1st Ever Illinois State Championship At World Shooting Complex

parta, IL I have never been involved with an historic event before. when the Prairie State Cowboy Action Shooters Association was formed I became a member because it was formed for the sole purpose of creating the 1st ever SASS Illinois State Championship. Illinois is a very active state for Cowboy Action ShootingTM with 19 clubs, so it seemed odd there had never been a state championship. The Illinois state government was looking for ways to stimulate economic growth in parts of the state where the economy was depressed. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources acquired 1600 acres of land outside Sparta, Illinois in Randolph County with plans to build the World Shooting Complex. This remarkable facility arguably will be the largest complex of its kind in the world with 3.5 miles of trap stations, 1000 campsites with water and electricity, and many other great features.

That the facility is being built at all is remarkable. (That it is being built in Illinois may signal the end of the world, as we know it!) It has



Have you wondered how a master shootist manages to make perfect hits in so small a time? Not used to having the split part of a second make the difference between living and dying, a skilled shooting gallery shot is used to piddling along, doing this and doing that, and having plenty of time to do it in. A greenhorn in his excitement errs to the side of speed, shaking the loads out of his sixgun as fast as he can with the barest hope he's flung 'em in the general direction of the target.

What the Master Shootist has learned to do is strike a perfect balance between amazing speed and hair-line accuracy. He can both shoot a cigarette out from under the hairlipped lady's mustache or get his hogleg out and smoking in the smallest part of a second. He's learned to move with precise lightning speed in all his gun





ast month we addressed the subject of "race guns." Race guns are modified firearms designed to perform better, faster, and maybe longer than standard out of the box firearms. SASS has always been committed to using standard, out of the box, tuned firearms that operate smoothly and accurately. There is a long-standing policy to this effect because it is a huge detriment to future membership recruitment if new $\,$ people believe they must spend a significant amount of money for their basic firearms and another significant amount of money making these firearms competitive. If the Territorial Governors do not

resolve this issue at SASS' Las Vegas Convention, is the battle lost? No.

Do race guns make a difference in competition? The answer is both yes

The Champions put in many hours of hard, dedicated work honing their competitive shooting skills to a sharp edge. Milliseconds can indeed accumulate and change the standings in major matches. Faster is better. If the other guy has a special modification to his firearm, then you will need the same modification if you want to keep up. We're talking about the top 1% of our membership here.

SASS has a significant number of folks with fantasies of being competitive ... these folks will likely never win no matter what they do to their guns. The remaining 90% of our competitors are "social" shooters ... they like to suit up, strap on their guns, and play "cowboy" with their buddies. They care how they shoot ... they all want to do their very best and out-shoot their buddies ... but they have no interest in committing to many hours of dedicated practice and no delusions about winning "the big one." Race guns do absolutely nothing for these folks.

Secondly, stage design has a big impact on the need for race guns.

The Judge has lately been on a soapbox regarding "cowboy plate racks." By this, he means targets evenly spaced and all at the same height \dots with dump plates being the ultimate. These stage set-ups are conducive to cycling the firearm as fast as it will go and sweeping across the targets. Once again, large dump plates are the ultimate. Are race guns an advantage here? You bet they are!

With a little more creativity given to stage design, where the height and distances of each target are varied, requiring the sights to be reacquired for each target, the advantage offered by super fast cycling race guns goes out the window. Standard, tuned firearms are just as competitive as highly modified race guns because they can all be cycled during the sight reacquisition time ... one can spend the money to incorporate the changes, but they offer nothing in the way of a beneficial payoff.

Since reacquiring the sights takes longer than the cycle time of any tuned firearm, it increases the stage times a little, but puts all the firearms on an equal footing. The effort is not to slow down the top competitors ... these guys are going to win anyway ... remember they've worked hard for what they can do and they're good at it! The objective is to eliminate any advantage of super fast cycling firearms.

We must continue to guard against complicated shooting sequences and small, distant targets (which also increase the stage times) because complicated shooting sequences become procedural mine fields for everyone, and small, distant targets are sources of frustration for younger, inexperienced, and social shooters - the big 90% group. All the targets need to be placed so all the shooters have a good possibility of hitting them ... and any tough bonus targets should be just that, $\bar{\text{bonuses}}$ when successfully engaged, and "no calls" for failure to successfully engage. Hitting targets is a lot more fun and satisfying than missing (or getting confused).

Although our matches are competitions (we keep score) and we value our champions, we're still in the entertainment business for the vast majority of our members ... let's keep them happy and not make them feel they need to pay more money for modifications they really don't need.

ON DISQUALIFICATION

I'm writing in response to Palaver Pete's article in the August Cowboy Chronicle that suggests SASS relax its regulations associated with disqualification. I and many other members of the United States Practical Shooting Association support SASS, and would hate to see the safety record of any shooting sport - especially a PRAC-TICAL shooting sport - brought into disrepute out of a desire to be compassionate. Reinstating someone who has committed a safety infraction might seem like kindness, but it endangers everyone else on the range.

Allow me to explain.

SASS' safety rules were based on the rules of the United States Practical Shooting Association (USPSA). I serve on USPSA's professional staff, and have been an active practical shooter (USPSA, IDPA, 3-Gun, even a little unsanctioned cowboy) for almost 15 years, giving me plenty of opportunity to see those rules in action.

USPSA and SASS enjoy a long, almost injury-free history, thanks in large part to their stringent safety rules. Specifically, both organizations' rules forbid a competitor from participating in any shooting for the balance of the match after they have committed a safety infraction.

The Chronicle's editor did a fine job pointing out these rules emphasize the importance of safety, but he missed two important elements:

- 1. When a shooter gets DQ'ed, in most cases, he's emotionally rattled. He's just done something unsafe with a lethal device, and worse, other people saw him do it. For the next several hours, that shooter is much MORE likely to do something foolish and unsafe, simply because he's upset, and not thinking properly.
- 2. Consider the liability ramifications of re-instating someone that has just been disqualified for unsafe conduct.

being unsafe, as the record shows, but we decided not to disqualify him because we didn't want to hurt his feelings. We're terribly sorry that Mrs. Johnson's son was killed, and we're going to hold a memorial match in his honor.

That conversation precedes Mrs. Johnson coming into a large amount of money - courtesy of the host club's Board of Directors.

Like your editor, I've been on both sides of the DQ coin. I've been DQ'ed twice myself, and I've disqualified others several times, including having the sad duty of disqualifying a shooter at the USPSA national championships. I've also turned a blind eye to actions that technically deserved a DQ, and lived to regret it. As painful as disqualification is, the rules are there for a reason.


Stick by your guns SASS, lowering your safety standards endangers us all.







that is simply not possible. It's like trying to infuse socialism into our sport, and we don't need that.





True freedom isn't free nor is it easy, and people's comfort level would be significantly disrupted, generating heated anger targeted at politicians everywhere—politicos are real cowards in that regard and can't stand such negative attention—or the resulting low poll numbers!
- 3. Lastly, the indisputable fact is politicians in general enjoy the real power and perks of being in Washington and controlling millions of lives across America. They've become inebriated on power and can't get their fill. Like an alcoholic, they can't limit themselves to just one drink (one term). They drink more and more and begin to see themselves as the center of the universe. What this translates into is the truthful crux of the whole question—politicians really don't want to change our system no matter what they say on the evening news around election time. "Matt Clark, Railroad Detective, traveled West every week to get his hands on yet another illustrious criminal; from Jesse James and Doc Holiday to The Dalton Gang, Geronimo, and Little Britches." That's the promo, that's the premise, and Detective Clark covers them all. He is a principal in or a witness to the end of the careers of thirty-six well known, and well feared, bad men and women of the Old West, and his wondrous career spans more than 50 years, from the 1850s through the early 1900s, and from sea to shining sea and even into South America (think Butch Cassidy!) . Somehow, through it all, he retains his charming, 35ish good looks! Matt Clark is none other than Jim Davis! Who?

Jim Davis, who played Jock

Ewing on TV's famous "Dallas." Now you recall? Sure you do. Maybe. He played in any number of movies, not just Westerns, whether you recall or not, including some well known films such as John Wayne's "Rio Lobo" (Davis played a Deputy) and Bob Hope's "Alias Jesse James" (Davis played Frank James). In reality, he had more than 100 movie and TV credits but I think his most enduring role was as Jock Ewing in Dallas. Why, I don't know, he was good looking enough and had the right moves for any Western movie and should have been a bigger star in my opinion. 
It was time to round up the posse,



THE BENDERS OF KANSAS

Where Facts Intertwine with Legend in the Dusty Annals of History

Part II

Part I covered the basic story of the Bloody Benders and their disappearance as the neighbors became suspicious ... Now, for the "rest of the story" ...

And then there's my personal favorite – the "dead prospector" variant, which authoritatively proclaims the Old Man had managed to make good his escape. For years afterward, it was a standard cliché to teasingly "accuse" any man of the right age of being Old Man Bender (thus explaining the accusations against our own Palaver Pete). And here things take yet another strange turn. According to this account, nothing more was heard of the Old Man, that is, until many years later when the Gold Rush was going strong up in the

Idaho and Montana Territories. There, on a desolate stretch of the Salmon River, a lone miner traveling between Salmon City and Challis chased a recalcitrant mule well off the trail. He found the mule, but also found a starving, helpless old man more dead than alive. Looking at the man's hollow cheeks and glazed eyes, the miner decided to nurse him back to health. One night, the (now recovered) old man knocked the kindly prospector's brains out with an axe and stole a horse to make good his escape. Again.

By sheer luck, some citizens of Salmon happened upon the scene of the murder and followed the trail until they eventually captured the perpetrator of this hideous crime. They brought him back to Salmon, with the idea of hanging him for the whole town to watch. Once there, someone recognized him — it was Old Man Bender! And after all these years, he still had a price on his head. Thereupon followed a debate whether to risk sending him back to Kansas for the reward, or just to hang him now and be done with it.

In the meantime, the citizens of Salmon chained Old Man Bender's ankle to a stake — jeering, kicking, and goading him all the while of the fate that awaited him on both sides of Eternity. Sobbing, the Old Man pleaded for his life, but his pleas fell upon deaf ears. Eventually, the miners adjourned indoors to continue the debate. But Old Man Bender had one

last card left to play. Taking out a pocketknife, he cut off the chained foot and stumbled back into the wilderness on the bloody stump. (Note: this should dispel any rumors that Palaver Pete is actually Old Man Bender. It does however, raise strong suspicions concerning another SASS member who goes by the name of Pete).

When the citizens discovered how he had made good his escape, they were furious! But although they immediately set out on his well marked trail, the Old Man bled to death before they could reach him. Cheated out of their vengeance, they pondered whether to attempt to collect the reward. It being too warm and late in the season for the

corpse to be recognizable after making the trip to Kansas, an Indian suggested interment in a nearby swamp to preserve it until cold weather arrived.

But shortly afterwards, the Indian dug up the corpse for use in making his "medicine." He later told of how one leg jerked spasmodically as he dragged it out of the marsh. Attempting to silence the convulsions, the Indian buried his hatchet into the corpse's skull. After stewing the corpse and making his medicine, he laid its bones out in a tree to bleach, according to custom. (Some say the silencing of Old Man Bender's corpse with a hatchet to the skull is just too darn coincidental to be true. Perhaps so; perhaps not. Either way, the axiom "when the legend becomes fact, print the legend!" applies).

At any rate ... Years later, a wandering miner found a tomahawkscarred skull high up in a pine tree and brought it into town with him. There (so the story goes), he presented it to a local saloon owner who displayed it on the back bar for many years. (I cannot locate my reference at the moment, but if I recall correctly the bar may have been in Grangeville or Elk City, present-day Idaho).

And so this is the "true" story of Old Man Bender and his family, according to legend and custom. How much is actually true? Which version is the most accurate? And did the grisly epilogue in Idaho really take place? The basic facts remain the same; only the details and the degree of gruesomeness seem to vary from one version to the next. No doubt the early town promoters of Parsons, Kansas allowed the specifics to fade into obscurity in their eagerness to attract new settlers. But any way you "slice" it, there's proof once again that "fact is indeed, stranger than fiction!"

Current highway marker, located in the rest area at the junction of US Rte 400 and US Rte 169 in Labette County, Kansas:

Near here are the Bender Mounds, named for the infamous Bender family ~ John, his wife, son, and daughter Kate ~~ who settled here in 1871. Kate soon gained notoriety as a self-proclaimed healer and spiritualist. Secretly, the four made a living through *murder* and robbery.

 $Located \ on \ a \ main \ road, \ the$ Benders sold meals and supplies to travelers. Their murders were carried out by use of a canvas curtain that divided the house into two rooms. When a traveler was seated at the table, his head was outlined against the curtain. The victim was then dispatched from behind with a hammer, and the body was dropped into a basement pit, later to be buried in an orchard.

As more and more travelers disanpeared, suspicion began to center on the Benders. They disappeared in the spring of 1873, shortly before inquisitive neighbors discovered the victims' bodies. The Benders are believed to have killed about a dozen people,

including one child.

Although stories abound, the ultimate fate of the murderous Bender family is uncertain. Some say they escaped, others that they were executed by a vengeful posse. Their story is unresolved, and remains one of the great unresolved mysteries of the Old West.



THE TRUE STORY OF THE CERVEZA KID

was born in Baltimore in 1862. My unwed mother died in childbirth, and I was orphaned as an infant. When I was eight, I ran away and made my way west doing whatever I could. I never had any schooling, but I had street smarts and I worked hard.

When I was fourteen I was working at Nuttall and Mann's No. 10 Saloon in Deadwood in the Dakota Territory (it was called Deadwood Gulch back then). My job was to get beer and sandwiches for the paying customers so they wouldn't have to stop drinking or playing cards. I didn't get paid, but I got three meals and a place to sleep in the back. Some of the regulars would give me tips, especially when they were drunk. One fellow I got to know pretty well was James Butler Hickok. Back then some people had started calling him Wild Bill, but to me he was always Mr. Hickok. Mr. Hickok liked me for two reasons.

First, we both had the same birthday, May 27. Second, I knew to keep my mouth shut and not talk about some of the things he did when he was drunk, which was most of the time. Sometimes I would steal a bottle from behind the bar and give it to him when he didn't have any money. Once I even paid for one of his whores because he was broke. However, most of the time I used to just stand near Mr. Hickok and watch him gamble. He said he felt more comfortable knowing someone he could trust was behind him.

1876 was a terrible year. In June, General Custer was killed by the Sioux and the Chevenne at some place called the Little Bighorn. That was the most shocking news any of us had ever heard. Then, on August 2, the worst thing in my life occurred. That afternoon I was in the No. 10 at my usual place behind Mr. Hickok at the poker table. He asked me to get him some cigars. He was winning and he gave me a dollar and told me I could keep the change. He still had one cigar on the table, so it didn't seem to me he was in much of a rush. I went in the back to get his cigars and, since I was in no hurry, decided to sneak a beer. I had done this a couple of times before, but that day I had maybe three or four. I remember sitting on a sack of corn thinking how good everything felt. I must have dozed off, 'cause the next thing I remember was hearing a shot that woke me up. People were always shooting their guns off in Deadwood, but something told me this was different. I ran back into the saloon and saw a crowd at Mr. Hickok's table. I knew something was bad. When I got to the table, I saw Mr.

Hickok on the floor. He had been shot in the back of the head and was dead. He was still holding onto his cards, aces and eights. This crazy guy, Jack McCall, had done it, and the crowd had him down on the floor and was kicking him. They hanged him in Yankton the next year for Mr. Hickok's murder.

If I hadn't stayed in the back drinking beer, Mr. Hickok wouldn't have been shot. When everyone found out where I'd been, they started calling me names like "Beer Boy," "Slow Suds," and "Cerveza Kid." That name stuck. Later I moved to the New Mexico Territory. I could have gone back to my real name, but I decided to keep Cerveza Kid as my punishment for letting Mr. Hickok down. That's the true story.

He has recently begun to include drawings of Old West firearms in his work as well. Ken travels the country photographing live models and scenery, which he then uses as the subjects and settings for his paintings and drawings. He is known for his attention to detail and the realism of his artwork. His work has been featured on the covers of nationally known magazines, such as "Art of the West," "Midwest Art," and "Wild West."

Ken has been a full-time artist since 1980, but only learned about Cowboy Action ShootingTM and SASS in 2004 at the Las Vegas Cowboy Christmas Show where he was displaying his artwork. Soon thereafter he joined SASS, adopting the very apropos alias of "Painter Boy," SASS #62747. This April, Ken made the long trek out to Albuquerque, NM, where he served as an END of TRAIL vendor, introducing his artwork to SASS members from around the world. 
I grew up on small farm, and my most vivid childhood memory is racing home with my Dad on Saturday nights to make it in time for Have Gun will Travel and

I missed the good old days of pictures like The Three Mesquiteers, Hopalong Cassidy, Gene Autry, and Roy Rogers, with corrupt saloon owners, crooked bankers, claim jumpers, land grabs, aging lawmen, stage robberies, stalwart farmers, hooded gunman, fast guns - these were once staples of the genre I wanted to bring back. The spirit of SASS members with their

great humor and camaraderie during matches fit seamlessly into this fun-loving mold.

Many of these early films, though often outwardly simplistic, had serious messages for youngsters of duty, honor, and country that were equally important. I set Hell to Pay in the days immediately following the American Civil War, as two brothers migrate west and end up not only on opposite sides of the law, but in love with the same woman in the spirit of great fun westerns of the past.

Casting was critical, as we had to find three types of characters: Young, talented, up and comers like Rachel to carry the main story; legendary icons of the silver screen to give the picture weight, scope, and hopefully fond memories; and championship SASS members instantly recognizable to our target audience of Cowboy Action Shooters.

Jubal O. Sackett was kind enough to introduce me to Evil Roy, cast in the film as the ruthless Roy Hobbs, acolyte of Bloody Bill Anderson who comes west from Kansas after the war in search of his granddaughter, played in the film by none other than Evil's real granddaughter, known to SASS worldwide as Holy Terror. As word spread we enlisted the participation of Outlaw Annie, Quick Cal, Frederick Jackson Turner, Cole Younger, Lassiter, Ellsworth T. Madd Kincaid. Mike. and Handlebar Doc in key roles, along with SASS co-founder, Tex himself.

Our casting director Dana Wayne searched through 4,000 actors and actresses in addition to Rachel, finding leads Kevin Kazakoff, William Gregory Lee, Jason Shaw, Griff Furst, Katie Keane, and Alison Vasan who bring extraordinary conviction to their roles.

The final piece was the celebrated men and women of the silver screen who made their mark in the great Westerns. Luckily, each star I sought liked the script, so we're blessed with an astonishing cast of extraordinary screen legends, including Lee Majors, James Drury, Bo Svenson, Stella Stevens, Andrew Prine, Peter Brown, William Smith, Buck Taylor, Denny Miller, and Tim Thomerson. The film was shot by the enormously gifted cinematographer Stephen Shank, veteran of numerous series and great films such as Dead Poets Society and Midnight Run.

Firearms and wardrobe accuracy was paramount. Jubal O. Sackett supplied the Sharps and Henry rifles, Remingtons, and Colts. Cimarron Firearms, Buffalo Brothers, and High Desert Leather

supplied the custom firearms and period rigs. Jack Lilly and Phil Smith, the two top western movie wranglers in California, supplied the horses, buckboards, and stagecoach, with most of the costumes coming from Warner Bros.

The picture was filmed entirely at Sable Ranch, one of only three surviving and operating Western movie ranches in California. The old Newhall Movie Ranch in Santa Clarita and Warner Bros Ranch in Burbank, both used for my Glenn Ford film, Law at Randado, were long ago converted to housing tracts and high-rise offices.

Hell to Pay was a considerable financial risk, and will only be truly successful if SASS members respond to the film and purchase the DVDs in significant numbers. My fervent hope is the film so many of these folks labored over for so many long hours and days to bring to life will be appreciated by its core audience of Cowboy Action Shooters for what it was meant to be - a throwback to the beloved pictures of our youth; of courage, honor, love of country, and duty, where in the words of so many of our heroes, a gun was only as good or bad as the man who used it. .

TUNING MARLIN RIFLES

The following tips will work for ■ the regular Marlin Cowboy rifles, but are especially useful in the new Competition Cowboy rifle. Right out of the box the new Marlin Competition Cowboy is much smoother than the original, and the 20-inch barrel length makes it even better. Smaller shooters really appreciate the shorter barrel length and lighter weight; the ten round magazine capacity is quite sufficient for our sport. As smooth and great as the new competition model is, it can be improved to various degrees and at very little cost.

One of the first things to do with your new Marlin is to get rid of the white diamond on the rear sight, which is not SASS legal. There are two ways to correct this problem. The easiest is to merely black it out with a magic marker, something that is often done at major matches. The method I prefer is to loosen the screw holding

the offending white diamond slide, remove it, and turn it around. When replacing it, I always turn it so the U notch is still up, and fire a few sighting shots to make sure the rifle is corectly zeroed. I like my rifles to hit point of aim at fifty yards; this eliminates any correction from close in to one hundred yards. Often side matches will be held with your pistol caliber rifle at a hundred yards or even further; therefore, it pays to know where your rifle shoots at such long ranges.

In the interest of comfort when working the action briskly, as we do in a match, I like to wrap the lever with leather. Your local shoe repair shop should have leather bootlaces; these come in a 72-inch length perfect for wrapping the lever. Start at the front and leaving about an inch or so, tightly wrap the lever all the way to the back and down the rear curve, then wrap back to the start. With

the inch length at the front, tie a knot and then soak the knot with superglue. In a couple minutes, you can trim off the excess lace and you have a permanent padded lever, a real knuckle saver.

Now to the actual tuning of your new rifle, the Cowboys and Indian Store sells a great kit (\$30 plus shipping) to smooth up any of the '94 Marlins. This kit consists of a one-piece firing pin, as well as new hammer and lever detent springs, and easy-to-follow instructions. To install the firing pin, you merely remove the lever screw, lever, and bolt. Using a 3/32-inch punch, remove the two roll pins that hold the factory twopiece firing pin and spring. It is this flat spring that causes part of the resistance felt when closing the lever. Replace the two-piece firing pin minus the flat spring with your new one-piece pin, and utilizing the center hole in the bolt, replace that roll pin. The old

two-piece pin, spring, and one roll pin are discarded or put in the spare parts bin.

Using a 1/16-inch punch, remove the lever detent and spring; reinstall using the new spring. Suddenly the action will work even smoother than before. To install the final spring in the kit, you must first remove the butt stock. One tang screw holds the butt stock to the action. With the hammer in the lowered, forward, or fired position, it is a simple matter to slide out the hammer spring retainer. Again, replace with the spring from your kit, and replace the butt stock. Your Marlin is now much smoother with a lighter trigger pull. While the butt stock is off, I usually bend the flat spring that works on the projection through the lower tang. This projection prohibits the rifle from firing unless the lever is fully closed. A slight bend is usually all that is

necessary to lighten the resistance this puts on closing the lever. Be very careful if you decide to bend this flat spring, as it's very easy to over-bend or break it. Most of the time it may not even be necessary to bend this spring, depending on how the action feels to you. There is one other addition to improve the trigger pull that some feel necessary. Wild West Guns makes a one-piece trigger, available from Brownells, (part #981-000-004 for \$89.95) which is said to lighten the pull. Personally, I have not used this, as it's an expensive part, and to my way of thinking, of somewhat dubious value considering what we use our rifles for. Also, I feel the two-piece trigger is a safety feature to prevent or lessen the chance of an accidental discharge.

If you have a rough chamber or merely wish to make extraction of the fired cases easier, Brownells can help you out. They carry a special "Flex-Hone" designed to smooth or hone out any tool marks left in the rifle chamber. .38/.357 caliber, use (part #080- $608\text{-}338); \ \ for \ \ .45 \ \ caliber \ \ (part$ #080-608-345), either one costs \$25.72. You will also need their special Flex-Hone Oil; a half pint (part #080-609-008) sells for \$8.95. You simply chuck the Flex-Hone in a variable speed drill, lube up the chamber, insert the Flex-Hone with the drill running about 750 rpm, and in a few minutes your chamber is glass smooth. Then clean the bore to remove any traces of the abrasive left from the honing operation.

To make loading easier, I like to remove a few coils from the magazine spring and also alter the loading gate tension. To alter the loading gate, you must first disassemble the rifle and remove this part. I use a small grinding wheel in a Dremel tool to cut down the sides of the gate spring slightly. This is done in an hourglass pattern and very carefully. You don't want to overdo it or you will ruin the part. This is one operation best done by a knowledgeable gunsmith familiar with the procedure.

The last item I consider essential to make the Marlin a real cowboy competition rifle is removal of the cross bolt safety. I would not recommend this for a rifle used for anything other than Cowboy Action Shooting TM . In Cowboy Action Shooting M you only load at the loading table, shoot your scenario, and then go to the unloading table where you rifle is checked to ensure it's empty. At first, I used to turn out a safety replacement on my lathe and then blue it to match the receiver, a labor-intensive project. Now there is an easier way. A gentleman by the name of Clyde Ludwig makes a nifty replacement

for the safety that is nicely blued and slotted to look like a screw head. This \$13 item replaces the original safety perfectly in just a few minutes. No longer can you inadvertently bump the safety to the on position and lose shots on the clock. I have seen this happen far too many times. Usually the shooter will eject one or several rounds before realizing what happened. This only has to happen once to really ruin an otherwise

Installation of this unit is a little tricky, but not a problem if you are careful and follow the instructions. With the butt stock off, you will find a gob of yellow paint covering a small socket screw on the left rear of the receiver. Pick out the paint and insert a 5/64 inch Allen wrench and remove the screw. Now the tricky part; there is a small spring and ball bearing under this screw. DON'T loosen these parts. Remove the old safety and slip in the new replacement; replace the ball bearing, spring, and socket head screw. By turning the replacement with a screwdriver, adjust it until the hammer falls fully. Make sure the socket head screw is tight. Cover it with a drop of Lock-Tite or paint, replace the butt stock, and you now have a real competition rifle. Note that removing parts or altering the internal and/or safety portions of a firearm will surely void the warranty. If you feel hesitant about performing these alterations, by all means have a competent gunsmith do the work. In addition, neither the author nor The Cowboy Chronicle assumes any liability for alterations to the safety devices of any firearm.

hen I go to my workbench, I know my tools are in specific places and oriented so they are easy to access and use. I have some custom tools made specifically for my hand. My benches are at a specific height for maximum comfort and efficiency of movement because leatherwork requires movements that are dependent on specific body positions as well as repeated tool motions. How do I know? I've cut

MUSCLES - MORE THAN MOTION

hundreds of miles of lines, stamped and carved acres of cowhide, and edged hundred of miles of strap goods - and probably made every mistake in the book. I've studied, analyzed, and pondered the errors of my ways and have improved considerably since I picked up my first swivel knife. I'm confident and competent as a result.

Having said that, let's talk about me and Cowboy Action ShootingTM ...

I'm awful at it. They time me on a calendar. The spotters have to spell each other for coffee lest they fall asleep during my stages. I'm slower than slow. I'm pathetic. Now, I know I'm not lacking in mechanical skills, and I'm reasonably decent in the hand/eye coordination department, so what gives?

It's not that I don't have some nice gun leather. Nope, nope. Truth is, I could have slicked-up gun buckets and some super tricked-up guns and I'd still be slower'n Slowpoke

Rodriguez. Could it be I simply don't practice? Yup!

Being a one-person operation, I'm pretty much resigned to being shackled to my bench, but that's not the entire story either. Practice is good, but it's not worth a flyin' fiddler's yahoo if the motions practiced are bad or inefficient. The concept at the core of this is something known as "muscle memory."

Practice develops muscle memory. Essentially, you have it when a particular series of motions (good or bad) becomes instinctive. When I draw my guns, I'm not familiar enough with them, their mechanics, and the placement of my holsters and other gear to have that ease and flow of movement. That doesn't mean I'm dangerous or I can't hit the broad side of a barn, it mostly means I'm slow because I have to think about every single motion. My brain being the weakest muscle in my body ... well ... you know ...


Muscle memory is an interest-

ing thing. We mostly don't think about things like using a set of eatin' irons or a pen, but there's lots of muscle memory involved in that. Just ask your mom or teacher! In my circle of pards and colleagues, where even more complex movements are involved, we call it "doing the dance" — and no, in this instance I'm NOT referring to that move you make when you have a crossdraw holster. This is different, and it doesn't matter if it's a guy driving a bulldozer, a ballroom dancer, or a cowboy pingin' off targets with split-second precision. You sure know it when you see it. It's economy and fluidity of motion, one movement melding into the next.

Muscle memory is mostly dependent on practice, but it's also dependent on gear. Oddly, it's not the slicking or tricking of your gear that makes or breaks you here though for very practiced "dancers,"

those *are* important considerations. If you are an average shooter, it is ergonomics that will give you the edge. With respect to your guns, this means they must not only balance well in your hand, but also work with your hand. Theses are the principles of ergonomics and basic applied mechanics. Guns don't have to be slick but ... if the gun is barrel or cylinder heavy, if the grips are too big or too small, or if the trigger is too far forward or too far back, they will never work with you. Similarly, if your gear isn't right for you, you'll be fighting an uphill battle against it. If your belt irritates you, or your holsters are sticky or riding higher, lower, more forward or aft of where your hand naturally wants them to be, then you'll be dealing with that rather than concentrating on smoothing out your draw.

A holster that takes two hands and a boot to get a pistol out of is an obvious hindrance, but is it possible that a very slick holster might also be? My humble opinion as a maker is it very well might. Developing muscle memory is a process of making repeated motions the same way every single time. Its development is not only dependent on making the movement, but also on thinking about that movement and improving on it until it is absolutely correct and absolutely second nature. It is easier to think about how you are drawing when you get a bit of biofeedback from your holster. I'm not talking about the negative kind of feedback that comes from having to violently yank your guns out of a holster. That does no one good. This discussion is about a holster that allows you to draw your smokewagon smoothly and easily with just the weensiest bit of friction to let you know where it is at all times. This gives you a report on the position of your gun throughout the entire process of drawing and re-holstering and allows you to analyze movements and make small corrections until that draw (and reholster) feel identical each and every time. Your chances of getting that same end result are slimmer with a gun bucket because you have no biofeedback mechanism. Furthermore, your chances of bobbling a gun are increased with a loose holster. If you think you've cleared leather and you hit the side or front of the holster, or if you think the barrel's in the holster but you're actually holstering air, your game is going to suffer from more than just a second or two here or there! Don't forget too, an inexperienced shooter needs to think about all the movements involved in the action part of this game, and a loose holster and the wrong move can cause a pistol to go to dirt in a hurry if the shooter is moving and not thinking. I'm



not against slick holsters, but I have a healthy respect for them: great in the hands of the experienced, potential accident in the hands of the new, inexperienced, or careless shooter.

And don't forget, a slight friction draw in a holster can be worked out as you gain experience and confidence. Some of this will happen naturally with time and use, or it can be "installed" with a bit of attention to molding and fitting as you get more comfortable with your gear. Making a sloppy holster smaller is not as easy.

Compadres, they tell me the

directions on how to get to Carnegie Hall are "Practice, practice, practice." I don't expect I'll make it to the stage there any time soon but I know there's not a single puncher born yet who can't learn "to do the dance" (if only a modest polka) by paying attention to ergonomics and your movements and thinking about how they all interrelate. Meantime, I'll be settin' in the audience and takin' notes!

The RO Committee recently discussed the 10-Second Minor Safety Penalty for leaving empty or live rounds in the magazine or on the carrier of the long gun in which they were loaded.

This has been a controversial penalty for the past few years, and there are deep-seated opinions on both sides of the issue. Some believe an empty shotgun hull stuck in the action of a '97 presents no safety concern and therefore should be no

penalty if the action is left open. The side-by-side shooters say if they've got to clear them, then so do the '97's. Others believe all longs guns should be left open and empty for safety sake, especially since sometimes there is downrange movement after discarding long guns. In any case, the Territorial Governors resolved this issue three years ago, and there is a rule in place.

However, various clubs are enforcing this rule in different ways. Here are examples of two extremes being applied depending upon the club at which these infractions occur.

#1 Some clubs feel the rule is the rule. If you put down a long gun, and it "leaves your hands" with an empty hull or casing anywhere in the gun, it was loaded. The 10-Second Minor Safety Penalty is earned the moment that gun leaves your hands.

#2 Other clubs feel so long as one clears any hulls or empty casings out of the action before going to the unloading table, there is no penalty.

The problem is we get together and shoot larger matches, and if we aren't all on the same page, we will have rules being applied differently depending upon which posse we're on. Although there are strong opinions on both sides of this issue, for the good of the sport we must have a common understanding of the rules the Territorial Governors have seen fit to invoke.

The RO Committee has determined the "Open and Empty Rule" should be applied the same as leaving an unopened action in the

course of a stage. In fact, both situations are generally written about in the same places within the rules ... if there is still a hull or casing in an action, it's probably a good indication the action was not opened all the way. If you look in the SASS Range Operations Basic Safety Course, which is downloadable on <sassnet.com>, on page 9 under "Additional Commands" it states what has long been the policy concerning unopened actions. This policy pre-dates the entire RO Program by years and was an unwritten practice dating back to the very beginnings of Cowboy Action Shooting TM .

The text states, "Action Open" -This command is given by the Timer Operator when a competitor puts a (Continued on next page)

long-gun down with the action closed. The Timer Operator must do everything in his/her power to prevent the shooter from moving from that position with the action of any discarded long-gun closed. If the shooter puts down a long-gun with the action closed, but returns and opens the action, there is no penalty."

Therefore, we are advising all RO's to do their best to ensure there is no hull or empty casing in the action as the shooter is in the process of putting the long gun down. If you can see the action is not open or there is a shell in the action, you can command, "Action Open" or "Clear Your Action" or "Hull in Action," and as long as the competitor returns and makes the situation right before engaging their next firearm, there is no penalty. Engaging the next firearm means cocking it. If the long-gun with the hull or empty casing in the action is the last gun fired on the stage, there is no penalty so long as it is cleared before reaching the unloading table. We suggest all Certified Range Officers adopt these updated commands as documented in the RO Course. If for any reason the RO doesn't spot the infraction, the ultimate responsibility still lies with the shooter to make sure the gun is clear, and penalties will apply.

The RO Committee also had a lively debate on whether a shotgun hull hanging out of the action of a '97 constitutes not having the gun "clear." I admit I have always personally felt if a hull is hanging out, then it is not "on the carrier." But, the majority of the RO Committee feels we should not have a rule that has many gray areas of interpretation ... either it's empty or it's not. So, I have to agree with the RO Committee and this decision, as I hope all SASS members will. I thought I would share this inside look at how the RO Committee functions and how it reaches decisions. All members should be aware, though, the RO Committee does not make rules. That task belongs to the Territorial Governors. The RO Committee simply clarifies and blends them all together in the Handbook and RO Program while striving to avoid conflicts and inconsistencies ... although the word "simply" can indeed be very complicated at times!

Since the RO Committee has now stated a hull in the action has the same status as a closed action and is correctable under the "Action Open" command, a Timer Operator who is paying attention can save a shooter from receiving this penalty.

We hope this clears up any misunderstandings. The RO Committee will adjust appropriate wording in the Handbook and RO Program during the annual editing after the Las Vegas Convention's Territorial Summit. .

Thave been involved in Cowboy Action ShootingTM for seven years, and in that time I have seen some really good stages and some really bad ones. The key to good stages is planning, foresight, and a little bit of knowledge.

A match can be a winner or a loser for a club based on stage design. The absolute most important thing to make sure is your match runs on time. If your stages are not set up well, then people are going to get backed up and that can be the death of your match. A good thing to

do to ensure your stages run smoothly and on time is to throw them into your local matches so you can get an estimate of how long it takes a fast, regular, and slow shooter to complete the course of fire. By doing this, you can check to see if your stage runs on time or if it needs to be changed.

Other than making your match run on time, you want your stages to be fun. This part is a little harder because there is no single thing that makes a fun stage. There are several things to consider.

Targets are the first important part of a stage. Your targets should have a good range of sizes and distances. I have never seen a match survive if it had all six-inch targets at 25 yards. Your targets should vary in size and distance. It is fun to have a smaller target thrown into a group of larger ones because it mixes up the

difficulty of the stage and makes it more interesting. As a rule of thumb, I would suggest you make no target so small or so far out that a brand new shooter has trouble hitting it. For instance, if you choose to put a smaller target on the range, put it at a shorter distance so even a new shooter has the possibility of hitting it.


Props are the next most important part of the stage. Props can range from a house front to a gold bag the shooter has to carry around. Props are a little bit harder than targets because they are so diverse. A basic rule here is to make it so any person can use the props easily. You cannot accommodate everyone, but you want to make it possible for many people to use the prop easily. A good storefront has appropriately sized windows. It is okay to make the windows a little short so people have

to bend down, but if you make them tall, then it can be a problem for short people to see and shoot out of them. Gun staging positions need to be safe so guns will never fall off props.

There are a couple of things to look for in props the shooter holds or handles. One, is it easy to hold? A 25 pound gold bag is going to be difficult for smaller or weaker people to carry around. All props should be easy to handle, and if you think there is going to be a problem with a prop, then it is probably not a good idea to use it. Another concern is to be sure the prop can be handled safely.

After targets and props comes the stage scenario. The scenario is probably the place where there is the most room for mistakes. It is not easy to write a really inventive, fun to shoot scenario that is not too difficult or too

frustrating to shoot. The two biggest parts of a scenario are target order, and the non-shooting activities.

Target order is the hardest place to be really new and different, and you don't really have to be. Most of the scenarios that can be shot, we have all shot before. Many people want to invent new ones, so we keep getting these really complicated target orders. It is okay to invent new orders, but there are better ways to make a stage interesting. If you want to use a difficult target order, then try to make it the same with every gun on the stage. If you keep the target order consistent throughout the stage, it will still be fun to shoot without being so complicated as to frustrate people. It is always exciting to have a new target order, but when it is difficult and there is much for the shooter to remember, it can discourage even the more experienced shooters.

Other than target order, there are the non-shooting activities. These can include everything from where you are supposed to stand, what you are supposed to say, and so forth. Adding other activities can make your stage really unique and memorable. However, adding other activities can also make your match the biggest failure of the year. These days the competition for participants is fierce. There are things you can do to ensure this extra stuff doesn't hurt your match.

It is always good if the other stuff is kept to a minimum. If you have to sing a song, throw a rock, and hop on one foot while shooting a complicated scenario at four-inch targets, shooters aren't going to want to come back. They aren't going to tell their friends to come either. One or two "other" things for the shooter to do are interesting if they are kept simple.

If you are adding non-shooting activities, do them off the clock. Most matches will have the shooter say a line, but do it before the buzzer. If you want the shooter to light a match or throw a rock into a bucket, don't punish people who can't throw rocks by making them do it 50 times on the clock. Let them do it before the buzzer or set a limit as to how many times they have to try on the clock. If you score a rock throw as a miss, you are making it difficult for women because many women didn't grow up doing things like that as men and boys usually did.

Don't make non-shooting activities bonuses. Yes, Cowboy Action ShootingTM is about having fun, and being entertained, but it is a shooting sport. A ten second bonus for throwing a knife puts some people at



a disadvantage.

During my shooting years, I have seen many different kinds of stages. Some were really memorable because the match planners put in lots of hard work and thought about the shooter.

The biggest piece of advice I would give to anyone designing a stage is "Don't try to trick people." Lots of matches I don't attend anymore have tried to make things purposefully difficult for the shooters. They had really far or small targets, or they had ridiculously difficult target orders or too many non-shooting activities. There is no reason to try to make things harder for people.

The adrenaline running through our veins is enough to get us to mess up even really simple stuff. Besides hurting your match, it can potentially hurt our sport by making new shooters not want to come back.

Cowboy Action ShootingTM is the greatest thrill of my life, and I am sure it is for you, too. The stages are a big part of that thrill and deserve lots of attention, so put in the time and effort to make them really enjoyable.

When we are loading our rifles and revolvers at a match we seldom think of the history of the cartridge case. Cartridges have come a long way over the years. Let's take a step back into time and discover where we started and how we got to where we are today.

Our first stop in time will be the day of the flintlock rifle - the era of the long hunter. In those days loading was accomplished with loose gunpowder and ball. The gunpowder was usually stored in an animal's horn

called a powder horn. The shooter would pour a certain amount of gunpowder down the bore of his flintlock rifle. Then, he pushed a patched round ball down the bore of the rifle. This method of loading was very slow and not uniform, as the shooter probably poured different amounts of gunpowder each time he loaded his rifle.

Sometime before the Revolutionary War the next step was taken. The ball and a pre-measured amount of gunpowder were now encased in paper. The paper was rolled and glued into a tube. The round ball was inserted into the tube. Next, the powder was poured into the tube. Finally, the tube was closed at the other end and ready to be carried in a shooter's cartridge box. The shooter was able to carry several of these paper cartridges in his cartridge box. When needed, all the shooter had to do was to tear the end of the cartridge at the powder end and dump the powder down his rifle or musket bore. Next, the remaining paper and ball was pushed down the bore of the rifle with the rifle's ramrod. The paper was most often considered wadding. Using pre-measured powder charges gave the shooter more uniformity in his loads. This method was slightly faster than the earlier method of loading.

By the 1850's, things changed dramatically. Several new advancements had been made and more were soon to come. Flintlocks had been made obsolete by percussion ignition. Several brands of breech-loading rifles and carbines were the items of the day. These rifles and carbines used many different sizes and styles of contained cartridges. These cartridges, like the paper cartridge, only contained the bullet and powder. The ignition was still accomplished by an external method. At about the same time, rimfire ammunition came onto the scene. This ammunition was a completely self-contained metallic cartridge. Incorporating all three elements in one place, ignition, powder, and bullet, this was a big step in the development of the modern cartridge. In the early days, rimfire ammunition was expensive and very scarce.

The American Civil War was a boon for the firearms industry. Manufacturers developed several styles of rifles and carbines. Most of these all incorporated the newest advancements. However, the infantryman still carried a rifled Musket with a paper cartridge. The firearms boom of the Civil War gave more speed to the development of the modern cartridge. At the same time, the Civil War became a proving ground for many of the early cartridge guns, and caused the obsolescence of the old paper cartridge and the muzzle-loaders that used them. Paper cartridges were too easily torn or gotten wet. The earlier externally primed car-

tridges had their problems also, but they proved a breech-loader with a cartridge was the way of the future.

Most of the externally primed cartridges had a vent hole in the back, allowing the spark to travel through and get to the gunpowder. However, this only proved to be a great way for the gunpowder to dribble out of the cartridge or for water to get into it. Often the metal cartridges used in carbines, such as the Burnside and Gallagher, tended to stick in the chamber after only a few shots.

The way was now set for the internally primed, self contained, cartridges. Rimfire cartridges had proven efficient. However, they had their problems also. The early rimfire cartridges were made of copper, and copper corrodes easily. This corrosion would cause the cartridge case to split, causing problems for the shooter. Many letters from soldiers and ordinance officers detailed rimfire ammunition that would not ignite. This made the cartridge completely useless. A better solution was needed.

Early in the 1870's, centerfire ammunition came on the scene. In those days, it was referred to as central fire, most likely meaning the ignition was in the center of the cartridge instead of the outer rim. The case was boxer primed making it reloadable. This was a great advancement in ammunition, but not the last.

Before or just after the advent of smokeless powder, it was recognized the old copper cases were not strong enough for the pressures of the new smokeless powder. Some new material had to be utilized for cartridge cases, and brass was that new material. Since the adoption of brass, the cartridge case has changed very little. .

would like to discuss an aspect of photography that will help you make much better portrait photographs and overall event images. This technique will give you a sense of being in the photograph rather than just looking at them.

Human beings are blessed to live in a well-designed three-dimensional world - height, width and the space in between - yet, as photographers, we are forced to live in the flat two-dimensional world of the height and width of a print. So, how does a cowboy or cowgirl create a sense of all three dimensions on the printed image? Well, it involves a few creative photographic techniques that professionals use and (Continued on next page)

Another simple tip to make your cowboy photos better!

Here at the 2004 Deadmans Point I made use of the beautiful background surrounding the entire shoot and specifically posed these cowboys and girls where I thought they would look good in this posse photo. I wanted to add some foreground to the image to give the image a since of depth so I included bushes and a bit of rock. You will notice your eye enters at the bottom bushes quickly and for most of you will go to the left, up and then back to the right and around again. The simple foreground gives a since of depth to the image.

Canon 1D 20 to 40 wideangle lens, F/11, 1/500 of a second, 400 ISO and some flash.

this year's Smoke in the Valley the sunflowers were blooming everywhere. All I wanted was a very simple photo that would be pleasing. 1



asked this pretty lady to stand right next to the flowers. Her yellow dress and the surrounding yellow sunflowers made a great connection. I wanted only the flowers closest to her to be sharp and the ones behind her to start to fade so I set my f/stop to 3.5 with a 70 to 200 lens on a Canon 20D camera. The photograph has a soft, friendly, simple look to it, yet has a little depth with the flowers. Try this technique yourself.



SHOTGUN STYLE POINTS

By Wrong-handed Dave, SASS #57836

nyone shooting Cowboy Action AshootingTM can hit a helpless, stationary shotgun target - in fact, it's surprising (and painful) when someone misses. But, doing it from the hip, instead of the shoulder, gets you Style Points. Major Style Points. Looks even better with movement between targets. Think of what the spectators see! Mowing them down.

Now "from the hip" isn't exactly accurate - you have to snug up the stock with your forearm just above your hip; then you have the sweet spot. Instead of your shoulder taking the whole hit direct on (that hurts!), your forearm and body absorb the recoil. You'll be surprised at how little recoil you'll feel this way. Try it.

Line up the barrel with the target, and boom it. The longer the barrel, the better it works. The first few times you practice from the hip, you will likely shoot high and miss. Just aim for the bottom

of the target instead, your natural tendency to shoot high will compensate, and you'll hit it dead on.

But how about loading the '97s? (Those of us that are still allowed to use them - Down Under Cowboys had them banned.) Lefties will fall all over themselves with joy doing this. Snug up that cannon to your left side and hold it up out there with only your left hand. Now move your right hand to the shotgun shells and pop one in. Notice that your hand moves only 6 inches each way now, instead of all the way down and all the way up? Clack it shut, line up the barrel, boom. Pull back, rotating a bit toward the next target, and continue mowing 'em down. Righties can use this technique too, but the loading chamber is on the outside of the body, so they have to come over the top instead. ('Bout time righties experienced a bit of awkwardness in their sheltered lives.).

usually keep to themselves. Let me share two of these with you this issue.

At best a photograph or painting can create only a shallow approximation of reality. Through the use of perspective, you can create more interesting photos. For a photograph to be more interesting, or have a feeling of being there, you need to create the space in-between that we just talked about within the image. So how does one go about doing this? For a photographer, the easiest way to accomplish this is to add a distinct foreground object into the image thus imparting a since of depth. For example, adding maybe a wagon wheel or bushes or rocks into the foreground and placing your subject behind these items.

The key also is to find an object that complements the image such as Old West props that you find at most SASS shoots. Once you pose your subject in this type of situation, the photographer needs to move around a bit to create the right look. At this point take a few images at different angles and then just pick the best one.

Another way to accomplish this is to compose your image vertically. This will allow you to include more near ground space at the bottom of your image. Be sure, however, you include enough depth of field when doing this, usually around f/16 or so. Otherwise the background or foreground will not be sharp, but one will be blurry instead. Also try using a wide-angle lens when trying to accomplish this and it will increase apparent depth of field at lower f-stops.

Okay, let's look at one more thing you can use that we at Mr. Quigley Photography employ a lot. Next time you are trying to make a good portrait but cannot use the previous technique, do the next best thing. Surround the people or person with a nice appropriate background. Again, for example, pick cowboy props or maybe some trees or flowers or bushes.

Next time you are trying to visualize a scene to photograph, give some thought to your foregrounds and backgrounds and the way you will compose the photograph. It will make your photos better and more interesting. When looking at the image, you will feel as if you were there. Then you will have mastered the art of adding a sense of depth to your photographs.



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY



1890's

November

By Ellsworth T. Kincaid, Life/Regulator #6037

4 Nov 1890 The Hedgepath Four, named after its leader Marion Hedgepath, rob the Missouri Pacific Express Train in Nebraska, netting \$4,000.

25 Nov 1890 Word spread among the whites that in the camp of Big Foot, on the Cheyenne River, there were 364 lodges ... more than two thousand Indians, with more coming in every hour. General Miles decides to arrest Sitting Bull and disarm the Indians.

28 Nov 1890 Buffalo Bill Cody arrives at Fort Yates with an order to "capture" Sitting Bull. Since the two are friends, Cody proposes to induce him to surrendering of his own free will with a wagon full of gifts.

"You called me a liar not long ago," said law officer, Texas Ranger, and ranch foreman, Ira Aten. "Do you still say it?" Andrew McClelland, lawyer and candidate for the position of county judge replies, "I still say it, but have to say it unarmed!" "Then arm yourself, I'll wait." Aten retorted. McClelland ducks into a store and reappears with a brace of .45's, snapping off two quick shots at Aten. Aten returns the fire, hitting McClelland in the arm, knocking him down. As the lawyer is carried off, his brother Hugh fires at Aten, who turns and fires, wounding Hugh twice, who then flees.

3 Nov 1892 One of the most wanted men in Oklahoma Indian Territory, Ned Christie, a full-blooded Cherokee, horse thief, whiskey runner, and murderer is forced out of his fort near Tarlquah in the Cookson Hills. Discovered by U.S. Marshal Heck Thomas, the fort is surrounded by a small army of men. Over 2,000 rounds of small-arms are fired and 30 shots from a three-pounder bounce off the fort's logs. A few sticks of dynamite dislodged Ned. He staggers out levering his Winchester and is killed.

8 Nov 1892 Grover Cleveland defeats Benjamin Harrison by only some 360,000 votes, although the electoral vote is 277-145. Among those elected to office is Charles Curtis, grandson of a Kaw Indian chief, who spent three years on an Indian reservation before studying law. Elected on the Republican ticket, he will eventually serve as Herbert Hoover's vice-president.

1 Nov 1893 The Sherman Silver Purchase Act is repealed. In force since July 14, 1890, Western pro-silver states had received a bill calling for government purchase of large amounts of silver. This repeal will force the collapse of the fortunes of Colorado and other Western states. One who loses due to this is Horace Tabor, who will leave his wife, 'Baby Doe,' a worthless mine when he dies penniless in 1899.

7 Nov 1893 Colorado adopts woman's suffrage by popular vote.

Nov 1896 Doolin Gang member Dan Clifton, aka Dynamite Dick, is tracked down by law officers near Blackwell, Oklahoma and is killed in the resultant gun battle.

3 Nov 1896 Judge Roy Bean promotes the world heavyweight championship-boxing match between Maher & Fitzsimmons. Since fighting was illegal in all the states sans New York, the fight takes place on a sandbar in the Rio Grande.

3 Nov 1896 Idaho adopts an amendment to allow women to vote.

3 Nov 1896 W. H. Simpson establishes the advertising department of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad. It becomes one of the first railroads to promote the scenery along its routes and commissions over 500 original paintings of the Western genre.

17 Nov 1896 Isaac C. "Hanging Judge" Parker, having served more than 20 years, sending 79 men to their demise at the end of a rope, dies, 2 months and 17 days after his court had been abolished.

2 Nov 1897 Edward Harriman, highly regarded for his management of the Illinois Central Railroad, takes over operation of the Union Pacific Railroad. Reorganizing it after its 1893 bankruptcy, he will soon turn it into a major line and begin acquiring other railroads.

4 Nov 1897 Flat Nose George Curry, Tom O'Day, and Harvey and Lonny Logan, members of the Curry gang that robbed the Belle Fourche Bank in South Dakota in June and were quickly captured and jailed in Deadwood, escape after overpowering the jailer and abusing his wife. 


WAY OUT WEST -LITTLE KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE


A Movie Review

When I was a kid, growing up in small town America, one of our biggest treats was a Saturday at the theater. We'd pay our 50 cents, buy a bucket of popcorn and some Jujubees, and sit in the cool darkness, being taken away by the flickering screen to adventures most of us would never see. Hell To Pay isn't Gone With The Wind. It isn't meant to be. What it is, is an unapologetic, old school,

some of them were real dorkers. But my favorites were westerns.

So imagine my delight a few weeks ago, sitting in a LA theater, watching the premiere of writer/director Chris McIntyre's new western, Hell To Pay. MURDER IN TOMBSTONE

The Forgotten Trial of Wyatt Earp



nd then Virgil Earp, said, A"those men have made their threats. I will not arrest them, but will kill them on sight." Now it was suggested the Earps were deliberate assassins!

Contrary to cinematic imagery, the Old West was not devoid of law and order. Along with settlement came social institutions such as churches, schools, and businesses, all of which required law enforcement. Most towns were run by business leaders, who quickly enacted gun control ordinances and established local police forces, some of which—as in Dodge City, Kansas-became well known for their efficiency and professionalism. Consequently, shootings did not go unnoticed, and real-life murderers did not flaunt notches on their guns. Outlaws were apprehended, arrests were made. and trials were held. Even famous figures such as Wild Bill Hickok and Wyatt Earp were charged with crimes following shoot-outs, though the courts in both cases proved keenly sympathetic to claims of self-defense.

We Cowboy Action Shooters know about Tombstone—we know about the Gunfight at the O.K. Corral. The event itself lasted less than a minute, and it became the basis for countless stories and movies, but little has been written about the prosecution. To the Prosecutors, the Earps and Holliday were wanton killers.



According to the defense, the Earps were steadfast heroes willing to risk their lives on the mean streets of Tombstone for the sake of order. Were the Earps courageous lawmen or cold-blooded killers? It would take a trial to answer that question, and the controversial verdict has been debated for the past 124 years.

I truly enjoyed this book. I was not aware that within minutes and hours after the gunfight, the citizens of Tombstone regarded the Earps and Doc Holliday as heroes. But that feeling quickly changed when the lies circulated by John Behan and Ike Clanton began to spread around town. The situation moved quickly from being regarded as heroes to being regarded as culprits and murderers. It would take an outstanding lawyer indeed to get them out of this one.


Hell To Pay is a throwback western. There is romance, there are a few plot twists, and a final showdown between good and evil that will pit an unwilling sheriff against a barroom full of baddies. Writer/director Chris McIntyre has paced the film so the story gathers steam as the movie flows by. The film is punctuated with gunfights that are brief, violent, and often break out unexpectedly, but there's nothing in the film you couldn't take a 13-year-old to see.

The cast is peopled with some attractive newcomers, ably anchored by Kevin Kazakoff and Rachel Kimsey. I thought William Gregory Lee, playing dissolute younger brother Chance, was especially good. They, in turn, are surrounded by a host of Hollywood stalwarts, including James Drury, Lee Majors, Andrew Prine, Stella Stevens, and Bo Svenson, who add real depth and presence to the film.


It's a kick to see fellow SASS members up on the screen. Everyone misses a lot; no matter how fast they might be in competition, the good guys are always a little bit faster. As James Drury explained, "I don't care how good you are - the screenwriter's on MY side!" There's a slew of them, though; Tex, Ellsworth, Handlebar Doc, Mad Mike, Holy Terror, Cole Younger, Sackett - most of them were drafted to be bad guys, and anyone who thinks that acting isn't a chore, just doesn't realize how much of a stretch it was for some of these truly nice guys to get into "bad guy" character. But they get to really show their stuff. Outlaw Annie rides and shoots, making the rest of us look like equestrian hacks. Quick Cal gets in a few moments of slick gun handling, and Lassiter gets off more shots in two seconds than anyone else in the entire movie. I get to manhandle the female lead, threaten Buck Taylor, and blast away, duelist-style of course, with my trusty 1858 Remington. Evil Roy is a strong villain; cold as ice, he guns down a barroom full of cowpokes because they won't give him a drink, and then flips a gold piece at their riddled forms and snarls, "Keep the change."

SASS members and other sharpeyed viewers will be pleasantly surprised at the commitment to period correct weaponry. Viewers will see Henry, Hawken, and Sharps rifles employed. The hired guns carry a motley assortment of 1849, 1851, and 1860 Colts, as well as a few 1858 Remingtons. It's 1865, and refreshingly, there are no '92 Winchesters or 1873 Colts to be seen.

For the price of a movie, I got to relive a favorite part of my childhood. Even the gambler, Chance, would agree that's a pretty square deal. .

would venture to say quite a few of You cowboys and cowgirls out there familiar with Heritage are Manufacturing. They have quietly been making small .22 rimfire single action six-guns for quite sometime in their factory down in sunny Florida, near Miami. Their Rough Rider revolvers bear a resemblance to the Colt Frontier Scout, a small-frame .22 rimfire SA Colt produced from 1958-1971. Since they were introduced in 1993, the Rough Rider SA line has been offered in a number of configurations, with different barrel lengths, fin-

New Affordable Handguns for Cowboy Action ShootingTM

ishes and grip materials. I'll have to admit until the past few years, the Heritage revolvers were not up there at the top of my list, but a while back they closed down their production line of other handguns and decided to concentrate on their "bread and butter" single action six-shooters. What a difference this has made! The .22 rimfire line now looks more authentic than ever, with finishes like black and silver-gray satin, blue, and even a simulated color-case hardening on the alloy frame models. Exotic looking wood laminate, mother of pearl, and cocobolo grips grace the new $Rough\ Rider\ SA$ revolvers, plus a steel frame version is also available, and that is where our saga begins.

A couple of years ago after the steel frame revolver was introduced, I asked the folks at Heritage why they didn't chamber their new, more rugged handgun for the .32 H&R Magnum cartridge? Apparently it had not

occurred to them, and I hastened to add I thought it would most certainly work, and they would have the most economical SA centerfire revolver in that caliber on the market. Well, they went to work on that idea, and this year at the 2005 Shot Show, I went by their booth and right there on top of the counter was the new .32 Magnum Rough Rider. It was a 6-1/2" barrel model in black satin finish, with wood laminate grips in tones of brown, gray, and green. I picked it up and could find no difference in the heft or feel between it and one of the .22 LR models on display, except it had a bigger hole in the barrel. Of course being a .32 Magnum, it will also take the rest of the family of .32 revolver cartridges, the .32 S&W, and .32 S&W Long.

The quality, wood to metal fit, and metal-to-metal fit were all up to standard, with the satin black finish evenly applied and quite handsome. The frame of the Rough Rider is fashioned from 4140 steel, while the barrel is 1215 steel and the cylinder made from 12L14 steel. The grip frame and ejector rod housing are produced from a tough aluminum alloy. Heritage uses investment castings and lots of CNC machinery to build their guns, so there are pretty tight tolerances. The barrel is precision threaded and screwed into the frame just right to give the shooter plenty of power and accuracy. I checked the action. The timing was perfect, and the cylinder locked up tight at full-cock. You get that traditional "four clicks" as you crank back on the hammer, which has also been improved and is now flat-sided, giving it a more "true to the original" look. To provide extra safety, the Rough Rider .32 Magnum has a hammer block build into the left-side recoil shield, but Heritage (and SASS) recommend you carry it with an empty chamber under the hammer. The trigger pull is factory set at around 6 pounds, and has a bit of creep and over-travel ... nothing you'll really notice at a Cowboy Action ShootingTM match. Weight of the 6-1/2" barrel version is 35 ounces and varies just a mite with the 3-1/2" and 4-3/4" models. By the way, did I mention the 3-1/2" barrel version has "bird head" style grips? I have a nickel plated .22 in this configuration with pearl grips, and it looks just like something old Doc Holliday might've favored. Sights are just like the original Colt SAA, but the rear notch is square instead of 'U' or V-shaped. The front blade is 1/8" in width and provides a good sight picture.

I figured this new Rough Rider ought to be a pretty good performer, so I ordered a couple right then and there. However, I wanted something just a bit different. With Heritage's cooperation, my two new revolvers were to be in the silver-gray satin finish, with simulated scrimshaw ivory grips, one with a 6-1/2" barrel and the other a 4-3/4" barrel. I dubbed these guns the "LaVista Bill Specials," and they arrived from the Heritage plant about three weeks later. They fit perfectly in a holster rig I had made for a .22 SA by El Paso Saddlery a few years ago.

I wanted to try out the little "hoglegs" at a range before I took them to a SASS match, so I got my gear together and drove to an indoor shooting range where I have a membership. In my gun bag were some boxes of .32 Magnum cowboy loads from Black Hills Ammunition, with a 90 gr. flat point lead bullet. I also had some

Federal factory .32 Magnum loads with a 95 gr. flat point bullet and some of my own .32 S&W Long handloads, with a 115 gr. lead SWC bullet over a charge of Bullseye powder and a CCI standard small pistol primer. The latter has proven to be a good performer in the past in my .32 DA revolvers.

At a distance of 30 feet I used a two-handed hold and ventilated a number of targets with all three of my test cartridges until I had three 5-shot groups apiece. My set of Lyman dial calipers showed my best group to be 1.85" using the 4-3/4" gun and Black Hills ammo. The shorter barrel sixgun actually out-shot its longer barrel sibling most of the time with the groups running at less than 2.63" on average. I did manage a 1.47" group using the 6-1/2" Rough Rider and my handloads, but most groups averaged about 2.69," which ain't bad at all.

At the Southern Indiana Thunder Valley March Cowboy Action ShootingTM match, the two .32 Magnum Rough Rider SA's performed admirably. In my medium-sized hand, I found them fast to manipulate in the Traditional mode I chose to shoot in that day as a "49er." The recoil was mild with the Black Hills .32 Magnum cowboy cartridges and recovery was fast. In five main match stages, I only missed once in 50 shots. I predict beginners, youngsters, some of the ladies, and maybe even some of you big burly cow pokes will take to these new .32 Magnum six-guns from Heritage.

But, hold on, that ain't all! That same day at the SHOT show, my amigos at Heritage pulled a surprise out of their ten-gallon hats ... they had a second centerfire single-action revolver in their showcase, and this second one was in .45 Colt! This gun is a departure from the way Heritage usually does things, as they buy the parts from Pietta of Italy and then assemble the guns in their plant. Pietta is a family operation, much like Heritage, and the two companies quickly formed a bond. I have dubbed the newest offering the "Big-Bore Rough Rider" and it's dern near the spitin' image of the historical 1873 Single Action Army. It offers the looks and feel of this classic Old West handgun, right down to the traditional 4-3/4", 5-1/2", and 7-1/2" barrel lengths and one-piece grips carved from cocobolo. It has the "Third Generation" frame and only differs from the original in that it has a transfer bar action and a frame mounted inertia firing pin for added protection (Heritage recommends carrying the revolver with the hammer down on an empty chamber, just like SASS). However, you still get the "four clicks" that single-action aficionados the world over love to hear as they thumb back the hammer.

The six-shooter Heritage sent me had a 7-1/2" barrel and was fully nick-el-plated. They will also be making the Big Bore Rough Rider in an all blue finish or blue with a color-case hard-ened frame and later on an all stainless steel model.

My sample gun was well put together, and the only machine marks I could find on the exterior were on one side of the trigger. Wood to metal and metal-to-metal fit was above average. The trigger pull had some noticeable creep, but broke at around 4-1/2 pounds. Sights are standard SAA with a rounded blade front and fixed rear sight that has a squared notch and gives a pretty good sight picture. I like the balance of a 7-1/2" barrel, and combined with a weight of 32 ounces, gave the Big Bore Rough Rider a good "heft" in my medium sized hand. Timing of the action was right on target, and the cylinder locked up tight with no play when the hammer was drawn back to full-cock.

I did some paper target work with my test gun to see where the sights were and shot some commercially available cowboy cartridges and a handload I'd put together a few weeks earlier. I had on hand some Black Hills .45 Colt loads with a 250 gr. bullet and some .45 Schofield ammo with 180 gr. bullets, plus some Brazilianmade Magtech .45 Colt rounds, which also had a 250 gr. bullet. My handload was a 235 gr. SWC in a .45 Colt case backed by a modest charge of Unique and a Winchester standard large pistol primer.

Bulls-eye targets were hung at a distance of 30 feet, and I used my shooting bag as a makeshift rest. The Big Bore Rough Rider really favored the .45 Schofield cartridges. I fired a 5-



shot group that measured 1.15" with an average group measurement of 1.38" (three 5-shot groups were fired with each cartridge). The Black Hills .45 Colt load also faired well with a 1.42" average and my handload came in with a 1.64" group average. Even with a 1.79" group, the Magtech ammo couldn't be judged badly, and I was very impressed with this revolver's out-of-the-box accuracy. It was noted later after some plinking the screws had worked themselves loose in the frame and needed the services of a screwdriver.

The Big Bore Rough Rider accompanied me as I once again made the pilgrimage to Thunder Valley for a day of Cowboy Action Shooting $^{\text{TM}}$ fun. I

stoked it with the Black Hills .45 Schofield cartridges and shot in five main match stages. During this time, I only recorded one handgun miss, and this happened when I got too fast and skipped a chamber, and then got in a big hurry finding that loaded chamber! The Big Bore Rough Rider handled well and did as good as the Hombre behind it would allow. I'd recommend it to your attention anytime. Idon't know about you, but there have always been different guns that for some mysterious and inexplicable reason, just seem to catch my fancy. One such gun for me was the 1875 Remington revolver. If you know me, you will usually see me at a match shooting a Henry or Spencer rifle, and either S&W No. 3s, Colt Cartridge Conversions, or Remington revolvers. I first recall seeing the Remington when I was a young sprout, glued to that new fangled

gizmo (the TV) watching my favorite westerns. It was on "Wild, Wild West" with its hero Jim West and his sidekick, Artemus Gordon using an 1875 Remington instead of the ever present Colt. Ever since then, I've had an inexplicable fondness for the Ol' Remington. Fortunately, General Grant at EMF has a full line of Remingtons to keep me happy!

HISTORY

During the Civil War, Colt was charging the US Government \$25 to \$27 each for 1860 Army model .44s. Remington, who was staunchly against war profiteering, introduced his stronger, more durable solid frame (Old Model) Army Model .44 Revolver (commonly called 1858 model because of the patent date) at about \$10 less. The Remingtons had a solid, one-piece frame with an octagonal 8" barrel and a distinctive under the barrel web attached to the ramrod. Some sources claim the Re-



mington was much preferred by the front line troops, and they would trade several Colts for one Remington .44. Remington also introduced a smaller .36 caliber Navy version to compete with the 1851 and 1861 Colt .36 Navies. In 1863, they even introduced a five shot .31 caliber, spur

trigger pocket revolver with a 3?" octagonal barrel. These were very popular with Union Army Officers as a back-up gun.

Like its cousin, the Colt Peacemaker, the Remingtons were converted to metallic cartridge (Continued on next page)

revolvers after Smith & Wesson's Rollin White patent on bored through cylinders expired in 1871. The .36s were converted to either .38 rimfire or .38 Colt centerfire, while the .44s were generally converted to Remington's proprietary cartridge, the 44/100 (for 44 1/100ths of an inch), which to my understanding is nominally the same as the .44 Colt (though not necessarily interchangeable in all guns). Some .44s were converted to five-shot .46 caliber rimfire under license from Smith & Wesson in 1869. A few have even been found converted to .44 Henry rimfire. Some of the .31 caliber pocket revolvers were converted to .32 caliber rimfire.

It is more common to see Remington cartridge conversions without an ejector rod than it is with one. This is probably due to the speed and ease of removing the cylinder on a Remington compared to an open-top Colt. In fact, many Remington conversions did not have loading gates milled in, due to the ease of removing and replacing cylinders. In all cases, the Remington cartridge conversions left the ramrod assembly under the barrel, probably because it is necessary to hold the cylinder pin in. Both the percussion and conversions had a reputation for being stronger than their Colt counterparts due to the Remington's solid frame construction, as opposed to the Colt's somewhat wobbly, open-top, twopiece frame.

In 1875, Remington introduced its "No. 3, Model of 1875." It had a distinctive web under the barrel that approximated the look of the ramrod assembly on the percussion models. It was allegedly for strength, but in all probability it was for its aesthetic value, to retain that distinctive "Remington" look. Its ejector rod assembly was alongside the right side of the web, but unlike the Colt. you accessed the ejector rod from the right, instead of under the barrel. It was originally offered in the same 44/100 cartridge used in the conversions. It was later introduced in 44 WCF (.44-40) as a companion gun to the Winchester. This was three years before Colt introduced their "Frontier Six Shooter" in .44-40! Some say they also originally offered it in .45 Colt, but in my research I've only run across one reference to the 1875 being offered in .45 Colt. While not as plentiful as the Colt (there were only 20,000 or so made), it still made a significant contribution to the Old West.

Historically, I'm not alone in my liking of the Remingtons. Frank James carried one for a good deal of his career on the Owl Hoot Trail, and presented it to Governor Crittenden on his surrender. Frank was quoted as saying it was the flattest shooting, hardest hitting handgun made, and that it used the same ammo as his 1873 Winchester. A lesser outlaw, "Redtop" Callihan carried one when he was shot to death in Bodie, California in 1892. He was credited with six notches in his career. It was also one of the guns used in the shootout interrupted by Marshal Charles Bassett in the Longbranch Saloon in Dodge City, April 1879, where cowboy named Frank Loving used a Remington to end a dispute with a hapless character named Levi Richardson. Legendary cattleman Teddy "Blue " Abbott reportedly also carried a Remington. The 1875 Remington was also the issue revolver for some Tribal Police Agencies. Even movie producers liked the Remington's distinctive look. Besides "Wild, Wild West" Bruce Boxleitner used a Remington in a western early in his career, and Clint Eastwood used one (a cartridge conversion) in one of his spaghetti westerns.

EMF'S 1875 REMINGTON .45 Colt, Antique Finish

Pike at EMF sent me a very nice antiqued 1875 Remington, 7-1/2" barrel, in .45 Colt, manufactured for EMF by the Uberti Company in Italy. When I first saw it, I was amazed at the quality of the antiqued finish. At first glance, you would swear you were looking at a brace of original "smoke wagons" straight out of the Texas panhandle. The antique finish is a perfect match to the original remaining finish on an 1883 vintage 1873 Winchester in .44 WCF I had. What process they

use, I am not sure. Whatever it is, it's GREAT! I had a shooting Pard that charged \$100 to \$200 a gun to make new guns look vintage like this. His process was not as good as theirs, and he had more business than he wanted. Now you can have Remingtons that are pre-aged!

The finish is a wonderful aged satin grey patina with slightly mottled appearance associated with old guns. It has a perfect metal-to-metal finish. Even the hammer and trigger appear to have been aged. The wood to metal fit was very good on the antiqued 1875 guns. The grips are two-piece walnut with an aged, satin oiled finish, rather than the varnished finish of the standard finish 1875 replicas. It has a Colt style blade front sight, which would be correct for a latter production 1875. Its trigger pull out of the box is about 4 pounds.

For ammunition for the firing test, I used:

- 1) Black Hills .45 Colt 250 grn.
- 2) Black Hills 230 grn. Schofield
- 3) Ultramax .45 Colt 250 grn
- 4) My 200 grn. 45 Schofield reloads with 25 grns. (volume) of Hodgdon's

The shooting for group was done at 10-12 yards, with a traditional two-hand hold. Both the .45 Colt

loads from Black Hills and from Ultra Max printed about 2" above point of aim. The Black Hills ammo was one ragged 1-1/2" hole, and the Ultra Max was about 2." The Black Hills Schofield was only about 1" above point of aim, and also about 1-1/2" to 2" in size. The best load was my .45 Schofield reload. This load was a single ragged hole, one inch above the point of aim, more than accurate for Cowboy Action ShootingTM!

CONCLUSION

One of the features about the full size Remingtons I like best is the hand-filling grip. It is slightly larger than a Colt or Vaquero. It is also at a slightly different angle, much like that of a Schofield. It is a natural point shooter, which is important for me since I shoot blackpowder. It also looks just plain "neato keen" with that distinctive web underneath the barrel. At every shoot, you see predominantly Vaqueros and Colt clones, all of which, to the untrained eye, look about the same. When you sport a Remington, folks just seem to take notice. INTRODUCTION TO MOUNTED SHOOTING - PART II BLANK AMMO - ROLL YER OWN

Blank ammunition is the backbone of Mounted Shooting. Without the existence of blanks, we would have to use live ammo – whether that was birdshot or slugs there would be inherent dangers of a rider or spectator getting injured. Blank ammunition is also expensive because Mounted Shooting requires a blank that is a bit more powerful than theatrical or movie blanks. Ten years ago only one person made all Mounted Shooting blanks in large quantities. Today there are over a dozen companies producing blanks, but they take time and special equipment to make. We will discuss methods of making blanks at home for practicing Mounted Shooting, training horses, or reducing the costs for a new club. Many new clubs make their own until they can get enough members to afford purchasing blanks, and all the manufacturers started out just

Blanks can be produced using one of two primary methods.

There are several variations of these methods. To start, you will need: several hundred ".45LC" cases or ".45LC blank" cases, primers, case priming tool or cartridge reloader in .45LC, and paper or florist foam wads 1" thick, nail polish, or alternately a special crimp die for a reloading tool. Blackpowder or blackpowder substitutes in 2F or 3F grain size, powder measure, and wooden dowel are also required.

Preparation:

All cases must be clean. "Once fired" brass must have the primers removed and the cases thoroughly cleaned. Failure to clean the primer pockets will cause primer back out and gun jams. Any .45LC case will work. Starline and other companies make blank cases. Standard cases require the primer hole to be drilled out to one-eighth inch. This prevents the primer from backing out of the case and ensures good ignition of the blackpower. Paper or foam wads are made by die punching the foam or an old phone book with a .45LC case or .45" to .50" metal die punch.

Handmade blanks:

- 1. Clean the cases with primers removed if using once-fired brass.
 - 2. Lubricate the brass.
- 3. Prime the cases using a Lee, Dillon, or other case priming tool or progressive reloader.
- 4. Run the cases through a bullet-crimp die to round the case mouth. This makes firearm loading easier and helps hold the wad in place.
- 5. Measure 35 grains of black-powder and pour it in the case. Place a foam wad or paper wad over the case mouth. If using paper wads, seal the paper in place with a thin coating of nail polish or Elmer's glue. If using foam: With the wooden dowel, press the foam completely into the case. Foam wads will stay in place by themselves.

6. Repeat.

Progressive Reloading with a Crimp Die:

1. Using "blackpowder recommended" reloading equipment, set the crimp die to fold the case mouth down. Repeat this on several empty brass cases to be sure the

crimp is closed and secure and the equipment is working correctly before loading any powder.

2. Place your new brass into the loader and operate the system. The progressive system I use has the following steps: size the brass and flanges open the mouth, loads the powder and primes the case, and crimps the case mouth closed.

Variations:

You can, of course, use a progressive loader to fill blackpowder from the powder hopper to make paper or foam wad blanks. You can use single stage presses to size, prime, and crimp the brass. You can make one-quarter or half load blanks for training the horses. You can, as in the old days, use crushed case polishing media over a second paper wad, but I don't recommend it. Unburned powder works fine for breaking balloons. You can purchase special rifle-blank "shoulder dies" and "crimp dies" to turn .45-70 cases into rifle blanks – but that is a topic unto itself!

Remember, reloading "oncefired crimped" brass is not recommended. Crimping brass stresses the metal and hardens it. This could, has, and will lead to case failure. Case failure sends pieces of brass flying out the muzzle at several hundred feet per second risking injury to people and animals. Uncrimped brass may be reloaded many times, but be aware blackpowder is very dirty. If you do not carefully clean the brass and the primer pocket, the blackpowder will act as a lubricant and cause your primers to back out. A jammed gun during a practice at home is a minor disruption. A jammed gun at a match can be aggravating.

That's it! Now go out and have a ball riding hell-bent for leather and blasting away those evil balloons! (Hell-Bent Wade is the President and founder of the Las Vegas Mounted Shooting Association. 



ing us for coming. Some of them even dressed cowboy when they came to watch, and many were curious about the game and what was required to participate. It was great and we may have gained some new shooters.

We had three main match sponsors. First was the Illinois Department of Natural Resources who are building and will be running the facility. It would be impossible to overstate their contribution to the success of this match. Our second main match sponsor was Kirkpatrick Leather, and they worked tirelessly alongside the cowboys to get everything setup and ready to go. Third was the local newspaper, the Sparta News Plain Dealer, who printed thousands of items including the shooters books. We were extraordinarily lucky to have these organizations step forward on our behalf and help put this thing into the history books. All involved Illinois clubs, local vendors, sponsor vendors, shooters from all over the country, main sponsors, the City of Sparta, Randolph County, the State of Illinois, and our match staff have managed to put on one of the most outstanding 1st matches SASS has ever seen. Lastly we thank the Single Action Shooting_Society for this sport we all love.

An inaugural match with 319 pre-registrations has to be a record for a first match.

We pulled into the World Shooting Complex at 8:00AM on Thursday, July 28, after arriving the day before to get the lay of the land. There had been some question on Wednesday whether the match could even be held. Tuesday evening torrential rains and winds clocked at 60 mph raked the complex. Wednesday standing water and clay mud were everywhere. The area where the vendors were to be located was so bad you would sink in up to about mid-calf. So the vendors were moved back to a road paved with bedrock. Thursday found the standing water almost gone in the critical areas and the ground starting to solidify. Set-up was able to resume a little after noon, and the side matches commenced a couple hours later.

The next day the sky was blue and full of pretty white clouds with a temperature of a pleasant 67 degrees and a light breeze blowing. As I walked along the line of 12 bays before the safety meeting began, everyone seemed to be excited about the match. The first person I ran into was Spur, SASS #9048, a man

who would be a genuine contender for the title of Illinois State Champion. We shook hands and talked about his latest work trying to improve the reliability of certain lever action rifles. Next, I ran into my friend Triple T as he drove a 4-wheeler from one end to the other hauling ice and water for the shooters and anything else that needed doing. He would be a constant presence throughout the four days.

Upon arrival, I parked my car among a group of vehicles on the side of the road. As this is an Illinois Department of Natural Recourses facility, their officers were in charge of enforcement. The Conservation Police started tracking down the owners of the vehicles to have them moved. During their search for me, they asked Cowboy Rance, SASS #54090, where I was, using my civilian name, and he told them my cowboy name and where I could be found. The police pulled up to the tent on vendors' row where I was sitting, and over their vehicle's public address system said, "Juaquin Malone, keep your hands away from your guns and keep them where we can see them. You're under arrest!" After a few seconds they got out of the vehicle laughing hysterically and asked if I would move my car. Later Cowboy Rance admitted he was the one who had directed them to me. However, he denies putting them up to it. Yeah sure!

I had the opportunity to meet and speak with Evil Roy, SASS #2883, Friday night in downtown Sparta at the "Fracas." He had conducted his famous shooting school on Tuesday and Wednesday and had also signed up to shoot the match. As I spoke with him, I was struck by the fact he seemed very aware of his own strengths and weaknesses. As Clint Eastwood said in one of his movies, "A man's got to know his limitations." Maybe that is why Evil Roy has been so successful at our game. I wanted to interview him more in depth, but did not want to interrupt him while he was eating, working on one of the stages, or getting ready to shoot. Hopefully at some future time I will have that opportunity.

On Saturday I introduced myself to the man-wearing SASS Badge #1, and was greeted with a firm handshake and a nod as he held his trademark cigar. He then graciously answered all of my questions, questions I am sure he had answered a thousand times before. But you would never have known it by his responses. He became more animat-



MY JOURNEY TO BECOME SLOW HAND TOM Part 1 of 2

 \mathbf{I} 'm sure all SASS members over 40 grew up playing cowboys and Indians. My cowboy days started in 1947 when my Grandma Janes gave me my first gun holster set, a white leather single holster fitted with a Hubley Texan Jr. and wrist cuffs to match the holster. Both holster and cuffs were decorated with chrome studs and red glass jewels. On Christmas morning the thrill of receiving such a wonderful gift from my grandmother was so great the color of the leather didn't bother me a bit. If the good guys wore white hats, why not a white gun belt? It wasn't until we moved from Rockford, IL to Indianapolis and I met the other neighborhood cowboys and cowgirls that I discovered the only other white rig being worn was by the cute little cowgirl two doors down the street. It took a few strong words and the threat of a folded five in the nose to convince my new friends a "tuff" cowboy could were a white holster set.

As anyone who ever played cowboys knows, there were certain things that had to be understood prior to starting. The one universal rule was after you were shot you had to count to ten slowly and then you were a new man. For those that couldn't count, well, they just laid there for a while. Being shot was a huge part of the fun. It was then you could demonstrate your best act of dieing. Arguments usually ensued as to who was the best.

The other thing that had to be clarified was a description of the imaginary horse you were riding, as well as the saddle. Mine in most cases was a golden Palomino with a long flowing tail and mane and fitted with a black saddle and bridle adorned with silver studs and dripping stirrups. Of course, your horse was high-spirited, and as you described him you were dancing in place kicking up as much dust as you could while you reined in your mount. Those younger cowboys that couldn't come up with their own description were helped with a brief account by the big guy of seven and eight - a brown nag with a brown saddle and, of course, their horses were slow. This usually led to an uproar of laughter by those of us riding the stallions.

Our house backed up to Fall Creek and a steep hill dropped from the back yard to about an acre of land before you got to the creek. This area was referred to as the valley. With tree lined dusty trails running along the creek, it was the perfect place for an ambush or robbing the stage. The stagecoach was a Radio Flyer wagon with a wooden box tied on with rope. The strong box was on old lunch

Going to town was a hard ride through the valley and up the hill, through the back yard, and across the street to the alley. The garages in the alley were our western town. Most of the garages were only three or four feet apart. With tree branches in close proximity to the roofs, we could shimmy up the trees to get to the low-pitched rooftops. Once there, we could go from one rooftop to another during our gunfights. This lasted until a concerned town resident discovered us, and we were forced to gallop back to the valley with guns blazing and hooting and hollering.

Saturdays were special because the Zaring Egyptian Theater two blocks away had the Saturday matinee, which was usually a western. We would saddle up and gallop down the dusty trail, across the bridge on College Avenue to Fall Creek Blvd, and then west on the other side of the creek along the park trails to Central Avenue where the Zaring was located. It was mandatory to check your guns at the cloakroom where you were given a brass coin with a hole in it. To lose this coin would mean loosing your gun holster set forever. After a thrilling western adventure and popcorn, we'd pick up our hardware at the cloakroom and it was back down the trail reenacting the adventure we had just seen.

I never outgrew my love for the life of a cowboy or the love of capguns. I started collecting capguns in the late 1960's and now have a nice collection, including

the one I had as a kid and several others that were made before I was born. Along with collecting capguns and a few real guns, I also work with leather and have made rigs for my boys, their friends, a few relatives, and some of my own guns.

I was at Landwerlen's leather supply in Indianapolis picking up supplies and mentioned Cowboy Action Shooting TM . Eric, the owner, told me about SASS and gave me the phone number of Longline Charlie. One phone call to Charlie, and he told me about the SASS web page, and then invited me out to his ranch for a visit and to pick up a copy of The Cowboy Chronicle.


I took Charlie up on his invitation and drove out to Fairland for a visit. As I drove in the road to the rear of the house, I could see Charlie through a large picture window in the kitchen. He gestured with his arm to come on in. I walked through the back door and was greeted by five dogs ranging in sizes from small to large. There sat Charlie at a kitchen table strewn with leather and what looked like some kind of microscope. Charlie stuck out his huge forearm and massive hand in greeting. As we shook hands, it felt like I had stuck my hand in a vice. "Have a seat," he said. Then in the same breath he barked, "Carolyn, bring Tom some ice tea." Carolyn, his wife, brought a huge glass of sweet ice tea. I picked up the glass with my left hand as my right hand was in my lap convalescing from Charlie's greeting.

As it turned out, Charlie not only did leather work, he also made some really fancy knives. And what I had thought to be a microscope was actually used for his new hobby of gun engraving.

After visiting the SASS web page, I found there was a shoot at Deer Creek Conservation Club in Jonesboro, IN the following weekend. A telephone call to Deer Creek and a lengthily conversation with C. Bubba McCoy, and I was off to Deer Creek on the last Sunday in May. Arriving at Deer Creek, my first reaction was amazement. Had I died and arrived in Cowboy Heaven? Or was this a set for a B Western movie with a bunch of extras walking around? In my cowboy boots and hat I still felt like a stranger in a strange land. That feeling didn't last. I met Bubba McCoy, Miss Bonnie (who made western shirts and suspenders), Frenchy Yukon, Rattler, Back Creek Buck, Calamity Kelly, The Indy Kid, and Blackhawk Jeff, the proprietor of McDonald's Guns in Marion, IN. Without exception, the most memorable cowpoke of all was Montana Long Hair, affectionately known around the campfire as Furball. With his big hat, long hair, and mustache, his leather squeaking, spurs jingling, and leather chaps flapping, he was a real life version of Pecos Bill with a much better disposition. And then there were the elaborate guncarts with their owner's shotguns and lever action rifles standing at the ready. Everyone was friendly and eager to talk about how great an organization SASS is.

After posses were formed and all repeated the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of this great nation, the carts started rolling to the first stage. I've never been much of a spectator sportsman, so it wasn't long before I volunteered to be a spotter. I was hooked long before the first stage was complete. After the meet, I headed home with my new red suspenders I'd bought from Miss Bonnie and a goal in mind to be participating in my first shoot before the end of June.



but he assured me it would be fair for all four contestants.









the 3rd Infantry Division, the "Rock of the Marne." Beanie went back to Fort Leavenworth again – but this time as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Military Police Corps. He arrived there about a month after Hill Beachy did. When the talk turned to shooting sports, the topic of SASS came up and Beanie and Hill Beachy discussed the local shooting opportunities. Beanie observed his first Cowboy Action ShootingTM match at the MO-KAN Border War near Parker, Kansas. One look – and he was hooked!

As often happens however, reality intervened. One problem was an injury Beanie had suffered years before while on a night parachute jump with the 18th Military Police Brigade, XVIII Airborne Corps. That injury became progressively worse until something finally had to be done to fix it. Back surgery turned out to be the answer. And then there were the cowardly attacks on our Nation on September 11th, 2001. Beanie had to do something to fix that, too. After a painful surgery and some recovery time, Beanie Boy faced the difficult task of making his body fit for duty once again. Ah, but the test lay at hand. Hill Beachy had attended the 2001 Shootout at Moniteau Creek near Fayette, MO, and one of Beanie Boy's big incentives was the 2002 match. That became his "mark on the wall" and his efforts at recovery and therapy were made with the twin goals of shooting that match and continuing his contributions to our Nation's defense. He managed to do both, including a short stint in Afghanistan and a tour in Baghdad.

Hill Beachy managed to catch up with Beanie Boy after several months in Iraq. Their schedules didn't match up and Iraq is not the place where you put soldiers on the road just to go to say "howdy." Beanie had been spending most of his time in and around Baghdad, trying to help ensure our soldiers' security. He told Hill Beachy although he had been scheduled to depart the country in a couple of weeks, he had just been informed he would likely be extended for another 90 days over and above the year he had already spent there. Typical for him, he accepted it stoically. The next week his orders came through to leave, and it is said he broke all known land-speed records getting out of Iraq and back to his beloved family.


