iddletown OH As my grand daddy once said, "Son, it's hotter than a three dollar pistol." His comments summed up this year's event! The hills surrounding Middletown Ohio were HOT ... hot lead, hot weather, and hot Sexy Sadie taking the posse and banquet photos.

The Guns of August SASS Midwest Regional Championship has continued to grow and is now one of the largest and most prestigious events in SASS. From August 11-14, the Big Irons Rangers and Big Irons Mounted Rangers in conjunction with the Middletown Sportsman's Club played host to over 430 Cowboy Action and Cowboy Mounted shooters from all over our great nation and Canada. That this event has grown from its humble beginnings in 1998 as a local shoot to the Ohio State Championship and now in its third year as a Regional Shoot is due to the dedication and untiring efforts of all the Big Irons Rangers and Big Irons Mounted Rangers. The crew spearheaded by Balding Ranger, Wilbur Rexroat, Black Jack Beeson, and Lassiter put together 10 of the most charged and action packed stages. metal Steers and SASS Logo at several of the stages. Inmate Dillon Sergent and his staff at the Lebanon Correctional Institute provided these, and they greatly enhanced the overall shooting experience.

The stages were the epitome of what SASS envisions for a premiere -simple scenarios with big easy to see targets, placed up close. Forty-eight competitors cleaned the match! One stage even included a pistol dump on a dummy in the outhouse! The four-day competition was dedicated to the Guns of the Old West, and Seven Mile Tom did the historical research for the Shooter's Program.

Some of the guns described in the Program, such as Colts, Smith and Wesson Schofields, Winchester 73's, and Remington's were to be seen on the range in the hands of the skilled competitors.

Chuck and his staff at the Middletown Sportsman's Club outdid themselves from the hot black coffee that greeted the early morning competitors to Linn's steaming hot fried chicken dinner after Friday's competition. Their dedication to service was noted by all of the attendees. The Middletown Sportsman's Club is located half way between Dayton and Cincinnati, Ohio. It's a modern shoo-





ne of the basic principles SASS adopted right at the very beginning was "no external modifications" to our firearms. The idea was one should be able to compete in Cowboy Action Shooting TM with guns "right out of the box" ... at least once they had an "action job." We (SASS and the Territorial Governors) have done a decent job with the external modifications part of the policy, but have failed miserably controlling what goes on inside our competitor's

firearms. Today, we have drifted into a true "race gun" sport ... and if not checked will ultimately kill the game we all love so much.

This is a difficult article for me to write because I have many friends and deal with talented gunsmiths involved in creating race guns ... it's these friends that help make the game fun to play and these gunsmiths that keep our firearms tuned and working. Without friends and gunsmiths we wouldn't have a game to play.

Another friend told me years ago SASS had to keep a keen eye on the suppliers because in their quest to provide new and high-tech Cowboy Action goodies, they would drive our game to destruction. What we're seeing today is it's not the original manufacturers that have had such an impact, but it's the after-market suppliers who are doing the damage.

What is an "action job" and where do action jobs end and race guns start? An action job consists of polishing parts so they don't rub, correcting the timing so things cycle the way they're supposed to, lightning springs so the guns cycle easier and don't beat themselves to pieces, and the like. They ensure the gun operates easily the way it was intended to operate. Race guns go to the next level and change the way the firearm operates.

What kinds of changes are we talking about? Some changes that instantly come to mind are one piece Marling firing pins, short stroked '73s, short stroked single actions, coil springs in '73s, coil springs in Colts, non-brass lifters in '73s, roller balls on '73 firing pins, elongated grooves on single action cylinders ... and the list goes on and on.

Why create a race gun? They operate easier, more reliably, smoother, and cycle faster than standard guns ... they are more competitive. And, they create a business base for enterprising, creative individuals.

While the above modifications are mostly internal, I realize I also have difficulty with some of our "acceptable" external modifications. I don't remember ever seeing leather straps glued to the butt of John Wayne's rifle ... or his rifle lever wrapped with leather ... neither are "cowboy" and both are there simply to improve the "competitiveness" of the gun and its shooter.

What's wrong with having race guns? When a potential new SASS member suddenly realizes he needs to pour a considerable amount of money into already reasonably expensive guns (four guns plus back ups!) if he has any fantasy of being "competitive," many will decide the game is simply too expensive and back away. It's happened in all the other "action shooting" sports. Yes, Cowboy Action ShootingTM is a competition (we keep score and honor our winners), but SASS is also a membership organization, and we (Continued on page 22)



cloggers, Native American music, and Old West living history groups. Old west sutlers, crafts, and an-


tique traders will all be there.





SPIRIT OF THE GAME FOR DARKSIDERS?

A couple of years ago Judge Roy Bean, SASS #1, was moved to comment in these pages about "smokeless blackpowder loads" he was seeing crop up in the Frontier Cartridge categories. Since then I've read about and witnessed those non-smoking blackpowder loads in use. It left me with a deep feeling of disappointment in the shooters using them. To me, and many other Frontier Cartridge shooters, the smoke and roar of a true blackpowder load, or a blackpowder substitute, is part of The Spirit of The Game, for the Frontier Cartridge competitors! We all figure we come to the line with pretty much the same handicap to overcome, shooting through the smoke and dealing with the recoil! Then, along come some bright pards who realize that a couple 'r three grains of blackpowder under a truckload of grits in the case is a legal load ... them grits ain't propellant, so it's legal ... and they don't have to fight the clouds of

smoke. But, is it within The Spirit of the Game?

Spirit of the Game? become more and more a nebulous term. As more shooters from varied backgrounds enter our sport they bring with them differing ideas and ideals of what that means. Now, I don't intend to start a huge debate on what Spirit of the Game is by definition, but I think I stand on pretty firm ground when I say when an observer can't tell for sure whether or not a Frontier Cartridge shooter is using blackpowder (or approved sub) then Spirit of the Game is not being observed! And, when a nonshooter asks me, "Is he shooting Clays powder?" about a Frontier Cartridge shooter, then something is badly awry!

Now, before someone accuses me of being an "elitist BIG BOOMER, WARTHOG LOAD LOVER" I'd like to add a comment. A little over a year ago I had a small stroke. It left me with some minor problems for a while, and I had to load down a bit in order to hang on to those .45s of mine. In fact, I ended up shooting .38s for a while to stay in the game. So, I understand the need for some pards to have to find a way to deal with recoil with some filler in their loads. But, it shouldn't be to the point where the smoky factor is nonexistent, fer cryin' out loud! A full case of blackpowder in a .38 Special is a dreamy load to shoot, low recoil that's easy on the hands and shoulder, with enuff speed to handle the knock-downs, and plenty of smoke! And some of you may remember me writing about my .45ACP blackpowder loads I've experimented with ... again, less recoil but still lots of smoke and fire! My point being, if the need for lowered recoil is there, it's achievable with smoke ... and without becoming "smokeless blackpowder!"

Enforcement: (a big sigh goes here) Most of us don't like to discuss this issue much. And if Spirit of the Game were universally understood,

we probably wouldn't have to. But, we may have to do a reality check. If shooters won't self-police themselves on the "smokeless blackpowder" issue, then SASS may have to take the bull by the horns. Unfortunately the smoke cloud thing is subjective in that it's not really measurable or quantifiable. One pard may say, "I see the smoke," while another says, "Smoke? What smoke?" in reference to the same shot. I've heard a number of different proposals for dealing with how to enforce a reasonable standard, ranging from "The seven year old kid" standard, (if a seven year old cain't tell yer shootin' blackpowder then ya ain't), to the idea of pulling bullets and weighing charges with a pre- established table of required load density!

Personally, my favorite idea is one that contains a dirty word -Chronograph! <gasp!> But, perhaps it's time. Chronographs are a lot

WHY GUNFIGHTERS NEVER WIN

By Wrong-handed Dave, SASS #57836

When I first started Cowboy Action Shooting TM two years ago, I emulated the fastest shooters, pulling one pistol at a time and holding it with both hands as I moved my shoulders, keeping the gun over the targets, thumbing efficiently with the opposite hand. But it didn't feel "Cowboy" enough for me.

I started to use only one hand for the pistols, Duelist, cocking those big Blackhawks with the same hand. Felt more "Cowboy," but switching the pistol from the weak hand to the strong hand ... that didn't feel right.

Double Duelist, a non-category where I shoot, was next, and by gosh, that felt pretty close to "Cowboy." Took about six months to master my off hand as I swept targets. (I shot a friend's Bisley Vaqueros once, and that trial cost me another \$900 in new guns. Those Bisleys are just so much better in the hand, and are so much easier to cock one-handed.)

Finally, I thought, I'm ready for the biggie: Gunfighter. I can shoot with each hand, so all I have to do is alternate guns, and I'm finally at full "Cowboy." And, think how much time I'll cut off by only drawing once!

And, I started missing like crazy! What's all this about, I thought? I don't miss nearly this much with either hand, and all I'm doing is alternating guns. But, I was trying to maintain the same rate of fire I was used to shooting Double Duelist, and that wasn't working.

Why? Obvious. Remember how the first shot with each pistol takes so much longer than subsequent ones using only one gun at a time? That is because on subsequent shots my eye is already focused on the front sight and moves with the barrel as the gun moves from target to target, but on the first shot, I have to find the front sight and focus on it. In Gunfighter, I have to reacquire the front sight on every shot, switching from one pistol to the other-10 times per stage! No wonder the rate of fire is so much slower, if I want to avoid misses.

If I shoot enough, maybe I will be able to "instinctively" aim without

benefit of the front sight, and speed will improve. But until then, I'll shelter in the same class with other Gunfighters, reaping Style Points but no overall awards.

(It's not necessary to languish. Talk to some of the top Gunfighters for a different perspective. In my case, I use both eyes (left eye for the left gun and right eye for the right gun), look at the targets, put crystal clear sights (my glasses are focused at the front sights) between my eyes and the fuzzy targets, and then start multi-tasking like mad! There are Gunfighters who can win major matches ... but, as in all the other categories, it takes lots of practice! ... editor.) .

COSTUMING FOR CLASSIC COWBOY/COWGIRL B-WESTERN/SILVERSCREEN

At End of Trail 2005, I finally reached my goal – I took home the World Championship buckle for Best Dressed B-Western/Silver Screen Lady. Now, my buckle resides next to those of my other family members, Knifemaker, Little Star, and Spur Roberts!

Also, Cat Ballou asked me to join the Costume Committee and assume responsibility for Classic Cowboy and B-Western costuming judging. At Guns of August, Coyote Calhoun and I put our heads together to clarify the criteria and differences between the B-Western and Classic categories. There have been many questions about the two categories. In many ways, these two categories overlap for costuming, but there are also many differences.

Classic Cowboy/Cowgirl:

Classic Cowboy/Cowgirl costumes should represent the clothing worn during the "classic" cowboy era

Leather: No Buscadero or Drop Loop holster rigs.

Pistol grips must extend above the top of the belt upon which it hangs. This applies to straighthang and cross draw belts.

Boots: All boots must be of traditional design with leather soles or smooth rubber non-grip enhancing soles.

Hats: Felts hats only. No straw hats allowed.

Costuming Accessories:

You must choose at least five of the following: Chaps, Spurs, Tie or Scarf with or without scarf slide, Vest, Pocket watch, Jacket, Sleeve garters, Knife (must be visible), Botas, Leggings, Braces (suspenders), Cuffs.

In addition, for ladies: Period watch, Split-riding skirt, Snood, Reticule (period handbag), Victorian style hat (straw allowed), period jewelry and hair ornaments, period lace up shoes, camisole, bloomers, cape.

All above items must be worn appropriately and must be worn during all shooting events and awards ceremonies.

B-Western/Silver Screen:

This costuming category represents the fantasy outfits of our favorite Western heroes and heroines of the Silver Screen.

Leather: Must be Buscadero or Drop Loop rig with pistols below the gun belt. All leather must be embellished (Conchos, spots or tooling). No cross-draw holsters. All leather must be of "straight hang."

Boots: All boots must be of traditional design with fancy stitching or multi-color and fancy design. Soles with smooth non-grip

enhancing bottoms. Western spurs with rowels. No lace up boots or moccasins allowed.

Hats: Felt hats only. Straw hats not allowed.

Costuming Accessories:

You must choose at least one or more of the following: Gloves or gauntlets, Scarves with slide or tied around the neck, Coat, Vest, Chaps, Cuffs.

Clothing:

Shirts must be of the B-Western style with snaps and or any of the following; Smiley pockets, Embroidery, Appliqués, Fringe, Different colored design yokes. Shield shirts allowed if they have piping or embroidery designs.

Pants must be jeans, ranch pants, or pants with western flap over rear pocket, and/or keystone belt loops, piping or design down the leg.

Belts must be of western design with buckles.

Suspenders not allowed.

All above items must be worn appropriately and must be worn during all shooting events and awards ceremonies.







cheaper these days; they can be had fer under a C note, and are pretty easy to operate. Most clubs could afford them with very little strain on the budget. (For that matter I'd donate the use of mine anytime.) Some year's back SASS did away with "the floor," which was a requirement to have loads that made a minimum of 650 feet per second mandatory. I would propose we bring it back for Frontier Cartridge categories only!

My thinking is this: 650 fps is a fairly easy speed to handle recoil wise, even in the mighty .45s, and it will make a pretty reasonable amount of smoke by anyone's definition. And if a pard cain't handle 650 fps in a .45, he can still go to a smaller caliber, reach 650 fps, and be making LOTS of smoke. It's simple. The only time any shooter's ammo needs to be chronographed is if there is a question in someone's mind as to whether or not it "hits the floor" of 650 fps. Ergo, if there's a question, then a random cartridge is taken from the shooter's box, fired over the chrony, and there's the answer. Not subjective, not biased ... just a straightforward answer to the matter at hand. Again ... if a handgun cartridge is making it to 650 fps with blackpowder or approved sub-

stitute, it WILL make smoke! (Unless the shooter is duplexing, which is a whole 'nuther matter and illegal in our game to boot. Albeit, a chrony could also be a tool to help detect that aspect also.) This may not be the best answer, but it is an answer of sorts. Perhaps someone can come up with a better one?

In conclusion, I have always believed there is a place in SASS for most everyone. We have lots of categories in which to shoot and a plethora of shooting styles allowed. But please ...if yer not making much smoke, register to shoot in a category other than Frontier Cartridge! Yer fellow shooters will think better of you, and I think you will feel better about yerself - which is also part of "Spirit of the Game!".

years. He undercut the hammer and built a baffle on the recoil shield that was too narrow for the caps to fall through. It modified my Colts to function like Remingtons, Rogers & Spensers, and Ruger Old Armies ... but not like a Colt. With the hammer down, all changes are on the inside. It seemed legal, it was certainly competitive, and I wore out three sets of these guns in competition.

Since then one-piece Marlin firing pins and short stroked '73s and single actions didn't seem so bad. They made my guns cycle smoother and quicker ... they are a competitor's dream, and I love them. They are SASS legal, and I'll continue to use them ... unless, of course, the Territorial Governors decide things have gone too far and the guns need to be returned to their original configuration.

What about enforcement? I truly believe when a cowboy knows the rules, he'll follow them. It's the Cowboy Way. SASS cowboys are good, caring, honest folks ... they follow the rules. Anyone challenged and found to be in violation of the rules would instantly be branded a cheater by his peers ... something none of want for ourselves.

ALL B-WESTERN **COSTUMES ARE EXPECTED** TO BE FANCY AND FLASHY!

Costumes depicting a leading role of a B-Western/Silver Screen character from a B-Western movie are allowed as long as the costume is complete with all accessories depicting that character. Saloon girls (in general) are a separate category. For example, if you are depicting a character such as Mae West, Marlene Dietrich, Miss Kitty, or Lily Von Stupp, and are dressed in a costume from one of their western movies, then you would be eligible to compete in the B-Western/Silver Screen category. But, you would not be eligible in B-Western/Silver Screen if you were just dressed as a saloon girl.

Hopefully this list helps you separate the two categories and helps with whatever costume you have in mind. Remember - you can never have too many rhinestones!



The legislative and judicial branches of our government are systematically destroying America's religious foundation and whether you personally believe in God or not is irrelevant to the danger inherent in that. The fact is the vast majori-

ty of Americans <u>do</u> believe in God and religion is and has been a strong foundation upon which they depend to fill many needs in their lives—regardless of which religion they follow.

Religion was so critically important to the Founders, that effective December 15, 1791, America ratified its position on the relationship between religion and government and summed it up very clearly and simply in the very first section of the First Amendment of our Constitution. Religion was the 'first of the first' so to speak in the eyes of our Founding Fathers:

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..." ~ First Amendment ~

To contrast the position of our modern day courts and say the Founders intended to prohibit people from mentioning God, the church or religion in and around the American state is a perversion of the facts. On the contrary, the First Amendment very clearly says it is the state, in the form of Congress, who cannot prohibit the FREE EXERCISE of religion by the people. In fact, everything the Founders did in the first 10 Amendments was designed to specifically protect individual rights.

If we look deeper into the founder's views of religion via their own words, separate from the Constitution, it's unmistakably clear what they thought ...

"No power over the freedom of religion ... [is] delegated to the United States by the Constitution."



Does this sound like men who intended to go where the judiciary has taken us over the past 40 years? Presidents Washington, Jefferson,

and Madison would have been hauled away for publicly making such statements today given our modern courts. Over the past 40 years, however, there's been a concentrated effort to contort this concept of religious freedom and generally exterminate religion from the public sector by placing the prohibition referred to in the First Amendment on the people instead of the government!

Starting in the early 60's when Madelyn Murray O'Haire convinced the Supreme Court school prayer was some kind of national threat, we've been running God out of town on a rail of pandering atheism ever since. We went to moments of silence in order to compromise with an uncompromising left, and from displaying the Ten Commandments to a taxpayer funded display of the Virgin Mary covered with elephant dungall in the name of separation of church and state and constitutional freedom. 
I started digging through one when the old Chinese man came up behind me and said, "Looking for anything special?"

He really enjoyed talking to all of the GREAT friends I've made in this game. Before he got on the plane, I told him I loved him, enjoyed his visit, and looked forward to the next time he comes back. A week later, he had a stroke, wound up in a nursing

home, and I feel I lost the Dad I knew. Also, I found so many great people in this sport that I have gotten closer with than I thought I ever would. Each time I saw my Dad I told him the Cowboys had asked about him, and he would get a big smile on his face. I planned to tell him about our three-day shoot the next time I visited him. Well pards, it's too late. He passed away the week before our shoot. Dad never wanted to shoot, but he had a good



time just talking to others and watching. He said he did too much shooting in WWII. I did tell him I was proud of him for serving his country.

Did you ever think the next time you go to a match that someone you always have a great time with wouldn't be there anymore? One day last season while I was walking down the trail to the range, one of my friends said to me, "something happened to G.W." (I won't mention anyone by name. All of my Amigos know who they are.) I asked what happened to him. He replied, "I thought you knew," and then his eyes started to water up. He told me G.W. had been hit by a bus and wasn't doing well. Because I was lucky enough to see G.W. in the hospital, I told him how I felt and thanked him for our friendship. Recently, I just discovered the cowboy who told me about G.W. isn't doing well. It really stinks growing up and getting older! That's a big reason why I like to play Cowboy at a shooting match as much as I can and whenever I can.

The man that introduced me to this great sport decided he and his wife would move to Arizona. I'm glad I got the chance to thank him.


I ran across a page of history the other day and began to apply it to today. For most of us native Texans this should be familiar.

sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of his country. **Victory or Death**.

Lt. Col. William Barret Travis

For those not familiar with this letter, it was written during the siege of the Alamo in San Antonio, March 1836, by Co. William B. Travis, commander of the forces in the old Mission. Now you ask, "What has this got to do with today?" Let's break it down a little and apply it to gun owners.

Fellow citizens and compatriots is the greeting. Who is he talking to? Travis is appealing to every freedom loving Texan and American - people like you and me that know what freedom is and of the cost to maintain it. These people came to Texas with a dream of prosperity and to make a new life in Texas. At the time, Texas was part of the Republic of Mexico, but soon became a dictatorship under Santa Anna.

I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna. We, as gun owners today, are besieged by the liberal mainstream press and politicos not only in the US Government, but at the State and local levels as well. These people would take our constitution to the paper shredder to control the populace, if we let them. That does not only apply to the 2nd Amendment. If you want an example, take a look at the Campaign Finance Reform bill that passed. Does the 1st Amendment ring a bell? We are besieged in our country by those who say "The police and government will protect me, so we don't need to be armed. On 911, if only one passenger on each of those planes had been armed, the devastation might not have been as great. Then there are the complacent, (the enemy within our own ranks), with the opinion, "as long as the law does not effect me, it's OK.'

The state has now recognized the right of a citizen to protect himself while traveling in their travel homes as an extension of their home, without a concealed carry license. The TSRA/PAC is constantly sending out alerts to keep us informed as to what congress is doing and what we as citizens need to do to respond to as threats to our freedoms become apparent.

(The call.) Then I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and everything dear to the American character, come to our aid with all dispatch. The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of his country. If you own a gun in Texas or America, this is the call. It is time to become an activist. JOIN your State Rifle Association. The stronger we are in each State, the stronger our voices will be heard in Washington. The State Organizations work hand in hand with the NRA. The NRA is best on the national scene and in some state levels. But in the States, your State Rifle Association leads the way to preserve our rights at home where we live. It is time for us to be on the offensive, not on the defensive.

Give to your state organization PAC. A little or a lot is up to you.

In Texas, one of the little things our Political Action Team does is to host the Ladies of the Capitol Event. Our lobbyist will bring out as many of the lady staffers of all the members of the State Congress for a picnic and day of shooting. Many of these women have never fired a gun in their lives. The last couple of years Miss Hattie and I have set up a Cowboy Action stage for them. They learn shot gunning on a five stand and learn to shoot BB guns by instinct with no sights. This year we brought out some .22s and kept the magazines loaded so they could plink as long as they wanted. When our Legislators are in session, they cannot be near their constituents, so they will rely on the opinions of their staff. When a questionable gun law comes up, these women will remember the fun they had shooting guns. Since we started this event, it has opened so many doors in Austin, Texas has started rolling back some of its archaic gun laws, and we, as citizens of Texas, have become safer.


There are other ways to become an activist. Know and communicate with your representatives on what and how you expect to be represented. Give'em a piece of your mind, as they certainly can't read it. This will be effective with your City leaders as well.

Give of your time. There are youth organizations that need volunteer help. Working with the youth is one of the best ways to secure the future. They are the future. Giving them your knowledge can help to keep the spirit alive for hunting and all the shooting sports. There are youth hunts and 4-H clubs all over the state as well as the Junior Olympics.


Last but not least, get to know your neighbors. We go through our busy lives and may times don't know the folks next door. Get to know them and talk to them. Let them know what we do for fun and share the experiences. Talk to them about shooting, neighborhood safety, and help them when needed. Bringing guns out into the open for the misinformed will give them a positive perception about gun ownership. Many who have fears will become less fearful about guns and their owners. We, as gun owners, will just become regular folk. And that's a good thing.

Will you answer with a canon shot or let the call go neglected? Will you be that soldier determined to sustain himself and his honor for the greater good of our State and Nation? Will you be a part of the victory in the name of liberty? Become a member of your State Rifle Association, or upgrade your membership. Be an activist working in your community to educate the misinformed.

Working for your rights in your local area and state is one of the best ways to keep the gun grabbers on the run and informed that the 2nd Amendment is our best Homeland Security. 4.

THE BENDERS OF KANSAS

Where Facts Intertwine with Legend in the Dusty Annals of History Part I

This highway marker, long since removed, once stood on US Rte 160 in Labette County, Kansas:

On the high prairie a mile north-west, beyond the nearby Mounds which bear the name, the Bender family ~ John, his wife, son, and daughter Kate ~ in 1871 built a small house. Partitioned in two rooms by a canvas cloth it had a table, stove, and grocery shelves in front. In back were beds, a sledgehammer, and a trap door above a pitlike cellar. Kate, a self- proclaimed healer and spiritualist and reported to be a beautiful, voluptuous girl with tigerish grace, was the leading spirit of her murderous family.

The house was located on the main road. Travelers stopping for a meal were seated on a bench backed tight against the canvas. In the next two years several disappeared. When suspicious were finally aroused, in 1873, the Benders fled. A search of their property disclosed eleven bodies buried in the garden, skulls crushed by hammer blows through the canvass.

The end of the Benders is not known. The earth seemed to swallow them, as it had their victims.

The legend of the Benders of Kansas is rooted in fact, but has assumed the trappings of a legend. The central figures remain constant (the Old Man, the crazy son Tom, and the raven-haired beauty Kate —



woman, known only as "Ma Bender" and a dozen or more murdered travelers), but the details have become increasingly murky over the intervening years. This is fairly common with old, poorly documented events on the sparsely settled prairie, where details are alternately embellished or forgotten during numerous retellings. Back in May of '01, a chance comment from Lonesome Dave, SASS #6761, had spurred me to re-tell a version of this story to the folks who gather around the Cowboy Action ShootingTM fire, and there it rested. More recently, a lady friend (coincidentally, another raven-haired beauty named Kate) mentioned she had never heard the story either. Thus it was decided the old serials would be resurrected, updated, and published in this venue for all to enjoy.


From Lonesome Dave, "May 4, 1873- Labette County, Kansas- the other murder victims are found on the Bender family farm." (Author's note: Labette County Kansas is located in the southeast corner of the state and abuts the Oklahoma state line. It lies just east of Coffeyville, where brave townsmen halted the Dalton Gang's crime spree).

Now there's quite a story behind THAT little tale! And to think Old Man Bender escaped ... the reward was valid for many years ... in fact, it used to be fairly common during the Old West to jokingly accuse a man of about the right age as being Old Man Bender. Some have claimed Palaver Pete, SASS #4375, might even be Old Man Bender hisself!

The Bender story is a classic Western campfire story, and its setting on the pristine American prairie merely reinforces its Gothic horrors. What follows is supposedly the "true" version of the story (but then again, ain't they all?) Alright then, sit on down by the fire, pour yourself a cup of coffee, and let me tell you about how it was back in the old days. What with the long distances between towns on the sparsely settled prairie, travelers sometimes would stop off at one of the very few houses or way-stations to knock the dust off their boots and get a homecooked meal before moving on.

In 1871, one such place was the Bender farm. Old Man Bender had two offspring, Tom and Kate. Tom had a silly, eerie laugh, like a half(some folks say no one ever knew his real name) looked as though he would kill on the slightest provocation. But Kate! Oh, now Kate was another matter entirely. Tall, slender, and voluptuous with long, flowing, raven-black hair, Kate was not without certain evilly attractive charms. She was said to ride her black horse at full gallop during the dead of night in the thunder, rain, and lightning. Many a moneyed guest, it was said, was lured to his death in a dark rear room by Kate's lascivious dancing. (Note: In later versions of the story, the location was changed to the outskirts of the morefamiliar Dodge City, and Kate was $either\ a\ tall,\ bowlegged,\ gangly\ witch$ of a walleyed girl or a gorgeous Siren who lured young men to their deaths — take your pick. Cutler's 1883 version furnishes the name John Bender for the clan's patriarch, and adds an unnamed wife. Cutler also stated young Tom sometimes posed as Kate's husband and at other times as her brother. McLoughlin claims Kate had copper-colored hair.)

But if the number of men entering Bender's seedy premises was greater than the number departing, these were rough-and-tumble times on the frontier, and no one was keeping score. The documented story (with photos to support it) was that her last victim was Dr. York, brother of the prominent Colonel York of Fort Scott. The good Colonel arrived at

the deserted farmhouse with a search party shortly following his brother's disappearance. (Again, the various versions differ here; one states her final victim was one of the rare, "live," and honest sheriffs who became brave enough to visit the establishment in an attempt to ascertain why so many of its guests were never seen thereafter. drunkenness and lust, he followed Kate into the dark; and like the rest, he too never emerged. The next day, the roadhouse was ominously dark and silent. Concerned citizens broke in to investigate, and found the sheriff dead on the floor, his head nearly severed from his body. This version further claims that Kate lay there with a bullet drilled neatly through her eye, still clutching a bloody hatchet. Probably too neatly wrapped to be true. But then, why let "facts" get in the way of a good story?)

The townspeople started looking around the premises, eventually pulling up the boards covering a cistern. Inside there were eight corpses — each with a smashed skull. Apparently, Kate would lure the men into the back room, and then bash their skulls in. The family would then recover any plunder and dispose of the bodies. (Versions of the story published in The St Louis Republican [December, 1882] and in Cutler's 1883

History of the State of Kansas state that a sheet was hung to separate the kitchen from the main room of the house. While the unsuspecting guest sat with his back to the sheet, Kate ostensibly cooking dinner in the back "room" - would bludgeon the neatly silhouetted victim from behind. The bodies would then be dumped into a pit located under a trapdoor until they could be carried outdoors and buried under cover of darkness. Although this version appears more plausible due to the common use of sheets as room dividers, it certainly seems they would have to change the sheets fairly frequently or risk tipping off the intended victim).

For quite some time afterward, the good citizens were finding bodies under rocks, trees, and brush piles. Little more is recorded of the brother, Tom. One version of the story has Kate killing off both him and the Old Man. The 1882 St. Louis Republican article reported that, contrary to the events recounted above, a posse captured the entire family after a wild chase by rail, wagon, and horseback; the fugitives being summarily executed and buried in a pit about four miles from Grand River, Indian Territory. The original highway marker on US Rte 160 near the farmstead asserted, "the earth seemed to swallow them, as it had their victims." Should this be interpreted as a successful escape, or perhaps as an allusion to the actions of the posse? The current highway marker on U.S. Rte 169 mentions both possibilities.

Other versions of the story have Kate escaping the Law in Kansas and marrying a sheriff (or a Texas Ranger, take your pick). When he gets to asking too many questions, they reach an agreement to live and let live (or, she kills him too – there are plenty of versions to go around).

One of the most ludicrous accounts has the entire family escaping by hot-air balloon, finally coming to rest after crashing into the mast of a ship sailing the Gulf of Mexico. (I suspect this version involved ample amounts of rye whiskey, and most of the "hot air" was not in the balloon.) Yet, this version was duly published in newspapers of the day! Proof that media accounts — current or period — are not always reliable.

use my phone. It was more bad news about my Dad. My family in NY told me to stay where I was because there was nothing I could do. They just want me to stay updated on Dad. The RO drove me back to my posse, as that's where I wanted to be. He gave me a supporting pat on the back as I exited the golf cart. That's one of those little things that mean a lot. One friend was only there to watch for a while, and she told me she would stay the rest of the day, so she could hold my cell phone in case my family called again and also just to be there for me. My one-armed Amigo can just give me a look that means he is always there for me. To watch him shoot and be around his great spirit, you don't see a person with a handicap. You just see one heck of a real Cowboy. I know no one that shoots as many clean matches as he does. When I am with my cowboy friends, and the other great people I shoot with, I am surrounded by my non-biological family. Before it should ever be too late, I need to tell them, "I LOVE you, man!!!"

I had the great honor of standing with many good people who taught me so much about this great game and how to be an instructor at a new shooter's clinic. I was teaching new shooters how to be a safety officer by working the unloading table. Some of them weren't sure if I was serious

when I told them to make sure you thank the person checking your guns. I told them these cow folks came here to play cowboy with you for the day and took their time to help make sure you and others around you will be safe. Before it's too late, take a moment to <u>at least say thank you</u>.

I've read articles in The Combou Chronicle complaining that things aren't fair or there are too many rules. I'm not a fast shooter. We shoot six stages at a match, and I can shoot them under a minute most all the time. We are at the range five to six hours. That's a lot of time spent not shooting. I like to spend that time helping with posse jobs, being with my best friends, and just laughing so much it starts to hurt. I'm in a place to play and forget about the outside world. What do you do with that time????







nious experience over making it like another trip to the dentist for a root canal. One idea would be to scout out for a great backdrop ahead of time. Look for a place that has a good solid backing to it (interesting but not overly cluttered or busy). Also you want to pick a time and place where the sun will be to the photographer's back.

Be careful not to have a lot of backlighting, meaning an excessive amount of bright or white backdrops behind your subjects. This will tend to underexpose your subjects or overexpose your backdrop. At every Cowboy Action ShootingTM event I have attended there usually are a number of places suitable for a backdrop. It could be a vendor store front or a nice grassy area with trees in the background. In Arizona we have big tree like things with millions of sharp needles; they make a good backdrop as well. Old wagons or stagecoaches make fantastic atmosphere setters for the old fashion cowboy look. Anyway have fun finding the place that works for you.

Once you find a spot, pick either early morning or late afternoon to cloudy day, mid-day photos tend to produce harsh lighting with more pronounced shadows. Early and later in the day lighting tends to produce softer contrasts. I might recommend taking the photos Sunday morning when everyone is dressed up well, and you are still fresh from a good night's sleep.

Now that you have a time and a place, the only thing missing is a camera and preferably a photographer! (Also, please don't forget the film, digital or otherwise). Of course your best bet is to look for one of your buddies that has a really nice camera and has a good reputation for taking good quality pictures. Maybe you can talk them into taking your photo for you. The only other option would be to have your own camera on a tripod and use the self timer.

Assuming your ducks are quacking the way you want them to, and now that you have found the right time, place, photographer/camera (and don't forget the film!), the next challenge is before you. How do you all pose? You can all just stand there like a bunch of stiffs, or you can do a few minor things to make it look a bit more appealing for future generations to look at. Have the taller people in in the front. Try to arrange the gang like a pyramid, directing the attention toward the center. What do you do with the hands? Good question! Gals can put one hand on the cowboy's shoulder and the other hand on her hip with a bit of a sway to give her that "sassy" look. If you can bring firearms with you, they make great props. Guys could have one foot up on a wooden box, rock, log, etc. and rest their shotgun or rifle on their knee or thigh. The younger ones can have their six shooters on ready to draw. Tilt your hat back just a bit to keep the shadows down and add some fill flash to minimize those shadows. Have the subjects on the ends tilt their heads inwards just a bit.

Above all else have lots of fun! That's what you want to remember when you show off these photos to other family members and friends. We have two of those old time pictures of our family when our full grown boys were still wet behind the ears. It was a blast having them done, and they are priceless now that the boys are older.

If you need anymore pointers just stop by Mr. Quigley's booth and anyone on our team would be glad to help, if things aren't too crazy. One last word, don't wait for everything to be perfect, but do get that family picture; it's part of the glue that holds us together! .

In my shooting career, the biggest struggle I have seen concerning women and their shooting has been the shotgun. The shotgun is the most difficult gun to shoot. Most women find shooting intimidating enough with the noise and the recoil, but the difficulty of shooting the shotgun has ended more than one woman's shooting career. Here are some very basic tips that can ease shotgun shooting even experienced shooters don't know.

When most women start shoot-

ing, it is with the help of a man their husband, father, brother, son, or any other man in their life. For the most part, men usually have some idea about firearms and shooting because they were raised around it. However, even some very experienced men don't know all the tricks when it comes to Cowboy Action ShootingTM and the shotgun.

The first and best thing a person can do to make shotgun shooting easier is to fit the shotgun to the shooter. Most shotguns are designed for some kind of hunting and/or some type of exclusive shotgun shooting like trap or skeet. This usually means they have a very long length of pull. The length of pull is the distance from the end of the stock to the trigger. However, it is not a good idea to have a long length of pull if you are short or have short arms.

First, when the stock of the gun is too long, it is difficult for a person to really lean into the gun. If you aren't leaning hard into the gun, the recoil effect will be worse, and shooting the shotgun will hurt you.

Second, Cowboy Action ShootingTM is an action sport. It is important you be able to get the gun in and out of your shoulder easily. Shooting under the timer can be very difficult, especially for a new shooter. When the stock of the gun is too long and not easy to get in and out of your shoulder, and the pressure of shooting under the clock is added, it is likely you will miss your shoulder socket. If you miss the shoulder socket, you will put the gun farther in on your chest or on the upper part of your arm. This improper position causes recoil to hurt and will quickly make anyone hate shooting the shotgun.

Another reason for the stock to be the correct length is the gun is easier to load. If you have a '97 the port is closer to you, so you don't have to reach as far. If you have a double barrel shotgun with a shorter stock, it is easier to take the gun on and off your shoulder, and it balances better.


Those are the three biggest reasons for your stock to be the right length. I am 5' 8" and I shoot a 12-1/2" stock. Usually, if the bolt of the gun is not hitting you in the face, it is not too short. If you still have questions about stock length, you can refer back to the Women, Guns, and Gear in the May Cowboy Chronicle.


Another big mistake most people make when they start shooting the shotgun in Cowboy Action ShootingTM is in choosing the gauge of their gun. Most people assume if they are having trouble handling the recoil of a 12-gauge, they should change to a 20-gauge. When they get the 20-gauge, the recoil is worse. If you don't load your own ammunition, you can usually buy a 12-gauge shell that will have much less recoil than a 20-gauge shell. The 20-



(Continued from previous page) gauge's much sharper recoil, makes it harder to shoot.

The best shells for a new shooter are the Winchester Featherlites or Extra Lites. These can usually be purchased from any gun store, wilderness store, or Wal-mart. If you can't find those lighter shotgun shells, talk to the people in your local gun club. They usually know where to find them.

Recoil is always a problem with new shooters. There are several other ways you can help reduce the recoil, making the gun easier to shoot. One of these is a recoil reducer you can slide into the stock of the gun. This is usually some type of weighted material that makes the gun heavier so it can't move back with as much momentum. I personally do not recommend them. The reason I don't like the recoil reducer is it makes the gun heavier and changes the balance point. This makes the gun harder to pick up, set down, and handle. I personally see no reason to make any part of shooting more difficult.

Another way to help reduce the felt recoil is to use a pad. All shotguns should have one of those thick rubber pads on the end of the stock. I see no reason for having one of those thin metal plates. The thick rubber pad will help cushion the recoil. Even if it is only a little bit, it is worth it.

If you are still having trouble, I recommend a pad you can wear either over or under your shirt. There are many different types. Some of them you wear strapped around your body and some attach to your bra strap, though this will not help if you are a man. I have personally never worn one of these pads.

I have had the privilege of having a very experienced instructor. I started shooting when I was 11 years old and weighed 82 pounds. I started with a 12-gauge shotgun with no recoil reducer, shooting Winchester Featherlites. I always leaned into the gun really well, and consequently I have never had a problem shooting the shotgun.

The last major problem I have seen when it comes to ladies and their shotguns is their husband or other man in their shooting life. I know that sounds bad, but it is really not. Actually, I see two problems. One, some men do not want to change the shotgun to fit their wife. However, if you don't make the gun comfortable for her to shoot, she is



not going to want to shoot with you.

The other problem I see is most wives will refuse to listen to their husbands. I am honestly not sure of the reasoning behind this. But, I have seen men give their wives advice for days, and a complete stranger will give her the same advice, and she will take it without question. Whatever the reason, it never hurts to take advice, even from your husband! It may not be right, but if you try it and find it doesn't work, then the two of you can work together to find something that will work. This requires not only the woman to listen, but the man as well. Regardless, if you work together you can make the shotgun comfortable to shoot.

The shotgun can be very fun to shoot. However, if the gun does not fit you correctly or if you are shooting monster loads, you are not going to enjoy it. Cowboy Action ShootingTM is supposed to be fun, and if you aren't having a good time, then you are doing something wrong.

ast Fall I saw an advertisement In The Cowboy Chronicle for the EMF Great Western II revolver in stainless steel. When I was still a teenager, a long time ago, I talked my dad into getting me an original Great Western single action in .22 caliber. Some years later I found another in .45 Colt. I still have both, well worn, but still working fine. So I thought I would like to try the new ones. I had seen the Great Western II advertised before, but not in stainless steel. I much prefer stainless handguns for several reasons. They don't show wear like blue guns. If well polished, they look like old nickel plate similar to the ones Roy, Gene, and Hoppy used, and also it's easy to remove silly warnings or names from the barrels. A call was placed to EMF to ascertain if it was possible to get a consecutive serial numbered pair of these new revolvers. The gentleman on the phone checked and said he did indeed have such a pair with my favorite 4-3/4 inch barrels in .38 Special caliber. I advised him I usually need an action job on new guns, and he said these would not need it.

Two days later the pistols



arrived, and to my delight they did not need any action work. The trigger pulls measured 2-1/2 and just under three pounds, perfect for Cowboy Action ShootingTM. The guns I had been using always needed quite a bit of work, so this was a refreshing surprise. I discovered the chambers did not need to be honed and polished, and to my amazement each cylinder throat slugged out at .3575, perfect for the .358 bullets I use. In addition, the cylinder pins were a perfect fit, no side slop or end shake. In fact, every part of these new Great Westerns was perfectly fitted and correctly timed. The bolt dropped into the cylinder notch lead without scoring the cylinder, a common problem on some revolvers. These Great Western II's are match ready right out of the box! One note of caution, there is no transfer bar in these revolvers. The firing pin is mounted on the hammer as in the original Colts. This means you only load five rounds and lower the hammer on an empty chamber, SASS style. The **only** safety feature is a double-notched cylinder pin; the second notch extends the pin through the frame preventing the hammer from fully lowering.

I packed up my new toys and headed to the range to sight them in. Yes, they did need adjustment for my 124-grain cowboy load. Windage was good, but the front sights on both had to be cut down. I like to zero for point of aim at 25 yards, as that way you can be pretty much on all the way to fifty yards. Every once and a while the local club will have a scenario where you shoot your revolvers at the rifle targets way out yonder. Using a fine cut flat file, I fired five shot groups and then filed until my groups were right on point of aim. Then I took the file and wiped off the etched Great Western II name from the top of the barrels. This was fairly easy, and with a little polishing, the job was complete. Using these fine revolvers, I never missed a shot the rest of our shooting season. These are truly great guns!

My pair came with what is called Ultra Ivory grips, not unattractive, but they are in reality plastic, which turns me off. Therefore, I called Dan Chesiak, who makes custom grips for Colt, to see about getting a couple pair of real African Elephant Ivory grips. I specified them to be "one piece" fitted just like the "ultra ivory" ones from EMF, but with a flatter butt and about 1/16 inch thinner at the bottom. Dan did a great job making a perfect fit to my specs on my grip frames, and using some beautiful Ivory. Expensive, yes; worth it, definitely! There is just something about real Ivory. It has a warm feeling and character absent in the imitations. Since it was time to hibernate for the winter, (that means watch westerns while it's snowing outside), I decided to ship the guns to my engraver. Years ago I fell in love with the engraving done by Jeff Flannery. In my estimation, he ranks up with the Old Masters. His full coverage on a stainless single action is a beautiful thing to behold. For real quality engraving (Continued on next page)

at a reasonable price, you just can't beat Jeff.

Fast forward to the first warm weather here in Ohio, and I decided to get another pair of Great Western II's, in stainless of course, for backups. Cowboy Action ShootingTM is just the greatest excuse to buy more guns! Again I called EMF and the following day my new consecutive serial numbered pair arrived. This pair came in with slightly heavier trigger pulls at 3-1/4 and 4 pounds; otherwise, they were fitted and finished exactly like the first pair. A quick call to Brownell's and a couple sets of "Lee's Gunsmithing" Colt spring kits (part #100-000-509) were on the way. At the same time I decided to order the screwdriver bit set for Colts to fit my hex driver handle (part # 080-000086). Correct fitting screwdrivers save ugly burred heads and lots of cussing. (Do ask Brownell's for a Cowboy Action Catalog, it's free and full of goodies for Cowboy Action ShootingTM.)

Installing the new springs was quite easy and again nothing else needed to be done other than cutting down the front sights for my loads. These guns seemed to shoot even better than the first pair, producing two-inch groups at 25 yards from a rest. As usual, I removed the Great Western II marking on top of the barrels. The Italian maker Pietta is marked very unobtrusively under the barrel next to the ejector housing where it does not detract from the clean looks of the gun. This pair instantly became my main match guns. They just don't miss, if I do my part!

I heard of a gentleman making grips of Red Stag and when a fellow shooter, Marcus Allen, SASS Life #4357, showed me his, I knew my second pair of guns would soon be wearing them. I contacted Roger Warmuskerken to see about getting some custom Red Stag grips made for this pair. Since the original ultra ivory grips fit my hand well, I wanted the Red Stag to be the made with approximately the same dimensions and with as much bark as possible on such thin panels. Roger does not just ship you a set of grips that roughly fit. Rather, he makes them to your grip frame. These panels are fitted, no gaps and nothing hanging over the frame. In addition, he made my pair "one piece," that is, actually two panels with stainless pins and a filler block gluing the two sides together (the same as "one piece" ivory). Of course, this means you must ship him your grip frame and wait a few weeks, so it's good to have a spare set of guns if it's your shooting season. Roger emailed me photos of the new panels before finishing. What a teaser! I could hardly wait for them to arrive.

Several days after receiving the email photos from Roger, my new

grips arrived via priority mail. have twenty pairs of Sambar Stag on various handguns and two pair of Elk Stag, and none of them compare to the beauty and fit of these custom Red Stag grips. When you buy off the shelf/mail order stag grips, they come in various thicknesses, and usually with either sharp edges hanging over the frame or gaps with the frame wider than the grips. Since Cowboy Action ShootingTM is a two-hand gun competition, I believe both should be as alike as possible, i.e., same trigger pull and grip size. To be consistently accurate, the grips must fit your hands and the actions should feel the same. While these grips have a different pattern on the panels due to the nature of the material, they are the same thickness. Therefore, they feel alike. Roger did have to make them a little thicker than the originals because I wanted lots of "bark" on the panels rather than plain smooth grips without character. Again there is something about natural material that beats synthetic any time. Remember the guns used by our western heroes didn't have faux ivory and imitation stag back then, just the real deal! Unfortunately these grips are so nice looking I may have to find another stagecoach with a loaded strongbox, so I can have Jeff engrave this pair of six shooters.

If you want to play our fantasy game with guns that look and feel like those in the old westerns, check out EMF and these custom suppliers. I am sure you won't be disappointed.

You hear it time and time again ... I ordered this ... (Insert any or all of the following words: britches, gun belt, pants belt) ... and they don't fit! How come?

It would be simple, in the case of britches, to say, "oh, it's just the cut," but it's more than that. Some manufacturers "fib." Okay ... most of 'em lie like rugs, but it's not that they want to make you feel bad. Usually they're trying to make you feel good.

WHY DON'T IT FIT????

Hmmph! you say? Here's the logic: When your jeans say you're a 38, most likely you're a 40 in the waistline, doesn't it make you feel more svelte to think of yourself as a 38? The trouble comes when one manufacturer makes you think you're more svelte than another - or when one cut delivers a promise another can't for the same measurement. Or when one set of britches comes with spandex and the others come with that stuff that shrinks just looking at a tub full of water. About the safest advice anyone can give is trust no one and try them all on and then ask if they'll shrink on you in the wash. And pay attention to the fact no human being has ever been able to predict shrinkage when hung in a closet for a number of days, weeks, or months. Buyer beware!

Pants or waist belts come with a whole different set of rules. Don't ever even think of telling a belt maker you wear a size such and such pair of pants and expect your belt to fit. It simply doesn't work. I know 'cause my brother tried that one on me years back, and I fell for it. It took me three belts to figure out his britches weren't telling the truth and that he was fibbin' some too!

Manufacturers measure belts any number of different ways too, so even if you know your actual waist size, you could be in for a surprise. Here are some of the ways they measure:


- 1. The manufacturer figures out the total length of the leather in the belt plus the buckle together. Translation: the center hole is anywhere from 4-6" from the end, which makes that 38" belt a 34" or even a 32"!
- 2. The manufacturer measures the belt from the hole closest to the end of the billet. That means the belt is actually about 2" shorter than what it's labeled as, 'cause it's the centermost hole that counts!

3. The manufacturer measures the belt from the center hole to the fold. Translation: There's no buckle on that belt. Depending on style, width, and type, buckles can add anywhere from a half inch to 3" — or more! — to the length of a belt. That means your 38" belt is now a ...?

Actually, this is one of the more common ways of measuring a belt, used by quite a bunch of extremely reputable manufacturers because it standardizes the manufacturing process (i.e., better for them, not you). In my neck of the woods, this measurement is designated HTF or "hole to fold." The good news is if you have a pretty-much standard sort of buckle - or are putting your old buckle back on the new belt — this can actually work. It is also about the only way to do things for those folks who have one belt and continually want to swap out the buckles.

- 4. The belt is measured from the center hole with the buckle included in the measurement. For those of you who don't know, for a heel bar or center bar buckle, that's from the center hole to the place where the tongue hits the buckle. On a trophy buckle, it's from center hole to the buckle hook. This is the most accurate way of doing things, as it matches the waist measurement. A 38 is a 38. Unfortunately, it's rougher on the maker because math is involved. They have to cut the leather to length by subtracting the buckle length, which can be in interesting fractional numbers that strain the noodles of the best makers. My humble opinion is the "noodling" is well worth the tailored net end result.
- 5. And this is the worst! The manufacturer hasn't a single clue on how to measure his belts. I've measured belts from some pretty well known manufacturers that make absolutely no sense whatsoever. I have no idea what's going on with this, but I've seen it too many times to dismiss it as uncommon. I can't even begin to speculate how to order one of these from a catalogue or (heaven forbid!) online. Your best bet would be to talk to someone who can physically measure the belt for you.

When you get to gun belts, it gets even nuttier. There are all the possible permutations mentioned above as well as the following:

- (a) Some manufacturers automatically figure the hip measurement is 4" (or so) larger than the waist measurement, and they'll mark their 42" hip belts as 38" belts. Boy, can that create mayhem! That means if you think you're ordering a 38" hip, that belt will be 4" (or so) too big on you!
- (b) Other manufacturers mark the actual hip measurement (that 38" will actually be a 38"), while others give an HTF measurement (38" plus an inch or so). Either way, you'll get closer than with the method outlined in (a). Unfortunately, it makes punchers who are used to having that 4" hip fudge factor added in crazy because all their belts will be coming in 4" shy of what they need! So how on earth do you get around this mess?

Trying the darn things on is your first and best way of dealing with the issue. Unfortunately, we mostly don't live in that sort of a world, and mail order and Internet sales are a fact of life. If you mail order, the best way to do it is to give your true measurement (taken with a tape measure at the place where you will be wearing the belt). If you can talk to a real, live human being, tell them you would like someone to take a physical measurement from the buckle to the center hole. (If the belt is con-



toured, you might have to remind them to measure along the contour rather than across it. Yeah ... the hired help can get scary sometimes!)

The next best way to order is to go by an existing belt. In this case make sure they know this is a *hole to* fold measurement and have them do a physical measurement to make certain. (Ummm ... don't forget to measure along the contours of your existing belt rather than across it. Customers can be scary too!)

This still doesn't guarantee mis-

takes won't happen. Folks who make these items are just mere mortals after all. But, human error aside, these methods work and will usually make you feel less grumpy when your ... (insert britches, gun belt, waist belt) arrives.

've received several letters over Lthe past year asking me to address the 170 Degree Rule. While just about everyone agrees on how this rule applies when a competitor is actually engaging a stage with firearms in hand, the rule gets real murky when it is applied to drawing and re-holstering pistols and vertically staged long guns. For instance, a vertically staged side-by-side shotgun with the action open resting against a prop is already at 180

degrees, and the moment the competitor retrieves it and begins to lift it even while using the greatest care, it will probably exceed 190 degrees. This can happen with any long gun when staged vertically, but it is most obvious with the side-by-side.

Another example is a strong side "straight-hang" pistol worn at or behind the side seam of the pants. Most of these types of strong side draws exceed 180 degrees as they are exiting the holster. Cross-draws are consistently heavily scrutinized by just about everyone, and when performed correctly by wearing the cross-draw holster in the appropriate position or by twisting (if necessary), these types of draws can be done as safely as any other. But the biggest complaint I get from crossdraw shooters is that everyone seems to completely ignore strongside "straight-hang" draws even when someone wears it "John Wayne Style" and sweeps the Timer Operator and Spotters as they draw and re-holster.

As we always should, let's read what the rules have to say about this subject. There are many people in SASS that believe the SASS Handbook is the final word on the rules. However, I would like to point out on Page 3 of the Handbook it states, "The SASS Range Operations Basic Course and SASS Range Officer Training Course offer an indepth interpretation and further clarification of these rules." Therefore, in order to have the complete rules, you must have all three documents. I strongly suggest every serious competitor download it and put

it in a binder, so you have all the information at hand. If you don't have the complete set of the above materials, they can be downloaded from the SASS Web page at www.sassnet.com. You can also download the Match Administration Guide and the Match Design Guide. These are all free and are a wealth of information for anyone involved in organizing any size match.

In the SASS Handbook on Page 40, #17 seems to be the only place that mentions the 170-Degree Rule, but the wording only seems to be about cross-draws and shoulder holsters. It's almost as though it doesn't cover strong-side holsters or long guns.

In the SASS Range Operations Basic Course (RO-I) on Page 14, at (Continued on next page)

the end of #19, it says in bold letters, "Any gun that breaks the 170-degree safety rule will result in a Stage DQ." On the same page under #21, it covers Dropped Guns, a subject for a future column.

Finally, in the SASS Range Officer Training Course (RO-II) on Page 8 under Breaking the 170-Degree Safety Rule, 2nd paragraph, "It is also necessary to note the shooter must be given the ability to draw and holster pistols from "straight hang" holsters and the ability to retrieve and return vertically staged double-barreled shotguns without penalty."

What does all this mean? It means both the shooter and the Range Officer have to apply good judgment. SASS has an impeccable safety record, and we aim to keep it that way. Shooters should draw pistols and pick up vertically staged long guns so as to keep the muzzle in a safe direction and point them downrange as efficiently as possible. In some International Action Shooting Sports, they actually go as far as allowing a competitor a one-meter (draw zone) around their feet to accomplish drawing and re-holstering. This was brought up to the Territorial Governors in 1999 at the first Summit, but it was decided we just wanted to keep everything as down-range as possible. Practically speaking, we have pretty much been following the One-Meter Rule both around the shooters feet and vertically when retrieving and re-staging vertically staged long-guns. Personally, I'm not a big fan of un-written rules, but I do understand the concept of "if we give them an inch they'll take a mile," or in this case, a meter and a half or two meters.

What we have been doing has worked, although it can lead to literal interpretations, hard line calls, and penalties. SASS is committed to keeping this sport as friendly as possible and keeping the rules as simple as allowable. There is no such thing as making the rules so plainly written everyone can understand them without any misunderstanding. No language, especially English, is capable of accomplishing that task. If it were, we wouldn't need the court system. We don't want our Handbook a foot thick and have to use Black's Law Dictionary to decipher it. Instead, we prefer to have common sense and the intent of our rules as our guiding light. We are a sport made of competitor judging competitor. To use good judgment and apply the rules for the benefit of all the shooters is the highest goal we can seek to attain.

COUNTERS READY? SHOOTER READY? COMIN' AT CHA ...

Beep. You engage the stage, shooting as quickly and safely as possible. Your last round goes downrange, and you proceed to the unloading table with a grin. As the smoke clears, you wait to hear your time and misses called out to the scorer. You look over to the spotters and notice no count being displayed. The counters are looking at each other, seemingly waiting for something. Tentatively a counter raises a finger and almost instantly the other two are displaying a single finger as well. Hmm. That's interesting. Wonder what they were doing when they were supposed to be counting? You once again briefly consider selling your guns and taking up golf.

Ever happen to you? Even worse, have you ever been that counter waiting for someone else to make the call? Our hobby is rare

among organized sports in that the participants score and referee for the very folks they are competing against. We must be vigilant in our performance while counting, and insist on it from others, to ensure a fair and level playing field for all that will shoot that stage.

To do so:

- Watch the targets for impacts and markings.
- Listen for impacts.
- Find a position that will give you a line of sight on both shooter and targets during the entire stage. If such a position does not exist move as needed as the shooter moves.
- Be aware of your shooter's equip ment. Smokeless .32 rounds will not "ding" the same as full load blackpowder .45's but a hit is a hit and counts the same.

- Do not be intimidated by the shooter or the match everyone misses at some time first time shooters and champions alike.
- Be aware of the stage directions be looking at the correct targets.
- Do not discuss or debate with the other spotters during the stage.
- You saw what you saw right or wrong. Hold up your count at the end of the shooting string – don't wait for the other counters.

The position of counter can be a difficult job, as it requires a level of attention almost as intense as the shooting itself. When you note a

counter performing this duty well and accurately - thank them. Fair, accurate, and consistent counting ensures we all get the same shooting experience, and our scores can be fairly compared to others shooting the same stages. No shooter wants to benefit or be penalized because of someone else's scoring error. Lastly and perhaps most importantly, avoiding these types of issues ensures our thoughts of selling our guns and taking up golf are minimized. After all, who wants to take up golf? Those folks wear funny looking clothing. .





COWBOY FAST DRAW

Past Draw competition has been around probably as long as Cowboy Action Shooting™. However, because of the number of leg wounds, missing toes and other injuries, and the danger involved for others, as well as for the shooter, the activity has not attained any advanced level of popularity.

With today's advanced techniques of laser development and the production of sophisticated timing machines and the production of wax projectiles, a change is taking place and the sport seems to be taking off at a very rapid pace. A number of matches and Championships already have been held, mostly in South Dakota, Idaho, Wyoming, and other western states. Most recently a cowboy fast draw match was held in conjunction with, but not authorized by, a SASS match in Norco, CA and another in Mule Camp, GA.

Having been involved with SASS shooting for a number of years, I decided to see what this fast draw

stuff was all about. In May we traveled to Meridian, ID for the 2005 Cowboy Fast Draw National Championship.

Fast Draw competition is held in a more or less urban setting because of need for a dependable electric power source to operate the quite elaborately designed and most accurate scoring machines that must provide results at least to the millisecond (0.001 sec). These timing machines are attached to round targets two feet in diameter that have a light in the center. The contestants are brought to the firing line, commanded to be set, and the controller presses a switch that shortly activates the light. This activation is the signal for the contestants to draw and fire. Only one shot is fired at each activation and is repeated, normally for the usual five rounds, unless a tie occurs between the contestants, at which time the competitors reload one to five more rounds (depending upon the rules established for the match)

and try again until one person has won more rounds.

It would seem reloading would not be necessary because the targets are placed (for championship matches) at distances no more than the traditional gunfight distance of 21 feet. However, the number of misses in a match often can be exceptionally high. As an amusing aside to illustrate this point: in this Meridian Championship in my very first attempt at this sort of thing, I was able

to defeat the eventual champion, whose scores consistently were clustered in the 0.4–0.5 second range, because I did not miss a target. Thus, I had scores more than twice as high as his, but I had five scores while he had only two!

The match is run on a round robin sort of format. Individuals are eliminated from the tournament when they are defeated four times. Most of these eliminations occur the first day, so the second day provides for two brackets competing simultaneously. The championship group continues as before, and the second group, consisting of the 4X losers, competes by shooting only three rounds for up to two losses to determine "Best of the Worst."

A very large number of the shooters were not SASS members and, in fact, a considerable number were not even aware of our organization. They gain most of their new members by people stopping by while shopping. These visitors try a few rounds at the booth the society keeps manned with a person to demonstrate, supply a rig, handgun, and wax projectiles, and provide instruction so the person can join on the spot. This particular match in Meridian, which is a suburb of Boise, was held in the parking lot of a shopping mall - an ideal location to provide the electrical connections and other amenities essential to the match.


There are no age divisions such as those offered by SASS, although they do recognize juniors and seniors with a division prize. The Senior Champion would have qualified for early senior status in SASS. However, he also finished third overall in the championship division. Thus, I would not believe it should

behoove an elder statesman, or one approaching that division, to have great expectations of gaining fame and fortune in this sport, although at 85, I was able to win a couple and survive through nine rounds. But, my survival resulted only from being able to hit the targets consistently while depending upon my much faster opponents to miss.

Women seem to enjoy this type of competition and were represented by a large contingent. The nearness of the aforementioned amenities of civilization was mentioned as im-




El Tigre Viejo gets ready to take on the reigning Cowboy Fast Draw Champion at the Meridian match.

portant to a number of queries. They also have a senior division that was won by the Overall Women's Champion, thus allowing the second place senior, my wife, La Gatita, SASS #28084, to take the senior's award in her very first attempt at this sport.

The dinner provided by the organization at one of the Boise Hotels certainly was excellent and the number and quality of the prizes

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY



1890's

October

By Ellsworth T. Kincaid, Life/Regulator #6037

For \$25, passengers on the Anchor Line steamboats traveled roundtrip from Natchez to the St. Louis Exposition. Some said the Oct 1890 meals alone were worth the fare.

Oct 1890 Due to the growth of the railroad, the 1890 census showed Kansas and Nebraska had grown to more than a million residents each, Minnesota to 1.3 million, the two Dakotas to more than a half million, and the Pacific Northwest States to 675,000. The desert of Arizona Territory boasted almost 90,000 settlers. The "great empty" was no longer empty.

Yosemite National Park in California is created by an act of Congress and is dedicated on the $15^{\hbox{th}}$. This act is chiefly due to 1 Oct 1890 the work of naturalist John Muir and Robert Underwood, one of the editors of Century Magazine.

7 Oct 1890 Train robber, murderer Rube Burrows is captured and lodged in the Linden Alabama jail. Attempting to escape, he is killed.

Kicking Bear is escorted from the Dakota's Standing Rock Agency 16 Oct 1890 as officials become agitated over the Indians' "Ghost Dance.

Troops reach Pine Ridge in fear the Indians are on the "verge of a 19 Oct 1890 big outbreak." Thousands of Indians take to the Bad Lands.

5 Oct 1892 Just after 9:00 AM, the Dalton Gang raids Coffeyville, Kansas, attempting to rob two banks, the Condon and First National, simultaneously. Four gang members (Bill Powers, Dick Broadwell, and Bob and Grat Dalton) and four locals are killed. Emmett Dalton turns back to aid his brother and is shot repeatedly, surviving 20 gunshot wounds. Emmett is sentenced to life in prison in 1893, but will be pardoned in 1907 and live to become a prosperous citizen of California, making movies about his gang's exploits.

President Harrison opens 1,800,000 acres of Crow Indian land in 15 Oct 1892 Montana to settlement.

A young historian from the University of Wisconsin, Frederick Jackson Turner, reads from his essay, "The Significance of the Frontier in American History," at the World's Columbian Oct 1893 Exposition held in Chicago. Turner clothed the frontier experience in a new dignity, saying the American was unique among the peoples of the earth, due to their conquering of the frontier.

Ed and John Jennings, brothers of Al, get into a gunfight with Temple Houston. Ed is killed; John dies of wounds soon afterward. 7 Oct 1894

Oct 1894 Asa Shinn Mercer, former publisher of the Northwestern Livestock Journal in Cheyenne, who once supported the cattle barons and their dominant Republican Party machine, publishes his little book with the long title, *The Banditti of the Plains, or the* Cattlemen's Invasion of Wyoming in 1892, keeping alive the memory of the Johnson County War. Mercer had switched to the Democratic Party just after the invasion of Johnson County and denounced the cattle barons.

Oct 1895 Charlie Russell rides over to visit the family of his friend Ben Roberts near the town of Cascade, Montana. There he meets Nancy Cooper, an attractive 16-year-old, who was motherless and abandoned by her father in Helena. They become fast friends and marry in September of 1896. Nancy organizes Charlie's life, puts him on a strict work schedule, taking over the sales of his art. She persuades him to move back to Great Falls, a better market for his art, and gets him to exhibit his works in Denver. Charlie was content with Nancy managing his life.

Rural free delivery is established throughout the country by the 1 Oct 1896 Federal Post Office ... especially appreciated by residents of the West, where distances are so vast.

1 Oct 1897 Al and Frank Jennings rob a Rock Island train, netting \$300. They are arrested, tried, and sentenced: Al getting five and Frank getting seven years hard labor.

15 Oct 1899 The "Overland Limited," a luxury train, makes its first run from Chicago to Oakland, California, stopping in Reno, Nevada to make it convenient for gamblers. This train will remain in service 'till 1947.



offered were outstanding. The top 15 men and top 10 women in the Championship Division each received prizes along with the top two men and women in the "Best of the Worst." Both the man and woman top gun, or overall champions, received an unusual and most attractively designed plaque, a complete rig valued at over \$1000, a new pistol (a 50% engraved Ruger), plus a silver champion's buckle.

My thoughts and emotions about Fast Draw are quite ambivalent. Obviously, the pluses are many and

all of the people were some of the most congenial and most pleasant I have encountered in any of my shooting travels. As a traditionalist, however, I am not too overly pleased about spending a couple of days in the parking lot of a big city mall in spite of the fun and nice people. I also am not overly excited about traveling more than 2000 miles round trip to actually shoot a total of less than two minutes in the entire competition. However, that may be because even the less than two minutes of shooting over the two day period is far more than I should shoot, if I want to be competitive.

When I put it all in perspective, I guess I understand why Bat Masterson decided to give it all up and become a reporter, and why Wyatt Earp decided to go after some gold in Alaska. They had a lot more to lose, but the idea is the same. As Dirty Harry says, "A man's got to know his limitations."

(Actually the sport of Fast Draw is a lot older than Cowboy Action ShootingTM. Many of our early SASS members came from Fast Draw, and others, like Quick Cal and Arizona Thumber, are still

active Fast Draw competitors. Fast Draw, Western Three Gun, and Cowboy Action ShootingTM are all "cowboy" gun games and each serves to broaden the membership base of all the disciplines. It's wonderful when individuals actually join all three organizations! While SASS is hesitant to host or sponsor Fast Draw and Western Three Gun matches for perceived safety and prize money reasons, there is no reason our members shouldn't give these other disciplines a try. Variety is the spice of life! ... editor.) ...




INTRO TO MOUNTED SHOOTING - PART I

MOUNTED SHOOTING GUNS

ost anyone new to SASS Action LShooting or Mounted Shooting has seen what we do and their comments range from "Looks like fun!" to "Where do I sign up?" For those reasons I'll skip the "What is" part of Mounted Shooting and move on to the equipment needed in a multipart series covering guns, blanks, saddles, costumes, and even the ancient history of this great sport. When a new person decides to join in the fun of Mounted Shooting they inevitably ask what kind of guns are needed. The SASS Mounted Shooting Handbook states:

"Each contestant shall be armed with two revolvers. Only fixed sight single action revolvers of .45 Long Colt caliber, designed prior to 1898, reproductions thereof, are allowed. Examples of these guns include Colt Single Action Army or Bisley Model, Smith & Wesson



Schofield or Russian, or Remington Models 1875 and 1890, their reproductions, and Ruger Vaqueros."

The new shooter can pick up two of these firearms, new or used, at any gun store. If you cut out this text and bring it with you, the dealer should be able to help you decide what guns are right for you. You can also peruse manufacturers' websites and pick something out. Prices start around \$280 and go up.

In general, you are not going to want to beat up an original antique firearm. Mounted Shooting WILL beat up your guns. They get dropped in the dirt, banged against fence posts, fouled with blackpowder, stolen from holsters by curious horses, and even chewed on! A reproduction is the way to go. So, whom do you purchase from? Who makes a good gun, and how do you avoid something that will break a lot? These are tough questions because everyone will have their own opinions. My experience shows all guns are made about the same. Any of the major and many smaller manufacturers produce a good product. I've heard good and bad about every manufacturer - just like every car company! Cost does not seem to affect quality because, in general, all guns work fine out of the box, ready for your upgrades, if you desire them.

Think of the gun as a basic model car. Some people like them stock and other people cannot wait to put in after market upgrades. Allowable upgrades include Birdshead grips (many companies already sell guns with these grips), simulated ivory, antler, wood, or antiqued plastic grips, lighter hammer spring kits for easier function (don't go too light - if the primer doesn't go "bang," you'll get a five-second penalty!), free spinning pawls for quicker reloading, or even custom engraving, turned down hammers for easier cocking, hammer swaps between gun types (ex: Bisley

hammers on Vaqueros). (Knurling the backstrap for better grip is not allowed!) In general, any internal modification is allowed and very few external modifications that affect function are allowed. As a rule of thumb if you keep the gun looking like an 1800's cowboy sidearm you will be okay! Now that "cowboy" could be a wealthy British Lord who wants his Peacemaker gold plated. Or, it could be a poor cowhand with a handme-down gun. Remember, many Mounted Shooting changes are not allowed in Action Shooting. If you do both, you might need different guns.

Talking of modifications, you might want to consider "convertedguns." There are lots of low cost "percussion" revolvers available that can be converted to fire cartridges: Remington 1858's, 1851 and 1861 Colt Navies or the 1860 Colt Army, Walker Dragoons, Patterson, etc. Any gunsmith can convert these guns to take .45LC cartridges, but many now specialize in these conversions. Some conversions are authentic changes made to original guns over 100 years ago, and others are modern designs such as special dropto engage the remaining targets. You will need a lever action rifle or revolving carbine in .45LC for "Rifle Shooting" and a double barrel 12 gauge or .410 gauge shotgun. The revolving carbine is very light and easy to handle. It also keeps the empty brass in the gun, which means not having to pickup brass from the arena floor. Some revolving carbines are percussion models and will need conversion to take cartridges as mentioned above. The .410 shotgun will accept .45LC blanks, but the 12 gauge will require special converters. You can buy 12 gauge to .45LC converters from Old West movie prop companies, or you can drill out an empty 12 gauge shell primer hole to 0.45 inches, and then chamfer the opening to accept the case rim.


SMALL CREEK II—THE RETURN OF NEBRASKA NED

Noah's assimilation into the society of Small Creek, Kansas in 1874.


The Capgun Kid's characters really come to life, and in my opinion, this is a very accomplished trait for a writer. We get to know and become friends with Sheriff Axel Sweet, Rancher Ben Benson, and Wrangler Slim Posey, as well as the story's protagonist, Noah Dobbs IV, no small



a pistolero by the local, and anonymous, dime novelist Williams. This resulted in a reputation as a gunfighter—not exactly what this bootmaker wants. Whether he liked it or not, it appears he is now branded with this moniker "Kid Galena" for the remainder of his life, and a couple of outlaws, namely Nebraska Ned did something about that.

When we last visited Small Creek, Kansas and Noah in Volume One, Noah was recovering from a shoulder wound received while preventing Nebraska Ned from stealing his horse. Nursed back to health by his love, Alice Benson, Noah continues his futile effort to deny the "gunfighter" label already stamped upon him. Noah has more problems facing him in Volume Two. A syndicate of Texas cattlemen is attempting to squeeze his future father in law, Ben Mason, off the range. Nebraska Ned is traveling with them, and Volume Two is principally concerned with the range war that ensues. One of the Texas foremen, Jack Cronin, has sworn to kill Ben, and this will truly put the test to Noah's reputation and more importantly, perhaps his life. In Volume Two, we see a run in with Wild Bill Hickok, and the continuation of feat for any writer, but this comes as no surprise. The Capgun Kid, better known in real life as Gregory J. Geiger, has already published four novels, Divers Adventures, A Legacy Found, A Season of Purpose, as well as Small Creek I, introducing Noah Dobbs IV. His other work has been seen in "Smoke and Fire News," "The Buckskin Report," and the "Book of Buckskinning." He and his wife, Anne, raised their children in Connecticut, a center of colonial and firearms history.

The tale of *Trawlaine* follows the ▲ adventures of Jonathan Trawlaine, from his boyhood in the Cumberland Mountains to his coming of age in the New Mexico Territory. With the tragic loss of his family, young Jonathan decides to hook up with a trade company and head west, following the Santa Fe Trail to New Mexico. Tracking close behind him are a pack of no-nonsense mountain boys, the Flagan men, wanting revenge for the death of one of their own ... by the hands of Jonathan when protecting those he loved and lost. We learn Jonathan is half-Cherokee, on his mother's side, and for a young 15-year-old, he can wield a knife, tomahawk, shoot a Kentucky Long-rife, and pretty much take care of himself when trouble rears its ugly head ... which is often.

Having no difficulty making friends, he develops a life-long friendship with an old mountain man, Jeremiah Hawkins, and together they build a ranchero in northern

When we say "Sharps Rifle," in our minds it conjures up images of scruffy, buckskin clad, bearded men carrying their heavy barreled 1874 Sharps "Old Reliable" business rifle across the trackless plains in search of the vanishing North American Bison. What we don't often think of, however, is that Sharps metallic cartridge carbines were an issue item for both the US Cavalry in the Indian Wars, and the

CIMARRON'S TEXAS RANGER MODEL SHARPS .50-70 CARBINE

Texas Rangers on the Southern Border! With the increase of popularity of Plainsmen Matches requiring single shot rifle caliber guns, the Sharps carbine is a natural. Our friends at Cimarron have introduced their new Texas Ranger Model Sharps .50-70 Carbine. It is perfect as a fast handling Plainsmen rifle and for Indian War re-enactor alike.

SHARPS CARBINE HISTORY

Christian Sharps produced his first single shot, percussion, breechloading rifle using paper cartridges in the late 1840's. The popularity of his rifles increased over the next ten years. Prior to the Civil War, the Rev. Beecher, an abolitionist, shipped Sharps rifles to fellow abolitionists in Kansas in crates marked "Bibles." This gave the Sharps rifle the nickname "Beecher's Bibles." During the Civil War, the Sharps rifles, with

their fast breech reloading and their deserved reputation for accuracy, were in high demand. Col. Hiram Berdan issued .52 caliber, model 1859 Sharps rifles to his notorious "Sharpshooters."

As for Sharps carbines, the Sharps Linen cartridge carbines were very popular with Cavalry units during the Civil War, 80,000 of them having been manufactured. They had a reputation for reliability and accuracy. In fact, the Sharps carbine was second only to the Spencer repeater in popularity with Union Cavalry units.

After the war, in the late 1860s and early 1870s, over 30,000 thousand Sharps linen cartridge percussion carbines were converted to fire the new .50-70 Government round then used by the Allin Conversion Springfield trapdoors. In 1866, Sharps also began producing newly made metallic cartridge firing breechloaders. One of the first calibers was the .50-70 Government round. As the post war westward migration swelled, so did the flow of Sharps rifles to the West. Plainsmen and Buffalo hunters alike favored the Sharps for its power.

Even after the 1873 trapdoor Springfield carbine was made the standard issue during the Indian



Wars, these Sharps .50-70 carbines were substitute standard. They were still issued to many front line units, including the famous 10th Cavalry Buffalo Soldiers in Texas. The Sharps .50-70 carbines stayed in circulation in the Army, to some degree, until the early 1880s, though most were surplused out, as enough of the 1873 carbines were produced to replace them.

According to Garavaglia and Worman, in their book "Firearms of the American West 1866-1894" thirtv-six of the .50-70 converted Model 1863 Sharps Carbines were delivered to Captain McNelly's company of the Texas Rangers. The carbines had "T S" with a star between them stamped on the top of the barrel in front of the rear sight. (Author's Note: The Cimarron website says they were 1859 carbines that were converted. The actual Texas Ranger Carbine pictured in the book has no patch box on the stock. Model 1859 Sharps carbines had a patch box, but the 1863 (Continued on next page)

did not.) I have also read elsewhere it was predominantly Model 1863 Carbines that were converted to .50-70 after the war. This makes sense, as there were more 1863s produced, and they had seen less use.)

THE TEXAS RANGER SHARPS

About the only commonly found originals of the Sharps rifles found in today's SASS side matches are these .50-70 Cavalry carbines. They usually run about \$3,000 and up, though, for a functional one. Cimarron has made these much more affordable. These are nice, well-made guns, patterned after the model 1863 .50-70 cartridge conversion Sharps Cavalry Carbine issued during the Indian Wars. They are authentic and great shooters. My sample from Cimarron was really, really nice! It is made in Italy by Armi Sport, exclusively for Cimarron.

This Texas Ranger .50-70 has the true distinctive 1863 receiver and cartridge conversion lock-work of the original Sharps cartridge conversions.

It has a 22" round carbine barrel with a polished black-blue finish. The barrel sports a carbine reproduction of the original Sharps ladder style rear sight marked to 700 yards, and a period correct military style front inverted "V" on a platform front blade. The barrel has deep lands and grooves for use with blackpowder. It is chambered for the histori-

cally correct, and increasingly available, .50-70 Government cartridge. (For the non-purists, it is also available in .45-70)

The crescent steel butt plate is color case hardened like the receiver, hammer, and lever. The breechblock is blued. The Texas Ranger Sharps has a single, wide military style trigger that is smooth and crisp. The action is very smooth and light. It has the military style lever lock to keep the breech closed. It also has the cavalry "saddle ring on a slide bar" on the left side of the receiver (though actually for clipping to the wide leather sling used by horse troopers in the 19th century). It does not have the obnoxious automatic firing pin safety gizmo, like some earlier reproduction Sharps. The receiver tang is drilled and tapped for vernier tang sights, though I prefer the stock Sharps barrel sights on the carbine. Tang sights on a .50-70 carbine are like a 9X scope on a .22 pistol!

It has a walnut straight grip stock with a color case hardened carbine type crescent butt plate. It has the correct carbine style fore end, with a carbine barrel band held in place by a spring catch like the original. The wood to metal fit on my sample is absolutely perfect! My sample was a gorgeous light walnut with a dark grain pattern.

The "T S" with a star in the mid-

dle is stamped on the top of the barrel. It has appropriate Sharps and Lawrence patent information on the receiver and lock plate. Armi Sport's markings are discreetly stamped on the bottom of the barrel, well out of sight.

The Texas Ranger Sharps carbine tips my postal scales at exactly 7 lbs., 4 oz. It seems to balance in the hand well, and throws up on target quickly with the short barrel. My overall impression was above and beyond favorable

AMMUNITION

The only load I had on hand to test it (which is the only .50-70 load I use) proved to be a real gem, and showed the Texas Ranger Carbine's wonderful accuracy potential. It used a 450-grain bullet from a LEE mold, which incorporates two very deep grease grooves. The bullet is somewhat short with an almost pointed round nose. I lubed it with my 1/3 beeswax, 2/3 Crisco lube. I used Dixie Gunworks .50-70 brass, Winchester WMR primers, and 67 grains (volume) Hodgdon TRIPLE 7 blackpowder substitute. I use Lyman .50-70 "Cowboy" dies, which run only about \$40 a set, to assemble the loads. The powder was trickled down a 24" brass drop tube. The bullet was seated so no grease grooves were exposed. This allowed the 67grain powder charge, without either over compressing the powder charge or deforming the bullet.

This load should be in the neighborhood of 1,250 fps. if I am figuring right. That should be a good combination of speed and bullet weight for those of you who, like me, prefer the heavier "pills" traveling down range.


AT THE RANGE

As it is a carbine, I used a 50-yard range for the shooting. I used crossed "Buffalo Sticks" from a sitting position for a rest. I also shot pop cans off-hand at 25 yards to simulate Plainsmen shooting. The three-shot groups averaged around 2-1/4" to 2-1/2" at 50 yards, very respectable for a carbine with a short barrel and the stock iron sights with the military front blade.


This was with the factory replica Sharps ladder rear sight and military front sight blade. The groups were dead center on the target. The Texas Ranger Sharps shouldered well, and seemed a natural fit. The felt recoil with blackpowder loads and the 450-grain bullet were surprisingly tame.

CONCLUSION

You can tell I truly believe Cimarron has another real "shooter" here. It is a natural for Plainsmen events, and can throw lead 275 yards down range and bang a buffalo gong. It's a good looking and a good shooting gun for a great price. With a little shopping for the right dealer, one can be had for around \$950. \$\mathbb{L}\$.







Nubbins Colt, SASS Life #7802

As I mentioned in a recent Combou Chronicle story about attending the NRA Convention, I had the opportunity to examine Charles Daly's entries into the single action revolver market. What I specifically wrote was that I was stunned by the good looks of their guns, especially the stainless steel model with faux ivory grips and a "CD" carved into them. I said then, and I say now, these are

great looking guns that will earn big style points when seen in holsters or on the firing line. Moreover, the guns I handled, which were factory stock, had hammers that cocked like slicing a hot knife through butter and the triggers were exquisite.

Early this past May, the Charles Daly offerings were discussed on the SASS Wire. Just to indicate I am not alone in my praise of these

fine guns, here is what Colonel Nathan C. Riddles wrote, dittoed by Gallows:

The fit and finish is very nice. The action is very smooth. I forgot to use a trigger pull gauge at the store, but judging from my other guns that have all had action jobs with a trigger pull of 2 1/4 lbs I would estimate

these to be about 2 3/4 lbs each. The triggers both break nice & crisp with no creep at all. The cylinders are beveled to facilitate easier reholstering. The one-piece imitation ivory grips fit perfectly. There is no end shake and they lock up good and tight. The bolt rises at the proper time and there are no drag marks on the cylinders. I was surprised at how light they are and how well they balance for 7 1/2" barrels.

The guns are made by Pietta in Italy and imported by KBI. The model Charles Daly sent to me for testing was the gun that knocked me out, their 1873 Single Action Stainless Steel, .45 Colt, 4 3/4" barrel, PVC grip (which I think looks great, really ivory-like, but some folks might be fussier than me). I'll probably never know if it was the same gun I handled in Houston, but it felt the same, looked the same, cocked the same, and had the same exquisite trigger pull. The markings on the guns mimic Colts, plus there are Charles Daly, Pietta, and KBI proprietary markings that I scarcely notice. Purists might be attuned to such things and care, but it would seem to be of no consequence to most folks. I can only say the gun is truly lovely and, in my experience, has an out-of-the-box action about which other manufacturers can only dream.

So, having said that, at a recent Comanche Valley Vigilantes Sunday match I presented the gun for examination to several knowledgeable shooters including Cowtown, current World Champion and Texas State Champion/Modern category, and Goatneck Clem, the club's Territorial Governor and current Texas State Champion/49er Category, and top

shooters and my good friends, Doc Brazos and Steel Eyes. Cowtown, Doc Brazos, and Steel Eyes reacted similarly, admiring the revolver's good looks and, simply put, marveling at the fact this was an out-of-the-box gun with an action that smooth and that slick!


Goatneck, however, is also a Colt SAA collector and expert in the area of single action revolvers; he is also a gunsmith and very definitely knows the inner workings of such guns. He not only admired the action of the hammer and trigger, he slowly and careful checked each aspect of the gun, and with his practiced hands and expert's eye, he stated categorically the shiny revolver's timing was perfect. Goatneck specifically noted the Charles Daly single-action revolver locked up one hundred percent solidly, and he pointed out other positive aspects of the action with respect to the construction, the quality of the hammer and firing pin, fit and finish, and so forth. I was mighty pleased to hear that from an expert of his stature.

Okay, it looks good and it feels good and it "clicks" good – how does it shoot?

IT SHOOTS GOOD!

I'd like to be able to tell you I cleaned the match with it but I failed to accomplish that. For one thing, I was just a little trepidatious with respect to that great trigger. I shoot Ruger Vaqueros regularly, and I don't allow my guns to have triggers that light. I'm a little ham-handed, and I fear accidental discharges. So, for equality, I borrowed a Uberti SAA replica from Doc Brazos that has a very similar trigger and hammer to the Charles Daly (to be sure, NOT out of the box!). It felt quite the same when shooting, thereby making a level, and I believe safer, playing field as I shot the match (Duelist, by the way). First stage, the operator (that'd be your Nubbins) couldn't get a good feel for the pistols, and I missed once with each. Second stage, same thing. Third stage, I shot clean, and at what I consider my normal speed, and that Charles Daly was a dream, shooting to point of aim and flowing nicely. On the

fourth stage, I cleaned five shots with the Charles Daly but short stroked (or something) the Uberti and had to go around again to fire the last round. That's important because on the last stage I did the same thing to both pistols! That's operator error, because just a few minutes later Doc Brazos poured five shots, on the clock, out of that revolver in well under two seconds. My summary? The gun is a Cowboy Action ShootingTM shooter's dream gun, mid-range in price compared to the rest of the SAA replica market and sure to be popular with Cowboy Action Shooters.


FYI, all shooting all day was done with remanufactured ammunition from Lazy J, Granbury, Texas, in 215 grain and 160 grain, light Cowboy Action ShootingTM loads. It is my opinion these guns are not designed for today's heavy .45 Colt loads, like Corbon's sizzling 1150 fps combat ammo, and I would recommend such loads only for sturdier guns (think Rugers here, amigos, or Freedom Arms or John Linebaugh's guns as examples of platforms for such stout ammunition).

Okay, the Charles Daly Classic Single Action Revolver is a great Cowboy Action Shooting™ gun. How about some practical tests to eliminate any doubts? For that, it was off to the range (indoors) to give it a whirl. I started off using 25-yard bullseye pistol targets, but at a Cowboy Action ShootingTM distance of five yards. Using 215 grain, light Cowboy Action ShootingTM ammo, and shooting Duelist, four rounds went into the X-ring and a fifth was low and away to the left, but still in the 10-ring. Call it a flyer.

Next, using a two-hand hold, Weaver-style shooting stance, same distance, I strung five more in the 10ring, four being Xs but not as tight as before. Moving a similar target to seven yards, and shooting Duelist, the same point-of-aim result as the first target, but the second target, using two hands, resulted in all 10-ring hits but with considerable keyholing. I cannot explain that, but five more rounds of Duelist shooting took care of it because then the hole was simply one giant, ragged hole and satisfied my inquiry as to point-of-aim results with the 215-grain ammunition. I then switched to the 160-grain ammunition and returned to five yards, using similar targets. Interestingly, the results were reversed, with my Duelist-style shooting being scattered in the 10-ring, but my two-handed shooting blowing out the X-ring, and with no keyholing evident. There is no doubt this gun shoots to point of aim out-of-the-box.

But, because the denizens of the SASS Wire keep bringing this subject up, I decided to test the gun for combat. I always suggest that modern guns are best for concealed carry and self-defense, but can a SAA replica work for this? Well, what I did was really a modified test with respect to actual combat (okay, I admit it, it's easy), but it does demonstrate what a gun can do. I took the Texas concealed handgun test with the Charles Daly. The test consists of 50 rounds, 10 slow-fire at three yards, 10 rapid-fire at three yards, repeat the same at seven yards, for 40 rounds, and then 10 more rounds under the clock at twenty-five yards. But for fun, how about taking the whole test Duelist-style? Work for you? I thought so.

Trust me, after a couple of dozen bullseye rounds this gun was warmed up, and by the time I finished the CHL test it was, in a word, HOT! I showed no mercy, taking very little time even under slow-fire conditions and shooting as fast as I could rapid-fire. Remember the operator error I described at the beginning? NOT THIS TIME! Not a single hiccup, and I raced the gun so fast I could barely load it; it was so hot. Remember, at an average Cowboy Action ShootingTM match a pistol gets perhaps 30 rounds through it in a day, each five shots being separated stage by stage. What I did was fire one VERY long


stage. The Charles Daly, with no operator error, performed flawlessly. I cannot say enough good things about this gun.

Oh, my score? You had to ask, didn't you? A perfect score is 250, but when I get to 25 yards, well, your

Nubbins starts to have some problems seeing what he is doing. So when I was through, I had the target scored by one of the range masters so there would be no doubt. Will you take 249? Thought so. So will I, every time. 🙂 🗘





FUTURE COWBOY – CURLY NATHAN BROCIOUS

Allow me to introduce our future cowboy, Nathan Hulbert, the son of Ranger Clayton Conagher, SASS #43872, and Shawler Brook Rose, SASS #45799. We have not chosen a SASS alias for Nathan yet, but we call him Curly Nathan Brocius at SASS functions because of his curly blonde hair. 
To say this man is unknown and unheralded is an understatement. I can find no record of his exploits, be they many or few, in any of my books on Old West history, gunfighters, etc. I will search some more; perhaps I missed a book. However, the most thorough books I have on Old West gunfighters do not mention this man perhaps because the time frame is limited to the era of the Civil War to the turn of the century, basically the same time frame or "period" we use in SASS. Jonathan Davis' exploits or, really, his one important exploit, occurred in the late 1850s.

I discovered Jonathan Davis by watching "Wild West Tech" on the History Channel. I am sure many of you saw the story as well. It seems Jonathan Davis was a miner (I think in California, but I am uncertain, and I cannot find a verifiable reference or the text of the show) who was ambushed by about a dozen or so gang members who wanted to steal the gold he was carrying. He had two partners with him who were shot down instantly,

but he was not hit at all when the fusillade began. Davis drew two revolvers, each loaded with five rounds, and while taking painstaking aim, he hit seven of the gangsters, killing most of them. He then drew his Bowie knife when four more rushed him (why they didn't stay away from him and shot him the story didn't say, and I don't understand) and, as I recall the story, he killed all four with that knife! In any case, he totally won the fight, and that's how we know the story. If his partners lived, I do not recall, but it seems somewhat unlikely he could make this up when he had the bodies to prove it. A ballad apparently exists somewhere about the whole thing. Presuming the veracity of this story, perhaps Mr. Davis was a WARRIOR EXTRAORDINAIRE!

So, thus ends this very short story – if anyone can fill in the gaps, get me details, etc., I will be glad to expand upon this with the new information obtained. Gracias!

SASS SOUTH DAKOTA STATE CHAMPIONSHIP Summer Shoot '05




It was great to see so many





Their foreign guests from other countries in Europe - many of them SASS members - are banded together in their own local organizations and often travel great distances to attend large competitions of this sort.

Hungary, by the way, has just this year established Cowboy Action ShootingTM in that country and was already able to join the competition at the "Philippsburg Star" with seven representatives! No small feat for such a young organization having to travel well over 1500 miles and across two countries in order to join the fun!!

Cowboy Action ShootingTM in Germany is divided into several categories, the Shooters Handbook published by the "BDS" was written essentially according to the SASS Handbook, so there are no hang-ups among members from other countries in Europe or from abroad, as they all are familiar with the SASS Shooters Handbook and SASS rules.

There are, however, a few local modifications to be observed; one of them being it is not permitted to hold two loaded guns in hand at the same time - which prohibits Double Duelist!

Shooting got under way at nine o'clock sharp on Friday, August 12th, and soon the first clouds of blackpowder smoke were rolling across the shooting lanes. Blackpowder is a favorite among the most avid German shooters, and in some countries such as Denmark it is the only possible way to go, due to the fact all small arms in that country are limited to caliber .38/9mm if they use smokeless powders! The only way for cowboys in that country to enjoy Cowboy Action ShootingTM is to load and shoot their .44's and .45's with blackpowder!

After the first day of shooting and five stages successfully complet-

The 3rd Kentucky State Championship to be held in Hooten Holler was concluded on Father's Day with 160 shooters from 14 states and Canada enjoying a very challenging and oftentimes smoky match. unobtrusively back into town with crow feathers protruding from their teeth and the name "buttercup" tattooed on their behind.


An old-fashioned weenie roast was held on Friday evening, and the main match began on Saturday morning following the opening cere-

HELUVA RUKUS 2005

Ballston Spa, NY For weeks before the event, you heard the same question over and over -- "What kind of weather do you think we'll have for Heluva Rukus THIS year?" June in New York can bring anything from chilly temps to sweltering heat to torrential rain to well, actually nice summer weather. It's a challenge to prepare for on the part of both the host club AND the shooters, but the uncertainty never stops folks from signin' up and showin' up for the big event. In fact, this year the Circle K Regulators broke their own record by having a whopping 226 shooters from 18 different states descend on the small town of Ballston Spa in upstate NY to participate in their 5th Annual SASS New York State Championship, June 17-19, 2005. The Circle K Regulators were pleased to welcome a new match sponsor this year, Kirkpatrick Leather, and to have Tex, SASS #4, fly in from California to serve as the SASS representative - and an eager competitor - at the match.

Thursday was set-up day, and despite some rain that slowed things down a bit, by late afternoon things had fallen into place with all the stages/side matches set up, the big tent in place, and many of the vendors and campers already on site.

Friday was registration, door prize pickup, and side match day. Again, the forecast was "iffy," but the day actually turned out to be decent weather-wise, with nice temps and only a bit of rain later in the afternoon. By the end of the day, all but a handful of the registered shooters had picked up their shooters' packets. This year's door prizes ranged from bullets to ball gowns to blackpowder pistols, with plenty of gift certificates mixed in. Side matches were busy all day with folks having a chance to use virtually all their Cowboy Action Shooting $^{\text{TM}}$ firearms, including pocket pistol, derringer, .22 caliber rifle and pistol, long range rifles, and main stage guns.

Again this year, the mini-stage (utilizing all main stage firearms) was a big hit. When not throwing lead on the range, many of the shooters chose to throw their money at the vendors along sutlers' row. With merchandise ranging from cowboy clothing and accessories to western/Native American art, bullets, gun leather, firearms and even Navajo fry bread, folks had ample opportunity to part company with their hard-earned

cash. Following the side matches Friday evening, there was a delicious BBQ buffet under the tent. Umm, umm, good - those BBQ ribs were to die for! After dinner, 20 Territorial Governors, or their representatives, from various SASS clubs in NY, CT, MA, VT, and NH met with Tex to discuss such things as: (1) having a large multi-state New England shoot, (2) having TG meetings at all future State shoots, (3) setting criteria for blackpowder shooters, and (4) determining how best to handle "renegade clubs.'

Saturday's temperatures were quite comfortable, but unfortunately, there was a bit of "liquid sunshine" for the shooters to contend with off and on throughout much of the day. As always, six main stages were shot that day with a two-hour mid-day break to allow shooters time to check out the vendors and whet their appetite with some lunch from the cook shack. This year's scenarios were fun, challenging, and action-packed as always. All four firearms were used on every stage, and there was even an optional rifle reload bonus shot. Amongst other things, competitors found themselves fending off no-good cattle rustlers, turning a game of Texas Hold 'Em into a raucous gunfight, saving a trainload of silver from a

gang of Mexican banditos, robbing a small town bank, and keeping stagecoach passengers safe from a band of Comancheros. They got to be bad guys and good guys, to kick down a door, throw a box through a window, and turn over a card table. They got to shout such things as "Who goes there?" "This is a stickup!" and "You lousy cheats!" In other words, they got to play cowboy (or cowgirl) just like when they were kids – only with REAL guns and REAL bullets this time. And most importantly, they did it all safely.

When the shooting was done for the day, some of the competitors retired to their homes or local motels for a night of relaxation - or perhaps gun cleaning. But approximately 135 shooters and their guests changed into their "fancy duds" and joined in the Saturday evening festivities at the nearby Saratoga Knights of Columbus. After an hour of hors d'ouevres, drinks, and chit-chat in the bar, everyone found a spot in the main dining room where Premier Caterers served a sumptuous buffet, including a multitude of salads and side dishes, carving stations for both turkey and roast beef, and out-of-this-world cheesecake for dessert. Following dinner, side match awards

were presented and a three-piece band provided the folks with country/Western tunes and an opportunity kick up their heels. It quickly became obvious some people were meant to shoot, NOT square dance, but a good time was had by all.

Sunday was a perfect day for shooting - dry and sunny with spring-like temps. Another four fun-filled main stages were shot in the morning, followed by the ever-popular three-person team event in the early afternoon. Then finally it was time for the anxiously awaited awards ceremony. Sponsors and vendors were thanked for their support, followed by a special thanks to Circle K Regulators and KF&G club members for all their work on the event. Then stage winners, costume contest winners, clean shooters, team event winners, and category winners received their awards. And finally the SASS New York State Men's and Ladies' Champions, Yukon Mike and English Bev, were presented with their buckles and plagues. Yukon Mike also took the coveted Top Gun Award. And thus ended the best darn Cowboy Action ShootingTM event to ever hit the Northeast!





SASS TEXAS STATE BLACKPOWDER CHAMPIONSHIP

Driftwood, TX — The Tejas Caballeros love the smell of blackpowder in the morning. It smells like ... fun!

The sun had barely burned off the early morning mists when 57 shooters took to the eight stages in the scenic Hill Country of Central Texas and vied for the 2005 SASS Texas State Blackpowder Championship.

Texas in July is usually hot and July 30 was no exception. It was so hot the cows on the adjacent ranch were giving powdered milk, but shooters who embrace the dark side weren't about to let a little sweat get in the way of a good time.

One way to beat the heat, club officers figured, was to get started early, so shooters were dragging their gun carts away at 7:30 a.m.

Before they broke up into posses for the day, the Tejas Caballeros

President—appropriately named Texas Heat, SASS #48606, extolled the shooters on the virtues of shade and drinking lots of water.

Shade was in abundance thanks to Mother Nature and the club officers and many volunteers. Over the past year, stages were moved or modified to either create shade or put them in the shade. Only one stage remains in direct sunlight, but two large canopies were erected for the match for anyone not actually shooting or timing to stand under. Several stages also had their own water jugs and cups.

Range Officer Nada Chance, SASS #29547, performed yeoman service throughout the championship shoot by compiling scores at the end of each stage, then hopping onboard his trusty mini-steed to distribute cool, clear bottled water among the posses.

Kissme Kady, SASS #19133, rode up from Corpus Christi to stand by on EMT duty. Luckily, she was lonesome all day.

The morning air was so still and humid shooters got a good workout by having to duck and dodge around their own smoke with each shot just to see the targets.

All except for Spur Roberts, SASS #14625, that is, whose shooting glasses must have been a pair of those X-ray goggles that used to be for sale in the backs of comic books. He stood his ground and shot like he knew where the targets were. Apparently he did, because he finished as the top shooter for the day—a true champion.

Spur was one of several invaders from north and northeast Texas who won most of the top spots. In fact, Posse Five was the place to be as nine of the top 10 shooters were gathered there. Only Kettleman, SASS #27254, broke the Posse Five stranglehold, finishing ninth overall, but just out of the trophies for his category.

Little Star, SASS #53411, proved the fruit doesn't fall far from the tree. Spur's daughter was the top Junior shooter for the day. The 13-year-old has been shooting since she was five, but just became a soot lady the previous weekend.

Stages offered shooters a wide variety, from shooting in the saddle atop a trusty steed at the corral to shooting from behind bars at the jail, trying to pick out targets from among the shrubs and trees and billowing smoke.

The Tejas Caballeros are known in Texas for their challenging stages. One, for example, has a rifle swinger and another a pistol swinger, and a couple targets are on springs or move up and down as they are hit.

But Spur had little trouble handling them all, cleaning the match as well as winning it. No one else had a clean match.



SUCCESS THROUGH COOPERATION

In late January 2005 seven New Hampshire clubs held their annual summit meeting to discuss changes to the SASS rules made at the Las Vegas Convention. Additional topics included updates from each club, encouraging clubs to offer all SASS shooting categories at their events, scheduling of shoot dates to prevent conflicts, the need for RO-I and RO-II courses, and how to better promote the sport of Cowboy Action

ShootingTM in New England. The last topic generated a great deal of discussion. To date, only three of the six New England States were participating in the SASS State Championship program. Maine, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts all had matches in place, so the discussion turned to how could we help get the

remaining three states of Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Vermont involved. We decided to request a meeting of all 22 New England Cowboy Action ShootingTM Clubs. We contacted Barrister Bill of the Nashoba Valley Regulators in Harvard, Massachusetts and asked if they would be interested in hosting a New England Cowboy Action ShootingTM Summit Meeting to discuss items of interest to Cowboy Action Shooters. Their club is a good central location for New England members. They were very excited about the concept and agreed to host the event. An agenda of discussion items was drawn up and clubs were invited to participate.

On March 19, 2005, thirty-six representatives from seventeen Cowboy Action ShootingTM clubs throughout New England met at the home of the Nashoba Valley Regulators in Harvard, MA. Agenda topics for discussion included the possibility of having a single New England Championship shoot to crown the winners from all six states, or having host clubs invite neighboring states to participate in multi-state championship events. What resulted was a compromise that would allow us to ultimately achieve both goals. Maine, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts would continue to run their established state championships, but invite neighboring states to partici-

pate in a combined format. And, we would try to make it happen this year! In addition to the multi-state championship format, we also agreed to pursue a New England Championship event in 2006, and work out the details during the remainder of the year by having meetings of the Territorial Governors during each of the state events much like the format used by SASS at the Regional and above matches.

The result so far has been nothing short of phenomenal. In July, the Pemi Valley Peacemakers hosted a combined New Hampshire and Vermont "twin" States Championship crowning the top male and female from both states. Later that same month, the Nashoba Valley Regulators hosted the combined Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island "combined" State Championship. In September, the Hurricane Valley Rangers will host the SASS Maine State

So, keep my idea in mind when your club needs to build props and is in need of money. 🌲







ay 21, 2005 was the beginning of a new Lera with the Texas Peacemakers. The first Texas Plainsman match was held. The match consisted of only two categories - Blackpowder and Smokeless. We shot five of our beautiful stages with the big bore rifles, taking the place of the pistol caliber lever action rifles. The rifle targets were set at 70 to 110 yards with the pistol and shotgun at the regular distance. Any SASS legal revolver and shotgun could be used. Any SASS legal rifle single-shot or lever action, .375 cal. or larger could be used except the shooter had to load the lever gun single shot style. As always, the ammo for all the guns had to be plain lead base bullets.

We had fifteen brave souls try their hands at this new style of throwing lead. There was so much fun had that after the end of the shoot I don't think anyone left 'till the awards were presented. There were high-walls, falling blocks, trapdoors, and a few lever actions used in the mix. Four rifle rounds, 10 pistol rounds, and anywhere from 2 to 6 shotgun shells were shot per stage. "For good or bad, it was kinda my idea," says Chili, SASS #11183, the engineer of the Texas Plainsman match. When

asked what was on his mind when he thought up the idea he stated, "I have long range rifles, and I like to shoot them. There are many other people who have long-range rifles, the .45-70s, .38-55s, and so forth. They stay in the closet or the gun safes, and this is the chance to come out here and shoot them some." Chili also stated he wanted to use SASS legal guns, but in the SASS Plainsman match, it is cap 'n ball revolvers. But we are shooting 1874 Sharps and rolling blocks that are out of the cap 'n ball era, and not everyone has cap 'n ball pistols. A large round of applause is definitely in order for Mr. Chili.

The Texas Plainsman Match will be held the 3rd Saturday of each month. The only exception is when there is a 5th Saturday in a month. That is when we hold the Blackpowder only Cowboy Action match. If you are in the area and feel like shooting with us, come on by and welcome
