

"DAYS OF TRUTH" 2007 – MAZZANO, ITALY 17 Countries Come Together for Cowboy Friendship August 21–25

azzano, Italy – After days of deluge, the clouds parted for opening day at the Fourth Annual European Cowboy Action Shooting[™] Championship. The site bloomed fresh and green from the rain, and a bright Italian sky shined overhead. Mazzano is a small town a few kilometers from Brescia and Gardone Val Trompia where many of the Italian gun manufacturers such as Pedersole, Chiappa, Beretta, Uberti, and Pietta are located.

General Grant and I arrived Monday, August 20th in Milano and drove through a pounding storm with thunder, lightning, and torrents of rain to our hotel midway to Brescia. Tuesday we went to Mazzano and checked out the location. The rain had stopped, and spirits were high with arriving shooters. We greeted familiar faces from America, Italy, and those we recognized from the European Championship Shoot two years ago in Prague, the Czech Republic.

Immediately we could see Alchimista, SASS #42531, of Pietta Arms and Master Rino, SASS #5745,

of Chiappa Arms had done a magnificent job. We were dazzled with the smooth-running operation of the event, particularly impressed with the substantial construction of the main tent, complete with a great lighting system, a superior sound system with a Disc Jockey, and a firm plank floor(!). Every detail was carefully thought out and executed even to a ladies' changing tent! The latter was probably the inspiration of Flying Sue, SASS #73457, wife of Master Rino. She was everywhere, overseeing everything. Master sponsors of the event were: SASS, SASS Italia, Chiappa Firearms, F.LLI Pietta, Emporio Del West, Air-Sea Service, Armi Diana, and RegioneLombardia Sport.

Wednesday evening Alchimista officiated at the opening ceremonies, telling us 16 countries were participating: Italy, USA, Austria, Czech Republic, Croatia, Denmark, England, Finland, Hungary, Luxemburg, Netherlands, Poland, Serbia, Slovakia, Switzerland, and, numbering one-third of the total shooters, Germany. Two hundred and two

shooters in all were signed up.

American shooters who participated were: El Rod SASS #8849L, and Toni Two Bits, SASS #20649L, from Nevada; Elder Kate, SASS #5707, Nellie Belle, SASS #24695, and Mud-Flat Mike, SASS #20904, all from Washington State, who had first flown to Norway to take part in "Norsemen Trail" before coming to Italy; and Long Hunter, SASS #20389, from Texas who did not shoot, but was there to give lessons on shooting.

The highlight of the opening ceremonies had a representative of each nation present marching down the center aisle, proudly bearing the flag of his or her nation as it was announced, to the refrain of the national anthem of that nation. Because of his skills in the German language, Arizona Tom, SASS #30872, took over the Master of Ceremonies duties, he in English and German. Alchimista spoke in Italian, and Kodiak Al, SASS #52355L, spoke in French.

General U.S. Grant, SASS #2, came to the podium and spoke of the great importance and appreciation of the Regulators for this shoot, followed by translation in Italian by yours truly. He then presented Regulator badges to Big Fritz, SASS #1642L; Marshall Steven Gardiner, SASS #64522; Alameda Slim, SASS *(Continued on page 72)*

ell, I did something stupid the other day. The Judge and I were on our way to Guns of August in Ohio and while going through security, a loaded magazine was found in my purse. With as much as The Judge and I travel, I guess something like that was bound to happen, although I have always thought of myself as a careful, security conscious person, especially as a gun owner. So why did I have a loaded magazine in my purse and forget to remove it before I went to the airport?

Rewind to the middle of July when The Judge and I went to Founder's Ranch for a Wild Bunch meeting. Any time we travel, we are heeled. Both of us have concealed carry licenses that cover quite a few states, and we feel it is our Constitutional Right. The Judge and I are "gun poor" and have many personal protection firearms from which to choose. For our trip to New Mexico, I chose to carry a Walther PPK .380 for two reasons: 1) it easily fits in my purse, and 2) it had (notice past tense) a spare magazine.

The Judge and I had been very busy traveling to matches and taking care of business. It was a whirlwind of activity between trips, doing things around the house that I don't have time to do when school is in session. And since I always go heeled, except on school property, the .380 was still in my purse when we prepared to head out to Ohio. Yes, I removed the firearm. I just didn't remember the spare loaded magazine was still in my purse ... at the very bottom ... covered up with all kinds of stuff women carry in their purses!

I did the usual "take off my shoes, put Cowboy hats and carpet bag in trays, and push 'em through" thing. There was no problem with the metal detection booth, and I wasn't chosen for the "explosive residue" booth. As I collected my shoes and hats, I noticed my carpet bag carry-

on was being re-screened, and I just thought I had probably left a lighter in the bottom of my purse, so when the TSA agent asked for the owner of the carpet bag, I simply raised my hand. The look on the agent's face told me it wasn't just a lighter they were concerned about.

Immediately, I began thinking of what could be in my bag that was causing such a stir. At that point, I remembered the spare magazine I had taken to New Mexico and asked incredulously, "Did I leave a loaded magazine in my purse?" Again, the look on his face told me all I needed to know. A TSA supervisor and Houston Police Department Officer were called. Other agents were gawking at me. Passengers were staring at me ... and I just wanted to melt into a greasy puddle on the floor!

The TSA supervisor was very calm, cool, and collected unlike the rattled, incriminating agent that found the magazine. Mounds of paperwork followed, as well as a "visit" with the HPD officer, who was very nonplused. Knowing I had done something really stupid and trying to make the best of the situation, I took the opportunity to tell the agents and officer about SASS and Cowboy Action Shooting[™] ... even passing out trading cards!!

After familiarizing them with our sport and hoping that would explain why I had the magazine, the agent who found the gun commented, "Well, this clip isn't for a Cowboy gun." I smiled nicely and said in my best schoolteacher voice, "Yes, I know. It's for my personal protection firearm. I always go heeled and have concealed carry licenses for 32 states." I wanted to tartly reply that Cowboy guns don't have magazines ... Duh!! ... but figured that wouldn't "make friends or influence people," so I held my tongue.

When I asked what would happen next regarding my "brain fade," the TSA people were extremely vague. Finally, the HPD officer told me it would be a civil matter, and I would be contacted by letter from the TSA and there would be a fine since "violations can result in civil penalties of up to \$10,000 per violation." I almost swallowed my teeth and could see the next .38 Ruger Blackhawk Three-screw that I wanted to add to my collection going right down the drain! The Judge, to his credit, sat quietly by and let me handle the conundrum in which I had gotten myself.

After a fantastic time at Guns of August, The Judge and I headed to the airport for our flight back to Houston. At security, I was prepared to "be on a list" and be pulled aside for extra scrutiny. Fortunately, I breezed through with no undue attention. Whew!!

Fast forward now to September when I received a letter from the Department of Homeland Security. That's about the right length of time it takes the government to do anything ... six weeks. The letter included a list of permitted and prohibited items one "can and cannot have on board an aircraft or in the sterile area of an airport." Fortunately, the TSA "determined that this Warning Notice adequately addresses this incident."

The Judge and I even more vigilant now to make certain there isn't a magazine, ammunition, or casings in our luggage, and to wash our hands so there is no gunpowder residue on them. We don't fly with our Cowboy guns anymore since "9/11" when all the rules changed. It was a rude awakening the first time we took our firearms to the airport after 9/11, since we had always been able to put three long guns and four six-shooters in one gun case and count that as one of our four pieces of baggage. Not anymore!! We find it easier (read that ... much less hassle) to send our guns and accoutrements with someone going to our next match.

As gun owners, we have the right to carry; however, we must be ever mindful of where and when we can lawfully carry. Ladies ... check your purses before going to the airport! .







The SASS/Cowboy Action world in not flat, and trust me, shoots are a blast everywhere I travel. But, that could be the result of my positive mindset as well. A lot of what the TG's are asked to work on is to make things more consistent at LARGE annual shoots around the whole world.

Here is what is driving me. At the tender age of 49, I was left with no more parents or grandparents. I miss the mature mentoring that has been lost; however, I have filled that loss with SASS folks that I meet and greet at shoots. With me being the mature one in the family *(Continued on next page)*



every Private, every Sergeant, and every Lieutenant throughout our nation's heroic history.

I came to know soldiers as some of the most special people the good Lord ever created and placed on this earth. As Christ himself said, no man has a greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. To me and my chosen career, He was talking about our soldiers because when soldiers lay down their lives, it's not politically motivated. I know of not one soldier that did what they did with some political slogan in mind when the bullets were actually coming their way.

Fast forward to April 1999—I joined SASS. Why did I join? My heroes had always been soldiers and cowboys—what more need I say? Did I expect to find more than shooting acquaintances dressed in cowboy garb? Not really.


"Come on," I said, "let's do something different today."

His son, Todd, came riding in as if he and the horse were but one animal. These were all things that actually existed in western towns, and we're trying to bring back the glory days of Wild West roadside parks."

I was glad I had never been there before because the experience I was having was good and the family was happy. It was as it should be without any weird things I'm sure my kids will all be exposed to eventually, but I always figure it's my job to give them the wholesome things. clothes in one of the tubs, which were filled with a mixture of gasoline, creosote, and formaldehyde. Then the inmates had to step inside the other tub filled with "a bucket of gasoline, a bucket of coal oil, and a bucket of vinegar."

The fateful Monday afternoon, city jailer Frank Scotten, some jail trustees, and a health department doctor, who was assisting, had prepared the two large washtubs. Those in charge were aware of the dangers involved with the use of gasoline and the vapors it omits, so some of the barred windows and doors had been opened for ventilation.

As the procedure was in progress, the doors to the lower tier of cells had been opened and the prisoners were being run through the bathing process, one at a time. As each man (Continued on page 39)



It was part of El Paso Mayor Tom Lea's citywide disinfection campaign. This procedure was to kill body lice on jail inmates. Body lice had been determined to cause typhus.

A group of prisoners, most of them of Mexican origin, were ordered to strip naked. They were first to soak their



(Continued from previous page) when touring the palace and seeing beautiful furniture that seems a bit shoddy and worn at the edges, you are absolutely correct, that fabric looks worn and a bit faded because it is more than 200 years old and was actually handled by the king and his queen, Marie Antoinette ... absolutelv amazing!!

The shooting ranges are very busy all week because the men and women who are active members of "Tir Nationale de Versailles" are free to enter and use the facilities at any time they choose to do so - from early in the morning (we heard the first shots ring out just past seven o'clock in the morning) until late in the evening with patrons coming and going - and shooting - until eight or nine p.m!

But on the last weekend in September, traditionally everybody clears all their personal things away, and one and all pitch in to get the "show on the road!" This show, of course, being the "PARIS Western Show!" Shooters, dealers, vendors, and spectators all flock to tour the halls and visit the stands set up in the aisles and on the grounds surrounding the range to see the sights and to take a look at the many items for sale. Everybody interested in doing business with either shooters or organizers of shooting events as well as supplying spectators with everything they might

need or take a fancy to were present at the "Tir Nationale de Versailles" as the Paris Western Show got underway on Friday.

SASS and other European Cowboy Action Shooting[™] organizations presented our favourite sport here last year and enjoyed a great response. This year our hopes were up for a bigger turnout – and we were not disappointed! In fact, we had to place a number of last minute calls to our friends in Italy and ask them to help out with a set of targets and to give us assistance with organizing the demonstration matches for the French public! We had such throngs of visitors and shooters on our Cowboy Action ShootingTM ranges we could not handle it on our own - we needed every hand those great SASS Italy guys and gals could give us!

Headed by their TG, Alchimista, SASS Regulator #41531, who designed two stages to show the crowds just what Cowboy Action ShootingTM is all about, this wonderful bunch of cowboys then proceeded to shoot the stages and demonstrate the fun and the fascination that enchants spectators everywhere when they see this sport performed. We had prominent onlookers with SASS badges as well. I was proud to shake the hands of Trusty Phil, SASS #28720, Rick the Moderator, SASS #28733, El Gamberro, SASS #71011, and Old Rebel, SASS

#73904, who showed up with Lucky Maurice, SASS #73640.

Pretty soon more and more of the onlookers wanted to come over and actually see and handle the guns that "won the west" - and the hearts of the bystanders and shooters here in Versailles as well! We always prepare for this phenomenon and keep a good supply of ammunition on hand in order to let everyone who wants to actually fire a few rounds do so with any gun he or she fancies. Our RO's stood by constantly for the entire duration of the Paris Western Show and were always available to assist those who wanted to handle or shoot a gun and to answer the many questions (in several languages!) that are constantly asked on such occasions.

During these two days, we gave away 1200 rounds of ammunition from our own supplies that were fired from our guns by interested spectators and guests!

This year we had another "first." A troop of Civil War re-enactors from the UK came all the way from England in several cars and buses to join in the fun and show the French public how things might have looked back in 1864-65 during that bloody war. There were well over 100 persons participating in these forays, and they even brought along their cannon in an extra truck! They sure put those big guns through their paces – hauling them over the mock battlefield and shooting them off time after time amid huge clouds of billowing white smoke. The managers of the Paris Western Show had thoughtfully provided these gunners with more than 100 pounds of blackpowder for the occasion, and those gunners burned up every bit of it!

The whole show certainly turned out to be a big success and the newly founded "Cowboy Action ShootingTM France" organization managed to double its membership during these two days. Cowboy Action ShootingTM France now has just over 300 members registered in its ranks. We will be travelling there in the next few months to help them organize according to SASS standards, and will be pushing for more SASS members in those ranks of new members!

RO-I and RO-II classes will be scheduled there as well, as soon as we can get space rented on appropriate shooting ranges across the country. In the meantime, SASS Italy has generously offered to accept Cowboy Action ShootingTM competitors from France to their classes in Italy so we can get as many cowboys shooting "SASS style" as soon as possible!

Cowboys across Europe and in the USA, put a mark on your calendar for the last weekend in September of 2008. There will be an international Cowboy Action ShootingTM (SASS) match at the PARIS WESTERN SHOW 2008 in Versailles!

Be there! I certainly will!



PARDS, RIDE FOR THE BRAND - AND WHAT I'VE LEARNED FROM SASS

"m confused. Are we capable of I committing to one another without caveats? Who are we? What do we identify with? Money, status, nation, religion, ethnicity, political party? Do we speak our minds with a voice of personal conviction? Are we looking out for ourselves or others? To me, cowboys summed it all up in the phrase, "Ride for the brand." The first time I heard the phrase "ride for the brand" was from my SASS mentor, Hill Beachy. He told me it meant when you worked for a man you were no longer an individual but a part of the larger group, whether it was a posse or a bunch of drovers. The "brand" is that common unifying mark, sometimes physical and possibly a set of ideals or morals we believe in and are manifested in your actions. It goes beyond what

nationality, religion, or what your station in life is. Riding for a brand can be a conscious decision or a series of experiences in life that lead you to act a certain way. And it determines whom you choose to call your "pards."

So why does it mean so much to me now? I've read the comments made by Colonel Dan in The Combog Chronicle and on the Wire about patriotism and the "cowboy way." Those words struck a chord in me that made me think of all the "pards" out there that follow the brand of "patriotism and the cowboy way" and never get any recognition. For over 28 years I've followed the flag of my nation. I've been awarded by my nation with pieces of ribbon for my actions that would have been impossible without the men who rode with me. Every one of those Soldiers knew they could count on the Soldier to their left and right. Why? Because we all understood we were responsible for each other. Isn't that the meaning of being a "pard?"

THE PEOPLE OF SASS KEEP ME COMING BACK

Trose from my slumber in a camper at the Middletown Sportsman's Club, the morning of August 4th. It was the monthly match of the Big Iron Rangers, and, combined with the Miami Valley Cowboys of Piqua, Ohio holding their monthly shoot the next day, would equal a great warm up for the Guns of August! After a pot of coffee, my pard, Rio Loco, and I decided to head into town for a quick breakfast. Upon our return to Middletown Sportsman's Club, I made a shocking discovery. Now I am a bit embarrassed as to the circumstances surrounding this, so I will not elaborate. But this brings me to the point of this little



He produced a brand new Ol' Short Tom rig he was not ready to use. Even though I was shootin' Rodeo's and these were fitted for Rugers, I took Duece up on this generous offer.

Now I have never shot any of the pistol disciplines like IDPA, but have heard the stories. I believe if this cowboy game of ours were like them, I would have been packing up and heading home because nobody would have offered me equipment to use. However, we cowboys stick together! While we can play this game as competitively as we want, the bottom line is we are cowboys and friends above the competition! If this were not enough of an example of cowboys taking care of our own, listen to what came next.

After the day of shooting was done, Ol' Short Tom made a call to Dan Parmenter, owner of Murphy Custom Gun Leather. Dan was not in, but he left a message for him and asked that he do all he could to take care of me. Ol' Short then told me to go ahead and email Dan when I got home that evening. So, at home, I fired off an email telling him the custom details of the rig that I HAD. That was about 6 pm on the 4th of August. sit here in the stands of the Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum in Fort Worth, Texas on Day 102 of the 2007 Extreme Mustang Makeover. My eyes are full of tears and my heart is heavy with the fact my friend has had his horse wrenched from his life by a higher bidder. It began as a simple suggestion and nearly led to an emotional disaster for a horse trainer, his family, and his friends. The idea - train a wild American Mustang for the Federal Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the Mustang Heritage Foundation in the 2007 Extreme Mustang Makeover.

The journey began early this year. A client of Ray Ariss of StarBrite Riding Academy in Norco, CA had the idea to enter Ray in the Mustang Heritage Foundation 2007 Extreme Mustang Makeover. In May, the Mustang Heritage Foundation selected Ray as one of a group of one hundred trainers, from a pool of two hundred twenty applicants. Each was given one of one hundred wild mustangs and one hundred days to demonstrate their ability to train the true American horse.

Each horse was fresh off the range. They were rounded up by the BLM in an effort to prevent over grazing of the public rangelands by burgeoning herds as part of the federal government's wild horse and burro adoption program. After capture, the horses were handled only to the extent of being gelded, given a medical exam, and receiving vaccinations, before being presented to each of the one hundred applicants chosen to participate in the Extreme Mustang Makeover.

Driving through thundering hailstorms enroute to Fallon, Nevada, one of two designated pickup points (the other near Oklahoma City, Ok) yielded the name of Ray's prospective partner in this adventure, "Hail Yeah." After a raucous introduction and return trip home to Norco, Ray spent many hours just sitting in the pen with Hail Yeah establishing a bond with his new partner. Ray soon came to respect the capability and quiet acceptance of this wonderful horse. Hail Yeah expressively showed his Spanish bloodlines, the origin of the American Mustang, with his movement and quiet mind.

Within a few days, Ray had Hail Yeah working in hand and within a few weeks he was working under saddle. Hail Yeah willingly accepted his introduction to the numerous sensory challenges Ray proposed to him. The trainers were not told the exact details of the tests they would be facing during the competition. That would not happen until shortly before the competition began. Ray wanted Hail Yeah to have an easy time dealing with whatever chal-*(Continued on page 44)*

Forewarned & Forearmed

MARCH 11, 1884

Fresh off the train from Austin, Texas, drinking pals—and gunfighters—Ben Thompson and John King Fisher take in the sights of San Antonio.

At around 10 p.m., they stop at the Vaudeville Theatre, where two years earlier, Thompson had gunned down owner Jack Harris.

The pair head upstairs for more drinks and to watch the entertainment. Saloon co-owners Billy Simms and Joe Foster approach—and this is where the story gets murky.

The official version is that Thompson and Foster get into an argument. Fisher, trying to cool things off, suggests the four head downstairs to the bar. As they reach the door to the stairs, Thompson turns to shake Foster's hand, but the saloon proprietor refuses.

Thompson pulls a revolver and pistol whips Foster in the mouth. Special policeman Jacob Coy grabs for the gun—and all hells breaks loose.

Up to 20 shots are fired. Fisher and Thompson are hit multiple times and die on the spot. Foster is shot in the leg and expires 11 days later.

Then there's the other account: given by some eyewitnesses and supported by autopsies performed on the dead men.

In this version, Thompson twice offers to shake hands with Foster, and twice Foster refuses. Suddenly, the saloon owners and Coy step away. Thompson and Fisher jump up—and are hit by a volley of bullets fired from Winchesters behind a curtain above and behind them.

Coy and Simms put a few more shots into the dying men for good measure. Foster accidentally shoots himself in the leg as he tries to pull his pistol.

Either way, two of the fastest guns in the West are dead. They never had a chance. A

finished, he would be returned to the "runaround" or open exercise area in front of the cells and dry off in the air. The first group of prisoners had almost completed the process when it happened. By that time, vapors had built up, even with the open windows, and someone struck a match. There was a flash as the vapors ignited, an explosion, and then the fire.

After the fire began, there were still approximately 6 or 8 prisoners locked in cells in the upper tier of the jail, and these men could not get out until the fire department arrived and extinguished the blaze.

Several doors had to be broken down with axes and pry bars by firemen since there was utter confusion after the explosion, and the keys couldn't be located.

Some prisoners escaped. One was seen running almost nude and with his clothes still on fire. He ran down Stanton Street toward the Rio Grande River, jumped into the water, and escaped into Mexico. Another man was found on fire in the alley behind the jail. Passing citizens were trying to beat out the flames with their hats, but instead of beating them out they were fanning the flames, making things worse for the poor individual on fire. Firemen told of having to step over bodies near the doorway as they made their way into the inferno to fight the flames.

More help arrived and started removing the injured, burned, but still alive victims from inside the building after the fire had been brought under control. Victims were treated with first-aid supplies that were on hand at the jail. Twenty-five pounds of bandages were used, 200 yards of gauze and a large quality of ointment. Private cars were commandeered on the streets around the jail, and victims began to be transported to Hotel Dieu, Providence, and County hospital. There were 16 bodies at the scene that were transported to local mortuaries. In the ensuring days, six more prisoners would succumb to their injuries and be added to the death toll. Some accounts placed the final death toll at 22 and other accounts, 25.

For many days after the fire, charges and counter charges were made in an effort to fix responsibility for the catastrophe. A special grand jury was called by Wednesday and much testimony was heard. No criminal negligence was ever found and no indictments were ever returned. Apparently no one could be found willing to fix the blame on the city for the death of 19 Mexicans, a few white transients, and a "negro."

Pancho Villa was on his way to Columbus, New Mexico when, according to the account of an American hostage, he heard about the El Paso jail fire. Villa continually reminded his men of the burning of the El Paso jail in which some of Villa's Mexican friends had lost their lives. He accused the Americans of deliberately starting fire.

Villa had reason to believe this. In the preceding weeks, scores of Mexicans had been murdered by the Texas Rangers along the Rio Grande Valley. Pancho Villa promised his troops he was going to show Anglos how it feels to burn. He threatened to "make torches" of every American he found.

Four days after the El Paso jail fire, Villa's troop attacked Columbus, New Mexico, torched its main buildings, and killed 17 Americans.





travel to other matches. It is important for shooters to travel because without travel it is difficult to keep the continuity, and without travel it is difficult to see things differently.

At some point every shooter should travel to a big match. Many people prefer to stay at home in their comfort zone, and many do not have funds for lots of travel. However, if you don't go to a big match you are missing one of the greatest times you will ever have. Nothing is better than traveling to a big match and experiencing all the activities involved. The stages, the entertainment, the food, and the company are all things that are different at a big match. Even if it is only once, it will be the once in a lifetime experience you are looking for.

If you are a match director, stage designer, or if you are thinking of putting together a match of your own, it is a must to visit at least one other big match. By doing this, you have an idea of the standard of stage design, such as target size, distance, and scenario style. This doesn't mean you have to copy their stages. It just means you have an idea of how to set them up so they are similar to the standards people are accustomed to.

Also, not only will you have an idea of how to set up the stages, you will also have ideas for all the details match officials are concerned about, such as porta-potty placement, vendor placement, and By Holy Terror, SASS #15362

scheduling issues. You don't need to reinvent the wheel—instead borrow some designs from others.

If you are a competitor, traveling to matches helps keep your interest up. If your home club does the same four stages every month, then you are going to become burned out. By going to other matches, you can set new goals, you have plans to look forward to, and you might even bring home some ideas to help out your home club.

The next reason all shooters need to travel is to keep the differences alive in Cowboy Action ShootingTM. When you travel you experience the changes that occur between big and small matches, as well as the differences between regions.

Big matches and small matches have many differences. The feelings are different. The types of stages are different. The atmosphere is different. The list is endless. If you have never been to a big match of 350 or more competitors, you are missing out. Big matches are great just because they are so There are many vendors, big. entertainment, and people. There is no better place to meet new people, try new food, or experience new things. Usually the stages are different, too.

At a big match, the stages have to be more streamlined because there are so many people shooting them. Stages can't be too long, or have too much extraneous activity, because if they did, no one would finish. Small matches, on the other hand, have the ability to create really fun and different things. They can explore shooting challenges and entertaining scenarios that may run longer.

Not only are there differences between big and small matches, but there are also differences between the regions around the country. For instance, Mule Camp in Georgia is famous for having large targets at close distances. They were the originators in that department. Bordertown in Arizona borrowed the idea for close targets, and has set records for how close its targets have been. In the northeast at The Great Nor'ester this year I noticed a greater amount of movement in the stages than its western counterparts, and at Hell on Wheels in Wyoming, I believe they invented the short stage match on Thursday.

Every match I have ever attended has had something that made it special, whether it is bonuses, targets, stages, or just entertainment. They were all special for one reason or another. If you don't travel to various matches, you won't experience all of these very different and special attributes. And, if you are a match director you will want to experience all of these special things so you can get ideas on how to make your match special.



PERIOD CORRECT KNIFE LEATHER


While it was considered okay even during the mid 1800's to tuck a bare blade under a belt or sash, most folks preferred it be the other feller rather than themselves leakin' red stuff. Even back then everybody knew knives are always loaded, so if you considered yourself a tad anemic or maybe a might squeamish at the sight of your own blood, you considered some form of covering for a sticker a necessity. Today, there's a lot more hoopty-do made about guns than knives, and that's sort of fair seein' as how we're the Single Action Shooting Society rather than the Single Action Slicing Society. Still an' all though, a nice knife in a good-looking sheath goes a long way to making a cowboy or cowgirl outfit look like you're playin' hard and portraying the era well. So, what makes for a period-correct knife sheath? Like gun leather, there are infinite choices for period correct knife leather. There were some trends because civilized society and manufacturers guarantee such, but there were also a glorious assortment of frontier and native traditions and creative inventiveness that entered into play.

If your knife came from a civilized part of the world or had any expense attached to it, chances were very good it would come sup-

plied with a sheath. The majority of these would be elegantly made of formed and soldered metals (silver, German silver, etc.) or of formed leather or leather-covered wood. These latter sheaths would be (Continued on next page)

equipped with metal reinforcements at the throat and tip.

Whether solid metal or part, these sheaths would have no way to attach to a belt. They were worn tucked under a sash or belt at a convenient angle. In time, many cutlers fitted the throats with a small finial or knob, while others yet added an elongated hook made of the same material as the throat. These assisted in keeping the scabbard or sheath from sliding out of position and becoming lost. If the knife and sheath were particularly slender, these additions allowed for the knife to be readily carried in the boot as well as on the belt.

Both finials and hooks also

allowed the sheath to be equipped with a "frog" (fancy word for belt loop). In this case, the frog was a leather loop designed with a buttonhole to receive the sheath's finial or hook and a secondary loop behind for use as a belt loop. This arrangement allowed the knife to ride slightly lower on the body than it would if just under the belt, and would also have allowed for a greater range of movement and comfort for the wearer. It also made easier access to a strong side draw and was generally a more stable and secure method to carry a knife.

Yet another way to deal with a metal sheath was to envelope it entirely in a protective leather sheath equipped with a belt loop. Many folks, however, didn't have the means to purchase such knives and sheaths. There's also the simple fact fancy sheaths got lost or banged up beyond usefulness. When that happened, the fancy or well to do did what the less fancy and poor did, they relied on allleather sheaths.

Many leather sheaths were made in the same manner as their more expensive cousins. The leather was wrapped around a blade-shaped form and stitched down the back in the center. There was generally no metal, except possibly a rivet or two to secure a belt loop. Belt loops were not necessarily standard, although many of these sheaths did have them because it made carrying a knife easier. It was also easy to stitch the top of a solid leather sheath into your boot should you decide to carry it there.


Other period correct sheaths were made by forming leather over the blade, and then stitching it down all around to a backing piece. In later years on the frontier, some of the sheaths made this way got quite fancy and even had bits of leather at the throat or tip to imitate the metal at the throats and tips of fancier sheaths. Many were equally sleek in profile. Others yet just went hog wild and added loops and skirts or fenders around the knife pouch to echo the appearance

of the Mexican loop holsters popular at the time.

Knife sheaths were influenced by the red man as much as the white. The sheaths carried by Native Americans in the frontier era of the West were more complex than many realize, with variations according to tribal custom, availability of animal parts (porcupine quills, scalp locks, etc), trade goods such as beads, tin cones, tacks, bells, and personal taste. There were also many, many ways to attach a nativemade sheath to the belt. Formal belt loops were used as well as toggles tucked beneath a belt, long leather (Continued on page 49)

lenges were placed in his path. Excitement rose in the City of Norco, also known as Horsetown USA. People would stop by the ranch to see how things were going. You could not go into a store anywhere in town without hearing someone talking about "Ray and the Mustang." On day seventy-five, Hail Yeah was introduced to Cowboy Mounted Shooting. On day eightytwo, Hail Yeah competed in his first Mounted Shooting competition, in his first covered arena, in his first public appearance. A lot of challenging firsts for a wild Mustang from the Palomino Valley Nevada herd. Ray and Hail Yeah met those firsts with calm and grace, and even set the winning time for one of the stages of the competition. Lots of folks from the city were there. The mayor came out to cheer Ray and Hail Yeah in their efforts.

On day ninety-five Ray and Hail Yeah left for Texas accompanied by Ray's wife, Pippa, and his six children. On the road to Fort Worth, Ray would spend the early part of the day traveling and the evenings working with Hail Yeah. Training and preparation would continue all the way to the competition arena.

Day one hundred and one was at hand. The one hundred days of

training were over and now it was time to show what had been accomplished. The competition consisted of three preliminary rounds. The ten horses with the highest combined scores from the three preliminary rounds would compete in a freestyle exhibition to determine the overall winner. The first round of the competition was an in-hand evaluation for conditioning. The criteria included weight, conditioning, hair coat, and overall appearance. Hail Yeah scored in the top ten. The next competitive class was an in-hand trail class, in which the trainer would lead the horse through a series of obstacles in the arena, including loading and unloading from a stock trailer and picking up all four feet. Hail Yeah scored in the top five. The next class was performed under saddle. The trainer rode the horse through a series of obstacles in a specific pattern that must be followed exactly. Hail Yeah was disqualified (DQ) when Ray turned him to the left when he should have turned to the right. How sad! The score sheets placed Hail Yeah in the top of the class until the DQ.

Despite the DQ and not being in the final ten to compete in the freestyle finale, Hail Yeah was recognized by all who saw him for the quality horse he is and the quality training he received from Ray. After the competition, Ray was pleased with Hail Yeah's performance, but upset with himself for breaking the course pattern and the resultant disqualification. The general mood around the stall was one of quiet composure as Ray rested in a chair and Hail Yeah lay in his stall taking a nap. That was the end of day one hundred and one in the saga of Ray Ariss and Hail Yeah.

Day one hundred and two was to be a different story. The day broke as a warm peaceful morning with a few puffy white clouds to decorate the sky. It was a little cooler than the mid-90's temperature typical of late summer in Fort Worth. "Great day," I thought. On arrival to the barn, the first words Ray spoke to me were, "This is the worst day of my life! Today I have to auction my horse, and I want to take him home with me." You see, when you spend time getting your horse to bond with you, a necessity to achieve a sweet, willing, and predictable partner, you also form a strong bond with the horse. With Ray it was a particularly strong bond. The reality that he may lose his partner to a higher bidder struck Ray with terror.

The family held a conference. How much would they be willing to pay to keep Hail Yeah in the Ariss family? The answer was simple. There was no limit. Ray asked a friend to sit in the stands and bid for him. "Here's my credit card, bid whatever it takes," Ray instructed. The highest price horse so far had gone for ten thousand dollars, though the average was around three thousand dollars.

The time was at hand. Ray reluctantly led Hail Yeah to the center of the auction arena. When asked to speak of the qualities of his horse for the bidding crowd, Ray was suddenly at a loss for words. His mouth was dry and the tears welled in his eyes, his throat choked. Then the bidding began. \$500 ... \$1,000 ... \$2,000 ... \$5,000 ... \$8,000 ... the bidding took off at a frantic pace. The crowd sat in stunned silence, amazed at the rapidity of the rising bids. The auctioneer was pressed to keep up with the increasing bids. \$10,000 ... \$11,000 ... \$15,000 ... \$19,000 ... \$22,000. The incredulity of the crowd was palpable. I held my breath. \$25,000 ... \$30,000. I watched Ray and a tear ran down my cheek. He was going deeply in debt for his partner. He was determined that no one else would take HIS horse home. I looked across the arena filled with more than two thousand people. The friend bidding for Ray was in shock. I could see the discomfort expressed by the body language and flush of the skin. Television cameras showed up to record the emotional display as the (Continued on next page)

bidding continued, \$32,000 ... \$35,000 ... The cameras rolled. The bidding friend continued with trepidation knowing the financial impact this would have on Ray and his family. Staring intently at Ray seeking any indication to stop, the incessant bidding continued, \$38,000 ... \$40,000!! Would this agony ever stop?

I searched the stands for the offending bidder. Who was it that dared to bid against my friend Ray, trying to take his partner away from him? I was angry. How could this person be so insensitive as to break up this partnership? I wanted to run across the arena and shake this person and tell him or her to STOP, DON'T DO THIS!! But I couldn't locate the offender to deliver the message.

\$41,000 ... \$42,000 ... Ray had enough. He looked into the stands at his friend and shook his head. Enough was enough. This was too much of a sacrifice to ask of his family. With a coup de grace, the other bidder finished off all competition with a final bid of \$50,000!

The crowd sat in stunned silence. You could hear a pin drop across the arena. I sat motionless in disbelief, transfixed, with a full stream of tears running down my cheeks. My heart completely devastated for my friend. It was done. Hail Yeah was lost. Someone had taken Ray's partner away from him. Who would go to such lengths to deny my friend of this partnership with his horse?

I watched Ray. I saw him drop his head and lay a gentle hand on Hail Yeah's neck and rub him as the realization sank in. I was amazed at Ray's ability to remain calm in the face of the devastating consequence of the auction. Someone else had recognized, as had Ray, the special qualities of this horse and was determined to possess it.


Time slowed and the crowd sat silent. Tension filled the arena. Then the auctioneer broke the silence with the name of the winning bidder. Patti Colbert, the Executive Director of the Mustang Heritage Foundation. Patti came to the microphone and announced that indeed she had purchased the horse for \$50,000 on behalf of the Mustang Heritage Foundation. I listened in astonishment as she explained her goal to establish a partnership between the Foundation, The City of Norco, and Ray Ariss to promote Hail Yeah as a prime example of the special qualities of the American Mustang. Hail Yeah would become the mascot for the Mustang Heritage Foundation and the Federal Bureau of Land Management wild horse and





burro adoption program in the western United States.

The crowd exploded. Thunderous applause rocked the arena. The tears ran freely down my face, but now they were tears of joy for Ray and Hail Yeah, the \$50,000 mustang. His horse was going home with him! Sure all the details of this new partnership still have to be worked out, but the important result is that Hail Yeah remains part of the Ariss family and returned to California with his partner Ray Ariss, a fairy tale ending to a terrific story about a man and his horse. **A**

re you looking for a winter hobby A to fill the void of "Cowboy Action Shooting"TM 'till spring? Cowboy Action slows down during winter in Michigan, so I spend a good portion of that time reviving an old craft, making a wood log chain. I enjoy building unique items. Whether created out of wood or metal, my best effort is always put forth to produce a quality product. Someone asked a while ago to just throw something together for them out of wood. My response was "I don't make junk." If it has the Cree Vicar's name on it there are certain parameters involved. It says in the Book of Proverbs Chapter 22 and verse 29, "Do you see a man diligent and skilful in his business? He will stand before kings; he will not stand before obscure men." (The Amplified Bible) It is not known to me if kings read The Cowboy Chronicle, but you cowboys and cowgirls who conduct yourselves with integrity in the "Spirit of the Game" are as royalty to me.

With that said I would like to show you the wood log chains, made out of a real logs, I have been making for the past decade. In the old days these chains were carved by hand out of a single board or small log. Many were made in the logging camps or yore at the end of the short winter working days. My father carved a wood chain like that out of white cedar with a swivel link in the middle when he was a young man. But I opt for the table saw, drill press, and router power tools. At my age I have more time than money, though time seems to go by much faster than it used to. During winter I envision spring and Cowboy Action ShootingTM just around the corner when I am working in my shop. These chains make an impressive gift. I place one on the Cowboy Action prize table from time to time.

Red oak is my preference when working with wood. All the small pieces left over from projects are saved. When around a clothesbasket full of 3/4" thick scraps have amassed, they are cut into 2-3/16" x 3-1/8" pieces with the

grain aligning with the longer measurement. Two 7/8" holes are drilled on the centerline running with the grain leaving 3/4" of wood is intact on each end. The wood between the holes can be removed with a smaller drill or a 3/4" mortising tool. This leaves a little stock to be removed by the router bit. Removing this stock between the holes makes it easier on the router bit. The outside corners can also be rounded off a little with a band saw to promote router bit endurance.

The first chain I made was formed using a saber saw and file on the inside slot and a disc sander for the outside. Then a router was used to round the inside and outside edges using homemade fixtures. Since then, I have made and



remade fixtures to hold the pieces for each operation from start to finish using a router table.

The first set of fixtures used to hold the rectangle pieces to router the inter slot and the outside contour were handmade out of hard maple. I also made fixtures out

of wood to hold the pieces when rounding the inside and outside edges. The design still works well, but I found the wood fixtures used to form the slots and outside contour wore down because of the constant bearing pressure of the 1/2" shear cut flush trim bit running on it. A toolmaker friend that goes to our church solved the problem. He made me a set of fixtures out of brass mounted on a wood housing. Chain links are now turned out like on an assembly line.

The router bits were purchased (Continued on next page)

from Grizzly. The 1/2" diameter "Shear Cut Flush Trim Bit" is used to form the inside slot and the outside contour. The 5/16" radius "Roundover Bit" is used to round the inside and outside of the link. The links are then dipped in water and stacked to dry. This helps bring out the grain. When dry, they are sanded with a "Sand-O-Flex" wheel sander. A coat of stain and then varnish are applied. I clamp a long Quick Grip clamp on an upright and use the tail to hang the links on after staining and varnishing.

Next, choose the links you want for a chain. Every other one is broken in half, with the grain if possible, glued together and held with a rubber band to form the chain. Hooks can be formed, finished, and affixed to each end. It is then resanded, stained, and varnished to finish the chain. Or, use your imagination. A wood anchor or padlock can be joined to the end of the chain. Recently a friend at church asked me to make a chain with an anvil on one end and a horseshoe on the other. After a little diligent head work, it was turned out "Fit for a king."

ties to dangle a sheath from belt or neck, and all manners of cutouts to hook or slide a belt through.


It is worth noting the native studded sheath made prior to about 1885 used brass tacks or escutcheons (brass nails) for decoration. This is pretty much impossible to do now as tacks are made with steel pins that don't tolerate bending. The modern equivalent is the brass spot. If you're a historically correct costumer or a serious collector, that's something you should know. Regular brass spots in the spirit of the game are absolutely acceptable. It's also important to know the use of tacks and escutcheons pertains to the early frontier. As commercially made spots became available in the latter part of the 19th century, they took over. Beads of all sorts also supplanted porcupine quills.

Many of the Indian style sheaths are delightful additions not only to the native costumes, but also to the outfit of the cowboy or cowgirl, the army trooper or officer, trappers, scouts, and buffalo hunters. They are also great additions to Wild West Show persona paraphernalia. Remember, at this

time many of the tribes were tied down to the reservation and because of demand as trade items, the beadwork from this era was remarkably ornate and beautiful.

Many of the above sheaths were made without welts (that bit of leather in the center of the main seam which keeps the stitching from getting cut through). As a result, they tended to have sleeker and more elegant profiles than those that required them. That is not to say welted sheaths didn't exist. As with many things, the construction methods of makers varied all through the west.

Compadres, I've about took up all the space they give me. If you're real interested in knives and sheaths, I urge you to go and reconnoiter bookstores and libraries. Recommended readin' - "The Bowie Knife" by Norm Flayderman, "Knifemakers of Old San Francisco" by Bernard R. Levine, and "Plains Indian Knife Sheaths" by Alex Kozlov for starters. When I joined SASS I quickly settled on choosing Doc Cary as my alias. I am a veterinarian and Charles Allen Cary was a veterinarian who lived in the cowboy era and became a person of historical significance in the profession. He is a distant relative. My grandfather Huber's mother was Martha Louisa Cary. I have traced her up the trunk of the Cary tree and found Dr. Cary sitting on a branch. Our common

ancestor is John Cary (1610–1681) of the Plymouth Colony, my 8th greatgrandfather.

Charles Cary was born at Millersburg, IA in 1861. He graduated from Iowa State (B.S., 1885; D.V.M., 1887). After practicing for a time, serving as Assistant State Veterinarian in Iowa, teaching in South Dakota, and studying in Europe, he became Professor of Veterinary Science at the Auburn Polytechnic Institute (now Auburn University) in 1892. He also became State Veterinarian of Alabama and in 1907, was instrumental in the establishment of the first veterinary school in the South at Auburn, serving as its Dean until 1935. He also was long-time President of the



Auburn Veterinary College 1905

Alabama Live Stock Association, and this was the first state to require health certificates for animals in interstate shipment. An early advocate of cattle fever tick eradication and municipal food hygiene, he devoted most of his professional life to bettering livestock sanitation and public health in Alabama.

Dr. Cary joined the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) in 1890, was elected President in 1919, and worked actively on many committees during his 45-year membership. He was a member of the Executive Board at the time of his death in 1935. He was short, of spare build, and had red hair. Whenever he finished speaking, there was no doubt about his stand on any issue for he did not mince words nor evade issues. He believed in facing facts squarely and resolving issues on the basis of facts, and veterinary medicine in the South developed in this atmosphere of forceful realism.

Dr. Cary was elected to the Alabama Hall of Fame in 1957. Alabama's debt to him may be measured in its abundant good health, due in part to his pioneer work in eradication of livestock diseases, estab-*(Continued on page 69)*

want to have a Spencer in the same caliber they shoot in their main match pistols!

The first time I ever personally saw a Spencer rifle was in 1970, when I was 18 years old. I worked at a restaurant in Chicago named "Aylwards Round-up" (which was owned by the father of a girl I was

dating). As it had a Western motif, there were assorted Old West antiques and guns displayed throughout. Just inside the entrance was an original Civil War vintage Spencer with the well-known historical picture of a trooper loading a Spencer with a Blakeslee "Quick Loader." I was intrigued then, and have always remained so. The next time I remember actually seeing a Spencer was at a gun show in the late 1980's (before I was saved, and saw the light of Cowboy Action ShootingTM!) Someone wanted to trade me an 1865 Spencer in .56-50 with a center-fire breechblock for an *(Continued on next page)*

AR-15 I was selling! Being ignorant, I didn't. Ah, would that I had the chance again!

The first movie I saw a Spencer in was "The Blue and The Grey." Gregory Peck (as Lincoln) and Stacey Keach shot Spencers on the White House lawn. I actually owned that particular Spencer for a short time, but that's another story. Spencers have become increasingly popular in the last several years in the media, starting with Clint Eastwood's classic western movie "Unforgiven," where a Spencer carbine is Morgan Freeman's co-star. Since then, they have been popping up in a variety of made for TV western movies, and Hollywood feature films like "3:10 to Yuma," and "Utu" (about settlers battling the Maori in New Zealand).

I suspect the main reason for this increased popularity of Spencers in film and TV is the spread of Cowboy Action ShootingTM and the fact the folks at Taylor's Firearms had the vision to develop and release their 1865 Spencer replicas. Taylor's first re-created Spencer carbines in .44 Russian and .45 Schofield. These are as approved main match rifles to cater to the Cowboy Action Shooters who care more about style and fun than fast times. Taylor's Spencer was then released in a center-fire, re-loadable version of the 1865's original loading, .56-50. Besides SASS shooters, this was excellent news for N-SSA, CWSA, and other Civil War re-enactors. Until then, they had to rely on finding a serviceable original to convert to center-fire, or an expensive custom made Romano Rifle Co. model.

Taylor's have since phased out the earlier .44 Russian and .45 Schofield models in favor of the more popular .44-40 and .45 Colt versions. Last year they even released three band infantry rifle versions in .44-40 and .56-50.

SPENCER HISTORY

In the late 1850s, virtually all shoulder arms were single shots. Most were "front stuffers" that required loading each shot by pouring powder down the barrel, ramming a single bullet down with a ram rod, and then priming the nipple with a percussion cap. This made

repeat shots VERY slow! Some exceptions to the norm were the Sharps rifles and a few other breechloaders that loaded paper or rubber cartridges and were primed with a percussion cap. These, however, were still single shot arms, and required manual capping of the percussion nipple.

The most revolutionary exception was the experimental lever action Volcanic Repeating Rifle, designed by D. B. Wesson of Smith and Wesson. Oliver Winchester saw the potential of this design. He bought the Volcanic Arms Co, renaming it New Haven Arms Co. He employed Volcanic's Superintendent, an inventor named B. Tyler Henry. Winchester put Henry in charge of ammunition development. They introduced the .44 caliber rim fire Henry in 1860.

The Henry, however, was not officially accepted for general issue during the Civil War. Just under 2,000 were ordered for some select units like Union General James Blunt's personal bodyguards, who were armed "with Henry's Volcanic rifles and two revolvers," and the 1st *(Continued on page 64)*



District of Columbia Cavalry. Private sales to Union troops far outstripped the government sales. Production problems plagued the Henry with its complex one-piece barrel and magazine assembly. Winchester could not keep up with the incoming orders. Less than 13,000 Henry rifles were produced during the war, of which only 11,000 (most of which were privately purchased) were used in the conflict.

It was another inventor, Christopher Spencer, who marketed a much more successful repeater during the Civil war, the 1860 Spencer. The Spencer design was simpler and cheaper to produce than the Henry. Official Government and state militia orders exceeded 110,000. Government orders and private purchases by troopers and individual units during and just after the Civil War (depending on which source you read) exceeded 160,000 to 200,000 Spencer rifle and carbines.

Spencer began his association with firearms working as a machinist for Christian Sharp at his rifle plant. This association with Sharps influ-



enced Spencer's design and gave it more than a passing resemblance to a Sharps carbine. Spencer modified the idea of the Sharps falling block, and used a downward pivoting block assembly. He added a seven round tubular magazine in the butt stock. like modern Browning 22 LR autoloaders. Pulling the trigger guard lever down opened the action, and allowed a round to be fed from the stock's tubular magazine. The trigger guard was then lifted, closing the action. The Sharp's like hammer was then cocked manually. The Spencer's seven round magazine in the butt stock held less than half of the fifteen in the Henry's under barrel magazine. Even with the lesser capacity, and with the Spencer being slower to cock than the Henry, it was still much more popular than the Henry.

The original loading was in .44 rim-fire. It was designed slightly different than the Henry rounds, but it is recorded .44 Henry rounds would function in the Spencer "Light Carbine" as it was called. This "light carbine" was still listed in Spence catalogues in 1865. Realizing this was too light to attract military orders. Spencer developed a more powerful round called the "No. 56 Spencer rifle and carbine round," though later it would be called the ".56-56." It used a .54 caliber, 350 to 375 grain bullet over 42-45 grains of blackpowder in a copper, rim fire cartridge case. It was much more powerful than the Henry's 215 grain .442 diameter bullet over 25 to 28 grains of powder. The Spencer would sink this big, heavy bullet 12 inches into soft pine at 15 feet. The Spencer had almost the "stopping power" of the rifled muskets of the day, and was regarded as very much superior to the Henry in the "stopping power" department, as well as having a reputation for superior accuracy.

From late 1862 onward, the Spencer gained a reputation as an effective, reliable firearm. After a personal demonstration to President Lincoln in August of 1863, where Lincoln actually fired the Spencer himself in a Washington DC park, the Spencer was on its way to becoming an official issue firearm. Because production was simpler and he was better financed with official government orders, Spencer was able to deliver far more rifles than Winchester. Most of these were 22" barreled Cavalry carbines, though the first 1,000 Spencers issued were full length infantry rifles, with 30" barrels.

In June of 1863, Col. John T. Wilder and his small troop of Union Cavalry decimated a much larger force of Confederates with muzzleloaders at the Battle of Hoover's Gap, Tennessee. At other battles such as Yellow Tavern, Five Forks, Winchester, Chickamauga, Franklin, and with Custer's troops at Brandy Station, the Spencers proved their superiority. Even in the first day of the Gettysburg campaign, Union General Buford's cavalry used their Spencer rifles to forestall the Confederate advance, and ultimately saved the day for the Union. On the third day the boy General Custer's 5th Michigan Cavalry used their Spencer rifles to repel Stuart's Cavalry.

In 1865, the ordnance department modified the original .56-56 Spencer round and developed a .50 caliber round using the same case. From 1865 on, the newly produced Spencers were in this new caliber. Many existing guns were also re-barreled. The original .56-56 had used a healed bullet (much like a modern .22 LR) with the base of the bullet crimped on the case mouth, and the body of the bullet being the same diameter of the cartridge case. The lube was on the outside of the bullet in exposed grooves. This allowed debris to stick to the bullet, and the lube would rub off. The new .56-50 round had the case lengthened to cover the sides and grease grooves of the .50 caliber, 360-grain bullet. The crimp was a taper crimp over the ogive of the bullet. The 1865 model had its barrel shortened to 20" and had a magazine cut off designed by an engineer named Stabler added to it. This allowed the firearm to be used as a single shot, with the magazine tube to be held in reserve.

Spencer did not like the new .56-50 round, thinking it had excessive crimp creating too much pressure. In response, he introduced his .56-52 round, a variation retaining the healed bullet and the shorter case similar to the .56-56, but using a 400grain, .50 caliber bullet. Both the .56-50 and .56-52 rounds were totally interchangeable, however. A shot shell was even produced that could be used in any .56-50 or .56-56 Spencer rifle. It looks like an old 5 in 1 movie blank on steroids! Performance, guessing based on the shot round I have, would be something like a standard .410 shotgun shell.

After the Civil War, the Spencer continued its popularity in the wild and wooly West. The Frontier Army appreciated the Spencer's awesome firepower. It was not long until the Spencer also gained a favorable reputation as a fearsome weapon with the Native American warriors. The braves, accustomed to the military having single shot muzzle-loaders, were stunned by their initial encounters with the "long knives" armed with the rapid firepower of the Spencer rifles. Encounters between Spencer armed troopers and Native American warriors are too numerous to count.

Custer's Seventh Cavalry was armed with Spencers at the infamous massacre of over 100 of Black Kettle's Cheyenne at the Washita in 1869. Custer liked the Spencer so much he personally owned a custom Spencer sporting rifle. Another encounter where the Spencer earned this reputa-*(Continued on next page)*

tion was the "Hayfield Fight" on August 1, 1867. In the Hayfield fracas, nine troopers and nine civilians were cutting hay when they were beset upon by a large war party. The group took cover in a makeshift corral, and held the war party at bay with their Spencer and Henry repeaters. Many of the war party died, but only three troopers and one civilian were killed.

Yet another notable incident was September 17 to 22, 1868, the "Battle for Beecher's Island" where a band of civilian scouts under the command of Major George Forsyth and Lt. Frederick Beecher was beset upon by another war party. The party held up on a sandbar in the middle of the Arikaree fork of the Republican River in Colorado. Once again, the Spencers rained lead on the attacking force with their vastly superior numbers. The troopers successfully held them off for five days. The white casualties were 25 wounded and 5 killed, while the Indians suffered 75 dead, and an unknown number of wounded. Until around 1875, the Spencer was the most common carbine issued to Cavalry units on the frontier.

The Spencer was very popular with the Indians, when they could lay hands on them. Geronimo is known to have owned a Spencer sporting rifle. During the recent excavations and forensic work done at the Little Big Horn Battlefield, it was learned Spencer rifles in assorted calibers were some of the most common firearms carried by the Native American onslaught that wiped out Custer (whose troops were no longer armed with Spencers, but rather single shot Springfields!)

Civilians on the frontier also appreciated the Spencer. The former Civil War soldiers journeying west for their fortunes often were armed with Spencers, many acquired in the service. Others obtained them at bargain prices when tens of thousands were surplused out at the end of the war by dealers like Bannerman's and Carlos Cove in Denver. From the mid to late 1860's, and well into the 1870's, the Spencer was the arm of choice. In 1866, the frontiersman William Orway writes of impressing plainsmen at Carlos Gove's Denver gun shop by shooting out seven pine knots in a corral fence off-handed at over 30 yards. In 1867, western pioneer William Breckenridge (of Breckenridge, Colorado fame) accounts of single handedly engaging six Indians in eastern Colorado as they tried to steal his horses. Wells Fargo and railroads issued them for their guards. In 1867, William Bell writes of a fortified stage stop by Fort Wallace, Kansas equipped with loaded Spencers in all positions.

After the Civil War, Spencer introduced a sporting rifle based on the 1865 carbine and rifle. They could be bought in any of the existing



See these and <u>MUCH MORE</u> on our Website: <u>www.cochiseleather.com</u> calibers, and also in a new .56-46 bottlenecked sporting cartridge. It had a .45 caliber, 330-grain bullet over 45 grains of blackpowder. This potent round was much superior to the later introduced .44 WCF (.44-40) in the 1873 Winchester.

In general, all Spencer calibers stayed very popular until the turn of the century. They were considered by many as being much superior in stopping power to the .44 and .38 WCFs, and as being a "thumper" with their 350 to 400 grain bullets pushed by 45 grains of powder compared to their 205 and 180 grain bullets over 38 to 40 grains of powder for the WCF calibers. According to the old "Buffalo Runner" Frank Mayer, an experienced frontiersman would rather shoot a buffalo with a Spencer than one of those "new" repeating 1873 Winchesters. At varying times, the Spencers could be ordered mail order from catalogues such as Sears Roebuck & Co. and Montgomery Wards. Sears still had Spencers in its 1902 catalog for \$3.65 with a free box of shells! Ammunition for all of the Spencers was still produced and sold until around 1920!

I have had in my collection several original 1860 Spencers in .56-56 at varying times. The first was very interesting! It had an awesome, crisp bore, but at some point had been reblued, and had some of the parts chrome plated to make it a presentation piece! (Because of this, I picked it up for far less than Spencer market value, which is, as of this writing, \$1,500 to \$3,500 depending on condition). Overall, however, it is in great shape, and the wood is smooth and sound. It had an original rim-fire breech block, but with the help of my resident Spencer expert and Civil War re-enactor, Hangin' Judge Hemp, we got it up and shooting. I bought a very nice, color case hardened center-fire breech block, reloading dies, centerfire .56-56 brass, and a Rapine mold to make it a shooter. These all came from Dave Gullo at Buffalo Arms. I had less than \$400 invested in the whole set up to make the 140-year-old gun boom again!

After getting some rounds loaded (375 grain Rapine bullet over 37+ grains Hodgdon's 777), we went to the rifle range on the lower part of my ranch. We were gratified it functioned and fired perfectly every time! In fact, at 25-30 yards, shot standing off-hand, it would easily shoot fistsized groups. We made the pop cans on the embankment dance until we ran out of loaded ammo. I have had two originals since then (including the Gregory Peck Spencer), and both were fun to shoot with the center-fire breech block.

Today's Cowboy Action Shooters can still have a very period correct Spencer. Taylor's Firearms and Cimarron are selling SASS-legal Spencer replicas in .44-40, .45 Colt, and .56-50. See my article next month! **1**.






This book is not to be missed if you are a *Lonesome Dove* fan or a fan of Western photography, and it is just in time to be added to your Christmas list. The book is now on sale in the SASS Mercantile. *A*. (established in 1790), in England in 1868 as the Webley R.I.C. or Royal Irish Constabulary Model and was chambered for the .442 Webley R.I.C. center fire cartridge. 
I appreciate all the SASS Scholarship Foundation has done to support me in my pursuits, and looking back on these past couple years, I am very thankful for it. *1*.





THE BRITISH BULLDOG REVOLVER ...

(Continued from page 67) markings, and country of origin, and the less structured international patent laws led to many imitations, and the Bulldog was soon duplicated by countless Belgian and German copyists and eventually American gun manufacturers. With the Bulldog being exported around the globe, between one and two million were produced, maybe more. During the latter quarter of the nineteenth century the Bulldog enjoyed brisk sales in the American West and was known as the firearm of choice by many notable (and notorious) personages.

When first introduced in the U.S. (between late 1873 and 1875), the less expensive .44 caliber, doubleaction Bulldog competed against the .38 caliber, 1st Model Smith & Wesson single action ("Baby Russian"). There was nothing comparable to the Bulldog available from American companies at anything like the Bulldog's low price. In fact, the Bulldog was so popular, it was selling for \$25 to \$30, three times its retail price. Finally, in late 1878/early 1879 manufacturer giant Forehand and Wadsworth introduced the first genuine, American copy of the British Bulldog. These self-cockers were known for "their smooth, short stroke trigger pull" and were "equal to or better than Weblev's British Bulldog." They sold in three calibers, ".32 S&W 7 shots, .38 S&W 6 shots, and .44 Webley Caliber 5 shots," and advertised as the "Improved British Bull-Dog" and "Seven Shots in Five Seconds." Superb engraving, ivory or pearl grips, nickel plating, and other refinements were soon added to the Bulldog. Proliferation by other manufacturers of later Bulldogs in different calibers and barrel lengths was immense and quantity difficult to calculate.

George Layman states one purpose of his book is to provide collectors and shooters, especially Cowboy Action Shooters, a reference source to the British Bulldog and its variations from the standpoint of identification, historical significance, popularity, and its common mechanical problems. This he has accomplished admirably. This book is the ultimate collector's guide for Bulldog Revolvers. Interesting are some of the Western characters noted for carrying a Bulldog:

- Lieutenant Colonel George Armstrong Custer carried a brace of Bulldogs into the Battle of the Little Bighorn.
- The mining town of "wicked and wild" Bodie, California, in its day had dozens of newspaper articles mentioning the use of the Bulldog.
- The Bulldog was used to assassinate President James A. Garfield in 1881.
- Jesse James is on record to have owned one.
- ^o "Dueling Madam" Etta Clark shot rival brothel owner Alice Abbott in the "public arch" (sic) in El Paso, Texas in 1886 with one.
- Bob Dalton, when frisked after the botched Coffeyville raid was found in his vest pocket a .38 caliber Bulldog.
- Frederick C. Godfroy, Mescalero Apache Indian Agent in Lincoln County, New Mexico carried one.

- John H. Tunstall carried one, and it's believed Billy the Kid snatched it from Tunstall's body after his assassination and carried it as a backup gun.
- Winston Churchill carried a Bulldog when he was Home Secretary in the early 1900's.
- Raquel Welch, starring as Hannie Caulder, carried a "Belgian Frontier Bulldog" in that film.
- Joanna Pacula's character "Big Nose Kate" used a Bulldog in 1993's "Tombstone."

It's interesting to note all but two of the top shooters were SASS members, from which one could draw the conclusion that it is an advantage to be in the SASS family.



14 Dec 1852Ned Christie is born in Indian Territory. During his lifetime he will become a Cherokee tribal senator and the most wanted fugitive in the territory for killing a U.S. Marshal in 1887.

- **24 Dec 1853** The steamer, *San Francisco*, founders on its way to California. Two hundred and forty passengers and crew members of the 700 aboard die.
- **30 Dec 1853** The Gadsden Purchase is agreed upon by Mexican President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna and American Minister James Gadsden. The price is \$10 million for Mexican land extending from western Arizona to West Texas, approximately 29,640 square miles of desert. This land secures the southern boundary of New Mexico and Arizona. It will yield some of the most enduring gold and silver fields of the century (discovered in 1856). Gadsden views the strip as important for a southern transcontinental railroad route.
- **10 Dec 1854** Rancher Richard King weds Henrietta Chamberlain at Brownsville, Texas.
- **28 Dec 1854** William H. Russell, Alexander Majors, and W. B. Waddell form a partnership to provide regular overland freight service from Fort Leavenworth, Kansas to California. The company is subsidized in part by the Federal Government.
- **5 Dec 1855** Columbia River volunteers under Nathan Olney are near Fort Walla Walla in southeastern Washington when they encounter Pio-pio-moxmox's (Yellow Serpent) band of Walla Walla. Pio had looted the Hudson Bay Company's Fort Walla Walla, but he had always been neutral or helped the Americans in the past. He advances under a flag of truce and wants to return the booty. An agreement cannot be reached, Pio refuses to fight and he and four others are taken prisoner.
- **7 Dec 1855** The Walla Walla attack Nathan Olney's volunteers, who still hold Pio and the other four as prisoners. Pio resists being bound by the white man and he and three of the prisoners are killed. Pio's scalp and ears are paraded through white settlements. This action moved many neutral tribes toward a war status.
- **15 Dec 1855** Kansas Territory now has two constitutions, as the Topeka Constitution of the Free Staters is adopted by popular election. The constitution includes ordinances prohibiting entry of Negroes into the territory.
- **15 Dec 1855** Oregon Governor Stevens gets a Nez Perce honor guard.
- **23 Dec 1855** White volunteers surround a friendly Rogue River Indian village they had visited the day before. The village is mostly unarmed. The whites attack, killing nineteen Indian men. The women and children are driven into the cold. Survivors arrive at Fort Lane in southwestern Oregon with severe frostbite and frozen limbs.
- **2 Dec 1856** In his final message to Congress, President Pierce laments that the Kansas Territory 'was made the battlefield, not so much of opposing factions, or interests within itself, but of the conflicting passions of the whole people of the United States.'
- **8 Dec 1857** President Buchanan, in his annual message to Congress, requests money for soldiers and supplies to suppress the revolution in the Utah Territory.
- **31 Dec 1857** In territorial elections, the Lecompton Constitution, with provisions for owning slaves, passes by 6226 to 569. Almost 3000 of these votes are later shown to be fraudulent. The Free State men refuse to vote.

LITTLE KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE WAY OUT WEST -

SQUIRREL TOOTH ALICE was one of the favorite "Ladies of the Evening" in Dodge City, Kansas during its hey-day. Alice's trademark was a pet squirrel. Dodge City sported a selection of soiled doves in the 1870's, such as Hambone Jane, Big Nose Kate, and The Galloping Cow to name a few. Eventually, many quit the profession to get married.

- **4 Dec 1858** Colonel Miles and the Navajos agree to a truce and start negotiating a peace.
- **6 Dec 1858** In his second annual message to Congress, President Buchanan asserts that the authority of Constitutional law has been fully restored and peace prevails throughout the territories.
- **20 Dec 1858** Abolitionist John Brown leads a raid from Kansas Territory into Missouri, freeing 11 slaves and killing one man in the process. The former slaves are taken to Canada.
- **27 Dec 1858** Twenty Texans, led by Indian fighter Peter Garland, attack a peaceful group of Anadarko and Caddo camped on Keechi Creek near the Brazos River Reservation. The Texans kill seven Indians while they are sleeping. The Texas Rangers refuse to arrest Garland for unprovoked murders. A grand jury set up to investigate the murders will charge Anadarko Chief Jose Maria (Iesh) with horse-stealing instead.
- **2 Dec 1859** Found guilty of treason and sentenced to death, today John Brown is hanged in Charleston. His body will be returned to the Adirondacks to be interred on the Brown farm according to his wishes. Later the bodies of his sons and the bodies of ten of his associates who were killed at Harper's Ferry will be brought to the farm for burial.




They were going to help me with the classes and travel around Europe.

wanted to brave the elements or a possible repeat of Wednesday's excitement. But, this is Cody, Wyoming. Wait a while and the weather will change, and change it did – for the better! Just 24 hours after the downpour began, the sun shone and side matches began! The first annual Cody's Wild West



Shootout and Wyoming State Championship was under way and the hosts, the High Lonesome Drifters, were greatly relieved. Shooters drifted around the range testing their skills at long range rifle, Plainsman, HLD's now famous (or infamous) Hunting Party - 20 standard rifle silhouette targets set 25 to 100 yards out and shot at with your pistol-caliber match rifle. It's quite challenging and sometimes frustrating when the silhouettes are hit but don't fall and just stare back at you as if to say, "Is that all you got?", especially the rams.

The fast and furious Indian Attack for two-person teams, 50 little targets with 5 "no shoots," shot with your pistols and rifle, also provided some frustration, but many came back again and again to show 'em what for! Instead of the usual speed stuff, practice stages were set up for various gun combinations: pistol and rifle; pistol and shotgun; rifle and shotgun, and, of course, one for all three.

The main match for 183 shooters started on Friday morning, a bright, sunny day with perfect temperature and a light breeze, and Saturday was a repeat of Friday – everyone was happy. The ten stages (five each day) were written by Joe Cross, Kari Lynn, Yellowstone Bill, SASS #24321, and Six Gun Annie, SASS #24322, and were based on absolutely nothing - a match with no theme. Yet, all were challenging with lines to start things off, stuff to hold or carry, and plenty of movement, except for one stage which was shot seated on a stump with your guns laid out in front of you on a hay bale. Shooting was finished around 2 p.m. each day, which left plenty of time to head into Cody for sight seeing and shopping.

The Park County Travel Council, the Buffalo Bill Historical Center, local merchants, and many individuals contributed to making Cody's Wild West Shootout and Wyoming State Championship a success, and I thank them all. A special thank you goes to two Top



Smokey Sue and Paden Lead ran the show. And a show it was. It may be a crime to have that much fun ...







The CKR, a SASS-affiliated Cowboy Action Shooting[™] Club based out of the Kayaderosseras Fish and Game Club in Ballston Spa, NY, was asked to put on two demonstrations of Cowboy Action Shooting[™] during the event. In true cowboy form, the cowboys and cowgirls arrived with targets, props, and plenty of enthusiasm to show what Cowboy Action Shooting[™] was all about. This being only a demo, the most frequently asked question was "When can WE shoot the guns?" The CKR's answer to that was "Ask Remington." And they must have asked, because this

At 10:30 AM, the CKR folks stepped up to put on their first demo. The Trail Boss, Smokehouse Dan, read the scenario to the crowd and gave the shooting instructions to the cowpokes. Then while letting the shooters go to work on the stage, he explained all about Cowboy Action ShootingTM to the onlookers—guns, shooting categories, clothing, rules, aliases, posse duties, and so forth. The stage itself was relatively simple with 10 pistol, 10 rifle, and a shot-(Continued on next page)


gun pepper popper and clay bird (always a hit with the crowd). Basic props included a corral entrance, fences, a gun horse, and a watering trough.



try the lever action rifle with the same result. Lupe, tired of listening to the cries from the banker, ventilates him with her pistola, and begins screaming at her jefe. Missouri Bounty Hunter, himself quite the gringo, tells her to be quiet or speak English, as he grabs the shotgun and tries to open the box. Again that stubborn lock won't budge.

Lupe finally gets the pair to see she has retrieved the key from the banker's vest. Bounty greedily grabs the key and bends down to open the lock. A voice calls out from down the street, "Here boys, try this!" A bundle of dynamite soars through the air, down the street, and lands just in front of the box. The gang jumps back instinctively, but Bounty Hunter grabs the dynamite, pulls the fuse out, and tosses it aside. He then realizes the dynamite came from Cherokee Christie, SASS #39057, who is not a member of the gang. He glances up the street and sees the posse standing thirty yards away.

Hands slap leather and the shootin' begins. How will it end? Who will live? Who will die? Those questions and more were answered for those attending the 6th Annual Audrain County Historical Society's Walk Back in Time.

This event attracts historical reenactors from all over the Midwest and from all kinds of time periods. The historical camps are arranged on the grounds of the Historical Society in a unique reverse timeline. You can literally take a stroll back through time and visit people from World War II, the Spanish-American period, the 1880's Cowboys, the American Civil War, Native Americans, Mountain Men, and Colonial times. Other period traders and exhibitors are demonstrating their skills for visitors to see. Other events this year included a recreation of Betsy Ross' handiwork, vintage baseball games, and period battle reenactments.


One of this year's most watched attractions was an Iraqi convoy demonstration. Nine Iraq War combat veterans (currently in the Army Reserve) drove three large military trucks and a Humvee onto the reenactment battlefield to demonstrate a simulated roadside bomb explosion resulting with one casualty. What transpired was a remarkably realistic firefight with insurgents, the likes of which previous visitors to the Walk Back in Time had never seen. News footage could not come close to what these nine veterans were able to reenact. After watching this narrated portrayal our fellow citizens were able to achieve a better understanding that our Iraq War veterans, as all veterans, are truly the pride of America.

The Walk Back in Time started in Mexico, Missouri in 2002. It had small beginnings, but six years later, we host more than 10,000 visitors to the weekend event. Friday is an Education Day where area schools are invited to bring their 4th grade classes, visit the historical camps, and learn what life was like during our nation's history. Both Saturday and Sunday are dedicated to a jampacked schedule of events providing educational entertainment to the public. Entry into the event is free. There is a Friday night fish fry with bluegrass music entertainment and candlelight tours through the historical camps on Saturday evening. So, if you ever find yourself in Missouri, stop by Mexico, the home of the Walk Back in Time. Tell 'em the South Fork Regulators invited you to come. scenery, and breakfast with Evil Roy and Wicked Felina. They were on their way out to the range to teach shooting classes, so we finished eating and unpacked while waiting for Nashville Frank to pick us up.

Later that day, we went to the range to see what the facility was like. They had a brand new huge clubhouse that would easily accommodate up to 90 people, and then we ventured down to the shooting area. It was a well thought-out area, with separate bays, and covered areas. Perfect for the field class work. I couldn't have had a better facility if I designed it myself!

The following day, we met at the range, and as I watched, the students started to walk in. They had the same quizzical look I did. "Who is this lady, and how are we going to get this done?" Nashville Frank and Wild Bull, SASS #21850, from Sweden introduced themselves, and then they introduced me. I was there to watch as Nashville Frank and Wild Bull conducted the class, and I would add information as needed.

It only took about thirty minutes, and I had them smiling. We shared laughter, we answered questions, and one thing became apparent, they were here to learn. We had students from Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and Hungary. They all spoke English, and they were hungry for knowledge. By the end of the day, I felt like all my intelligence had been sucked out.

Then the dreaded test came out. I was curious about how they would handle some of the terms we use on a daily basis, but may not be easily understood in another country. Should I have been surprised if they had trouble? No. Was I surprised when they didn't have trouble? A little. They all passed, and not by a little. They passed with no trouble at all! All in all, 37 students passed with flying colors. Given the fact they all were attending the next day, we decided to run the field course after the RO-II class the next day.

The RO-II course started early the next morning, so we had plenty of time for the class, and several hours to devote to the field work. The RO-II course ran similarly to the RO-I, except we had additional students in the class.

Nashville Frank and Wild Bull were thrilled to have Evil Roy, and Wicked Felina join us. Nashville announced to the class he can now say, "He taught Evil Roy everything he knows!" Wicked Felina was just taking a refresher, so she didn't have to take the test, which was a relief since I made sure to tell the class Evil Roy better score 30/30, or he'd never hear the end of it!

We adjourned for lunch, and then



went down to the field course. They were very serious about this portion of the class. I threw everything at them, and by the end of it, they had all run the timer, and they all had worked very hard at making sure it was done correctly. I have to say I have never instructed a more talented and eager to learn group in my entire teachings with SASS!

The next day, we started shooting the match under a somewhat dismal sky. It rained intermittently, but in no way did that dampen the spirit permeating the entire range. Everyone was anxious to get started, and match nerves were evidenced everywhere. As I sat under one of the covered areas, and watched the beehive, I remember thinking this is like I remember us acting oh, say, 10-15 years ago.

Do you remember not sleeping well because you were shooting the next day, and it just didn't get started soon enough? How anxious we were to get to the range, and meet our new friends? The mannerisms changed, and we all slowed down to say good morning, howdy, or just a tip of the hat. I was hearing all of that, only with a slight Scandinavian accent.

The briefing was conducted, and everyone scattered for their bays. How similar we all are—our European cousins and us. How delightful, and invigorating it all was. I watched as the shooters started, and as each one came up to shoot, I noted two things. One, they are extremely safety conscious, and that could not have just been taught to them, as they already were doing it. Two, the joy they had with each other, the scraping, the boasting, and the jostling. Does that sound familiar? It should, or have we forgotten the joy? I hope not.

Every stage had incredible props, and the shooting sequences were easy to understand. The targets were set up so each one was easy to hit; that is, if you actually used your sights! It was apparent a lot of dedicated people worked hard to give us a couple of days to remember, and enjoy.

If anyone thinks our cousins across the pond can't shoot, think again. They are as talented with this game as we are. They have some very fast shooters, some not so fast shooters, and everyone in between. What they don't seem to have are the egos. I didn't hear any, "They don't do it that way where I come from," "It doesn't say we can't," or my all time favorite, "I didn't know that was a rule, show me!"

All in all, I met some incredible people that I look forward to meeting again, and again. They are some of the most generous of spirit people with hearts to match. They provided us with almost everything we needed. (I did have to bring my own clothes, but that's about all.) I would love to name all of them so you have the opportunity to say hello, but fear of not getting all the names correctly makes me not. Instead, I will provide SASS with photos and match results, and hope my Scandinavian friends understand.

If you ever get the opportunity to participate in the Scandinavian or European games, don't hesitate. You will never be sorry. What do you have to lose? It's your life, enjoy.

By the way, Evil Roy did score 30/30 on the test! **A**
