





rejected. However, after a short discussion, there was a huge majority who had also come to the conclusion we have a problem with out loads. Our game is being seriously tilted to favor lightly loaded small calibers, and ... that's not our heritage.

Numerous governors met privately with me after the Summit and confided they have been concerned regarding light loads for some time, and some are even having difficulty with their range operators who no longer take Cowboy Action seriously. I've also received quite a few letters and notes from members who have also harbored concerns regarding the drift into sub-mild cowboy loads. Although I don't read the Wire, I've been told there has been a significant amount of traffic regarding this subject, and sadly, much of it has been vituperative and negative.

Let me say this ... no one knows the solution to the problem we're facing today ... we can do nothing and hope things work out for the best, or we can be pro-active and see if we can find a way to "turn the herd" before it plunges over the cliff of oblivion. Every sport harbors the seeds of its own destruction, and these sports eventually decay if the seeds are not eliminated.

One of the "standards" SASS has had from the very beginning is to calibrate knockdowns for a .38 caliber 158 gr. "standard" load. 850 fps is often considered the "standard." I've heard a number of comments to the effect that it's nearly impossible for a .32 caliber competitor to be competitive if there are knockdowns. It's "not fair" to set out targets legal equipment cannot negotiate. My unequivocal response to similar arguments is just because certain calibers and loads are legal doesn't mean they are necessarily competitive. For example, a "full house" .45 Long Colt load topped with a 255 gr. bullet is also quite legal, but it's not competitive either! I personally don't care if someone chooses to shoot full house .45s or lightly loaded .32s, but I don't want to hear any whining if there is a dump plate the heavy load guys can't negotiate as fast as the feather lites, and I don't want to hear anything from those who don't have enough "umph" in their loads to topple the knockdowns. Both are shooting (presently) legal loads, and neither may be competitive. But, they are shooting what they want to shoot, and they are shooting it by choice.

If we continue to ignore the present SASS "standard," where will we end up? It's anyone's guess, of (Continued on page 67)



LIKE WHISKEY, WATER CAN ALSO LAY YOU LOW!

I recently had my officemate read one of the articles in The Cowboy Chronicle by Holy Terror. In the article, Holy Terror gives advice about drinking water at matches. I share an office with a medical doctor whose specialty is internal medicine. She said the advice given in the article could cause serious problems or even kill an older shooter. What she said was a person who drinks a lot of water and is perspiring will dilute the electrolytes in the body. Young people can tolerate the lower electrolyte levels pretty well, but older people who take certain very common blood pressure medications could be pushed into Congestive Heart Failure or suffer other very serious problems when their electrolyte levels are reduced. Her recommendation is for anyone with chronic medical problems or taking maintenance medications discuss their best approach to hydration with their doctor.

RE-CREATING THE "MODERN" CATEGORY

First a little background:

The Modern category was an early SASS creation because many participants didn't have the fixed sighted Colt style revolvers needed to play in the Traditional category. There were plenty of the popular Ruger Blackhawk's around with adjustable sights though, and creating a separate category to allow others to enter the game was a good idea. There was also a perception that pistols with adjustable sights were an advantage over the traditional fixed sighted guns. So the Modern category made good sense.

Today:

25 plus years later, we now have solid evidence that adjustable sighted guns have absolutely no advantage over fixed sighted pistols. Today's Modern category requirements allow only one adjustable sighted revolver; every other firearm used may be the same as the guns used in the Traditional category. Age based categories actually allow the use of adjustable sighted revolvers right along side those using fixed sighted revolvers. In other words, the Modern category requirements are exactly the

same as the requirements of the Traditional category, except you must use at least ONE adjustable sighted pistol.

The only other SASS Categories allowing only a single requirement change is gender. No other category is defined by a single piece of equipment! (Frontiersman requires BOTH pistols be cap and ball and age-based categories allow a mix of firearms not allowed in the Traditional category.)

In spite of this information, when I was asked at several TG meetings last year, "Is it time to eliminate the Modern category," I said, "NO." Instead of eliminating the category, I would rather see the category re-created to be a truly "Modern" category and as a more "open" category for the highly competitive types within SASS. At the same time, the Traditional category could possibly be made more, well ... traditional.

The Future?

What do I mean by a more "open" category? Here are some possibilities.

Any SASS legal firearms may be

Any SASS legal ammunition may be used.

This would be the home of pump shotguns (I never felt they belonged in the Traditional category anyway, being a very late arrival on the western scene).

Maybe the currently banned '93/'97 pump would fit here since it is a modern

hybrid that was specifically designed for Cowboy Action ShootingTM.

Double-barreled shotguns may use ejectors. (Putting them on an equal footing with pumps and lever guns, which both automatically eject shells simply by opening the action).

Any shooting style may be used on any stage where appropriate. (B-Western already allows this.)

I believe these changes would, in effect, reverse the roles of the Traditional and Modern categories. No other categories would be affected. No categories would be added or eliminated. Modern would become the category of the highly competitive types within SASS. What of the Traditional Category? Well, that could/would become whatever we decide to make of it.

(While I might quarrel a bit with the history lesson, the basic idea has merit ... give it some consideration and talk with your Territorial Governor ... editor.)






BLACKPOWDER **COMPETITORS** ARE THE BEST!

exas women served many roles in helping develop the Old West. Their traditional roles in support of family life on the plains, however, underwent a significant transition during the Civil War when their husbands and older sons went off to war. They now had to care for farms and ranches on their own. During the war, unfortunately, many of their husbands and sons were killed and did not return. After the war, many women continued to develop roles as ranch owners with

TEXAS WOMEN ON THE CHISHOLM TRAIL

their own herds, some of whom went along to protect their interests when taking their herds from Texas to the railroads in Kansas to get their cattle to the northern markets.

The largely untold stories of women on trail drives surprises many and is the focus of a recently published book edited by Sara R. Massey. (Her book is referenced at the end of this article, and I credit that book for much of the material in my story.)

After the Civil War, the south had plenty of beef, but the north needed beef, and railroads had not yet reached Texas. Much could be gained if Texas beef could be taken north to Kansas to get to the railroads. That was the function of the Chisholm Trail.

The Chisholm Trail wound through Texas and the Indian Territory (Oklahoma) to Kansas. Those willing to spend two months of hardships battling weather, thieves, and Indians while moving one or two thousand ornery critters along the trail could sell their cattle for up to ten times more per head in Kansas than they could in Texas. The dangers along the way also meant all could be lost. Three women who chose to risk these dangers were Amanda Burks, Margaret Borland, and Lizzie Johnson.

Amanda Burks accompanied her husband and their herd of cattle from Texas to Kansas in 1871. Her husband died early after but, like the stories of many other women in Texas during and after the Civil War, she remained active in successfully managing their ranch and increasing its value. She died in 1931 at the age of 90, outliving her husband by 54 years. She was elected Queen of the Old Trail Drivers Association in their annual meeting in San Antonio in 1923

Margaret Borland lost her third husband in 1867 when she took on the task of managing the ranch herself. In 1872 the railroads had reached Wichita, Kansas 100 miles closer to Texas than Abilene on the Chisholm Trail and, tempted by the profits that could be made, Borland decided to take a herd of her cattle from Victoria, Texas to Wichita in 1873. Accompanying her were her 9 year old daughter, 14 and 16 year old sons, a 6 year old granddaughter, some hired hands, and a cook. She survived the perils of the trip to Wichita but died in Wichita two months after arrival, at age 49, still trying to sell her herd.

Elizabeth (Lizzie) Johnson Williams made the trip up the Chisholm Trail at least twice between 1887 and 1889. Prior to her marriage to Hezikiah Williams in 1879, she had her own herd and registered brand in 1871. After her husband registered his own herd and brand in 1881, they traveled together with their herds up the Chisholm Train. By all accounts, Lizzie was the more astute business partner of the two.



She had to help her husband get out of debt often, requiring he paid back money he owed her. In addition to her own cattle business, she provided valued accounting services to many other cattle owners. When she died in 1924 at age 84, her large estate clearly demonstrated her business acumen.

As the railroads reached ever westward, the Chisholm Trail ended closer and closer to Texas, including Abilene, Ellsworth, and Dodge City. The U.S. government closed the Chisholm Trail in 1889 as railroads were reaching Texas, and the land making up the Chisholm Trail was fenced and turned into farmland. Although the Trail ended, the diverse contributions of women in the Old West continued.

LET'S KEEP THIS SPORT FUN!

We had a great shoot at Murrumba Pistol Club, Queensland, Australia on Sunday 21 January 2007. There were 29 competitors shooting 6 stages designed by Will Penny. My wife whose Australian alias is "Dusty Rose" came under fire for her handguns loads. "Dusty" shoots .44 mag. I have shot her loads over my chronograph in her Marlin rifle, and they average about 800 fps. I expect they would be less in her 4-3/4 inch Rugers. From what I read in the SASS Handbook, the maximum velocity for rifles is 1400 fps and 1000 fps for handguns. "Dusty's" loads are way below these maximums, however one of her critics said she would be thrown out of the State Champs for using these loads. "Dusty" is very comfortable with these loads, and although there is a bit of recoil she is shooting half the stages clean. These loads suit her firearms and are very accurate at 50meters for side matches.

I am very lucky to have my wife shoot with me because we get to participate more due to the shared interest. I don't care whether shooters use light loads, blackpowder, or loads up to the limit. I don't want any shooter to be discouraged from enjoying our sport because of the comments or attitudes of fellow shooters. I find unjustified and inappropriate criticism puts people off participating.

Cowboy Action Shooting $^{\text{TM}}$ is the most fun I've had in 40 years of competitive shooting. Dusty Rose and I are not great shooters and never will be, however we love the shooting and the history of the period.

Top shooters exist because of the participation of shooters at all skill levels. I have great admiration for their skills, abilities, and dedication to put in their skill-honing practice, and I love to watch them shoot. However, without the participation of good, average, ordinary, and awful shooters, there would be no club, state, national, or international competition. I understand the arrogance that can come from experience or success, however the true winners in our sport are those that are inclusive, friendly, and helpful, and some with these attitudes also happen to be top shooters. All endeavors involving people have a mixture of those fun to be with and those that are a pain. I would much prefer to spend my time with the former.

We are lucky to have strong leadership and more fun people than the other sort. If that situation reversed, as has happened in so many other sports, the future would be uncertain.

GET BEYOND THE VITUPERATOR AND HELP FIND A SOLUTION

When a new shooter joins our ranks he must make a decision: buy the cowboy guns he always wanted or buy the ones that are competitive. There are some shooters who prefer the .38s and .32s, sure. My point is our sport should be about the guns of the Old West, and when it evolves (and it has) to a point the Colt .45 SAA and the Winchester levergun in 44WCF are not competitive anymore, we've done something wrong somewhere. What we've done is take a sport and allow it to slip into a state that greatly favors smaller calibers ... then let it stay that way until it's going to be difficult to change. We do, of course, have several options:

- 1. Continue to pretend there is not a problem (hello .32 Short Colt in a full size Freedom Arms),
- 2. Get mad at those who say we have a problem,
- Insult those who suggest changes,
- 4. Ignore those who try to stimulate debate, or
- Try to embrace the opinions of others and argue with well-articulated facts, opinions, and insights.

It has long been my opinion that

"truth" is found by meaningful and sometimes passionate debate. Often it is ultimately the minority opinion we historically recognize as "truth," and we must keep this in mind. Those who debate with insults and vindictiveness are never helpful to any debate and often deny any reasonable chance of any of us ever finding truth. We are all tempted to debate like this at some point, and this is the VERY time to step back and think about our own positions.

Now that I've said all that, I'll get back to the subject at hand and say what I think should be our end-state: Classic Cowboy guns in large calibers should be at least fairly competitive in our sport, and there should remain the potential for smaller calibers for those who prefer or need them to play the game.

So, how do we get there? It ain't by calling Tex a jerk and tossing our Chronicle in the GI can!

Why is this? I think one reason oft times overlooked is related somewhat to our own success. As people raise their standard of living, they are increasingly more willing to



SHOOTOUT IN THE SAGUAROS

 $T^{he \ time \ had \ come \ for \ me \ to \ venture}_{out \ of \ the \ comfort \ zone \ of \ my}$ monthly matches. I am going to the "Shootout in the Saguaros," Arizona Territory Championships, December 1-3, 2006.

I know a number of Combon Chronicle readers have been to numerous major shoots, some of you even travel to as many major shoots as you can afford. But like even more SASS members, regretfully, I am not in the position to go to many majors. I have been a member of SASS since February 2005 and have gone through many learning experiences and have watched my shooting improve quite a bit, still not in the real competitors category, but respectable. I still have a firm hold on my position in the bottom three (Big Smile) and having fun.

For those of you that have gone to one or more major matches I hope something I experienced will bring a smile of "I remember my first major match." Also, if I do this article right it may also encourage more of those shooters that are in my category, relatively new to the sport and of limited or fixed finances, to take the leap and plan on attending at least one of the major matches of 2007.

So let me start at the beginning, for me. A group of online Cowboy Action Shooters I have gotten to know via one or more of the cowboy forums decided to meet up in Phoenix, Arizona in July 2006 at Cowtown, the home of the Cowtown Cowboy Shooters Association (C.C.S.A.). However, before the proposed date, for a number of reasons one Pard after another had to back out. Needless to say, it didn't happen.

During this time I had been fortunate enough to cultivate some real Cowboy friendships. One was R.D. Henry, SASS #27663, who is a member of C.C.S.A. He convinced me to join him at their big annual "Shootout in the Saguaros." He even sent me an application form, and I sent my entry fee and completed form back to C.C.S.A in late September 2006.

Now the experience really begins.

First off, in the real cowboy way, R.D. offered me a place to bunk at his homestead: that was one item off my travel list. Next, I needed to make sure I have enough ammunition for all the stages and side shoots I would enter. Since I drove from San Fernando Valley, north of Los Angeles, I had to allow six to six and a half hours travel time. Got my clothes, shooters, ammo, and truck serviced for the trip ... "Okay, bring it on!" Now I had to the wait for a couple of weeks before I would leave for my first major match—exciting! though Thanksgiving was the weekend before the match, that holiday took second place in my thoughts this year. Needless to say, "I was pumped, primed, and raring to go."

When I pulled into Cowtown, not only did I see about 100 cowboys and cowgirls also ready to toe the firing line, but also a really great set-up. It was just like a western street in the movies. There was everything from a church to a gallows and from a Western Union Office to a Bawdy House. Now

this is just what my mind pictured as a shooting venue when I first heard of Cowboy Action ShootingTM. There were events I had not seen at the usual monthly matches, such as long range rifle-pistol caliber and long range rifle-rifle caliber and long range-big bore as well as speed pistol, rifle, and shotgun. Those were the events the first day, Friday, December 1, 2006.

Saturday, December 2, there were six fun stages, and for those that shoot Gunfighter, they were really friendly. I normally shoot Senior Duelist category and generally shoot double duelist, and if this weren't a major match and I hadn't already signed up as Senior Duelist, with those stages it was real tempting to try my hand at Gunfighter.

After the stages and lunch we had the Posse Shoot, another hoot if you never were involved in one before. Sixteen posse members strung out across the stage sets—pistols, rifles, shotguns, pistols, and so on. Each pistol and rifle station fired five rounds,

shotgun two rounds, and the hollered "GO" as the next person continued right down the line. The entire posse was scored as with a stage, total time plus misses. If you were on a smaller posse than sixteen members, and you shot in the first few positions, you had to run like crazy to the first open position at the end of the line where you may have to fire an already staged rifle or shotgun until all designated positions had fired. Like I said, a real hoot!

The final shoot for the day was the team shoot. Another first for me. This was a weekend of firsts-first major, first out of state, and first time to meet Pards I had only met and developed a friendship with online over a couple of years. Anyway the team event was wild—five team members, they didn't have to be from the same posse, with rifles, and we had to cut in half peeler logs, about four inches in diameter and 3-4 feet long hanging from a target setup, with bullets, Yeeee Haw! Lots of noise and lots of smoke trying to chew away wood on a target that swung with every hit.

That evening we were fed nice thick rib-eye steaks, taters, and a green salad, something to feed the belly as the day of shooting fed the child in our soul. Then the gathering of cowboys and cowgirls for the night campfire and cowboy singing; it don't get no better than that!

Sunday, December 3, the last day of the "Shootout in the Saguaros" started

out with Cowboy Church for those who wished to attend. Then we had the final four stages, after which were the man against man (or woman against woman) matches. In short, there was just about any Cowboy Action you would want to take part in.



THE STORY OF "NERVOUS" CHARLIE BEAUMONT

Tharlie was born June 6, 1844, the ✓oldest son of Robert C. and Elnora Bowman. The Bowmans had moved from the Virginia Territory about 1820 to Calloway County, Kentucky where they had a small farm raising corn, cotton, and tobacco for their own use. Mr. Bowman raised some of the finest horses in Southwestern Kentucky, and Charlie learned to ride early in life. By the time he was ten, his horsemanship was superb. He attended a one-room school where it was the custom for all to graduate their education in the 8th grade. When the Civil War started in 1861, Charlie was seventeen, and the following year he enlisted in the 3rd Kentucky Mounted Infantry.

The Confederacy had the advantage in the early part of the war by having the best cavalry units and lead-While serving under Captain

Isaiah Duncan, Charlie met a Corporal named John G. Wade who lived just one county west of his home. During Charlie's boyhood, he and his dad had blown stumps with dynamite, and that experience came in handy during the war years, where several times he was called upon to blow up bridges to cover their movement in another direction as when they crossed into Indiana in the Jeb Stuart raid. Their unit fought several engagements along the Blue Ridge Mountains and into the area near Kennesaw, Georgia. John Wade's father was a Rally Captain (since Kentucky was a neutral state, and the Federals called any help to either side illegal). He supplied guns, horses, and recruited men to the Confederacy. As the war came to a closing point in 1865, the South had exhausted most all its resources, spent most of its money, and many of the fighting units were near starving. Following Lee's surrender, the South was broke, and its soldiers came home to almost unbearable conditions, many homes burned out, and between Northern soldiers and carpetbaggers, most cupboards were bare. John Wade invited Charlie to come live with them since Mr. Wade owned over 2000 acres and could use Charlie's talent with explosives in clearing the fields of stumps.

Since slavery was now outlawed, landowners had to tell the slaves their choice was either stay in their former location and quarters, working on shares, or leave to find work wherever they could. Mr. Wade had over 100 slaves, and several chose to stay on, some left, but two demanded they be given money and horses. A very heat-

ed argument followed, and Mr. Wade, his five sons, and Charlie told them to leave. These two former slaves came after Mr. Wade, one with an ax, the other with a large Corn knife. Sam Wade, one of the sons, cut down the one with the ax with his shotgun killing him instantly, and Charlie killed the other with his Colt 1860 revolver.

Since both knew they would be hung for killing these slaves, they took the only good horses and headed south. Several weeks later, they were just south of Macon, Georgia and met a family named Harris, where a wagon train was being formed to head to Texas.

Many days were spent crossing the major rivers, and nearly a year later, they arrived in Liberty County just west of the Trinity River. Several

families chose to establish their homes there, but Charlie turned toward Beaumont where he got a job building roads and bridges.

During the war years, he had gotten the nickname of Nervous Charlie because of a slight stutter in his speech. This was far from the truth because Charlie had nerves of steel, and extremely steady hands, becoming expert in explosives. He even carried nitroglycerin several times when needed, and was never nervous doing it. But again because of his slight stutter, he was mistaken for a nervous person and the nickname "Nervous Charlie" stuck. As Charlie was running from the law, it seemed a good time to also change his name, and since Beaumont was similar sounding like Bowman, he became Charlie Beaumont for good.

There was considerable cattle in the area, so when not in the work of building, he drove cattle. First just short trips toward the towns in that area, but his hankering to see the country turned him toward Hillsboro and his friend Sam Wade. Sam and one of his younger brothers James L. Wade were discussing the land that could be settled around Fort Stockton. Sam was content where he had just built his home ranch, but James talked Charlie into traveling to Ft. Stockton for a look-see.


That area was wide open, but had a lot of Comanche and Apache in the

area of the Glass Mountains. They decided to stay, and started building a ranch immediately. Over the next few years, they settled 32 sections of land, and grazed a very large herd of cattle.

Charlie was finally at peace, far away from the killing fields of the Civil War and the explosions of battle, loving the feel of a good horse under him, and the open sky overhead, peaceful nights around the fire, and true friends. But having the desire to see more of the west, he hired on a large cattle drive going to Abilene. After that, and a year or so later, he found his way to a peaceful place called Pine Ridge where a couple of his friends had built a fort, small town, Wells Fargo office, saloon, lake, and he thought he'd stay a while until his desire to see the open range hit him again.

(Note of information regarding the article I submitted about Nervous Charlie Beaumont, SASS #67555. This is, of course, a fictional story, but is based upon a lot of facts about my life and family. As a boy, I did help my dad blow stumps with dynamite. I did enlist in the Marines at 18, served at the end of the Korean War, and was inserted into two other conflicts. I also carried nitroglycerin on my lap during my Marine service (and was not nervous, either). The stories about John, Sam, James L., and Captain James Andrew Wade are all true. And, Pine Ridge is the Cowboy Action Shooting TM club where I now belong.) .





"... you really want to know what your problem is?" he said as he took a bite of the chips and salsa that was being past around.



the hat and the buttons, I was certain to even consider the underwear would be a big mistake.



THE COWBOY

A Description (sic) of the Manners and Customs of the Native

Having spent a goodly portion of my days as a cow boy, I consider myself practically qualified to write on the subject. The boyhood sport of the cow boy is not with marbles or balls or tops, but with a lariat or rope of rawhide, with which he lassoes calves and everything animate or inanimate, over which a loop can be thrown. At seven years of age he is an expert horseman, and able to do service on the range in many ways. Between this age and manhood he acquires some knowledge of the "three R's" though seldom at school, and at sixteen is usually as good a horseman and as dexterous a roper as any man in the district.

He is never fleshy or largelimbed, is slightly bow-legged from constant riding, is endowed with more than average muscular strength, and is very active and capable of great endurdnce (sic). He is an unerring shot, and cool in time of dangar (sic). He smokes cigarittes, chews tobacco, drinks whisky, carries a six shooter, and is guilty of many vices that would, if enumerated shock the embezzeler (sic) and stock gambler of civilized regions. He is not more quarrelsome than man in general but, unfortunately, his quarrels are apt to result in homicide.

The property of the cow boy is a wiry pony, a saddle and a lariat. The pony or "plug" is of Spanish stock, active and enduring. It is a stranger to the touch of currycomb and brush, and don't know corn from beans. The saddle is a ponderous affair of wood and leather, weighing

from ten to fifteen younds (sic). It has a pommel varying in diameter from three to six inches. Costly saddles sometimes have silver stars plentifully besprinkled on available parts of their surface. Two girths or sinches are necessary to hold the saddle firmly in position—a forward and a flank girth. The lariat is about forty feet long, and is composed of eight pliable rawhide hongs plaited into a rope bout half an inch in diameter. At one end is a ring; and at the other a loop to fit over the saddle pommel.

The wardrobe of the cow boy is unique. He wears a broad-brimmed straw or wool hat. His jacket is of ducking, his shirt of calico or hickory, and his pantaloons of some stout stuff over which are worn leather leggings. Heavy boots with high heels, to which are attached a pair of spurs with two inch rowels, complete his outfit. When the weather is threatening, he straps behind his saddle a slicker of oiled linen, which reaches from head to heels.

Thus accoutered, the cow boy is ready for business. He is employed either to drive a herd to Kansas or to look after those on the range. The spring is his harvest time. Then the great herds are put up for the drive. This is the season, too, when the annual round-up occurs, for the purpose of apportioning the unmarked calves and yearlings among the owners of stock on the range, that they may be branded with the particular device adopted by each as his distin-


The cow boy's life is not an easy one. During the whole year he is in the saddle from daylight until dark. His diet is bread, bacon and coffee. When on the trail, in addition to driving during the day, he is compelled to guard the cattle during a part of the night, the force being

divided into three reliefs for this purpose. In case of a stampede he must ride night and day.

In spite of all this, the cow boy is healthy and cheerful. No one is more hospitable, and his bravery is proverbial. But he is a relic of barbarism and must go, and the places that have known him will not mourn his departure, for he is too much addicted to "whooping 'em up."

CHAMPIONSHIP WAX MATCH CRITIQUE

No varnish here folks, just the plain facts. The 2006 World Indoor Championship Match shooting wax bullets was a success in every way! The venue was the 2006 SASS Convention in the lobby of the Las Vegas Riviera Hotel, December 7-9. Close to a hundred shooters enjoyed nine stages over a three-day period. Many had not experienced wax bullets before and quickly realized this tried and proven way of shooting (wax bullets and primer propellant only) opens up many more fun settings at home. Shoot wax in the basement, garage, in or behind the barn, or, even in the lobby of a hotel! After watching and understanding how the game went, many spectators wished they had signed up. You can bet a buck or two next year they and many more will compete and not miss out on this kind of fun.

Everything went very well except for several minor items that need to

addressed. Shooting only three stages per day was good; each flight required less than two hours. Since many more folks will sign up next year, this schedule will probably be repeated to accommodate more than the three flights of this year's match. Nine different stages were set up. The targets were about 10'-12' away. Most stages were 10, 10, and 2 shots. Next year we might think about setting up three different stages for the first day. Then shoot the same three stages each of the remaining two days. Before the beginning of the third day every shooter will have learned the idiosyncrasies of the three stages, and we will witness a lot more clean shoots.

Shotgun — Things could not have gone better with the shotgun phase. The Ten-X special plastic shell hulls performed as expected, both loading and ejection. I did not witness a single shotgun primer (Continued on next page)

fault. Oh sure, we may have missed a few targets, but it certainly wasn't the gun's fault!



brass cartridge cases worked well loading and ejecting. The modified 5in-1 brass cartridge fit a rifle chambered for .45 caliber, but pushed a .38 caliber wax bullet down the .45 bore. This resulted in very little wax buildup in the groves between the rifling. The targets were close enough the difference between .45 and .38 had little effect on the trajectory of the wax bullet. We did experience some problems in the feeding process. Small wax particles may have built up over time in the rifle cartridge tube. This could have caused the lever action problems we experienced late in the match. Sometimes it took several actions of the lever to bring the cartridge into the breech. I understand more than one new cartridge design is in the process of testing. A new plastic case designed by Ten-X looks good and another brass case by Bandit Shooting Supplies looks promising. I did not witness a single primer failure in a rifle.

Revolvers – The same modified 5-in-1 Ten-X brass cartridge cases were used to push a .38 caliber wax bullet down a .45 pistol barrel. Paired single action guns from a number of popular vendors were provided. The action of all the guns appeared to have been tuned up; perhaps a bit too much, though. We experienced occasional primers that were clearly indented, but didn't fire. Were the hammer springs too light? We also experienced some problems with the standard large pistol primers. After being fired, some of

the primers backed out against the rear frame of the revolver and prevented the cylinder from rotating smoothly ... referred to as a "primer back-out." The problems were inconsistent and not necessarily confined to any single gun manufacturer. It is suggested the use of magnum large pistol primers may resolve this problem. To the best of my knowledge only CCI and Federal make a "true" magnum large pistol primer.

Pards, take these comments as they are intended - positive. If everything was repeated exactly as it unfolded in 2006, count on me to be there next year. Only I promise to hit a few more targets! .





Blood on the Tracks: Earp vs. Stilwell

MARCH 20, 1882

With the recent killing of Morgan Earp by assassins, Wyatt Earp spends his 34th birthday attending to the details of shipping his brother's remains home to California.

With Morgan's body safely out of the territory, Wyatt, his younger brother Warren, Doc Holliday, and two other hand-picked men accompany Virgil Earp (who is still weak from an assassination attempt in December) and his wife, Allie, to Tucson, Arizona.

Guarded by Wyatt and his men, Virgil and Allie are transported by buckboard to Contention City where they board the train.

Switching trains in Benson, the party has a little over an hour ride to Tucson, and it is dusk as the passenger train slows down for its approach. Tucson is lit up as the city's modern gas lighting system has been turned on for the first time. Celebratory shots can be heard as the engine glides into the station.

Under the veranda of the brand new Porter Hotel, Ike Clanton and Frank Stilwell watch the passengers detrain.

Stepping off the train, Doc Holliday carries two shotguns, which he deposits in the depot office, as the Earp party makes its way to the dining room in the Porter Hotel.

After finishing their meals, the Earp party walks back to the train and retrieves the shotguns from the depot office. Wyatt and his men say their goodbyes to Virgil and Allie, and are ticketed on an eastbound train for the trip back to Benson.


While waiting for the train to move out, a passenger allegedly informs Wyatt that Stilwell and Clanton are lurking near the hotel and may plan on shooting Virgil through the train window as the train goes by.

Bristling with shotguns and rifles, the Earp bodyguards, led by Wyatt, run down the train tracks, straight for Stilwell who is standing near the southeast corner of the hotel.

Stilwell runs for his life. In the lead, Wyatt chases Stilwell for about 100 yards (saloonkeeper George Hand claimed it was a few hundred yards).



The train carrying the Earp party from Benson chugs into the newly built Tucson train station at dusk. The Southern Pacific built a modern, two-story depot with an adjacent hotel, all in wood, making the state-of-the-art buildings two of only several buildings in the Old Pueblo not made of adobe.

"I ran straight for Stilwell," Wyatt later recounted. "It was he who killed my brother. What a coward he was. He couldn't shoot when I came near him. He stood there helpless and trembling for his life. As I rushed upon him he put out his hands and clutched at my shotgun. I let go both barrels, and he tumbled down dead and mangled at my feet."

Other shots are heard, but many of the locals assume it is more of the gas light celebration.

As the train carrying Virgil chugs out of the station, Wyatt runs up to the cars, holding up one finger and mouthing the words, "One for Morgan." Virgil and Allie glide by in the darkness. .





If you looked into the gruesome inner depths of my file cabinets, you'd find a bewildering assortment of spur strap patterns. If you look closely though, you'll actually see only five basic *styles*.

The most modest style came from military origins. The ordinary military spur had no spur buttons. Instead, it had a couple of slots in the ends of the heel band and a long,

narrow strap was simply wound in an out of these, under the boot's shank and back around where it would buckle on the side of the foot. Not much else was needed to distribute the weight of the typically light military spur—though I have seen examples where a small "bib" (wider piece of leather) was looped into the strap to distribute weight and to further protect the delicate parts of the instep.

As the frontier expanded, the Mexican spurs and Texas-type spurs began their treks northward. These heavier spurs required a wider strap to distribute weight over the instep and to hold them in place. I'm not 100% certain on this, but by my readings and understandings of how cowboy gear evolved, it seems the strap and bib and dove-wing types of spur strap came into use virtually at the same time. I'm

hazarding this guess based on examples of very old and finely crafted spurs and straps I have seen photos of as well as an idea on frontier conditions.

The strap and bib type of spur strap came as an off-shoot of the "bibbed" military type, still a twopiece spur strap but with distinct differences. The bib is large and cut on a curve to fit the instep comfortably. One end has a buttonhole incorporated into it (either punched through or hidden in the form of a tab stitched or riveted beneath a concho) and the other has a set of two slots or a loop which act as a retainer to keep the billet (strap) in the correct position. A buckle is attached into the center area of the bib completing the assembly. The billet portion is a straight piece of leather with a swelling on one end into which a buttonhole was (Continued on next page)

punched. To wear, the billet is threaded through the slots or retainer loop and buckled. The buckle was generally worn on the outside of the foot, especially if there was a concho the cowboy was proud of. In the early years, the buckle was oriented "straight" on the bib. This aligned the end of the billet squarely over the concho in a straight line. In later vears—most definitively through the Hollywood era-this placement of the billet was altered by angling the buckle so the billet shot to one side thereby allowing for full view of both buckle and concho simultaneously. This latter style of strap and bib spur strap is often referred to as "Visalia," "Hollywood," or sometimes as "Bohlin."

The dove-wing spur strap is a large, heavily-contoured single piece of leather with a buttonhole on one end and generally three evenlyspaced buttonholes on the other. There is no buckle. This is the simplest of the spur straps and was an elegant and efficient way to make spur straps on a frontier where shipments of hardware and other goods would have been intermittent at best and impossible at worst. It would also have been the easiest strap for a poor man to whittle out of an old boot top or to come up with as an emergency replacement. Teddy Roosevelt wore dove-wings.

The fourth style of strap is one commonly referred to as a "bucklethrough." It is likely the most popular type today. It is a two-piece type. The strap portion is a single piece of leather with the billet on one end and a buttonhole on the other. The center portion of this strap can be narrow and quite straight or heavily contoured depending on the personal preferences of the puncher or the heft of his spurs. The other part of the spur strap is a short, folded piece of leather with a buttonhole in one end and a buckle on the other. This strap can be worn either buckle in or out depending on the whim of the waddie or investment in conchos or fancy buckles.

Because the billets on bucklethrough spurs wear out while there's still life in the remainder of the strap, you sometimes see repairs where a slot is punched into the body of the strap and a new billet is inserted and riveted in place. You also see some manufacturers doing this. To use up as little leather as possible, making a buckle-through body from two smaller pieces rather than one big one made sense. It also allowed the manufacturer to use their strap and bib's bib-cutting die for buckle-throughs as well as the bib style giving them more versatility. (These guys weren't dumb!)

The fifth style is a hybrid type, a spur strap made with the bib of the

strap and bib but with a twist. In the hybrid type, the billet is attached to a long, contoured bib by a combination of slots and stitching while the buckle portion is styled after the buckle-through type. This arrangement makes the spur strap work like a buckle-through but with it's elongated bib, look more like a strap and bib. It is worn buckle to the outside of the foot and offers a lot of protection and weight distribution over the foot. Collins Brothers show it in their catalogue, and it was used to great effect by Tom Selleck in "Quigley." I believe this spur strap was mostly used in the Great Plains area of Wyoming and surrounding territory as I have not encountered it anywhere else.

So ... what spur strap goes with what? The general rule of thumb seems to be the spur strap body should suit the spur. Heavy spurs require heavy straps while lightweight spurs should go to narrower, lighter straps. Old style strap and bibs are suited for all heavy spurs of any region and era while the newer "Hollywood" type is generally associated with California style spurs in the 20th century. Dove-wings suit all heavy spurs and any region or time while the buckle-throughs cover the post trail drive era. They are generally associated with Texas and Mexican style spurs though they do appear on modern California spurs nowadays. The shortshanked, modern "arena" spurs favor buckle-through types and military spurs need appropriate military styles. The hybrids favor the heavier spurs found in the northern plains area in the late 1880's. Plain, stamped or carved choices in those days would have depended on the tastes of the individual as well as how deep his "poke" was. Keep in mind plain was always good, borderstamping good from the 70's to the late 19th century where they were displaced slowly and steadily by geometric "checker" stamps. Carving was always tasteful for any style and era along with appropriate plain steel, brass, nickel, or silver buckles and conchos.

riding on his ass bringing diggings to the assayer office. When someone tries to hold him up, the shooting starts. But, you have to watch out so you don't shoot your ass, Aloysius. It says in Deuteronomy 22:4 "thou shalt not see thy brother's ass or his ox fall down by the way, and hide thyself from them; thou shalt surely help him to lift them up again." So in Cowboy Action ShootingTM thou






shalt not see thy brother cowboy shoot his ass and hide thyself from it; thou shalt surely assess a ten second penalty to thy brother. The donkey silhouette is made out of 1/4 inch steel plate and shooting it earns a 10 second penalty.


The target frame stands around four foot high. The target hangs down around 20 inches from a truck that rides in a sliding barn door rail that is around nine foot long. The truck is made up of two barn door trolleys; one on either end of a steel hanger around 16 inches long. The garage door opener is mounted just above the barn door rail and is attached to the target by a connecting arm. There is a button on the firing line building doorway the shoot-

er pushes at the beep. The target is then engaged with revolvers, taking care to shoot around the body or between the steed's legs.

The opener and rail are protected by treated lumber and lightweight steel. The whole assembly has a piece of steel roofing over it to protect it from the elements.

There were problems with heat build up. I shortened the length of travel down from seven feet to around five feet. Slots were cut in the motor shroud and a small fan was mounted

to cool the motor. To keep action moving, I mounted a flipper activated by the target to break the safety beam before the opener reaches the stop limit. This returns the target to home, or up position on the opener.

We are still fine tuning it. The donkey was moved so as to allow an average shooter to empty one revolver before the target goes behind its behind. Aloysius was raised around seven inches to make a shot between the legs more feasible. Shooters seem to love the action. So shoot straight and keep your "donkey" out of harm's way! .





THE .44 HENRY RIMFIRE CARTRIDGE: THE ROUND THAT OPENED THE OLD WEST

We think of .45 Colt Peacemakers and 1873 Winchesters in .44-40 as being the guns and calibers that tamed the west. You must consider the fact the critical period of expansion in the West was from the end of the Civil War in 1865 until the mid-1870s. After that, the cattle drives were over, and the railroads were already crossing the continent, not just in the north and south, but everywhere in-between! Almost all of the major Indian battles had been fought by 1878. Even the once vast herds of buffalo were also almost extinct by 1878. Past this point, progress was just filling in the gaps with a flood of homesteaders and immigrants looking for a better life than the crowded, squalid cities the East and Midwest had to offer. Even this period of influx was short lived. In 1893, Frederick Jackson Turner claimed the Western Frontier was gone. He based this idea on the census of 1890 that reported there was no longer a distinctive "frontier line" in the United States.

With this perspective, consider then the 1873 Winchester was not readily available until 1875 (by the end of 1874 only 126 rifles had shipped) and before 1878, only about 22,000 had been manufactured! Even by 1883, only 81,000 of the 1873 Winchesters had been produced. That was less than half of the number of 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchesters produced between 1861 and 1873. As for revolvers, the seemingly ubiquitous Colt Peacemaker did not become generally issued with most troops until 1875, and became available to

the public around the same time. Prior to the introduction of the 1873 Single Action Army in the .45 Colt cartridge, Colt produced their 1872 Open Top revolver in .44 Henry!

What guns opened the West during this crucial ten to twelve year post-Civil War era? The Military rifles of that time ranged from Civil War frontstuffers to various cartridge guns in calibers such as .56-50 Spencer, .50-70 Government, and at the end .45-70. The military handguns until the mid-1870s were .44 Colt and Remington percussion revolvers. All of these guns saw widespread civilian usage, also. It was a large, diverse assortment.

I believe, however, the .44 Henry rimfire cartridge was one of the most

the expansion era of 1865 to 1875. While the use of various Spencer cartridges (.56-56, .56-50, and .46-50) were widespread in both surplus military and new civilian Spencer rifles and carbines, the .44 Henry

guns still outnumbered them.

There were four main firearms manufactured in .44 rimfire caliber during this period that could be found all through the West: the 1860 Henry rifle, the 1866 Winchester rifle and carbine, the 1872 Colt Open-Top revolver, and the 1873 Colt Single Action Army (in .44 rimfire). Their combined production numbered almost 200,000 guns. A fifth, the Smith and Wesson top break No. 3 "American Model" revolvers were produced in .44 rimfire also, but I do not believe it was a long term, general production firearm. Many percussion revolvers were also converted to the .44 rimfire by gunsmiths in the post-Civil War years. Homesteaders, travelers, cowboys, and even the Indians

hunted and fought with all of these guns until the turn of the Century and beyond.

The 1860 Henry Rifle and its Cartridge

The first was the Henry rifle. The development of the Henry by Oliver Winchester gave birth to the .44 Henry rimfire cartridge. This is the gun that fathered the cartridge, and the experiences with it demonstrate the effect of it and its cartridge on the opening of the West.

In the late 1850s, all shoulder arms were single shot. Most were "front stuffers" that required loading each shot by pouring powder down the barrel, ramming a single bullet down with a ram rod, then priming the nipple with a percussion cap. Needless to say, this made repeat shots VERY slow!

Oliver Winchester saw the potential a repeating rifle design had. He bought the Volcanic Arms Co., renamed it New Haven Arms Co., and set out to improve on the design. He

wisely employed Volcanic's Superintendent, an inventor named B. Tyler Henry. Winchester knew the Volcanic repeater's shortcoming was the extremely underpowered ammunition, that also had a really nasty habit of going off in the under barrel magazine. Winchester put Henry in charge of ammunition development.

In 1858, Henry patented a .44 caliber rim fire cartridge. It utilized a copper case with a priming compound in the folded rim, much like a modern day .22 LR cartridge. The powder charge was 26 grains of blackpowder behind a 216-grain conical bullet. The bullet was a "healed" design, which is where the bullet is the same diameter as the cartridge case. To attach the bullet to the case, the base of the bullet is rebated, this smaller diameter portion being crimped inside the case (also like a modern .22 LR round). The original Henry rounds moved out at between 1100 and 1150 fps. It would prove very popular during its time.

Winchester coupled this cartridge with a modification of the old Volcanic rifle. In 1860, the Henry Repeating Rifle was born. It was a heavy firearm, tipping the scales at almost nine pounds! The majority of this weight was in the barrel and magazine, which was machined out of a single, solid forged piece of steel over two feet long. The Henry rifle had an exposed hammer and finger lever like the earlier Volcanic. Rather than a cartridge-loading gate on the side of the receiver like later designs, the Henry loaded from the muzzle end of the magazine tube. Another distinctive feature of the Henry is the absence of a wood forearm.

The new Henry rifle held an unprecedented 15 shots in the magazine, and one more in the chamber. In a world full of single shot muzzle loaders, this was unbelievable firepower! The Henry rifle earned a muchdeserved reputation for awesome firepower! While a muzzleloader is capable of several shots a minute, the new Henry rifle was capable of an unbelievable one aimed shot every second! Winchester capitalized on this with some rather fanciful advertising. He said the Henry was the most effective firearm in the world. He also said: "A resolute man, armed with one of these [Henry] rifles, particularly if on horseback, can not be taken!"

Production of the Henry began very slowly, with only a couple of thousand rifles being completed by 1862. Some early production rifles had a forged iron receiver, but the majority of the Henry rifles were produced with the more familiar brass receiver. With its expensive machining of the one-piece barrel and magazine tube, the rifles sold for the incredibly high sum of \$42! Ammunition was \$10 a thousand. This was a princely amount in 1860. Winchester tried to interest the Ordnance Board with his new repeat-

ing rifle. In 1862, the "Great Conflagration" of the Civil War was in full swing. Even with encouraging ordnance test that showed the Henry bullet imbedding itself 5" into a wood target at 400 yards, the official reception was less than enthusiastic. The Board felt there was no advantage to a repeating rifle!

While not officially accepted for general issue, just fewer than 2,000 were ordered for some select units. The First District of Columbia Cavalry and 66th Illinois Infantry were armed with Henry rifles, and several times defeated much larger Confederate forces. Private sales to Union troops, however, far outstripped the government sales. Winchester could not keep up with the orders coming in. Fully 11,000 of the 13,000 Henry rifles produced during the war were used in the conflict. The Confederates called it "that damn Yankee gun that you load on Sunday, and shoot 'till Wednesday!" Even with this, Union military bureaucrats did not take the Henry rifle seriously.

Out West is where the Henry really became a household word. While some Henry rifles went west during the war, most migrated with the displaced and restless former soldiers as they journeyed west for their fortunes and adventures. It was not long until the Henry gained a reputation as a fearsome weapon, both with the settlers and the Native American warriors. The braves, accustomed to military single shot muzzle-loaders, were stunned by their encounters with the "white eyes" armed with the firepower of the Henry rifles. They referred to it as "the Spirit Gun of many shots" or simply "the Spirit Rifle."

The 1866 Winchester

In 1866, Oliver Winchester stopped producing the Henry rifle in favor of his new "King's patent improved Henry," the 1866 Winchester. It was essentially a Henry with the barrel and the magazine tube being separate pieces, and a loading gate on the side of the familiar brass receiver to make loading easier. It had the improvement of an enclosed magazine, rather than the slotted bottom of the Henry that allowed dirt and debris into the magazine. This also allowed the use of a wooden forearm, preventing burns on the hand from grasping the Henry's bare, hot barrel.

This 1866 proved to be more popular than the Henry. A total of 170,000 1866 Winchesters were manufactured between 1866 and 1898. Of these, probably 95% were produced between 1866 and 1873. The 1866 came in both carbine and rifle versions. The handy carbine was a favorite of those on horseback. It had a 20" barrel and the magazine held 13 rounds of the .44 rimfire. The rifle came with a 24" barrel, in both round and octagonal configurations. The rifle held 16 rounds, and was referred to as "sixteen shoot-

MINIMUM RECOIL LOADS SEND WRONG MESSAGE IN EUROPE

For me, Cowboy Action ShootingTM
means we shoot our guns
the way those ol' role models of ours
from yesteryear did—and they used
full loads in their
(blackpowder) ammunition!!

We all know and love the scenario ... the crowd waits breathlessly – tension is tangible in the air – seconds seem to crawl by one by one ... not a breeze is stirring, and the sun beats down on the backs and the wide brimmed hats of the people sanding around!

Dust still lingers in the air that was kicked up by the last skirmish just a few minutes ago and starts to settle slowly on the clothing and gleaming leather gear of the bystanders who carefully keep their distance as the cowboy steps forward to make his play ... he knows the next minutes – or seconds if he is fast enough – will tell the tale at the end of this show-down!

The man next to him asks "are you ready?" – and there it is – the BEEEP of the timer in the hand of the RO close to his ear that sends him into immediate action to complete this "stage" in the shortest possible time ...

The game we are playing here is Cowboy Action Shooting TM – a game that is rapidly spreading around the world and takes us back to the days when the West was still "wild" and a significant part of American history was in the making!

But today there is yet another aspect to this game. The avid fans of this wonderful pastime (most of them!) dress to the "t" in authentic clothing and gear, depicting the past as well as they can and shoot the old guns (or accurate copies of these old firearms) to relive those times gone by in this family oriented sport.

But nowadays there seems to be a trend to – in my opinion – weaken things down a little (or a lot, the way I look at it!). Sure, folks dress up to look like cowboys, soldiers, store keepers, bankers, and so forth, but the point I am heading for is the ammunition they are using in their guns. Nobody in those days we love to depict would have even thought about "downloading" their ammo to "lessen recoil" or to try to be faster

than the next guy – if you shot at something in those days, you wanted it to GO DOWN!! Period!!

And, that is exactly what I am getting at. Targets we shoot at should go DOWN – if it were up to me I would have knockdown targets ONLY at all higher level matches, with no exceptions!! For me personally "the ding" on that piece of steel is not enough. All targets should be hit hard enough to put them DOWN!

I look at and read about all the little knacks to get even less recoil out of our guns – the latest "hit" on my list is that wonderful idea of a ".45 Special" for use in what, in my eyes, should be a "real gun" – a power packing .45!! What is special about that "wimp" .45 special?? Is it making a little noise while feebly pushing a bullet down range a few yards to make a polite little "ding" on a steel target? Would any of you want to (have to) use this kind of ammo in protecting yourself or your loved ones?? Or, to bag some game for the cooking pot?

I don't think so ... I am not only an avid Cowboy Action Shooting $^{\text{TM}}$ and have been a competitive shooter, including long range (up to 1000 yards!) all my life, I also have been a hunter all my life, and let me assure you, I do not hunt solely to bag trophies for my den. I EAT whatever I shoot – all of it.

I make no difference when loading my ammo, whether it be for the field, or for recreational shooting no matter whether I go hunting or am on my way to a Cowboy Action Shooting[™] event – I just pick up the guns of my choice suitable for the occasion, grab the appropriate caliber ammo off the shelf, and head out. I have no different ammo for hunting than for Cowboy Action ShootingTM. I use blackpowder when loading for both cases, hunting and Cowbov Action ShootingTM. My .45 cases contain 32 grains of GOEX fffg behind a 250-grain lead bullet. My .38 Colt packs 22 grains of GOEX fffg behind a 158-grain lead bullet. My shotgun shells hold 85 grains GOEX fffg ... Do those targets (whatever they may be) go down? They sure do!!

To be honest – after seeing these



ever lighter loads coming along in the last few years, I will not be surprised when one of the guys shows up at the range with air guns ... That sure will be low recoil and the "ding" should still be discernable ... as long as I don't groan too loud!


Yeah, sure, I know this is a game we are playing – but how far are we willing to deviate from where we came from??

present at the 2006 SASS Convention in Las Vegas – used REAL guns of the Old West – and used REAL ammo in them!! NO "downloads" to give 'em an edge, no idea of lessening recoil – they got out there and shot those old guns the way they were, for the fun of it!!

And the fun they had is basically the fun we are having today – some of us are just watering the ingredients down a bit (or a lot the way I see it!).

My plea is – Folks, lets play "Cowboys an' Injuns" the (Continued on next page)

way we did it long ago – no, NOT with "cap guns" - but with real shootin' irons, real clothing, and real attitude – and REAL AMMO!!

If you want the feel and the recoil of a .22- well SHOOT one ... don't go for a .45 and wimp it down!

You know something else? We might just be tripping ourselves up a bit here in the long run as well.

restrict us to using .22 caliber guns and 20 gauge shotguns. Why? Well one of the guys reading The Combang Chronicle came up with the idea that, quote, "Most of your cowboys do not feel comfortable with those heavy guns and "aggressive loads!" - Unquote.

I asked him "what the hell ...??" and he calmly shows me the ads in The Combon Chronicle where ammo is offered, "factory made," with bullet

tant jobs. I found a shooting range that seemed to fit our needs and got in touch with the managers and club officials for that range. They had heard about our sport, but were not really familiar with it, so I told them a lot about what we enjoy doing and left a few copies of The Cowboy Chronicle with them when I left. I always do that because the written word and a bunch of pictures always help to show what I am talking about. Besides that, I always "look the part." (You know something else - sometimes it makes you wonder - A young punk walking down the street with nails in his head everywhere and orange and blue hair, what is left that has not been shaved off, attracts less attention from other pedestrians than I do when I walk the same street and look like an American Cowboy ... but back to the subject).

A few days later I went back to the range to talk to them again, and what do you know, they have been thinking about what I said and are considering letting us "do that cowboy kind of thing here." Then down comes the hammer – they want to weights of from 78 gr. (.32) to 130 gr. (.357) and cites the article on that ".45 Special" that is alleged to have "about the same recoil as felt in a .22!"

Now these people I am talking to are expert enough to realize what kind of "power" is developed in these downloads with those light bullets. And in addition, they are avid fans of the Olympic shooting disciplines so their way of looking at it is -Nothing larger than .22 is "needed" or used in biathlon or the other shooting events for the Olympics, (they steered away real quick when I mentioned trap and skeet events at those games!), the cowboys in the literature I gave them were talking about reducing loads and "slicking" up guns to be better able to compete in a "purely sporting event" - so it was logical to them we need only to use "sensibly sized guns" to compete and enjoy our sport - hence their willingness to let Cowboy Action ShootingTM be introduced to their ranges - but using only the small bore "sensible" firearms that "are good enough for the Olympics" - and should surely, therefore, be good enough for us. Their question: "Who really NEEDS a gun with a bore diameter of 11.34 millimeters? That's a small cannon!!

My answer to them, "No dice folks, I'll keep looking around for another range ...".

The first jump I take flat gallop, then head straight down a hill for several hundred yards. I just LOVE galloping downhill. Reminds me of chasing cattle as a kid in the Outback. The thought occurs to me, however, that I shouldn't be here. My horse, Tower, is 24 years old, and has been laid up for a year. I am 64 years old (and I've had so many crashes I should have been PUT DOWN years ago!!), AND we are racing against a team lead by the celebrated Cynthia Shea, who has NEVER lost this race. Her partner is Kathleen Lorden, also a solid rider. Her name appears twice on the winner's cup. Kathleen is on a fine mount, Geronimo, aged 15.


More bad reality: I outweigh Cynthia Shea by 60 lbs. Her horse, Artic, is 12 years younger than my horse, and I am 25 years older than Cynthia!

But, I am here because I told my good friend, Michael Zacha, hosting this race meet, that I would at least show up. I could always pull Tower if he didn't feel right! At least, that's what I told myself.

Behind me somewhere is my partner, retired steeplechase jockey Jimmy Duggan. I had planned to ride with Hunt Master Mitch Jacobs. But, he pulled out an hour before the race when he was reminded by his very sensible wife, Linda, that he was still not recovered from injures endured in a crash months ago.

I am honored to be on the same team as Jimmy Duggan. He is a legend. You will see him on TVG, commentating on steeplechase and timber races.

At the starting line Jimmy had asked me, "How should we do it? What's your strategy; what's your

"Style? I'm from the bush. I have no style. I point at stuff and go as fast as I can. Speed is my friend."

We are on the Point To Point. Fastest time. Two miles, a dozen solid jumps. The first event of the annual race meet of the West Hills Hunt Club, here at the spectacular Zacha Rosa Ranch in California's Santa Monica Mountains.

It has been said if you are lucky, you will own one great horse. Never paid much attention to that. Thought all my horses were great, one way or another.

But saddling Tower on this day, I had a feeling something unusual was going to happen. He is 17 hands, a powerful horse, but when I sat on him, I felt his heart beating like I had never felt it before. He was amped! He took off like he was shot from a cannon.



We cross the finish line, and I slide off my mighty horse, and now my legs are so like jelly I can barely stand. Tower nuzzles me, and I give him a slap on his neck. A couple of old guys, I thought, but we made it.

At that moment I recalled what an old Outback stockman once told me—all thoroughbreds are always fit, by their nature. Tower had spent the past year on a two-acre hillside, amusing himself by chasing the other horses up and down the slope. So he kept himself fit.

That night, I would learn we won

by nine seconds.

I left the Awards Banquet early to check on Tower. There he was, laid out, not moving. A horrifying thought, "Oh, no, he's dead!" Then I saw his ribs going up ... and down. He was sleeping so soundly he didn't even lift his head when I stood at his side. Then he opened one eye, for just a beat. Yes, I thought to myself, THIS is the one great horse in MY life!

hill now, a sharp left. I lose my stirrups. No matter. I level the horse and take two quick jumps with no stirrups, grabbing so much mane that I pull out a clump in my hand.

About now I wish I was a little fitter. I am wearing my sweats because I couldn't fit into my riding pants this morning. But I am comforted by the fact Jimmy Duggan's vest looks a little tight too. Regardless, he's 25 years younger than myself!

A coop, a log, a tabletop. The jumps pass under me like no obstacles at all. Breathe, I tell myself. My arms feel weak. Or, maybe Tower is just pulling so hard. I am barely in control. But he feels great, and I feel exhilarated. I give up the fight and just let him go.

Jimmy is coming up behind me now. He is also flying, and has lost his reins. The thought occurs to me – a veteran of 2,000 steeplechases shouldn't lose his reins. But then, this is not exactly steeplechase. All the steeplechase courses I've been on had no ditches, or jumps over ditches, or jumps up hill, or jumps down hill. They're all flat! I make a mental note on Jimmy Duggan – this Irishman sure can ride!

After this race I learned Jimmy Duggan hadn't taken a jump in 12 years. Hadn't taken a drink in 12 years either. When I invited him at the start of this race to take a hit from my hunt flask, he declined explaining, "I'm allergic to the stuff."

"Allergic?" I query.

"Yeah, whenever I drink alcohol, I break out in handcuffs." He's Irish, I thought. That explains all. He's drunk his fair share.

Jimmy is riding Mitch Jacobs' horse, Max, a strong jumper. I discover there's a lot to shout about, when you're doing Point To Point with a partner. I'm yelling at Duggan because I think he's going too slowly, and he's yelling at me for riding like I'm out of control. Right, I thought. Maybe I am! Exhaustion is about all that will control THIS horse!

More jumps. More down hill, cross a road, another down hill, a yawning ditch, jump off a bank, then a quick right, then a left, and more jumps, one of them over a 4 ft timber log. I'm leading, and Tower is feeling incredible. It is as if I am floating somewhere over his withers.

Pull out of another series of jumps, cross a road again, then a last high hill climb. Now, I feel Tower staggering, his legs giving way, stride shortening. Jimmy yells, "Move over! Move over! I'll pull him along!"

Duggan passes me, and Tower lifts in his stride, eager not be left behind. Right there, I thought,

funds, to establishing rules governing the amount of water in your new toilet. But this, too, comes with a price, and the cost when government gets involved is not only tax money, but freedom as well.

The difference between hiring others to provide services for me and asking the government to provide services is I could fire all those personal service providers and perform the functions myself if I chose, but there is no firing the government. What I give up for every government service is yet another small piece of freedom-and those freedoms are surrendered, not bartered. "I will provide for you, but here are the conditions imposed" is the gist of government's deal. You must abide by their multitude of government rules and regulations, all designed to enhance government's power and control over the people.

How does government sell this to Americans? One method we've all seen that government uses to impose itself in our life is to fabricate a crisis designed to scare the daylights out of folks; propose a solution "only government can provide," sell it hard, and vilify those in opposition until a short-sighted public finally screams for government to "do something," and then the politi-

cians magnanimously step up to the plate and abide by the will of the American people—attaching strings in the process, of course. Example: America's education crisis. Nowhere in our Constitution does it outline a role for the federal government to do anything about education, yet Washington offers itself up as the messiah of our education system with tax dollars in hand. hands of the general public that is.



brim of my Stetson and ran the short distance to where I was to shoot. I stood on a red spray-painted patch of grass and reached for my stainless hog-leg. The revolver came up to the target and BANG! ding! BANG! ding! BANG! no ding! Missed that one. BANG! ding! BANG! ding! I holstered, drew my second revolver and unloaded it on five more targets, missing two. I shoved the gun into the leather mouth of its holster and shifted to the wagon. I snatched two shells from my belt and stuffed them into the double barrels of the shotgun. After knocking down four targets this way, I hastily returned the shotgun and shouldered my rifle. I hit all nine.

After my final ding, the Civil War solider with the timer turned to two cowboys and an Indian. "Spotters?" he asked. They each held up three fingers, indicating three misses. I strolled over to the unloading table, where a bargirl in a corset greeted me. Accompanied by a Victorian woman with puffy sleeves and a bustle. we chatted about my Bearcats as I removed the empties. There were ten such stages with different Western scenarios, all making one feel like real cowbov.

That was a great shoot. I won first place Junior Girl State Champion for both costuming and shooting. I admit I was the only twelve-year-old cowgirl there, but that was surprising because





people come from all over to compete. I was not there, however, as Elizabeth Kitchens. I was under my alias, as everyone had one. I introduced myself as Mojave Wildflower. I hardly knew anyone's "normal person's" name.

Later, I went back to our campsite with my father, known as Henry McKenna. He had our white walltent up with deer horns strapped right over the doorway. A Marine Corps flag was stationed beside a wooden table and matching chair. The table held a candle and two old jugs. Dad always tried his best to make everything look authentic whenever he came to shoots. Ornery Ellen, my sister, climbed out of the chair to help Dad clean his guns. I stole her seat and began working on my own messes.

Later, I set the shining pistols beside the flaming candle. I took off my boots and propped my tired feet next to the gleaming objects. Ellen was asleep against a tree and Dad was finishing up his guns. I felt like the luckiest cowgirl in the West. If you ever drop by, look me up, but don't ask for my real name. Nobody will know who "Elizabeth" is! Folks just call me Mojave.

21 Feb 1853 Congress passes the Coinage Act, authorizing the minting of three-dollar gold pieces.

6 Feb 1854 Texas passes a law allowing the United States to pick two Indian sites for reservations within the state. One will be located on the Main Fork of the Brazos River, the other on the Clear Fork of the Brazos.

12 Feb 1854 Retired Texas special Indian agent, now rancher, Colonel Jesse Stem is transporting goods near Fort Belknap in northcentral Texas when he is killed by Kickapoo Indians.

The Republican Party is formed by 50 Democrats assembled 28 Feb 1854 at a political rally in Ripon, Wisconsin. The name "Republican" was first decided upon by a small group supporting an antislavery position. In the upcoming election of 1856, the party will be labeled "Black Republicans" for their stand against slavery. Their nominee, explorer John C. Fremont, carries eleven Northern states, but carries only one percent of the Southern vote.

The Stockbridge and Munsee Indian tribes sign a treaty 5 Feb 1856 involving the cession of lands in Wisconsin and Minnesota.

11 Feb 1856 President Pierce issues a proclamation warning both the Free State men and the 'border ruffians' in Kansas to cease and desist their disruptive activities.

Mexican bandito, Felipe Carabajal, shoots it out with a posse 14 Feb 1856 near Oakland, California. One posse member is wounded. Felipe is shot dead.

22 Feb 1856 A series of Indian raids begin with the attack against the Rogue River Volunteers. Twenty-four whites are killed, including a captain and Indian agent.

Anastacio Garcia is hanged in a Monterey, California jail for 16 Feb 1857 the murder of six people.

2 Feb 1858 President Buchanan recommends to Congress admission of the Territory of Kansas as a state under the unpopular Lecompton Constitution.

25 Feb 1858 A group of Bannock and Shoshone Indians steal cattle from the local Mormon settlers near Fort Limhi, Idaho. A brief battle ensues, leaving several settlers dead.

14 Feb 1859 Oregon is admitted to the Union as the thirty-third state, and the eighteenth non-slave state. The state has over 50,000 inhabitants and elects as its first governor Democrat John Whiteaker.

28 Feb 1859 By government act, 558 square miles are set aside for the establishment of the Gila River Reserve in the Pima Agency south of Phoenix, Arizona. The area will be occupied by the Maricopa and Pima tribes.

LITTLE KNOWN **FAMOUS PEOPLE** WAY OUT WEST -

OHN KING FISHER was a Texas rancher, outlaw, and lawman. Born in Collin County in 1854. King stole a horse in 1869, but set it free. He was arrested again shortly after for breaking and entering and sentenced to prison, but received a pardon the following month. Fisher next bought a ranch in a lawless area known as the

Nueces Strip, where he was feared and respected among killers and rustlers. King was appointed Deputy Sheriff of Uvalde County in 1881 and was a fearless lawman. It is



believed King killed at least seven men "not counting Mexicans and Indians." In 1884, he attended a Vaudeville Theater and saloon with his friend and infamous pistolman Ben Thompson. A quarrel

ensued between Thompson and the Fisher and theater's owners. Thompson were killed in the gunfight that followed. No one was ever prosecuted for their murders.



A review by The Jersey Kid, SASS Life/Regulator #287


Tom Gronberg is a modern day writer and cowboy who lives in Montana with his wife, Jennifer, and their three sons. One Good Horse is Tom's second memoir. His first, The Secret Life of Cowboys was published in 2003 and chronicles his life from the time he was a college graduate in a Chicago suburb and his journey west where, no matter how hard he tries, he cannot fight the lure of the west. It is a very insightful tale of Tom's struggle to find himself, earn a living, fulfill his dreams and the

woman who loves and supports him through his passage. The story takes us through Wyoming and Montana, The Miles City Bucking Horse Sale, and surviving brutally cold winters, all told with poetic insights such as "the clear night freezes the stars in place."


One Good Horse picks up Tom's life while he is still in Montana working various ranch jobs to support his budding family. Dealing with all of the complications in his life, Tom decides what he really needs is a horse. This is not to be

an ordinary horse that belonged to another. Tom wants to buy an unbroke horse and go through the process of training him, not the old time approach of jumping on his back and breaking him, but rather through kindness and teaching the horse what he needs to do without stress and confrontation.

Concurrently Tom also chronicles the life of the horse that eventually becomes part of the Groneberg family. For me, one of the things that makes this book special is the interjection of segments of Teddy Blue Abbott's wonderful book, We Pointed Them North, a must for all SASS members. Teddy's colorful account of his cattle drive from Texas to Montana is beautifully woven in with Tom's own experiences and surprisingly transcends the century that divides the two literary



works. I strongly recommend that anyone interested in the west (past and present alike) give this book a read – I believe you will thoroughly enjoy it. .







1858 HISTORY

Colt was the first to introduce percussion revolvers with its 1836 Patterson, but other manufacturers like Remington soon joined in. One of the first widely successful Remington revolvers was the New Model Army in .44 caliber. While we generally (and erroneously) refer to

it as a "Model 1858," it was actually introduced in 1861 after the beginning of the Civil War. The "1858" actually refers to the patent date. This New Model Army revolver from Remington was second only to the Colt in its numbers and in its popularity. Both during the Civil War, (Continued on page 60)

Billie came away with a beautiful new hat, and Larry had another fan.

When I first met him, the thing that struck me was he looked like a cowboy. He is around 5 feet 7 or 8 with a wiry build, a mischievous glint in his eye, and a wonderful sense of humor. He is modest and self-effacing. It wasn't until after that first meeting Chisholm Cheeks told me Larry had been featured in *Persimmon Hill Magazine* (pub-

If pressed, he would tell stories about his days working on movie sets making hats for the actors. In between making hats, he reworked my favorite hat, a thirty-year-old Stetson, making it look like new again. He made a Bowler for my brother, a flat crowned Spanish style for my son's fiancée', and dozens more for the others patiently standing in line where their hats would receive his complete and undivided attention. His was the busiest booth on vendor's row, except at lunch time that is. Larry was having some health concerns while he was at the match and walking the mile or so to where his motor home was parked was pretty hard on him. So, my brother and I would drive him to it in the evening and pick him up in the morning if somebody else didn't give him a ride first.

Larry was born in Hobart, Indiana and made his first hat thirty-four years later. He worked on six movies before settling into his current schedule of shows and matches. He has worked with Buck Taylor, Jonathan Winters, and Dennis Farina, but he confided his favorite actor was the late Ben Johnson.

Larry now resides in Quartzsite, Arizona with his charming new wife, Jamie. They had been high school sweethearts and lost touch. They reconnected in 2005 and were married in the Arizona desert earlier this year. Larry says he doesn't have customers, he just has friends that he makes hats for. The man has a lot of friends. and the subsequent westward migration of former combatants, the Remington 1858 was a favorite.

Part of its popularity was due to its reputation for its one-piece frame being sturdier than the inherently weaker two-piece frame of the 1851 and 1860 Colts. In fact, Colt later adopted the Remington style onepiece frame for its 1873 Single Action Army. Another feature of the 1858 was the "safety notches" for the hammer between the chambers on the cylinder. Rather than resting precariously on a safety pin like the 1860 Army, or on a live percussion cap, the Remington's hammer nestled safely in these notches between percussion caps.

Some folks even allege the Remington's ability to quickly change cylinders (i.e., dropping in a fresh loaded and capped spare cylinder) made them popular. This was accomplished by dropping the ramrod, pulling out the base pin, and placing in a fresh cylinder "a la Clint Eastwood." I have never personally seen a historical reference, however, to any gunmen actually carrying spare cylinders for their Remingtons. This quickly removable cylinder feature does, however, make cleaning the Remington much easier

than the same process on an 1860 Colt revolver.

From the time of the California Gold Rush, the Civil War, and the early westward migration, almost all revolvers were percussion firearms like the 1858 Remington. Colt, Remington, and others could only produce their percussion revolvers, as S&W still had the patent rights for bored through cylinders - an absolute necessity for cartridge revolvers! This gave Smith and Wesson a virtual monopoly on metallic cartridge revolvers. Just after the Civil War, however, Remington decided to pay the licensing fee to Smith and Wesson in order to convert the huge stocks of percussion .44 caliber New Model Army revolvers (1858s). I have seen two basic types of conversions. One type I handled was a five shot ".46 French Caliber" rim-fire that used a newly manufactured cylinder, and had the revolver's recoil plate altered. Later, some were also converted to be six shot .44 Remington center fire, which caliber was merely Remington's version of the already successful .44 Colt cartridge (though they don't always interchange).

The second variety of Remington cartridge conversions used a twopiece cylinder like Kenny Howell's

modern R&D cylinder. Like the early .46 French conversions, these were also generally in rim fire calibers. Instead of the individual firing pins on the R&D's cylinder back plates (I'll describe later), they had slots in the back plate of the cylinder that the hammer projected through to hit the rims of the rim-fire cartridges.

The Remington cartridge conversions were produced until the No. 3 Army model of 1875 was released, also in .44 Remington. The Remington conversions are now exceptionally rare, and few have survived. Even if you had one, you probably could not shoot it, as most of them are rimfires. Ammo for them has not been available for many, many years!

UBERTI 1858 AND R&D CYLINDER

The new forged frame Uberti 1858 Remingtons from Taylor's & Co. are exceptionally nicely done. The deep blue-black finish is smooth and polished much nicer than the Pietta 1858s. The brass trigger guard is also polished. The 1858 has perfect metal-to-metal fit. The hammer and trigger appear to have been case hardened. Speaking of triggers, the 1858 Remingtons have a much wider and more comfortable trigger than the Colts. In my case, it seems to help with my trigger pull.

The metal finish and wood to metal fit was very good on the Uberti guns. The grips are two-piece walnut, with a varnished finish common to most other 1858 replicas. I plan on striping mine, and giving them a period correct oil finish. The eightinch octagonal barrel has a historically correct Remington "shaved post" design front sight, which is dovetailed into the front of the barrel. This is one of the best features of the Uberti made 1858s. It allows you to adjust the windage to your sight picture and favorite load. The Remington's rear sight notch in the frame is wide and deep. The barrel is well crowned, and the bore is centered in the barrel, a concern on some other brands of Italian replica blackpowder handguns. The rifling is deep and crisp.

Unlike most percussion 1858 replicas, the trigger pull was very nice, probably due at least in part to the lighter hammer spring than found on other brands of 1858 replicas. It broke clean and smooth at about three pounds. The hammer pull is also not too heavy; but not so light it made ignition unreliable. The vast majority of folks would not need two hands to cock these. The 1858s have a main spring tensioning screw in the front of the grip, just the same as the Smith and Wesson No. 3large frame revolvers do. By unscrewing this screw or tightening it, you can adjust the hammer pull and falling force of the hammer.

I obtained a R&D cylinder paired with the forged frame Uberti 1858 from Taylor's & Co. These conversion cylinders are first-rate quality. Kenny Howell of R&D duplicated the original two piece Remington cylinder in modern .45 Colt. The best news is (unless you are a Goex-burning "dark-sider" like me) it is in .45 Colt, proofed for Black Hills, Ten-X, or similar "Cowboy" loads. DO NOT USE HOT CORE-BON LOADS IN THE R&D CYLINDERS, AND DO NOT USE THESE IN BRASS FRAMED 1858 GUNS!!!!!! (That's to keep the lawyers happy).

These units are made as "dropin" units, and there are models for 1858s from Pietta, Uberti, and Armi San Marco. The best thing to do is check the markings on top of the barrel. They also make a pair of units for the Ruger New Model Army Percussion. They have blue cylinders for blue guns and an electroless nickel ones for stainless guns. According to the folks at Taylors, they are 99.9% pre-fitted. If they do not fit exactly right, ship the gun and the cylinder back to them, and they will fit them for free. According to them, very few have come for fitting.

The R&D cylinders are machined out of 4150 arsenal grade steel on CNC machinery. They are beautifully polished and blued. The cylinder dropped in and fit perfectly in my



1858 without any fitting. The timing, indexing, and lock-up were perfect.

The unit consists of a two-piece cylinder. The main body resembles a standard single action cylinder with six chambers for either .45 Colt or .45 S&W Schofield ammunition. (Note: Earlier R&D cylinders could not accommodate .45 S&W Schofields because of the larger rim). The cylinder is rebated for enclosing the cartridge case rims completely, with the exception of the newly added "witness slot" that shows the rims in the loaded chambers. It has lock-up notches (slightly offset to the side for strength) on the outside. The only difference is there is an indexing pin protruding from the rear face. It engages a mating hole in the back plate of the cylinder to achieve perfect line up.

The second part of the cylinder is the back plate. In place of nipples for percussion caps, it has six individual firing pin assemblies. The flat percussion hammer hits the firing pin of each cylinder, just as a hammer of a Ruger hits the frame-mounted firing pin on a Vaguero. It is really quite ingenious and simple. One of the firing pin assemblies is stainless and un-blued to assist in referencing the empty chamber at the loading bench.

Installation is simple. Make sure the revolver is unloaded. Place it at half cock so the cylinder will rotate freely. Drop the 1858's loading lever

about 45 degrees, and pull the cylinder pin forward. Remove the percussion cylinder. Replace it with the conversion cylinder, rotating clockwise as you insert to depress the cylinder advancing hand. Push in the cylinder pin. Raise the loading

To load the R&D cylinder, remove the cylinder as above. Take off the back plate and insert five .45 Colt or S&W Cowboy loads. (It is easiest to leave the empty cylinder under the stainless firing pin assembly.) Reinsert the R&D cylinder so the stainless (empty chamber) is under the hammer when it is taken off half cock. To unload, remove the cylinder, then the back plate, and drop the cases free. Some may not drop out, especially if using blackpowder, so just use the end of the loading lever or a dowel to give them a push. All in all, once you get the hang of it, the loading and unloading time is about the same as a Peacemaker clone.

AT THE RANGE Groups from the 1858 with the percussion cylinder:

The 1858 is very pleasant to shoot using a 148 grain .454" diameter lead ball and 30 grains (volume) of FFFG blackpowder, Hodgdon's 777, or a 30-grain Pyrodex pellet. I personally use Remington No. 10 percussion caps, a 30 grain Pyrodex Pellet, and Ox-Bow "wonder wads" between pellet and ball when I shoot

the 1858 in a Plainsman match. This is my standard load for both my 1858 Remington and 1860 Colts.

With the percussion cylinder, the Uberti 1858 shoots about one inch above point of aim at ten yards, using a traditional two-hand hold. Though the Pyrodex Pellets and wonder wads are handier for a match, the 1858 seemed to shoot best with FFFG Goex, and SPG or Buffalo Butter over the ball. I actually had a sub-one-inch group at the ten-yard distance with the Goex load. I have found "real blackpowder" is much more accurate and consistent than any substitute.

Groups from the 1858 with the R&D Cylinder:

For this article, I used the following smokeless ammunition:

- Black Hills .45 Colt 250 grain
- Black Hills .45 Schofield 230 grain
- Black Hills .45 Schofield 180 grain

Once again, the shooting was done at 10 yards, traditional twohand hold. The 250 grain .45 Colt ammunition from Black Hills printed a group about four inches above point of aim, one inch left with a group that was about two and a half inches in diameter. The Black hills 230 grain Schofield load group was about three inches above point of

DOC FOLEY, SASS #9092 February 4, 1941 to September 7, 2006

Doc Foley, aka Raymond E. Reilly, SWFL Gunslingers member died September 7, 2006. A member of the SWFL Gunslingers for 10 years, Doc Foley was known for his love of Cowboy Action Shooting™, his guns, and sports cars. A Naples Urologist since 1974, Doc Foley's patients included many SWFL Gunslingers. Many Gunslingers credit Doc Foley for saving their lives.

Doc Foley always had a joke or story to share with his fellow Gunslingers, patients, and the operating room staff. His cowboy grin put people at ease and helped reduce the stress associated with illness, hospitalization, and surgery.

Doc Foley was born in Newark, New Jersey and received his bachelor's degree from Villanova University and his medical degree from the New Jersey College of Medicine, his decision to become a doctor having been made much earlier after undergoing heart surgery as a child. "Heart surgery back then was pretty risky, and the experience had a profound impact on Doc Foley," his sister said. After medical school, Doc Foley completed his internship and residency at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. During this time period he became a Washington Redskins football fan, a team he continued to follow closely even after becoming a SWFL Gunslinger.

His residency was interrupted by a two-year tour of duty during the Vietnam War, in which he was stationed at Guantanamo Bay Naval Base in Cuba. During his time in Cuba Doc Foley discovered the joys of living in a tropical climate. "Dad loved Cuba," said his daughter. He learned to SCUBA dive there and did it every week. He was also able to visit all of the surrounding Caribbean islands, something most medical residents of the time could only dream of. After completing his residency, Doc Foley moved to Naples in 1974 and started his urology practice. In addition to his private practice, he served in various medical administrative positions at Naples Community Hospital over the years, including Chief of Surgery, Chief of Staff, and on the Board of Trustees.

Life for Doc Foley was not all about work. His children were the center of his life and he was equally proud of every one of them and their accomplishments.

Doc Foley was an avid outdoor sportsman, a passion he shared with his children and grandchildren. He was also very involved in girls' little league and high school softball for many years.

His love for Cowboy Action Shooting TM was evident in his vast gun collection (at home and in his office), his skill as a gunsmith, and his re-loader mounted on the kitchen counter.

Doc Foley was able to fulfill a life long dream of going on an African safari. His prize lion was prominently displayed at his memorial service.

I was privileged to officiate at Doc Foley's memorial service. The large room was standing room only with family, friends, colleagues, patients, and fellow Gunslingers. The SWFL Gunslingers will miss Doc Foley's passion for shooting, unique humor, competitive spirit, and friendship. ...


Walt Tillman was a valuable member of Trails End Muzzleloaders, Chatham, Ontario, Canada and especially the Cowboy division.

THE .44 HENRY RIMFIRE CARTRIDGE: THE ROUND THAT OPENED THE OLD WEST . . .

(Continued from page 41) ers" by the frontiersmen.

By this time the ammunition was also improved from the 216 grain round nose bullet with 24-26 grains of blackpowder of Civil War days to a 200 grain flat nosed, healed bullet over 28-29 grains of blackpowder. The cartridge was simply called .44 Flat Rimfire. While still not a powerhouse by today's standards, many a man and many a game animal met its demise from the .44 Henry cartridge. In fact, the recent archaeological excavations of the Little Big Horn Battlefields shown the 1866 Winchester was one of the most common rifles carried by the Indians that defeated Custer's various commands.

Revolvers

In 1869, S &W introduced their No. 3 "American Model" top break revolver; first in .44 Henry rim fire, then in .44 American (which was essentially a center fire Henry). It was an instant success, and was even adopted by the US Army.

In 1871, however, S&W's Rollin White patent expired. Many manufactures, including Colt, worked feverishly to come up with cartridge revolvers. In 1872 Colt introduced the new 1872 "Open Top" revolver.

While very similar in appearance to the conversions, it was made from all newly manufactured parts. The "Open Top" name derives from the fact, just like the earlier 1860s and conversions, there was no top strap over the cylinder. The only parts that were interchangeable with the 1860s and conversions are the grip frame and, I believe, the wedge!

The 1872 Open Top was available only in .44 Henry rim fire. It was very popular with folks who carried 1866 Winchester and Henry rifles. The 1872 Open Top Colt was meant to be a companion piece to these rifles. Even then, the concept of one cartridge for both rifle and revolver was popular. It certainly simplified provisioning for a long trek on horseback. A total of around 7,000 Open Tops were manufactured by Colt between 1872 and 1876.

Colt Single Action Army

Few people realize the second caliber produced in the 1873 Colt was the .44 Henry rimfire, not the .44-40. In 1875, Colt began producing the 1873 Single Action Army in .44 rimfire. They wanted to capitalize on the "one caliber for pistol and rifle" they had started with the 1872 Open Top (which was still in production). As

1860 Henry and 1866 Winchesters alone far outnumbered the 1873 Winchesters until 1886, it was just good business sense to produce the 1872s and 1873s in .44 rimfire. In fact, Colt did not introduce the .44-40 "Frontier Six Shooter" until 1878. A total of 1863 .44 rimfire 1873 Single Action Army Colts were produced between 1875 and 1880.

Conclusion

I do not think anyone, having absorbed this information, could dispute the .44 Henry rimfire cartridge was the cartridge that opened the Old West. While a case may be made for other cartridges like the Spencer and .50-70, at the very least it must

be granted the .44 Henry had a significant influence on the conquest of the West.

Until 1878, "a Colt's .44" meant either an 1860 Army .44 or conversion, or an 1872 or 1873 Colt in .44 rimfire. Until around 1880, when a man said .44 Winchester, he probably meant an 1866 Winchester in .44 rimfire. Those of us that love these old guns will probably never have an opportunity to shoot one of these original rimfires. Ammunition for them is no longer being made, and the guns themselves are collector's items. Fortunately, the Italian firm of A. Uberti USA is making replicas in current calibers like .44-40, .45 Colt#and



aim, centered, and had a three-inch group. Finally, the Black hills 180 grain Schofield ammunition grouped about one inch above point of aim, and about a one and a half inch in diameter group.

It surprised me the Uberti 1858 with the R&D cylinder definitely seemed to prefer the 180-grain Schofield Black Hills factory load. My 1860 Colt with the R&D cylinder absolutely hates the 180 grain Schofield load, printing about five inch groups! In fact, most Italian made replicas in .45 Colt I have tested don't seem to like the Black Hills 180 grain load, either. The .45 Colt and 230 grain Schofield loads, on the

other hand, performed about the same as they did in the 1860. The only difference was they do not shoot nearly as high as in the 1860 with the R&D! With the 1858 Uberti, you can use a low, dead center hold on a plate, and still ensure a hit.

course, but some disturbing possibilities have already surfaced.

There has been at least one instance in Europe where range officials have agreed to allow Cowboy Action ShootingTM at their facility ... on the proviso only .22 caliber firearms be used! They've seen the ammo advertisements and read the articles dealing with light, "competitive" loads and came to the conclusion at least some of us are shooting loads that approximate .22s, and since .22s are good enough for the Olympics, "who needs a firearm as robust as a .45?" I've heard more than one comment indicating the shooter simply did not like recoil ... if that's the case, the only reason they are not shooting a .22 is because it's (presently) against the rules to do so! Buckaroos now enjoy the privilege of shooting .22s in SASS competitions ... how much longer before there is a movement for the Elder Statesmen; Grand Dames; and physically impaired, small handed, slight of stature shooters ... and, oh yes, the wanna be champions succumb to the same temptation and start lobbying for a relaxation of caliber restrictions?

Can you believe it ... there have even been posts on the Wire regard-


ing the use of air-guns for Cowboy Action? In some parts of the world, that's already all they can legally use.

With the instant success of the SASS Indoor Shooting Championships there will predictably be many more such competitions across the country. Shooting wax bullets can safely be accommodated almost anywhere, including inside buildings. Wouldn't it be wonderful to be able to have a Cowboy Action match in the middle of winter ... and not freeze one's butt off? And, there is no recoil!

Shooting these deviant versions of Cowboy Action is certainly not attractive to most of us today ... but when others begin to realize it is possible to do so, someday we could all be relegated to something like shooting wax bullets ... not an attractive alternative! How many fast draw competitions do you know of today that use live ammo?

My hope is the Territorial Governors, along with the general SASS membership, will constructively talk about this issue for the next year and begin to develop a consensus as to what can be done to mitigate the potential issues. Today there are no right and wrong answers, only a quest to find a way through the forest.







new props, and design some real challenging stages to test the shooters' skills, yet keep everything within the guidelines of a SASS Regional match. We met and surpassed those goals and here is how we did it.

On Thursday Hawkeye Sam, Henni Penni, SASS #20741, and Dirty Bob, SASS #10066, taught the RO-I and RO-II classes for 20 students, and the treat we had in the RO-I class was Wyatt Henry, SASS Life #20289, the age of nine, oldest son of Charles Bolton, SASS Life #20288. Here is an example of how we can keep our sport growing - by including and teaching the younger generations everything we can about our sport. So folks, get our younger folks registered in the RO classes!

Thursday was also side match day, which included long range shooting where shooters can be challenged in events out to 900 yards, the Quigley event, Billy Dixon shoot-off, and different lever gun events.

We also held our famous six Gunfighter stages where the shooters can put lead down range prior to the actual match. This often helps shooters get over first stage jitters. These stages are set up where a shooter will use either two or three guns per stage and shoot a deviant version of the main match stages. Over the years this side match has been very popular with the shooters. We run a set of morning posses and a set of afternoon posses so everyone can shoot these stages and also take part in the other side matches.

This year Shoot Magazine representatives, Smith 'N Jones, SASS #13223, and Marshal's Lady, SASS #24623, attended the match bringing with them the equipment to put on demonstrations of Cowboy Fast Draw shooting and also giving both shooters and spectators a chance to learn this new sport and to challenge fellow fast draw enthusiasts. With help from Teaspoon, SASS #11726, and Jim Beam, SASS #7468, they kept the booth open throughout the weekend so anyone wanting to take on the challenge could do so.

Friday the main match began with clear and bright skies and with shooters anxious to get started. So not to disappoint them, we started the match with a formal color guard presentation from the Grand Old Army and representatives from the Wyoming National Guard Medical Unit, and the flag raising was done by the National Guard personnel. Again this year we had the privilege of having the Guard personal fulfilling our first aid needs. After a wel-



coming meeting from Overland Kid and Hawkeye Sam, the safety presentation from Catamount Sgt. Major (CSM), SASS #20392, and the introduction of SASS #1, Judge Roy Bean, and SASS #1000, Justice Lilly Kate, the morning posses were sent out to assist the famous lawmen of old and keep the bad guys at bay by throwing lead down range at the targets.


The morning went off without a hitch and after the afternoon shooters' meeting, we sent the second set of posses out to again help those old lawmen, but wouldn't you know it, we had a minor delay or two while the scarce summer rains passed through Wyoming's high plains. Other than that, all went well for the first day of the match. While the shooters were doing their best, and the spectators were watching the shooters and visiting the vendors, Lizzie Walker and her crew were out and about judging the working costumes.

After the long day of holding off the bad men, the law-enforcement personnel headed to the big gambling hall for a night of fun and frolic and maybe to win a big pot or two from the excellent prizes. Live music furnished by Rattlesnake Jake Martin, SASS #62499, had many up dancing, and the Saloon Master, Slowpoke Wyoming, acted as the Master of Ceremonies.

Saturday morning repeated Friday morning's weather so the posses that shot Friday afternoon were treated to a pleasant morning of shooting. However, Saturday afternoon's weather was a repeat of Friday afternoon, so those posses were treated to our summer rains. This time it rained harder than the day before, so we had some flooding in our bays. This is really where the shooters put forth the "Spirit of the Game," and when the rain passed, the shooters took to the range and finished the match in style. The Match Director offered to let anyone shooting when the rain started have a re-shoot, and we only had one or two takers. Nice job shooters!

Sometimes you learn from mistakes, and this year was one of those times for learning because we did not plan for the amount of rain that came. This year we thought we would try something different and have our banquet in the big tent on the range. Great idea, but the weather did not cooperate and decided to create a river through our tent! When the rain stopped, the river did too, but it left some damp spots in the dinning and dancing area. Mountaineer Rose worked around these challenges for the festivities. The banquet meal was provided by Road Kill Catering of Cheyenne, owned and operated by Slowpoke Wyoming and Dazee Bristol. They really know how to

To help with the praying part, Ole Tyme Preacher, SASS #49972, held Cowboy Church in the big tent. The shooting matches set up for the wrap up included the Top Gun shoot off where anyone can challenge their skills against another shooter until the last cowboy or cowgirl is left standing. Then we have a team shoot for those that like to challenge another team. It's a good time to settle some friendly grudges. At the same time the couple shoot is going on, which sets up some hot, but friendly, competition between couples.

When the last shot is sent down range and the final scores were tallied by Tanya Hide, her crew, and C D Tom, SASS #10411, the Awards Ceremony took place. This year we added a couple of extra awards ... they were "Spirit of the Game" and the "Snake Bite" award. We awarded two "Spirit of the Game" certificates. One went to Rusty Dawg, SASS #34081, who had an accident while helping set up the shoot, and even though he had an arm in a sling for a dislocated shoulder, he came back everyday and helped with the match. The other award was given to a shooter that had a mishap and received a match DQ on Thursday, but he stayed and helped with the posse during the side matches, volunteered to be a stage marshal, and helped the posse in anyway he could. Now there are two real Cowboy Action Shooters who dignify the Spirit of the Game.
