hoenix, AZ - On March 7th as the first vestiges of light began to spread over the valley of the sun and the Bradshaw Mountains just to the north, Winter Range 2007 began to come to life. Over 570 wranglers, cowboys both classic and modern, gunfighters, cowgirls, B-movie enthusiasts, young and old all gathered from 44 different states, Australia, Europe, and Canada for the 16th annual incarnation of this classic Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> match. The year that had gone into planning the annual event was past, and now it was time to move into the competition that would decide the best of the best at the SASS National Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>. weather in Phoenix was perfect with sunshine and only a few clouds plus a little wind; all right, a whole lot of wind on Sunday morning, but it was short lived and soon forgotten.







# SUBMITTING MATERIAL TO The Cowboy Chronicle

rect English and sometimes helping focus the writer's words to better explain the subject being addressed. Although the endeavor is largely a labor of love, it is much like going to school ... the homework just never ends. Attending matches, going on vacation, taking on special projects ... no matter what goes on in one's life,

the next issue is always only days

away, requiring a laptop permanently

be within arms length ... and running!

There a number of things each submitter can do that will make the editors' jobs easier and will materially improve the quality of and interest in each submitted article. If you draw the short straw to do the match write up for your annual match, or you want to let others know about your club activities, or submit material for any of the other sections of The Cowboy Chronicle, please continue reading ...

Text

The easiest way to submit text is via e-mail (address to Donna@sass net.com or sass@sassnet.com attention "Tex"). Embed the text in the body of the e-mail message and attach a Microsoft Word file of the text to the message as well. This way, there are two chances of being able to retrieve the text. The attached word processing file must be a Microsoft Word file. All Cowboy Chronicle material is processed on a Mac, and Word Perfect files, for example, are just impossible to get unscrambled.

Text can also be snail-mailed to "Tex" at the SASS office. An electronic version of the Word file on a CD or DVD is the preferred medium, and a hardcopy printout of the text provides a great "fail-safe" backup in case there is a problem reading the CD/DVD. It is possible to scan hardcopy if the text is clean (no streaks, dropouts, mark throughs, or hand annotations, and the like), but this represents additional processing steps and slows down the production process.

There are still a few souls that don't use computers and can only submit handwritten material. These letters and submittals will be read. but only in the most rare cases will they be processed for publication. The resources to turn these handwritten letters into processable text are simply not available.

If you are reporting the results of a match, or otherwise using someone's SASS handle (which should always be used in lieu of a SASS person's street name), include their SASS number the first time they are mentioned (especially important in the "Winners" list). If you don't know



here have been many comments lately on the wire and articles regarding light loads. I thought it interesting how at least one of our members feels about the situation. The following letter from Greenriver, SASS #38681, is quoted verbatim ...

"Please understand this is my personal opinion, but I really don't want to see the knockdowns set lower than what SASS has always recommended as a standard setting, 158 grain .38 Special Factory Load. Now,

understand, I shoot .45's, .32-20's, and .32 H&R Mags, all loaded with blackpowder, depending on the day and how I feel at the time. To me, lowering the settings to fit what I decided to shoot after reading the SASS Handbook and knowing my .32's would be marginal would be just wrong!!! It lowers me and detracts  $from\ my\ enjoyment\ when\ I\ easily\ take$ down knockdowns with my 'mighty' .32's!! I made the decision to use my .32's. Nobody forced this decision upon me. I made that decision knowing full well they might be marginal on some targets, and I neither ask nor want the sport changed to accommodate my decision on what I shoot!!! I can shoot my .32's faster than my .45's, so it is only fair I have to aim a little more carefully with them.

Don't lessen my efforts to do bet-

ter <u>in spite of</u> my equipment instead of because of my equipment!!! Don't lessen my feeling of happiness when I do manage to take down a knockdown target that someone with a .38 or .45 has had trouble with. Allow me to compete in this sport under the rules that were in effect when I made my decisions on equipment without trying to give me an extra advantage for that equipment!!! Allow me to step up to the firing line

and take the consequences of my decisions like a man without begging for special consideration for my choices.

On most days I like my .45's and other days I use my .32's, I have just as much fun. If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

I believe it's important to live and be content with the choices we each make—live and let live— COWBOY UP! ...



Writ, published in 1941. Mulford then retired from writing, but with Hoppy's popularity still at a fever pitch, and with Mulford's approval, Louis L'Amour penned four more Hoppy novels under the pen name Tex Burns, beginning in 1951.

After acquiring the rights, Boyd produced the final series of Hoppy feature films and later 40 episodes of the popular half-hour TV

# NRA HONORS COWGIRL

It's official! Our own Justice Lily Kate, SASS Life Regulator #1000, has been selected to receive NRA's 2007 Marion P. Hammer Woman of Distinction Award. It's a welldeserved choice and a coup for the cowgirls.

Each year, the National Rifle Association singles out individuals who have had a noteworthy impact on gun ownership in America. The highly coveted Marion Hammer Award for women was created in 2004 and named for NRA's first female President. The award recognizes exceptional contributions to the preservation of the Second Amendment and the shooting sports through education, advocacy, volunteerism, and legislative activism in support of the goals of the NRA. The selection of Justice Lily Kate for this prestigious award marks the first time the marquee pro-gun organization has formally recognized one of our own for an honor of this magnitude.

Most of us know Kate as the gregarious wife of Judge Roy Bean, SASS #1. We also know her as an enthusiastic supporter of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>. There is, however, much more to this native Texan than her cowgirl personae. Kate is a woman for all seasons: wife, mother, school teacher, journalist, activist, and willing ambassador for our sport. What sets her apart from her peers is her tireless and assertive use of every opportunity to promote both her sport and the purposes and goals of the NRA.

Through travels with the Judge, Justice Lily Kate has had an opportunity to interact with thousands of women, literally coast to coast. While she is an excellent Cowboy Action Shooter in her own right, with plenty of plaques on her wall to prove it, her strength is in her ability to bring new

shooters into the fold. Since she seldom takes "no" for an answer, I've personally seen her coax reluctant observers into taking a shot, eventually converting them into enthusiastic participants in the time it takes to hold a two-day match.

Kate is also a natural when it comes to firearm education. As a child, she was taught gun safety and how to shoot at a young age. She was allowed to go hunting with her brothers at age eight and often accompanied her Dad on coyote kills early in the morning, before chores and school. The family hunted to secure food, and Kate got her first deer at age twelve. She takes this background with her into the classroom, which she admits to using as a bully pulpit.

Says Kate: "I use the classroom to teach my students about gun safety, concealed carry licensing, and to negate the idea that guns, in



and of themselves, are dangerous and kill people." Amazingly, Kate's Principal at Houston's Langham Creek High School, is very supportive of her efforts to keep an open dialog regarding guns. Kate was (Continued on page 23)

In the very early years of the 18th Century, a man named Tom Twining began to serve tea in his London Coffeehouse. However, women were not allowed in coffeehouses, so Twining opened an exclusive teahouse for women in 1717, although it remained, for many years, a pleasure that only the rich and the fashionable could enjoy ...

Beginning in both America and England in the late 1880's, fine hotels began to offer tea service in Tea Rooms. Victorian ladies and their gentlemen would meet in the late afternoon for tea and conversation.

After the popularity of the English tea gardens diminished during the early part of the nineteenth Century, the first official tea room in Britain came around 1864.

In rural communities, afternoon tea evolved into "high tea," and almost became a meal in itself. High Tea is another acronym for "afternoon tea," and it became such in rural communities and evolved into the main meal of the day. High Tea was a cross between afternoon tea, and the dinner that was normally served in homes in the early evening. Tea also became an important social event, when people (especially women) would gather in their elegant drawing rooms and partake of their afternoon cuppa, talking discreetly about local events. A general rule of etiquette was always followed during these gatherings.


Out West, Will Roberts, Mark Brooks, and, of course, the incredible talents of Lafitte, Knight of the Green Cloth.


> pete in Winter Range, won 8th place in his category. This fine young man represented all of those outstanding individuals who serve our country, standing between us and

Sunday's Awards Ceremony last year went on and on and on ... well,



# CIVIL WAR HERITAGE PRESERVATION

The North-South Skirmish Asso-**⊥** ciation will hold its 115th National Competition on May 18-20, 2007 at Fort Shenandoah, near Winchester, Virginia. Member units compete in live-fire matches with original or authentic reproduction Civil War period muskets, carbines, rifles, revolvers, mortars, and cannons. It is the largest Civil War event of its kind in the country.

Founded in 1950, the N-SSA has 3,500 individuals that make up its 200 member teams. Each team represents a Civil War regiment or unit and wears the uniform they wore over 145 years ago.

N-SSA members come from all over the country to Fort Shenandoah each spring for this national competition that traditionally opens the year's activities. Compe-







their number, don't worry about it. But if you're reporting a SASS sanctioned shooting match, everyone is required to be a SASS member, and their SASS number is included in their registration materials. If you don't provide their numbers, the editorial staff must look up the numbers, again slowing the production process.

400 words are plenty when writing a letter expressing an opinion or making a comment. 800 words (half a Comboy Chronicle page) are generally plenty when writing a column. A

major article can be as much as 1200 words but should never be more than 1500 words. Anything over 2000 words will be edited down. This editing down of text not only takes time, but it's now the editor (one of only two) who is determining the content of the piece rather than the author. Keep the articles in bounds and maintain control of the contents. (Word has a menu function that counts the number of words in your article.)

Obviously, match officials need to make sure their range help and (Continued on next page)

match sponsors know they are appreciated. Thank you notes are appropriate ... but they should consistently be handled separately from The Cowboy Chronicle match report. There are always 800 to 1200 words of interesting match items to be reported without using your word allocation for long lists of "thank you's."

One last thing ... fractions. It turns out there is a difference in the ASCII codes used by the Mac and PCs for fractions. When these codes are entered on a PC and submitted to The Cowboy Chronicle, they come out as blanks. The editors are not shy about guessing what the fractions should be, but to ensure fidelity, do your fractions like this: 1-1/2," or 3-3/4", or 1/3 tsp flour ...

By the way ... always include a Byline ... we must know who wrote the material!

#### **Photographs**

Photographs make all the difference between an OK article and a great article ... but all photos are not created equal. There are many things you can do to "spruce-up" your article! It goes without saying, only "good" photos should be submitted—in focus pictures that show something you find interesting. In general, get up close and get plenty of light on your subject. Always use a fill-in flash during the day on the range. Be creative and look for great "action" photos ...

you just might make the cover of The Cowboy Chronicle!

First ... don't try to "help" by laying out the article yourself. Often Word documents are received with the photos and captions carefully and strategically placed within the text. Since the layout process is the last thing done prior to publication, the first thing done to the submitted material is to extract the photos and captions from the text ... once again, inserting an "extra" step in the production process and slowing things down. Keep the text file and the photo files separate.


Quite often a large number of photos are received with an article ... with no captions or any other indication what is significant about the pictures ... just a bunch of pictures taken at a match. That's not particularly interesting to the folks who weren't there, and the editors can't help if they don't know the individuals in the pictures or weren't present at the match.

In recent months large numbers of collages have been printed because that's all that were submitted. There was no useful information submitted with the pictures. Pick half a dozen pictures that you especially like and develop captions for them. A caption is different from a title. "Stage 9," The Buffet Line," and "Sammy Shoots A Lot, SASS #445566," are examples of "titles." A caption is one to three sen-


explain the ice age glaciers retreating north as the earth warmed before industrialization existed?



# RESPONSE TO MINIMUM RECOIL LOADS

Bottom line is this: I download because I am sick and tired being a loser! The first year I used only full loads, and I ALWAYS ended up at the bottom of the heap, not the very bottom, but close enough that I could see the bottom. As long as there is a winner to the match and a ranking, there will always be ways to improve one's ability to compete.

And if SASS wanted to, they could decide to adjust this limit upward even higher, just as they did for the knockdown target load limit – which the author doesn't mention. That rule alone would not allow .22 loads or anything that light. So, if that potential shooting range he mentions wanted to be regulation, they would have to at least have the minimum knockdown load.

It's a tough line to draw. And there has been a lot of discussion on all the various rule changes over the years to keep the line in the right place. But I wouldn't mind setting a heavier minimum load, as long as it is across the board; – OR – add yet another category of full load shooters.

I grabbed the Superman clock and headed back to my workbench. After taking off the back off the clock, I switched some wires and actually had the thing running backward. Luckily, I had my Cowboy duds on when I started my experiment, so I fit right in. I looked up and saw a sign with an eye on it that said "WE NEVER SLEEP." It was a Pinkerton office, and in the doorway stood a thin, medium sized man. It was Charlie Siringo. I stood up and wiped the horse poop off my face and clothing. It hadn't rained in days, so the road apples were fairly dry. Charlie was laughing.

"You drunks 'll sleep anywhere ... won't cha?" He walked over to me to help me out of the street. "Come on,"

he said as if he were talking to a child, "set yourself down on the porch here." He took me by the arm and led me over to the office. I sat down on a wooden bench that was under the window, and he reached into his vest pocket and produced a silver dollar. "Here, you're gonna need this."

"No," I said staring at him and then looking around. My head was still fuzzy, and I was trying desperately to collect my thoughts and act coherent. "Charlie? ... Charlie Siringo." He was still holding the silver dollar, and as I reached out and took it, reality made an abrupt appearance and everything became clear. I had done it! I had gone back in time and was sitting looking at one of my heroes. I practically peed in my pants; I was so excited. But instead of blurting out something stupid, I remembered why I had come there in the first place. I thanked him for the coin and put it in my upper right vest pocket next to my pipe tamper, and then said in my best western drawl, "I've been lookin' for ya Charlie. I got a question for ya."

He looked at me and sized me up and down to see if I was one of the men on his wanted posters. He assessed my domineer and after determining I wasn't an outlaw or a threat he said, "Yeah, go 'head, what's your question?" He sat down next to me, took a small pocket knife out of his vest pocket, and then reached under the bench we were sitting on for a piece of wood he had obviously been working on at an earlier time. It looked like he was carving a horse.

How to put this  $\dots$  "Well, there's North Korea  $\dots$ "

"Cholera ... who's got cholera?" he asked.

That's right, I'm in the 1800's, he probably never even heard of Korea. "I have this neighbor." I continued.

"Your neighbor has cholera?"

"NO, No ... forget about the cholera ... I have this neighbor, and he's nasty to his family. He starves his kids while he eats all the food. He's got a big belly, and the kids are thin as a rail, and he lives in a big house. He makes his wife and kids sleep in the barn, and every time I try to talk to him and make him see what he's doing is wrong, he tells me to shut up." I was trying to put the whole scenario in a way he could understand.

"Now this neighbor of mine just bought himself a big Gatling gun and a cannon that's so big, it could blow up a whole city." And then I added, just to drive home the point of how bad this guy is, "and he eats his dogs."

Charlie was listening intently, and when he heard the comment about eating dogs, his eyes became wide open, "Eats dogs? I wouldn't trust a man that eats dogs ... not when there's longhorn everywhere. Why would someone want to eat a dog?" His brow furrowed, and he looked down at what he was carving,



blew on it, and continued to whittle.

"Yep, so all us neighbors that live in the area went to his house and asked him what he was gonna do with that big gun and that big cannon, and he told us to mind our own business, so we decided not to let his cattle water at our wells until he gave up them dangerous weapons."

"Then what happened?" Charlie asked.

"Well sir," I continued, "he said if his cattle can't water at our wells, he would figure that was an act of war, and he would use that big cannon on us!"

I looked at this lawman that sat beside me. You could see him con-

templating the situation. "So now what do we do?" I asked.

He didn't answer me right away. He looked at the horse he was carving and took the point of his knife and started working on one of the eyes of the figure. When it was done to his satisfaction, he started to talk.

"I always enjoyed whittling," he said, "been doing it since I was a kid. You take a piece of wood, or a stick, and you make something out of it. You're doing something good." He took a deep breath and let it out slowly.

"You sure got a bad one there, and there's only one way to handle a character like that. The first thing

# WILLIAM F. "BUFFALO BILL" CODY

The ground trembled from the thundering hooves of the six frantically galloping draft horses. Atop the driver's box, the bearded, dusty teamster furiously whipped the team pulling the Deadwood Stage. Next to him, the lanky "shotgun guard" faced to the rear. He aimed down the gleaming barrel of his trusty 1873 Winchester, from under the brim of a ten-gallon sombrero. "Boom, boom," the Winchester belched smoke again and again, at the pursuing party of fierce, whooping Indians. Just as it seemed the painted braves would overtake the hapless coach, a loud bugle call pierced the din. A squad of bluecoated troopers on powerful chestnut horses had appeared at a full-on gallop. The cavalry had arrived, just in the nick of time. At the head of this relief column was a tall figure with a goatee and steely eyes. He wearing white buckskins and riding a magnificent white stallion with a flowing mane and long tail. The feathered warriors that weren't gunned down in the army's fusillade turned and fled. As one, the audience rose cheering, stamping their feet, and clapping with a thunderous applause. Buffalo Bill Cody, last of the frontier scouts, prince of the plains, had arrived to save the day.

"Buffalo Bill" Cody was a genuine hero of the American West. Early on, however, he knew the West was changing. Cody loved the west, and wanted others to be able to

experience it before it was all gone. He attempted to preserve and share his "Wild West" with the entire coun-

try and even the world. He did this through his "Wild West Shows." Buffalo Bill did more to propagate the image of the west than any other person of the times.

To understand Buffalo Bill and his wild west shows, you must consider the times.

In the later part of the nineteenth century, America was healing from a bloody civil war. The railroads had just spanned the continent. The cities of the East were overflowing with burgeoning masses. America was undergoing an industrial revolution. Immigrants flowed into the melting pot of North America. The tide of humanity was spreading west from the Mississippi River. Cody knew the West would soon disappear forever. Let us first take a brief look at the man and his own role in the West.

Probably Cody's best biographer was Helen Cody Wetmore, his oldest sister. Buffalo Bill was born William Frederick Cody on February 26, 1845

in Scott County, Iowa. Bill was the fourth born of five girls and three boys in the family of Issac and Mary Cody. Following the death of Bill's older brother, Samuel, in a horseback riding accident while showing off to the girls at the local school yard in 1852, Issac decided to sell the farm and head for the Gold Rush in California. After encountering broke, disheartened ex-miners returning east on the trail, however, Issac moved the family to Kansas instead.

By the mid-1850s, Kansas and Missouri were hotbeds of pro- and anti- slavery conflict. Bill spent his formative years in this cauldron of violence and intrigue. In 1854, Bill's father was stabbed while giving an anti-slavery speech. He was secretly moved to his brother's house in Ohio to convalesce and to hide from the pro-slavery faction that was looking to finish him off. During this period Bill had to step in and become a man before his time. Bill carried messages between Kansas and Ohio for the family, and even had to use a double-barreled pistol to stand off a drunken man looking to kill his invalid father. His father never fully recovered, and finally died in 1857. Only 12 years old, Bill had to take the part of the man in the family.

In the fall of 1857, Bill took a job on a supply wagon train taking beef to the army units that were forming to go to Utah and fight the Mormons. It was during this trip that Bill reportedly killed his first man, an Indian in a party attacking the group. At twelve years old, Cody was developing a taste for adventure. In 1860, Cody joined the fledgling Pony Express as a rider taking mail to California. Almost every trip was an adventure or a close scrape of some kind. At his mother's insistence, Cody finally quit and returned home.

In 1861, Cody joined the Union Army as a scout. In 1863, he was assigned as a spy behind Confederate lines. In 1865 when Cody demobilized, he became a stagecoach driver. By 1866, he saved some money, married Louisa Frederici, and opened a boarding house with her in St. Louis, Missouri. Cody tired of the inactivity, and rejoined the army as a scout on the frontier. While he used the boarding house as a base, he scouted for George Armstrong Custer for several years.

This is the time when America began to expand westward almost exponentially. The Union Pacific Railroad pushed westward from Saint Louis to join the Central Pacific Railroad growing eastward from Sacramento, California. In 1869, the two railroads met at Promontory Point, Utah. The transcontinental railway was a reality. Railroads were beginning to crisscross the West. The huge construction crews required large amounts of fresh meat as they


worked their way across the plains. In 1867, Cody went to work as a meat hunter for the Kansas Pacific Railroad, earning the princely sum of \$500 a month. It was during this period that Cody earned the nickname "Buffalo Bill Cody." It stemmed from a bet with Billy Comstock where Cody killed 69 Buffalo in one day, as opposed to Comstock's 43. In that one year, Cody is said to have killed 4,280 buffalo.

In 1869 Cody was again scouting for the Army. During this time, Cody first attained fame when Ed Judson (writing under the pen name of "Ned Buntline") published a dime novel about Cody called Buffalo Bill, King of the Border Men. This started a deluge of legends and stories about Cody. Cody continued his adventures with periods of scouting and hunting buffalo. In 1872, he took the Russian Grand Duke Alexis on a buffalo hunt. Alexis tried to kill a buffalo with a pistol, and it was only Cody's intervention of handing the Duke Cody's own rifle, and getting him within ten feet of the Buffalo, that got Alexis the kill.

In 1872, Cody experienced the stage for the first time. He accompanied Judson (Buntline) to a theatrical adaptation of a Judson Buffalo Bill story in New York. Cody was captivated and soon began his own presentations of "Scouts of the Plains" with fellow legends such as Wild Bill Hickok and Texas Jack Omohundro. It was thoroughly amateur and silly, but was well received. They traveled with "Scouts of the Plains" for several years, playing towns such as Saint Louis, Missouri, and Rochester, New York. The play made incredible amounts of money.

Historian Vincent Desantis tells us that in the 1870's, the West began to swell with the flow of humanity coming from the East. The railroads had acquired 130 million acres of public land from the government as they built the transcontinental railroad system. This was sold to settlers to make towns and raise revenues for the railroads. In the last 30 years of the nineteenth century, Americans had spread over 430 million acres. In the short time between 1870 and 1900, agriculture had spread from 89 million acres to 225 million acres cultivated. Gold strikes like the one in Dakota's Black Hills region in 1874/1875 would cause even more people to go west. The Native American population of the Great Plains and Rocky Mountains numbered about 250,000 at this time. The Indians resented the displacement by the white tide. They had been warring with the encroaching white settlers all along.


Probably the most publicized battles of the era was the massacre of George Armstrong Custer and 264 men of his 7th Cavalry by Sioux and (Continued on page 45)


Roy and Dale's Headstones.


than once by all those who ventured inside.

# Or, "A Gaudy Stream of Bespangled, Belaced, and Beruffled Barbarians"\*

Author note: I fancy myself a historian, not a clothier. Knowing some history about the era when Cattle Barons ruled supreme can give us a glimpse into what was worn to these fancy balls.

The sub-title is a hint . . .

In his 1873 book, The Gilded Age: A Tale of Today, Mark Twain coined the term that would define these times from the period shortly after the Civil War to near the turn of the Century when there was an unprecedented rapid economic, industrial, and population expansion. Railroad and steamboat companies, factories, banks, stores, mines, and the fertile lands west of the Mississippi grew dramatically in the United States.

With Western expansion in full

swing, the Victorian era truly became the definitive characterization of conspicuous consummation in America. Great fortunes were created (and lost) during the period and a way of life was created that this wealth supported.

On the East Coast were the super-rich industrialists like Andrew Carnegie and J. P. Morgan, and railroad tycoons Jay Gould and Cornelius Vanderbilt (critics called them "robber barons" based on their use of overpowering and sometimes unethical financial manipulations), and oil magnates like John D. Rockefeller, and entrepreneurs of such magnitude that Europe was appalled by America's wealth and

wealthy, some with little or no education. Wealth of the period

was underscored by the American upper class's opulent self-indulgence, where the social elite dominated American society. As wealth was created, the merchant, banker, and captain of industries cared less if their occupations or lack of education were "socially acceptable."

With the economic expansion of the West, personal wealth was acquired from the development of western natural resources and mineral exploitation. Well-defined examples are Nevada's Comstock Lode and Colorado's Leadville silver district. Ownership of vast ranches



(cattle empires) and enormous cattle herds in Colorado, New Mexico, Montana, and Texas brought innumerable wealth to individuals. Millions of acres of land, and the resources and raw materials below ground, were transferred into the hands of cattlemen, railroads, and mining and land development companies with laws passed by Congress. The production of iron and steel and western resources like lumber, gold, and silver increased the demand for improved transportation. Railroad expansion boomed as trains moved (Continued on next page)

goods from the resource-rich West to the East and, in combination with government land policies and the breaking of the Plains Indians resistance in the 1870s and 1880s, the trans-Mississippi West was opened for settlement and economic usage.

During this "Gilded Age," Americans who achieved wealth celebrated it as never before. In New York, the opera, the theatre, and lavish parties consumed the ruling class' leisure hours. Sherry's Restaurant hosted formal horseback dinners for the New York Riding Club. Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish once threw a dinner party to honor her dog who arrived sporting a \$15,000 diamond collar.


As fabulous wealth came into new hands, social status followed. Americans acquired status symbols such as enormous mansions on Fifth Avenue, glittering jewelry, servants, and ostentatious carriages. Their lifestyles moved away from the industrious capitalist work-pattern to fit around the aristocratic world of balls, theatres, and dinners.

Consumption in New York became more conspicuous and decadent than anything previously seen with certain items of expenditure, such as the balls, the fine clothes, the artwork, and the carriages forming an essential part of New York society. For example, it became custom-

ary in New York City for the rich, in their stone and marble palaces on Fifth Avenue, to leave their curtains open on New Year's Day so passersby could see the grandeur of their clothes and furnishings.

In the West, it was difficult for the *nouveaux rich* to attain the social standing their money would otherwise provide in the East. But, they were competitive with their fellowrich brethren on the East Coast.

Wealth was synonymous with social status at the highest levels in the United States, and the East Coast elite had established a common view of the correct ways of being a 'lady' or 'gentleman' - their "carriage, gait, address, gestures, voice, the ease, the self-possession, the power of conversing, the talent of not offending, the lofty principles, the delicacy of thought, the happiness of expression, the taste and propriety, the generosity and forbearance, the candor and consideration, the openness of hand."\* Also taken into consideration was the "nature of a man's occupation, his education, his manners and breeding, his income, and his connections all came into view in determining whether he was, in the narrow sense of the word, "a gentleman."\* The number of people who considered themselves within the 'true social elite' was rigidly small. In 1880 in America, the highest (Continued on page 50)





# Billy the Kid Breaks Out! By Bob Boze Bell, SASS #50,000



JULY 19, 1878

Fire is licking at the last room—Susan McSween's kitchen. In this final refuge, Alexander McSween sits with his head in his hands. His 12 defenders are crowded into this crumbling, tiny space, where the walls are too hot to touch and the air is heavy with smoke. The men are blackened, tired, thirsty and desperate, but they've decided to wait until dark before attempting to escape.

Housebound for nearly five days, the 12 men in the McSween home were holding their own until around 2 p.m. today, when one member of Sheriff George Peppin's posse, Andrew Boyle, torched the northwest corner of the house.

At approximately 9 p.m., five defenders, including Billy Kid, jump into the backyard and run toward a gate in the side yard. (One report says they are not wearing their boots or shoes.) Before they reach the gate, four Peppin men along the outside of the back wall spot them and open fire.


Law student Harvey Morris is shot dead at the gate. The remaining four, including Billy Kid, leap over his body and return fire as they race for the creek. Incredibly, they make it.

McSween and another group of his besieged men make their move. But as they approach the east gate, just outside the shadow of the flames, the guns at the back gate explode, driving McSween and his men back. They stay in the corner "about five minutes" before making yet another attempt, which also sends them scurrying back into the shadows.

Gunshots and yells are heard from across the creek as the Kid and crew celebrate their hair-raising escape.

Ten grueling minutes pass. All the guns along the back wall are aimed at the darkness. Finally, McSween allegedly says, "I shall surrender."

It is a ruse. McSween's men shoot one of the posse members. They back off and start shooting, killing all but one in the McSween group. Thus ends the Big Killing. 🎩



With that said, I have to admit there is nothing worse than going to one of these great matches and have something go wrong. Now, there are any number of things that can go wrong

# WOMEN, GUNS, AND GEAR Match Preparation

in a match: your guns might break, you might have a bad round, or the weather might turn sour. Unfortunately, there is nothing we can do about the weather, but there are many things you can do to prepare for a match and help ensure you'll have a great experience.

First, it is always important your guns work well when you go to a match. It's horrible to go all the way to a match only to have your rifle break down on the first stage! So, the first thing I always do before going to a match is make sure my guns work. I take them apart and clean them. After I clean them, I check them out one more time before I leave to make sure they still work. I have seen numerous instances

where people have been let down at a match because their guns were so dirty they stopped working!

It also helps to do some preventive maintenance before you leave. You always want to check important pieces to make sure they look OK. However, you can't always see when a part is going to break, so keep track of when you change parts, and you'll get a better idea how long they last. This is especially important for 1897 ejector and extractor parts.


Now that you have your guns clean and in working order, you are almost ready to leave. Before you go, make sure you have a couple of spare parts to take with you. If you lose a ten-cent screw that keeps you from shooting the match, you're not going

to be happy! I personally take extra screws and parts for all my guns, just in case. If worse came to worse, you could probably borrow from someone, but you will always feel more secure if you know you have anything you might need.

The second major thing you want to do to prepare for a match is to make sure you have good ammunition. The three things about ammunition you want to ensure are: you have it; it is reliable; and you have the right kind.

When I say you actually want to have your ammunition, that is precisely what I mean. If you are traveling a long way, you want to make sure your ammunition arrives there,

too. If you are driving, it's not a big deal, but if you are flying, it can be a very big deal. Most airlines only allow 11 pounds of ammunition, and it is required to be in the factory box. If you reload your own ammunition, you can try using a plastic cartridge box, but you never know what kind of airline agent you will run into! This makes it hard to bring the right kind and correct amount of ammunition.

When I fly I always attempt to ship my ammunition before hand. You can ship your ammunition to the match if they will let you, or you can ship it to the hotel where you are staying. I believe all major shipping companies require you to ship your ammunition ground, which will take longer, so you want to make sure you leave plenty of time for it to arrive. Also, it is always a good idea to call and make sure it arrived, so if it was lost, you can bring some on the plane in an emergency.

If you plan on shipping, the last thing I would suggest is to include your shot shells in the shipment. I know many people like to buy shot shells when they get to where they are going, but this can have serious consequences. You can never guarantee the stores in the area will have the kind of ammunition you want, or that they will not be sold out by the time arrive. It is always better to pay to have the ammo shipped than to get there and have no shot shells to shoot!

When it comes to reliable ammunition, I cannot stress this subject enough. When I go to a match, I always load my ammunition as if I were going to a real gunfight. I use

the best materials, including brass. I know many people don't like to use new brass if they go to a "lost brass" match, but it would really "suck" to spend a thousand dollars attending a match and have your rifle jam up over a seven-cent piece of brass! While reloading I watch every round to make sure it gets powder, and then spin each round through my pistol cylinder for a chamber and high primer check. I know it sounds like a lot of work, but because of this, I have had very few bad rounds.

My piece of ammunition advice is to make sure you have the right kind of ammunition. You want to make sure you will have ammunition to take down any knockdown targets you might run into. Knockdown targets are becoming very popular in many matches, but they are not always the same. When I travel, I have three different types of rounds. I have my normal load, my heavy load, and then my really heavy load. I do not want to go all the way to a match only to lose because I didn't have a heavy enough round to knock the targets down. So, when you go to a match, make sure you are prepared ammunition wise.

There are countless things that can go wrong in a match. Some you can control and some you can't. Always remember, this sport is supposed to be fun. All of this advice is relative. Everyone is different and needs to prepare in his or her own way.

Yes, we have no bandanas? One of my shootin' pards stood there grinnin' at me with a coffee mug in his fist. I was beginning to regret not buying that "Bang Head Here" sticker for my bench top. Why did I let him in here? Or maybe it was the coffee? I was definitely going to have to do something about the coffee ...

Actually, up until that moment, the conversation had been remark-

ably sensible. We were discussing the finer nuances of wearing the "wild rag" or cowboy neckerchief. My end of the conversation centered around a trip to California where I had encountered what could only be known in SASS parlance as the "neckerchief police." Note I avoided calling them "bandana police" as, according to them, the bandana was just a humble cotton rag favored by railroad workers and farm hands for blowing one's schnoz or wiping sweat from a brow or grease and grime in similarly untidy endeavors. ("Cotton for 'blow," they said rather haughtily. "Silk for show.") Furthermore, they maintained, the proper term for that silken piece of buckaroo haberdashery was "mascada," in reference to its occasional usefulness in covering one's face while robbing banks, stagecoaches, trains, or similar mischiefs. Or might they have been referring to its masking purposes in riding drag? How positively un-posh!!

Now, to a certain degree, these Californios were correct. I've looked at a lot of scribblings, and most of the real old-timers who wrote books on the subject never called 'em bandanas. They were neckerchiefs or "wipes." Some referred to scarves or "mufflers" and others to "handkerchiefs." Many of these writers also state the majority of cowboys wore cotton rather than silk—though silk was always more highly regarded, as it was cool in summer and warm in winter.

The neckerchief, as most all of the puncher's clothing, was purely

functional. Andy Adams says this in "The Old-Time Cowhand": "Folded diagonally, like the first garment he ever wore, he tied the two farthest corners in a square knot and hung it on the safest peg he knowed—his neck. In this way he was never without it in case he needed it, and he most generally did."

Adams goes on to say the neckerchief was generally worn tied loosely, draped on the chest with the knot to the back. If the sun were particularly brutal, it would be reversed to protect the neck. Many argue the knot was always worn to the front and, if you look at photos, this is often so. But, many of these photos were made in studios or were posed because cameras of the day required long, long exposures, and it was customary to wear a neckerchief, neatly tied and knot forward for "steppin' out" or formalities.

Nor was the wipe always tied with a square knot. While that was likely the most common knot used because it lay flat, it would not have been uncommon to see it tied with a "four-in-hand," same as regular "straight" ties. For downright fancy occasions, it would have been tied with a complicated little knot that divided the knot into 4 small squares. The neckerchief, if large enough, could also be doubled around the neck and tied. This was done by putting the triangle at your neck and then wrapping the ends around to the front where they were tied. I'm not certain if this is a more modern method of wearing the scarf or not. I can tell you with certainty, it's a good way to wear it for added warmth in winter or if you have a scratchy, irritating shirt or coat collar.

The neckerchief could also be tied into an "Alcatraz ascot" if a "necktie party" was called and no rope was convenient. However, it was customary for only the guilty party to be wearing such a knot for that proceeding!

That humble piece of cloth served beyond protection from sun, dust, and wind. It made a dandy potholder or a glove for a hot branding iron, could be used as strainer to filter out mud from a watering hole, a tourniquet, bandage, or sling for a wound. It served as a piggin' string for hogtying cow critters, hobbles for a horse, or a sack for toting biscuits or fresh berries. Men and women both were laid to rest when tragedy struck along a trail with a neckerchief placed over their face to keep the dirt off. It was a handkerchief for sniffles, a wipe for a sweaty brow, a signaling device, a towel for both you and your dishes, and served well for those occasions when a snorty bronc needed blindfolding so you could get in the middle of him.

For the old-timers, red was the color of choice for cotton or silk scarves, followed by blue or black.

White was not highly regarded as it showed dirt in seconds. It was also bright. Fellers who were riding the "hoot owl" trail (desperados), or who were trying to keep their hair or personal pelts intact in unfriendly territory would have shied away from it, at least in the old days. As the times got gentler and more peaceful, things got more colorful and all forms of prints, paisleys, and bright colors became popular. The Californians still tell tales of modern buckaroos coming in out of high mountain line camps and buying the brightest orange or screaming canary yellow mascadas they could find simply because all they'd seen that winter was white.

As trail drives faded to fenced ranges, many cowboys declined wearing neckerchiefs. Collars remained buttoned to the top for all occasions, and it was expected ties be worn for a dance, wedding, or other formalities if you had one or could borrow one. Many shirts in those days had no collars and many a puncher declined the paper or celluloid collars of the day for fear of being laughed off the range. It also made sense those types of collars didn't make it into the cowboy's standard wardrobe. Social engagements were far and few between and paper or celluloid collars would get stuffed into his "war bag" ending up rumpled, tattered, and dirty.

However, there was one type of collar that would transcend such mischief—the leather collar. Frazier listed them, as did Heiser. Fay Ward notes them in his book, "The Working Cowboy's Manual." He maintains leather collars were not popular and probably when counted against paper or celluloid collars sold, yes, sheer numbers would have indicated this. In a waddy's war bag, however, it was a whole different world, and a leather collar made sense. They didn't show dirt, could be pulled out, reshaped, and be good to go. If you'd had time to hit the bathhouse, well ... you were the king of the plains and so downright respectable even your best gal and her *horse* couldn't raise objections!

Historically speaking, there are plenty of options for appropriate neckwear on the range. I've said pert near all I know on the topic but, as usual, invite your comments or complaints. 


# **COWBOY TRAP GUN**

Most of us just use our short-barreled main match shotguns. Even with a little help from a proper choke tube, the shorter barrel often hampers appropriate swing through. Let's face it; most Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> shotguns are not designed to bag flying clay birds!

Shortly before our state shoot, I received my long awaited '87 lever shotgun from Coyote Cap Gunworks with all embellishments. As I was packing the covered wagon for Range War, I wondered how it would work on the Cowboy Trap field. When the time came to manufacture powdered pigeons, the new '87 actually worked quite well. When the




dust settled on the Team Event section, low and behold, my ol' friend and partner Riverview Rattler, SASS #67025, and myself were declared

the victorious winners. It says in Ecclesiastes 4:9-10, "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their work: If one falls down, his friend can help him up. But pity the man who falls and has no one to help him up!" And indeed, Rattler was the greater half of our team.

The '87 worked very well for Cowboy Trap. Even with the short 18-1/2" barrel, my follow through felt good. I used the modified choke tube provided and AA Feather Lite #8 shot loads. This combination resulted in well-ground

round clays. Now, if I can only figure out how to load the blasted thing in a timely fashion, I can start to use it in the main matches!

Cheyenne warriors at The Little Big
Horn in June of 1876.

It was shortly after the Custer Battle that Cody would temporarily leave his show, and begin his last scouting expedition for the Army. During this expedition with Colonel Westly Merrit, Cody, and the cavalry pursued the Sioux in the area of War Bonnet Creek. On July 17th, 1876 Cody engaged in one-on-one combat with the Sioux Chief, Yellow Hand. When Cody killed Yellow Hand, he scalped the chief and is said to have shouted, "The first scalp for Custer!"

After the expedition, Cody returned to the stage. Cody was now 31 years old. On his last expedition with the cavalry, he found the West was changing. Considering the success of dime novels about the West and Cody's stage play, people seemed to be hungry for the West. The play was successful, and gave Cody money to buy a palatial estate In Rochester, New York. Cody, however, wanted more. He missed the "old days" and filled up his house with his partners from the past. He knew the West would soon be gone; it was an era drawing to a close. Cody loved the West. He wanted to share that era with everyone through an expanded Wild West Show. He wanted to create a grand pageant that would bring the west alive. Cody's sister, Helen Cody Wetmore says it best. She said Cody wanted to present the public "the actual history of the West, as it was lived for, fought for, and died for, by Indians, pioneers, and soldiers."

His first "Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show" debuted in Omaha, Nebraska in 1883, an extravaganza of "real" Cowboys, Indians, horses, buffalo, stagecoaches, wagons, teepees, and US Cavalry. The parade of the grand entrance was a spectacle. There were stagecoach robberies, trick riders, Indian battles, and herds of cattle and buffalo pursued around the arena. Between 1883 and 1886, Buffalo Bill's Wild

West Show traveled most major cities in the United States

The timing was perfect. Historians Elen Flexor and Ellen Fitzpatrick tell us about the times. During the last twenty years of the Nineteenth Century, America was undergoing an industrial revolution. Immigration was swelling the eastern and mid-western cities to overflowing, overtaxing their infrastructures. Settlement house like Jane Addam's "Hull House" sought to improve the plight of the masses. The West probably seemed to be a magic place with clean air, bountiful game, huge mountains, and wild Indians. People by the tens of thousands would flock to see the Wild West Show. This experience was the closest most would ever get to the West. This experience was "The Wild West" to most people.

In March 1886, Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show made its first trip to Europe. Cody took the entire show, Cowboys, Indians, horses, buffalo, longhorns, stagecoaches, and all on the chartered steamer "State of Nebraska" to England. The show was a tremendous success and ran continuously in England for almost a year, closing on May 1, 1887. Queen Victoria and many of the crown heads of Europe attended. Cody and the Wild West show returned triumphantly to the United States

The show once again toured the major cities of the United States. It was a small village of about 600 hundred cowboys, Indians, and showmen moved by train and wagon from town to town. In subsequent years, the show took several more trips to Europe. The crowds at the performances were huge. Buffalo Bill Cody and his Wild West Show entertained under varying names until 1913. However after 1903, the show's business started to decline. Even after it closed down, Cody decided to use the new media of motion pictures to reach people. He formed the "Cody Historical Pictures Company in 1913, but it was not a success. In the end, Cody toured with the Sells-Floto Circus as a headline attraction. Cody knew the time, his time, had past.

America was a changing place. The census of 1890 officially stated there was no longer a "frontier line" as the 19th Century historian Frederick Jackson Turner maintained in his "Frontier Thesis in 1893." The West was gone. Labor and big business were battling each other with heated strikes such as the Pullman and Homestead Steel strikes. Women were fighting the continuing battle for the vote. America was expanding overseas into the Pacific and Asia. Teddy Roosevelt was attacking big business and big trusts. It was a different world. As Cody's sister, Helen Cody Wetmore, said, "The story of the frontier is a tale that is told. The Wild West has vanished like a mist in the sun before the touch of two great magicians of the nineteenth century - steam and electricity."

William Frederick Cody died on January 10th, 1917. The Western Historian, Denis McLoughlin, said the headlines of his death wiped away the usual headlines of the war in Europe. Buffalo Bill Cody was buried on Lookout Mountain, Colorado under a bronze statue of him, atop his horse Buckskin Charlie, depicting him in the prime of his life. He had now faded into the mists of history just as his beloved Wild West had.

There is no way to measure how many hundreds of thousands, or even how many millions of people Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show touched. For the last fifty years of his life he was a legend, synonymous with the Wild West. Still today, there is probably not a school age child that doesn't at least know something about Buffalo Bill Cody. Even though his legend of his life grew beyond its reality, the real deeds of his life are still truly amazing. He achieved his goal to spread the image of the West, at least as he saw it, to the entire country, and even the entire world. It

is likely he reached more people with this image in his 50 years of showmanship than any other single person. While it may not have been historically objective by today's standards, it offered a glimpse of a life and times the spectators would never know first hand.

In my mind's eye, Buffalo Bill still rides across the vast, rolling, trackless grassy plains on Buckskin Charlie. His goatee protrudes from his leathery sun-tanned chin, a broadbrimmed felt sombrero is perched jauntily atop his head of long blonde hair. His fringed buckskins are stained and dusty, and his favorite .50 caliber buffalo rifle is cradled in the crook of his arm as he rides off into the mists of the dim horizon.

Adios, Buffalo Bill!

# COLT TO THE RESCUE

Guick!" she shouted. "Bring me the shotgun from the wall. There's an Indian coming to our unprotected side!" Once my grandmother's grandmother had the Colt in her hands, she thumbed back the right barrel's hammer and shot out the shooting port in the log wall. As the men folks were away getting provisions, the women and children were left to defend the cabin they were holed up in. The body was dumped down a dry well so it would not be found and cause another Indian attack to occur. This incident is part of my family's legacy, as they had come down the Ohio River on a flatboat and proceeded west to new land and a new future.

While most individuals think Remington, Ithaca, L. C. Smith, or Parker when the term double barrel shotgun is brought up, the Colt shotgun was on par with the Parker. The Colt 1878 hammered, Damascus shotgun was equal with the Parker as a high quality, hand built, high-grade shotgun built from 1878 until 1891. The Colt was a top line shotgun with each shotgun being hand assembled. Due to the hand fitting, parts do not interchange from one shotgun to another. For instance, I have a set of 1878 10-gauge barrels that need a receiver, and to date, I have not found one. A skilled gunsmith is needed to keep the old guns functioning. George Weiland of Truesdale, Iowa is mine. I like even my wall hangers to be mechanically functional.

The shotguns were available in eight grades (based upon my factory letters that list two of my guns as grade 8). Upon visiting with Kathleen Hoyt (Colt's Historian), she told me the records do not exist that explain what denotes each grade. The shipping records that exist and the guns that have been examined matching those records tell us

the grade number is not just about engraving, but is also about the type and grade of wood, and the fit and polishing of the gun.

Case hardening was also present on the shotgun receivers. The accompanying photographs of my personal shotguns are of two grade 8's, a grade 5, and a grade 2. One of the grade 8's cost \$2.25 engraved in 1882. It is fully engraved in scrolls and swirls. The other grade 8 engraved cost \$1.75 in 1880. Other grade 8's may have American animals on their frames. While in Las Vegas this past year, I asked the representative of Little John's Auction Company if he had ever seen a Colt shotgun that did not have barrels of Damascus steel. He told me all Colt shotguns are Damascus steel, even though the finish on the Colt barrels may look as though they are not Damascus.

The Colt 1878 shotgun was available in 10 and 12 gauge. While the standard barrel lengths were 28", 30", and 32", the guns were ordered with barrel lengths of 18, 26, 27, 28, 29, 29-1/2, 30, 31, 32, 33, and 34 inches (R.L. Wilson, The Book of Colt Firearms, p. 483). Colt would build a gun with any specifications the customer wanted. Most had case hardened locks, breech, and front-end mountings.

Barrels were offered in twist, fine, laminated, and Damascus, with the Damascus available in blued or browned finish. The price started at \$50 for a twist barrel, no engraving, and a straight stocked shotgun. Each variation added \$5; i.e., 1/2 grip checkered—\$55; Fine barrel, line engraved, straight stock—\$55; 1/2 grip—\$60; and on up to \$75 (Colt's 1890 catalog). Considering what wages

were in 1878, a \$50 shotgun was a very expensive firearm.

The stocks were available in English or Circassian walnut and supplied in any style desired by the customer (according to the Webster dictionary Circassian walnut is a light brown irregularly black-veined wood of the English walnut). The guns could be ordered with a varnished or oil-rubbed finish. Sometimes a hard-rubber butt plate was used, with a Rampant Colt design on it, but iron butt plates were most common. The butt stock on the bottom had an oval silver plate for initials or name. This

oval silver plate is present on all I own or have seen at gun shows and auctions.

The shotgun barrels were manufactured in Belgium and shipped to Colt in New Haven. If the buyer requested, Colt would provide the target with the gun's shot pattern and a guarantee the gun would shoot the pattern supplied. Certainly,

this denoted the high quality and workmanship that went into the 1878 Colt shotguns, which ceased production in 1889.

The average weight of the 12 gauge was 7-1/2 pounds; whereas, the 10 gauge weighted in at 11-1/2 pounds. The 10 gauge was used for duck and goose hunting and also for law enforcement work. America's pioneers brought a mix of gauges with them out west. During this time period, the Colt and Parker shotguns were equal in outstanding quality, design, and materials. John Blickhan, another Colt collector, told me he had acquired a "club" shotgun, new in the box. In the 1880's shooting clubs existed on the east coast. Just as today's golf courses have golf clubs for rent should a traveler want to play a round of golf, so did the shooting clubs have guns that could be rented. Many of these "club" guns were Colts, and John Blickhan was fortunate enough to acquire a new and unused one in its original shipping box.

As with the Single Action Army revolver and the Lightening rifle, the Colt shotgun played a vital role in America's history. In 1883 (accompanying photo), Colt offered a highgrade hammerless shotgun, which ceased production in 1895. As with the hammered 1878, the guns were offered in 12 gauge and 10 gauge. Many of the stagecoach and express company guards, law enforcement officers, and hunters preferred the 10 gauge shotgun because of the added range and increased number of pellets in the shell.

In the accompanying photos are some of my several hundred 10 gauge shells (both brass and paper) and also 12 gauge shells. In the 1880's, the shells were brass and paper and loaded with blackpowder. The 10 gauge shells were 2-5/8" long and the 12 gauge were 2-1/2" long.

Because of the role Colt played in American history, TTN International had a factory in China manufacture a modern, high quality Colt reproduction shotgun with good black walnut stocks. When I visited with Walt at TTN International, he told me the guns were exact part for part with the 1878 Colt except for the hammers, and they chamber 3" 12 gauge shells. The original Colt hammers rested on the shell's primer when not cocked, but the new TTN International shotgun has rebounding hammers, so the hammer does NOT rest on the shell's primer. This is for safety. The excellent distributors, AcuSport and EMF, distribute these 1878 shotguns. In the beginning, TTN International had some problems with a California distributor, but these two new distributors have excellent reputations of getting product to their dealers.

Walt put together a case hardened 1878 for me that is wonderful. As usual, I sent the shotgun to my gunsmith, George Weiland, and had an 1878 silver dollar inlet in the stock, the chambers polished more, and relieved so the AAs will fall out of the chambers when the double barrel is tipped up, and the gun gone through so it is ready for cowboy competition. Walt told me the 1878 TTN has many SASS championships to its credit. As a fellow Iowan, Gary Owen (Pike) of EMF or AcuSport will see you get one for your shooting battery.

R. L. Wilson stated in his book The Book of Colt Firearms, America's finest quality production shotguns were the Parker and the Colt 1878 and 1883 double barrel shotguns. In 1878, the hammer Colt shotgun was the most expensive item in the Colt line. The 1878 was called the "prince" of the Colt line, and the 1883 hammerless model the "king." Having a TTN International replica certainly adds to a shooter's battery of historical firearms. I am glad I bought a modern replica so I can enjoy shooting an 1878. You will enjoy yours, too.

- My Colt 1878 #3891 was shipped to New York on September 2,1880, with a standard horn tip forend; a 29" barrel; engraved @ \$1.75; Grade 8; 12 gauge.
- Colt 1878 #7917 was shipped in 1881 with a brass tip forend and in 10 gauge.
- Colt 1878 #12986 was shipped to Boston, MA on October 2, 1882 with a horn tip forend; a 28" barrel; full engraved @ \$2.25; Grade 8; 12 gauge.
- Colt 1878 #15995 was shipped to Philadelphia, PA on August 25, 1883 with a horn tip forend, special feature "extended rib"; a 30" barrel; Grade 5; 12 gauge.
- Colt 1883 #1264 was shipped in 1885 in 10 gauge.



(Continued from page 35) social spheres remained exclusive. A group in New York was even known as "The Four-Hundred."

The women in the West knew High Society in New York was conspicuously expensive. They had read of the "constant round of brilliant banquets, afternoon teas, and receptions ... beautiful women and brave men threading the mazes of the dance; scenes of revelry by night in an atmosphere loaded with the perfume of rare exotics, in the swell of sensuous music. Soon nothing remained for the wives of the Western millionaires but to purchase a brownstone mansion, and swing into the tide of fashion with receptions, balls, and kettledrums, elegant equipages (horse-drawn carriages) with coachmen in bright-buttoned livery, footmen in top-boots, maid-servants and man-servants, including a butler, and all the other adjuncts of fashionable life in a great metropolis."\*

It appeared to the women in the West plenty of people knew how to get money; but ... to be rich properly was, indeed, a fine art, an art they intended to bring to the West.

These self-made businessmen and their wives, the so-called *nouveaux rich*, intended to be granted entry into the highest social circles,

despite their alleged lack of social graces and pedigree.

How better to flaunt one's newly acquired riches than an annual ball? They christened them the 'Cattle Baron's Ball' to trumpet their manner of wealth. If the hauteur in New York thought of them as barbarians, then By God, they would provide a steady, "gaudy stream of bespangled, belaced, and beruffled barbarians"\* for all to witness ... and demonstrate they, too, knew how to be rich!

Cattle Baron's Balls were held in Cheyenne, Wyoming (17th Street was called Cattle Baron Row); Denver, Leadville, and Georgetown, Colorado; and San Antonio and Fort Worth, Texas to name a few. It didn't take long before the oil and railroad barons, the bankers and capitalists from the East Coast, rubbed elbows with the Cattlemen.

Envision top hats and cowboy hats, tuxedo-clad and buffalo-coated gentlemen entering the popular Hotel de Paris in Georgetown, Colorado (the second largest city in the state at the time, owing to the silver-mining boom) or the Driskill Hotel in Austin, Texas with their ladies affixed at their arms. They enter and nod toward one another: John Chisum, meet Jay Gould (railroad tycoon). Erasmus Nagle

Dodge (railroad man and politician). Entering now is Silas Seymour, Sidney Dillon, and Thomas C. Durant (the Union Pacific's driving force) and their wives asking for Buffalo Bill Cody's autograph (yes, they were fascinated and enthralled with celebrities even then). People traveled for hundreds and thousands of miles to attend a Cattle Baron's Ball.

Were these Western "barbarians" competitively dressed? Unquestionably! Allow the social-elitist Eastern women to arrive better dressed, i.e., appear wealthier, than the women of the West? Unthinkable! With their social status rivalry in the late 1880s, this division of class between the expanding West and influential East Coast defined the word 'bling' long before it became a fashion-word in the 20th and 21st century.

So there you have it ... dress as though you intend to be received and accepted by the social elite of New York City—yards of silk, lace, and ribbon, bedecked with jewelry, and accompanied by a self-made million-

aire whether it be a railroad man, oilman, industrialist, or cattleman. Keep in mind, by 1892 there were over 4,000 millionaires in the United States, and at the end of the century, 10 per cent of the families owned some three-quarters of the national wealth.

Have fun with the Cattle Baron's Ball and your persona. Remember, with this Ball we celebrate our cowboy ancestry; but not some run-of-the-mill cowboy. We celebrate the self-made Cattle Baron and his high society-loving wife.



# WHAT DIGITAL FORMAT IS RIGHT FOR YOU ... RAW, TIFF, OR JPG?

#### Choosing the right settings for your Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> Digital Camera

By Mark Quigley

This article is for you digital cow-**■** boy camera users. We are often asked what setting we use for our photography. I will try to answer that below and provide you with some tips at the end.

Cowboy Action Shooters these days are given many choices for selecting file formats in which to save your images. The most popular formats are JPEG, TIFF and RAW

RAW... Raw files are so named because they are not yet processed (like unprocessed food) and ready to be used

As far as versatility and quality goes, the RAW file is the way to go. RAW files contain huge amounts of information and allow for the most versatility when it comes time to work your image in an image-editing program. But having said that, RAW files also take the most work to get a great-looking image and are very large files.

TIFF ... Tag(ged) Image File **F**ormat

Not all digital cameras will offer saving TIFF's as a choice. TIFF files will always be higher quality than JPEGs, but less than RAW. The main problem with TIFF files is that they are very large in size, which will cause your camera to

slow when photographing. also slow your computer down because of their size. The good thing is they maintain their quality, and many magazines want them these days.

JPG ... Short for Joint Photographic Experts Group, the original name of the committee that wrote the standard.

JPG files will always be smaller than TIFF's. They take up less room on a filmcard and don't slow your camera down. They also don't slow down your computer. The

problem with JPG's is they continue to lose quality each time you save them, rotate them, or change them. Soon, you end up with a poor quality photo. Here is a tip around this if you want to photograph in JPG. As soon as you download your images from your camera, burn them to a CD ROM and you will have a permanent copy. Think of the CD as the old negative when it comes to film. When working with JPG's in the computer, use the CD so you won't degrade the image and then save it once.

OK now let me give you some tips on how you can use the different formats.

Now that you know the above information, always ask yourself ... what do I intend to do with the photograph?

I want the highest quality photo I can get? Shoot in RAW.

Am I going to just make **prints?** *JPG* will be fine as long as you stay 11x14 and below.

Use them to Email to others? JPG will be fine. Do not use TIFFs or RAW for emailing.


Am I going to send images on to Tex and Cat at The Cowboy Chronicle for an article? SASS accepts JPGs for The Cowboy **Chronicle** and prefers 6 megapixils or more in size. Put them on a CD. Images selected for publication will be converted to TIFFs, For ads they do in other publications they want

Use them in an ad? Many ad agencies want TIFFs or RAW. Ask them what they prefer.

Use them to make large prints 12x18 or larger? Use TIFFs for this at your custom labs.

I hope I answered your questions on this subject.

Shoot well and stay safe. .

# 1850's

**25 May 1850** The New Mexican Territory Convention adopts a state constitution establishing its boundaries and prohibiting slavery.

29 May 1850 At the Battle of Agua Dulce, Texas Rangers engage Otto Cuero's Comanches.

4 May 1851 A 5<sup>th</sup> fire destroys 70% of San Francisco – greater than all earlier fires combined.

**6 May 1851** The Cherokee Nation opens its men's seminary (high school) near Park Hill in eastern Indian Territory (Oklahoma). The Cherokees provide all the funding for the school. The female seminary opens the next day.

15 May 1851 "Calamity" Jane is born; Princeton, Missouri.

**12 May 1853** Pickled in whiskey, the head of Joaquin Murrieta and the hand of "Three-Fingered" Jack goes on national tour.

17 May 1853 California Rangers are organized and commanded by Captain Harry Love, former Texas Ranger and Indian fighter.

17 May 1853 Fort Riley army base is established in Kansas.

19 May 1853 The Democratic administration of Franklin Pierce begins negotiations with Mexico to purchase land along the southern border of the New Mexico Territory. The United States wants the strip for a proposed railroad route from Texas to California.

26 May 1853 John Wesley Hardin is born in Bonham, Texas, son of Methodist

11 May 1854 In an effort to end the fighting in the Walker War in southern Utah,
Paiute Chief Walkara and Utah Governor Brigham Young meet in
Juab County, Utah. The meeting ends the ongoing fighting, though
the fighting will resume later.

30 May 1854 The Kansas-Nebraska Act is signed by President Pierce after passing the House and Senate. This act established two territories, with the settlers to decide the slavery issue. At the time, the Kansas Territory comprised all of present-day Kansas and most of present-day Colorado. The Nebraska Territory comprised present-day Nebraska and parts of North and South Dakota, Wyoming, and Colorado. Current treaties with the Osage, Cherokee, Cheyenne, Chippewa, and other Indian Nations are ignored.

**15 May 1856** The editor of the San Francisco *Daily Evening Bulletin*, James King, is found murdered. 'Committees of Vigilance' are formed to keep order in the streets.

21 May 1856 The pro-slavery Border Ruffians, aided by Kickapoo Rangers under Colonel Jefferson Buford, sack Lawrence, Kansas Territory. The hotel and printing presses are burned, homes are pillaged, and one man is killed. Exaggerated accounts of the destruction arouse Northern sympathizers.


24 May 1856 Around midnight John Brown, his four sons and two others attack pro-slavery cabins along Pottawatomie Creek, Kansas Territory. They butcher five men, hacking off limbs and shooting them as families watch in horror. Militias of Kansas' factions are alerted to stand by.

**27 May 1856** General John Wool and his forces and volunteers defeat the Rogue River Indians at the Battle of Big Meadows, Oregon.

28 May 1857 An Army punitive expedition departs Fort Leavenworth, Kansas Territory against Mormon settlers resisting federal authority in Utah. Information the territory was in a 'state of rebellion' was exaggerated.

11 May 1858 Minnesota is admitted to the Union as a non-slave state. It is the thirty-second state of the Union.

# LITTLE KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE WAY OUT WEST -

CHRIS MADSEN served on the Hanging Judge's (Isaac Charles Parker) roster of U.S.

Deputy Marshals in Fort Smith, Arkansas,

whose job was to police the lawless Oklahoma Territory in the 1880's. Madsen was a Danish soldier of fortune who had been a member of the French Foreign Legion in Africa and fought shoulder-to-shoulder with the Italian rebel Garibaldi, before coming to America in the 1870's. He joined the US Cavalry and fought his way west in the war against the Sioux, Cheyenne, and other fierce Plains Indian tribes before becoming a lawman. Chris was

one of the famous triumvirate christened the "Oklahoma Guardsmen," which cleared the Indian Territory of outlaws in the 1890's.

12 May 1858 Colonel John S. "Rip" Ford with 100 Texas Rangers, along with Colonel Albert Sidney and his Second Cavalry, and Chief Placido and his 111 Tonkawas attack Buffalo Hump's Comanches in the Antelope Hills on Canadian River in Indian Territory. Chief Po-hebit-squash, "Iron Jacket," seventy-five Comanches, and two Rangers are killed.

12 May 1858 Jack Powers/Pio Linares Gang attack Rancho San Juan Capistrano, killing two men and raping the foreman's wife.

17 May 1858 Brevet Lieutenant Colonel Steptoe and his expedition leave Fort Walla Walla in SE Washington in search of hostiles. With 158 soldiers and thirty civilian volunteers, they encounter hundreds of Spokane and Coeur d'Alene Indians. The Battle at Steptoe Butte takes place thirty miles south of present-day Spokane. Steptoe's forces are forced to retreat and fight a running battle. Many lives are lost on both sides.

**20 May 1858** Reverend Pierre De Smet leaves St. Louis and goes west, serving as chaplain for an army expedition.

6 May 1859 John H. Gregory discovers a quartz vein rich in gold at Gregory's Gulch, on the north branch of Clear Creek in western Kansas Territory (present-day Colorado). A series of strikes begins. Colorado towns such as Boulder, Golden, Canon City, and Colorado Springs owe their existence to mining activity. By 1860 5000 miners a week pour into the Kansas Territory.

**9 May 1859** Utah Territorial Governor Cummings declares any assemblage of armed men in the territory illegal, attempting to handle the presence of both federal troops and armed Mormons.

12 May 1859 Captain Earl Van Dorn and members of the Second Cavalry attack Comanche forces at Crooked Creek, southwestern Kansas Territory. Robert E. Lee is wounded during this fight. Forty-nine Comanche warriors are killed and the remaining five are wounded, thirty-two Comanche women are taken prisoner, and two soldiers are killed.

12 May 1859 "Where, under our Declaration of Independence, does the White Saxon man get his power to deprive all women and negroes of their inalienable rights?" queries Susan B. Anthony at the opening of the Ninth National Women's Rights Convention in New York City. Soon, pioneering women west of the Mississippi will pick up the cry.

23 May 1859 John Baylor and a group of Texans attack the Caddo living on the Brazos River Reservation. The attack is due to a series of murders committed by non-reservation Plains Indians. After one Indian is killed, Agent Robert Neighbors intercedes and arranges for the Caddo to be moved to a new reservation in Oklahoma, far from the Indian-hating Texans. Neighbors will be murdered in September, labeled an "Indian-lover." •



If you were out on the range, far from towns and civilization, having a rifle and pistol using the same ammo made sense. It was far simpler to have one cartridge for all your guns. There was no possibility of grabbing

the wrong box of shells out of the saddlebags when you grabbed your rifle and dove behind some rocks to avoid hostiles or banditos! Colt had been making metallic cartridge conversions of their 1851 and 1860 percussion revolvers for at least a year or two, but they were not available in a rifle caliber.

Then, as now, it makes sense to have the same caliber for both rifle and revolver. I always wondered why couldn't I have an 1872 in .45 Colt.

Imagine my surprise when in late 2006 General Grant's EMF called and asked me if I wanted to try their new .45 Colt version of the 1872 Open Top. It seems Cimarron lost their exclusive rights, and the first thing EMF did was to acquire them in .45 Colt. I was ecstatic, and of course said, "Aw shucks, I guess I could!" Since they got one to me first, they get the article.

#### **1872 OPEN TOP:** A BRIEF HISTORY RECAP

From the time of the California Gold Rush, the Civil War, and the early westward migration, almost all revolvers were percussion firearms, with the exception of the Smith and Wesson revolvers. Smith and Wesson held the rights to Rollin White's patent on "bored through revolver cylinders." From about 1860 on, S&W produced their No. 1, No. 1-1/2, and No. 2 revolvers, which were in .22 and .32 caliber rim fire. Though popular, they were rather anemic in the "fight stopping" power department.

In 1869, S&W introduced their No. 3 "American Model" top break revolver; first in .44 Henry rim-fire, then in .44 American (which was

essentially a center-fire Henry). It was an instant success, and was even adopted by the US Army. It was the first metallic cartridge revolver with true "stopping power." Colt, Remington, and others could only produce their percussion revolvers, as S&W still had the patent rights for bored through cylinders – an absolute necessity for cartridge revolvers!

In 1871, however, the patent expired. Many manufacturers, including Colt, worked feverishly to come up with cartridge revolvers. Colt introduced the Richard's patented, a cartridge conversion of the 1851 Navy and 1860 Army revolvers. They used a new shorter cylinder on the percussion frame. Behind the cylinder was an added-on

# CIMARRON BRINGS BACK THE EARLY WEST Henry Military Model

#### HENRY HISTORY

The most revolutionary exception to the 1850's era single shot rifles was the experimental lever action Volcanic Repeating Rifle, designed by D.B. Wesson of Smith and Wesson. This rifle was available in various calibers, but all calibers used a hollow lead bullet that contained a small 6.5-grain powder charge and a priming compound. To say it was anemic in the performance area is an understatement.

Oliver Winchester saw the potential this design had. He bought the Volcanic Arms Co., and renamed it New Haven Arms Co., and set out to improve the design. He wisely employed Volcanic's Superintendent, an inventor named B. Tyler Henry. Winchester, knowing the Volcanic's shortcoming was the very underpow-


ered ammunition (that had a really nasty habit of going off in the under barrel magazine), put Henry in charge of ammunition development.

In 1858, Henry patented a

.44 caliber rim fire cartridge. It utilized a copper case with a priming compound in the folded rim, much like a modern day .22 LR cartridge. The powder charge was 26 to 28



piece to the frame that held a loading gate, rear sight notch, and frame mounted firing pin. The loading lever was removed and replaced with an ejector rod. Another Colt engineer named Mason patented some changes to the basic conversion. It utilized a hammer mounted firing pin and a slightly different ejector rod. Both of these revolvers were an instant success.

In 1872, Colt had run out of 1860 components, and introduced the new 1872 "Open Top" revolver. While very similar in appearance to the conversions, it was made from all newly manufactured parts. The "Open Top" name derives from the fact, just like the earlier 1860s and conversions, there was no top strap over the cylinder. The only parts that were interchangeable with the 1860s and conversions are the grip frame and, I believe, the wedge! A total of around 7,000 of these Open Tops were manufactured by Colt between 1872 and 1876.

The 1872 Open Top Colt was available only in .44 Henry rim-fire. It was meant to be a companion piece to the 1866 Winchester and Henry rifles, and was an instant marketing success. Both of these rifles were in .44 Henry caliber. Colt even continued with the .44 rim-fire chambering

in the new 1873 Single Action Army.

Even then, the concept of one cartridge for both rifle and pistol was popular. It certainly simplified provisioning for a long trek on horseback. The Open Tops, 1866 Winchester, and Henry stayed popular until the turn of the Century. Rim-fire .44 Henry ammunition was even manufactured until just before WWII.

#### EMF'S .45 COLT 1872 OPEN TOP

EMF was one of the very first purveyors of fine replica Old West Guns. The newest in their line of revolvers is the 1872 Open Top Model in .45 Colt. It is great! I obtained an 1872 Open Top .45 Colt in late fall of 2006 for evaluation in this article. Mine is an eight-inch barreled model with the blue steel Army size grip. The 1872 Open Top Models from EMF are now available in three calibers: .45 Colt, .44 Colt/.44 Special/.44 Russian, and .38 Special/.38 Colt. Availability varies, as demand is VERY high.

My first impression of the EMF 1872 was extremely favorable. The 1872's are very similar to the sleek lines of the 1860 Richards and Richards-Mason conversion. They have a slightly "beefier" cylinder than the originals to accommodate the larger modern .45 and .44 cartridges. The 1872's have beautiful, deep pol-

ished bluing, perfectly fitting walnut one- piece grips, and a nice subtle color casehardened receiver and hammer! The cylinder has a Colt Style Naval battle scene roll stamped on it. Like the Richards-Mason Conversions and original 1872s, the EMF 1872 Open Top has a hammermounted firing pin.

When you pick it up, you immediately notice they have a nice balance. It has a slightly muzzle heavy feel that lends itself (in my opinion) to Duelist style shooting. The actions are light and crisp; the trigger on mine breaking at around 2 lbs. with almost no creep! The timing was "right on the money." I saw no drag marks on the cylinder. The front sight is a blade style, while the rear sight is a milled notch in a built up area on the top, rear end of the barrel. The front sight is higher than on the original 1872's, as they used the same sights as the 1860 Army percussion models. The originals were regulated for 75 yards! The sight picture was superior to a pinch framed early Colt or Remington 1875, but not quite as good as a Vaquero's! It is wide enough to lend itself to a rapid front sight acquisition. The fit and finish, especially the wood to metal fit, was flawless. The bluing is dark and rich.

Loading and unloading the 1872 Colt is the same as with an original

Colt or other SAA clones. Half cock the hammer, open the loading gate on the side, and rotate the cylinder by hand. When taking it apart to clean it, you break it down like an 1860 .44 Army percussion revolver. Drive out the wedge, pull off the barrel, and then with the hammer at half cock, pull off the cylinder. Reassemble in reverse order. It is one of the easiest revolvers to clean, even when using real blackpowder.

The EMF/Uberti 1872 has a nice touch. The wedge screw to capture the takedown wedge has a flat spot on the edge. Tightened in, it keeps the wedge from backing out. To remove the wedge, you just turn the screw one-quarter turn to its flat edge, allowing you to drive out the wedge. Another clever feature is the flange on the front of the cylinder face used to eliminate cylinder pin fouling. This flange makes the EMF 1872's impervious to blackpowder fowling. I fired 100 rounds of blackpowder loads from an earlier Uberti 1872 Open Top (.45 Schofield variety) without cleaning it. It just kept going.

#### HOW DOES IT SHOOT?

The reason I chose .45 Colt 1872 Open Tops should be obvious. It is a revolver that has been too long awaited. As I have already stated, the slightly muzzle heavy feel of the 1872's really seemed to point very

well when shooting Duelist. This natural "pointability" is inherited from its 1860 Colt Army percussion roots. The long barrel and muzzle heavy feel of the Open Top also seemed to help my "point shooting" using a traditional two hand hold. For the evaluation, the 1872 Open Top was shot off-hand, two handed, traditional style, at ten yards. For this article, I used the following smokeless ammunition:

Black Hills .45 Colt 250 grain. Black Hills .45 Schofield 230 grain. Black Hills .45 Schofield 180 grain

#### LOAD GROUP SIZE/POI

Black Hills 250 RNFP 1"/ 2-1/2" above POA Black Hills 230 RNFP 2-1/4"/3" above POA Black Hills 180 RNFP 5"\*/1" above POA

The 1872 Open Top clearly preferred the Black Hills 250-grain Colt load. I found this a little surprising, as usually I find the 230-grain Schofield loads do best.


\* The 180-grain Schofields were awful in the Open Top. For some reason I have found that guns either love or hate the 180-grain Schofield load. In another test fire session using an 1860 Uberti Army with an R&D conversion cylinder, the 180-grain Schofield was capable of subone inch groups! Go figure?

#### **CONCLUSION**

The EMF .45 Colt 1872 Open Tops are perfect for the Cowboy Action Shooter or Old West re-enactor portraying the early post-Civil War years of the American West. It is perfect to go with an 1865 Spencer, 1860 Henry, or 1866 Winchester, especially if you use .45 Colt in your main match rifle. (Ah, some may say Spencers don't come in .45 Colt! They will be coming soon!) Using the same ammo for pistol and rifle has always been convenient and logical.

EMF has done a wonderful job on the .45 Colt 1872 Open Tops. Not only are they beautiful, they are real shooters. I liked my sample so much, I bought it to pair with my Taylor's .45 Colt, 1858 Remington factory cartridge conversion.

grains of blackpowder behind either a 216-grain conical or 200-grain flat point bullet. The latter was referred to as the ".44 Henry Flat." The bullet was a "healed" design, where the bullet is the same diameter as the cartridge case. To attach the bullet to the case, the base of the bullet is rebated, this smaller diameter portion being crimped inside the case (also like a modern .22 LR round). The original Henry rounds moved out at between 1100 and 1150 fps. While not a powerhouse by today's standards, it would prove very popular during its time.

Winchester coupled this cartridge with a modification of the old Volcanic rifle, and in 1860, the Henry Repeating Rifle was born. It held an unprecedented 15 shots in the magazine, and one more in the chamber. In a world full of single shot muzzle loaders, this was unbelievable firepower! The Henry rifle earned a much-deserved reputation for awesome firepower! While a muzzleloader is capable of several shots a minute, the new Henry rifle was capable of an unbelievable one aimed shot every second! Winchester capitalized on this with some rather fanciful advertising. He said the Henry was the most effective firearm in the world. He also said: "A resolute man, armed with one of these [Henry] rifles, particularly if on horseback, can not be taken!"

#### **CIMARRON'S** HENRY MILITARY MODEL

The Henry replicas are currently available only in .44-40 or .45 Colt. The .45 Colt will feed .45 Schofield, also, as long as you don't use the short 180-grain bullets. While the Henry is one of the most expensive Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> rifles, retailing at \$1050 or so, Cimarron's Henry is well worth it. Just as it was in 1865, it is an extremely expensive rifle to produce. The barrel and magazine tube are still machined from a single piece of forged steel, just as the originals were.

It has a certain mystique and is in my mind, with the exception of its cousin the 1866 Winchester, the quintessential rifle of the "Wild West." When you consider the Wild West was from 1860 to 1890ish, the Henry and 1866 far outnumbered the 1873 Winchester until almost 1880, and still continued to be popular until near the turn of the Century.

The Cimarron Henry's long barrel is accented by the lack of a fore stock, thus making the barrel seem even longer. The brass frame and butt plate, even when tarnished with use, nicely accent the blued steel of the barrel. The butt stock has a graceful, gently swelled curve, reminiscent of a Kentucky long rifle. As the Henry is N-SSA approved, the stock has two re-enforcing rods running through it to give it additional strength for use "in the field." The frame is eye-catching brass. The Henry has a door in the nicely done brass crescent butt plate to expose a cavity in the stock for a multi-part cleaning rod, just like the originals. The finish on the barrel and lever of my sample is the "charcoal blue" finish, an almost iridescent, rich blue.

The Military Model Henry has military inspector's cartouches on the stock and frame. There is a sling swivel on the left side of the stock, also like the originals. There is a corresponding "D" screwed to the left side of the barrel to accept the peculiar hook device for the opposite end of the Henry military sling. The Henry has a long-range ladder sight, fancifully graduated to 800 yards. This folds down to expose a wide "V" notch "Battle Sight." The front sight is a very wide, nonadjustable brass blade.

While the Cimarron rifles are as heavy as the originals, and are subject to the same limitations of the 19th century design and the same materials, with its brass frame, DO NOT SHOOT HOT LOADS IN THE HENRY! The rifle is designed to take factory loads that meet SSAA-

MI specifications. I hand-load for mine, and tend to load slightly lower than "factory" loads.

When loading for the Henry, it is imperative you only load flat point bullets. This is even more critical than other tubular magazine rifles. This is because of the peculiar way you load the Henry from the muzzle end.

To load, you push the thumb piece (and follower) up to the muzzle end of the tube. When it reaches the end, it unlocks the last four inches of barrel and magazine tube (including the follower), which then rotate about 30 degrees around the axis of the barrel, leaving the muzzle end of the magazine tube open. One then loads up to 13 rounds of .45 Colt (or .44-40) or 14 rounds of Schofield, rim end first. This is best done by laying the rifle on its side on the loading table, and placing them in one at a time. While holding the follower back, rotate the barrel back into place, and ease the follower down against the cartridges until all of the excess space in the magazine tube is taken up.

Even though the newer Henry rifles have a rubber shock absorber insert in the follower where it contacts the bullets, I still would not allow the follower to snap down on the stack of cartridges in the magazine. If one round has a high primer, it could still go off! This thumb piece on the follower moves along the bot-

tom of the magazine tube as you chamber each round. Because there is no wood fore-stock, it is necessary to shift your grip on the tube when the follower comes in contact with your hand. In the beginning this was a minor annoyance, but I have gotten used to it and do it now without even consciously noticing it.

#### HOW DOES IT SHOOT?

The reason I chose .45 Colt/Schofield in the 1860 Henry was to be able to, as closely as possible, duplicate the .44 Henry round originally used in the 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchester. I used Starline .45 Schofield brass, Winchester and CCI primers, 27 grains (volume) of both FFFG Goex and FFG Elephant blackpowder, a milk carton .45 diameter wad (to prevent the lube in the wad from migrating to the powder), and a SPG lubed 200 grain RNFP .452 bullet. For an alternative load-

ing, I use 25 grains (volume) of Hodgdon's Triple 7 blackpowder replacement. It is about 10-15% hotter than equivalent blackpowder loads, so 25 grains of Triple 7 duplicate the 27-28 grains of Goex. Original Henry rounds I have dissected have 25 to 27 grains of coarse (probably FFG) blackpowder and a 200-grain .440-.442 diameter heeled bullet in a copper rimfire case. The overall length of the Schofield rounds is very close to the Henry, only about 1/10 inch longer overall.

As for factory ammunition, Black Hills makes both .45 Schofield and .45 Colt factory ammo for Cowboy Action Shooters. The published velocity for the Colt and Schofield loads hovers at about 750 fps. I used only the 230-grain Schofield loads, as the 180-grain Schofields were too short for my Henry. I also used Black Hills .45 Colt 250 grain RNFP loads in the Henry. The Black Hills



#### DWAIN B. BOND - "BONDO"

Dwain B. Bond believed in reincarnation, and he certainly brought credibility to that belief during the final years of his life, prior to his sudden death from a heart attack on March 5, 2007, at the age of 64. During the past several years, Dwain could be found at events around the country celebrating our Western heritage. And, those who had the opportunity to enter his Old West saloon tent and listen to him pound out over 100 "honky tonk" style historic songs on his vintage upright piano, observed a master at re-creating the "rinky tink" sound that served as background music in dusty, frontier saloons across the American West in the late 1800's. Playing by ear and with his authentic close-handing style, Dwain brought back the look and the sound of those frontier saloon piano days that have been all but lost to the annals of time.

Born in Decatur, Texas on March 16, 1942, he spent his early childhood in Lubbock, Texas, until his family moved to central Ohio. There he attended Canal Winchester High School and later, after serving in the National Guard, graduated from Capital University with a Bachelor's degree in Geology.

graduation. his Following Dwain's spirit of adventure took him to Fairbanks, Alaska, where he attended graduate school in geology for one year at the University of Alaska. Dwain didn't like sitting in a classroom any longer, so he hired on with Pan American Petroleum (later known as Amoco) where he managed oil and gas wells being drilled in the Gulf of Alaska. From there, Dwain began his 30-year career in the oil and gas business. He worked for major oil companies and small independents, developed his own consulting business and his own small oil company, "wildcatting" and traveling throughout the western U.S. and South America, and he called several places home, including Anchorage,

Denver, Midland, Corpus Christi, Abilene, and finally Big Spring, Texas. Throughout all the ups and downs of the oil industry, maintained his great sense of humor, h i s

mism, and his ability to have a lot of fun at whatever he did.

Dwain also had a good ear for music, as well as an ability to play without instruction just about any musical instrument he laid his hands on. From banjo to bagpipes, trumpet to fife to piano, he would entertain friends, family, and strangers with his music, sometimes into the wee hours of the morning. So, after retiring from the oil business, Dwain began doing what he truly loved: playing music. He said, "it sure fits me just fine." Having the sense he belonged more in the 19th Century than the 20th, Dwain formed a Civil War era drum and fife corps and played at historic and civic events in Texas and New Mexico, and participated in Civil War re-enactments at Gettysburg and other battlefields. Ultimately, he moved on to his final "gig," playing his honkytonk frontier saloon piano at Western heritage shows across the country, including END of TRAIL. He also composed lyrics, and one of his compositions was being considered for national recognition at the time of his death.

Dwain was truly one-of-a-kind. People were naturally drawn to him because of his humor, his talent, his sense of adventure, and most of all, his authenticity. Dwain created good times and fun, no matter where he was or what he was doing. He will be missed by his friends, his wife, his two daughters, and his brother, Wendell. We all wish him Godspeed as he begins his next "gig." ...


out his encouragement and friendship. He still lives in the hearts and memories of his fellow cowboys.

Obviously, the importance of the .44 Magnum cannot be overstated, and Sections 4, 5, and 6 are devoted to this caliber. Sixgunner cleverly breaks down the .44 Magnum into the guns most frequently associated with it by manufacturer, so there is simply no confusion. First, there are three chapters for Smith & Wesson's Model 29, then the Model 629, then the new, lightweight Magnum, the 329PD. One great line I noted was where John T says, "When it comes to double action .44 Magnums, Smith & Wessons are like thoroughbreds, while Dan Wesson, Rugers, and Taurus .44s, being much larger and heavier, are like Clydesdales." What does that mean? It means use those really heavy loads in .44 magnums from companies other than Smith &Wesson. Big John calls S &W's .44 Magnum revolvers "gentlemen's sixguns," and I think you all can understand exactly what he means.

The S&W section is followed by four chapters on the Rugers, from the "First .44 Blackhawk—the "Flat-Top" through the Super Blackhawk, Bisley, and Hunter models from that company. Section 6, which follows, details a host of .44 Magnums from other companies so, in case you were wondering, Big John misses no maker of any importance, replicas, double action silhouette guns, semi-automatic magnums, and single shots as well. I do love the title of chapter 34 - John T calls it "The Perfect Cartridge in the Perfect Sixgun - Freedom Arms Model 83." He does have a way with words, and he lets us know what's good and what's great!

This is a book about a caliber, not handguns, so Section 7 is called "The Long Guns and Long Cartridges" and after the Cowboy Action Shooter's favorites, both the replica .44s and the modern .44 rifles, we get details about the .444 Marlin and .445 SuperMag—now, if that doesn't cover EVERYTHING about the .44, what else is there?


One more thing - "Loads and Handloads for the .44s." John Taffin is nothing if he's not a handloader extraordinaire, and Section 8 gives us the whole nine yards of loading the .44 caliber cartridge. If you need to know which bullet, powder, primer, and die to use-here it is! I admit, some of that is Greek to me, but for my reloading pardners, this will be a dream section to have. I am kind of fond of the last chapter because, as it is Chapter 44, it covers "Factory Loads for .44s," and it is in this world that I most often find myself when it comes to just about anything to do with my defensive .44s.


In Mr. Taffin's own words, the story of the .44 is far from over. He sees deeply into the past, and he sees far off into the future when he says, in conclusion:



Frontier Marshal (1939) with Randolph Scott as Wyatt Earp and Cesar Romero as Doc Holliday.

Tombstone, the Town to Tough to Die (1942), with Richard Dix as Wyatt and Ken Taylor as Doc.

My Darling Clementine (1946) with Henry Fonda playing Wyatt and Victor Mature as Doc.

Gunfight at the O.K. Corral (1957) gave us two great actors, Burt Lancaster as Wyatt and Kirk Douglas as Doc.

Hour of the Gun (1967) with James Garner as Wyatt and Jason Robards as Doc. Robert Ryan played Ike Clanton.

Doc (1971) had Stacy Keach as Doc and Harris Yulin as Wyatt.

Tombstone (1993) with Kurt Russell as Wyatt, Val Kilmer as Doc, Sam Elliott as Virgil, and Bill Paxton as Morgan, along with an outstanding cast that included Powers Boothe as Curly Bill, Stephen Lang as Ike Clanton, and Michael Biehn as Johnny Ringo.

Photos can also be submitted via e-mail ... a few at a time. Put up to four photos in a folder, zip it, and attach the zipped folder to an e-mail message. Captions should be documented in a separate Word file. For each of the images, indicate the image file name followed by the caption. Put all the captions in a single file. Put this Word file in the zipped folder with the images.

Images can be submitted as .jpg files ... they're smaller than .tif files, which are used for actual

printing. It's easy and convenient to put a bunch of small images in a zipped folder and e-mail them ... the transmission time is short. However, these small images are really not useable ... and if they are used, the quality will be very low. You won't be proud of your article. Take your pictures at "high resolution" ... at least 3 megapixils, but five or more megapixil photos work best. These pictures will be converted to .tifs, lightened for publication, and cropped. After processing, the images should still have one side at least 1000 pixils in size.

That's a five-inch picture at 200 dots per inch. Collage photos can be just a tad smaller. The bottom line ... bigger pictures are better than smaller pictures!

If you don't have the patience to e-mail the pictures, put them on a CD or DVD and send them to the SASS office (attention Tex). If you send a CD of pictures, please put your article on the CD as well. It helps to keep everything together.

By the way ... if you are using "sessions" on your PC (so you can write to your CD multiple times) it will be unreadable on the Mac.

### Recap

Submit text in Word files; photos as large .jpg files. Caption the photos. E-mail material whenever possible; send CD/DVD otherwise. Handwritten material will not be published.

When e-mailed material is received, it will be acknowledged via return mail. If you don't get an acknowledgement, call the office and inquire.

If there are ever any questions, please don't hesitate to ask. Everyone's goal is to produce the best Comboy Chronicle possible! .
