fer good memories. With that personal chore being successfully completed, I headed back to finish my part of the Utah War. There was the usual forest fire smoke off and on as I clicked off the miles burnin' up the local main trails headin' south. Forest fires are nothing new, as they happen every summer, but fires could sure screw up movin' a herd back in them days.

As I arrived at the Utah War battlefield, recruitments and fresh troops had arrived, and my cool spot by the brook was taken. I walked over to a couple of cowboys enjoying the late afternoon, sat down on a stump (lawn chair), and we commenced to introduce ourselves.

This is where frame of mind took me back, way back to the Ol' West, as

they said "Yur Madd Mike, The GunFighter?" I proudly said, "Yup", and then asked, "Why?" (I can be long winded at times) "Well ya see," they replied, "We got our own GunFighter round these here parts, goes by the name of Doc Nelson, that's gittin really fast, and we can't wait ta see who's faster!!" I've heard quite a bit about "spirit of the game" and the following is right out of the SASS Handbook:

"As the game of Cowboy Action ShootingTM has evolved, our members have developed and adopted an attitude towards their participation we call "The Spirit of the Game." Competing in The Spirit of the Game means you fully participate in what the competition asks. You do not look for ways to create an advantage out of what is or is not stated as a rule or shooting procedure. Some folks would call The Spirit of the Game nothing more than good sportsmanship. Whatever you call it, if you don't have it, Cowboy Action Shooting[™] is not your game."

Whatever you call it—sportsmanship, code of ethics, playing fairly, the Cowboy Code—whatever, it comes down to attitude.

Most of us have entered this sport because it is just that—a sport. It's supposed to be fun! It's an escape from our everyday lives. We can pretend to be someone other than our professional or daily self. We can go back in time and get away from "the real world," if only for a few hours. UNLOADING TABLE MONITOR

The Michigan State Cowboy Action Shooting[™] Championship known as The Wolverine Rangers Range War is held over Labor Day weekend and attracts many good shooters from far and wide. My posse had several hot shooters who were hard workers; among them were the posse marshal and a national champion.

The national champion demonstrated proper procedure to us all by carefully examining each shooting position and mentally verifying that each target was still in its proper position, before assuming the starting position, and firing with the speed and accuracy necessary to achieve that high status. Perhaps we should all follow this procedure, as we can then have more fun by spreading our shooting range time over a longer period.

Upon completion of the course of fire, the national champion then proceeded to the unloading table, as is standard procedure. The rifle and shotgun were verified as empty, the

revolver cylinder's cartridge cases shucked out, and the cylinder spun at about 1000 RPM, and the loading gate closed. As the unloading table monitor I objected, and explained that as an Elder Statesman I react slowly, I see slowly, and as a result, I shoot slowly. I would appreciate the cylinder being turned at a slower RPM. Somewhat reluctantly this was done. Stage 2 followed with exactly the same pre-firing procedure and post firing conversation, plus some further discussion. Words like ridiculous, agreement, rude, arrogant, came up. Stage 3 again followed the same pattern, plus the posse marshal told me there was to be no trouble ... I replied there shouldn't be! Stage 4 again was the same and the posse marshal informed me henceforth he would verify the competitors' firearms were empty.

Perhaps I am a slow learner, also. I somehow thought the rules applied to all competitors with the same effect. The temperature was hot, the sun was high, the shade was non-existent, and so I looked for another posse job. Counting misses, standing in the shade, empathizing with fellow shooters who had the target unexpectedly jump in an unanticipated direction at the moment the hammer fell, etc.

For my own part, I will be happy if I am never on the same posse as either of those two competitors, again ... and even happier, should they feel the same.


(You're absolutely correct ... mentally shooting the stage after being called to the firing line is inappropriate and actually "shadow shooting" the stage at the firing line is forbidden. It simply consumes unnecessary time. Both of these activities should be accomplished at the Loading Table or the Expeditor's position. However, for anyone to object to any request to show clear at the Unloading Table is unforgivable. Until the Unloading Officer releases the shooter, they are obligated to remain at the Unloading Table. If this means waiting on an unloading officer to return to the unloading table or reopening every one of the firearms for a second inspection, that's the appropriate etiquette. No one should ever be upset or impolite when having their firearms verified empty ... editor in chief.) **1**.

THE REVERSE DRAW

My reason for contacting The Comboy Chronicle is motivated by Juaquin Malone's comments on "Butt Forward Pistol Carry."

In his opening remarks Mr. Malone mentions Wild Bill Hickok and his preference for the butts forward draw. During the many years of research on Hickok the man, his myth, and his place in frontier history that resulted in my five books on the subject, his preoccupation with firearms has led me to study the subject at some length.

As long ago as the late 1830's when Colt's Paterson pistols were becoming popular, the butts forward position was common, and by the time Colt's Dragoon, Navy, and other models became available in the 1850's, so, too, did various open or flap top holsters designed to be worn on the right side of a waist belt. The U.S. Cavalry adopted the *(Continued on next page)*

(Continued from previous page) reverse draw holster so a trooper's pistol, or his saber, could be drawn and used in his right hand, leaving his left hand free to grasp the reins and control his horse.

To be objective, wearing pistols in the reverse draw position was infinitely safer than what we now regard as the "conventional" hip draw. By inverting the hand so it fitted around the butt, and the index finger slipped into the guard, the thumb then fitted over the hammer spur. An upward pull, and as the pistol was spun forward, the hammer was cocked, and when lined up, the pistol was aimed or fired. There was no fear that the thumb would slip off the hammer, unlike hip draws when it was (and is) possible to jerk the pistol and the thumb slips off the cocked pistol, sometimes with disastrous results to the shooter, someone else, or his poor horse!

An examination of Hickok's photographs that depict him wearing revolvers sometimes reveals the pistols are worn far back (as in the famous buckskin photograph) or tending to point across the body, but some experts wonder if that was a stance for the photographer's benefit. In any event, wearing pistols in this fashion gave one two choices: a reverse or a cross draw—the latter useful if sitting down in a card game and needing a pistol in a hurry!

The one remaining and much debated issue is how did Hickok and others carry their ammunition? The Army had belt cartouches, but one rarely sees photographs of them used by civilians. So, did they carry prepared ammunition and caps in pockets, or in pouches worn on the reverse of the belt, or attached to their clothing? And if not, what about loose powder, balls, and caps? I have never received any firm information on that, and should be grateful if you or your readers might have some ideas. Meantime, my congratulations on a fine magazine.

IF I HAD THE POWER...

If I had the power to make only one SASS Range Rule, it would be no steel targets should ever be closer than 10 yards/meters from the firing line. The difference in spray-back and ricochet between 7 yards and 10 yards would amaze the un-initiated. Considering the loads we use, I don't think anyone can argue with the simple fact the further the steel target from the firing line, the less dangerous the spray-back and ricochet.

It is my understanding 10 Yards/Meters has been the minimum

range for steel targets in IPSC for a very long time. And, it certainly would not appreciably slow the Cowboy Action Shooting[™] game down. I think it would be well worth the loss of one or two seconds stage time for the faster shooters to significantly reduce spray-back and ricochet. The stage times for the average and lesser proficient shooters would not change because they do not engage in "slip shooting" or "point shooting" with the pistol. Basically, all you would be doing is taking these two techniques out of the game for all but the most accomplished

and practiced shooters. Would that really be a bad thing? If a club still wants to "slip shoot" on a Big Dump Target – GREAT. Just move it back a safe distance from the firing line.

In my opinion, a minimum safe distance for steel targets from the firing line goes hand in hand with a minimum safe muzzle velocity, and is worthy of consideration by the Wild Bunch. It's probably a little too controversial for consideration by the Territorial Governors or to ever gain a consensus at the TG Summit.

media or radical left would have us believe are those asking: What can I do to help restore that "Spirit of '76"?

What I'll suggest is nothing magical or complex, just basic. The best operations I've ever seen (military or civilian) have been the simplest plans boldly executed by dedicated people. Simplicity works best when applied with dedication, intensity, and enthusiasm. Nor do I want to pontificate or issue orders. I retired from issuing orders about 12 years ago. I'll just offer a few thoughts about what individuals can do to help win this cultural war.


The real key to forcing any governing body into effective change is for the governed to go on offense in great numbers. Just as Americans demonstrated during the immigration amnesty bill uproar in June, we must roar. We must show resolve, intensity, determination, and controlled anger pressed in the face of our political leaders—leaders who are driven to appropriate action <u>only</u> by credible threats to their public image, political office, and personal power. Intense, vocal, and extensive pressure from America's heartland is critical to all the sug-

gestions that follow. Know thyself. First, you must determine where you're willing to take a stand before you decide what you'll do and how far you'll go. Then when the time comes to *put up or shut up*, you won't be as torn when the pressure is greatest. Don't start something you don't have the heart to finish, and don't be a bar room hero-the ones that have bigger mouths than brains. I avoid braggadocio because those who talk most perform least when the chips are down. Still waters run deep while shallow waters just babble.

Get actively involved. Join one or more active pro-constitution/progun groups and then support them with your time and money. Volunteer to help out with and attend their functions. Read about and discuss current issues, books, articles, and kick around ideas face to face, via email, and over the Internet with your fellow patriots you'll be encouraged by all the likeminded folks you meet.

Don't expect to totally agree with every stance your group takes on every issue, nor will you always agree with the tactics employed to fight every battle, but don't quit just because of a few disagreements. Keep your eye on the big picture. It's that final objective we're interested in, not every rock we must step over in getting there.

Push for organization and coor-(Continued on next page)

dination. Encourage your group to join forces and fight in a combined and coordinated way with other groups ... something I've always advocated if we are to have a solid chance of success. By this I'm not suggesting that all groups fold into one. What I'm advocating is the coordination of specific talents, resources, and actions of these separate groups toward a common objective. Coordinated and combined forces are far greater than the individual parts, and the establishment of such a combined force is the most effective means of taking action. There are an estimated 80 million gun owners in America and if even 10%, 8 million, stood together, they would be an immovable force ... but they can't do it as 8 million individuals. They <u>must</u> be organized and focused as a coordinated force-see my essay We Need a Combined Force Forum.

Speak with conviction, act boldly, and don't compromise on principle. Politicians, the news media, and the nation must know how strongly we feel about preserving our freedom ... we must "yell like hell" and in great numbers! They must realize we mean business, and we will act boldly in preserving that freedom. Weight of numbers with a unified, bottom line message is more important than the exact words sent. Politicians are more impressed by sheer numbers than one or two eloquently written letters. So continually flood them with email, phone calls, faxes, and letters, and be willing to take to the streets if necessary in support of what you know is right. Let your determination and resolve shine through ... leftists are frightened of strong and uncompromising resolve built on truth.

Support those that support America. Money talks, so as much as possible, do business only with those companies and people you know who stand up for traditional American values. Banks that issue credit cards to illegal invaders is not a bank I'd support as an example. Just as important, let those businesses know why you are or are not supporting them. Be polite, but very firm.

Temper your anger and enthusiasm. "Those the gods seek to destroy, they first make mad." Don't allow unchecked anger or excessive enthusiasm to overrule good sense. Rushing down that trail will lead you into an ambush, and that's not what we need to win. A professionally executed plan by a dedicated and focused force is more effective than even the largest band of irrational players. Let your actions speak very loudly and keep your cool. Cool heads always prevail, while unchecked rage leads to destruction.

Don't get discouraged. Don't be taken in by lies and think all is lost. Question everything that comes from the mainstream press and every politician—take nothing at face value. Many in the anti-freedom camp will make the most outrageous statements telling you they're winning because this is what the American people want so you better jump on board ... after all, it is for the children! Most Americans will never call them on these lies. Don't be deceived. You know the right of it, so show them the courage of your convictions. Hang tough and be determined ... don't let down and don't let up, challenge the lies at every turn, and never give up.

Vote and encourage others to vote. Never think one vote doesn't count. If everyone felt that way, we would indeed be lost. I don't presume to tell anyone <u>how</u> to vote even though I do have some strong feelings about my own approach.

Read about the Founders and their struggle. This can be inspiring and give you inner strength. Pick a few favorites and get to know them. They faced tremendous challenges, but through dedication and perseverance, they won the cause to establish a free country inspired by God. Should we do less to preserve it?

Pray for America. Regardless of what political correctness dictates, prayer is a real combat multiplier, so pray for the survival of the country God Himself inspired and that we are now in danger of losing—from within and without.

This battle will be fully joined only when we, the so-called "*silent majority*," are motivated enough to show Washington we seriously mean business and will not be silent—far

from silent and certainly not sheepishly submissive. It will be won only by personal commitment and enthusiastic dedication to coordinated action. We must set the example for all, and push those groups to combine their resources to fight as a coordinated force. People are impressed by good examples and willingly follow those with whom they're impressed and respect-be an example. Lead, follow, or get out of the way, but do so with gusto and dedication. THE CODE DUELLO

"For truth, honour, freedom and courtesy ... a custom hath been ... to seek revenge of their wrongs on the body of their accuser, and that by private combat, seul a seul ..." — <u>The Single Combat</u> – John Selden, English jurist and author (1610)


The western drama "Gunsmoke" ran on television for twenty years from 1955 through 1975. It was the longest-lived series ever. There were a number of opening sequences used, but the best is, arguably, the duel between James Arness as Marshal Dillon, and Arvo Ojala as the "man in black." Ojala, who was many things, including a wizard with a six-gun, outdraws Arness, but Marshal Dillon is more accurate, and dispatches his adversary with a single bullet. Both characters were participating in the ultimate evolution of the duel, or personal contest. While, strictly speaking, a duel was over an affair of honor, Marshal Dillon was obliged to enforce the law in order to uphold his personal and professional honor.

Depending on whether you take your religion straight, or with a chaser, mankind has been battling one another since Cain slew Abel, or Alley Oop first knuckled someone's head "before you can count to four." The term "duellum" is an old form of the modern-day Latin "bellum" for "war." There has, however, long been a distinction between man-to-man battles fought on behalf of an army or nation, and those that take place by agreement between two persons by reason of some personal quarrel. Battles between champions, such as David and Goliath, or Hector and Paris during the Trojan War were examples of warriors deciding the outcome of a conflict between nations, not matters of individual honor or injury.

The Sicilian historian Diodorus Siculus, writing between 90 and 21 BC, relates the custom of personal dueling existed among the Gauls and Germans from the earliest era. The oldest known law of Christian times that permitted a judicial duel was that of the Burgundian King Gundobald (d. 516). In a judicial duel, it was believed God would permit the man in the right to prevail. Almost immediately, the Church outlawed private duels, considering them a usurpation of God's authority over life and death. The penalty was excommunication.

On through the ages many customs and procedures evolved to settle personal disputes, primarily among men, although duels between women are recorded. The Norse "holmganga", or "island walk," evolved into a duel on a hide or blanket approximately nine feet by nine feet. Now, that's up close and personal! Formal rules for jousting among knights included the requirement contestants be noble, or of the same class. Flos Duellatorum, or The Flower of Battle was written by Fior di Liberi in Italy in 1410, and was a manual for defense, as well as a code of conduct in such contests. Talhoffer's Fechtbuch, written by German fencing-master Hans Talhoffer, is an illustrated manual for judicial and other duels, composed in 1467.

Finally, in 1777, at the Clonmel Assizes, certain gentlemen of Ireland adopted the "Code Duello." With the advent and development of firearms, pistols had become the preferred method of settling disputes of honor. The Code Duello consists of 26 (Continued on next page)

Commandments, which spell out in excruciating detail the correct way to conduct a duel. An Americanized version of the Code Duello was written by South Carolina Governor John Lyde Wilson around 1838, called "The Code of Honor."

Even though it was outlawed almost everywhere, by the mid 1800's dueling had become such a lethal endeavor that men sought a less permanent solution to their disputes. Previously, it had been considered uncouth for "gentlemen" to fight with their fists. In 1867, the Marquis of Queensbury published his rules for fist fighting. These were not meant to replace the London Prize Ring rules of 1743, but in short order, they did just that. The Marquis offered his new rules as a means to satisfy affronts between "gentlemen." The new rules called for a "fair" fight, with no kicking, biting, gouging, stomping, et cetera. Now "gentlemen" could settle matters of honor, yet still have a reasonable expectation of going home that evening.

All of the above, though interesting, is merely an introduction for the recounting of my first duel. All of the classic elements are there, including the insult, the challenge, the combat, and the satisfaction of honor. With a single exception, I was always the smallest male in my class. As I grew up an Army brat, I got plenty of exposure to moving, and meeting new bullies. When I was in the 7th grade, the current bully was John Grover. John was apparently attempting to finish his education in middle school, as he had spent far more than the allotted years there. This made him bitter, and also bigger than almost anyone else in the school. Despite being a runt, I had been blessed with a certain amount of gray matter, and a determination to leave my very humble beginnings behind. John Grover appeared to resent me.

One day as I walked past him in class, John grabbed my arm. Without thinking, I spun around, and delivered my best shot to his face. John was too surprised to react before the teacher escorted me to the Principal's Office. There I was informed that although he would like to reward me, I would have to stay at detention after school. As I alighted from the school bus the next morning, there stood John Grover with the prettiest black eye I had ever seen. Of course, John was there to invite me out to the back of the schoolyard behind the trees where he intended to give me lessons in the fine art of fisticuffs. It was to be a short lesson. Not only was I small and unskilled, but also it seemed I had broken my hand when I hit him the previous day. My right hand was the size of a grapefruit, and completely useless.

Ironically, one of my best friends

was named Ed Grover. There was no known relation between the two Grovers. Ed Grover was the inspiration for Jim Croce's lyrics, "big and dumb as a man can come." He was however, a gentle giant, who was always grateful for my help with his schoolwork. As Ed, John, and I made our way to the field of honor, we attracted a small following, anxious for blood. They were not to be disappointed.

In extremely short order, I found myself on my back, with John Grover kneeling on my shoulders. Left, right, left, he quickly delivered three blows to my face, and said, "Had enough?" I turned my head to look over at my buddy Ed, who shook his head no. I looked up and defiantly said "no." Right, left, right, then the same question. I glanced in Ed's direction, who again indicated in the negative. Yet a third time-left, right, left, followed by the question. I thought I had seen teeth flying out of my mouth that time, so when Ed again indicated not to give, I looked up at John Grover and said, "yeah, I've had enough."

We all began walking back, me wiping the blood and spit off my face (thankfully, it had been spit and snot, not teeth flying). My buddy Ed asked, "whad ja give for?" I turned to him and replied, "You weren't the guy getting his face beat off. And by the way, you could have jumped in any time, and I wouldn't have minded." Ed said nothing, as we both knew it would not have been proper for him to interfere. John Grover had satisfied his honor by beating the crap out of me, and I had retained mine, by refusing to dodge a painful whipping.

Fast forward to my sophomore year in high school. Though I was still a runt, I had at last grown some muscles, and acquired a bit of pugilistic skill, as well as the selfconfidence to employ it. I wrestled, ran track, did gymnastics, and generally thought I was hot stuff. One day, I literally bumped into John Grover in the hallway. He was pitiful, with the bloodshot, washed-out eyes of a druggie, long straggly hair, and a filthy Army field jacket. Unkind words were exchanged, and John said, "I kicked your butt once, and I can do it again." I simply looked at him and stated, "I don't think so, but you're welcome to try-right now." He turned and walked away. I never saw him again. My buddy Ed had gone to vo-tech, and I never saw him after the 8th grade.

By the time the shoot was over, all concerned were laughing and joking and heading to the clubhouse for the chuck to be provided. A first class barbeque with a half of chicken, corn on the cob, and all the trimmings was provided. As we sat there eating, I related the story of how on the very last stage the firing pin in my rifle broke and in true Cowboy fashion, several people offered up their rifles so I could shoot the stage. Smokehouse Dan had a .45 caliber '73, much like what I'm used to, and I took his rifle and finished one of the most fun shoots I had ever attended.

Saturday night brought a drop in temperature, so the campfire served for more than just light. Now we all try to shoot our best, but everyone knows it's the people involved in this sport that keep all of

us coming back time and time again, and as I sat talking to Broadside O'Barn and his better half, Three Bears, that thought came to me again, and I wanted to invite everyone of these fine folks to my house for Thanksgiving dinner, but, of course, that would be impossible.

I left the Tioga County Cowboys on that Sunday morning knowing here was a club that truly knows what this sport is all about, and on the way home I took all secondary highways. * NEW MEXICO TRIBUNE * *"KINCAID'S LUCK"*BUFFALO HUNTER BAGS LARGEST BUFFALO


July 1874, Tijeras, NM Famed buffalo hunter and legendary scout for Lt. Col. George A. Custer's famed 7th Cavalry Ellsworth T. Kincaid made an appearance around these parts during the past month hunting buffalo. He was seen wearing the very buckskins he wore scouting for Custer along the upper Washita River in western Indian Territory back in '68.

Along with his normal attire of long fringed buckskins ("longer than Custer's" Kincaid chided), Kincaid was sporting the red wool neckerchief Custer had given him for heroic duty during the Washita fight. When questioned, Kincaid replied he treasured the gift of the necktie and wore it at every opportunity. Kincaid informed this writer that the best buffalo hunting could be found in the New Mexico Territory, especially south of Santa Fe, east of the Sandia Mountains. His goal, according to Kincaid, was to best his friend Custer in hunting and killing the largest buffalo.

This writer, wanting to appear knowledgeable, asked if Kincaid was referring to the Great Buffalo Hunt that he, Custer, and Buffalo Bill Cody led for the Russian Grand Duke Alexis back in '71. Kincaid laughed at the reference. Very jovially Kincaid said the hunt was great fun and Alexis finally got his buffalo. Of course, Kincaid added, the Grand Duke was assisted by Cody, rode (Continued on page 39)





"You load sixteen tons, and whataya get?"



Now I'm not the sharpest knife in the drawer, but I knew immediately "snap" and "bang" do not belong in the same gun during the same run. My heart felt like it weighed a ton. I tried to move quickly; I jerked the lever down ejecting the dud round, and went to



I normally do a better job of reloading than this. I fully understand there will be incidents with reloaded ammo, but all on one stage? Then, as if I needed a possum to walk across my grave, one of the cowboys started laughing and ridiculing my ammo and me. Not the good natured, good intentioned helpful kind of needling we enjoy, but the hurtful "let's add to the burden" kind of comments. I shot the rest of the match in slow motion, put the guns away, and drove home.

Most of the cowboys on the posse tried to be helpful. They came by and offered encouragement, obviously trying to help me get back on track. Try as I may, I could only think about the one that hurt. Oh, how hard it is to think of the other guy! Harder, yet, is it for us to control the tongue! It only took one to destroy the day. "Shrug it off," is the words of wisdom that were given. How do you do that? I never learned.

A sailing ship under full sail is one of the most beautiful sights we can ever hope to embrace. Running before the wind, the vessel appears alive, willful, destined to the good. It is fitting for us to realize of all the complex systems on one of these ancient vessels or on a sleek, modern ship, are all controlled by the rudder. It is the rudder that determines if the vessel will stay out of harms way or be destined for destruction. In our lives, it is the tongue that is the rudder. (James 3:2-6) Whatever good there is in us becomes visible or is obscured by how well we use the tongue. When a cowboy on our posse suffers disaster, we hold the power to help or to destroy, all in what we say.

Each of us was a new shooter at one time when we dealt with all of the fears of attempting to shoot a stage without any major malfunction. We have all made the beginner's mistakes only to be talked to as if we were brain dead and committed the transgression on purpose. Words have the power to destroy or to redeem. With all the good that is found in the cowboy game, we are shooting ourselves in the foot by how quickly we criticize, condemn, and complain about the other guy. Those with experience need to remember that the operative motive is "competitive advantage." Did the shooter commit the transgression to achieve a competitive advantage, or was it simply a mistake? This is a judgment call. You respond one way to the cheater, another to a mistake.

The future of this game we love lies in the hands of the new shooters. If we stop bringing in new shooters, we become witnesses to our own demise. I've been a competitive shooter in some way or another for over thirty years, and during that (Continued on page 39)

Shoot-out at Mescal Springs

MARCH 24, 1882 Since the murder of his brother Morgan on March 19, Wyatt Earp has slipped outside the law, and along with his six-man posse (many in Cochise County consider them nothing more than a "gang"), he has killed Frank Stillwell in Tucson, Arizona, and Florentino Cruz at South Pass (Wyatt believes both men had a hand in his brother's murder).

Wyatt's posse includes Doc Holliday (a suspect in the Benson stage robbery), Sherman McMasters (accused stage robber), "Turkey Creek" Johnson (real name John Blount, an alleged cattle rustler), Texas Jack Vermillion and Warren Earp, Wyatt's younger brother.

Now close to noon, Wyatt's avenging angels are within 30 yards of Mescal Springs. (One report claims Wyatt is expecting a cash infusion from mining magnate E.B. Gage to be delivered there.)

Sensing danger, Wyatt dismounts with his bridle rein in hand. He grips his shotgun and steps forward into the clearing at the spring. Suddenly, nine cowboys jump from behind a dirt bank. (Wyatt later remembers, "Every man had a rifle at his shoulder, and every rifle blazed.")

Everyone in the posse except Wyatt turns to run or "show the white feather," as is the slang of the day. At first, Wyatt doesn't realize he's been abandoned. He levels his shotgun to fight, while the bullets from the cowboy's guns whiz around him.

Wyatt recognizes one of the men shooting at him: Curly Bill Brocius. Aiming at the outlaw chieftain,

Wyatt levels his shotgun and fires two charges of buckshot that strike Curly Bill's chest, almost cutting him in half.


In the stampede to retreat, McMasters is hit in the side, and his binoculars are shot from his neck. Texas Jack's horse is killed in the volley of cowboy fire.



Wyatt Earp's version of the fight at Mescal Springs has nine cowboys attacking him at the lush springs, which are surrounded by willow and cottonwood trees, and a 15-foot bank. Also note Wyatt's gun belt down around his thighs, and his boot heel and saddle horn being shot off.




Wyatt is carrying warrants for various criminals. One district judge tells him, "If I were serving these warrants, Wyatt, I'd leave my prisoners in the mesquite where alibis don't count."



Realizing he is outnumbered and holding the short end of the stick, Wyatt tries to remount, but he can't. On the ride up the draw to the springs, he loosened his gun belt. Now he can't mount his horse because his gun belt has slipped down around his thighs. As he does a crazy little dance, his saddle horn is shot off. Bullets tear into his hat, coat, pants

and boot heel, but he finally succeeds in forking his horse and rides off to rejoin his men. The brief, dramatic fight is over.



Nothing is accomplished by confronting a shooter who already feels badly and making that shooter feel insignificant, unworthy, torn down and defeated.

There are times in the course of our relationships that we are at a loss for what to say. It is during these times that our true value becomes visible. These are the times when saying nothing can be the right thing to do. Walk by, a friendly pat on the shoulder, an offer to help, nothing more is needed. Just demonstrating a willingness to let the cowboy know a beautiful Indian maiden named Miss Spotted Tail. Kincaid's demeanor became deadly serious. WHAT'S IN A SCORE Back of the Envelope Calculations

END of TRAIL 2007 was a lot of fun any way you slice it. Some of us went home with trophies, but most did not. This brings me to the issue of scores. You can say a particular shooter placed, say, 250 out of 562 with a total time 450 seconds against the top place of 206 seconds. This is fine, easy to understand. But how does this or any other score relate to the entire population of shooters at END of TRAIL 2007?

SASS provides a data file of match final scores. The one I am using is MATCH FINAL12.PDF. There are probably later versions, but this one is just fine for my purpose. This file is sorted by ascending total rank. I will use two data elements from this file, place (1 to 562) and total seconds (206 to 911).

Why only 562 places? Inspection of the data shows that scores get squirrel-




How well did you stack up against the other END of TRAIL competitors? Get your total time, find your "interval," and look at the cumulative percentage curve to see how many shooters shot better than you. (I shoulda practiced more! ... editor in chief) ly after 562 places due to unengaged stages. The 562 places represent nearly 100% of END of TRAIL 2007 shooters. Why am I using only whole seconds for time? It is enough detail for this analysis. I divided the total times into 100second intervals; nothing fancy, just the time nearest each even 100. I subtracted the beginning place number from the end place number for each interval, giving the number of shooters falling into each interval. This result is plotted on the graph as heavy dots.

What a picture! The curve peaks in the 300 to 400-second interval. More END of TRAIL 2007 shooters scored in this interval than any other. This interval is where the game was! You may take your total time, subtract the peak time or any other time you wish, divide by 12 (stages) to see what your improvement per stage needs to be to reach that point. This can send you back to the "head knocker."

Next, I converted my numbers to percent of total and added them together to get a cumulative percentage. This data is plotted on the graph as light dots. The median, that point at which as many shooters scored faster as scored slower, is at about 400 seconds. Another measure of where the game was. Pick a time, move up to the cumulative percentage curve, and you will see the percentage of shooters who scored better. Another head knocker?

I don't think there are any statistical lies in this analysis. It is a minimum of mathematics and simple arithmetic. Yes, I could have chosen a smaller interval, etc., etc. But my envelope was of small size. Kind of fun seeing where you stack up against the herd. Good shooting, cowboy! **1**.





ON THE TRAIL OF THE BELGIAN CENTAUR The Belgian-made "Colt" Army Model 1860 "Centennial"

By Long Johns Wolf Hofheim, Germany

"Re-Discovered" European Piece of American "PC" – The emergence of new interest among American shooters in a certain Belgian "Colt" cap-and-ball pistol has confirmed what has been long known to some Pards across the Atlantic. The Model of 1860 Army revolver produced by Fabriques d'Armes Unies de Liege ("United Arms Manufacturers of Liege") was, for the first several years of its manufacture, superior in materials and workmanship to clones made elsewhere then or since. One testament to its superiority is the fact that all parts will interchange with "originals", down to the last screw.

Of equal interest is the somewhat murky history of its origin and distribution. Some feel justified in referring to it as a "re-issue," rather than simply a very close copy, and the debate is not likely to be closed soon. The story thus far is made up of reported fact and memory, and it is this lack of exacting information that has led me into a project to try and re-create the production and distribution history by collecting and collating information on existing examples. The story makes great reading for Colt fans, and begins over a century ago.

Colonel Sam Strikes a Continental Deal – In April 1853, Samuel Colt entered into a contract with a consortium of seven Belgian arms makers in the city of Liege for the licensed production of Colts Patent (Brevete) revolvers. These Belgian Pockets, Navies, and Dragoons were to be sold only outside the United States. Note the agreement was never amended to include the Army Model of 1860, and the consortium would make none until 100 years later.

In 1959, with the approach of the centennial anniversary of the American Civil War (and in a time of already expanding interest in blackpowder firearms), the young firearms historian and consultant William B. Edwards saw what he felt would be a huge market for the '60 Army among the thousands of re-enactors and enthusiast groups then forming. Edwards had already demonstrated his business sense in 1957-58 in negotiations between Val Forgett of Navy Arms and Vittorio Gregorelli for the manufacture of the first Navy Model 1851 replicas in Italy. The market niche for a reproduction of the Army model was still unfilled. At that time only replicas of the '51 Navy, in either steel or brass frames, and the Remington model of 1858 were available. Edwards and colleagues quickly put together the Centennial Arms Corporation of Chicago to import and distribute a new "Army" revolver. That company would become the principle dealer for Belgian "Colts," and the number two replica distributor overall behind Navy Arms.

Production by a "Heritage" Company – Edwards and the other principals of Centennial concluded an agreement to produce the "New Army" with – who else? – Fabriques d'Armes Unies de Liège in Belgium, the modern descendant of the same company that made the original deal with Sam Colt back in the 19th (Continued on next page)





Models and Variations

ike Colt's, however, surprisingly Fabriques d'Armes Unies de Liège Like Colt's, however, surprisingly rabiques armines produced a great number of variations of the basic Colt Army Model 1860. Reasons seem to be the desire to reproduce all major known Colt models, but also the ambition to have proprietary FAUL variations and the use of existing stock of inventory. For a better understanding of the models plus sub-models/variations made between 1960 and approximately 1975, it is suggested to use barrel length as primary determinate to differentiate three basic models.

The 8" barrel variation is most often found. To date six variations are known.

- The Civilian Model is an important, but rare and early variation with "C" prefix ("C" for Civilian Model) before the serial. Civilian Models were manufactured from the end of 1960 in a separate block of serial numbers beginning with C1. Only blued/case colored finish was available with silver plated trigger-guard and back-strap, in 3-screw configuration without cuts for shoulder-stock. The cylinder sported the proprietary Centaure naval scene. Barrel marking "1960 NEW MODEL ARMY"
- Rebated, plain cylinder pistols are the exception in the USA, but represent the majority of pistols found in Europe. They have regular blue/case hardened finish with the 3-screw frame cut for stock in recoil shield and back-strap.
- Three different barrel markings are known today, namely

- Relatively common in the USA but rare in Europe, this variation is identical to the aforementioned one, but sports a cylinder with the proprietary Centaure naval scene (like Civilian Model) and NEW MODEL 44 between scene. Barrel marking

followed sometimes by CHICAGO U.S.A. (for US importer Centennial Arms Corporation, Chicago)

• Centaure pistols with a Colt-type naval scene engraved into the cylinder, plus the wording ENGAGED 16TH MAY 1843 and CENTENNIAL between the scene have only been reported from the USA so far. Two types of barrel markings are known

- Belgians with the fully fluted cylinder, 3-screw frame with recoil shield and back-strap cut for shoulder stock, in high gloss polish "in the white" finish are very rare in the USA, but quite common in Europe. Barrel marking "1960 NEW MODEL ARMY"
- Stainless steel versions have surfaced in Europe. Barrel marking CENTENNIAL TRADE MARK

Only one model has been encountered with 7-1/2" barrel, dubbed Cavalry Model in Europe: fluted cylinder, four-screw frames, serials with "F" prefix ("F" for fluted cylinder). The 4th screw or stud rather functions to stabilize the shoulder-stock. Probably only a few hundred were manufactured from late 1961 in a separate block of serials starting with F1. The only finish available was the standard blue with case color hardening. Regular accessory was a shoulder stock numbered to the gun. Barrel marking "1960 NEW MODEL ARMY"

So-called Marshal Models have 5-1/2" barrels without barrel marking.

- Fluted cylinders, recoil shield, and back-strap are cut for shoulder stock and a high gloss polish "in the white" finish are standard.
- 3-screw frames are regular.
- 4-screw frames are very rare. Contrary to the Cavalry Model, the 4th screw here has a flat head without function.

Century. The company logo and trademark for this firearm, to be struck in the same place on the left side of the frame as was the rampant "Colt" of American manufacture, was a stylized centaur-a mythological creature with the body and legs of a horse, and the torso,

head, and arms of a man, brandishing a rifle, deliberately chosen in homage to Col. Sam's mark. To this day, the Belgian '60 Army is known in Europe as the "Centaure."

Fabriques d'Armes at this time was owned by cousins Paul and Albert Hanquet. Paul was the greatgrandson of J. Hanquet, who, in



turn, was a member of the original consortium of seven gun makers who had contracted with Colt back in 1853. Edwards provided them with two Colt '60 Army originals for use as models. One had a slightly bent trigger guard, resulting when the pistol had been dropped on concrete. So concerned were the Belgians that their product match the originals in every way, trigger guards on the prototypes included the dent! This was, of course, discovered and corrected before the first revolvers were shipped.

Paul Hanquet received the first unnumbered pistol. The second one, stamped "MODEL" was presented to the then-President of Colt's with the subtle barrel engraving "ADDRESS FRED ROFF, HARTFORD, CT."

The barrels of production guns shipped to the US for distribution by Centennial bore the inscription, "1960 NEW MODEL ARMY" **CENTENNIAL TRADE MARK** and sometimes CHICAGO U.S.A. A few variant markings have been observed.

By the time Fabriques d'Armes ended production in the mid 1970s, only some 60,000 examples of both the US-bound "Centennials" and those produced for sale in Europe were made in various configurations, finishes, and markings. Thereafter, the company was known to have been involved in some arms distributorship, but disappeared during the 1980s.


Copy or "Re-Issue?" - It has been established while quality of the Belgian Army model fell off in the last years of production, for most of the total produced, quality was very high. When Italian replicas, or 2nd and 3rd generation Colts themselves are compared to the Belgians, the superior quality of material and workmanship of the latter is apparent as they are made from a very hard forged steel, and the fitting is extremely close. Barrels were bored for a size .451 round ball (later Colts were bored to .457) with rather shallow button rifling. Parts, including screws, are interchangeable with 1st generation Colt Armies. Nor are they lacking in performance-shooters working with well-maintained Belgians report solid accuracy and reliability.

The Challenge: Separating Fact from Fiction - That's the more-or-less accepted "story" assembled piecemeal from old magazine articles and memory. Sure makes for a fascinating tale, but is it the truth?

It depends on how you want to see it. The facts of dates, places, persons, and circumstances were reported by well-known American and German authors in the 1960s and 1970s (see #'s1, 4, 5, 6, & 7).

It *can* be shown that: Quality of steel, workmanship, and

- finish is superior (4, 8). All deteriorated, however, during the last years of production (4, 9);
- Interchangeability of parts with original Colt Armies has been recently confirmed (4);
- A licensing agreement with Colt from the 1850s does exist (2, 3). Additional and intriguing ques-

tions remain:

- 1. Why were no Colt Brevetes made by the Belgian consortium with the Centaure logo and trademark?
- 2. Why did Colt not amend or extend the 1853 contract later to include the '60 Army at a time when many other Belgian-produced guns were used during the War between North and South?
- 3. Why can't serial numbers of the 1960 "New" Army be correlated to year of production?
- 4. Why are identical models in the USA and Europe serial-numbered using different schemes?
- 5. What variants to the basic pattern were manufactured by the Belgians?

These are some of the questions asked and objectives to be gained in my research project – THE RECON-STRUCTION OF PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION HISTORY OF THE BELGIAN COLT ARMY, aka CENTAURE, aka CENTENNI-AL COLT.

Efforts to locate company records and import documents have so far been unsuccessful, and that leaves us with the painstaking methodology of bit-by-bit reconstruction by inspecting and documenting existing specimens. Ultimate success depends on reaching owners all over the USA and Europe, and in their willingness to cooperate and provide input regarding their prized revolvers. Once comprehensive information has been gathered and analyzed, and solid conclusions have been drawn, the findings will be published.

To that end, I have designed a questionnaire for owners. The absolute most important key L to shooting well in Cowboy Action ShootingTM is to shoot accurately. Many new shooters have a hard time with accuracy when they first begin. There are many variables in being accurate, and sometimes people don't know everything they need to do in order to be accurate.

The first step to being really accurate is to make sure your guns actually shoot to point of aim. This means when you have the sights lined up, the gun actually shoots where you are aiming. Most guns are not accurate from the factory.

You can set the accuracy of your gun vourself, but it can be much harder than it sounds. I ask my gunsmith to make certain my guns shoot to point of aim. Gunsmiths have the tools, experience, and knowledge.

If you choose to set your gun up to shoot point of aim, then you want the point of aim to be the top of the sights. When you have the sights lined up, the shot will go to top center of the sight picture. You want the impact to be at the top of the sights rather than under it because if you are shooting at something very


small, covering the target with the sights can be too inaccurate. Make sure when the sights are lined up correctly, the impact is at the top center of the sight picture.

If you send your gun to a gunsmith to sight it in, send some of your ammunition as well. The type of ammunition can change the point of aim, so it is best to include your own ammunition when sighting in your firearms.

You want all your guns to shoot to point of aim. Pistols, rifles, and shotguns all need to be tested, and if they don't work, you need to send them to a gunsmith to be fixed. Each firearm has some unique rules that go with setting up the sight picture.

With revolvers, one thing you want to do when setting up your sight picture is to make sure you have plenty of light on each side of the blade. Most revolvers come with the width of the back notch being very close to the width of the front sight. This makes it difficult to line the sights up because there is very little light to see if it is lined up or not. It By Holy Terror, SASS #15362


is a good thing to have a gunsmith open up the width of the rear notch.

When it comes to the rifle, make sure you can see the sights really well. I recommend getting a good size bead you can see well in all types of light. However, you don't want a bead that is too big because then it is difficult to shoot accurately on small targets. But, if the bead is too small, then you won't be able to see it well in low light.

If you have bad eyesight, you might want to check out a peep sight. Many people like the peep sight because they can see more light through it, making it easier to line it up on the target.

When it comes to the shotgun, many people don't realize it also needs to be sighted in. In fact, you need to sight in your shotgun just like any other gun. Some people like two beads on their shotgun because it helps them line it up better. If that works for you, then by all means keep it up. Whatever you do, I suggest a big bead on the end so it is easier and faster to see.

Another thing to consider when it comes to shotguns is to install a



choke. Not all shotgun targets are set up equally, and sometimes targets are not set up so they can be knocked down with an open bore There have been many gun. instances where I have changed my chokes. If the targets are set far out and hard to knock down, or if they are flying birds, sometimes it helps to change the choke of the gun.

I know some people that say they don't need to have their guns shoot to point of aim because they can correct it themselves. I would argue against this because while you are trying to shoot a stage worrying about target order, gun order, being safe, loading your shotgun, and everything else you are thinking about, you don't really have the extra brain power to adjust for that one pistol that shoots high right. Shooting will be much easier if you know all you have to do is line the sights up, and the bullet will hit the target!

Now that your guns actually shoot to where you are aiming, the next step in being accurate is knowing how to aim your guns. Many new shooters, especially women, don't know what a sight picture looks like. If you have never shot before, knowing what the sight picture looks like is not intuitive.

Make sure you know what a sight picture is supposed to look like. If you miss a lot or if you are just curious, then it is good to have someone draw it out for you. I am a very visual person, so I like to see the way things are supposed to be. I can explain it, but sometimes people just need to see it.

For revolvers, your sight should line up by having the front blade centered in the rear notch side to side. Then, the front sight and rear notch should be level across the top. If you have Colts or Colt replicas, your rear sight notch is a "v." If this is the case, you need to have your sight changed. I don't think anyone could line up that "v" to be accurate. I suggest filing out the rear sight to be a square notch.

When lining up the rifle sight, you want the bead to be centered in the bottom of the notch of the rear sight. If you see any post, then it is not lined up correctly. Some people like to see post; I do not. I think it is difficult to determine the amount of post you need to be accurate, so to be simpler, I just set the bottom of the bead in the notch.


The shotgun sight picture is the easiest to line up, but also the easiest to mess up. When lining up the shotgun sight, you want to see just the bead. If you see any barrel, then you are aimed high, and you will miss. Another common problem people have is if your face is not down touching the stock, you will shoot high, even with a perfect sight picture. Your cheek should always be placed firmly against the side of the stock.

Now that you know your guns shoot to point of aim, and you know what the sight picture looks like, you have come to the third step in being accurate—practice. If you practice to be accurate, then you will be more accurate. I personally quite often practice with a very small target. This makes me more accurate on the larger targets, so I miss less during matches.

Being accurate is an important part of Cowboy Action ShootingTM. Knowing how to be accurate is an even more important part!

t's part of my job to play with pointy things. When I'm not dealing with pointy, stabby implements of destruction known as leatherworking tools, I am dealing with other peoples' pointy, stabby implements making sheaths for their personal knives. Guns and knives seem to attract similar souls, and, bless 'em, many of our cowboys and cowgirls are as attached to their knives

as to their guns. It's a treat to see a period correct knife hanging off a shooter's belt, or tucked into the sash or belt of a gent finely kitted out for an evening's romp when Dodge City rules apply. What a kick to note a push dagger or small, slender dirk in the garter of an appropriately attired saloon girl, or a beaded sheath on a scout or warrior. It sure makes me grin when I see the folks who make a real effort to get it right.

The biggest errors among our knife-bearing SASS members are as follows:

Stainless steel. Okay, the argument remains that stainless Rugers and Colts are now available so ... so what? For those of you who opt for authenticity, high carbon steel was the steel of the time. I know there are some of you out there who go out of your way to sport Damascus, but if you look closely at actual knives of the period, they were made of plain, ordinary high carbon steel and not



While all but the bottom knife with it's designer plywood handle would look period correct when buried in a deep sheath, they are all, in fact, incorrect. All of these have inappropriate guards or bolsters and their blades are hollow ground. Several have fiber spacers, also incorrect for the Old West time frame.

Damascus. Damascus was a much earlier knife steel. Once good, high carbon steel was perfected, it

absolutely took over in the cutlery trade. I won't tell anyone that Damascus knives didn't exist, but they were certainly not the norm.

Oddly, while real Damascus was (Continued on next page)

rare and pricey, the look of Damascus was still very desirable. As a result, some high carbon blades (and shotgun barrels) were acid etched to look like Damascus. Now that's period correct!

Hollow grinding. When you see this on a knife, it screams "modern knife." Old knife blades were all flat ground. If the knife was made of thin steel like a kitchen knife, it was ground only along the edge. On knives with thicker blades, the blade was sharpened from edge to back in a triangular wedge cross section.

Integral guards and guards only on the blade side of the knife. Integral guards are guards that are shaped into the bolster portion or handle of a knife. They are commonplace in modern hunting and skinning knives. Most old-timey knives either have no guard whatsoever, or have a full guard that juts fore and aft from the knife handle. The half guard that appears on the edge side only is a child of a much later era.

Similarly, the large, **metal bolsters** one sees on modern hunters' and skinning knives didn't exist in the cowboy era. While you see metal above the guards on Bowie knives and daggers, it should not appear on handles where there are no guards.

Red, black, or white spacers. This stuff is very much a mid-20th Century invention. Period correct cutlery always laid handle material directly on steel.

Modern handle shapes and holes in handles for wrist loops. Old knife handles have a very distinct look. Modern-style knives are shaped differently.

The only knives I know of that had holes in their handles were peculiar to the seafaring man. The sailor's knife typically had a lanyard fitted so the knife a) would not be lost, or b) accidentally end up pointy side down in your captain's or a colleague's head while you were aloft in rough seas. (Oops!)

Modern handle material. Micarta, decorator plywoods, phenolic resins, Corian, and so forth weren't around back then. Gutta percha *is* period correct (as it is for gun grips) as is ivory, pearl, stag, antler, bone, horn, silver, and wood. German silver (aka nickel silver) was also very popular for handle fittings after about 1850.

So what's in a period knife? Styles ranged from soup to nuts on this as with many things in the Old West. One of the most correct knives of the era was simply a butcher or large kitchen knife. The **Green River knife** is probably the best example. These were mass-manufactured knives, stamped out by the hundreds from high carbon steel. The metal extended through the handle, which was simply two slabs of plain

wood riveted on. They were easily sharpened, came in useful shapes, were cheap, and were available pert near everywhere. They were carried by Indians, prospectors, trappers, cowboys, and immigrants. Their popularity even extended into common language with the phrase "Give it to 'im up the Green River." Translation: The knife blade was stuck in clean to where the Green River logo was stamped into the steel. If you're familiar with the knives, you know that was a considerable way toward the hilt and would been downright hurtful and damaging!

The Green River knife was popular enough and useful enough to be copied. As a result, the knife can appear with virtually any handle material from stag to fancy hardwood (bearing in mind that some hardwood species had not yet been discovered!).

Dirks, daggers, and stilettos were very common on the Frontier especially among the local tough guys, gamblers, and women of bad reputation. Some cowboys carried them, but the majority didn't, as they were not as utilitarian as the more general-purpose blades of the Green River and Bowie. Daggers were knives of offense or defense, more likely to be carried by troublemakers than honest working folk.

Push daggers were popular with the same sorts of characters as

above and for the same reasons. These were one of the few items that made their influence from West to East having been developed in California during the Gold Rush era. Push daggers were mainly diminutive knives, small and easy to hide for emergencies or evil.

Bowie knives were immensely popular with folks all over the west. With their full guards to keep fingers slipping onto the blade and a general-purpose blade shape, they were ideal knives for every sort of honest work the range had to offer. Sharpened on both sides of its tip, it was also an ideal knife for naughty doin's or as a weapon of last resort.

Folders. You don't hear much about these, but they existed and were extensively carried. Many working folks carried two knives, the belt knife for work and the folder for personal use. After all, if you were turning bull calves into steers or such with your knife, and then sat down to grubpile ... well, some fellers just didn't care for that!

Compadres. I've run outta space for now, but I'll continue on with period-correct knife leather next time our trails cross. 

HABITAT FOR DUCKS

One Saturday morning last May I was sitting in our living room looking out the window at the beauty of nature. I always say, "Michigan in the summer is what Heaven will be like." Well, May is not quite summer, but some of its days do measure up.

We have a pond next to our home. That pond has been the best investment the Vicar's Wife and I have ever made. We receive untold hours of enjoyment observing the attracted wildlife. Back in the 1990's, I spotted wood ducks in the area. That spurred me to build wood duck houses. Since then I have installed four houses on our pond and several for neighbors and friends who live in the surrounding area.

On that Saturday morning I was referring to I noticed a hen wood duck looking out of one of the houses on our pond. This was unusual because they normally don't waste any time entering or exiting their abode. After a few minutes, she flew By Cree Vicar Dave, SASS Life #49907 TG Sucker Creek, Michigan

down to the water and then swam back to the house. As I watched, to my wonder and amazement a little head appeared in the oval opening of the house. The newly hatched wood duck jumped to his mother's side. I called the Vicar's Wife over and we witnessed twelve more ducklings flutter down to their mom's side in 20-second intervals. Then they proceeded to swim into the weeds for cover. In the 15 plus years the wood duck houses have adorned our pond this was the first time we had witnessed the little ones coming out party. The adults are usually only seen early in the morning when the drake lands and swims around with

the hen, and just before the sun sets. They are very wary of people, but have learned to tolerate us a little over the years.

Wood ducks had a rough time in the early 1900's because their natural nesting sights (hollow trees) were becoming scarce. Someone discovered they would nest in a man-made box and now they are flourishing. It says in Genesis 2:15 "And the Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to tend and guard and keep it." (Amplified Bible) One of the best ways to care for God's creations is to make proper housing for the birds of the air. I read in a bird book that sometimes more than one wood duck will lay their eggs in a nesting box and then one hen sits on them. Or, if the house is large enough two hens will nest in the same box. Even other box nesting ducks, such as Hooded Mergansers, will share a house.

Wood duck nesting boxes are fairly easy to build for anyone with appropriate tools, skills, and safety equipment. I got the plans from a forestry officer in our community. (Continued on next page)



The house plan size is around 12" wide by 12" deep by 24" high. The entrance hole for wood ducks and hooded mergansers is a 3" high by 4" wide oval. I make it around a half inch larger per chance a common Golden eye shows up. The hole should be large enough to allow access to the ducks while keeping predators out. If the entrance is cut very much larger than 3" by 4", raccoons and such have easy pickins. If you place the nest box on a wood post, a cone shaped predator guard should be installed. I place most of the houses I build on some type of steel pipe to deter predators.

The plan calls for the box to be made from 1" by 12" cedar. Pine will work, but will not last as long. I use rough sawn cedar. It can be used as it is or planed down to size. It is hard to find white cedar around here in 12" boards, so I end up using 1" by 10" when I can find it. They can be made with narrower lumber and pieced together. A strip of quarter or half inch hardware cloth is installed on the inside front leading up to the entry hole to aid the baby ducks in climbing out. I make the sides swing out up from the bottom for easy access. The boxes should be inspected after each season, cleaned, and new red cedar shavings added as needed, around 3" to 4" will do. The box is placed 3 to 5 feet above water or ground.

If you don't have a State Forestry office in your area or have trouble locating plans, I would be happy to aid you in caring for God's Creations. For plans, send a self addressed stamped envelope to:

In April 1881, a young Alabama Civil War veteran of German ancestry, Dallas Stoudenmire, had been selected by the El Paso city government to fill the position of marshal. He was a gunfighter of considerable reputation. A young personable man in his mid-thirties, he was a striking figure. His jutting jaw and six foot two frame, in conjunction with his black frock coat and prominent frontier weapons, were an imposing advertisement of his profession. Stoudenmire had served briefly as a Texas Ranger in Captain Waller's Company B. He had served with the Fifth-Seventh Cavalry and Thirty-third Alabama regiment, General Cleburne's division; surrendered with General Joseph Johnston in the Civil War and had been paroled in April, 1865, following the end of hostilities. Dallas had drifted west after the war, and finally settled in Columbus County, Texas, not

far from Houston. During the years following the war, he had acquired a reputation as a fighter and was known to have been involved in numerous incidents, some on the thin edge of the law. His reputation as a gunfighter, and his accuracy with the six-gun, was a natural outgrowth of his turbulent lifestyle.

Dallas Stoudenmire had been marshal of El Paso for less than a week when he was involved in one of the most famous gunfights on historic record. Three local characters were embroiled in an argument over a coroner's inquest in the center of the town's main thoroughfare, El Paso Street. Words shortly led to gunfire as the only solution to the argument. When the shooting started, Dallas was enjoying a late breakfast in a nearby Globe restaurant. At the first shot, he leaped to the door of the restaurant, drawing his pistols, and he ran. A local citizen,

Gus Krempkau, an ex-ranger of Captain Baylor's company, selected as interpreter for the inquest, was already shot and down. Seeing the remaining two combatants with sixshooters out, Stoudenmire opened fire. His first casualty was a Mexican bystander who had the ill fortune to race across Dallas' line of fire. He fell dead. Undeterred, Stoudenmire coolly shot John Hale and George Campbell, a former city marshal, the remaining contestants. The fight was abruptly over. In

almost as many seconds, three men had died under Stoudenmire's guns and Krempkau had been killed by John Hale. The violent entry of Dallas Stoudenmire on the El Paso law and order front had a most sobering effect on the unruly element. An unaccustomed calm prevailed in the lusty border town.

Stoudenmire was known to carry at least two revolvers. There is contradiction about the guns he used. Historians agree he carried two in "leather-lined pockets." One authority has the marshal packing a pair of "silver-plated .45 Colts." Famous lawman, Jim Gillett, a contemporary of Stoudenmire, presented two ivory-gripped 1851 Navy Colts, obviously too long-barreled to have been carried in any but the most cavernous of pockets, to Sul Ross University at Alpine, Texas. Gillett believed these revolvers to have been Stoudenmire's.

Gordon Frost, a prominent El Paso gun collector and author, has obtained a .44 Colt for which he has convincing authentication as having belonged to Stoudenmire. One of the rare 1871-72 transition models that bridged the gap between the 1860 .44 Army percussion gun and the 1873 Peacemaker .45, the Stoudenmire revolver has been cut to 2-7/8" barrel length, doing away with the front sight and ejector rod. Chambered for the .44 Centerfire cartridge, this seems a most likely gun to be carried in the pants pocket (Continued on page 66)

The new SASS Mounted Shooting Program was implemented at END of TRAIL 2006 and had a successful first year completion. Awards were presented at END of TRAIL 2007 for High Overall Cowboy and Cowgirl, Division Winners, as well as sponsored luck of the draw prizes.

Why SASS Mounted Points? As the new and improved SASS National Mounted Shooting Program was being developed, the necessity to have a Mounted Shooting database of active Mounted Shooters was realized. By registering SASS Points, the organization has been able to document the active SASS Mounted Shooter, as well as the activities of the affiliate clubs. SASS is also able to track the division status of the Mounted Shooter, a benefit that has been long overdue. This has been a successful system in motivating affiliate mounted clubs to host SASS Mounted Shoots and for the club members to become SASS members. The SASS points system has been successful in motivating existing local clubs to affiliate with SASS.

To be eligible for points, division awards, and luck of the draw prizes:

- You must be a SASS member in good 1. standing.
- Attend at least three SASS sanc- $\mathbf{2}$. tioned mounted points matches.
- 3. Affiliated club must submit match results and points results within 14 days to the SASS office; after 15 days the points are invalid.
- 50% or more of the competitors in the local and annual SASS sanctioned matches must be SASS members. State and above must be 100%SASS members.
- There must be at least 10 or more competitors at a sanctioned match to qualify for points.
- The points are awarded as follows: 1. 1 x points – SASS local club match
- or Annual Champion 2. 2 x points – SASS Stage
- Championship 3 x points – SASS Regional 3. Championship
- 4 x points SASS National 4. Championship

5. 5 x points - END of TRAIL World Championship

SASS points are not needed to qualify for attendance at any SASS mounted activity and are recorded at no extra cost to the affiliate club. They are for you to see where you stand with other Mounted Shooters, for SASS to track division status, and for fun!

Most holsters are a type we could call "conventional," as they are variants of sheaths; a pocket the

revolver is dropped into and from which it has to be drawn from before the shooter can aim and fire. Now, as fast as the modern gunfighter rigs are, a long time ago there was another way to carry revolvers, and it may have been even faster! It was known as the "Bridgeport RigTM." The Bridgeport RigTM was not a holster as we know it. It was a fork-shaped, spring loaded belt clip riveted to a gun belt. The revolver, usually a Colt SAA, got a special hammer stud with an enlarged mushroom shaped head that slipped into the fork of the belt plate. This allowed the gun to swing freely at the shooters side, absolutely in the open.

I first heard about such a rig back in the early 1960's in Elmer Keith's classic work, "Sixguns by Keith." He refers to a similar rig made as a contemporary replica of the Bridgeport $\operatorname{Rig}^{\mathrm{TM}}$ by Jesse Thompson. Keith thought this was

the fastest quick-draw rig he had ever used.

The real Bridgeport Rig was the 1882 invention (U.S. Patent #252448) of Louis S. Flateau, a Texan. He called his device a "pistol and carbine holder." Louis approached the US Army and 500 of the rigs were tested in 1883 field trials by units in the Southwest. The name we know came from the fact they were made by the *(Continued on next page)*

Bridgeport Gun Implement Company in Connecticut. Hartley and Graham in NYC supplied the rigs to the Army at Rock Island Armory, who assembled the belt clips onto gun belts.

Turns out the Army didn't care much for the "holders" and for reasons that are obvious. They offered no protection from the elements, and the revolvers, hanging loose, got tangled in gear and fell out while the owners' hands were otherwise busy. Later, some of the devices were sold commercially. The author of *Packing Iron* suggests these rejected military rigs were possibly the only civilian supply. A few Bridgeport RigsTM pop up in old photographs. The title just cited shows some of these. One noted user was James B. Gillett who refers to having used two of these rigs in the early 1880's while El Paso's Chief of Police.

The belt-plate is riveted to a gun belt with prongs forward, and the revolver is inserted by sliding the head of the special hammer stud back into the prongs. In place in the clip, the pistol hangs at the ready with its muzzle down. All the shooter has to do is grab the grip and push forward to draw. Another way the Bridgeport Rig^{TM} can be used is not to draw the gun at all, rather to fire from the hip. Leaving the gun inside the spring clip, the gun is gripped and the handle is tilted down until the muzzle comes up on target, the hammer cocked, and the gun fired while it is still on the hip.

The famous Bridgeport Rig[™] is about to make a re-appearance, thanks to Wisconsin artisan Michael Pugh of Racine. Pugh sent me some of his prototypes to experiment with a while back. Since then friend, Jake Slade, SASS #5965, and I have been experimenting with them. These new reproductions are made close to the originals and seem to be made with good quality. Mike plans to have special "mushroom-head" hammer studs available to fit Colt SAA

1st and 2nd generation, and USFA; Cimarron Model P/Uberti Cattleman, and Colt SAA 3rd generation. The hammer stud enters these models from the left, so they are intended for right-handed draw. There may be a stud in the future for the 1878 Colt Double Action Army, but since the hammer screw enters from the right, it will be a left-handed draw only. The Bridgeport RigTM belt plate is fastened to the belt by four rivets and is not mounted in the same place as a regular holster would be, as the angle of the rig would too extreme to function well. Pugh says they work best mounted almost waist high on (Continued on page 66)



Lightning, but could never find one that worked—at least in a price range I could afford! When General Grant at EMF told me they were going to be marketing the new Lightning pump rifle for Pedersoli, I was very interested. In fact, to say I was excited at the prospect of getting the Lightning to do an article is an understatement.

The version I chose to evaluate was a 20-inch round-barreled carbine model in .45 Colt. When it arrived and I opened it, my first impression was "What a beautiful gun!" It is striking in appearance. The bluing is a deep, highly polished blue-black, very even, and is exceptionally well done. The metal-tometal fit is excellent, absolutely 100%. The action is light and as smooth as silk, yet secure with a tight lock up. The 20-inch round barrel appears to have a slight taper, with a full-length magazine tube (Continued on next page)


that holds 10 rounds. The front end of the barrel and magazine tube are held together by a standard carbine type barrel band.

The rear sight is really interesting. It is a ladder sight almost like the original Lightning and Winchester carbine sights, with one twist—when folded down, it has a small but sufficient semi-buckhorn rear sight with an ample square bottom notch that lends itself to an excellent sight picture. It is a little beefier than the original carbine sight; however, almost like a "mini-Sharps" ladder. When elevated, it is indexed to 800 yards, which is probably a bit optimistic! The cross piece is spring loaded, so it will not slip when set at an elevated setting. Overall, it is absolutely the nicest factory rear sight I have ever seen on a Cowboy Action ShootingTM main match rifle. The front sight is a simple tapered blade, rounded on the front, and flat at a 90-degree angle to the barrel on the rear towards the shooter. This makes for a very crisp front sight picture.

The fore-grip is a really nice onepiece type of figured American walnut that duplicates the original Colt cocking piece. The forearm has

sharp, cut checkering to help maintain the grip of the cocking hand. This is especially appreciated when cycling the action quickly. The buttstock also appears to be American walnut. It has a clear, straight, and even grain. The wood finish is a little brighter than a semi-gloss, but not really shiny like a varnish finish. It is almost like a quality, hand rubbed, tru-oil finish in appearance. The fit and finish of the wood is 100%. The butt-plate is a steel, almost crescent carbine type. This Lightning pump rifle lives up to Pedersoli's pedigree of quality firearms.

Lightning, and the Pedersoli copy. I spent some time comparing it to Hanging Judge Hemp's original, and there were no noticeable external or functional differences. Just like the original Lightning, loading and operation of the Pedersoli Lightning is different than any lever gun. Unlike a lever gun, the Lightning must have the action open and to the rear to load the magazine. After the action is opened, rounds are inserted into the loading gate on the right side of the receiver, just like lever guns. The Pedersoli Lightning has a very stiff (Continued on page 65)

I live in Europe, and I love Cowboy Action ShootingTM! For Cowboy Action ShootingTM I



dress as a Sergeant in the US Infantry. The rifle I am holding is a replica Sharps 1859 "Berdan" with double set triggers in .54 caliber. Fam. Chiappa of ARMI Sport Chiappa in Italy made this rifle for me, and I have successfully used it for 500 and 800 yard long range shooting. My other guns are two Colt Navies in .44 caliber made by F.ILLI PIETTA in Italy, a replica Winchester 1873 by UBERTI, Italy, and an original side-by-side shotgun manufactured by Husqvarna, Sweden in 1880.

I chose this outfit because I am an American ex-GI currently living in Europe. I served in the 2nd Battalion, 48th Infantry in 1965/66 during the "Cold War." I was stationed in Gelnhausen, Germany, an area then known as "the Fulda Gap." I was sent from there to Viet Nam with the 173rd Infantry Brigade, (Airborne) for a rather "extended" term as well ...

magazine spring, no doubt to help with feeding. Because of this stiff spring, and the fact that the shells must be pushed far into the receiver, a loading stick is a really good idea. Once the magazine is fully charged, the action is then closed on an empty chamber. As the lifter is already in the upper position when the cartridges are loaded, no round is forced into the chamber. The hammer is then lowered onto the empty chamber by first placing your thumb over the hammer, pulling the trigger, then slowly lowering the hammer all the way down.

To chamber a round and fire is simple. Pull the "off-hand" holding the fore-grip to the rear several inches, and then slide it back forward. This cycles the action, cocks the hammer, and chambers a round. The slide is now locked until the trigger is pulled and the hammer falls and fires the cartridge. The slide is then free to be pulled to the rear, just like on an 1897 Winchester. (This is a benefit to 1897 Winchester shooters, as both long guns use the same muscle memory to cycle) This action can be repeated by the average shooter MUCH faster than a lever gun! If you want to cycle the action when it is cocked with a live round in the chamber, there is a release lever on the forward face of the trigger guard. Depressing it unlocks the action, and allows it to be cycled without pulling the trigger and dropping the hammer. I understand this feature is copied from early models of the original Colt Lightning, though it was omitted on later production guns.

This slide action is an advantage, as this maneuver can be done with little or no disruption of the shooting hand and sight picture. The shooting hand and index finger remains on the grip and the trigger throughout the whole process! You are able to maintain target acquisition and sight picture 100% of the time while cycling the action.

The Pedersoli Lightning is currently offered in .45 Colt and .44-40. They are available with both round and octagonal barrels in 20-, 24-, and 26-inch lengths. The blued finish is standard, though some models can be had with color case hardened receivers.

AT THE RANGE

Considering the reputation of the original Lightnings (and many reproductions) not to cycle reliably, I thought I would see how it fed action proving dummies before I even went down to my range below my house. I took the Lightning into the den, and



dug out about a dozen dummy .45 Colt rounds from my loading chest. These were inert rounds I loaded up with different brands of brass and bullet weights (230 and 250 grain). I fed them into the magazine of the Lightning and hoped for the best. Clack, clack, clack, clack! One by one they fed smoothly through the action, ejecting perfectly, and making a pile by my feet. No malfunctions. I retried this drill with six or seven magazines full, each time cycling the action at different speeds and intensity. Once again, zero failures to feed, every one fed, and ejected smooth as silk! This seemed too good to be true. Now I really couldn't wait to take it to the range!

At the range the Pedersoli Lightning really showed its stuff. The first match where I used the EMF Lightning was the August Macoupin County Regulators match outside of Bunker Hill, IL. It was my first Cowboy Action ShootingTM match after moving to Southern Illinois. One Good Eye, Polish Cowgirl, Ellie Oakley, and all the rest of the Posse made me feel very welcome, and right at home. On the first stage, I used my trusty .44-40 Iron Frame Henry Military Model, as I did not want to take a chance on using an unproven rifle on my first stage at a new club. If it malfunctioned (as some varieties of Lightning clones are known to do), it would not have been a good first impression.

On the second stage, however, I took the plunge and switched to the .45 EMF/Pedersoli Lightning carbine. WOW! What a gun. It cranked off the rounds like a semi-auto and thumped the targets every time. I shot the remaining four stages clean with the fast, little carbine. I was able to accurately empty the magazine on the Lightning in less than half the time it took me to empty my 1860 steel frame Henry Military model! This was done with relative ease, as being able to maintain the strong hand position and sight picture with the pump action naturally leads to quicker repeat shoots.

The only one failure to feed I experienced the entire time I had the test gun was when I short-stroked the action in my excitement during the final stage of the match! To be fair, though, on my posse alone I saw several 1892 shooters short stroke their rifles and have failures to feed. In fact, about the only rifle that won't generally fail to feed on an unintentional short-stroke is the Winchester toggle link models: 1860 Henry, 1866, 1873, and 1876.

As for accuracy, the Pedersoli Lightning was outstanding. I used Jeff Hoffman's Black Hills factory .45 Colt 250 grain ammo, which I consider to be the "gold standard" of Cowboy Action Shooting[™] ammo. I (Continued on page 71)

of a knowing gunman of the 1880s. Trimmer, with fewer projections to catch on clothing than 1873 Models, the Frost gun is said to have been removed from Stoudenmire's pocket at the time of his death and is persuasive evidence not all westerners chose the Peacemaker Colt.

Smith & Wesson pioneered the use of metallic cartridges, and by 1870 they had developed their Model #3, initially introduced chambered for the .44 Henry Rimfire. The U.S. Army told them some contracts might be forthcoming if they altered the ignition system to centerfire. They did this with little other change to the cartridge. Eventually the round gained the name ".44 American."

The government was as good as their word and bought 1,000 S&W Model #3s with 8" barrels. They were issued to cavalry regiments around the frontier, and saw much service. In fact, modern archeology has proven no less than four Smith & Wesson Model #3s in .44/100 caliber were fired during the Battle of the Little Bighorn in 1876.

The Russians liked S &W's new revolver, but not its cartridge. They redesigned it, and then proceeded to order hundreds of thousands of revolvers chambered for it during the 1870s. As things turned out, the Russian design was superior to S&W's, and the .44 American was soon dropped. The .44 S&W Russian cartridge became the father of the .44 S&W Special and the grandfather to the .44 Remington Magnum.


According to a Winchester catalog dated 1899, they loaded the .44 American round with a 205 grain bullet over 25 grains of blackpowder, and the .44 Russian with 255 grain bullet over 23 grains of the same.

The term "Model 3" refers to the largest frame size used by S&W to produce its full sized top-break cartridge revolvers. The model line began in 1870 with the introduction of the S&W American - the first commercially successful large bore centerfire cartridge revolver. Large military contracts from the Russian government encouraged a series of redesigns during the 1870's, resulting in the configurations known as "Russian Models." Between 1875 and 1878, the US military purchased Model 3s of the Schofield pattern. In 1878, S &W discontinued its other Model 3 variations in favor of a much-improved design they called the New Model Number Three. In just a few years, a double action model was introduced, known, logically enough, as the .44 D.A. In all it's variations, the Model 3 was the

the belt, just above the pocket on your jeans.

Wearing a revolver in one of these rigs is entirely different from carrying a revolver on the hip in a conventional holster. I had a disconcerting feeling wearing a revolver that is open for all to see. As you walk, you are conscious of the gun swinging on your hip out there in the breeze, so it takes some getting used to! Several folks came up to me at the range to ask about the rig, and a few of them said it just didn't "look" safe. I share their opinion. Watching someone walk while wearing a revolver in one of these rigs is intimidating; that muzzle swinging around doesn't look safe.

My 4-3/4" Colt .44-40 SA hangs at about the same angle as with a Lawman style holster, like Bianchi No. 1. The muzzle hangs canted to the rear with the butt slightly forward, an angle from which many shooters find comfortable to draw from. When drawing from the Bridgeport Rig[™], grip the gun nor-*(Continued on next page)*




(Continued from previous page) mally and then simply push straight ahead while tilting the muzzle up ... that's all it takes! Draw speed is enhanced if you consciously swivel your hips rearward during the draw. This pulls the "rig" back while you push the gun forward. Once I had those moves down pat, I found drawing a Colt from the Bridgeport RigTM is lightning fast, but it is nothing like drawing from a "normal" holster. I found it took practice to get the hang of finding the grip of a gun hanging loose at your side. Also, I realized I had to forget how I had been trained to draw, meaning pulling the gun up, and then changing the direction of the muzzle toward the target.

I decided to see how firing the gun from the hip while it was still in the belt clip idea would work. Moving slowly, I had no intention of trimming my toenails with a .44 caliber slug. I found it necessary to get used to operating a gun that was fixed to my hip. The practice was all done with an empty cylinder, and I was very happy I did that, as I soon found that my inclination was to thumb the hammer back while trying to swivel the muzzle up. That was okay as long as I kept the motion deliberate and slow. However as I tried to speed it up, on half the shots the hammer was dropping before the muzzle was up horizontal. Yeah, there were a few, when the hammer dropped while the muzzle was pointing near my toe!

So, we tried a different method, first carefully swiveling the muzzle up, being conscious of the muzzle being nearly horizontal "before" thumbing the hammer. This took some work to get used to, but it was obvious this method would work. I found it both fast and safe. To satisfy a foolish fantasy, perhaps to duplicate what it would have been like to fire a Colt attached to a Bridgeport Rig[™] in the 1880s, I fired a few rounds of .44-40 blackpowder from the hip. As anyone with brains has already guessed, two shots was all I got, the muzzle flash being so close to my pants, 35 grains of blackpowder was inclined to light up the denim!

We had an inkling you wouldn't be seeing this rig in competitions sponsored by fast-draw groups like World Fast Draw Assn (WFDA) or Cowboy Fast Draw Assn (CFDA). Quick Cal, the Executive Director of CFDA, generously offered this: "They (the Bridgeport Rigs) do not meet the rules for use in CFDA competition and therefore would not be allowed at a sanctioned contest." And, ... "From a safety standpoint, which is our number one concern, I would be very leery of them since they don't hold the





gun in a firm straight-down or down-

range position. I would be worried with them swiveling the muzzle about as shooters walked around." Hmmm, yep, no surprise there!

Practical? Heck no! But aw shucks ... I just had to have one! Maybe it is just because these intriguing rigs came out of a wonderful time in our history and they sure had their share of that history, including time with the US Army during the Indian Wars.

ZEBULON AKA "ZEB," SASS #42906 January 25, 1946–March 29, 2007

Zebulon, aka Larry Gene Icenogle, made his last ride to a glorious reward suddenly at 2:59 PM, March 29, 2007.

Zebulon was a member of the National Rifle Association, Sons of Confederate Veterans, SASS, and a founding member of Coles County Regulators, all of which he enjoyed. He was a former stock car racer, a fan of the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing and took pleasure in a day of hunting. He was always available for others in a time of need (as many can and will attest to). Zeb never met a stranger in all the days of his life. From his years as a stock car racer, Civil War reenactor, Old West re-enactor, and Cowboy Action Shooter, his friends numbered in the hundreds, or perhaps, even in the thousands.

Zebulon was a man of his word and a true and loyal friend. To many of us he exemplified "The Cowboy Way." He certainly lived life to its fullest and never wasted a waking minute. If he wasn't taking care of his home and yard, he was reloading or casting bullets, cooking and baking, or enjoying one of his many other diversions.

Zebulon had a deep and true interest in the Old West and enjoyed creating stories with his friends in the SASS Saloon. I am honored to have been one of the authors of the last story he wrote entitled, "Desperation Trail," along with Brazos Jack, Cherokee Charlie, Pat Riot, Bama Red, Oklahomabound, J. Mark Flint, and D. Deadshot. Zeb was the leader of that story and left us before it was finished. The rest of the authors finished the story in tribute to a man we all respected.

He always portrayed a man based much on his own characteristics, born exactly 100 years earlier. He built the story and his character's age around that time in history. He researched the Internet for places and events he could use to bring his stories to life. He often used names of friends, acquaintances, and relatives for the characters in his stories.

After Zeb's untimely passing, Ellie Mae Mohr and Redneck Rebel hosted a Memorial Match in his honor. A duplicate of Zeb's match gunbelt and holsters was made by one of the "Desperation Trail" authors, Cherokee Charlie, and funded by the rest of the authors who, taking a flourish from their characters in that story call themselves, "Zeb's Irregulars." The gun rig was raffled at the match.

Zebulon shared his thoughts about anything and everything and shared his favorite libations of Apple Pie and Peach Squeezin's. In working with him on stories, he had an opportunity to describe himself to me in writing, and I think it fitting to let an extraordinary man describe himself in his own words, speaking of his persona in the SASS Wire Saloon versus his real life ... "The Saloon Zeb is a hard drinking, womanizing carouser that will fight at the drop of a hat, even if he has to drop it himself. He is uncouth at times – dense and "unedjumacated." He is [the] fellow in the Saloon that knows the conversation at every table. He knows at a glance which bottles contain the good stuff and which ones are filled with watered down whiskey. He knows every one of the saloon girls intimately. He knows who cheats at cards and which key on the piano is sour. He lives in the saloon - leaving only for an occasional gunfight out in the street."

"The real Zeb is a retired man -a father of four and grandfather of eight. He helps his oldest daughter five mornings a week in her day care. He occasionally helps his youngest



son with his business. His oldest son is his best friend and a frequent visitor at his home. The youngest daughter lives in Texas with her husband, who is in the United States Navy."

"The real Zeb is a loyal friend, a former Civil War re-enactor, a founding member of the Coles County Regulators (a Wild West reenactment group), an avid shooter, and at one time an avid hunter. He enjoys cooking, but not nearly as much as he enjoys NASCAR."

And finally, Zeb only shot "The Holy Black," and I have a great picture of him with his favorite shotgun throwing about six feet of flame out of the barrels with copious smoke in attendance.

On behalf of the authors of "Desperation Trail" I submit this in memory of a man I miss daily who was truly bigger than life. Zebulon is probably reading this from his favorite chair on a heavenly porch and wondering what all the fuss is about. After reading it through all the way, in inimitable Zeb style he would loudly proclaim, "JUMPIN JEHOSS-APHATT!!!!!!!" The best thing I can say about him and the highest praise I can give is that he was and always will be my friend ... Vaya con Dios.

(Continued from page 65) was able to regularly shoot sub-one inch groups at 25 yards from a casual rest. I was also able to get several three shot clover leafs. This is especially good when you consider it is a short-barreled carbine in .45 Colt rather than a more accurate .44-40 round or longer barrel rifle. I also did my usual off-hand firing drill at 25 to 35 yards, bouncing pop cans as fast as I could. After several rapid magazines full, and no misses, I finally called it quits. It was almost as if the EMF/Pedersoli Lightning would not let me miss.

With the 20-inch carbine barrel, a Lightning feels much lighter and handier than a Marlin Cowboy or Uberti 1866 or 1873 with a 24-inch barrel. It swings easily and effortlessly to engage every target. After over 100 rounds of .45 Colt ammo, I had zero malfunctions or failures to feed. Bad Lands Bud, watch out!!! There are going to be more shooters who can shoot a rifle as fast as you do.

CONCLUSION

This Italian made beauty is remarkable. The Pedersoli Lightning distributed by EMF is accurate, reliable, and extremely fast. If you want quality and reliability, backed by great customer service, you have to pay for it. Just as the original Lightning had this well deserved reputation for speed shooting, I believe the Pedersoli Lightning will have the same reputation for speed, without the originals reputation of unreliability. Today's Pedersoli computer driven CNC milling machines are capable of making much more reliable firearms than Colt's 19th Century plant was, and today's steel alloys are far superior and more wear resistant than the early steels of the 1880s.

This Pedersoli Lightning is not cheap, but neither is a Ferrari! If you want real quality, you have to pay for it. If you are like me, though, you don't mind the expense if you are paying for quality. If a product has real quality, it is a bargain, regardless of expense. An inexpensive gun that doesn't work isn't worth a dime. Even worse is an expensive gun that doesn't work. That's not an issue, here, however. The Pedersoli Lightning really works!

When it comes to Cowboy Action Shooting[™] guns, I tend to be lowtech, leaning to early period guns like Remington cartridge conversions, 1860 Henries, and 1860 Spencers. This sample Lightning carbine was such a peach, however, I really did try to think of a way to hang onto to it.

With EMF taking on marketing the Lightnings for Pedersoli in the US, the availability should be good. EMF has a longstanding personal relationship with Pedersoli. You can contact EMF at (800) 430-1310, or check their web site at: www.emf-company.com.

By the way, if you are ever in the Saint Louis, MO or Springfield, IL area on the third Saturday of the month, go to Bunker Hill, Illinoisabout half way in between the two. 





- 14 Nov 1851 Lieutenant Colonel J. J. Abercrombie and members of the Fifth Infantry begin construction of Fort Phantom Hill north of Abilene, Texas.



extra animals, having been raided repeatedly by the Mormon Nauvoo Legion.

- **16 Nov 1858** General William Larimer and company jump Charles Nichols, while he is working on his claim in Colorado. A meeting between the two results in Nichols being threatened, and finally a \$250 offer to Nichols plus shares in a new claim and city that Larimer intends to call Denver. They lay out 345 city blocks parallel to the Platte River and Cherry Creek.

THE OUTLAWS IS COMING! (SOITENLY!) Utah Summer Games 2007 June 7-9th, Cedar City, UT

Nedar City, Utah – Nestled Jamidst such natural beauty as Zion National Park, Cedar Breaks, and Brian Head Ski Resort, Cedar City, Utah, is the annual home of the Utah Summer Games (USG). For two weeks every June, the population of Cedar City grows by 8,000 or so as athletes from around the state come to compete in their choice of the 54 individual and team sports hosted by the Games. Since 2005, the sport of Cowboy Action Shooting[™] has been well represented, causing the USG staff to call us "the fastest growing individual sport, not to mention the most unique!" They love having Cowboy Action ShootingTM as part of their event!

Monday officially kicks off "crunch week" for the members of The Coal Creek Cowboys as they rush to place the final touches on their range in order to host the venue. Just a few miles away, a small plane lands at the airport. Evil Roy and Wicked Felina have arrived and are ready to meet their 20 eager students bright and early Tuesday morning.

With the Evil Roy Shooting School, the Cowboy Action ShootingTM venue has officially begun for the Utah Summer Games. For the next two days, students learned all the ins and outs of how to improve their game. Smiles were plentiful and everyone had rave reviews on the class.

Each year The Coal Creek Cowboys develop the USG match around a central theme. 2007 was no different as the 1964 classic movie, "The Outlaws Is Coming!" featuring The Three Stooges was chosen as the central focus for all the fun. Included in each shooter's packet was a full-color, 54 page collector's shoot book, filled not only with slapstick stages, but also with Stooge trivia and autobiographies.

Thursday, June 7th dawned bright as the competitors gathered to begin this unique match in earnest. After the mandatory safety briefing, a full slate of sixteen side matches were waiting to test the

mettle of anyone stepping up to the challenge. This year, the long-range side match featured a full-sized buffalo set at 745 yards, in addition to the "near" target at 417 yards. It was difficult to determine who was having the most fun ... the shooters or the spectators, as nary a shot was made without appropriate (or *in*appropriate) comment.

Side matches proved to be an important element of the match this year as The Coal Creek Cowboys changed how the overall match winners were determined. New for 2007 were the "Iron Cowboy" & "Iron Cowgirl" overall awards. Competitors for overall awards were required to shoot five mandatory side matches: speed pistol, speed rifle, speed shotgun, precision pistol and precision rifle. The shooters were ranked appropriately in each of the five side matches, and those rank points were then added to their rank points earned during the twelve stage Main Match. The cowboy and cowgirl with the lowest number of totaled rank points at the conclusion of the Main Match then took home the impressive (and unique!) Iron Cowboy and Iron Cowgirl trophies.


The day ended with everyone

having a bundle of shooting fun, and the "kiss 'n cry" area in front of the scoreboard was crowded into early evening as each shooter assessed their chances at the overall trophy. Friday morning came in typical Utah style with beautiful blue skies and an abundance of sunshine.

All safety rules were addressed and everyone headed out to their first stage of the day. Stages were true to The Three Stooges theme. As in many SASS matches, a shooter had to say a line to indicate they were ready. The dialogue was in the spirit of The Three Stooges, and the competitors took great pride in seeing who could sufficiently "alter" the line to get the RO laughing the hardest. Unofficial competitions arose with each Posse striving to develop the "best line" of the match. The winner was buckaroo Mini Moe, from St. George, Utah ... but we'll just have to let you ask him in person what he said to win the honor!

Friday evening was the Cowboy BBQ and Side Match awards. Stampede kept us entertained through dinner with an excellent repertoire of Country and Western songs, backed up by acoustic guitar and bass fiddle. The 'dogs and 'burgers were grilled with distinction by Culpepper and Slo Swede. As everyone wound down to dessert, Puffbuster awarded the Utah Summer Games Gold, Silver, and Bronze medals for each of the side matches. After a great evening of music, food, medals, and socializing, we were ready to call it a night and get ready for Day Two of the main match.

The final six stages of the Match were hosted on Saturday and by now our shooters had definitely achieved the "Spirit of a Stooge." They continued to ride Ol' Gluepot, rescue L'il Annie, daintily step around the cow patties (which were a penalty if you stepped in the "poo") and squeeze the infamous Henrietta the rubber chicken (who was all decked out in her best bikini, with highly glossed chicken lips, feather boa, and a squawk sure to make you giggle). Shoot Henrietta's stage "clean" and you

were awarded a rubber chicken key chain to proudly hang from your gun cart to commemorate the occasion.

The warm sun, balmy breeze, and stickery grass made things a bit interesting! It wasn't as easy as it first seemed to be.

The second team event of the afternoon was the Post Cut. Six person teams were chosen randomly, with two shooters armed with pistols, two with rifles, and two with shotguns. Teams could take all the ammo to the line they wished, but *(Continued on next page)*



SMOKE IN THE GREATLAND 2007 *Battle on the Plains*

Trooper John Smith felt uneasy as he kicked his mount into a gallop, following Captain William J. Fetterman up and over Lodge Trail Ridge. The detail consisted of 80 Troopers that had been ordered to rescue a woodcutting party out of Fort Kearney. Proceeding up the ridge, the scouts had spotted a small party of Lakota Sioux, and the leader had been recognized as the young warrior, Crazy Horse. As they topped the hill and started down the

other side, it was immediately obvious they had just been led into a trap as over 1,000 Indian warriors came out of hiding.

Screaming "Charge!" on the beep, Trooper John Smith, SASS #5561, moved from his horse and picked up his rifle. In a Nevada sweep with nine rounds, he engaged the three rifle targets including the buffalo. Putting down the empty, open rifle, he picked up his shotgun, engaged the two shotgun targets, and swept them three times. Placing the empty, open shotgun on the "mule," he drew his first pistol and engaged the four pistol targets in a sweep, putting the last round on the

bound water for track prices as the sport the hill and started down the started track of the hill and started down the

same target as the first. He re-holstered, drew the second pistol, and swept the targets same as the first. Upon completing the scenario, he picked up his empty firearms and proceeded to the unloading table. It was a successful beginning to the Battle On The Plains.

It was not really December 21, 1866, but May 26, 2007, and it was the opening stage of the Alaska State Blackpowder Championships. Planned and directed by Yukon Marshal, SASS Life #3415, each of the ten stages brought to life a historically important battle during the era known as the Indian Wars. In this incident, Capt. Fetterman and the men under his command were completely wiped out. It was a great victory for the Plains Indians.


In another of his well-planned and well-researched matches, Yukon Marshal chose to celebrate Memorial Day by commemorating some of the great conflicts that took place in the American West during the years between the Civil War and the official closing of the Frontier in the 1890's. Not only did we get to enjoy some great shooting stages, but were exposed to some fascinating history lessons as well.

What better way to celebrate Memorial Day than to pay homage to those brave souls that gave their lives on both sides of the conflict?

In Stage #2, called the Wagon Box Fight, the shooter began with his/her hands on the hat brim as though shading their eyes from the sun, and shouted, "It's Red Cloud!"

This fight took place on August 2, 1867. Chief Red Cloud of the (Continued on next page)

Ogallala Sioux led an estimated 1,000 warriors against a small party of military and civilian woodcutters, also near Ft. Kearney. Red Cloud was hoping to repeat the Fetterman massacre, but several things occurred that changed the outcome. First, he did not have the element of surprise, and the party of 32 woodcutters led by Captain James Powell, were able to take cover inside an oval corral made up of wagon boxes. In addition, they were armed with new breech loading faster firing rifles. They were able to repel the attack and held out until a relief column arrived. The woodcutters only lost three men killed and two wounded while killing an estimated 60 Indians and wounding more than 100.

Moving to Stage #3, we re-fought the Battle of Beecher Island. This fight occurred in western Kansas during the summer of 1868. Col. George A. Forsyth led a group of frontiersmen he had formed into the Forsyth Scouts. They were tracking a large band of Cheyenne warriors that had raided a wagon train near Ft. Wallace, Kansas. On September 17th, they caught up with them just inside Colorado on the Arickaree Fork of the Republican River. Forsyth and his men dug in on a large sandbar known as Beecher's Island and were besieged there until September 25th, when a relief column of Cavalry from Ft.

Wallace arrived.

Col. Forsyth lost five men killed and sixteen wounded during the battle. It is not known how many casualties were suffered by the Cheyenne, but it is known their war chief, Roman Nose, was among the dead.

There were two fights known as the "Battle of Adobe Walls." The first was on November 25, 1864 with Kit Carson present. The second, the one of legend, was fought on June 27, 1874. This is the one re-enacted in Stage #4.

There were 28 or 29 persons present, mostly buffalo hunters, and at least one woman, Mrs. Olds. Some of the more notable of the defenders were James Hanrahan with his "Big Fifty" Sharps rifle, Billy Dixon known as a crack shot with a rifle, a young Bat Masterson who became a famous lawman, and "California" Joe Milner who later scouted for Custer.

At dawn on June 27, 1874, a force of approximately 700 warriors attacked the party. A half-white Comanche war chief called Quanah Parker led the Indians. Taking refuge inside the crumbling walls of an old adobe fortress, the buffalo hunters were able to fight off the attack with pistols, knives, Henrys, and Winchesters. After the initial attack was repulsed, the hunters were able to keep their attackers at bay with their Sharps rifles. In the first attack, four hunters were killed along with fifteen warriors. One of the hunters, Billy Olds, was "accidentally" shot and killed by his own wife, Mrs. Olds.

The next day, a group of about fifteen Indians rode up to a bluff about a mile from Adobe Walls and began taunting the besieged party. Billy Dixon used Hanrahan's "Big Fifty" Sharps in .50-90 to cleanly shoot a warrior from his horse at that distance. This so discouraged the Indians they rode away. Two weeks later, a U.S. Army survey team under the command of Nelson A. Miles measured the distance of the shot at 1,538 yards, approximately 9/10ths of a mile.

In Stage #5, we found ourselves at the Battle of the Rosebud.

In the spring of 1876, the U.S. Army, in three columns, took to the field against the Sioux and Cheyenne. The tribes had not met an ultimatum to return to their respective reservations after negotiations failed to acquire the sacred Black Hills in the fall of 1875.

General George Crook with over 1,300 men including Crow and Shoshone scouts, moved into the Rosebud Valley, Montana Territory in an attempt to force the tribes to return. On June 17th, 1876, a roughly equal number of warriors led by Crazy Horse attacked Crook. After more than six hours of hard fighting, Crook's column fought to a standstill and eventually was forced to return to its base camp near Sheridan, Wyoming. This gave the Sioux and Cheyenne a big psychological boost for another battle that was to come eight days later, approximately 30 miles away at a place the Indians called The Greasy Grass, called by the white man the Little Big Horn.

A side note to history: This was not a simple fight between the Sioux and Chevenne and the Army for the Crow and Shoshone scouts. It was their battle also. They deeply resented the other tribes encroaching on their lands.

Stage #6. The Indians who took part in the Battle of the Little Bighorn called it the Battle of the Greasy Grass. This was their name for the nearby river and valley. The Native Americans have long revered it as their greatest victory against the U.S. Army. To this day, you can still spot bumper stickers that say, "Custer had it coming." Since I am part Indian, I sometimes find myself agreeing with it. Think how different the world would be if the aboriginal people of the western hemisphere had a strict immigration policy in the 1500's instead of welcoming the Europeans with open arms!

The battle of the Little Bighorn, June 25-26, 1876, was the last great instance of Native American resistance to the growing westward expansion that would soon dominate the West. This battle was really two separate actions. Major Marcus Reno conducted the first, in the valley. His command attempted to attack the lower end of the village and was soon routed and forced to retreat back across the river onto some bluffs where he was joined by Captain Benteen and his troopers.

Five miles further up the valley, Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer and five companies of the 7th Cavalry were attacking the upper end of the village. Custer and his troopers were soon surrounded and tried to fight their way back up onto higher ground overlooking the village. Many brave men fought and died that day on both sides. But the Sioux and Chevenne. along with other Indian allies, were fighting to preserve their homeland and way of life. Greatly outnumbered, Custer and his men were soon overwhelmed on "Last Stand Hill" where they all perished.

Reno and Benteen, with their combined forces, were able to hold out through the next day until the Indians struck camp and left the valley after seeing the approach of Terry's and Gibbons' columns of Infantry. (The Sioux called them the "Walking Soldiers.") In Stage #7, The Buffalo Sol-

diers, we acknowledged the tremendously positive impact the African-Americans had in the development of the West. Not only did they help to protect the frontier, they were also the law enforcement in the early davs until civilian law was established. The name "Buffalo Soldiers" came from the Indians who described their hair and color like that of the buffalo. When you consider the importance of the buffalo in both the spiritual and physical lives of the Plains Indians, you can appreciate the respect that was shown.

There were still over 180,000 Black soldiers who fought for the North, at the time the Civil War ended. In 1866, the Army re-organ-(Continued on page 88)





Mission, BC – Once again the report of six-guns echoed through the pass, and the valley filled with clouds of billowing white smoke as the Red Mountain Renegades hosted the 2007 SASS Canadian Regional Championships at the Mission and District Rod & Gun Club. Situated in the beautiful natural valley between Bear Mountain and Red Mountain in Mission, BC Canada, the range offers a very comfortable and inviting venue for the event with a generous portion of warm Canadian hospitality. It was wonderful to see familiar faces again and meet many new ones. I was very happy to see Mud Marine, SASS #54686, Into Buffalo, SASS #47315, Never Metta Stranger, SASS #43871, and her husband, Dead Lee, SASS #43870, all make the journey from south of the 49th parallel once again.











ized and authorized two Regiments of Cavalry, the 9th and 10th, along with the 24th, 25th, 38th, 39th, 40th, and 41st Infantry Regiments. In 1869 the Infantry were consolidated into the 24th and 25th United States Infantry. The Buffalo Soldiers were assigned in every Department of the West, and fought many engagements throughout the Southwest. In all areas, they distinguished themselves with honor and were among the bravest and best of the fighting forces.

Stage #8, Guarding the Talking Wires. Every day life in the frontier U.S. Army was drudgery, boredom, lonely, and at times, brutal. Days, weeks, and months could go by with monotony. But danger lurked for the complacent and unwarv.

In the Southwest, favorite targets of the Apache warriors were the stagecoaches, mining camps, and telegraph lines, called the "talking wires" by the Indians. They recognized their importance to communications. The Apache were a strong, fierce, and proud race of people who did not give up their way of life and lands without a fight.

One of the Apaches' frequent tactics was to tear down the telegraph wires and then ambush the small patrols that came to check on it and/or repair it. No quarter was expected or given.

Counting Coup. Stage #9 introduced us to just how twisted Yukon Marshal's mind can get. One of the procedures on the stage required the shooter hold a 5-foot long "Coup Stick" while shooting. The rule was simple. You could not drop it on the ground. This led to some interesting innovations. Some tucked it in their boot, some put it through the gun belt, some held it in their fingers, and one enterprising soul stuck it down the back of his pants. He did shoot the stage "clean," but complained about splinters in a sensitive area!

A measure of bravery for a warrior of the Great Plains was not always the letting of blood. One way was the "Counting Coup," which was a non-violent practice of many of the Plains tribes. The warrior would touch an enemy in battle with his hand or a "coup stick," risking injury or death by doing so, and then running away unharmed.

Coups were recorded by notches on the coup stick or by feathers in a warrior's headdress. Other war trophies measured a warrior's bravery as well. Horses, captives, scalps, assorted body parts, weapons, etc. All recognized courage.

As warfare on the plains intensified, and since the white man did not seem to recognize "counting coup" by touching, it soon came to mean at least one of the parties came to a violent end.

A Way of Life No More was an accurate title for Stage #10, the final scenario.

The Apache Indians were a semi-nomadic people and longed for the open space of their native lands the Spaniards called Apacheria. On May 17, 1885, Chihuahua, Mangus Colorado, Nana, and Geronimo jumped the San Carlos Indian Reservation in Arizona and went on the warpath.

The "renegades" or "hostiles" as they were called, consisted of thirtyfive men, eight boys, and one hundred and one women and children. They would occupy the attention of five thousand troops, five hundred Indian auxiliaries, and an unknown number of civilians. On the warpath for sixteen months, they killed seventy-five U.S. citizens, twelve White Mountain Apaches, two commissioned officers, eight enlisted soldiers, and an unknown number of Mexicans. They terrorized hundreds of people over thousands of square miles, both in the United States and Mexico. The Apaches lost six men, two boys, two women, and one child.

On March 27, 1886, Geronimo was finally run down. He surrendered and returned to San Carlos. On March 29, 1886, Geronimo and forty others again jumped the reservation. This caused General Crook to resign and General Nelson A. Miles assumed command. It was during this campaign that Tom Horn acted as a scout for the Army. On August 24, 1886, Lt. Gatewood found and met with Geronimo on the banks of the Bavispe River. Geronimo agreed to meet with General Miles. On September 3, 1886, he surrendered with nineteen men and twenty-eight women and children. On September 8, 1886, the Apaches were sent east on a train under heavy guard to begin years of captivity. It was an ignominious end to a truly free way of life.
