wrope is half a world away, and yet ... Cowboy Action is as exciting to those folks as it is for us ... and it always has been! As the West was disappearing in America, Buffalo Bill Cody took his Wild West Show to Europe and played before packed stands for every performance. In the early 70's when I had a European assignment for a year and a half, cowboy and Indian "outfits" were rather common (and well done!), and events where these outfits could be worn were not

rare. While the myth of the Old West helped shape what America was to become, I suspect the excitement and adventure offered by the Old West was an escape from the bonds of wellestablished European national politics and social norms. At any rate, it's wonderful to know the lure of our past—its characters, its history, its adventure, and its guns—have a deep-seated appeal for us all!

There have been SASS members in Europe almost from the beginning. In the very early days, SASS was motivated to create an International Category to recognize the efforts by the Fritzes ... Big Fritz, Fireman Fritz, Wagoner Fritz, Small Glass Fritz, and a dozen more ... all Lufthansa employees. Some of these guys still make the long trip to the states and participate in END of TRAIL or one of the other more convenient annual matches.

Europeans have always had to be "cowboys" (folks working under duress with a single mission) in order to own and use their firearms. And, traveling any distance, especially across national boundaries, was always a challenge. Today, these challenges still exist, but there is light at the end of the tunnel!

While the shooting situation has become direr in Great Britain, in the Czech Republic, behind the former Iron Curtin, Cowboy Action is flourishing! Because of the evangelistic efforts of a few individuals, Cowboy Action clubs are beginning to sprout all across Europe ... from Norway and Poland in the north all the way to Italy in the south.

Each country has its own laws and ways of dealing with firearms. What is generally required is a complete codified set of "rules" for the shooting sport, and some sort of organization that is responsible for "controlling" (or at least administering) the sport. Often there is a single national organization that controls all shooting sports within a country ... generally the police, but not always.

In both Germany and Poland (and maybe elsewhere as well), the SASS Shooters Handbook has been translated into the local language, any necessary changes to comply with local ordinances made, a video showing Cowboy Action ShootingTM (or maybe a demonstration) provided, and approval has been granted to allow the sport in that country. Having "USA" stamped on the back of the book is seldom a help, but having the Germans (a European entity) approve the activity has carried considerable weight with the other countries.

Long live SASS and Cowboy Action ShootingTM. I hope to see some of you out there someday. \mathcal{A} .



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

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SMALL CALIBERS - SOMETIMES THERE'S A VERY GOOD REASON...

When each monthly issue of The Comboy Chronicle arrives in my mailbox, we can almost guarantee there will be somebody from somewhere making yet another misguided, uninvited statement about "Wimp Loads" or "Mouse Farts" or "Sissy Pistols" or any number of other insulting descriptive adjectives applied to any gun or load the contributing writer does not like. What somebody else shoots and enjoys does not deserve negative comment from anyone, unless that equipment somehow involves unsafe or illegal practices or does not conform to SASS rules.

We are constantly reminded SASS is involved with fun—fun for the whole family, and having fun is the primary objective of *our* activities as well. So, why do some folks continue to jump all over those of us who like to have "fun," but maybe have a legitimate reason for choosing a caliber the complainers personally determine as unsuitable or unfit?

What we shoot is entirely within the rules, and doubt if any of these complainers have ever heard any whining from those of us who are using .32 caliber revolvers and fail to knock down the target. We accept the condition the targets are set to fall under a .38 load, and if we don't aim carefully, the target may just not react properly. So what? Does that affect the score of the complainers? Of course not, but for some reason they seem to feel it is not the "Cowboy Way" – or more accurately, "Their Way."

Well, not being the "Cowboy Way" could also apply to anyone using two pistols as most 1800's working cowboys could barely afford one, much less two. And holsters? Try stuffing your revolver into your pants top or coat pocket if you want historical accuracy. I doubt (but don't know for sure) most real cowboys ever heard of a pump shotgun, much less owned one. They might have seen one in a late 1890's catalog just before its paper pages were put to a more practical use, but the coach gun or single barrel was the favorite. However, no one should pick on anybody using one in a match—it's their choice, legal, and not subject to your misguided opinion.

We have been shooting Cowboy Action for quite a few years now started off in Rimfire Ruckus at the Fort White Gun Club in Florida because we could afford one .22 caliber pistol, Henry rifle, and singlebarrel 20 gauge plus leather dress belts with cheap holsters. Enjoyed it so much that last year we finally decided to move up into Centerfire SASS due to, in part, of Delta Glenn's constant encouragement. However, since my wife and I both shoot, sometimes three times a month in good weather, we had to make some budget decisions, as we share all of our guns in all disciplines (Rimfire Ruckus, Urban Cowboy, SASS Cowboy).


So, we bought a Rossi '92 in .38 Special (.32 Marlin was way too heavy for her) plus a used 12 gauge Coyote Cap coach gun, both requiring us to learn how to reload, as her shoulder has some age-related tenderness (we are seniors ++) and both loads had to be reduced to soften the recoil. Then it was time to purchase two pistols and again, arthritis was the controlling factor. After 18 years as a bank teller, her wrists and fingers just could not take the impact of even .38 caliber, much less .45 caliber. A good personal friend suggested we consider a pair of .32 caliber Single-Sixes he knew were for sale, and that our budget would allow us to buy. We were fortunate enough to find his acquaintance who sold us a beautiful pair of Ruger .32 H&R's at a very reasonable price. We adapted our single-gun leathers by adding cross-draws to start out with. (We have since bought two sets of custom leathers and upgraded our clothing)

Now I don't have a recoil problem as I am a fairly big guy at over 6 ft and 235 lbs, plus having a couple of very large hands. But my wife, Bodacious Banker, has very small fragile hands with weakened fingers. With some larger calibers she could not even cock the hammer using two hands, so a smaller revolver was absolutely required if she was to continue to have fun shooting. Therefore, our choice of the .32 caliber was appropriate. Maybe someday we can afford to buy some .38's or .45's for me, but for now we are all about enjoying our hobby together inside the camaraderie of SASS, and shooting small calibers in no way compromises our efforts or embarrasses us. We shoot to have fun and if a target doesn't fall, well too bad for us, but we still enjoy the effort. Heck, we like clean matches as well as anybody, (we have a few), but they are just the "cherry on the sundae." To spend time together in our golden years with our friends, shootin' up some steel—that is what SASS is all about.

So, to all of you who like to make fun of or complain about those of us who shoot .32's for a very specific reason, please keep your opinions to yourself. We always enjoy our friends who kid us, even about our "toy" pistols, because there is no meanness in *their* comments. For the rest of you ... lighten up ... it really is none of your business as long as SASS approves it ... as they should because it's the Cowboy Way.

(This is preciously why SASS has been very slow to levy minimum power factors, minimum velocities, or minimum bullet weights. There are many who need to shoot or simply enjoy shooting the lighter bullets and smaller calibers. The venom should be focused on folks who are shooting tiny guns with next to no powder soly IN ORDER TO WIN. In doing so they bend the sensitivities of many people. Folks like you should be encouraged to use these smaller guns and enjoy our game for as long as possible. For those few who are abusing the system, we should laugh them out of the game! ... editor in chief.) A.

FOR PETE'S SAKE, RE-GROW SOME BACKBONE!

Since I am one of one of the few individuals in this country who still communicates through the Pony Express, I put this letter in the hand of my local carrier this morning, and hopefully sometime next month you will read it. Please take the following suggestions seriously because it comes from nearly 50 years of shooting experience, including 30 years of training thousands of American (and foreign) servicemen and law enforcement officers, and 33 years of competition in most shooting disciplines.

Each month in The Cowboy Chronicle I read articles and letters agonizing over the downward slide of our shooting sport "into the abyss," as you refer to it, caused by that common human competitive tendency we euphemistically call "gamesmanship." I have experi-enced this in PPC (Police Pistol Combat) competition, and later in **IPSC** (International Practical Pistol Confederation), which spawned the inevitable IDPA (International Defensive Pistol Association), a new association and discipline that was formed to correct the downward slide of the endless gamesmanship in IPSC.

PPC competition, originally designed to promote fast and accurate shooting for law enforcement officers who carried guns for a living, was meant to allow officers to train and compete with their <u>unmodified service</u> revolvers. But because PPC tried to be "everything

VISIT THE SASS WEB SITE AT WWW.SASSNET.COM for everyone" right from the start, it allowed "minor modifications" with grips and sights in order to accommodate individual officers' physical differences. Bowing to *competitive human nature*, it quickly degenerated into custom built "rail guns" costing several thousand dollars. Oddly enough, almost all PPC matches have a side match with separate prizes allowing only *unmodified service revolvers*, called "Leg Matches." (What does that tell you?)

IPSC was originally envisioned by founder Col. Jeff Cooper to help average people (not necessarily law enforcement or military personnel) hone their defensive skills with a handgun for <u>real-world</u> defensive encounters. Again, this very quickly degenerated into the "win at any cost," tricked-out, multi-thousand dollar "space guns" encountered in the sport today. But even worse, it experienced a massive exodus of members and spawned a counter shooting organization in order to correct the degrading effect of gamesmanship! THIS IS EXACTLY WHAT IS HAPPENING TO COW-BOY ACTION SHOOTINGTM AND THE SASS! I am seeing more and more Cowboy matches in my area that <u>are not</u> SASS affiliated for just this reason. Sure, we have thousands of new members joining every year, but thousands of long time members are dropping out and/or losing interest BECAUSE THE FUN HAS GONE OUT OF IT! Why? Because (like PPC and IPSC), the serious, well-financed, "professional" shooters are the consistent winners, and new members, unless they have thousands of dollars to put into the game right up front in order to be competitive, might as well not bother.

I have also been involved with

military and NRA sponsored "High Power Rifle" competition in the past, having been raised around the largest military complex in the U.S., and I can tell you that this shooting discipline has never had the problems of gamesmanship experienced in the other shooting sports because they set forth strict guidelines and rules about what *few* modifications were allowed to firearms used in competition <u>right at the start.</u> Competitors may use only *issued* match-tuned military weapons, or the equivalent civilian legal counterpart (to strict military specifications). Yes, these weapons are relatively expensive, but the competitors know going in that there is a fairly level playing field, and that no monkey business or "pushing the envelope" will be tolerated! The sport is alive and flourishing, even though it is the oldest US shooting competition.

I have heard and read all of the complaints and most of the solutions, but if SASS is to retain its <u>original</u> purpose of <u>having fun</u> while shooting guns and "<u>playing</u> <u>Cowboy</u>," then it needs to make a decisive decision sooner, rather than later. In my never to be humble opinion, there is only one answer to keeping the fun in our sport, and putting a final period at the end of the controversial sentence ...

All minor handgun and rifle calibers (.32 Spl., .32.20, .38 S&W, .38 Spl. and .357 Mag., etc.), and 20 gauge shotguns would be restricted to women and teens under 16. Period.

Men (over 16) must compete with major calibers (.44 Spl., .44-40, .44 Mag., .45 Colt, etc.), and 12 gauge shotguns. Period.

All loads will be factory (or equivalent reloads) of a specified minimum velocity and/or power factor to be determined by the Governors. Period.

I think the current proposed restrictions on slide action shotguns vs. double barreled shotguns will suffice.

I do not submit to the argument that any presently allowable caliber is acceptable because "they were actually used in the Old West." .22s were used quite a bit in the Old West, too, but nobody to my knowledge carried them for use in gunfights. The founding romance and nostalgia of SASS/Cowboy Action ShootingTM was the use of "real" Cowboy six-guns of .44 and .45 caliber, "real" rifles of the same or similar caliber, and "real" 12 gauge coach guns like our heroes and forefathers. For Pete's sake, re-grow some backbone! (The minor calibers will be SASS's concession to the fairer gender and youngsters.)

As for all the money people may already have invested or expended in their current equipment ... the men who have minor caliber firearms can sell them to women competitors, trade them for guns of major caliber, or relegate them to weekend plinking or their gun safe, whichever they prefer. It has been my extensive experience the romantic notion the "average" Cowboy Action Shooter coming into the sport with a relatively small budget for his guns and equipment is horse manure. Face the fact the vast majority now in the sport, or soon to join it, already have a fair number of firearms, and would welcome the excuse and/or opportunity to buy more! And any newcomer who might actually be a first time gun buyer, well, they can jolly well buy the "right" caliber to start with; the cost is the same for minor or major. El Cascabel, SASS #22718

The basic process of applying for scholarships will remain the same. Applicants will need to submit a complete package. Scholarship application packages will be available beginning November 1st from the SASS office and must be requested in writing (email or snail mail) from Donna Oakley in the SASS Office. Incomplete packages will be returned with a cover letter explaining why the package is unacceptable. Late applications will be returned as well. Applications must be received by the published due date that will be included in the packages ... not postmarked by that due date.

An anonymous committee of SASS Members has been selected to read and grade each application package. Grading criteria will be the same for each, and a standard grading rubric will be used. Committee members remain anonymous in order to avoid solicitation or harassment. Wild Bunch members and wives will not be part of the selection process and only Committee member tallies will be used to determine the recipients.

As in the past, five letters of recommendation must be included from SASS members. The letters should detail why the applicant deserves a scholarship (hard-worker, good grades), personal characteristics that would assure the applicant's positive representation of SASS (honesty, integrity), and to where the scholarship will be applied (college or university).

One modification is applicants do not have to be accepted to an institution of higher learning in order to apply for a scholarship. Granted, acceptance would be the best-case sce-*(Continued on next page)*



Now, if you can just remember them all and practice intelligently 300-500 rounds every day between now and next year's END of TRAIL, do a lot of dry firing practice, and if you have good eyesight, you can do well. (Well, with my eyesight that lets me out, even if I could find a place to practice.)

J.T. Wild and Cody Conagher were there helping out. J. T. was widening rear sights to give a quicker flash sight picture and, if needed, to correct point of aim to point of impact.

It should be noted during the first morning Roy was utilizing his multiple World Champion granddaughter, Holy Terror, the best woman shooter since Annie Oakley, by having her clean all 12 of the clan's competition guns. Every few minutes she would pop out of their fifth wheel trailer with a disassembled gun and something to spray the parts with. Then she would return inside the trailer.


We shot a lot. Bring more ammunition than you think you'll need. All of the clan was walking the line and quickly correcting errors. Even that was an exercise in efficiency. They caught mistakes and gave insightful instructions for correction.

I've also taken Tequila's school, and people have asked me, "Should I take Evil Roy's school or Tequila's?" "Yes"

Friendly Vendors

I used to sell big-ticket items and train people to sell. I still pay attention to how sales people deal with the public. Vendors have only a short time to get the attention of the customers. Some sit silently behind the counter. Some talk among themselves, ignoring the customer. Some grunt. A few, however, have always been friendly and cordial. The people at Brownell's were good examples of how to do it. They were cheerful and greeted me every time I went in. Vendors, next year drop in the Brownell's booth, see how it's done, then go and do likewise.

If you've spent all the money to be at END of TRAIL as a vendor in (Continued on next page)

order to lose money, please ignore my advice.

Cowboy Cartridge

The Hodgdon tent was always friendly, too. Birdshot let it slip that a milder version of Triple 7 will be out by next year specifically for Cowboy Action ShootingTM. It will be called Cowboy Cartridge. This is good news. 777 is good stuff, but hotter than most Cowboy Action ShootingTM shooters want. We are, after all, looking for low recoil loads that smoke as much or more as 15 gr. of Goex Cowboy.

Texas Brush Popper

Both Evil Roy and Coyote Cap were high on the new Cimarron Texas Brush Popper. Cap bought one. It's a '73 with a short halfround, half-octagon barrel. Roy thinks it might be the ideal '73 for competition.

Speaking of '73s

I have two '73s. One has a rifle buttstock. The other has a carbine buttstock. The carbine stock goes on the gun I'm shooting in the match. Do 300 single shots from port arms with the rifle buttstock. You'll understand. Holy Terror just had her rifle buttstock cut straight and covered it with a butt pad. That works, too. I just spent four days at the Cody Firearms Museum and found some examples of '73 rifles with carbine buttstocks, so it's historically accurate.

Smoke Wagon

Spur Roberts stopped me to tell me about a new pistol from Taylor's, the Smoke Wagon. Like the Evil Roy from Cimarron, it is a tuned SAA with a wide front sight and wide rear sight, thin, checkered grips, and vulnerable springs replaced with ones a lot less likely to break. No signature on the side, though. Cody Conagher is doing the action jobs. I went to the Taylor's booth and tried one. It felt ready for a match. Nearly all Single Action Army clones have front sights that are too skinny, some tapered, and too narrow rear sight notch. Most SASS shooters are near senior age category, and the eyes went ten years ago, so easy to see front sights are a BIG DEAL.

Dillon

The Dillon people are always friendly and helpful. For some reason if you lay your SL900 in the back of your SUV for a couple of weeks, then mount it in a trailer and drive 900 miles, it gets out of adjustment. I discovered this while reloading before END of TRAIL. I broke one of the few parts I didn't have a spare for. The Dillon people had given all of that part away that morning, so they offered to dismantle the display 900 on Sunday morning. Then I loaded ammo until I ran out of hulls with no problems.

Soiled Doves

Judging the Soiled Dove contest sounded like fun until I realized, sitting there with Rattler John and Billy Dixon, that I was about to make at least 7 of the 10 contestants angry, and they were all women who can shoot. For most of my life I've preferred to avoid angering women, especially ones who can shoot.

I'm of the opinion, despite the proliferation of awards, that there should be a Best Madam award at the Soiled Dove contest. Some of those ladies looked as if they had just stepped out of a Parlor House in Denver in 1892. Had they been in the Best Dressed Costume contest in their madam personas, with those costumes, I would have given them high authenticity and presentation points if I were judging.

T-Bone Dooley and professional stand up comedian Ringo Fire did a great job emceeing the program, so good that many of the ladies were playing to them. I did think to myself, "You know, we're the ones with pencils, not them."

It should be noted that each judge, individually, came up with the same first, second, and third place winner, in the same order. So, ladies, you'll have to shoot all three of us.

Costume Contest Some suggestions for contestants at costume contests.

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1. Leave your wristwatch in your room. Take off your modern glasses with designer frames.

2. SPEAK UP. Two contestants used the microphone that was offered, and a few spoke up. Part of the reason for the contest is to entertain. Having someone describe his or her costume in a whisper that goes unheard in the din of the Belle Union isn't entertaining. For that matter, I've been a judge and couldn't hear some contestants.

3. You can't win if you don't enter. I see championship quality costumes in the audience every year.

Knockdowns

One person who didn't have a problem knocking them down was Arizona Tom who had a powder measure that must've gladdened the hearts of Goex stockholders, 40 gr. in the pistol, full cartridges in the rifle, 70 gr. in the shotgun. The pistols spit three feet of fire and made the earth shake. I'm pretty sure the targets fell down from the concussion, including three that weren't knockdowns!

Knockdowns and the smoke rule made me switch from my former ammunition supplier, The Wimpy Loadz Ammunition Co. Inc. "If it bounces off the target, it's a wimpy load." Now I use ammunition custom loaded by the Adequate Loadz Ammunition Co., Inc. "If it smokes enough, it's adequate."

I did actually have to HIT the targets to knock them down, though. International Posse

Along with Arizona Tom, I was on Tex's posse, which is always a hoot. This year it was truly international. We had Italians, Australians, and Texans.





"Okay ... now ... what's for dinner?"


I sighed and put my shotgun away, and headed back up stairs. *A*















16 Oct 1851 William "Wild Bill" Preston is born in Austin County, Texas.

- 28 Oct 1852 Fort Chadbourne is established in western Texas (near modern Bronte) to protect settlers and the Butterfield Stage from Comanche.
- 2 Oct 1853 During the Walker War in southern Utah, several Ute seek refuge in the local fort. Instead of being protected, the Indians are killed by settlers.
- 8 Oct 1853 William Walker and forty-five others set sail from California for Guyamas, Sonora, on the Mexican mainland in the Gulf of California, ostensibly to stop Apaches from raiding against Southern California settlers.
- 22 Oct 1853 US Minister James Gadsden, in Mexico City, receives instructions to negotiate the purchase of a thin strip of land extending south of the Gila River, west to the 37th parallel boundary of California, and east to the Rio Grande border of Texas.
- 25 Oct 1853 Captain John W. Gunnison and his party of eight surveyors are attacked and killed by Paiute Indians led by Moshoquop, in the Sevier River Valley, Utah Territory. The Pacific Railroad party was surveying possible sites along the 38th parallel for the transcontinental railroad. Mormons were suspected in provoking and leading the attack, and the US Government refused to believe Mormons had nothing to do with it; yet, no connection could be proved. Investigations indicated Indians sought revenge for the murder of one of their own the previous month. However, tensions will erupt into the Mormon War.
- 29 Oct 1853 Bob Younger, future train and bank robber, is born at Lee's Summit, Missouri, the thirteenth of fourteen children.
- 3 Oct 1854 Major Granville Owen Haller marches to avenge the death of Indian agent, A J. Bolon, encountering the Yakama on October 5th.
- 5 Oct 1854 Troops under Major Haller battle the Yakama near modern Yakima, Washington.
- 25 Oct 1854 The doomed British Light Brigade makes their charge into the Valley of Death. It is from this Crimean Battle Lord Tennyson wrote: "Theirs not to reason why, / Theirs but to do and die."
- 1 Oct 1855 John B. Whitfield is re-elected as Congressional delegate from Kansas by the pro-slavery legislature.
- 8 Oct 1855 James Lupton leads whites against friendly Rogue River Indians in California, killing eight men and fifteen women and children. Survivors flee to Fort Lane in SW Oregon for safety.
- 9 Oct 1855 Tecumton (Elk Killer) and other Rogue River Indians retaliate for the previous day's attack. They destroy farms near Evan's Ferry and kill eighteen people at Jewett's Ferry, Evan's Ferry, and Wagoner's Ranch. The whites call this the Wagoner Massacre.
- 9 Oct 1855 Ex-governor of Kansas Reeder is elected Congressional delegate by the Free State men. Tensions are building and armed conflict will soon become inevitable.

Joe Fasthorse Harrill, SASS #48769



ASHAKIE was one of the few Indian Chiefs who never challenged white settlers. When homesteaders moved into Shoshone tribal lands, Washakie decreed they were not to be harassed by Shoshone warriors. In 1868, the U.S. Government showed its gratitude. Wyoming's Wind River region was reserved for Washakie's Shoshone tribe. *A*.

- 23 Oct 1855 The Free State Party of Kansas holds a constitutional convention and produces a document prohibiting slavery in the territory.
- 5 Oct 1857 Elections in the Kansas Territory result in thousands of fraudulent votes cast by pro-slavery supporters. With these votes thrown out, the Free State Party wins a majority in both houses of the legislature.
- Oct 1858 Teenager Ben Thompson shoots teenager Joe Smith in the back with a shotgun after a quarrel. Ben is fined one hundred dollars; Austin, Texas.
- 1 Oct 1858 As part of the Wichita expedition, Colonel Albert Sidney, four companies from the Second Cavalry, 135 Indian scouts, and Texas Rangers – 350 men total – fight Buffalo Hump's 500 Comanche at Rush Springs, south central Oklahoma. Another source indicates the army was led by Captain Earl Van Dorn. Fifty-six Indians and five soldiers are killed. All 120 Comanche lodges are burned.
- 2 Oct 1858 Yakama Chief Owhi attempts to escape from Fort Dalles after being held prisoner since September 23rd. He is shot and killed.
- 10 Oct 1858 The Butterfield Stage arrives in San Francisco.
- 17 Oct 1858 Zuni warriors rescue twenty-five soldiers being attacked by approximately 300 Navajos near Fort Defiance on the Arizona-New Mexico border.
- 24 Oct 1858 Lieutenant Howland and soldiers from Fort Deliverance capture Navajo Chief Terribio and twenty other Navajos.
- 27 Oct 1858 Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. is born in New York City.
- 4 Oct 1859 An anti-slave constitution, drawn up by the Free Staters, is ratified by Kansas Territory voters 10,421 to 5,530.
- 22 Oct 1859 A camp on Pawnee Fork that will become Fort Larned is established in Kansas. This military base is built to protect travelers on the Santa Fe Trail from hostile Indians.
- 16 Oct 1859 Abolitionist John Brown leads twenty-one men and seizes the U.S. Armory at Harpers Ferry, Virginia, becoming Brown's most famous deed. During the raid, they kill seven people (including a free black) and injure ten or more. Brown intended to arm slaves with weapons from the arsenal, but the attack fails.
- 18 Oct 1859 U.S. Marines, led by Colonel Robert E. Lee, overpower Brown at the Federal arsenal at Harpers Ferry. Each of Brown's men is killed, flees, or was captured.





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COWBOY ACTION SHOOTING IN NEW ZEALAND Standard course of fire - Blazing Irons

For some years now, Cowboy Action Shooters in New Zealand have been shooting a standard course of fire we have affectionately named "Blazing Irons." It is a stage that can be easily set up by any Club (or shooter) on any range, and be used to compare shooters' ability, no matter where they live or shoot, very much like "El Presidente" is for Action Pistol.

The stage consists of eight rifle, ten revolver, and four shotgun rounds. All rifle and revolver targets are sixteen inches square, suspended on standard target stands. The five revolver targets are on short stands approx 24 - 36 inches high. The four rifle targets are on high stands approx 36 - 48 inches high. The four shotgun targets are large poppers or sixteen inch square knock-overs. By Sudden Lee, SASS #19234

The stage is set up with the shooting position being a standard height table (approx 30 inches high). The five revolver targets are placed in a straight line three feet apart (between centres), and exactly seven yards from the front (side the shooter stands on) edge of the table. The middle target is squarely centered in front of the middle of the table.

The four rifle targets are set exactly twenty yards from the table and are placed in a straight line, so as to be visible, one each between and above each two revolver targets. Two shotgun targets are set on each end of the revolver targets three feet apart (between centres), and in a straight line with the revolver targets.

The stage instructions are: Start with two revolvers each loaded with five rounds and holstered. The rifle loaded with eight rounds and staged on the table along with the empty and open shotgun, both with the trigger guards on the table. The shooter must also have at least four shotgun rounds on their person. The four rifle targets must be engaged twice each with the rifle, any order. The five revolver targets must be engaged twice each, any order. The four shotgun targets can be engaged any order, and must go down, any missed shotgun targets may be re-engaged.

The shooter starts standing at the table with both hands (finger tips) touching the brim of his hat (which must be worn on the shooters head, for the gamers). On the signal, the shooter can use the firearms in any order, so long as the rifle is not last (to allow accurate timer function). The revolvers must be re-hol-

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

stered once fired.


Blazing Irons is a great way of measuring a shooters progress or gauging their level of skill since the stage is always set up the same each time it is shot. We have noted Blazing Irons is a very good exercise for sharpening up transitions and is also great for improving those trigger times.

Blazing Irons is a perfect choice for a side match at major matches around the country (where consistent accurate times can be recorded), enabling shooters from all over to gauge how much work they still need to do in training. Perhaps SASS could keep a record of scores on their webpage for shooters to keep an eye on.



any new and experienced Wishooters usually have a tough time when it comes to choosing a technique for loading the shotgun. Choosing the right technique is important for your shooting strategy. There are many techniques, and there are even more reasons for choosing a technique. In this article I will give some of my reasons for choosing a loading technique.

There are five main factors you want to consider when choosing a loading technique. The factors are type of shotgun, type of belt, dominant hand, number of shells manipulated, and physical strength.

First, when choosing a type of shotgun load, you need to consider what type of shotgun you have. There are three basic types of shotguns: pumps, doubles, and 1887 lever actions. I have experience with doubles and pumps, but I don't have experience with 1887 lever actions. After you have determined what type of shotgun you want or if you already have a shotgun, then it is possible to find the right load technique for you.

Second, you want to consider

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what type of shotgun belt you have. Now it is best to have your shotgun belt made after you have decided on a load, but if you already have a shotgun belt, then you can choose a type of load based on that as well.

When it comes to belts and loading there are two determining factors. First, if the belt has single or double loops that can effect how you are going to want to load. Single loops work best for shooters who want to load only one shell at a time. If you grab two shells at once, you want a belt that has pouches instead of single loops. If you have single loops, it tends to disturb the shells when drawn because not all loops wear the same.

The second consideration when it comes to shot shell belts is that many people place rifle/pistol reloads on their belt, and depending on what hand you load with, you are going to want the rifle/pistol loads on a particular side. If you are right handed, you will probably want your rifle/pistol loads on the right, and on the left if you are left-handed. It is always better to have the belt designed around the type of load you want, but if you already have a belt, it is not the end of the world.

The third determining factor for choosing a load is which hand is your dominant hand. I always suggest loading with your dominant hand because you have better control and dexterity with that hand, but in some instances some people like to By Holy Terror, SASS #15362

load with their off hand. It is usually a personal preference whether or not you have enough dexterity to try loading with the off hand.

The fourth determining factor is the number of shells you want to manipulate. There is a wide range of number of shells from which you can choose. When deciding how many shells to grab, my preference is the fewer the better. Also, if you have small hands, it is difficult to hold a large number of shells. Many people think they have to grab lots of shells to be really fast. However, I have found the amount of time you gain by grabbing lots of shells is usually lost if you "bobble" even one shell. I have also found it is next to impossible to keep from bobbling.

The fifth factor that should determine the type of load you choose is your physical strength. There are several types of loads I would not recommend to those without strong upper body strength. For instance, over the top loading is very difficult if you don't have lots of upper body strength. If you find you have less upper body strength, then I would recommend using a load where you can support the gun farther out, like on the slide, so it is easier to hold up.

The final factor you want to consider when you choose a shotgun loading technique is time. You don't want to choose a technique that is too time consuming because the two main goals of shooting are accuracy and least time used. If your current shotgun loading technique takes a long time, you will probably want to rethink that loading technique.


Now that you have considered all of your options, you want to actually choose a loading technique.

For loading the pump shotgun, there are five common types of loading I recommend. First, there are the single loading techniques. You can load one shell at a time from either the right or left side, depending on whether you are right or left handed. The single load is the easiest to learn and can be quite fast.

The next technique with the pump is the one I currently use. It is the technique of drawing two shells, loading one while holding the second shell in your hand, then ejecting the first shell and loading the second. This load can work with the right or left hand depending on which hand is dominant.

I load right handed and I pull the trigger with my trigger finger both times. Some people like to pull the trigger on the first round with the middle finger so they can hold onto the shell easier. It is a personal preference and just depends on what you want to do.

If you decide to load holding the shells in the left hand, many people choose to draw 2, 3, or even 4 shells. I recommend grabbing a maximum of two shells because the bobble factor is less. Also, if you load holding (Continued on next page)

the shells in the left hand, it takes a somewhat extraordinary amount of strength to hold the gun up with only the right hand while you load. I would not recommend this load to those with a weak upper body.

The last popular loading technique with the pump is what I call the double load, which is loading two shells into the gun at one time; one in the receiver, and one in the tube. This load works especially well on shotgun targets that have a stationary plate that trips a flying bird where most shooters do not have time to reload between the two. The trick to this load is you want to take the gun off your shoulder and hold it under your arm while loading. It is too difficult to load while holding the shotgun on your shoulder. Also, this load really only works for right handed shooters because left handed shooters do not have enough access to the port and it becomes very awkward for them to use this technique.

If you choose a load where you are

loading more than one shell at a time, you will want to choose a belt that has a pouch that holds multiple shells.

For loading the double barrel there are two types of loading, and these initially depend on which hand you are loading with. There is either the right hand load or the left hand load. I recommend loading with your dominant hand because it is easier to manipulate the shells with your dominant hand.

I don't have any experience loading with the 1887 lever shotgun, so I cannot recommend a loading technique to choose for it.

Whatever technique you choose, make sure you practice the technique a lot. Practicing will help you perfect your loading technique and make you a better shooter whatever load you choose.

Mark Twain once referred to his Smith & Wesson .22 rimfire as carrying "a ball like a homeopathic pill." Ain't that the truth! That perspective would have held for the largest majority of the pocket pistols built in the 19th century. There were exceptions, of course. Some standard long-barreled guns were chopped to "snubbies" for undercover police

work and are often classified as pocket pistols for the simple reason they could be easily hidden.

So why were pocket pistols so popular? The small caliber pistols didn't exactly pack a wallop and were hopelessly inadequate and inaccurate over long distances. Larger caliber pocket pistols, while packing a bigger punch, also failed as a primary weapon over distance. However, even with these failings, they offered their carriers a serviceable, though specialized form of offense and defense. They were weapons of last resort and of personal defense, and they were perfectly suited for this task. Let us also not forget that, in their day, even the puniest, most ineffective pocket pistol could be a formidable weapon and would have been treated with respect by anyone who appreciated (Continued on next page)

their personal pelts. Penicillin and other antibiotics had not yet been discovered, nor had the practices of sterilizing surgical instruments and antiseptic methods been adopted. As a result, any wound that penetrated the chest or abdominal cavity – particularly the abdominal cavity – was an open invitation to infection and a painful, lingering death.

Pocket pistols were stashed away in the desks and vests of bankers and businessmen and in the pockets of countless gamblers and other rascals. They were inconspicuously carried in clothing and bags of women of decent and ill repute alike. Respectable gentlemen carried them in "civilized" cities such as Denver and San Francisco because, then as now, respectability was sometimes only skin deep and protection, inconveniently, a matter of personal responsibility.

Many US military officers carried a privately purchased pocket pistol in case capture by "hostiles" necessitated a speedy exit from life rather than a painful, drawn-out death via the horrors of torture. Women, too, were urged to "save the last shot for yourself" in similar circumstances.


And who can argue with the gamblers' credo that a loaded gun beats four aces? Or even five?

It is interesting to see the variety

of ways in which pocket pistols were carried. A good many pocket pistols were nickel plated to keep sweat from penetrating and rusting the steel components when tucked into a pocket. Many others were protected by the addition of a fitted pocket, generally a heavy, waxed canvas or leather. These specialized pockets may have been made as part of the garment or as separate entities that could be easily transferred from one garment to another. They were desirable as they not only protected the pistol from sweat and grime, but also helped to maintain the weapon in a suitable position for an easy, accessible draw.

If you look at pictures of uniformed police officers in big cities, you will often see no evidence of a gun belt or other external indications of being armed. Some police departments actually issued coats with special pockets for pistols. This made the cities look less rough and tumble when, in reality, this was often not the case.

The gambler or professional dealer would also have appreciated being heeled while giving the outward appearance of civility. Wyatt Earp (who hated holsters) was not unarmed when he dealt faro or went about the streets of Tombstone. His holsters were built into his frock coat. It is noteworthy that he used a *(Continued on page 50)*

gun belt when performing duties outside of town and while on the Vengeance Ride, but in town ... it was in his pocket. (Granted, the guns he carried in these specially built pockets were full-grown Single Actions, but that doesn't diminish the fact many smaller pistols were also carried this way.)

Gamblers carried their "stingers" in vest and frock pockets and sometimes down a boot top or even under a hat! But, they had other clever ways to pack a pistol as well. Heiser, SD Myer, and other manufacturers of gun leather made and marketed wrist holsters toward the turn of the century. The ones I've seen were made for the Remington over-andunders and were built with a spring clip (much like the spring mechanisms of skeleton rigs) on a leather armband. This was buckled around the forearm with the derringer placed in the clip, barrel pointing up the coat sleeve. A quick tug and out she'd come!

The ladies also had their own ideas of carrying a pocket pistol. Depending on reputation and (ahem) "working position," gals often concealed small pistols in upper story



"unmentionables." Another favored spot would have been under their dress tucked into a stocking garter. Sometimes the garter was enough by itself to maintain the position of a small pistol. If not, a holster was often employed. Most of these were in the form of a Slim Jim, and would have been equipped with a finial or short clip to help keep gravity from taking a hand in exposing that little bit of "feminine protection." (Sorry, just couldn't resist!)

Gals of all social classes who felt the need to pack a small bit of heat would not have hesitated to keep their little "hide-outs" in their reticules or in a convenient dress or apron pocket. In wintertime, the pistol would have been handily kept from view and at the ready in a muff.

One of the more interesting carrying cases I've seen for a pocket pistol was in the form that one might associate with a coin purse. It was made of soft leather with a carefully shaped clasp frame that, when opened, would allow the bulk of the trigger guard and cylinder to pass through easily — very weird looking, not particularly suited for a speedy draw, but very, very efficient for transporting and protecting a small pistol.


The larger pocket pistols could be and often were carried in belt holsters. You can see non-regulation holsters for these diminutive pistols in photographs. They were worn by both officers and enlisted personnel. The US Military actually issued a number of '49 Pocket Colts with holsters to officers at one point during the Civil War. Rhode Island issued Colt New Model Police pistols to some of their volunteers in 1863 as well.

Numerous civilians packed the '49, '62's and '63 in belt holsters. At the turn of the century, Eastern manufacturers were producing pocket holsters for the catalogue and hardware store trades. Many of these had flaps and were tooled with simple bead lines or with embossed "roll" patterns.

RL Wilson maintains "From the dawn of the .41 rimfire in 1860 to the end of the era over 50 years later, there were over 75 makers and over 300 variant models of cartridge derringers built in the United States." I hope you've had some fun with me in exploring the many ways in which the "little iron" of the West was packed.

The Nude Duel That Will Not Die

AUGUST 24, 1877

A wild picnic is in progress just outside the city limits of Denver, Colorado. Brothel owner Mattie Silks is among the party crowd. She is with her "kept man," Corteze Thomson, a handsome gambler.

After numerous rounds of drinking games, Mattie notices a voluptuous business rival, Katie Fulton, displaying extreme affection toward her man. Threats are made. Neither soiled dove backs down.

A duel is suggested. Both women strip to the waist. In classic dueling fashion, the two women step off the required paces, turn and fire.

In the twilight, a cry is heard, and a body falls to the ground. Everyone rushes forward through the billowing gunsmoke to see which queen of the demimonde is still standing. Both prostitutes are still on their feet. Cort, however, writhes on the ground with a bullet in his neck.

Great story, but it didn't happen. Here's the real story: A half-dozen of the "sporting crowd" are celebrating Cort's stunning win against Sam Doherty in a 125-yard foot race. By evening, Cort, Mattie, Katie, her "friend" Sam and possibly two others are on the banks of the South Platte River, drinking.


An argument ensues between Mattie and Katie. Cort steps between them and punches Katie in the face. Sam tries to protect Katie, but he is decked. Katie strikes back, yet she is kicked in the face and her nose is broken. In the melee, Cort pulls a pistol, which someone jostles loose from his grip, and it falls in the grass.

The fight breaks up, and the combatants stagger to their respective carriages. Beyond Olympic Park, a carriage draws up beside Cort's carriage. A shot is fired, and Mattie's man is grazed in the neck. Cort survives—end of story.

Who could ask for more? Loose women, a gunfight, an errant shot, a wounded bystander—except the duel never took place. The legend is traced to Forbes Parkhill's 1939 book, *The Wildest of the West*. Ironically, *The Rocky*

Mountain News, which reported it correctly in 1877, publishes the duel version, only to print a retraction when the complaints roll in.






ers in Michigan. I quizzed him about the equipment needed. When I asked him about a holster rig, his statement to me was timeless. "Are





and mark with a line. Next, undo the thread back up from the holster bottom to just about the line. Then, cut off the holster as desired at line. Retie and trim thread. Finally, open up the bottom tip of the holster that was cut off and place it over cylinder of well-oiled revolver. This helps reform the holster. Now I have stainless steel Ruger Vaqueros and this worked for me. I am not an expert and I have read articles that caution against storing pistols in holsters as this can cause corrosion. With this in mind, you may want to use something of similar shape. Last year I made two revolvers out of wood that are a tad larger than my Rugers and look almost real. These work as well as the real McCoys. A plain gunIf you already have your gun rig, this advice may help you outfit someone starting out. If it's a youngster, let them have a part in building the rig. Things that you have a hand in putting together always seem to bring more satisfaction.

beginning of the Lightning story ... COLT LIGHTNING RIFLE HISTORY

In 1883, Winchester had cornered the market on repeating rifles and carbines in "pistol" calibers such as .32 WCF (.32-40), .38 WCF (.38-40), and .44 WCF (.44-40). Marlin would not introduce its first repeating rifle in any of these calibers until 1888. Manufacturers such as Burgess, Evans, Whitney, and Kennedy had lever guns in the 1880's, but had not achieved the success and popularity of the Winchesters. It was in 1883 that

to again try their hand at the repeating rifle market.

Colt had initially entered the repeating rifle market long before Winchester firearms even existed. In 1839, Colt produced a total of 360 Patterson revolving carbines, based on the Patterson revolver design. These were used effectively in the Second and Third Seminole Wars in the late 1830's to late 1850's. During the Civil War, Colt produced 15,000 large bore, five shot, .56 caliber Model 1855 revolving rifles for the Union Army. These Colt revolving rifles were the original issue for Berdan's Sharpshooters prior to their being issued the Sharps .52 caliber breech-loaders. The Colt revolving rifles continued to be used by various units of the Union Army and state militias throughout the rest of the war.

By the early 1880s, Colt had long abandoned the manufacture of revolving rifles. Colt now shifted its rifle efforts to producing a lever action repeating rifle to compete with Winchester. In 1883 Colt introduced the Colt-Burgess lever action rifles and carbines in .44 WCF (.44-40). They sold a total of approximately 6,400 of these Colt-Burgess rifles, before discontinuing them in 1885. The primary reason Colt ceased production of the lever-action Burgess Colt rifles was a "Gentle-

men's Agreement" between Colt and Winchester. The Winchester Company representatives showed Colt representatives a prototype of a double action, large bore revolver Winchester had just designed. Winchester was ready to introduce it to compete with Colt's revolvers. If Colt agreed to drop production of the Colt Burgess rifles, Winchester would not produce the large bore revolver. Colt agreed.

Black Powder"

It was a good move on Colt's part, as this agreement was probably more beneficial to Colt than Winchester. The Colt Burgess lever action had only had modest success when introduced. Winchester was well entrenched in the repeating rifle market. Winchester also had the manufacturing capability and brand name reputation that gave them the ability to give serious competition to Colt's handguns with their new double action pistol, if they had produced it.

This gentleman's agreement, however, did not preclude Colt from producing slide or pump action rifles. I am sure Colt made the agreement with Winchester to stop producing lever action rifles, knowing they had plans for a new type of pump action rifle. It was 1883 when W.H. Elliot, C.J. Ebbets, and W.B. Franklin applied for the basic patents for Colt to make the pump action for a repeating rifle. In late



1884 or early 1885, Colt released it as the Lightning pump action rifle.

There were two basic frame sizes at first. One was a small frame .22 rim-fire. Most of the small frame .22 rim-fire Lightnings were made with 20 to 24 inch octagonal barrels. The other size frame that was originally introduced was a medium frame that came in .32-20, .38-40, and .44-40 calibers. These middle sized framed rifles came with either round or octagonal barrels 26 inches in length, with a full length magazine tube. They also produced a 20-inch "Baby Carbine" version in the medium frame that weighed less than six pounds.

In 1888, Colt scaled up the basic Lightning medium frame to make a large size frame. Colt offered the large frame version as an "Express Rifle" in .40-60, .45-60, .45-85, and .50-95. These calibers used relatively light bullets coupled with heavy powder charges meant to give increased velocity and extended range to the rifle. The Express rifle came with 26 and 28 inch barrels.

In early 1885 Colt's new Lightning had gotten off to a rough start. Feeding and ejection were a problem with the initial production guns. The revolutionary pump action rifle had been released before all of the design flaws and production procedures were worked out. Early customers were frustrated by mechanical problems with the new Lightning. Colt was flooded with letters from retailers and customers complaining about the rifle and its inherent feeding problems. Colt quickly re-engineered the Lightning, rectifying the problems in subsequent production guns. Colt also repaired the guns already retailed at no charge to the customer. The reputation of the Lightning would improve after the improvements were implemented.

In fact, despite the troubled and slow start, the Lightning went on to become very popular, indeed. After Colt corrected the feeding problems, demand for the Lightnings increased dramatically. By 1898 more than 186,000 Colt Lightnings had been manufactured. That exceeds the number of Marlin lever action rifles produced during that same time period, making the Lightning pump second only to Winchesters in sales. The 1895 Montgomery Ward's catalog lists the "Colt's New lightning Magazine Rifles" in various calibers from .22 to .44 for \$11.80. This was exactly the same price they charged for Winchesters. Because of this popularity, most wholesalers and retailers in the West carried the Colt pump rifle on their shelves to meet demand.

There were many Lightning fans in the West. Buffalo Bill Cody and Annie Oakley sometimes used Colt Lightning pumps. Period photo-(Continued on page 64)

BOND ARMS' MULTI-TASK SNAKE SLAYER

The genre of so-called snake charmer guns has been around a long time. From what I have studied of American Old West history, the old cowboys and ranch hands really had no special firearm on their carry to dispatch snakes. They often just opted for the Colt or Schofield, or maybe a Winchester lever gun, or a Greener smoothbore to squelch the tail shake of a nasty rattler along the cattle trail or around the corral.

The New Derringer

Small double stack barreled "belly" guns were most often encountered in the gambling houses or paddlewheel river boats held next to a spare ace by sporting men. Such guns were likely used in self-offense when a card hand went bad or another cheat was discovered dealing from the bottom of the deck. They were probably not regularly seen around the stockyards or ranches as a nor-




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The Snake Slyer IV gets the job done with either .410 shotshells or .45 Long Colt pills.

mal tool of the workingman.

Today, the derringer has been relegated more or less to a plinking role or some orchestrated shooting events held at cowboy gatherings. Some may have picked them for a self-protection role. The overall popularity of the two-shooters seems to have waned somewhat over the



years, at least until Cowboy Action Shooting™ came into vogue.

All that changed when Bond Arms of Granbury, Texas came on the scene with a line of modern manufactured single-action, high quality Derringer pistols. Greg Bond and his group have come up with some really innovative designs and materials to upgrade the derringer concept to a multitask utility firearm.

Bond Arms derringer's claim to fame is the simple fact their guns have won the World Champion SASS Shooter Derringer category for eight years in a row! That alone is a pretty good reputation to build upon. Once you handle one, you will quickly see why.

The Bond Arms Derringers

Of all the many models and configurations of derringers offered by Bond Arms, I was fortunate enough to lay my hands on their newest version called the *Snake Slayer IV* (*SSIV*).

With pistol model names like Texas Defender, Cowboy Defender, and Snake Slayer, one's interest has to be piqued. I will be the first to admit, in this particular case I succumbed to their print media advertising campaign.

The ad depicts a guy out in the wilds on a fishing trip taking defensive action against the meanest, vilest looking snake one could imagine. In Texas those are rattlers no doubt, but here in Mississippi, we have a nastier model called the cottonmouth water moccasin. The ad looks to be illustrating this particular bad boy.

As a springtime turkey hunter and early fall whitetail deer scout, I envisioned this pistol the ideal backup side carry for slithering ankle biters. Besides, it looked like it would be fun to shoot, easy to tote, and convenient to place in a scouting fanny pack or ATV holster.

When I saw the first ad for the SSIV derringer, then perused their web site (<u>www.bondarms.com</u>), I was dead sold on the spot. I called my gun dealer the next day, and within a week I was palming this man-sized hunk of stainless. I have never looked back since.

Detailing the Snake Slayer IV

What immediately caught my attention on this model was the extended grip design allowing for big

meaty mitts like mine to get a firm grip on the thing. I was also attracted to the interchangeable .410/45 Colt chambering of this version. Of course, like other Bond Arms derringer models, the SSIV has a barrel set that can easily be changed out to many other calibers and a couple of different barrel lengths. It is truly a versatile pistol in this regard.

Specifications include 4.25 inch barrels, 23.5 ounce empty weight, 6.25 inches long, fixed sights, full trigger guard, swing open barrel release, and a manual cartridge slide ejector. Everything is a matte stainless finish with oversized laser engraved, polished wood grips.

Many accessories are available from the factory, especially other barrels in popular chamberings, including the .44 Special, .357 Magnum/.38 Special, .32 H&R Magnum, and .22 Long Rifle. Threeinch barrels for rimless rounds include the .45 Glock Auto, .45 ACP, 10mm, .40 S&W, and the 9mm Luger. This certainly is enough choice options for any derringer shooter.

Other add-on items include a selection of optional holsters; grip panels in various materials such as buffalo horn, stag, rosewood, or Giraffe bone; and custom made wooden display boxes. Company logo caps and coffee mugs are also available.

When I ordered my own SSIV, I also ordered the BMT leather holster. This is one beautiful piece of tanned leather and is fully lined. Later I received the BAD model holster, which is made in South Africa (Continued on next page)

for crossdraw, self-defense carry against carjackings. It, too, is a fine piece of work, especially if you like a crossdraw, which I do.

Indeed Bond Arms has the waterfront well covered when it comes to derringers.

But Does it Shoot?

The simple answer is, heck yes! I took the SSIV to the field on its first weekend of ownership to appropriately blacken its bore. Now, keep in mind these guns are short-range affairs, even though one champion shooter out there is using one at 60-

yard targets.

People forget, no doubt, these are marketed as snake killer guns or up close and personal for defense use. Up close and personal is the operative term here.

I did my initial shooting round at 10 feet on paper target copies of snakes and a well-known reptilian figure known as the Geico Gecko. For these, I first used .410 shells in both barrels with Remington shotshells in No. 6 shot. Even at this distance with the 4.25 inch barrel, the concentration of shot holes proved a steady shooter could easily dispatch a vermin in quick order.

Ditto the same reaction with using .45 Colt lead loads of 250 grains in a Winchester Cowboy load. I discovered, curiously to my amazement, the .45 Colt loads were easier to control than the .410 shotgun shells, at least on this first trial. Certainly in terms of a small gun for taking out a snake or other close in varmints, the shotshell is the way to go with adequate shot density for better target coverage. Shooting this gun with .45 Colt loads in a selfdefense mode at close range would be one tough ticket to punch.

Greg Bond highly recommends reading the owner's manual to learn exactly how to shoot these guns. In particular, he points out to make sure the web of the shooting hand should not in any way come in contact with the cocked hammer, as this will impact the feel of the trigger pull. This is not really an issue unless the shooter is used to snuggling the shooting hand up tight into the grip. Shooters should heed this advice though.

Bond Arms suggests two shotshell types that have proven to shoot well in their guns. These include the Winchester .410 load of 3-inch, 000 buck shot, which is loaded with five buck shot pellets. The other load is the CCI .45 Colt Shotshells with the plastic capsules holding 1/3 ounce of No. 9 shot. If you find difficulty in getting a good saturation on target, then try these specific loads.



The Snake Slayer IV retails for around \$485, but always try to work a deal. That's why they call them gun *dealers*. Extra barrels sell from \$139 to \$159. Grips run from \$40 up to \$250 for exotics. Holsters are priced from \$21.95 to \$95 for a shoulder rig.

If you want a near perfect small,

lightweight, two-shot tool for carry in the wilds against snakes and such, or in urban environs for other types of creepy slime-ball things, this is the gun you want. As a Cowboy Action Shooter, too, the Bond Arms Derringers are bar none the best for western action shooting. I highly recommend them! **1**.

graphs of cowboys and lawmen with Colt Lightnings are plentiful. A pard of mine that worked with me at Riverway Ranch Camp in the Kings Canyon area had a Lightning in .38-40 that belonged to his grandmother. She carried it in a saddle scabbard when riding out of the California mountains to school in the early years of the Twentieth Century. Those were rough times in that remote area. Not that many years before, the Daltons had left that area to head back east to Coffeyville, Kansas in 1892 to their appointment with history.

The San Francisco Police Department favored the Colt Lightning. They bought a large number of the Lightnings in .44-40. Some of the nicest remaining specimens of Colt Lightnings found are these SFPD guns. In 1999, I was at a Beretta Armorer's School at the SFPD firearms range. While I was there, I saw numerous near mint .44-40 Lightnings still in racks in the SFPD



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Armory. I was more interested in the beautiful Colt pump rifles in the next room than I was in the department's Beretta Model 92's I was supposed to be working on.

The Lightning always had a reputation for speed. According to Garavaglia & Workman in their book "Guns of the American West 1866-1894," a professional exhibition shooter named George Sickles wrote in 1889:

"I do shooting at glass balls and marbles. I understand that a person can do more rapid shooting with your Carbine Improved [after production problems were solved] than I can with a Winchester..."

Colt eventually discontinued actual production of the Lightning rifles in 1898, though they were still cataloged and sold until 1902. Dealers and hardware stores would still have some "new, old stock" Lightnings on their shelves for several more years. Throughout production, .44-40 was the most popular caliber in the medium frame rifle. Second was .38-40, and third in popularity was the .32-20

In recent years, several domestic companies have produced replicas of the Colt Lightning pump rifle in response to the demands of Cowboy Action Shooters. A feature that is shared by all of the current domestic efforts is a very high price tag, retailing for \$1,200 to \$1,600. Some efforts have been more successful than others. Some work better than others. There are many reports they share the same feeding and reliability problems the originals had, as they are simply reverse engineered from the original design. I do not, however, have any personal knowledge or experience in this area. Many people, myself included, are reluctant to part with that much cash for a gun that may have to be worked on after you buy it to make it reliable!

The search for an accurate, reliable pump action rifle began with the introduction of the original Colt Lightning rifle late in 1884. Immediately Colt's revolutionary, exceptionally fast shooting Lightning was very popular. During its production, it was second only to Winchester in numbers produced. These original Colt Lightning pump rifles are not that hard to find nowadays, though after 120 years, they tend to be well worn and have reliability issues. One hundred-twenty years ago, steel was not the same quality it is now. You will almost cer-(Continued on next page)

tainly have to send any original Lightning to someone like "Elrod" who specializes in Lightnings, or an antique gunsmith like David Chicoine to get the bugs worked out.


Original Lightnings, in any condition, are not cheap. Add to them the cost of having them re-worked, and it becomes a very expensive proposition to have a Colt Lightning "shooter" you can depend on. Most people I know with original Lightning "shooters" have over \$2,500 to \$3,000 tied up into them. These factors have created a sizable market for a reproduction Lightning.

Over the years, several domestic companies have introduced limited amounts of Lightning replicas with mixed results. Some work better than others, some not at all. I'm not going to name names, however, since some folks are very sensitive. I also prefer not to subject myself to the character assassination I have seen on the SASS Wire when the truth is spoken! An old Arab proverb says "A man that tells the truth must have a fast horse, and keep one foot in the stirrup!"

Then, in 2005, the Brazilian firm of Taurus started producing a Lightning clone under the model name of "Thunderbolt." Pre-production and early production samples of the Taurus were very promising. I tested two in late 2005, and they both functioned flawlessly. I thought the answer had arrived. Beginning shortly after the Thunderbolt's introduction, however, there began to be some quality control and production problems. There have also been numerous customer service issues. Now in 2007, Taurus has initiated an extreme price increase to the US wholesalers. All of these factors have combined to make the Taurus version scarce and far more expensive than when initially released. They have also left some gun writers (myself included) with egg on their faces.

Then came EMF and Pedersoli with their Colt Lightning rifle replica! *To be continued next month:* **1**.



STUD BUSTER, SASS #7571 JOINS ETERNAL POSSE







C. S. Fly, SASS #5078, and Claudia Feather, SASS #2816 Wild West Mercantile




I'm proud to boast of being the first lady to compete in Mounted Shooting. I definitely made my mark at Winter Range 1993!

Wes Terner, SASS #36



Wes Terner, SASS #36, also known as "James Butler Hickok" from '87 to '97, shot his first cowboy match in 1979 with Diamond Jim Chisholm, SASS #27. He loved the Old West shooting and was hooked.

At END of TRAIL #1 he, along with Grey Fox, SASS #223, were the only ones in authentic 1870/80's period costumes. Wes won the costume contest as "Doc," and received the award from Red River Outfitters owned by Rawhide Rawlings, SASS #834. He continued to attend END of TRAIL, wherein he would introduce new personas each year. Two of the more memorable were: "The Cisco Kid" -1989 Silver Screen Award, and "Clint Tribute" (Josey Wales, The Preacher, and The Man with No Name) - 1991 Working Costume Award. Wes has won innumerable awards at major SASS events for his costuming and has continually helped other SASS members create their special outfits.

In 1984 he joined the Wild Bunch and succeeded in getting major recognition for SASS costume contests, especially for those at END of TRAIL.

During this period he also worked on SASS formalization, and took badge #36—his alias's gun caliber. Wes was an early proponent of blackpowder and won the category at END of TRAIL '84. He also brought the first western re-enactor's to END of TRAIL and produced/directed a formal recreation of the OK Corral gunfight for the 10th anniversary.

In 1987, Wes retired from the Wild Bunch, due to forced retirement from law enforcement, and moved to northern California where he recuperated from sustained injuries. During this time he helped establish two new SASS shooting clubs and major shoots, The High Sierra shoot at Railroad Flat, and the Yolo Sportsman's Club, which became the Plainfield Raid. In 1990, he was recognized with the SASS Top Hand award.

In 1991, Wes moved his family to Idaho, and joined the Cowboy Action club in the area, helping it grow and achieve SASS affiliation. He was also instrumental in getting the first SASS Northwest Regional established, which was dedicated to helping local children's charities.

Wes and his family have been active as a SASS traveling booth to gun shows and other shoots all over the Northwest and as far afield as the Gulf of Mexico, and have been sponsors of END of TRAIL continually for 26 years.

Wild Shot, SASS #51



Wild Shot has been continuously involved with SASS and Cowboy Action ShootingTM since the early eighties. Starting with West End Gun Club in Lytle Creek, California, where along with his wife, Mrs. Slick Shot, and match director, Lucky Smucky, he was involved with match and range operations for over 10 years. As matches became larger, he recognized a need for an efficient scoring system. With valuable input from Mrs. Slick Shot, along with Alamo Al, he co-wrote the first scoring program specifically for Cowboy Action Shooting[™].

For many years he and his wife traveled throughout California and the west, helping others set up and organize the administration and scoring of monthly and annual matches.

He designed the first computer network and wrote the first data base program for SASS, moving membership records from a paper ledger to a computerized system. He continues to coordinate programs for the operation of SASS Headquarters as SASS Administrator.

In 1997 he became the first END

of TRAIL coordinator, relieving the Wild Bunch of many of the mundane operational details. The following year, the job of Vendor Liaison was added to his responsibilities, as well as overseeing scoring.

Wild Shot has represented SASS as a member of The World Forum at the United Nations, traveled to New Zealand to conduct Range Officer Training, coordinated SASS' participation of the first US Pan Pacific Games, and is co-producer of the annual SASS Convention. He has worked closely with the NRA in Sacramento and Washington.

Today, as a Platinum Founders Club member and SASS Administrator, he continues to be actively involved in all aspects of SASS and Cowboy Action ShootingTM.

William Bruce, SASS #5



William Bruce, SASS #5, influenced the organization of the Single Action Shooting Society and its early growth. In 1987 he became the first Wild Bunch member not from California. The SASS Badge numbering system and The Cowboy Chronicle were William's concept as he incorporated successful ideas from other competitive sports in which he had been active.

William Bruce began a retail and mail order company in 1988 called Old West Outfitters, selling the styles of the 1880's. His idea was to mainstream the old styles by having them manufactured by modern clothing factories to high quality standards. This concept really took flight when Allen Wah of Gruenwald Marx and Jim met and combined their efforts. The result was the beginning of the popular brand called Wah-maker. He sold out of Old West Outfitters in 1992. Many top magazines, newspapers, television, and radio stories about this old time style featured Willliam Bruce and Wah-maker clothing.

William Bruce's tireless work for the sport and creative nature lead him to initiate the largest shoot ever held outside of California. Beginning in 1992 in Phoenix, Arizona, this shoot is called Winter Range, the SASS National Championship. His also invented the sport of Cowboy MOUNTED Shooting and introduced it to the public at this first Winter Range. He started the Railhead Cowboy Action Shooting[™] match and the Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association (CMSA).

Numerous awards show Jim's dedication to the history and love of the West and his major influence on SASS:

- 15 World and National Overall Mounted Shooting Championships in SASS and CMSA
- Railhead's Top Vaquero award
- Winter Range's Founders Award
 - END of TRAIL's coveted Top
 Hand Award

William Bruce also won many major SASS Cowboy Action ShootingTM events in his years of competition. His best finish at END of TRAIL was a 3rd place overall. His talents are also well known as an announcer, cowboy poet, chuck wagon cook, and rancher.

William Bruce is Jim Rodger's alias. This was his great-grandfather's name who pushed cattle up the Goodnight-Loving Trail in the 1870s. Jim has been an avid hunter, fisherman, and outdoorsman during his life in Arizona. He continues to work tirelessly to bring horse and shooting sports to more people around the world.

The lush green forests of northeastern Pennsylvania's Endless Mountains were a welcome sight after the dull, dreary brown of winter. Sullivan County is an area of small valleys divided by mountains and streams. The landscape is much like that of Switzerland, and the

local inhabitants are friendly, helpful, and willing to accommodate anyone who might query them for information. Unlike the Rockies, these mountains are much older, geologically speaking, so the harsh edges have been worn round over time. The ground consists of a hard purple clav rock. the remnants of an ancient prehistoric bog the local inhabitants use as a base for the macadam roads, and after time, the clay leaches through the macadam giving the roads a purple hue. You can feel the age of the hills and ravines as you drive up and down the land. Visions of Native Americans traveling on foot through the passes and early colonial settlers are conjured up in your mind as you pass the old farmhouses, fields, dirt roads, and trails. At one time, this area had a huge lumber industry, so all the old growth forest was cut down long ago, and in its stead, young trees grow, allowing light to come through the canopy of their tops creating a thick underbrush, home to deer, bear, and wild turkey.

The local paper is published once a week and consists of twenty-two pages of community events and stories about how people are helping each other daily. A welcome refreshing read compared to the daily morning paper in my area that chronicles the previous night's murders, stabbings, and burglaries.

With the pull of the trailer, my truck chugged up the steep gravel incline, leaving huge dust clouds behind, to the main clubhouse and camp ground of the North Mountain Sportsmen Association, home of El Posse Grande, where the Single Action Shooting Society's Pennsylvania State Shoot has been held these past four years, always on Memorial Day weekend. Always looking forward to meeting old friends and new, I wasn't disappointed when my old pal, Bear Lee Tallable, SASS #23670, pulled up in his trailer and parked it close to where I was making my camp. Bear is from New Hampshire, so I only get to see him if he's at a shoot I'm attending. He always has a great story to tell, and one of these days I'm gonna corral him into my camp

and have him spill all his anecdotes and childhood tales on the ground so I can clean them up and take 'em with me.

I set my tent up next to Mustang Megs, SASS #60070, and Timberland Renegade, SASS #58071. Their company is always a pleasure, and true to their good nature, they invited me over to their trailer for marinated venison at suppertime.

Since I had arrived two days early, I lent a hand to the match organizers and volunteers and helped where I could.

"Hey, shorty!" Barley Pop Bill, SASS #53019, called. "Could you give us a hand setting up some of these canopies?"

Okay, so I'm not the tallest person in the world, but "shorty," now that just wasn't nice, but I had to laugh knowing Bill said it with no animosity, so none was taken. We had the canopies up in no time, and I spent the next few hours checking out the range, taking pictures, and imagining what the scenarios would be. At one shooting stage, there was what appeared to be long johns hung on a clothesline, but at closer inspection I found the underwear was made of steel and the idea was to be able to shoot through the "trap door" of the skivvies and hit the target behind it. I could only guess how the story that accompanied that particular stage would go, and later I would find out it had something to do with Ah Chu's washtub and a box of starch!

The shooting club here has a dedicated Cowboy Action ShootingTM range. Nobody but Cowboy Action Shooters are allowed on the ground, and so, in my mind, it's consecrated land. With this weekend being May 26th the 100th anniversary of the birthday of our beloved John Wayne, I knew in spirit he was certainly here looking over the Cowboys and Cowgirls that were going to spend the next three days reciting words from his movies, as well as other great western shows, and as we sit around the campfire after each day's events, we'll call each other "pilgrim" and swap stories about the movies and television shows we like the best, and educate those who will listen on the finer points of the cattle drive or the "truth" about Cowboy towns like Dodge and Abilene.

Summer came early this year, and by the time Friday's side matches started, the temperature was (Continued on next page)

already on the rise, as was the humidity. To have thick, green forest, you must have water, and Pennsylvania has lots of that element. Not only is the state full of river valleys, the air is filled with the wet stuff, as well as the ground, and there are times when you don't even need a cup to get a drink; just take a good long draw of air into your lungs, and you've had a pint of water just by breathing! High temperatures along with the humidity make for some very sweaty, uncomfortable days slinging lead, especially for us Cowpokes who shoot in the Classic Cowboy category where you have to wear a *real* Cowboy hat and not one of those grassy yellow things. At one time I thought I had a mouse inside my hat until I removed it only to find

a puddle of perspiration that had been running around on the inside of my Jacksonbuilt.

People were rolling in from all over the country from states as far away as Michigan and North Carolina, and this year we had a troop of shooters from Canada ... yes, I said Canada. Our neighbors up in the north country got wind of what a great shoot the people at North Mountain put on, and they had to make their way down to see what all the gossip was about. Unlike the cold to the north, these people were warm and friendly. I asked Two Feathers, SASS #70784, of Barrie, Ontario about her trip and what kind of protocol she and the other four Canadians had to go through to get themselves and their guns out of Canada and into the United States.

"See this?" Two Feathers said as she showed me a big thick binder.

"Yeah, but why dya bring your Bible with you?" I asked.

"This isn't a Bible," Canadian Crow, SASS #39113, laughed, "that's all the paperwork we have to go through to not only have guns in Canada, but we need all this stuff to transport them as well."

I was amazed to discover in their country, it is illegal for a person to own a hand gun unless they're a member of a bonafide gun club, and then, they need a license, much like our "right to carry" license just to have the gun in their own homes! I realized just how important our Second Amendment rights are and how our forefathers had the intelligence to write that legislation right into the Constitution. What men of vision they were!

When Two Gun Ches, SASS #65620, told me about their experiences coming across the border, I suggested they should have just come over the border illegally as "undocumented workers," and that way they could have avoided all the paper work, been given a place to stay for free, food stamps, health care, and ... when they were finally found out ... amnesty! I was joking, of course, but it seems there're people in our country now who would take that suggestion seriously.


SHOOTOUT AT LEADVILLE 2007 *The Singing Cowboys*



fourth annual "Shootout at Leadville" in honor of the Singing Cowboys. Yes, all of the shooters had to sing a tune or two and make music with their six guns. Even had a few dancin' to our tunes. The big question was, "Would it rain?"





A surprise guest at the Shootout at Leadville – the Lone Ranger. Actually it was the Red Eyed Kid.

come to Leadville for some action, and action they were going to get. Chuckaroo, SASS #13080, Territorial Governor of the Damascus Wildlife Rangers, put it this way: "For a small young club on a limited budget, the Jefferson Outlaws held a three day match worthy of clubs much larger and with bigger budgets. A great team effort and truly a successful event."

A successful event it was. But the question still remained, "Would it rain?" On Friday, side matches were held, including the "All-Around Cowboy" that required the shooter to rope a steer, shoot all the guns, and use a knife. It cost \$5 to shoot this event, and the money raised went to a local charity, The Hanover Council of Churches (HCC), which sponsors a soup kitchen, homeless shelter, provides clothing, and finds housing for those in need. The match made \$130, which the Outlaws then matched to give the HCC \$260. Chilliwack Buck, SASS #57645, won that event and earned a copy of "The Singing Cowboys" by Douglas B. Green. It tells the story of all of the legendary cowboy and cowgirl singers. It did rain, but only for a few moments.

The other side matches included such things as speed bird and shotgun mania. Speed bird required the cowboy to shoot five clay birds with a pistol. Chuckaroo won that event hands down, but it was a fight to the finish with Tanner, SASS #12715, who ran out of bullets first. Next year Tanner plans to have plenty of bullets. That showdown could get ugly. Shotgun mania consisted of ten various shotgun targets scattered around the field. This event was for the diehard shotgun lovers. No weak shoulders allowed. Chilliwack Buck won that event, too. As the side matches ended, the rain passed.

Ten stages at the Shootout at Leadville required the cowboys and cowgirls to shoot from a bathtub, kiss a horse (but not this time), get booed off stage, send the out going Mayor off on the train, and blast away at some no accounts in the Midnight Star Saloon. There was plenty of action while singing the old tunes, and for some of us, we ended the day singing "Happy Trails To You." We even had a visit from the "Lone Ranger," Red Eyed Kid, SASS #37263, who brought music from many of the shows of yesteryear.

Cody Conagher, SASS #6986, and Sunshine Marcie, SASS #64900, were the winners of the match and each received a copy of "Singing in the Saddle," another great book by Douglas B. Green, chronicling the Singing Cowboys.

Saturday night the Outlaws hosted a dinner that was a big hit. There was no rain. The dinner consisted of paella, pasta marinara with chicken, stir-fried vegetables, and rice. It was spicy and hot. The fixin's were catered by the Salsa Grill, best food in town. To top it off, Martini Kate, SASS #74153, made a large sheet cake in honor of the Singing Cowboys. It was the piece de resistance that was just down right good. Dice, SASS #21400, Kate's husband, had to fight to keep some cowboys from taking Kate home because they though she would make some great bear claws. The "ham" was a hanging steel plate the cowboys freed by shooting the rope. However, if you hit the ham, it was a 10 second penalty. The winning posse was Posse 5 led by Tug Hill, SASS #15764, in 19.12 seconds and no penalty. Everyone thought it was a blast!


As the last stages were shot, the clouds started to form. It was getting dark, and we knew it would rain. Or



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He looked down at me, and I mean way down. Remember the shorty comment? Well this fellow had the right to call everybody shorty. His name was Long Tall Texan, SASS #22449, and he hailed from Indiana, Pennsylvania. He stood 6'10" in his stocking feet, so with his Cowboy boots on, this man had to be at least seven feet tall! At the buzzer, you pick up your rifle staged on a bale of hay, double tap the rifle targets, return the long gun open and empty, and then you dart up the stairs into the cab of the train and draw a pistol and engage the pistol targets out of the left side window, 1-1-2-2-1, just complicated enough to make it interesting; then, second pistol out of the right side window and repeat the sequence on those two targets. It really looked like something to see when a gunfighter was shooting out of the train windows and both guns were a-blazin! I could swear I saw that in a movie once! Watching the gunfighters shoot always amazes me, as it takes a special person to be able to have a pistol in each hand, and hit the targets. I have a hard enough time just using one gun. They sure must be ambidextrous, and if that ain't a twenty-dollar word, I don't know what is!

Hanna, the resident female dummy was ... Hold on there ladies, no offence, Hanna is made of cloth and straw so she really is a dummy! Well, she was nowhere to be seen this year, and I was sad she didn't show until Miss Behavin' Blacksmith, SASS #55151, took me in her arms and consoled me on my loss. Now there's a girl I'd like to spend a week with one night!

Six stages were shot on Saturday, and by the time of the banquet that night, people were either cussin' they had missed something, or braggin' the whole lot was going according to the stars, and the planets must have (Continued on next page)

The Match Director, Loose Gun, SASS #31182, usually has a stage that includes what he calls the Big Fred shuffle, and you shoot the targets in this order: 1-3-2-3-3. He sets that up for pistol as well as rifle, and at first you think you're going to blow it with a procedural until you say it like you're dancin' the Tango. Then it's a piece of cake. All the stages include movement, too, and that always adds to the fun.

As usual with the Cowboy banquets I've attended, if you go away hungry, it's your own darn fault, and this year was no exception. Even The Greek, SASS #34981, agreed the beef was tender and very enjoyable, and the turkey was nice and juicy. After we had taken the feedbag off, we headed back to our respective campfires and swapped stories about the day's events. We pondered over who might take Top Gun ... male and female, and cussed the gremlins that made us pull the trigger when we knew it was the wrong target even before we hit it.

As Sunday morning approached, a fine rain started just about the time my alarm went off. I listened to the pitter-patter against my tent, wishing I could sleep in, but in true Cowboy fashion, I was up and at 'em and headed to the range by six. The rain stopped as suddenly as it had started, and as it turned out, it was a dry weekend as far as the shooting competition went. Nobody had to get their shootin' irons wet, but the heat and humidity remained, and the perspiration was flowing fast as the bullets were flying. We had four stages to go, and by 1:00 PM there was nothing left but the crying.

A crowd gathered under the group of canopies by the Cowboy clubhouse, and people waited in anticipation to see who would walk home with a wood plaque and who would get "The Buckle." There's one thing about an event that has some mileage under it; people that have come back time and time again have gotten to know one another, and as I sat listening to the commotion and cackles from the crowd, I could hear nothing but good comments directed to one, and then another, from friends and well wishers, and the feeling of contentment was obvious. People like Loose Gun, SASS #31182 (Territorial Governor and Match Director), Black Hills Barb, SASS #34171, Mr. Black Hills Barb ... better known as Doc Allan Wood, SASS #34170, North Mountain Man, SASS #44796, Sodbuster Ed, SASS #11234 (one of the originals who started this whole thing here on the mountain), Beaver Run Kid, SASS #74204 (whose wife and I use the same tool to teach our boys the finer points of good behavior), Warbucks, SASS #74284, Mustang Megs, SASS #60070, Timberland Renegade, SASS #58071, Barley Pop Bill, SASS #53019, and last but not least, our good friend, Poker, SASS #27001 who moved to Cain Tuck, but still found time to put together our shooter's booklet.

There were 82 awards to be given and North Mountain Man and Loose Gun carefully stacked them in order before calling out to get everyone's attention. The crowd became dead quiet as the first category was called off and the shooters came up to the table one at a time to accept their awards. The Top Ladies award went to Sunshine Marcy, SASS #64900, who also took first place in the Ladies Modern category. Let me tell you folks, this woman is pure poetry in motion. She's smooth as silk and fast as greased lightning, and seldom misses anything she aims at.

Top Gun, Top Men's award, and first place in the Traditional category went to Biloxi Bob, SASS #22644, who not only was the fastest son-ofa-gun in town, but also did the whole thing without missing a single target! Dawn broke over Rauhauges' range and a wondrous transformation of a small group of shooters to the settlement of "Mill Creek." Shooters and Conventioneers were immediately greeted with the early morning edition of the Mill Creek Dispatch, a period style newspaper highlighting both the previous days events and a schedule of things to come. The paper reported sightings of 'The Duke' in town and the excitement generated by the celebration. As the shooters gathered, a well known John Wayne quote came to mind: "Courage is being scared to death - but saddling up anyway."

The shooters' meeting was held at 9 AM, and then the fun began! There was a good supply of visitors to the vendors' tents all day, and several events were held to entertain everyone. WE CLOSED A DOOR ... AND A HUGE WINDOW OPENED

Enderlin, North Dakota – Awesome! Amazing! Unbelievable! These are but a few of the words used to describe the new home of the Sheyenne Valley Peacekeepers near Enderlin, North Dakota.

Earlier this spring when the Peacekeepers met to gear up for the 2007 shooting season, the mood was a somber one. We had a hard decision to make. Do we continue the ongoing battle for the right to shoot at the present site, or do we give up the frustrating struggle and begin searching for a new location?

To give you a little background – In 2003 a small group gathered in the Jones' dining room to discuss the possibility of making some props so we could practice Cowboy Action ShootingTM – a sport introduced to us a couple years before in East Grand Forks, MN. The seven men and six women sitting around the table decided to each put \$50 into the pot to purchase building supplies. It wasn't long before prop construction began at Dakota Rody's cabinet shop. Doc Neilson spent countless hours cutting out and grinding targets. And several of the guys put together target stands.

As members of the local Wildlife Club near Kindred, ND, we were able to set up the props for practice and eventually hosted our first Cowboy Action match with 21 shooters attending. We became a SASS affiliated Cowboy Action group and hosted a total of three matches that summer - increasing the number attending by seven shooters each month. The range, we felt, was a perfect place for Cowboy Action. The club owned thirty acres next to the Sheyenne River, surrounded by trees and farmland. There was a newly constructed clubhouse, with kitchen, restroom, fireplace, and a meeting room large enough to seat sixty plus people. Absolutely perfect!

The shooting line was out in the open, so canopies were often set up for protection from rain or too much sun. All props, targets, stands, and any additional equipment needed to be set up and taken down before and after each match. Our monthly matches were held on Saturday By Wild River Rose SASS #41561 Sheyenne Valley Peacekeepers, President

afternoon, running five or six stages, and we finished the day with an evening meal, which was included in the registration fee. We started putting on a free New Shooter Clinic every April to introduce people to the sport and give them a chance to try it out using our guns and ammo.

In 2005 we were honored to host the first annual "Peace in the Valley"—the SASS North Dakota State Championship with 69 shooters participating. The following year "Peace in the Valley" brought 89 shooters from across the US and Canada to this small southeastern North Dakota community, and our regular matches increased to around 50 shooters each month. Sounds good right? Perfect location, increased participation, and lots of fun what more could a person or club ask for? Right!

Did I mention the battle for the right to shoot? Since purchasing the property over ten years ago, the Wildlife Club has met with ongoing opposition from some of the neighboring farmers, township board members, and anti-gun individuals with deep pockets. Not unlike many of the ranges across the nation, tens of thousands of dollars have been spent on lawyer fees and court costs to retain the right to use the property for trap shoots, youth shooting programs, including hunter safety, sighting in hunting rifles, cowboy matches, and various other shooting events. There were those who had no problem sending their children to our free hunter education classes, yet felt the need to place signs of opposition in the church yard near the club gate when we hosted our first SASS State Championship. They even went so far as to move the road signs directing people to the range, resulting in several guests traveling ten or more miles out of their way.

There were also problems within the Wildlife Club itself. Some vocal members felt if the Cowboy Action Shooters went away, their problems with the lawsuits would be over. There were also those who had no problem accepting the funds generated by the monthly matches, yet provided little or no moral support and no physical help whatsoever ... as you may recall the same problem was shared by the Little Red Hen.

To many of you, this may be a very familiar story. The thing that kept going through my mind as we struggled month after month was, "This makes no sense. It should not be this difficult to have a good time! It should not be this difficult to bring good people together to participate in the safest shooting sport you will ever see ... a wonderful sport the entire family can enjoy."

So when we met that Wednesday night, a decision had to be made. Do we continue to fight? Do we give up and the Sheyenne Valley Peacekeepers disband? Or do we come up with another plan? It was not an easy decision because, like many clubs, each member had put a lot of heart into everything we had accom-*(Continued on next page)*

plished, and the thought of giving up was not easy. We decided we had been beat down once too often and would not hold another match at the wildlife club – even if we couldn't find a new place to shoot. We still wanted to promote the sport, so the New Shooter Seminar scheduled for Saturday would be held in our garage instead of the Wildlife club clubhouse. We planned to go to the club the following evening and remove all the props, targets, and stands owned by individuals in our small group.

Then from the corner of the room, our tall quiet 'Lodgepole' softly mentioned - "We could maybe shoot on our land." Doing a double take – all ears perked up, and I remember the words, "Your land?" coming from more than one pair of lips. Lodgepole explained he owned a quarter section with an abandoned farmstead near Enderlin and said we could take a look at it to see if we'd be interested. We made a plan to meet for breakfast a week from Saturday and then go to check the place out. In the meantime, someone would check on any business related things to consider. We left the meeting with a feeling of hope and renewed excitement.

The next day our website was updated to announce all matches were canceled until further notice, and emails were forwarded to all the shooters we could think of. Emails came pouring back – "What's going on?" "How can we help?" "Good luck finding a new place – we're behind you." "Please let us know when you get up and running again," and my favorite from a South Dakota pard – "Sometimes what we first think is a real disaster ends up being a blessing – we really are a family."

The following Saturday, after a brief breakfast meeting, we drove to Lodgepole and Peggy's property. It hadn't been occupied for many, many years. Vandals had burned down the house and a few out buildings. The remaining buildings, with the exception of the small red barn, were beyond repair. The property was overgrown with trees, bushes and long grass and home to over a hundred old cars that had also been vandalized, leaving piles of scattered glass and debris. As we left our cars in the driveway and walked along the overgrown trail - we just took it all in - not saying a word. I don't know who spoke first, but it wasn't long before phrases like "This would be a great place for the berm." "The shooting line could go here." "Won't this shade be great!" "Look at all the room for campers." "We could do a long range shoot!" "We could build permanent props, so we wouldn't have to set up and take down every time we have a match." "Wouldn't this be a great place for a fire ring?"

Renewed enthusiasm – renewed

hope – renewed excitement – it felt wonderful!

The next step was to come up with a plan and put it into action. Once again, the core group -14 this time, put starter money in the pot to get things off the ground. Quackr met with the Enderlin City Council to explain who we were and what we would like to do. The Council members thought it sounded like a great plan and we would be a valuable addition to the community. We elected officers, wrote and adopted our bylaws, incorporated, and secured insurance under our own name.

On May 5, 2007 the work began and every Saturday, some Sundays, a few days off during the week and some evenings, rain or shine, were spent cutting and burning trees and brush, removing stumps, building a berm, moving old cars, taking down buildings, clearing space, moving and removing fences. We patronized the local businesses, introducing ourselves, and gained their support. Members borrowed or provided whatever equipment they could lay their hands on, and support poured in from shooting friends who were unable to physically be with us. Well over 800 man (and woman) hours were put in by the charter members and a handful of good friends so on Saturday, July 21, 2007 we would be ready to host the first monthly match at our new home range. Fiftytwo shooters helped us celebrate that memorable day.

In 13 weeks the Sheyenne Valley Peacekeepers went from "We got nothin', to lookie what we got!" I am extremely proud to be a part of this wonderful group of people who are the Sheyenne Valley Peacekeepers charter members. And from the bottom of my heart thank Lodgepole and Peggy, Calico Cara and Loyel Manning, Cousin Roy and Gall Dixie, Dakota Rody, Duckota Quackr and Sassy Cat Sue, Helena Handcart and Wyatt Hurtz, and my husband, Doc Neilson, and son, Johnny Otter, for helping build a dream come true.

Thank you also to Chance Calhoun, Buck Skunk, Amp R Sand, BB Gunner, Obsessive Annie, Austa La Vista, Samantha Burkett, Avery Dockter, Colt Lancaster, Deadly Dale, Steph Miller, and Craig Huseby for your tremendous help. To my parents, Don and Lois Schmit for running errands and coming out to check on the progress of the range with fresh baked goodies or coolers of ice water in hand. And thank you to all our shooting pards, far and wide, for your words of support and continued encouragement.
