YES, COSTUMING IS IMPORTANT...

As has been pointed out repeatedly, this is a fantasy game, and everyone has their own fantasy. Most really are out chasing "bad guys," but others are interested only in the competition. These competitors spend time practicing, honing their shooting skills, developing more efficient shooting techniques, tailoring loads for minimum recoil, and challenging themselves to find the simplest, most efficient way to shoot each stage. After all, this is a shooting sport, and low time wins. And, make no mistake; these individuals are wonders to behold. Many are "world class" competitors; the best in the world. They are a pleasure to watch, and they are vital to our game. Vendors, sponsors, and the media all bring money, product, and attention to our game, help it grow, and keep it vital. We love these shooters and couldn't get along without them. But, "just shooting" does

not define our game.

Everyone around the world instantly recognizes the American cowboy. It's a romantic, stylized, and mythical image ... and it's an image where wearing guns is not seen as a threat. It's an image where folks in many countries can enjoy their firearms in a fantasy environment with the blessings of otherwise restrictive bureaucracies. It's the thing that differentiates us from a bunch a yahoos playing with sixguns. When folks see Cowboy Action Shooters in costume, they know they are dealing with friendly, safe, considerate individuals ... and it's okay to expose their children to these modern-day cowboys with their 19th Century clothes and paraphernalia ... and of course, their six-guns!

Cowboy Action Shooting TM is a shooting sport with costuming requirements. We all live in different climates—some hot, some cold, some humid, and some dry ... and so did the cowboys. They had their work to do ... in all kinds of weather. Just because it was hot, they didn't shuck their canvas pants, chaps, and boots for Bermuda shorts and tennis shoes. If it's hot, dress lightly. If it's cold, dress warm. Dress appropriately for the weather, but play the game!

When new shooters are recruited, anything they're wearing is just fine. However, with a little positive reinforcement, they can be encouraged to quickly begin working on their "outfits." Jeans, work shirts, and a straw "cowboy" hat are not unreasonable expectations after a couple of monthly matches. Boots, moccasins, or bare feet should soon replace tennis shoes and modern work boots. Some will never get beyond these basics, but most do.

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
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Dear Fellow SASS Members:

MENTAL

All the time, we hear or read folks sayin', "Shooting is 98% Mental." Well, a lot of shootin' schools teach it, and alongside that, do a Google search and you will find trainloads of information with regards to mental preparedness.

The more mentally prepared I am, the better I perform, and for me that means being positively mentally prepared days before a shoot, during the shoot, and right down to mentally paying attention (no day dreaming) for EVERY second of performance time that each stage requires.

It has literally taken me years to figure this out. But, maybe if I share it with others, perhaps said in a different way, then just maybe someone will gain from this writing and save some of the learning curve time I consumed.

When I hear the timer operator say "ONE" these days, I have developed the mental skill required to literally run an instant replay of that stage in my mind (including shot by shot pause), and I have noticed that watching the rerun in my mind, I can see the LACK of full mental concentration on the very shot that became the miss. My sight picture disappears, meaning to me, a lack of concentration at the time of that shot.

Days before a match, your mental attitude towards the upcoming match can play a very large part in predetermining how well things start off and your overall performance. How many times have you heard and said, "Wow, I have not been shootin' well lately!" "Geese, I just went through that slump myself." I was settin' myself up fer a bad shoot doin' that, and it took me several months to git my mind back in a better pre-match state of mind. I got it back now, and I am happy."

How many times have ya heard, "Flyers? Dang, I can never hit them," and then what happens? Well, the shooter that says that, once in a Blue Moon gits lucky and hits one, instead of very seldom missin' one. Pre-encoded negative thoughts can begat just that, "nega-

When I watch the best of the best shooters these days, one thing becomes very apparent, their Mental Preparedness, their overall Mental Positive Attitude, and their TOTAL attention from the time they start the loading process at the loading table all the way to when they are done unloading for that stage. It looks like hard work to some,

but it is merely an important state of mind required to achieve maximum performance success, and they are having fun at the same time. Least ways, I do!

Okay, I can hear the comments from some of you out there right now sayin', "Yeah, but Madd Mike, I don't want to mentally work that hard." Shucks, that's fine too. We all rally to our own music. I am just trying to share information that has taken me a long time to achieve and start to understand and apply. The instant replay in my mind was long in the development stage; yet, when I achieved that ability, it really became apparent just how important a mental image before, during, and even after plays a large role in success, and this will apply to all aspects of your life, not just this wonderful SASS/Cowboy Action ShootingTM sport/hobby.

Predetermined mental attitude can play a very large part in the unforeseen as well. For example, at our Nevada State Blackpowder Championship, while I was doing a transition from rifle to shotgun though a small window opening confined by a hitching post at the same walkway, I smacked the jamb with my double barreled shotgun, hard enough that it closed on one of my fingers, resulting in a nasty cut at the cuticle. I finished the stage as if nothing happened, and when I got to the unloading table,

folks was askin' me, "Where did all the blood come from?" At that time I mentally said, "Oh golly gee wiz," er something like that, as it really did hurt. Okay, I said more than golly.

My point is NOT how tough I am. My point is I wanted to perform at my very best for that Championship match, so I was mentally prepared to NOT be adversely affected while under the clock to any type of adversity that may rear its ugly head. Yer mileage may vary.

I am often asked by others on my posse or at shoots in general, "How can I shave some time off my stages and shoot faster?" My answers usually are custom tuned to the shooter asking me the question, but more often than not, the answers center on some form of mental issue first, with facts, means, and methods being next in line.

Folks, shoot yer own game, and develop the skills required to reach the level of competition/enjoyment that you desire. Watch the best of the best, and don't be fooled by how easy they make it look. It's not all just eyesight, agility, great equipment, and practice after all. It's 98% mental before, during, and after you achieve the other skills needed to physically perform the required task to complete each stage. See ya on the range.

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
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RESPONSE TO COL. DAN'S COLUMN - EXECUTIVE ORDERS (MAY '08 COWBOY CHRONICLE)

It is unclear from Col. Dan's post where he stands on the topic of Executive Orders. George Bush has signed well over 200 of these orders, including Executive Order 13233, limiting access to the records of former U.S. Presidents. Drafted by infamous former White House counsel Alberto Gonzales, this order keeping Presidential papers secret for an indefinitely renewable period past the previous 12-year limit has been opposed by broad bipartisan support in both Houses of Congress since it was signed in 2001, though it has yet to be overturned.

Dan says we shouldn't put "executive power in the hands of anyone whose moral fiber or judgment might lead them to arbitrarily abuse it at the first opportunity." Sorry, but that's already occurred.

You may take your pick of abuses; i.e., the willful manipulation of intelligence to justify a war in Iraq; the decision to violate the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act [FISA] and wiretap American citizens; the outing of a covert CIA official and subsequent cover-up; the use of torture in violation of Common Article 3 of the Geneva Conventions, under which both Cheney and Bush could be charged and tried by any of the 194 countries that are signatories to the conventions. All of these meet the constitutional "high crimes and misdemeanors" standard for impeachment of either the President or the Vice President.

Dan says, "Such abuse could transform America overnight into a country none of us would recognize." What more are you waiting for, Dan? The President to outlaw birthday parties?

To the particulars in his article: Andrew Jackson's actions were indeed in violation of a Supreme Court decision, and are an outrage to civilized behavior. His actions were state-sponsored ethnic cleansing. He forcibly removed the Cherokee from their lands and placed them in concentration camps ("reservations"). The same was done to Japanese-American citizens in 1941, though they were repatriated to their homes from the internment camps after the cessation of hostilities.

While Lincoln expanded Presidential and Federal powers, he was constitutionally grounded in the case of insurrection or rebellion, both situations that existed during his term of office.

Dan makes the error of stating terrorists have "engage[d] in acts of war on our homeland." What the non-state sponsored terrorists did was to commit acts of terrorism, which are criminal acts prosecutable under current U.S. Code. They were not military acts.

Everything didn't change after 9-11; in fact, it was the second act of terrorism upon the World Trade Center. It was just a bigger one. Unfortunately, intelligence indicators were ignored, and many citizens died in the attacks.

By calling terrorist actions "acts of war," you legitimize their actions and make of them soldiers. Yet the 20th hijacker, Moussaoui, was tried and convicted as the cowardly criminal he was. If the action was one of war, he should have been designated a POW. It is either one or the other; it ain't both!

Taking Col. Dan's argument to its logical end, he would oppose unilateral war making abilities of a President. The wars in Iraq and Afghanistan are examples of faulty democracy in action. Aggressive U.S. actions were neither appropriate nor proportional responses to the criminal attacks against our nation.

It sounds like Col. Dan is arguing against another President like Mr. Bush, who has hundreds of executive orders under his belt. The future you fear is already here, Col. Dan, and we will hope for more discretion in the next administration and a return to the rule of lawa U.S. that is respected versus reviled among the citizens of the world.

Anderson didn't apply 21st century technology just to holsters. Completing the rig is the HondoTM Belt, which also incorporates new design elements. Bianchi used a fancy-stitch design in the Hondo Belt making it more flexible than most leather belts, and making the Hondo Belt ideal for Mounted Shooting competitions where comfort and freedom of movement are of great importance. This belt and holster design is also available for Action Shooters in a plain version with traditional woven cartridge loops and is named the ClearwaterTM.

"The Bianchi name means a lot to people who cherish and value

what SASS is and does, and we were very careful that any leather product carrying that name lives up to the reputation John established," Anderson said. "As SASS grows and more people become Old West enthusiasts, we want them to not only know why the Bianchi name is special, but also to be able to have a piece of that tradition for themselves. This community holds us to a higher standard not only because of what they've come to expect from Bianchi, but also because SASS members have a different standard—one that draws from the honest values of the Old West. This line is a return not only to Bianchi's roots, but the values of the time period we are emulating.".

the best shooting partner a cowboy could possibly have, my wife.


There was considerable teaching and practicing to accomplish before having her face the rigors of shooting in a cowboy match. It is one thing to know how to shoot the various guns we use in this game. It is an altogether different thing to be a Cowboy Action Shooter. With the distinction made between simply knowing how to shoot the guns and growing into a Cowboy Action Shooter, I decided to spend time discussing the mental side of the game with her. I am convinced if a person

obtains a squared-away grip on the mental side of cowboy, the rest of the game is down hill.

I divided our discussions into three parts: the loading table, the scenario, and the unloading table (a novel concept - how original?). We set up a folding table in the den, and with a handful of snap-caps she started the process of getting familiar with the feel of the various firearms. Probably the most difficult hurdle she had to overcome was expectations. It was not the guns or her ability. It was the other cowboy's expectations. It was a shock to her system that she had to meet the loading/unloading table monitor's expectations, not her own. explained she had to handle the various firearms in a confident and familiar manner, and in such a way the monitor expected them to be handled. I wanted her to understand the impact these two cowboys


can have on her enjoyment of the game and how much she can influence their response to her.

The loading table monitor can help you relax and assist in your mental preparedness for the upcoming stage, or he can rain all over your parade. If she acted in a confident manner and demonstrated proficiency simply in handling the firearms, the monitor would be more at ease in her presence. On the other hand, if she was careless or unsure, the mon-

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


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

he SASS Shooter's Handbook, the SASS Range Operations Basic Safety Course, and the SASS Range Officer Training Course are the rules by which we play the game of Cowboy Action ShootingTM. In the early days of SASS, the Handbook was kept small, rules were brief, and many of those rules were based on the Spirit of the Game or just doing the right thing. As years have passed and our numbers have grown, some of our

rules were judged ambiguous and clarifications become necessary. The Territorial Governors were assembled to help establish and clarify rules and nuances of the game. The Territorial Governors have done a great job over the past years, and the Summit this December will be our 10th Annual gathering.


Because of the SASS Range Operations Basic Safety Course, the SASS Range Officer Training Course, and a dedicated group of RO Instructors, the rules have been disseminated to the membership, thereby creating much more consistent penalty assessment, match design, and administration. We are all now on the same page, for the most part. The SASS Shooter's Handbook has been expanded and, to be quite frank, some of the rules have proven to be good ones and some not so good. Of course hindsight is always

"20/20." During END of TRAIL there were a few calls made by the book, but after discussion regarding the merits of the rules and the "Spirit" in which the rules were intended, it turns out some of the rules may fall into that "not so good" category after all. But, good or bad, the rules must be followed at matches just as they are written.


So, how do we fix it? Easy, we change the rules! Well, it turns out it's not as easy as *just* changing the rules. The system we have in place is designed so rules cannot *just* be changed on a whim. Our system requires the discussion of prospective rule changes at Regional and State matches in order to determine their validity or need before bringing them to the Territorial Governors Summit for a vote. This process gathers input from the membership and helps ensure we don't just make

knee-jerk reactions.

END of TRAIL brought to the forefront a couple of rules that need to be "fixed." One of these rules states you cannot pick up a dropped shell or cartridge during or after a stage. The part of this rule that creates a problem is the "after." This rule was created primarily because of the "fear of the possibility" a shooter would lose muzzle control of a long gun if they attempted such a feat. But in reality, this rule is not really necessary because we have another rule that states what happens to a shooter if they break the 170 degree safety rule or sweep another person with a firearm. So, we have created a rule based on the assumption the shooter could "possibly" break the 170 degree rule if they attempted this maneuver, and we would go ahead and award them a penalty (Continued on page 100)



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
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DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA vs. HELLER A Brief Analysis

Yes, the Heller decision is wonderful. Because such decisions from the Supreme Court of the Unites States ("SCOTUS") start with "holdings," I will limit my remarks solely to the numbered holdings and will not discuss the historical discussions, lengthy legal analysis, or dicta (side comments) found in the overall decision.

The first holding is perfectly clear, namely, the Second Amendment protects an individual's right to own a firearm; the possession of a firearm is personal, and one need not be connected to a militia to possess a firearm; and you can own that firearm for traditional, lawful purposes. The specific purpose enumerated is self defense within your home, because that is what the Heller decision specifically concerns.

A simple reading of that first hold-

ing is easy—it is the guaranteed right of Americans to own firearms for personal self defense and to keep such guns in their homes, and Americans do not need to be members of organized military bodies for this. That's it. That's all it says. It's that simple. It doesn't say what kind of firearm, it does not say any weapon, so it will take other arguments to cover edged weapons (not a problem—the Heller decision is, in many ways, a handgun decision only, but it can be expanded, arguably, to cover other kinds of weapons, and it will be, I am certain of that, and it should be). Of course, the politicians and we lawyers will complicate it, but for the first blush reading, that's that. Owning a gun is an individual right of Americans. Perfect.

The first subset of that holding is especially wonderful because it says the opening statement of the Second Amendment, "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State" is merely a preface, an introductory statement, "but does not limit or expand the scope of the second part, the operative clause, namely, "the right of the People to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed," and, most importantly, the holding repeats the earlier statement the operative clause

"connotes an individual right to keep and bear arms." It could hardly be more clear, but the next subset goes on to explain what a militia is, or was, within the meaning of the prefatory section, a citizen's militia, to wit, not an organized military but the body politic as a whole, men (people is the better term today) who can be called upon to fight with their personal arms. Nice.

The following subsets clarify the points made before and, essentially, shrug off any thought there might be another way to look at the Second Amendment, including a dismissal by way of a clarifying comparison that the two most famous cases dealing with the American right to keep and bear arms either do not apply to the concept of the individual right, or they support the concept as a whole. That eliminates a host of arguments the antigunners always made with respect to these two earlier cases, known by their short names as the Cruickshank and Miller decisions.

We now break off from subsets of the first holding to come to the second major holding, which is very clear, and will generate much controversy and litigation. It states with clarity:

"Like most rights, the Second Amendment right is not unlimited."

We have in our midst a certain group of firearms advocates known generally as absolutists. For years they have insisted, "What part of 'shall not be infringed' do vou not understand?" To which I replied consistently if "Congress shall make no law" in the First Amendment does not stop reasonable restrictions on the rights enumerated as protected therein, then the same can be said of "shall not be infringed" in the Second Amendment. It is not absolute, and reasonable restrictions on weapons (arms) can be passed.

The rest of the second holding discusses what types of restrictions might be permissible, and those discussed include firearms restrictions against felons, mentally ill persons, and laws concerning weapons prohibitions in special places like schools and government buildings—none of these are overturned by the Heller decision. By supporting the Miller decision with respect to what the SCOTUS calls "dangerous and unusual weapons," the Heller decision has affirmed the National Firearms Act of 1934 and the rules concerning machine guns, sawed off shotguns, suppressors, and explosives, among other things. 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(Continued from previous page) affirmed the Gun Control Act of 1968 Clearly, "shall not be as well. infringed" does not cover all arms.

Next, however, in what I thought was a delightfully pithy way, the SCO-TUS declares in its third holding that "the handgun ban and trigger lock requirement (as applied to self defense) violate the Second Amendment." There are three clear meanings here. The first is no jurisdiction can ban handguns outright. The next is Americans have a right to selfdefense, so no jurisdiction can cause Americans to have to lock up the very guns they depend upon for selfdefense. The third is more subtle; namely, if a jurisdiction wants to cause Americans to lock up guns NOT being used for self-defense, they can do that. Read it carefully—that's the import of adding the parenthetical about self-defense.

The rest of that section expands the SCOTUS's reasoning for what it has pronounced and then concludes by noting the District of Columbia must (I love "must", such a nice STRONG word), if Mr. Heller is not otherwise disqualified, allow him to register and license his handgun for his home. BUT

LOOK OUT!!!! That's VERY RESTRIC-TIVE as well as liberating. It supports the individual right to keep and bear arms, but it also subtly, but demonstrably, affirms all of the licensing laws in place across the country. All it does is insist the jurisdictions that have licensing laws such as the District of Columbia or, for example, New York City or Chicago, have to permit otherwise not disqualified citizens to possess home handguns under license. The decision does not disaffirm the requirement of the licenses.

In summary, the fact Americans not only have the individual right to possess arms, specifically handguns in their homes, but all arms by way of the overall decision in Heller, is no longer in controversy. That's the good part and the opening of the door to the expansion of the Second Amendment to places all of us want it to go. I say, congratulations to us, and let's keep up the good fight—our camel has got way more than its nose under the tent now; let's shove it all the way through!

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the People to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. A

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WHATEVER HAPPENED TO **COWBOY ACTION?**

I have really enjoyed SASS and what it has done for shooting enthusiasts. However, in recent matches, both local and Mule Camp the last six years, my feelings are becoming more like those expressed in John Taffin's recent article in the July 2008 issue of Guns magazine.

If categories are under study, I definitely recommend the consideration for "major calibers" (such as .38-40, .44-40, .44 Special, .44 Russian, .44 Colt, .45 Schofield, .45 Colt, and the like firing 180-grain+ bullets) and "no wimp calibers" (.38 Special and punier). Personally, I shoot no lighter bullet than 200 grains in my .45 Colts. As a spotter, some of the lighter bullets seem to barely "ping" or shake the plates, making scoring difficult.

I know there is no target too large or too close it can't be missed, however, sometimes pistol targets seem to be almost little more that two rifle barrel lengths away. I will continue to shoot what I have. I'll take my .45's "bong" over a .32's "ping" any day, even if some in my club continue to snicker at my "magnum" 725 fps loads and the "power factor" classifications remain the same.

(I, too, prefer and exclusively use fullcharged blackpowder .45 and .44-40 loads in my Cowboy Action revolvers and rifle. That's my fantasy ... the way Ithink the "old timers" did it! Unfortunately, John Taffin, you, and myself are in the minority ...

In my opinion there is no interest on the part of the Territorial Governors to institute any power factors above the puny "60" adopted at the last Convention. Or, to change the rules to require large bore, "heavy" bullets. Many of them already shoot the small caliber, "light" bullets ... and so do many of our members.

 $While \quad the \quad game \quad has \quad certainly$ changed since the beginning, I must take exception to several of John's assertions. He seems to think we started with big bores and full loads ... nothing could be further from the truth. Lightly loaded .38s have always been a major part of the game and always in the winner's circle. (Although no one thought the loads would ever drop to the ridiculous levels the Territorial Governors outlawed last year!) SASS has always had an aversion to imposing power factors (e.g., major and minor classifications). There was a misguided attempt several years ago to impose some sort of minimum velocity floor on Cowboy Action loads, but the safety excuse for the proposed rule could never be proven, so it was dropped. "Honest," mid-range loads (not magnums or pip-squeaks) are the way the game ought to be played.

The targets have nearly always been of generous size and modest distances. Cowboy Action has never been a "bullseye" game ... rather it is an "action" game. In the (mythical) Old West, all gun fights occurred "up close and personal"—I know, because I saw it in the movies! The effort has never been to make everyone successful in a competitive sense, but to recognize we're in the entertainment business. Not everyone is interested in or willing to practice to "get good," but everyone who pulls the trigger wants to hit most, if not all, their targets. If they hit their targets, they come off the line grinning, and if they're grinning, they're having fun. If they are having fun, they'll come back. And, SASS is a membership organization ... we want them to come back!

Yes, Cowboy Action has changed. Yes, I'd like to see heavier loads mandated. But, since I'm not willing anymore to spend hours and hours practicing, I've finally realized I can't win the major $matches\ anyway,\ so\ I\ might\ just\ as\ well$ shoot the kind of game that makes me happy ... and that's full-house, blackpowder loads in big-bore pistol cartridges. My advice—have fun, be safe, and shoot what turns you on! ... editor-in-chief) 🌲






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MY RESPONSE TO "STEEL"

Regarding the article "Steel" by Inspector (May '08 issue), as an historian I felt compelled to respond and perhaps offer some additional perspective, since the article seemed to relate a number of misconceptions. First they've often been referred to as "shootin' irons" over the years because early firearms were iron, not steel. Take a flintlock rifle of the 18th century for example. The only steel in the gun is the two springs in the firing mechanism called the "lock." You may have a brass trigger guard or butt plate or even precious metals, but the barrel, the remainder of the lock parts, the trigger, etc. are all iron. That had already been true for centuries. Why? Because that's all that is required. Wrought iron has terrific malleability and is surprisingly elastic, and it was readily available.

By 1775 the American colonies were ranked third in the world in iron production, following Russia and Sweden. A great deal of that iron was shipped back to England as a major raw material fueling England's industry. Appropriately made gun barrels can easily withstand the pressures produced by the blackpowder loads of the day, evidenced by the fact proof testing of the period indicated a 300% overload. Only when you move into modern "smokeless" powders and the increased pressures they create do you need the additional strength of steel. Iron was also comparatively cheap. Steel at the time was roughly three times more expensive, and again, was unnecessary for many applications.

The article refers to several items, apparently assuming they were steel, that typically were not made of steel at all. As for burning down the house to recover nails, it may be a good story to get a child's attention, but it has no basis in historic fact. Nails were made of iron, not steel, and how many were used in the construction of a house on the frontier, instead of mortise and tenon joinery? In the third quarter of the 18th century approximately one pound of eight-penny common nails was the same price as a pair of socks. Wouldn't you rather sell your house rather than burn it for the price of a pair of socks?

Let's also take a look at that poor Native American sitting around the campfire with a flint knife. Three hundred years ago if that guy is still using a flint knife, he really is poor because anyone who could afford it had been trading for metal blades for years. Quench-hardened carbon steel cutting tools have been in use since at least 1000 years BC!

How about those abandoned wagon wheel rims? They were called tyres, and yep, you guessed it, they were made of wrought iron, not steel and for all the same reasons I've already stated.

I'm afraid I also have to take exception to the statement that "we all know that steel is refined iron." All you have if you refine iron is ... refined iron. Wrought iron is refined iron. It only becomes steel when carbon is introduced to it. That's why a blacksmith can hammer and shape a piece of wrought iron without it becoming hard or brittle. It remains malleable with virtually no carbon in it.

Early methods of introducing carbon involved "cooking" the iron with various types of organic materials that caused the iron to absorb the carbon. The resulting steel could be very good, but often unpredictable in terms of uniformity of carbon content. It wasn't until the "Bessemer process" made predictably uniform carbon content on an affordably large scale. Certainly the Europeans brought steel with them, but not because it couldn't be made here. Like many things, it was cheaper to manufacture in quantity with cheap abundant labor there until sufficient labor was available here. The raw materials were here; the ability came with the Europeans. A common forge, as used by blacksmiths through the centuries, pumped air into the coal (not charcoal) fire usually with a bellows of some type, and could produce a fire of about 3000 degrees, more than sufficient for forging. welding, making steel, etc.

As far as modern steel being "vastly superior" to steels of past history, I'll bet I'd be "preaching to the choir" if I said to the majority of the men reading this that I own and have used tools, guns, blades of various types over the years that I wouldn't take a basketful of modern replacements for at half the price because the steel just isn't as good. In my opinion, new and different alloys of steel don't necessarily equate to being better. .

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

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

The Ku Klux Klan in El Paso? Yes, it did exercise some influence in the city in the 1920's. With their white sheets and hooded faces, the Klan settled in El Paso and affected the city politically, and in religious and race issues as well.

After the Civil War, six Irish Americans began the organization as a social club for ex-Confederate soldiers from the poverty-stricken town of Pulaski, Tennessee. The name may have derived from the Greek word for circle or band, kuklos. Its numbers grew rapidly as Southerners attempted to regain control of their region. Nathan Bedford Forrest, legendary Confederate cavalry officer, became the Klan's first Imperial Wizard, establishing new chapters all over the South. With over a million members by 1870, the Klan's purpose became political. The KKK believed in native white, Protestant supremacy, and aimed its invective at Blacks, Jews, Catholics, anti-Prohibitionists, and any person of liberal or radical views.

The Klan's mission, to prevent newly enfranchised black Southerners from putting Republicans in power in the Southern states, soon came to be carried out with hatred, evil, and pride. Its members, sworn to secrecy, wore white robes, pointed hoods and masks, and adopted the burning cross as their symbol. They were most active during elections, when their nighttime rides to murder, rape, beat, and warn were designed to overcome Republican majorities in their states. In 1872, Forrest left the Klan, denying responsibility for the violent turn the Klan had taken. By this time, the Klan had lost its earlier power as segregation laws took effect in the South.

In April 1868, the Klan appeared in northeast Texas, terrorizing and murdering freedmen, burning houses

and crops, and intimidating officials. By 1871, the Klan officially ceased to exist because of national laws against secret conspiracy and the refusal of the South to tolerate violence.

In 1915, William J. Simmons reorganized the national Klan at Stone Mountain, Georgia, to fight new threats, especially immigration and social ills. By 1922, Texas had as many as 150,000 Klan members, and by 1924, Texas had more Klansmen in public office than any other state.

El Paso became vulnerable to the Klan's efforts at creating conflict within the city. The impact of the Mexican Revolution and World War I were still strongly felt in El Paso during the 1920's. El Paso's experiences during the Mexican Revolution were different from those of any other city in the United States because it was the only large border city at the time. Frightened by the confusion and anti-American sentiment in Mexico, many Anglos became prejudiced against Mexicans, feeling they had no place in an American city.

After World War I, thousands of new Anglos arrived in El Paso. Many of these newcomers were natives of the racially intolerant South. So with these hostile attitudes, the border was vulnerable for the Ku Klux Klan to establish a chapter in El Paso.

In May 1921, Klan recruiter C. C. Kellogg set up office in the Sheldon Hotel. By late summer 1921, the KKK had established the Frontier Klan No. 100 in El Paso. Besides racial problems, issues concerning law and order and social morality provided the Klan the opportunity to recruit law-abiding and respectable citizens, including attorneys, physicians, bankers, and businessmen.

The Klan also controlled members of the Herald Post's editorial staff, allowing for the society to print its beliefs in the newspaper. Members were able to publish one editorial on their goals in El Paso and how they would make El Paso flourish.

In public statements, the Klan claimed it had a purpose: "to make El Paso a better and cleaner city, a better place in which to live and rear our children." The Klan claimed to be against crime of all types. The social ills of El Paso, which included prostitution and gambling, were the first that the Klan promised to eliminate. Other crimes the Klan vowed to attack were home burglaries and car thefts. Juveniles drinking across the border and returning late at night were other targets. Klan members would record names or take pictures to show the parents of the young people.

Their concerns weren't limited to social ills. The Klan was also concerned with the political issues in the community. In order to arouse enthusiasm in one school board election, the Klan planned to parade through town dressed in sheets and hooded masks. They had to be threatened with jail before they would cancel their plans.

The Klan's main reason for the entry into the school board election was their belief the Roman Catholic Church was trying to gain control of the public schools. Samuel J. Isaacks, a well-known attorney, clearly asserted his position on Catholics to his listeners. He said, "This is a country of religious tolerance, but not a country where any sect can come in and run our educational system.

In April, the ticket of Klan members consisting of Charles S. Ward, Hal Gambrell, and Isaacks beat W. H. Burges, U. S. Stewart, and J. B. Brady, gaining control of the school board. Many residents and other anti-Klan organizations stunned to see the final results of the election. This election marked the high point of Klan power in El Paso politics and was the first indication that the Frontier Klan had the popular vote.

Since they were free to make changes within the school system, Isaacks suggested changing the names of the schools to commemorate Texas heroes. Highland Park became Fanin, El Paso High became Sam Houston High School (later changed back due to strong protest), Manhattan Heights became Crockett, and Grandview became Rusk. The schools that were under construction were named Austin and Bowie and Burleson Elementary.

The school board held secret meetings to vote out two school principals and other staff members who were Catholic. Even a librarian, Edith Cony, was dismissed because she had protested the removal of a Catholic encyclopedia from the library. Many people started to grow concerned about the Klan taking over. Nevertheless, in March 1922, the Klan initiated 300 men near Kern Place. After the initiation. Klansmen drove up Scenic Drive on Mount Franklin, where they burned a wooden cross. About 3,500 El Pasoans joined the Klan in the few years of its existence here.

Lawyer William H. Fryer, a personal enemy of Samuel J. Isaacks, made a major assault on the Klan. At the Odd Fellows Hall, the Catholic Fryer pointed his finger at the hooded audience and said, "I know who you are, and one day you will be unmasked before the public." In October 1922, Fryer filed an injunction to remove four candidates from ballots in the upcoming election who had sworn allegiance to the Invisible Empire of the Ku Klux Klan. The Klan's membership roster and other materials were made public, exposing lists of outstanding citizens who had taken the Klan's secret oath. Fryer accused the Klan of believing their oath took precedence over the Constitution and the United States. Later, Fryer dropped the action since his purpose—to expose membership—had been accomplished.

Other anti-Klan residents followed members to secret meetings. They wrote their license plate numbers down, eventually identifying these members to the community.

Others who opposed the Klan included El Paso Times editor James Black. Backed by his paper, Black

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called the Klan "anarchists and public enemies" who "seize the purpose of the State." Police Chief Peyton J. Edward said he would do everything in his power to oppose Klan actions and dismissed officers who were members. County Sheriff Seth B. Orndorff was also quick to take a stand against the KKK.

By February 1923, the Klan was soundly defeated at the polls when El Pasoans elected anti-Klan candidate R. M. Dudley mayor over Klan member P. E. Gardner. In April, the Klan also lost the school board elections. The Klan's member base rapidly decreased to a handful of individual advocates, and the KKK eventually retreated from El Paso. Many residents believed it was important to keep good relations with the resident Mexicans for business purposes, leading to the weakening of the Klan.

The Ku Klux Klan's membership dwindled in the state as it did in El Paso in the late 1920s. The Klan became active again in the 1950's and 1960's once the civil rights movement gained impetus. Among the largest groups still active in Texas are the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and the White Camellia Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. In South Texas, the Vietnamese were the targets of Klan violence in the 1980's, and in the 1990's various groups of the Klan united with neo-Nazis. The influence of the Klan in El Paso lives on in the names of several city schools, but little outward sign of any other influence exists.

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Ioway, SASS Life #214

Iknelt down and laid the barrel of my 1886 Winchester across the shooting sticks. Several hundred yards across the prairie on the hillside stood a lone bull. I stood up the rear elevator ladder on my Winchester's rear adjustable leaf sight, guestimated the range, and slid the sight bar up the ladder. The trigger was squeezed after seating the crescent steel butt plate firmly against my shoulder. A puff of smoke, the loud report, and the .405-grain bullet of lead was on its way. After a lapse of a few seconds, a loud

smack sound reverberated across the sage-covered prairie, and I knew I had succeeded in hitting my first long range, lever action rifle target at a SASS shoot. This event happened several years ago

at Cheyenne, Wyoming's 4th of July Hell on Wheels shoot at the King Ranch.

My 1886 lever action was an original I had purchased from a friend who had gotten it from who knows where. The old rifle was manufactured in the 1800's according to the Winchester records and the three digits that are still readable on the rifle's lower tang. This rifle has a lot of character with a chip out of the wood back of the receiver three notches cut into the bottom of the gun's butt, and the words "Kalispell, Mont" carved into the left side of

the rifle's forearm. All of the letters and the three notches are blackened from age, but after 122 years of being carried around the west, I, too, would probably

be chipped and blackened with age. This rifle is the standard one with an octagon barrel and adjustable leaf rifle rear sight in .45-70 caliber. Ah, if only the rifle could talk!

The 1886 was Winchester's improvement over the heavy big bore 1876 rifle of Teddy Roosevelt and the Royal Canadian Mounted police fame. For anyone who has handled an original 1886, they know of the gun's famous glass smooth, double, locking bolt action when the lever is thrown downward. This predecessor to the 1892, in revolver calibers, with the same glass smooth, double bolt action is a pleasure to operate. The 1886 was manufactured in .45-70, .45-90, .40-82, .40-65, .38-56, .50-110 Express, .40-70, .38-70, .50-110-450, and .33. This was certainly a wide plethora of calibers for most everyone's shooting desires and was manufactured off and on until 1931. The gun was made in rifle, takedown rifle, carbine, and military musket configurations. In its era, the octagon bull barrel was referred to as the "buffalo" barrel, thus giving one an indication of the early use of the 1886—even though it came at the end of America's great buffalo herds.

In 1984, Browning Arms Company began the remanufacture of many of the Winchester historic rifles, with the 1886 being the third in the series. Thus, the shooting public who wants to use a modern steel rifle in .45-70 has a pool of modern rifles to find in the used section of gun shops. While I bought one new in 1986 to replace my old original rifle, many are available at gun shows in the thousand-dollar range. My gunsmith, after replacing some springs and screws in my old 1886, suggested I get one of the Browning's. So I did. I had him put a Lyman #2 tang sight on it, but I am not totally happy with its performance, as it has to be so far back to allow the rifle's hammer to cock, yet the tang sight when screwed out for a 100 yard setting, gouges into the rise on the stock. While the dings might add "character," I do not like the sight dinging my stock all of the time.

In Iowa, farmers frequently hang the empty seed corn or soybean sack over the wires of a field's fence. I had one such sack hanging on the half-mile boundary fence of one of my farms. After standing the rear ladder sight up on the original 1886 and sliding the slide to the 20 at the top of the ladder, I squeezed off a .405 grain round. The front of the barrel took on a funny angle with the rear ladder slide all the way to the top. I held the front sight at the top of the sack. The loud report of the rifle echoed up the valley, and after a bit, one heard a dull plop and the sack moved. Upon driving over to the sack, a .45 caliber hole was in the bottom half of the sack. My buffalo gun showed me what it had been capable of in its era. Visions of buffalo herds danced before my eyes.

After this, I retired my Kalispell rifle to the gun vault; the new Browning replaced it. While the rear ladder sight on the Browning was not as good as the original Winchester, it worked for a couple of years. Then the slide on the rear ladder sight had become so loose it would not stay in place for even one shot. Brownells in Montezuma, Iowa had an authentic replacement rear sight with ball bearings and notches for each setting on the ladder. This modern replacement goes to 10; whereas, my original Winchester's went to 20.

Thinking about the hunting use these .45-70 1886s had given our ancestors, I decided to hunt with the Browning. A friend and I tried a moose hunt in British Columbia with only cows being seen. No bulls. So the Browning only rode, target practiced, and searched for game. The same was true for a moose hunt in the Selway Wilderness of Idaho. Again, the Browning rode in saddle scabbards for the ten-hour horseback ride deep into the Bitterroot Mountains to camp. Knee-deep snow and wolves gave the 1886 no moose, only a black bear kill for the rifle and its .405grain lead bullets.

Finally, from a stand in southern Arkansas, the 1886 took more game for the table. After the month of snow and the saddle scabbards filled with melted snow and wet leather rubs, my Browning was taking on the well-worn look of the old original 1886's. All summer on my farms, I would set a gallon jug up at 100 yards, lay the Browning over the Kawasaki's seat, and adjust the new rear sight. I found the Brownell's replacement hit the jug every time with the slide at 8 and the sight laid down flat. To keep everything there during the abuse of carrying the rifle on horseback, I put a wrap of black electrician's tape around the sight and slide. My aging eyes were having trouble seeing black on black. After trying many different brands and colors of paint, I settled on an automobile bright white touch up paint tube with which I periodically paint the rear of the front sight. Saddle scabbards wear the paint off, as do the elements.

Two or three shots a day were all my shoulder could take, but I shot daily for a month. The 1886 became very comfortable to my shoulder, and my confidence level of hitting consistently with the rifle up to 100 yards was maxed.

Sitting in my stand in the deep forest of southern Arkansas, I saw a nice 3x2 whitetail at 100 yards. Three points on at least one side was the minimum for deer hunting that year. The 1886 came up and fired once. The deer ran less than 50 yards as the .405grain lead bullet had entered the front shoulder, angled a bit back, and exited. This cowboy load used by our ancestors certainly proved itself a game getter, not just on steel buffalo, but on game for the table too.


This fall my oldest son, his brother Lone Knight, and I are going to Ontario for black bear. Two of the three will be using .45-70 lever actions. The .45-70 1886 has proven to me to be a capable buffalo buster and also a game getter for the table.

LOOK THAT UP IN YOUR FUNK AND WAGNALLS

have enjoyed Cowboy Action Shoo-Lting™ since the summer of 2003, and I recently began shooting blackpowder. My introduction to Cowboy Action Shooting TM had nothing to do with blackpowder, but as I spend time learning about the Holy Black, I am convinced certain events and misadventures of my youth predisposed me not only to the shooting sports, but explosives in general. My family had a nearly complete set of the Funk and Wagnalls Standard Encyclopedia, sold, as I recall, in weekly installments at large grocery chains, commencing in 1953. Unlike today's PC publications, the Funk and Wagnalls contributors were not afraid to describe the ingredients, and even formulas and processes for the manufacture of substances such as nitroglycerine (easy, except for the critical temperature control), ammonium iodide (also easy, but a very touchy contact explosive when dried), and even nitrocellulose, or guncotton. I spent many hours reading about these explosives, and wishing I could make some. I had no real use for them, other than a boyish fascination with blowing things up.

Fortunately for my family, the entire neighborhood, and myself, at the age of eleven or twelve I lacked the financial resources and courage to actually attempt the manufacture of these explosives, but hey, a kid can dream. What I was not afraid to do was experiment with blackpowder, which though a scarce commodity in the Pine Barrens of New Jersey, was obtainable.

For a price, firecrackers, bottle rockets, and even M80's could be had on the black market (no pun intended). Fireworks were, and still are, strictly prohibited in the Garden State. I miss the Pine Barrens, but I sure don't miss the politics of New Jersey.

My father was career US Army, and in 1967, my mother stated she was never moving again, so while my father served out his last tour in Southeast Asia, my mother, three sisters, and I settled into a post WWII tract development in the middle of the Jersey Pines, close to Fort Dix, as well as McGuire AFB, and Lakehurst NAS. In an earlier story, I mentioned my buddy Sid, and the three hundred or so acres of orchards and fields owned by his family. Sid and I became friends in the eighth grade. Compared to mine, his life was right out of "Ozzie and Harriet," or "Leave It To Beaver." I loved riding my bicycle the eight miles over to visit, and was occasionally invited to stay the night. I got my first motorcycle ride on Sid's Honda Z50, then on the newer CT70. I later learned to drive on his father's antique fire truck tanker, which we were allowed to use to flush groundhogs from their burrows in the orchards. A keen eye and quick shot usually netted at least one dead varmint.

Sid and I spent a lot of time in the orchards and fields, and knew them well. One night, when we were both probably twelve or thirteen years old, we were out in the northern forty,

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
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lighting off bottle rockets we had modified by adding supplemental explosives in the form of small "Black Cat" firecrackers. This additional payload caused some erratic flight patterns, but we were unconcerned until we saw a New Jersey State Trooper cruise into the far end of the orchard. New Jersey Troopers are not renowned for their sense of humor, and Sid and I immediately assumed he was looking for us, and that no good could come of waiting for him. We were only about a quarter mile from the house as the crow flies, but even at that age, we knew better than to let him identify us, let alone lead him home.


Off we disappeared into the darkness, hoping we had not been spotted. The crisp bite of fall was in the air, most of the apples had been picked, and there was plenty of rotting, fermenting fruit under the trees. All too soon, it became obvious he had seen at least one of us. That man could drive! Many times he came close to catching one or both of us as we ran and slid from row to row, diving under trees, and rolling out on the other side of the row. We were able to work our way to the south, towards a bit of woods where his cruiser could not follow, and we hoped he was not willing to pursue us on foot. After what seemed a lifetime, but was probably about fifteen or twenty minutes, we made the tree line, and began to work our way around to the barns and main farmyard. As we hid in the shadow of a barn, the Trooper wheeled his way through the drive, lights out, in an apparent attempt to catch us unawares. We stayed under cover. Perhaps because Sid's dad was a respected man of substance, the Trooper did not stop at the house, but left as quietly as he had arrived.

Soaked with dew, and reeking of sweat, grass, mud, and the aroma of rotten apples, we snuck in the back door, hoping Sid's parents were not in the kitchen. As we entered, Sid's mom was just turning away from the wall phone. Sid's mom always seemed like June Cleaver to me, as she actually wore jewelry around the house. She took in our disheveled condition without comment, and said, "That was Mrs. Smith over in Meadowyck. Apparently someone has been throwing firecrackers at passing cars. Do you boys know anything about that?" Since we had only been launching bottle rockets in the orchard, we could honestly answer in the negative. It wasn't our fault that some people jump to erroneous conclusions based on scanty evidence. Sid's mom accepted our denial at face value, in spite of our appearance, because Sid was known for his veracity. I guess you really are judged by the company you keep.

Having survived yet another youthful misadventure unscathed, I am now pleased to keep company with a great bunch of pards, who enjoy touching off explosives, and feeling young! .



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THE OTHER BULLET: RE-ENACTORS REVIEW The West Texas Roughriders

Westerns written about places like Lubbock, Texas and Midland and Odessa in the Permian Basin just "sound" like they have to be as authentic as possible. The 2006 census estimates the Permian Basin had a population of 497,342 in 17 Texas counties, a hefty growth over the 1880's, but still small enough to be the genuine West. The re-enactment group that performs in this area fits the bill as The West Texas Roughriders.

Have you ever seen something done you knew you could just do better if given the chance? Well, that is exactly how this group got started. Marshal Chance Brisco was the head of security for The Permian Basin Fair in Odessa, Texas, and in 1984 a group did a Wild West show for the fair. After seeing it, he told the Fair Board members he could do a better job. The next year they contacted him for "put up or shut up." He talked to several of his friends and co-workers, and in September 1985 they did their first re-enactment for The Permian Basin Fair. They call themselves The West Texas Roughriders and represent mostly the 1880's.

Marshal Chance Brisco and his brother, Dragon Hill Dave, SASS #59561, heard about SASS and attended the SASS Convention in Las Vegas two years ago. The Marshal joined that first year. Dragon Hill Dave joined later and lives near Austin. He comes in for at least one weekend of the Fair now. Marshal Chance Brisco is still the ramrod, and all programs The West Texas Roughriders perform go through him.

Marshal Chance Brisco provided all guns, leather, and outfits for most of the guys for several years. Now, many of the people involved have their own paraphernalia. There are four members who are original to the group, and any one of them can run programs and skits when Marshal Brisco can't be there. Their group runs from 20 to 25 members who do their big event at the Fair. They have 10 that regularly participate in



re-enactments performed for other organizations during the year, such as the re-enactments in Lubbock and Buda, Texas. They include stunts in their performances, which most other groups don't do. Marshal Chance Brisco was asked about training for the stunts he said,

"I had no training. I just made sure I fell a certain way so I would come down face first. The hitching post flip was just a go do it and hope it works out, and for 23 years it has. The falls from the roof and going through the windows were taught to those that volunteer for those particular stunts. The first year we did the show, I wouldn't let anybody come off the roof until I did it, and it was just falling on some spread out hay. As the years went by, we used the younger guys to do this stunt, and we have added some mats that we

bury under the dirt and hay. As far as the window falls, we just use a mattress on the other side. Even with the training, we have had accidents including cracked ribs, injured knees, concussions, and one separated shoulder. The shoulder incident occurred in our second year when we had the guy come off the roof and fall into the water trough, making a big splash. The stunt was a big hit. Unfortunately, one show I did not fill the water trough enough, and he hit too hard and got a separated shoulder. But even with that, he kept doing the shows. We never have done that stunt again."

Anything to do with the guns is supervised by Marshal Brisco, such as all loading of the firearms for each show, making sure each is unloaded when brought to the event, and each is loaded with the appropriate caliber blank, and that it is a blank for the show. At smaller events, they never shoot in the direction of the audience. At the Fair, the audience is in the line of fire because of the setup, but at a great distance, so they are never in harm's way. In one of the skits, Marshal Brisco twirls his rifle to reload. The rifle Marshal Brisco uses is a Rossi .45 caliber Model '92 with the John Wayne big loop. He has used a rifle like this for 23 years while doing the show. He purchased a John Wayne commemorative rifle and practiced with it until he learned to twirl the rifle for the performances.

During their big event at the Permian Basin Fair in September, they talk about gun safely to the audience and do demonstrations as to how dangerous even blanks can be. They set up a storefront town the weekend before the fair, practice two nights before the fair starts, and perform 28 shows during a nine-day period. With other smaller re-enactments, they go over what they are going to do about 30 minutes before they perform. Several of the group get together weeks ahead of time and write a new script for the fair. For the smaller re-enactments such as conventions, private parties, and fundraisers, they just go off the top of their heads and try to put some humor in the act, specifically about the group for whom they are performing.

The fair is all volunteers, including The West Texas Roughriders group. The fair pays for their blanks. They used to charge for the blanks and maybe gas at other events that were for profit, but now Marshal Brisco just subsidizes the cost, as it is less paperwork. "If you like to provide Old West entertainment, dress in Old West outfits, and be cowboys and shoot guns, you do it for the love of it." Members pay no dues, and any money made is spent on buying clothing or equipment and props. They have sponsorships that are advertised on the signs above the town that help cover the cost of what the Permian Basin Fair pays for them to put on the show. These sponsorships are now providing for new storefronts. The Fair also has insurance that covers them when performing at its location.

For the fair, The West Texas Roughriders write a complete script. Once they have a script, they get everybody together to record the entire show. Marshal Chance Brisco then sets up the voice recordings and music mix for each show. Brisco says this gives it more of a movie or TV western feel, and, in case someone can't be there for a show, they can use someone else without the pressure of learning lines in a short period of time. When they write the show each year, they try to utilize ideas from popular movies that year, which helps the kids relate to what is being done.

During the last 21 years, they have had three recurring characters, The Marshal, Deputy Stumpy, and Deputy Durwood. Brisco plays the Marshal and two friends, Doug Chism and David Johnson, play Stumpy and Durwood. They use three basic things in their re-enactments—humor, stunt fighting, and, of course, gunplay. This past year at the fair they did the story of how a

female gunfighter who worked for the gang leader, McTavish, transformed into a good guy. (Hint: the movie *Transformers*) The show starts off with rousing music from one of their favorite westerns, and the Marshal and Stumpy come out and say the McTavish gang is supposedly on the way into town, but in his usual manner, the Marshal is not perturbed and figures they need to eat first. Stumpy tells him about a new food they have at the steakhouse called a donut, and the two rush into the steak house to try one.

The eerie "bad guy" music warns the audience those "despicable hombres" are coming on the scene, and 15 bad guys and saloon girls enter the stage from the saloon. McTavish calls to Stella, the young lady packing a cross draw holster with a nickel Colt, and tells her it's about time she started carrying her weight in the gang. He says he doesn't like the stable manager and to go kill him. She is very hesitant, whether because of indecision or lack of confidence, we don't know. McTavish gets a little rough with her, and she finally agrees to go. Billy, one of the gang, tells McTavish he doesn't believe she will do it, so the boss sends him and Tex to make sure she does. They follow Stella, and because they don't like her, they set up a plot to ambush her. As she comes out and heads for the stable, Tex takes her on, and she out-draws him and shoots the gun from his hand. Billy gets the drop on her and begins marching her off to the boss.

The Marshal, seeing her being pushed around by Billy, comes out, confronts Billy, and uses his rifle to shoot the gun out of Billy's hand and subsequently twirls his rifle to reload. Billy challenges the Marshal in a hand-to-hand fight. The fight ensues with Billy getting the upper hand for a while, but the Marshal comes back and wins the fight. As he walks away, Billy goes for a gun, and Stella shoots him dead. The Marshal and his crew turn to head to the jail while McTavish comes out and learns what happened to his man. He sends

Kansas and Bart to look for Stella. In the end, when the final gunfight begins with the good guys and Stella taking on the bad hombres, bodies are flying everywhere, through windows, off the roof, and into water troughs. When the smoke clears, all the bad guys are laid out, and the saloon girls are stealing their money. The audience goes crazy.

Good fun, and the good guys win! This group of men and women volunteer about three weeks worth of time to the community, so when they see the happy looks on the kids of all ages, it is worth it. The West Texas Roughriders used only men in the reenactments for the first 10 years, but then some women approached them about joining, and The West Texas Roughriders have been performing co-ed ever since. Only people over 16 years old are used in the actual reenactments. Some youngsters perform in the pre-show. Most of the older people in the group grew up with westerns at the movies and on TV, and they wanted to give the kids some of that kind of entertainment and moral values. The main goal is to show good always triumphs over evil, even when the odds are against you.

Deputy Durwood is played by a Baptist preacher. He also plays Billy, who has been doing stunt fights with the Marshal for 30+ years. When their kids turned 16, they were allowed to be involved, and they now have some grandchildren they are trying to work into the act in the next few years.

A group goal is to build a western town and be able to perform there for groups. They have also done some western movies written by one of their group and are trying to do get some professional movie people to do one with them.

news" is reported in a local paper. I fully realize The Combay Chronicle is not an unbiased journal any more than a local newspaper is, but I thought some of its readers might to enjoy

hearing some good news regarding guns and school for a change.

In October of 2007 I was asked if I would be willing to be the advisor for a new club forming on the campus

of The University of Charleston. I was both happy and somewhat honored they had asked me to serve as the advisor. The Sportsman's Club was started by a small group of stu(Continued on next page)



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dents to provide a platform for students that enjoy hunting and fishing, and is one of several different student organizations active on the campus. Some of the student organizations are more active than others. I assumed the Sportsman's Club would hold a couple of meetings in the spring and might participate in one of the spring charity functions held annually on the Charleston Campus. Was I ever in for a surprise!

Brandon Meddings was elected President of the Sportsmen's Club, and from the initial club meeting was busy organizing activities for the club members. They participated in several of the campus-wide activities throughout the spring semester, including working from a pontoon boat to help haul trash from the Kanawha River and raised approximately \$700 for the club's treasury.

As the semester was winding down, Brandon asked if I would be interested in presenting a lecture on Cowboy Action ShootingTM to the group at one of their last meetings. I was very interested in talking about Cowboy Action ShootingTM, but I wanted to use some visual aids along with my presentation. Like most secondary schools and colleges, firearms

are not allowed on campus, so my first order of priority was to contact the campus Chief of Security to inquire exactly what I could bring to my lecture. Security Chief Jack Rinchich, a former Marine, was very agreeable to my bringing my cowboy guns to campus, as long as I left the ammunition home and notified the administration of the purpose of the presentation. With that taken care of, I gave the presentation on April 10 to members of the club, two college administrators, and one faculty member. Then, at 9:00 AM on April 27th, twelve members of the Sportsmen's Club traveled about 15 miles west of the campus to the Putnam County Gun Club for a two-stage cowboy shoot. The President of the Putnam County Gun Club, Santa Fe Sparks, SASS #68428, had made signs directing the members to the cowboy range and welcoming them to the club, and was also there to run the unloading table. Little Pearl, SASS #26341, ran the loading table for the shooters. Following a safety meeting, the students shot two typical cowboy stages with all guns and ammunition furnished by gun club members.

It was a typical cowboy match for the most part. The students were active in following the scenarios, and they said their lines with enthusiasm. As soon as the shooter had cleared the line, six people picked up brass (did I say typical cowboy match???). After the shooting activities, we adjourned to the cowboy shelter for lunch and following that, the top three shooters were presented medals. What is a shoot after all without awards? In my opinion, not much. They don't have to cost a lot, but an award is a symbol of achievement, and I know the students certainly appreciated theirs.

It was obvious from watching them on the line all had shot some type of firearm previously, although most of them were more familiar with automatic pistols or double action revolvers than with single actions. None of the students knew what SASS was prior to the lecture and the shoot, and though none are currently SASS members, I have hope for the future. They are already planning another cowboy shoot for next year and want to expand it from one per year to one per semester.

Perhaps there are other colleges or universities across the country that would also be favorable to a SASS class for a student activity if properly approached. I can honestly say I met with no hostility or apprehension from any administrators at any juncture of the process. While it probably wouldn't go over too well at Berkley or City University of New York, I have to believe it could happen at more than a single campus in the country. A.

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Seven Ladders, SASS #75152

There are few documented historical instances when a real gunfighter demonstrated his skills outside of a fight. Wild Bill Hickok and the picket fence? Possibly true, but in a fight, he killed Dave Tutt across a crowded intersection at 75 yards. Elfego Baca holding off twenty cowboys in a fight in 1884? Possibly true, too, but a later account said he didn't hit a watermelon six times at thirty feet when challenged at a picnic. Wyatt Earp hitting a playing card at

THE GUNFIGHTER SHOWS HIS STUFF!

300 yards 6 times out of 6 in 6 seconds, the fabled 666? No, I just made that up! It's the stuff of television shows seen in my adolescence.

In fact, gunfighters consistently demonstrated one simple rule of survival: never show your best shooting in front of witnesses. It is the fallacy of SASS. Here, we try our best. In the Old West, a gunfighter's best ... was his best-kept secret!

An example of this was Texas gunman and hothead, John Wesley Hardin, arguably in the top five gunfighters of all time. Was he a better shot than Bill Hickok or Bill Longley? Who knows? Did he kill more men than Jim Miller—who preferred to

use a shotgun in the back? Again, who knows? In fact, there is a great deal we don't know about John Wesley Hardin. Though he wrote an autobiography, the purpose seems to have been to lessen his reputation rather than enhance it. For that reason, to find out how good a shot he really was, we must rely on witnesses. Among these were the crowds in El Paso, March-June 1895, who eagerly bought souvenir playing cards he shot full of holes. These people were awed by his skill, but there is a discrepancy as to the distance between Hardin and his targets.

Another account, however, exists. This account happened along the

Guadalupe River southwest of Gonzales, Texas, in late November or early December 1894. Hardin had just been released from prison after 17 years. He was 41 years old and trying to make his way in life as a lawyer. He had returned to Gonzales, one of his former haunts, to be close to his three adult children, but he was slipping back into his old ways, drinking and gambling, and getting into trouble.

Four friends, Dennis Stuebing, Cheat Reid, Bill Johnston, and Clay Mangum went fishing on the Guadalupe River with John Wesley Hardin. Along with the fishing, there was undoubtedly some drinking and

bragging, and Hardin's friends asked him to show how fast he could shoot. Remember, this was after seventeen years in prison. He was not at the top of his form, but Hardin reluctantly agreed. The men chose as a target a knot on a tree trunk about 70 feet away. The knot was at eye level and about six inches in diameter.

Hardin stood with his back to the tree. Suddenly he whirled around and by the time he had turned, both guns were smoking. He fired eight shots and then put away his guns.

"Sorry, boys," he said to his friends as they walked over to check the target, "but I don't empty my guns for anybody." It was the custom then to leave an unloaded chamber under the hammer of a loaded gun. Having shot eight times, Hardin had left himself two loaded chambers, one in each gun.

There were eight bullet holes in the knot. John Wesley Hardin had awed his friends, but not shot to his full potential. Such caution is what kept a gunfighter like him alive! Unfortunately, however, Hardin was killed eight months later, shot in the back of the head as he threw dice at a bar in El Paso. Even as he fell, stone dead, some witnesses claimed he tried to pull his pistols to shoot his assailant. .



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AREAL SHOOTOUT

Ctories of shootouts in the Old West Dabound. Like many stories, the truth is not as romantic as the real thing. Yes, it is true, boys and girls. Very seldom is the song "High Noon" playing in the background as the good guys face off with the bad guys.

This is a true story about a real gunfight from start to end.

A morning's drive from Las Vegas, Nevada, the ghost town of Johnnie sits just off the road, and goes unnoticed by most driving by at 70 miles per hour.

For a short time while the gold lasted, the town site boomed like many others in the west. These towns grew and existed because of the minerals mined nearby. Across the paved road and up a short hill from Johnnie is the Johnnie mine. This is one of the mines that supported the growth of the town, but before the town, the mine had to be located and worked. It is here our tale begins.

Gold was discovered in the area of Johnny by George Montgomery in 1891. The placer soon began to play out, and Montgomery was not a very good manager. His Chispa mine was almost broke by 1892. One of his backers, one William Dechant, sold out his interest in the Chispa to a Salt Lake company by the name of Sterling Mining and Milling Company. All the while, another backer, Angus McArthur, also had a claim on the mine. Hence, the trouble was brewing.

The Mormons took over the operation of the mine, and when McArthur found out someone else was operating his claim, and making money at it, he took action to correct the situation. George Morris and Billy Moyer were hired, along with the notorious gunfighters, Phil Foote and Jack Longstreet, to run off the Mormons.

Phil Foote was a gambler and stage robber and all-around seedy character. Just prior to being hired by McArthur, he had broken out of a Salt Lake City jail and escaped by stealing a boat at Green River, Utah.


Jack Longstreet was the most infamous of the four. A half-breed with long blonde hair, he turned bad when only a youngster by stealing cattle, a profession which earned him a notched ear when he was caught. He was married to an Indian squaw and had been involved in shady schemes all his life. He had no qualms about shooting anyone that didn't see eye to eye with him. A town site and associated mine in central Nevada, named by him and after him went nowhere because of his bad reputation. Now, he had been dragged out of his Ash Meadows retreat to head up this group.

Four gunfighters against two Mormon miners is not a very fair fight, and they knew it. So with great haste, the miners left the mine with no holes in them.

The Sterling Mining and Milling Company did not take kindly to their operators being run off the property. They sent word to McArthur that they were going to take this matter to court, all the while gathering their force of armed miners from around the area.

A group of 25 Mormon miners surrounded the Chispa mine, and as Longstreet's wife came riding in with supplies, they opened up and shot the horse from under her. The gunfight was on. The four gunfighters now became the defenders and as the lead flew, one round found its way through the shack they were in and ripped into Phil Foote's belly. Pinned down,







and with nowhere to hide from the rain of lead, they soon gave up and the Mormons retook the mine.

Phil Foote was taken to nearby Johnny town site where he lay while help was summoned from the nearby community of Pahrump. Help arrived in the form of Mr. Manse who brought with him morphine. Upon being given a dose of morphine, Phil Foote expired.

So much for the romantic gunfight of the Old West. Most are legends or stories that have been changed by too many tellings.

If you ever get a chance to visit the town site of Johnny, Nevada, say a prayer for the ghost of Mr. Foote. And while you are there, look across the paved highway and you will see a lone grave on the hillside—a grave with no name, but possibly the grave of a legend. For according to the diary of Lula Parker Betenson, his sister, William Phillips aka "Butch Cassidy" lies in peaceful sleep on the hillside overlooking Johnny, Nevada.

You can also visit Ash Meadows, which is only a short drive from Johnny, and visit Longstreet Springs and the house where Jack Longstreet and his wife lived. Sparse by today's standards, but peaceful and secluded. 4.

itor would, out of necessity, be more critical of her every move. All of this would be simply trying to get the guns loaded!

The same would be true of the unloading table monitor. This cowboy has the ability to make you feel good about what you just did, or make you feel ashamed. It all depends upon how you handle the various guns in assuring the monitor the firearms are empty. You can walk away feeling confidant and encouraged, or you can leave wishing you were somewhere else. It all depends upon how that cowboy responds to you.

For example, when she picked up her pistol for loading, I had her grip the pistol firmly demonstrating an awareness of the muzzle direction. She would then open the loading gate and slowly rotate the cylinder to confirm the pistol is empty ... but, do this by holding the pistol in such a way the monitor could also see she was starting with an empty pistol. (I started her with Rugers, so simply opening the loading gate was all that was required.) I took the same approach to the double shotgun and the rifle. Lay the shotgun on the table where the monitor can see the open action and work the action on the rifle where the monitor can confirm it is empty. All of this is done with a very acute awareness of the muzzle direction. This is a lot to think about for a new shooter, and must be practiced until it is habit. The den was a good place to accomplish this. All of this working together is going the extra step to meet the monitor's expectation, and to assure him this lady knew what she was doing. I was trying for all that was in me to hedge the bet she would have a good, positive experience when she shot her first match.

Next on the agenda was the scenario. I had a number of old shooter's books, so I started reading the stage descriptions out loud to her. First, I wanted her to get the order of the firearms in her mind from the description. As the description was being read, she learned to mark which was shot where, i.e., revolver, revolver, rifle, shotgun. Then, mark the sequence for each gun, i.e., first revolver, left to right; second revolver right to left; rifle left to right, and then shotgun left to right. I would then have her repeat this until she could walk through the set-up in the correct sequence.


We then approached the unloading table in the same manner as the loading table. I had her doing whatever she could to make the monitor feel at ease with her gun handling and to be assured the firearms are empty.

It wasn't until this drill became monotonous that we made a trip to the range. I noticed the first sign of nerves when she started putting live ammo into the various guns. What was monotonous in the den now had an entirely different meaning. We shot a lot of ammo as she began to be comfortable with each of the guns. I started her with very light loads, so she would be comfortable with the gun's firing. I let her tell me when she was ready to increase the load level. I allowed her to make that decision. The truth is that shooting is not fun if it hurts to pull the trigger. The better you handle the gun, and the tighter it is held, the less the recoil hurts. That did not take long. This lady took to shooting the cowboy guns like a duck to water. I was one happy cowboy. The transformation really accelerated when she joined SASS and officially became Prissy Pearlene Jones, SASS #59753.

Then we put the scenarios into action. I would monitor her, as she would load the guns at the loading table. Then I would read a scenario. At first I would question and have her explain how she was going to shoot the stage. After a few times of question and answer and having her look at me in a way that said, "Enough," it was time to shoot through the sce-

nario. Then when shooting the scenario was complete, it was go to the unloading table and unload.

Now it was time for that doubleheaded serpent called "The Match." Time to introduce her to that case of nerves we all experience. She could not believe it. It started at the loading table and continued until she completed the unloading and was back at the gun cart. They did not go away, these shakes. "I can't believe this," she would say. I explained to her after competitive shooting for over forty years, I still get nervous; maybe not as bad as she was experiencing, but nervous just the same. The day I quit getting a little nervous is the day I will stop shooting. I pray that day never comes.

I am proud of this lady that wasn't so sure about this shooting stuff. Last week on our way home from a match, the discussion focused on why some folks shoot when they look like they are in pain? If it hurts, why do it? I explained that some shooters shoot "for" and some shooters shoot "against" and some haven't figured out why they're there. You can shoot "for" the fun of the game and the enjoyment of fellowship with a group of folks doing the same thing for the same reason. These are the folks enjoying the game for the sake of the game. It is good to win once in a while. It is a good thing to be recognized for the accomplishment.

However, when the reason for being there is to win at any cost, the shooter is shooting "against" everyone who potentially stands between them and their goal. Then there are those with that "deer in the headlights" look. They haven't figured out if they are there "for" or "against," or even if there is a difference.

Prissy looked at me and said, "You know, if I had fun, I won!" She got it! I have a shooting partner that is a keeper!♪



The Wild Bunch Match at END of TRAIL

hen the rules came out for the Wild Bunch category, I was interested. Here were rules that could be used by every SASS club that wants to use them, hopefully minimizing the maze of local Wild Bunch rules. As I encountered these wide variations in my travels, I just had to ignore them and skip the event. But events using these rules, I can plan for, just like other SASS categories.

DISPATCHES FROM CAMP BAYLOR

Guns

You need three guns, hopefully ones you already have. 1911's or 1911A1's, in outwardly stock form, can be shot in Traditional, meaning one-handed, or Modern, meaning two-handed. More modified guns, the kind you have from IPSC or IDPA days, can only be shot in Modern category. All have to shoot 200 gr. or heavier lead bullets to a modest power factor of 150. Rifles can be any big bore (.40 cal. or larger) main match rifle. Shotguns have to be '97's, and trench guns are allowed. They can be stoked to the number of rounds required. This makes for a whole different experience from shooting '97's one or two at a time.

Magazines with Naked Bases

Before the warm up and before the main match. Covote Calhoun held up evil magazines with base pads, even the thin Wilson Low

Profile bases, and angelic magazines, ones without. Only five rounds are allowed in the magazines at any time, so fancy eight-round magazines are not required. Having magazines that feed perfectly is a must, of course.

You could tell who had been practicing with angelic magazines by the blood blisters on their palms.

Clothing

You can wear a military uniform from 1900 to 1916. I chose the Mexican Punitive Expedition in 1916. I got all the accoutrements from Coon Creek and matched the photos of soldiers of the era. One shooter came as Pike, who, in the movie, got some things wrong on his uniform.

If you don't go in uniform, you can go in your regular SASS clothes with some exceptions, no straw hats, and pants need suspenders. I presume this means no belts and belt loops. At END of TRAIL I saw belts, but I wouldn't expect to see them after this becomes a regular thing. Historically, belts and trousers with belt loops were coming into fashion. The Army had adopted trousers with belt loops and a canvas belt. (Sadly, they didn't put front pockets in the trousers.)

Leather Gear

Several people wore US Army 1912 holsters on web belts. In theory this works because you can put the flap out of the way before starting the stage. In reality, I didn't see anyone doing that, and they took a while to draw the pistol. Others wore holsters that looked like Cowboy Action ShootingTM holsters adapted to 1911's. Now that I've shot some matches, were I designing a rig, I would want something like an early IPSC holster. Wolfbane (Michael Bane of Shooting Gallery),









had a Ted Blocker holster that was just such a design, but with floral carving so it looked "western." The rig should include six magazine pouches. You shoot up to 20 shots, four magazines limited to five rounds each, and you're allowed two spare magazines. Since you insert the magazine on the line at the instruction of the RO, then coming to the line with six on your belt makes sense. Put one in the pistol, and you have two spares on your belt.

I found the shotgun belt to interfere with reaching magazines. I saw Evil Roy had a shotgun slide on his pistol belt. That works. You also need a slide for a few spare rounds for the rifle.

Problems

Very few problems occurred. At the shooters' meeting we were required to show our rigs to officials to make sure everything was legal. One shooter had a Colt 1911A1 and was shooting Traditional. It came with plastic molded checkered GI grips with a Colt medallion on them. The officials decided he would have to shoot Modern because the grips weren't period correct.

The regs say: "Grips must be GIstyle wood or plastic grips. Other natural materials are okay, but no rubber grips. No target grip or thumb rest."

Every vet in the place recognized

these as GI grips. Wolfbane had them, though worn, on his father's WWII gun. Fortunately, he chose to shoot Modern with it anyway.

"Lowered and flared ejection port allowed" in modern category only, but there are "GI" spec guns on the market with lowered ejection ports, the Rock Island, for example. Several were shot in Traditional category (and should be). The only functional advantage of the lowered ejection port is to prevent denting of brass for reloaders. This needs some sorting out.

Loading:

Rifles are loaded at the loading table. Shotguns are loaded at the loading table. Magazines are loaded at the gun cart and checked by the loading table monitor. But the first magazine isn't inserted in the pistol until the RO tells you to do so. This caused several restarts. I was the first to foul up as RO. Then Evil Roy did several times, just to make me feel better.

I might respectfully suggest that inserting magazines at the loading table be a standard practice. This isn't IPSC. They don't have a loading table.

Warm-up

The crew from Shooting Gallery showed up on warm-up day. Naturally. Looking forward to 10 days of shooting in costume, I'd worn the stuff I liked the least that day. I

asked Michael Bane why they were there on Warm-up day, and he said he didn't want to mess up anyone's match. Made sense. I figured I was beyond such nonsense as stage fright. Then I looked over and saw the big HD TV camera pointing at me as I went to the line. "Oops. Mess this up, and it'll be on four times some Wednesday, not including reruns. Okay, shoot a little slow. Hit every target." It worked. Quick, clean stage. Slow is smooth. Smooth is fast. Then I wished I could get them to photograph me for the whole match!


The Fun Factor

Make no mistake; this is a fun category. We shot the same targets as the main match, though on some stages we didn't use them all. We didn't shoot the same scenarios. The pistols are fast. Remember, the 1911A1 is the most efficient fighting handgun ever devised. It is very easy to shoot, especially with light 150 PF loads. Knockdowns adjusted for 105 gr. .38s usually go down hard when hit with a 200 gr. bullet at 750 ft./sec. Reloading took most people longer than switching SAA's. That's where practicing magazine changes comes in handy. It was easy to see who had been practicing.


Shooting the '97 stoked is a gas, too, a whole different animal than one loaded with one or two rounds at a time. Shooting the rifle is just like shooting your .38 except you can tell when it goes off.

Put these three guns together, and it's understandable why J.T. Wild was whooping during his stages. All of us were smiling.



I'm Doc Nelson, Gunfighter. I like the sound of that tag and always have. "Gunfighter" brings the Old West to my mind even more than "Cowboy" does. I really like shooting in the Gunfighter category and have been doing it since Gunfighter was recognized as a category. My SASS heroes are almost all Gunfighters: Tex, Madd Mike, Lassiter, Easy Rider, and more recently, Badlands Ben, to name a few. Now, as I compete I want to emulate that kind of shooter—skilled, amiable, confident, and ready to help the next shooter along.

As anyone is likely to do, I'm always looking up the score sheet to see who I can compete with and learn from, but lately I've paused to study the score sheet, and I'm not seeing many Gunfighters on the list. Shooters on my posse shake their heads and say Gunfighter is too hard, or 'I can't keep it straight in my head' or something similar. I say BULL! If you can compete in SASS, you can shoot Gunfighter. I ask you, was your first match a real speedy top 10 kind of match? Not likely. Was it worth it to work at it and become better at

whatever category you chose? Sure it was, and you were rewarded for your efforts. Now I might be a bit biased here, but I think Gunfighter is so much more rewarding to shoot than any other category that I've never seriously practiced "two-handed" shooting since starting SASS. Two handed shooting seems like a let down after Gunfighter.

I see SASS is going to offer classes for a SASS University. What an outstanding idea! My thoughts and intentions here are to get some folks interested in the Gunfighter portion of that endeavor. I truly believe it will be a fun *multiplier* for you. It ain't nick-named FUN-FIGHTER for nothing!

A bit of background might be good so you know where I'm coming from. I live in a very small rural community in Eastern Utah. I competed for a couple years before I even saw another Gunfighter at a match. This was back when not every club recognized Gunfighter as a category, and sometimes I had to shoot Double Duelist the whole match. Since there was no competition in my category. I focused on competing with the good Duelists, and then with Traditional shooters as I got better. Currently, I am the six-time Utah State Gunfighter Champion, and I even win stages at these matches. At END of TRAIL '06, I placed 5th Gunfighter and 51st overall. Unfortunately, I don't get out of state very often, and I don't see that changing anytime soon. I'm not the world champion Gunfighter here, but I think I can help those who would like to give Gunfighter a try.


The first thing I did when this new and exciting Gunfighter category came along was to put up five dots on the wall at uneven heights and uneven distances apart. Then I started dry-firing, very slowly, counting, and making sure I was getting five shots from each revolver. I practiced a left to right sweep until I had it down pat, second nature. Then I practiced a right to left sweep, and then a Nevada sweep. I was very slow and deliberate as I worked to get the mechanics down. I practiced and shot one match Double Duelist so I could concentrate on my weak hand. When I felt my weak side was capable, I started putting both pistols out there.

I had some crash and burn matches, but I was hooked. Holding two revolvers and hitting consistently was intoxicating to me. YEEE-HAW! Bang and Clang! That's what I'm talking about! Rifle? Sure it is fun. Shotgun? Yeah sure, whatever, BUT LET ME GET BOTH PISTOLS OUT THERE and RIDE, BOLDLY RIDE in search of El Dorado, or in other words, Gunfighter nirvana.


How do you go about it? Start as simply as you can. I'm going to

pause and say I am left eye dominant and right handed. As a youth I taught myself to shoot right handed with my BB gun. Up until my later 'teens I could shoot a rifle equally well left or right. Why is that important? Because I shoot in pairs now as a Gunfighter. I will cock both guns and fire alternately. More on this style later. The other more common style is alternating pistols.

For now, you need to figure out what your abilities are. Because I can see both sights at the same time, I prefer shooting pairs. My wife, Senorita Tira Todo, SASS #45723, has a very dominant right eye and uses the same eye for both guns; yet, she is quite capable as a Lady Gunfighter. I believe the more dominant your eyesight is the more likely it is you will prefer alternating pistols rather than shooting pairs. The important thing here is to get it in your head correctly. The target order is the same for all shooters, so you can ignore 'first revolver engages ... second revolver engages ...' and think instead 'first five rounds engages ... second five rounds engages ...' You'll want to experiment with different styles until you develop your own preferences. Watch the best and learn from the best. Count yourself lucky if you have a top Gunfighter nearby. Do what you can to get on his/her posse and talk to

him/her. He/she will most likely be more than happy to share with you. Just avoid discussion at the loading table. You may even ask for some sort of mini-shooting school after a match. I'd bet it could be arranged!

Come on now; try it. Put up some dots or pick out five objects at which to dry-fire. BE SAFE and check and double check your firearms for live rounds and follow rule number 2: DON'T point at anything you don't want shot up. I started with five pieces of electrical tape on a cement wall in the basement.


Did ya try it? Did ya try it until you got a good 10 shot string out? You'll be grinning when you do. Hard work brings the best rewards and Gunfighter is no exception. But, I'll guarantee this ... when those Traditional and 49ers start muttering about the "Gunfighter advantage" after you've run a good stage, you'll know how worth it all the practice was!

All you need is two hands and a desire to blaze away with two sixguns. It really is that simple. Increasing your skill comes with the secret that isn't a secret ... practice.

Holy Terror, SASS #15362

Yowboy Action Shooting[™] can be Jboth fun and aggravating at the same time. There is a continuous learning curve involved with Cowboy Action ShootingTM. There are so many facets of the game involved in Cowboy Action ShootingTM it is often difficult for new shooters because there are so many things to think about and remember. Even though I have been shooting over 10 years, I still learn something new at every match I attend. I try to eliminate as many mistakes as I can from my

shooting and to make sure I learn from each mistake when it happens.

When you make mistakes in your shooting, they cost you time and impact your final standings. If you are a new shooter trying to get the hang of the game, or if you are a seasoned shooter trying to find those extra couple of seconds, you will shoot better if you eliminate mistakes.

The very easiest mistakes to eliminate are equipment mistakes. There is nothing worse than having a firearm break or having your ammunition give you problems. Make sure your equipment and your ammunition are in good working order.

To make certain your guns are working, the first thing you should do is clean them. A majority of firearms malfunctions can be traced

back to dirty guns. I clean my guns before any big match where my placement is especially important. As I have said before, when you clean your guns, it is always a good idea to test fire them before going to the match so you know you put them back together correctly. After that, I don't take them apart again until the next match.

Preventative maintenance will also help ensure your guns work smoothly. Parts will wear out over time, and if you have been shooting or dry firing extensively, it might be time to change out a part or two. The parts I wear out most often are my Winchester 1897 ejectors and extractors. I change these two pieces regularly, even if there doesn't appear to be anything wrong with them.

As far as your ammunition is concerned, it is always a good idea to test it before you go. When testing ammunition, use a chronograph, if possible. Chronographs are useful in telling you how consistent your ammunition is and whether or not it will pass the power factor test.

The power factor is a new SASS rule that regulates your ammunition. You can determine the power factor of your ammunition by multiplying the bullet weight (grs.) by the velocity (fps) and dividing by 1000.

When it comes to ammunition, you really can't ever have too much. My grandfather regularly takes four different loads to every match he attends. There is the regular load, the slightly heavy load, the heavy





load, and the really heavy load. It may seem like overkill, but having the right bullet can make or break your match.

The more difficult types of mistakes to eliminate are mental mistakes. These are mistakes you make because you didn't know any better, you weren't sure of the right way to do it, or you just plain had a "brain fart." You can try to eliminate these mistakes as best you can, but sooner or later you will have at least one. When this happens, there are things you can do to make the best of a bad situation.

When you make a mistake, the first thing to do is don't let it affect you for the rest of the stage or the rest of the match. Some of the most painful train wrecks I have seen are when people get distracted because they made a mistake, and then end up making four or five more!

If you make a mistake, do your best to put it out of your mind and continue on with what you are doing. After the stage is over, it is okay to feel bad about a mistake, but it is not okay to let it mess you up for the rest of the match. There have been a couple of matches where I have made a mistake and was so upset I "gave up." If I had kept trying instead of giving up, I possibly could have placed well even with the mistake. If you make a mistake on a stage, it is always better to contain it to that one stage than allowing it to contaminate your entire match.

Every mistake I have made has been a lesson in what not to do in the future. After every match I look back on my performance, good or bad, and try to understand what I can do better next time. Gun malfunctions and ammunition problems can be frustrating at the time, but for most people after they happen once, better care is taken, and they don't happen again.

After matches where non-equipment related mistakes happen are the times when the real learning occurs. I have had too many mistakes to tell you about all of them,

but there is one lesson that has made the biggest difference in my shooting.

The most important trick I have learned over the years is to stay focused. If you make a mistake, you have to put it out of your mind and finish the stage in the best way possible. To learn to do this is hard, and it mostly involves experience and practice, but there are a couple of things you can do even if you are a new shooter.

Don't talk to yourself while you are shooting, especially don't give yourself negative commentary. Talking to yourself distracts you and will keep you from focusing on what you are doing. Negative commentary is bad because it will keep you concentrating on what you did wrong, which is bad for your self-esteem. Instead of saying "dang it!" when you miss, don't say anything, and concentrate on hitting the next target. After the stage, you can be upset, but don't distract yourself during the stage.

When trying to stay focused on your shooting, it is important not to dwell on mistakes, but it is also important not to try and compensate for your mistakes. When you miss or do something you didn't mean to do, you usually can't fix it, even if you try to shoot faster to make up. Trying to shoot faster or changing your game plan right in the middle of a stage is a bad plan. No matter what happens, I try to stick to two rules: hit the targets and be smooth. Hurrying and shooting faster will most likely only make things worse.

It is never fun when something doesn't go according to plan. Unfortunately, guns break, you will get a bad round, and sometimes you just miss. Learning to make fewer mistakes will make you a better shooter, and you will have more fun shooting matches.

The 1800's produced a multitude of inventions unique to that time such as the steam engine, the paddle wheel, and the steam locomotive rail system. People are drawn to exhibits where they can examine and even experience the excitement of one of these grand old mechanical wonders of our past. Amidst the backdrop of all the sparks, smoke, and animation, the Gatling Gun came into existence. It was named after an American inventor, R. J. Gatling (1818-1903).

The Vicar's Wife and I visited the museum at Fort Riley Kansas when our son-in-law was stationed there with our daughter and grandkids. The old cavalry building has a large display of nineteenth century military items. One of the objects that grabbed my attention was an 1883 Gatling Gun. The caption written on the wall beside it read: "THIS .45 CALIBER CAVALRY GATLING GUN WAS USED DURING THE INDIAN WARS. CRANKED BY HAND, IT FIRED UP TO 1500 ROUNDS PER MINUTE." Being part American Indian, I can imagine the intimidation and dread this gun must have produced. In Micah 4:3 it says in the Last Days the LORD will "... judge between many peoples and will settle disputes for strong nations far and wide. They will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore." I look forward to that time; however, we live in the here and now.

It's amazing how much firepower the Gatling had. But what really


AN IMITATION GATLING GUN

held my attention was the craftsmanship of the piece. It was plain, but elegant; small, but menacing. It looks more like a work of art than an old arsenal relic.

The simple design gave it good mobility. It has two wood spoke wheels of around four feet diameter, a cross axle with the gun, and two ammo boxes mounted in place. Connected to the bottom of the cross axle was a tongue around four feet long. The gun, mounted on a yoke with an arc passing through it, swivels horizontally and vertically. The barrel assembly O.D. appeared to be five inches, and the length around the same as the wood spoke wheel diameter. The magazine inserted into the top of the barrel was a little less than a cubit from the breech and was around one-foot in diameter.

The real attention grabber was the exterior of the gun. It was brass, all polished and poised. It really





stood out as a treasure of workmanship from the Victorian Period, a time when things were made as much for looks as for function and purpose. I took a couple pictures of this old beauty musing to myself that I might build an ersatz Gatling someday.


It took a little over a year, but this faux Gatling finally came to fruition. You might remember the article on making wood spoke wheels a while back. Well, when the wood chips and dust cleared, there were six wheels in all. Four were placed on the "Buckboard Look Alike," so that left two for this Gatling Gun imitation.

The counterfeit Gatling was made around three-quarter scale. Most props used for Cowboy Action ShootingTM look just fine in this scale. The wheels are three feet diameter. A three quarter inch by 36" long threaded rod sandwiched in the middle of three boards around five inches or so wide make up the cross axle. The tongue, made of 2" stock, tapers from 4" to 2" and is 42" long. The cross axle and tongue were made out of oak, finished with Min Wax golden oak stain and given three coats of varnish.

The yoke is made out of 2" oak

with a slot in it for an arc. The arc is three quarter inch thick by 2" and is also oak. The yoke and arc are painted black. The barrel was made out of four-inch O.D. thin wall galvanized metal pipe cut three feet long. You could use plastic pipe, but I just used a piece of exhaust pie from the scrap pile.

The magazine (around 9" diameter) and the plugs for each end of the barrel are made of 2" wood. I used a brass color aerosol paint can for the barrel and magazine. A half inch threaded rod was used to attach the barrel to the yoke. A hole was drilled through the barrel up around one and a quarter inches from the bottom and 13 inches from the breech for the threaded rod. The magazine



was placed around 9" to center from the breech. The arc passes through the yoke and attaches to the under side of the barrel with sheet metal angles. It takes a little head work to fit the arc properly. I put a rubber damper and a stop on the arc to control vertical movement. The hole for the crank was drilled one inch from the breech and horizontally on the harrel center

A brass knob from an old hame

was mounted on the breech plug for a handle and holes were drilled in the muzzle end plug to simulate multiple barrels. The yoke, with arc inserted in it and attached to barrel, was mounted in the center of the cross axle on a stud. Ammo boxes, made to fit, were mounted on each side of the gun. Measurements are not real critical on this project. I just tried to balance it out and have the gun look as real as possible.

It appears almost real and would



be an asset to any Cowboy Action town. The Gatling should be kept out of the elements when not in use. This type Gatling Gun uses readily available, impossible to find stealth cartridges produced by R. U. Goofy, CEO of Oxymoron Incorporated, located in Nowhere USA. However,

the average Cowboy Action Shooter can obtain an ammo box full of nostalgia with props such as these. Always make sure to follow all safety rules when building projects and playing with em.

How Modern Technology Affects Our Lives on the Firing Line:

about ready for us to dig it up. Problem is, pure lead is not found in nature, and often times it is found in deposits with other heavy metals

um, and antimony. These impurities must be removed in a process called smelting.

are removed from the ground. Modern technology helps speed this step along with the assistance of explosives. Once removed from the ground, the lead concentrates (ore) are crushed to the consistency of FFFFg blackpowder in order to remove waste materials, such as earth and rock, and to give it more surface area so it can better react to the purification process.

One major change in the refining of lead ore was the discovery of the floatation process. The floatation process was developed in 1869 and relies on the chemical properties of sulfur in its basic principle. In its natural state, lead is usually found combined with sulfur. This characteristic helps to separate the lead concentrates from the other heavy metals in this process. The lead sulfide is mixed with water and a light oil to create a slurry mixture. The slurry is agitated with air, causing the slurry to stir.

we spend a lot of hard earned money, only to look forward to getting rid of it on the firing line. At the end of the day, the gun cart is a few pounds lighter; the result of a day's efforts of sending lead down range.

Several of us take the time and recycle lead in the form of range pickings or old wheel weights, casting them into new bullets. With its low melting temperature, just under 650 degrees, not a whole lot

of special equipment is required for an average person to recycle lead at home. In fact, 50% of today's lead market is recycled.

Centuries of ballistics have determined lead to be the most efficient projectile in small arms technology. There in no doubt about it. The characteristics of lead make it an almost perfect material for firearms.

So, where do we get this stuff? Well like most substances, it was provided for us in the ground, just such as zinc, silver, copper, cadmi-To start with, lead concentrates

Lead has been an element used by mankind dating back to the 5th century B.C. At first, lead ore, known as galena, was simply burned/melted in open-hearth furnaces with the lead collecting in a pit at the bottom. In medieval times, the French discovered they could get a more efficient burn by placing furnaces on a hillside to catch the wind. This was the precursor to the blast furnace. Through the evolution of technology, the furnaces became more refined into the roasters and blast furnaces we know today.

Aided by other additives, the oil,

which floats on top of the water, captures the sulfur and holds it atop the mix, while the heavy metals and undesirable elements sink to the bottom. The lead sulfide is then skimmed from the top of the floatation chamber and sent through a filter to dry.


The sulfur now needs to be removed. Since sulfur is combustible, the lead sulfide concentrates are sent to a roaster averaging over 2500 degrees Fahrenheit. Using coke as fuel, the roasting process burns the sulfur out of the concentrates, leaving a black cakelike material called sinter.

Now containing mostly lead oxide, the sinter is sent to a blast furnace. More coke fuel is added and the blast operation oxidizes any metallic impurities in the sinter as the melted lead settles and is tapped from the furnace.

At this point, our lead is still not quite pure. The final step in the purification of lead is called drossing. Basically, the lead is held in a kettle just above its melting temperature, while lighter impurities are allowed to rise to the top in the form of scum. Zinc is added to react with trace amounts of gold and silver to help it rise to the top as well.

The pure lead is finally cast into ingots, billets, or other useful shapes to be made into the every day items we use in our modern lives. Besides ammunition, we find lead in car batteries, in general-purpose weights, white oxide pigmentation for paint, and radiation shielding. Heck, we used to use it for plumbing and as a gasoline additive.

Without lead, our game would be too expensive to play, and without the modern technology of the smelting process, manufacturers would not be able to keep up with the market demands that keep us supplied with a vital component of our everyday lives. 🎩



COWBOY LONG RANGE

Ever since the first projectile rat-tled down a barrel, the race was on to find the design that would shoot further and more accurately, leaving all these wonderful lead lobbing instruments behind for us to fascinate over and sometimes frustrate the heck out of us, especially if we try to get them to shoot again. I started out my shooting history with flintlocks, but now I really enjoy long-range guns and calibers of the latter 19th century,

which, until Cowboy Action ShootingTM, had long been forgotten by gun and ammo companies. Having a history in my last life as a precision rifleman in the police community, I am rather fussy about groups, and it really amazes me the accuracy that can be attained with blackpowder and without all the fooforall of the modern rifleman.

I have learned over the years I enjoy working up a rifle nearly as much as shooting it. Once the rifle is tuned, some of the fun has gone from it, until it earns me some braggin' rights on the iron buffalo or with an elk or deer. I have turned to the later 1800 tools to do most of my hunting these days, and the cowboy long-range events are my training grounds. The long range events, like the main matches, are filled with like minded individuals that have gone through or are going through the same heartburn (enjoyable heartburn) of making their gun shoot to the best of its design.

Many of the calibers that are the most popular as "buffalo guns" were introduced long after the

herds were gone, but we still have them to shoot the iron buffalo at our long-range matches. One of the best cartridges to choose from is the .45-70. It is the most popular and has

the most information published on it, even though the others are creeping up quickly. It will handle any cowboy long-range event and can be loaded smokeless or blackpowder, whichever you prefer. The .45-90 has become a real popular cartridge and shines at longer ranges. I like the .45-90 for the long-range events and hunting. The other .45's are the .45-110's and .45-120's. Some of the smaller calibers like the .40's are popular with the BPCR crowd, including the .40-65 and .40-77, and the .44's. If you really like a lot of smoke, the big .50's like the .50-140, are great fun.

The most popular of the buffalo guns was the Sharps rifle. It is very popular at the long-range shoot because it still has the reputation of being an accurate long-range gun. There are still some originals around to shoot, but it makes more

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sense to shoot the replicas, and the Shilo Sharps Company of Montana makes a fine Sharps style rifle. Although they are replicas, they still carry the Sharps name and are a fantastic product living up to the reputation. I have shot one a friend of mine owns in .45-70 and found it to be superbly accurate and pleasant to shoot. He isn't a cowboy or a BPCR shooter, but enjoys hunting with the rifle. Sharps makes the rifles in just about any caliber you could need for whatever shooting you want to do with the rifle, target or hunting.

The Italian manufacturers have been making replica Sharps for many years, and I have owned several. They also are superbly accurate and a fine rifle. I have shot Cowboy Long Range matches and placed well with them, and in the hunting field they have provided elk, deer, and bear meat for my household. I presently have one in .45-90 I think is an all round good caliber for a guy that wants to shoot long-range events and hunt. I have starched marmots at near 200 yards with it, and a marmot is a small target in a peep sight!

The cowboy events allow the use of smokeless powders as well as blackpowder and the .45-90 takes to smokeless without excessive pressures, as long as you stay within limits in the loading manual. I started out loading IMR 4198 and could get fast velocities safely with 500-grain bullets, 1800 fps, but found they would tumble or were not very accurate. When slowing them down to around 1500 fps, I found it to be extremely accurate and adequate for any game I hunted. I also could get pretty close to that velocity using blackpowder and be more authentic to what the cartridge was designed around.

Nowadays I prefer to shoot blackpowder in the buffalo guns. It really isn't as inconvenient as many fuss about, especially in the single shot rifles and even the rifle caliber lever guns. I get a little cranky when shooting it in revolvers, and they stop turning before the end of the match and need cleaning. Here I prefer smokeless, unless it is an all black-powder match.

Another rifle that was around back in the day and can be had in original form or replica is the Remington Rolling Block. I found one that was a Number 5 action chambered in 7mm Mauser. The wood was shot, but the action was in great shape. I paid around 300 bucks for it and re-barreled it into a fine shooting .45-90. I also re-did the wood with the help of Brownells. Brownells carries all the parts and tools necessary to undertake this project. It took lathe and machining skills, but I made a real nice Rolling Block like it might have been offered from the Remington Factory in the 1870's. It is more of a hunting rifle to me, so I fitted it with Rough and Ready sights from Montana Vintage Montana Vintage Arms Arms. makes high quality sights of original design and eventually one of their Sharps Sporting Verneer sights made it to the Rolling Block.

Since then, I acquired an original Swedish Rolling Block action for a reasonable price. Remington sold their rights to the rolling block to several European companies and this one dated back to 1879. They made a lot of these rifles, and there are still rifles or actions running around that are vintage. If they are in reasonable shape, they are still good shooters. This Swedish Rolling Block is ready to hunt iron or meat, and I decided to put a Verneer Sight on it. Hunting with a rifle that was around in the late 1800's and probably shot buffalo and other game of the day really adds nostalgia to my hunts.

The replica market has these Rolling Blocks available and are like the replica Sharps rifles; they are just great. Remington also started reproducing the Rolling Block rifle again for the Cowboy Action Shooters, and it is a great rifle. The parts are close enough they may be ordered from Remington or the Italian companies to replace worn parts in the vintage guns that need some TLC. They may require fitting, but I often find replica parts easier to obtain when fixing vintage guns.


The long-range events also include rifle caliber lever guns. Marlin's 1895 Cowboy is a great choice chambered in .45-70. It also works on Idaho black bears. The Winchester 1886 is still available from USRA, and Browning also made an 1886 replica. The 1886 came in a variety of the vintage calibers, and the replicas are following suit. Mine is .45-90 and handles the 330 grain HP lead cast bullet more than adequately for deer, bear, and elk with blackpowder or smokeless. If you are only going to shoot smokeless, the .45-70 can equal the .45-90 ballistically, but the 90 will push the pill a bit faster using blackpowder. I also shoot a Marlin 1895 Cowboy in .45-70. I knocked a black bear on his hind side with a 405 grain Laser Cast bullet. I really like that bullet for the .45-70. I have shot the Marlin in a few long range events, and it is a great choice for blackpowder or smokeless, but I like it more for hunting because it is lighter to pack around and it holds nine rounds in the pipe.

My new project is rebuilding a worn out Winchester '94 in .30-30 and re-chambering it to .38-55. The '94 is a top eject that was made in the late 60's or early 70's and I think it will be a great long range lever rifle that won't have the cross bar safety. I'm thinking it will be a handy deer gun and the long-range event will be just the practice I need to be ready for the upcoming hunting season.

I enjoy hunting with the early cartridge guns mainly because I like the guns and they made meat in the past and can do so again. They are a bit more challenging than modern rifles, but not so much a good hunter will go hungry when hunting elk, deer, or bear. I started shooting the long-range cowboy events to add some shooting fun to the cowboy matches and started hunting with them. Now I really enjoy hunting with these guns and shooting the long-range matches is summer practice with my hunting tools. I have found the loss of meat to bloodshot high power rifle wounds is almost none with these guns, and you can eat right up to

Adding a long-range gun to your Cowboy Action events will increase the fun of a shoot, and once you start hunting with these guns, I doubt you will return to a modern rifle. 3.

The Wild West Show had a great run from its inception in 1883, when William F. Cody, Buffalo Bill, started the first organized Wild West Show, to the present day shows held throughout the USA. Even our own END of TRAIL featured a great Wild West Show when it was held in Norco. Gordon Lillie joined Cody's Show, and then in 1888 he and May Lillie launched their own show: Pawnee Bill's Historic Wild West. May Lillie starred in the show as the "Champion Girl Horseback Shot of the West." Meanwhile, Col. George Miller started the 101 Ranch shows, and Zach Mulhall started Mulhall's Wild West, also in Oklahoma.

The origination of the Wild West Show derived from the interest shown by the people in the East of the rough and wild frontier. The real

west was unknown to them, and they were willing to believe virtually anything. Audiences were captivated by the west, and Wild West shows were the answer to popular demands. Wild West shows preserved the disappearing world of the unsettled and untamed west and brought it to life for audiences around the world. At the turn of the 20th century, Wild West Shows were extremely popular. Within the first two years of the first Wild West Show, over 10,000,000 spectators had witnessed it. The people in the East were eager to enjoy the thrill and danger of the west, but without the risks and consequences that came along with the real west.

The shows generally consisted of reenactments of history combined with displays of showmanship, sharp-shooting, hunts, racing, or rodeo style events. Each show was in the neighborhood of three hours long and attracted crowds of thousands of people daily. The show normally began with a parade on horseback that involved huge public crowds and many performers, including at times, the Congress of Rough Riders. Among the composition of the show were supposed historical scenes, and although the exact scenes changed over time, they were either portrayed as a typical event such as the early settlers defending a homestead, a wagon train crossing the plains, or a more specific event such as the Battle of the Little Bighorn.

In both types of events, Buffalo

Bill used his poetic license to both glorify himself or others while heightening the villainous mischievousness of the bad guys (outlaws or Indians) and to exaggerate each situation for theatrical enhancement. These events included acts known as Bison Hunt, Train Robbery, Indian War Battle Reenactment, and the usual grand finale of the show, Attack on the Burning Cabin, in which Indians attacked a settler's cabin and were repulsed by Buffalo Bill, cowboys, and Mexicans.

A more specific historical event in the show might have been a reenactment of the Battle of the Little Bighorn also known as "Custer's Last Stand." This event was made into a famous act performed in the show, with Buck Taylor starring as General George Armstrong Custer. In this battle, Custer and all men under his direct command were killed. After Custer is dead, Buffalo Bill rides in, the hero, but he is too late. He avenges Custer by killing and scalping Yellow Hair which he called the "first scalp for Custer."

Shooting competitions and displays of marksmanship were commonly a part of the program. Great feats of skill were shown off using rifles, shot guns, and revolvers. Most people in the show were all good marksmen, but many were experts, such as Annie Oakley. Buffalo Bill himself was an excellent marksman. It was said nobody could top him shooting a rifle off the back of a moving horse (we will see about that now

that SASS has incorporated mounted rifle competitions).

The Wild West Shows preserved the legends of the West, but not necessarily the facts, and these legends were popularized and expanded all over the world by the various Wild West Shows. Some of the early stars of these shows included Calamity Jane, Annie Oakley, Tom Mix, Gene Autry, Will Rogers, Bill Picket (William Picket as Woody Harrelson's character in The Cowboy Way recalled). As early as 1905, Zach Mulhall took his Wild West show, including Will Rogers and Mix, to Madison Square Garden. A steer jumped into the New York audience. Mix missed with his rope, but Rogers caught the steer which led to movie stardom for Mix and Rogers.

Unfortunately, the era of the Wild West Show as a top form of entertainment is gone. However, its effects are still present in western films, modern rodeos, or even SASS.

Wild West shows have created a lasting image in American history of the American West. The representation of the West as we see it today was crafted by Buffalo Bill and Wild West shows to be an exaggeration of the reality of the American West, which made it all the more exciting. The Wild West Shows have formed a western myth, which is more often than not confused and mistaken with reality. They have preserved, however accurately, stories of battle and history of the American West.







WHAT'S THE CALL?

With the proliferation of RO's being in the position of a "Range Official," Timer Operator, Spotter, XP Officer, Loading or Un-Table Officer, loading Scorekeeper, I have noticed the same people keep running the timer. By the end of the match, they are really tired following shooters all over the range. Yes, it's a fun job and gives an up front view of the possible mistakes that can happen.

One of the hardest things we have to do as RO's is "let go." So what if a new RO makes a mistake while running the timer? I know I did when I first started. In fact, I still cannot keep up with some of the faster shooters, and if I see them about to shoot on the wrong target, I can't redirect their reactions fast enough to keep them from incurring a procedural. When I am fast enough, I always receive a "thank you." If a shooter doesn't want coaching, they tell me and I keep my trap shut. Usually though, coaching is welcome.

I have RO'ed at END of TRAIL, Regional, State Championships, Territorial Championships, Annual Club Matches, and monthly matches. During that time I have observed the very best and the very worst in Cowboy Action ShootingTM. I'll save those stories and examples for later in the series.

Read the question and decide on an answer. NOW, LOOK IT UP! Were you correct? Was it better to look up the correct answer? Congratulations, and welcome to Cowboy Action ShootingTM Range Official responsibility.

Question 1 - Gimmickry and gadgets are a part of the "Spirit of the Game." I can do whatever I can think of, interpret the stage directions, and shoot the stage that will give me the greatest advantage. I can modify my firearm any way I like, and as long as no one sees it or

questions me about it, it's okay.

Answer - SHOOTERS HAND-BOOK, Page 1, Last paragraph: SPIRIT OF THE GAME, Page 2

Question 2 - You are running the timer. The shooter completes the course of fire. You read them their score off the timer. You then look for your spotters to give you the number of misses and any procedurals. One of your spotters holds up two fingers indicating two misses, no procedurals. You observe the next spotter looking at the first spotter, sees the two misses, and then holds up their two fingers, indicating the number of misses. The third spotter has two fingers raised also indicating two misses.

Answer – Shooters Handbook, Page 8, **Spotters**, items A thru H.

One of the problems we have is a spotter being distracted or just not paying attention. They do NOT know the number of misses. They know they were supposed to hear the bullet strike, see the bullet strike the target face, see the target shake. Something distracted them, and they were unable to fulfill their responsibility. Quickly they look to

the other spotters to obtain the number of misses.

When the stage instructions are read on the 1st stage, admonish your spotters to not look at the other spotters to get the count and just hold up the number of misses on their fingers. Hold up the number of misses they actually saw. If smoke obscured their seeing the target face, then they need to move. If they are talking with the other spotter or anyone, they need to move. No, this isn't written anywhere. However, I have found it very useful in keeping down any questions as to the number of misses. If someone else has another way to alleviate this continual problem, I would be overjoyed to hear from you. ...

THE CAPGUN KID RIDES ... WITHOUT GETTING HIMSELF KILLED DOING IT

Part Two - How Not to Get Started With Riding Lessons

The first horse I ever rode was at a ▲ shelter for which I was a volunteer. The first trail ride I ever went on was at that same shelter. The first time the horse under me took off at a dead run was at that shelter, and the first time a horse bucked on me was at that very same shelter. The first time I learned through the urgency of the moment how to stay on a bucking horse was at a shelter. The only time I was ever thrown off was at that same shelter. And, as you would imagine, the first time I learned about living through getting dumped was at that same shelter. And, I'm still here!

There but for the grace of God go I. As we covered in the first article, this series is for the Buckaroo who wants to get started in learning to ride and may someday bust a cap on a balloon. The major obstacle to getting started is just that ... getting started. I don't think my tenure in the Marine Corps threatened me as much as did those events at the shelter. I knew what I was in for in Uncle Sam's Misguided Children, but when I mounted for the first time and tried

Using a halter rather than a bridle helped me learn how to steer without relying on the reins at the wrong time. But, look how long my stirrups are and how extended my legs are. That's because my stirrups are not the right length and by heels are not down.


My hands are up and my heels are not down. He's confused and I have little control. So I looked down and made it worse

for the first few months to ride, I had no idea what I was doing right and doing wrong. That's because I was trying to start this project by myself. Don't do that if you want to learn about riding and horses.

I thought it'd be like it was in the movies, and I was about thirty pounds overweight. I also thought that a good place to learn for free (key words ... for free) would be a shelter for abused or neglected animals.

Lesson Number One: A shelter is a great place to learn about horses. However, it is no place to learn about

If you're going to work in a shelter, and I recommend that you do, understand it is a great place to do a lot of groundwork. The people who work there are generally what animal activists ought to be ... in other words, they put out and are not just a bunch of empty-headed demonstrators who want to impose rules in environments where they have no tenure or residence or practical familiarity other than their bleeding hearts and misguided intellect. These folks who



run and work in shelters rescue animals, and the efforts they show in caring for them are admirable. In spite of my own inexperience, they tolerated and taught me, so I have the utmost respect for that kind of animal rights activists.

Unfortunately, at least in the shelter I worked for, nobody had the time to teach me the fundamentals of how to ride. Compound that with the notion that most horses in a shelter are there because they have something fundamentally wrong with them (or worse, wrong with the previous owner who abused or neglected them). So, by the end of my first six months of work at the shelter, I understood horse mentality, how they move and don't move, fundamentals of caring for them, walking them, and guiding them from point to point. I understood how afraid they can be of anything that is before them, and how important it is to be consistent in dealing with a horse. I also learned how quickly you can hurt a horse. I spent a whole summer feeling like a dirt-bag because, in saddling up and riding a gorgeous young gelding, I did not have the experience to see that the shoe he was wearing was supposed to heal his ailing legs. I hurt

that horse, and have felt remorse for it ever since. On the other hand, now I am a lot more careful about horses Nevertheless, I still did not learn to ride there. So, here are some of the things I learned whilst staying healthy at the same time.

First, although you should put time in at a shelter to learn how a horse's brain and anatomy work (and, moreover, what happens when they short circuit), do so. Do it BEFORE you try to get in a saddle.

Second, when you think you are ready to learn to ride, look for a place to teach you true western riding, not just show riding. Cowboys used their horses for work, and only afterwards for recreation. Mounted shooting ... if you get that far without being sidetracked by the other joys of riding ... is a variant of that work, just the way rodeo events are.

Get your hands on a book, "The Cowboy At Work," by Fay Ward, University of Oklahoma Press. If I'd had that book from day one, I would have understood what I was looking for in learning how to ride. The book details everything inclusive of training horses for the work a cowboy did and still does. The point here is Mounted Shooting is a derivative of how a working cowboy rides ... steering with the legs, eyes, and one hand to keep the other hand free to do the work ... get it?

If you know what type riding you are looking for, you'll learn where to look for the instructions you need. You may never make it to the point where you own your own horse, or point your sixgun at a balloon, but, by God, you'll surely learn what it was like to ride like a cowboy.

Lesson Number Two: Patience with the horse and patience with the

By the time I finally found a stable that could teach me what I wanted to know, I had already built up a repertoire of mistakes. I had been through a highly qualified instructor who taught me all the wrong techniques. Lemme clarify that. She was a great professional and accomplished rider, but I did not yet know what I wanted. She taught English riding techniques on a western saddle, but I needed to know entirely different techniques. It was my mistake, not the Instructor's. For example, when riding like a working cowboy, you want your boots firmly in the stirrup and sticking just far enough in front of you so you can see your boot tops. That's foundational in western riding for control when the horse stops and is a no-no for the English style.

Leaning slightly back as opposed to forward enough to go butt end over teakettle if the horse stops suddenly is another difference I found. They DO stop suddenly and intentionally try to throw you, especially when their entire careers are carrying around trail riding tourists. Remember, horses see the world differently than we do. Riding English style implies keeping your feet in them tiny, adorable li'l metal stirrups more underneath you and holding the reins with two hands rather than one. In western riding, I rarely held the reins with both hands because I needed a free hand to work with.

By the time I got to a working stable with a real cowboy owner, I had to spend time and money unlearning mistakes and understanding how cowboys have to ride to get their work done. The biggest issue I faced was learning about my balance, and learning to relax in the saddle. It took a long time to figure out that a horse is steered with your eyes, legs, and only as a last resort, your reins. If you yank on the reins as much as you see them do in the movies, you give a horse what is referred to as hard mouth. They become resistant to reins and, therefore, useless.

Lesson Number Three ... It's the collection, stupid.

Collection means comporting yourself in the saddle where you have balance and can manage the horse. When you get it right, it feels natural and right and like you belong there. The most important thing for western riding collection is keeping your heels down in the stirrups.

means the stirrups have to be the right length. I learned you can't lope with the animal without bouncing around and losing collection unless your stirrups are at the right height. I learned if I could stand in the stirrups while the horse was trotting, I'd learn my balance and feel for my collection in a hurry. It ain't easy.

It took a long time to keep my eyes up, and to turn my body and use my eyes in order to get the horse to turn. Forget about turning on a dime and giving you nine cents change. I'm just talking about getting the ol' walnut brain to turn his entire 1200-pound body in the direction you wanna go while on the move. If your eyes are too far up, and you are leaning too far back, you end up riding too stiffly, and it is impossible to keep said collection. If you don't point your eyes, and then your shoulders in the direction you want the horse to go, the critter doesn't understand what you want it to do. Every single one of my instructors told me the horse can actually feel you shifting your eyes and balance right through the saddle and blanket. It will actually lose confidence in you, get a mite scared, and seemingly wander around taking you with it.

Two years into this, although I had finally learned the basics of riding, I had still not yet dusted a balloon with a sixgun.

Dear God, only You know when I'll reach the end of my trail, So I want you to know I'm grateful. A hundred times I've been thrown by life


And a hundred times You've lifted me back in the saddle.


Florida champion marksman Florida champion and sharpshooter.


called "Houston Knights," which I enjoyed thoroughly.


So, why would I even bother mentioning this in The Combon Chronicle? It's really simple – if you like to watch interesting Old West

CIMARRON'S NEW 1858 REMINGTON CONVERSION

Just got Cimarron's new '58 Remy. Why would I be interested? Well first of all, it is just like the gun I got from Cimarron to make the "fancy" gun carried by Chance in "Hell to Pay." That gun started out blued, cap and ball, with wood grips. I took it to Buffalo Brothers for a polished nickel finish and Ivory scrimshawed grips. Since we shoot blanks on the movie set, we also

put a cartridge conversion on the "Chance" gun. It worked pretty well, only every time I had to reload it, I had to take the cylinder out of the gun, load, and reinstall the cylinder. That takes time, so I was asking about a better, faster way of getting the job done. Cimarron proprietor, Mike Harvey, took the issue to heart and gave us a real good alternative conversion. (Almost sounds politically correct, doesn't it?)

The gun is a tried and true '58 Remy with a few new twists. It not only has the charging rod under the barrel, but it also has an ejector rod fitted right in there as well. You hardly notice it. The charging rod is notched to accept the hand of the ejector rod so it is locked in place while the "cap" gun is in use ... a great idea.

The new cylinder slips in just a little differently from the cap and ball cylinder. You tip in the backing plate, which includes the firing pin in the plate frame, and then open the loading gate to slide the cylinder into the pistol frame and backing plate. Real easy, real neat, real slick, and when it comes to reloading cartridge ammo, you just treat it like a cartridge gun! Now for about the price of a nice cap and ball '58 Remy in .44, you also get a .45 caliber cartridge pistol as well because you get both cylinders when you buy this gun off the shelf.

The fit and finish of the gun I tested is quite good. All of the wood and metal match up nicely. I did not take the gun apart, but did not feel any dragging in the action. The trigger was smooth; the break was crisp; and the pull was about average for a gun off the shelf. The balance of the 8" barreled .44/.45 is nice for a gun its size. Cimarron has a 5" barrel that should be available soon. So, you can shoot your .44 in the Plainsman side-matches, and without changing guns, you can shoot

in Classic Cowboy, Frontier Cartridge, or just about any other category with your .45 smokeless or blackpowder cartridges. Very versatile, like all good cowboys ... with either cylinder the gun weighs just about the same.

I took the gun to the range to try out the cylinder on the cartridge conversion first. To make this article a little more relevant to the shooters who will be interested in this set up, I decided to test fire offhand at 7 and then 10 yards. The assumption being that you would like to know what it would shoot like for you at a match.

I was prepared to be impressed, and I was. It seems, since I have not shot "real" .45's for a while, I flinched once on each cylinder. Notice the groupings for four—clearly I have some work to do in the practice department!

To give the gun a good test, I obtained three boxes of ammo, Great Basin, Remington, and once fired reloads. Apparently the gun is not picky, because it shot all three sets of ammo well.

7-yard Shooting

I was fairly steady on the initial four rounds, but had a flyer on the once fired reloads, and on each string I had at least two rounds in one hole on each type of ammo. Since all the





ammo patterned nicely, I decided to move back to ten yards.

10-Yard Shooting

The Great Basin cartridges were 200 grn, RNFP "light" loads for a .45. You could cover three of five holes with a quarter. The next cylinder was the once fired reloads, 225 grn. RNFP and resulted in another nice grouping if I do say so myself. The final cylinder was Remington 225 grn RNFP Remington High Velocity ammo, which also looked great.

Percussion Shooting

The next set of targets would be a challenge for me, as I have not really shot cap and ball before. Those that were at the Huntsman Games this year will remember I tried to shoot the Plainsman Match. I say tried, because I did not quite finish the first stage before I had jammed each pistol and the borrowed single shot rifle; the shotgun went ok ...

For those interested in trying out the Plainsman category and/or Classic Cowboy, I can recommend Cimarron's "new" '58 Remington.

I decided the cap and ball shooting test would be limited to seven yards and three rounds per cylinder for two reasons. (1) I was shooting blackpowder or substitutes indoors and (2) with the blackpowder, I was not sure how much fouling I would have.

Aside from the inability to see the indoor target after three rounds, shooting cap and ball was

fun. I obtained a loading lever block and dropped the cylinder out of the frame into the loading block. I measured 1-cc of powder of each type in three chambers, and topped each with a wonder wad and a .457 round ball. It is easier to do than to describe ... I seated each round, dropped the cylinder back in the frame, and fired. Since I had four different powders, I also tried several different percussion caps just to let you know how it worked out.

Starting with APP FFFg and Remington #10 caps, I placed the front sight at the top of the notch of the rear sight, and on the 10 ring-three rounds two holes! Shooting a little low from POA. Next, I loaded Goex FFg and used RWS #1075 caps—three holes almost touching. Back to subs, I loaded Pyrodex under a CCI #10 cap. First shot was in the six ring; second in the six ring, and third in the 10 ring. I had to go around on two of the caps before ignition.


Finally, I decided to give it my best, so I loaded Goex FFFg under Remington #10 caps. Eight, Nine, and Ten ring you could place a quarter over! Clearly the gun shoots straight and likes blackpowder. It was also clear to me the Remington likes Remington caps and a little more than 1-cc of powder.

The APP was easy to shoot and easy to clean. I cleaned the cylinder and barrel between each powder just to be fair. Looking at the cleaning patches and cylinder, this gun could shoot up to six stages without a tear down and clean. Of course, if you are removing the cylinder to load at each stage, you will have the time and opportunity to clean the cylinder and even the barrel. I would be confident in shooting these guns for the entire

I like the fact the gun meets the five-foot test—just looking at the gun it appears original in design. It is only when you look closely you realize there is an ejector rod, as well as the reloading lever under the barrel. The cartridge cylinder and backing plate blend nicely into the frame and look "original." The walnut grips are standard size, shape, and feel. You could mix this '58 with a Cimarron '58 cap and ball or cartridge gun and not notice a difference.

While at the range several new shooters asked if they could try out the gun, seeing the clouds of blackpowder did draw a lot of attention. No complaints from anyone who shot the gun, but a couple of "modern" shooters allowed as how they would like to take up Cowboy Action ShootingTM just to get the chance to shoot these guns more often. That was about as good a recommendation for a .45 as I could give.

I plan to get a couple of the 5" models to try in Classic Cowboy and in Plainsmen. I have been told once I learn how to set up and lube the guns correctly, I will have a lot of fun shooting them. If the shooting I have already done is any indication, this will be a great new part of Cowboy Action for me. ...

To most of the world, the Colt 1873 Single Action Army revolver is the gun that tamed the Old West. For over a century, the saying "God created man, Samuel Colt made them equal" has been ingrained in us from our earliest youth. Even among today's Cowboy Action Shooters, some insist "Real Men Shoot Colts," while most of the others "only" shoot 1873 Colt Single Action Army clones.

The fact that "Real" Colts are well out of the average person's budget, however, (\$1,800 and up for new Colts, and two to three times that for vintage ones), gave rise to a booming industry in Italy producing replica firearms at very modest prices. One of the foremost of these producers is F. lli Pietta. Alessandro Pietta, otherwise know by his SASS alias of "Alchimista," has been involved in Cowboy Action ShootingTM for quite some time, and is a driving force of Cowboy Action ShootingTM in Europe. (He insists his father is Mr. Pietta, not him. He is Alchimista.) F.lli Pietta has now created an excellent 1873 Peacemaker clone in collaboration with Boyd Davis at EMF. EMF markets this 1873 style revolver under its registered trade name of "Great Western II." Pietta has now taken that one step further and created what I feel will be a classic!

In Italian, Alchimista means Alchemist. The dictionary defines an Alchemist as "one who practices alchemy ... concerned principally with discovering methods for transmuting baser metals into gold." Well, Alchimista has certainly turned steel into gold with his latest offering of the Great Western II. It is a model he personally designed and carries in SASS matches in Europe. It is a 5 1/2" barreled 1873 clone in .45 Colt, with a the longer brass 1860 Army grip and checquered stocks!

ALCHIMISTA'S 1873 COLT WITH 1860 ARMY GRIP FROM EMF

Since it has been a number of years since I have covered any Colt 1873 or its clones, let's cover the history of the original (as that is my custom) before getting into a review of the reproduction.

SINGLE ACTION **ARMY HISTORY**

The westward moving pioneers, Cowboys, and Indian fighting Army carried a wide variety of side arms prior to 1873. These include 1851 and 1860 Colt percussions and their cartridge conversions, 1858 Reming-

ton percussions and cartridge conversions, and even Smith and Wesson #3 American revolvers in both .44 Henry Rim-fire and .44 S&W American. The Army used most of the aforementioned revolvers on the frontier in varying quantities. With the increase in violence between the Native Americans and the encroaching settlers, they were particularly interested in the rapid firepower of self-contained metallic cartridge revolvers. With this

rapid reloading capability, and in an effort to standardize in the early 1870s, the Army sought a durable, robust, and powerful sidearm with which to arm the U.S. Cavalry. Colt submitted the prototype 1873 Single Action Army for trials, along with their new, proprietary .45 Colt cartridge. The Colt offering was a single action, solid frame revolver with a 7 1/2-inch barrel and fixed sights.

This .45 caliber cartridge itself was a vast improvement over any of the revolver calibers in use up to that time. It used a 250 to 255 grain conical lead bullet over 40 grains of coarse (FFG) blackpowder in a balloon head case. This potent revolver round developed well over 400 lbs. of muzzle energy, more than double that of the percussion revolvers, and cartridge conversions. The round was so brutal in recoil, though, that the army eventually reduced the powder charge to either 30 or 35 grains (depending on what source you read) to reduce the recoil. Even in this somewhat reduced load, it was still a potent

stopper, equivalent to a modern .45 ACP in a 1911A1 pistol. (Author's note: current .45 Colt brass has a solid head, and will only take about 35 grains of blackpowder. About twelve years ago, I found some old balloon head .45 Colt cases. I loaded these with 40 grains of FFFG Goex under a 255grain bullet and fired them from a martial marked Henry Nettleton 1873 Colt SAA. Boy, did it buck and roar!!!!) A man

shot with a .45 Colt in the torso generally noticed it immediately, no matter how excited and full of adrenalin he might have been. The fight would almost certainly be over very quickly.

The Colt Single Action Army revolver itself (or 1873 SAA for short) was an improvement over the percussion and cartridge conversion revolvers of the day. The 1873 SAA had a robust solid frame with a top strap (initially developed by Ryder and Remington prior to the Civil War), rather than the inherently weaker strapless, two-part frames of the original percussion Colts and the cartridge conversions of those revolvers. It has very few moving parts, and these, for the most part are very strong. I have had several First Generation Colts, the most recent being a 1902 made .38WCF (.38-40) Single Action Colt. Though very well worn and somewhat loose from many years of use on horseback, it still fired EVERY time I pulled the trigger, and could shoot a tighter group than I could hold!

Also known as the "Peacemaker," the 1873 SAA was an instant success, not just with the Army, but civilians as well. With its simplicity of design and ease of repair, it was a favorite on the frontier with lawman, badmen, gunmen, and cowboys. Initially offered only in .45 Colt. in 1878 it was released in .44WCF (.44-40) and marketed as the "Frontier Six Shooter" to be a companion piece to the popular 1873 Winchester. In 1886, it was also released in .38 WCF (.38-40), also a companion for the newer Winchester 1873's chambered in that caliber. In all, between 1873 and 1941, the Colt SAA was offered in over 30 different calibers from .22 to .455 Webley!

In the mid 1890's, the 1873 Single Action Army was replaced with a .38 Colt double Action model 1892 revolver as standard Army issue. The Model 1892 .38 proved to be such a poor stopper in the Philippine Insurrection and Spanish American War (its dismal performance not equaling a modern .380 auto), that the old Colt Single Action Armies were resurrected and reissued. Many of these had their barrels cut to 5-1/2" to make them handier to use in the dense jungles. These have been commonly "Artillery Models." The 1873 SAA remained popular with the Army until the issuing of the Model 1911 Colt .45 ACP semi-automatics just prior to World War One.

To say General George Patton (of World War Two fame) was a fan of the 1873 SAA is an understatement. In 1916 he accompanied "Black Jack" Pershing on the punitive expe-




A few moments later, as planted, Havey Logar, a k a Kid Carry comes in the front door. Kid Cany's younger brother John stays outside and guards the front door with a Winchester. Kid-Cany advances straight toward Larkely and aggressively slaps him on the shoulder, knocking the bottle out offishand When Landisky time, Kid Carry pariches the noted brawler in the face with all his might.

Luchsky is a grizzled, experienced brawler. He gets the advantage on Kid Carry, harling out op of the smaller man whiletrying to gauge out his eyes. Kid Camy manages to get on top, promoeling the much bigger man until Larkely cries out 'Brough!'

A mixing friend of Landwelly, Thomas Carter, asks Lorie to intercede, saying that Lundusky has clearly had enough Lorie allegedly replies, "Helias not got enough for what helms danetous."

Thoughill finally consinces Kid Carry to let go of Landnsky. The combitants stagger to their feet, and Landricky reaches in his coat and pulls out a semi-automatic pistol (an 1893) Borchardt) As he does, he calls Kid Cauy a coward for attacking him without cause. (Landusky doesn't fire his pistol, one account chins he does, but either the gran misfired or he failed to chamber around)






During his service, Sixkiller dealt with cattle rustlers, train robbers, bootleggers, and murderers. Capt. Sixkiller was murdered on the streets of Muskogee in 1886. 4.











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MERLIN MARAUDERS SATTLE OF ROGUE RIVER 2008

11-13 May 2008 ... Just when you thought it was safe to go skinny-dipping in the Rogue River again ...

Merlin, Oregon - Suddenly, BULLETS, SHOT, POWDER SMOKE, and PINK FEATHERS FILL THE AIR!!!! (I'll explain about the feathers later.)

Once again the Merlin Marauders have desecrated a solemn holiday weekend (Mothers' Day) and scheduled their annual match on the second weekend of May! Having no shame, the Marauders continued their near-endless string of annual matches (well, okay, a string of four) paying homage to actual and imagined events that made the "OLD WEST" what it was ... or at least what we THINK it was, and bowing as well to such famous Western Movies as "3:10 to Yuma" and, of course, our namesake and bellweather movie: "Battle of Rogue River." The Josephine County Sportsman's Park (JCSP), bordering Merlin, Oregon, and lying only a few minutes away from the beautiful Rogue River was the natural place to hold the Marauders' match. Besides, that's where the range is ...

This year, the gang from Merlin attracted 83 shooters to the two-to-three-day, eleven-stage match at JCSP. The park is located at exit #61 on Interstate 5, just three miles north of Grants Pass, Oregon. Shooters came from Washington, California, and all over Oregon to shoot, RV camp, dry camp, motel it, or bunk in with friends for the shoot. Side matches were held on Friday afternoon and included revolver accuracy, lever-action pistol-caliber rifle accuracy, and single-shot long-range rifle events.

In addition, those with a hankering to find out either how well their derringers and pocket pistols worked, or how LUCKY they were, competed in the pocket pistol/derringer "Poker Match." An 11-inch square target had a complete deck of cards imprinted on one side, and from a range of five feet (or less,

depending on how long your arms are), you shot at the blank BACK of the target. After five rounds were shot, the target was turned over and your poker hand was revealed. Prizes were awarded for the best "regular" poker hand and one for the best "five of a kind" hand. The winner with the best "real" poker hand was Tenderfoot Henry with a full house of three ACES and two EIGHTS!! That's right, J.B. Hickok's supposed "Aces and Eights" hand! The "five of a kind" was shot by Speedy McDraw with FIVE ACES! (And NOT all in the same card) Speedy, by the way, upgraded his win of last year's poker match from FOUR Aces!!! A special award was given to Smitty Wesson for shooting a ?-inch, one-hole GROUP with a pocket pistol! Unfortunately, he shot it into a deuce!

The Oregon weather cooperated with us again this year and produced three beautiful days that started a bit chilly in the early mornings, but became the warm, sunny Southern Oregon days the various chambers of commerce all advertise. The stages were pretty straightforward, with some movement in nearly all of them, and props to deal with in most. Lariats were thrown over steer heads. Rubber knives were thrown through outlaws' chests. Bank vaults were blown to smithereens, and pards were rescued from the clutches of a "Hanging Judge."

After six stages on Saturday, a team shoot was held, requiring ten soda cans (full of outdated diet soda) be shot off a 4x4 beam before the beam was "sawed" in two by rifle fire. Three teams of 12 each competed, and "Team Number Two" dropped the beam in 14 seconds! Stages 7 through 11 were shot Sunday morning and an 8-person Top Gun Shootoff, won by Territorial Rider, was held before everyone headed for the indoor range and the awards ceremonies.

Special attention was paid this year to the American Cancer Society's (ACS) Breast Cancer Awareness Program and one of SASS's well-known manufacturers of fine hand-cast bronze spurs, Lindholm Brothers. Wimpy Hank Yoho and Whiney Henry Yoho donated a beautiful pair of specially made spurs to be raffled off during the awards ceremony with the proceeds to go to the ACS. In addition, recent transplants to the Southern Oregon area, Ima Horsinaround and her daughter, Vindictive Violet, have been making and selling cowboy arm garters in pink and black, also donating to the American Cancer Society's Breast Cancer Programs. The PINK FEATHERS? Ima loads them in her shotgun rounds with the shot and keeps our awareness at a high level ... plus, she feels 12 gauge shotguns aren't very FEMININE, and the pink feathers are to remind you that you are dealing with a LADY ... with a shotgun! And speaking of ladies with shotguns, each lady shooter was presented with a special

OKLAHOMA TERRITORIAL MARSHALS HOST LANDRUN

klahoma City, OK – Oklahoma Territorial Marshals hosted the 15th annual Landrun event for 293 ne'er-do-wells, trailhands, madams, drummers, and Civil War veterans who tromped through the Territorial town from April 17 - 20, shooting in side matches, 12 main stages, and team matches. Friday night featured an Oklahoma Country Fried supper at the Gun Club and a Texas Hold 'Em Tournament in the range Saloon. Saturday evening more than 400 people in their costumed best attended the awards banquet at the National Cowboy Hall of Fame elegant ballroom.

Side matches included a trail walk that had shooters searching for targets in the woods, a buffalo shoot at 500 yards, and golf at Fort Courage. In the

Cowboy's version of golf, the shooter starts with a bucket of balls and a bucket of rifle ammunition. Instead of reaching for a driver, the shooter grabs a lever rifle and tries to knock each ball out of a rope circle before time expires.

Stages included being confronted in the privy at the Texas Governor's Mansion by the Lone Star State's finest, fighting sheep rustlers at the Tepee, running into a camp of Comancheros at the Covered Wagon, breaking Big Mama out of the

Territorial Jail, pumping five shots into Montana Dan at the hotel, taking on Goose Terwilligher and the Shortgrass Rangers at the livery, sweet talking Lie N. Dog's gal at the fort, protecting Big Mama's virtue at the adobe wall, running Stonewall off at the mine, fighting off bandits from the train, and saving Querida Kate from the Stillwater ruffians in the saloon. Shooters had a shot at a couple of birds and bonus rabbit for all that trouble. Being able to spin a good yarn also goes a long way to giving some much-needed life to a dusty old range. Maybe a back story doesn't inherently heighten a shooters aim or efficiency, but if a person can't at least smile while pretending to take on the villains of the Old West-well, maybe Cowboy Action ShootingTM is just not for him.


The wiser crews loaded up on rifles to punch holes in the wood, and then let someone use their shotgun to pop the top of the wood off.

The SASS Midwest Territorial Blackpowder Championship April 5-6, 2008

iddletown, OH – "Welcome to the dark side." And with that said, the first shooter at stage one let out a blast of smoke and fire. The inaugural Smoke in the Woods Indiana-Ohio State Championship was conducted less than a year ago. And now, here I was on a cool (real cool) April morning shivering in anticipation of a truly unique event. Blackpowder shooting only! To say last year's event was a roaring success would be an understatement ... so, how were the Big Irons and Middletown Sportsman's Club going





HISTORY:

The Gunnysackers began in 1995 when a handful of Massachusetts shooters from the Verdant Mountain Vigilantes decided they wanted to do some more shooting ... and a little closer to home. Yankee, SASS #266, went to the board of his home shooting club, The Scituate Rod & Gun Club, and suggested they offer Cowboy Action ShootingTM to their members. The board agreed, and the Gunnysackers were formed.

Now, having a club on paper and having it in operation are two different things. A lot of hard work and Yankee ingenuity combined to get the Gunnysackers Club up and running.

For targets, members prowled the resources of local businesses and came up with some usable scrap steel they cut to appropriate Cowboy Action ShootingTM sizes. They supplemented these with targets bor-

rowed from the Vigilantes. For props, they scrounged scrap wood and cardboard and fashioned them into storefronts, horses, cactuses, barrels, and owlhoots.

Through the years they've added more targets, either by buying "ready mades," or making more themselves. Like I said—hard work and Yankee ingenuity!

The Club now numbers 30+ members ... and enjoys lots of participation at their matches from members of other nearby (and not so nearby) clubs. A typical match will have up to 70 shooters. And, it isn't surprising to have shooters show up from 150 miles away. These New Englanders truly support one another.

INTERESTING STUFF:

Because they're located so close to the ocean, it isn't surprising to see seagulls and other shorebirds checking out the shooters from overhead during a match. And the salubrious salt sea breezes are often called upon to clear the air when the Gunnysackers' blackpowder shooters are doing their thing. Incidentally, you can always find a sizeable contingent of blackpowder shooters at any of their matches. The Holy Black is alive and well in Scituate!

A typical Gunnysackers' match goes like this: three well thought out stages in the morning, then a gala 1hour buffet luncheon (no additional cost), followed by three fun-type stages in the afternoon. Now, when we're talking about lunch, here's what you'll find on the menu: Turkey, Ham, Potato Salad. Barbecue, Sloppy Joes, Coleslaw, etc., etc. It's a wonder everyone doesn't have to take a nap following this belly buster lunch! But NO ... it's back to the range to wrap up the shooting, Pards!

The Gunnysackers have a couple unique shoots every year. The Brass Monkey Shoot is held in January, when "it's cold enough to freeze the bells off a brass monkey." Yankee says there's plenty of hot chili on hand to warm shooters up between stages. In their Last Blast of


Summer Shoot, shooters can shoot the entire match as a Plainsman if they choose. The rules are adjusted for those who do to make things equitable for everyone. These features point out the Club goes out of its way to keep the fun in our game.

We mentioned the Gunnysackers boast lots of blackpowder shooters. They also boast a sizeable number of Lady Action Shooters as well. And, these ladies do more than shoot. They're plenty involved in stage designing ... and are physically involved in the State and New England Regional matches.

AT SIGNAL: With shotgun, engage cardboard bulls-eye target with two or more rounds to blast a hole big enough to shoot through. Move to doorway and make shotgun safe. Draw first revolver and, THROUGH YOUR HOLE IN THE BULLS-EYE TARGET, engage P1 through P4 in a CONTINUOUS NEVADA SWEEP, using second revolver as needed for a total of 10 rounds. Holster. Move to window, retrieve rifle, and engage R1 through R4 in a NEVADA SWEEP. Make rifle safe. Retrieve shotgun, move to right fence, and engage S1 and S2 in any order. Move to unloading table.

Dear Lucky Bill,

This is a particularly embarrassing problem for me. It is obvious I am a Cowboy Action Shooter. But I am also a LTTC, long time tobacco chewer. Herein lies my problem. 
Secret Sam

ALCHIMISTA'S 1873 COLT WITH 1860 ARMY GRIP FROM EMF...

dition into Mexico chasing after the bandit Pancho Villa. Patton used his personal 1873 .45 Colt sidearm in a stand up, in the street, gunfight straight out of the Old West with several of Pancho Villa's bandit band. He used it to kill several of Villa's men, including an important lieutenant, who were charging directly at him with guns blazing. Patton stood his ground in the middle of the street, dropping them with his SAA. After returning to camp with the bodies of the deceased banditos across the hood of his car like trophy deer, Patton was thereafter referred to as "my Bandito" by General Pershing. Later, during WW II, while Patton pushed the German Army back with his armored division, he carried an ivory gripped 1873 Single Action Army all the way across Europe.

EMF'S ALCHIMISTA .45 Colt

The Italian firm of F.lli Pietta was one of the primary pioneers in making Old West revolvers. They started with blackpowder revolvers like the 1851 and 1860 Colts, and the 1858 Remington revolvers. They are now among the leaders of the industry in manufacturing cartridge revolvers for Cowboy Action Shooting with their current line of 1873 Single Action Army Colt clones. These were created as a collaborative effort with EMF Company of Santa Ana, California as the Great Western II. EMF's President Boyd Davis (Wild Bunch member

General Grant, SASS #2) foresaw the problems and eventual availability issues arising from Beretta's buyout of Uberti. This was one of the factors that motivated the General into developing and marketing the Pietta manufactured Great Western II. They have now greatly improved quality control of Pietta revolvers since the pre-collaboration production standards. Piettas are now very comparable in quality to Uberti and even some Colts I have seen, though they are far less than the cost of even a basic Colt 1873 SAA.

When the Alchimista Great Western arrived, I was not disappointed. It is gorgeous! It is a 5 1/2" barreled model, with a deep, lustrous polished blue finish. The fit and finish is uniformly excellent. It has the "smokeless" style frame with transverse mounted, spring loaded, cylinder pin retaining screw of the post-1898 models. It also has the "smokeless" crescent style ejector rod. The metal to metal fit is perfect, as is the metal to wood fit.

The grip is the most interesting aspect of the "Alchimista" Great western in that it has the long, slender, brass frame grip of the 1860 Army Colt mated to the 1873 Colt frame! (There is historical precedent for this, as about 12 years ago at a high-end gun shop, I personally handled an old, first generation 1873 Peacemaker that had an original 1860 Army grip on it.) It has nicely checquered one-piece walnut grips. When you first pick it up,

your initial reaction is "WOW! What a nice feel!" The 1860 grip is longer and slimmer than the traditional 1873 Army grip. While not quite the 90-degree angle of the Bisley model Colts, it definitely points better and more naturally than the revolvers with the standard 1873 grip. As one of my main match guns is a Pietta 1860 Army with a .45 Colt Kirst Konverter, the "Alchimista" Great Western II with its 1860 grip would be a perfect revolver to pair with the 1860.

The timing of the Great Western is right on the money. This model also has a different trigger than the standard Great Western II. It is wider and set back more, allowing for a larger finger in the not overly large SAA trigger guard. The trigger breaks at 2-1/2 lbs, crisp with no creep. This is great for keeping it on target while squeezing off a round. The action is exceptionally light and smooth, enabling for quick cycling of the hammer. The front sight is robust, and the rear sight notch is ample, giving it a great sight picture. This gives it very quick target acquisition.

How does the Great Western "Alchimista" do as far as shooting? Well, unfortunately I wasn't able to actually shoot my sample. I had to send it back for its debut at the Shot Show. I have test fired Great Western revolvers before, however, and they tend to be above average in the accuracy department. This is probably because of their great sight picture,

and their generally excellent trigger pulls and actions. I know you won't be disappointed. They will be available in three calibers: .45 Colt (which will also chamber and fire the .45 Schofield and .45 Cowboy Special rounds), .44-40, and .357 Magnum/.38 Special. That variety should make just about everyone happy. For now, at least, it is available only in blue finish. If you want nickel or engraved, it would involve a special order. As for barrels, it is only being manufactured with the 5 1/2" barrel. That's okay, though, as that is the most popular barrel length in Cowboy Action ShootingTM.

It should be fairly obvious to most people that the Great Westerns, in general, are a much better buy for the buck than the "Real" Colts. While I do prefer to try to "buy American," when possible, that is not always possible in this global economy. The EMF Great Western is made by Pietta's Italian craftsmen in Brescia, a region famous for making guns since prior to the Revolutionary War. The Great Western with the 1860 grip in .45 Colt (or either of the other calibers) would be a good addition to anyone's Cowboy Action ShootingTM battery. Once you hold it and feel the balance, it will sell itself!

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
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
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
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
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YES, COSTUMING IS IMPORTANT...

or simply fantasy gunfighter, it's the costuming that sets us apart and provides the Old West atmosphere that defines our sport. This Old West atmosphere takes us all back 130 years to what many think was a simpler time ... where a person's word was their bond, a hand shake was a contract, riding for the brand was an expected measure of loyalty, men were polite to women and kids, and the kids respected their elders. It's this attitude and shared experience in a world where these values are rare that led to the extended family we all feel within the folds of Cowboy Action Shooting TM .

A disturbing trend has recently been noted in many clubs across the country. Club officials and members are participating in club shooting activities in absolutely minimal and inappropriate attire. Anything less than modern "ranch wear" certainly falls into the realm on "inappropriate." Even if one considers a local club's monthly match as "only" a "practice" match, if you're not "suited up," you're not playing our fantasy game. There are plenty of other action shooting sports with absolutely no costuming requirements. If that's your thing, you're playing the wrong game.

I would encourage clubs to even consider work-party days as "ranch activities," and dress accordingly. I also encourage folks participating in actual "practice" sessions to do so with at least a cowboy hat, jeans, and a long-sleeved shirt. Be a "cowboy" while improving your techniques!

There have been suggestions to somehow reward those clubs that do the best job of encouraging their members to stay in costume and play our fantasy game. That's way too difficult an assignment. For those clubs that don't have enough fortitude to insist their members "play the game" in costume, they've not found the "Spirit of the Game" we all seek.

An addendum from Cat Ballou...

For many of our lady shooters, dressing up in costumes is what attracted us to the sport to begin with. However, shooting in stretchy Lycra tops, tank tops, and designer jeans is, frankly, a "no-no". If it's hot, wear an appropriate cotton camisole. If you must shoot in pants, wear the canvas duckins' that are available in women's sizes from our many fine vendors.

because they could "possibly" violate another safety rule. This is just one case in point, but other situations exist where one action by a shooter potentially creates multiple rule violations. Many of these situations have proven to make enforcement difficult and sometimes just muddy the waters in determining which or how many penalties to assess.

Part of the RO Committee's job is to act as an oversight committee on rules. In the past, the committee has found conflicts and poor wording in the SASS Shooter's Handbook and RO materials and fixed them if it was within their scope or asked the Territorial

Governors to vote on the identified changes. During the next few months I am asking the RO Committee to identify the "bad rules" and penalties we have allowed to slip into The SASS Shooter's Handbook, the SASS Range Operations Basic Safety Course, and the SASS Range Officer Training Course. At the conclusion

of their findings, an agenda item will be presented to the Territorial Governors for voting. This should make the process as streamlined as possible and help clean up many of the conflicts, redundant penalties, and the like. I think a complete review of our materials is long overdue and look forward to the RO Committee's findings. ••

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
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
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
