Tuesday and Wednesday. In keeping with our theme, we were lucky to have the school taught by the very lovely and very skilled Holy Terror, SASS #15362. We had a full class and in keeping with our ladies' theme, this was the largest group of women Holy Terror had ever taught.

Wednesday was also main match day for the match officials and vendors. Once again, the day was hot and humid with temperatures hovering in the high 90's. This year was special because a brand-new shooter joined us for this marathon match. 10-year old Callous Cade, SASS #75231, shot his very first match! He kept up with us and did it shooting .38's and a hammered 12 gauge! His father (that would be me!) was very proud of him.

Competitors also had a chance to test their marksmanship skills at our old-fashioned shooting gallery using lever action and pump .22 caliber rifles. This event was so popular we set it up again on Sunday before the Top Gun Shoot Off.

Thanks to the hard work from the many volunteers, both main match days' scheduling went like clockwork. Everything started on time, and there were no bottlenecks at any of the stages. Toledo Kid, SASS #35150, and Saguaro Jack, SASS #33974, did a superb job again on the stage writing. Every stage was a pleasure to shoot with big, up close targets and no procedural traps at all. That didn't mean the shooters didn't have any challenges though. Stage 8, appropriately titled, "Just a Game" gave each shooter the opportunity to shoot a bonus target with the rifle. The catch was that an extra round needed to be loaded on the clock, but only after shooting the rifle targets. Hitting the bonus target entitled the shooter to one ticket in a closed raffle for a significant prize. Missing the target did not count as a penalty. 



I hardly seems possible, but The Coubou Chronicle is now 20 years old! It seems like only yesterday when "cut and paste" meant exactly that. The early Chronicle was typed on a Tandy/Radio Shack TRS-80, one of the first "home computers"! The articles were printed on the dot matrix "line printer" sold by the same folks. These articles were printed, cut into columns by hand, and then the "jig saw" exercise of laying out the paper began. All the photos were shot in black and white and turned into half-tone images. Just finding someone who would even process the black and white film was challenge in those days. (Just finding someone who will process any kind of film can be a challenge today!)

As most of you know, Cowboy Action began in the late '70's when The Judge and a few others decided to play their action shooting game using "cowboy" guns. Many of the basic rules of our game were developed early on, but some of the standards and practices were developed over time as everyone began to appreciate the nuances of the sport.

The first END of TRAIL was held in the spring of 1982. The rules were still very loose, but the small number of people involved allowed word of mouth edicts to work just fine. It wasn't until late 1986 the evolving Wild Bunch began to consider the possibilities of a large, formal organization. If SASS was to become a national (or international!) organization, it was recognized a membership-wide newspaper was needed.

At the time I was editing and producing the West End Gun Club's (San Bernardino, California) newsletter every month. I also had computer and scoring skills, so I was invited to join the Wild Bunch and be the newspaper's editor. One of the first tasks was to develop a name for the paper. We held a "name the newspaper" contest. Paydirt, SASS #411, one of the very early SASS authors (half a dozen excellent cowboy novels), came up with the winning name ... The Cotubog Chronicle.

The first issue was published January 1988 and is included as an insert in this edition. The initial schedule was quarterly, and most of the time we published four issues a year (but not always!). Since I had the camera and took most of the pictures and wrote nearly all the articles, my photo appeared many, many times in those early Ohronicles. So many times, in fact, folks would comment, here comes another "Tex edition" of the paper!

In those days it was always a challenge to collect and process the material. Quite often when a match was reported, the entire results list was included! As time went on, more members began submitting material for the paper, and the Chronicle's real estate became much tighter. Today, only the winners are generally reported. Interestingly, the early END of TRAIL issues often don't even identify the overall winners!

Advertising is the life-blood of any publication, and The Combog Chronicle is no exception. In the early days, there was none. While every effort was always made to produce the very best document possible, cost and economy were always issues. Today better than half the page space in the paper is devoted to advertising. This not only pays for the printing and mailing of the paper, it has become "the" place for SASS cowboys to shop! 1880's cowboy gear is a niche market, and The Combog Chronicle is *the* place to advertise those wares.

The paper continued to be published quarterly until 1998 when the schedule was changed to every other month. Cat Ballou had long since thrown her hat in the ring and was actively involved in editing and reviewing the material. And, it's a good thing! The workload was tremendous!

But, it gets worse! In 2000 the decision was made to take the paper monthly!

Contrary to popular belief, the current editorial staff still consists of only Cat and I. She handles the initial processing (the hard part!) and does the allocation of material to each edition. Adobe Illustrator is our layout guy and ends up working around the clock the last three weeks of each four-week cycle. Mac Daddy does the graphics for both SASS and The Comboy Chronicle, and Donna Oakley keeps the advertisers in the paper. It's a tiny crew, but the critical contributor to the effort is the SASS membership itself! If it weren't for the members turning in letters and opinions, writing about guns and gear, or reporting on their club or annual match activities, we wouldn't have a paper! SASS doesn't pay for these submittals, we couldn't afford to.

Every newspaper in the land, and certainly those in the 1880's reported the "news" with a point of view. "What's the point of having a newspaper if you can't tell folks what to think?" ... and The Comboy Chronicle is no different. For years the Judge had an "In My Opinion ..." column. Currently, Coyote is starting his Coyote Droppings column, and the Editor-in-Chief has never been reticent about voicing opinions and sounding the alarm when things didn't feel right. But, as you can well imagine, whenever an opinion steps on someone's toes, the response is immediate and generally in your face. That just comes with the territory. All editors require a thick skin! I just never imagined how thick!

That first Chronicle was only eight pages long and now the paper is generally 108 pages every month. Modern computer technology now allows us to do most of the Chronicle work via email files, and even the newspaper's printer receives the finished product via a special website.

It's been a remarkable 20-year journey. We hope you enjoy reading The Comboy Chronicle, Volume 1, Number 1, January 1988.

FROM THE DESK OF THE GENERAL

s many of you know, I attended Athe Fourth Annual European Cowboy Action Shoot, "Days of Truth," in Italy last August. It was great as indicated by Lonesome Dove's front page article in The Comboy Chronicle last month. During this event I called a meeting for a representative from each of the sixteen countries present and a translator as necessary. The purpose of this meeting was to determine how all these folks really felt about SASS. I was delighted to find we are held in high regard, and it was unanimously felt SASS should be more involved in Europe. A meeting was subsequently held during the SASS Convention in Las Vegas last week to determine an appropriate course of action.

It was decided The First European Annual SASS Cowboy Action Regional will be held August 14 - 16, 2008 in Mazzano, Italy. This will be the first 100% SASS match held in Europe and will follow the exact same standards as all State and Regional SASS events in the United States. This match will be under the direct control of SASS. The Elder Katie from Washington has agreed to be Match Director. I, as President, will be there to assist and promote SASS throughout Europe. The SASS Handbook has now been translated into Italian, German, Polish, and French. These translations will soon be up and available on our website. Because of unique rules relating to firearms in various countries, minor changes to the basic Handbook have been necessary. We now have about eight months to get this first European SASS Regional event promoted by all the clubs in Europe. It is our hope to have this annual event held in a different European country each year. *J*.



any believe the 2008 Presidential Campaign denotes the first time in American history a woman has run for President of the United States. Not so, dear readers. A woman was a Presidential candidate 136 years ago, and her running mate was a famous ex-slave and abolitionist. Who was this woman and how did this happen in the years before women even had the vote?? Her name was Victoria Claflin Woodhull (1838-1927), and she was a colorful and notorious symbol for women's rights, free love, and labor reforms in the nineteenth century. She also was the first female stockbroker, a noted spiritualist, an author of several books, and a newspaper editor-all in a time when women were expected to stay home, run a household, bear children, and defer to their husbands' opinions.

I first studied Victoria Woodhull over thirty years ago when I returned to college for a degree in American history and even I forgot about her until all the media attention focused on Hillary Clinton's bid for the Presidency jogged my dusty memory.

Victoria Woodhull was born to a poor, but genteel, family in Homer, Ohio. Her father was a lawyer and her mother was interested in spiritualism. In fact, her mother immersed Victoria and her sister, Tennessee, in the spiritualism movement, and as children, Victoria and "Tennie" gave demonstrations of spiritualism to enraptured audiences.

At fifteen, Victoria married her first husband (she had three during her lifetime), the 28-year-old Dr. Canning Woodhull, by whom she had two children. However, she continued to travel with her family in a medicine and fortune telling show, and made her first fortune as a highly successful magnetic healer.

Her ideas about free love probably originated with her first mar-



riage, as Dr. Woodhull was an alcoholic and a womanizer. In the 19th Century women bound into unhappy martial unions had few options for escape. Any woman who divorced was stigmatized and often ostracized by society. Victoria believed women should have the choice to leave unbearable marriages, and she rallied against the hypocrisy of married men having mistresses and other sexual alliances. Even though she advocated "free love," it was not an advocacy of promiscuity. Rather, Victoria believed in monogamous relationships, with a woman's right to choose her husband or lover.

In 1868, Victoria and her sister went to New York City and attracted the attention of financier, Cornelius Vanderbilt, because of his interest in spiritualism. With Vanderbilt's backing, Victoria and Tennie opened the first female Wall Street brokerage firm, Woodhull, Claflin and Company in 1870, and she made her second fortune. New York papers hailed the sisters as the "Queens of Finance" and the "Bewitching Brokers."

In May 1870, she and Tennessee established a paper "Woodhull & Chaflin's Weekly," which was published for the following six years. The paper became notorious for publishing controversial opinions on taboo topics. The paper advocated women's suffrage, short skirts, spiritualism, free love, vegetarianism, and licensed prostitution. By this time, she had divorced Dr. Woodhull and married her second husband, Colonel Blood.

At first, leaders of the 19th century women's suffrage movement were suspect of Victoria's motives. But when she addressed the House Judiciary Committee in 1871 and argued that women already had the right to vote all they had to do was use it—since the 14th and 15th Amendments granted that right to all citizens—suffragists like Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton saw her as their newest champion, and she catapulted to the leadership circle of the suffrage movement.

In 1872, at Apollo Hall in New York City, she was nominated for President of the United States by the newly formed Equal Rights Party. Former slave Frederick Douglass was nominated for Vice President. While many historians and authors agree Woodhull was the first woman to run for President, some have questioned the legality of her run due to one of the following reasons:

- 1) The government declined to print her name on the ballot.
- 2) She was under the constitutionally mandated age of 35.
- 3) She didn't receive any electoral or popular votes.4) Women couldn't legally vote.
 - She was a woman. (Some of her contemporaries believed because she was a woman she was not a citizen, and therefore, not entitled to vote. Some believed women were considered citizens, but the states had the right to limit the franchise to males only.)

In 1876, she divorced her second husband, and less than a year later, she left for England to start a new life.



She appeared as a lecturer at St. James Hall in London in December 1877 with her lecture on "The Human Body, the Temple of God." Present at the lecture was wealthy banker, John Biddulph Martin, the man who would become her third and last husband on October 31, 1883. From then on, she was known as Victoria Woodhull Martin, and under that name she published a magazine called "The Humanitarian" from 1892 to 1901. Victoria Woodhull even embraced the new technology of the 20th Century, as she became a patroness of aviation, offering a prize of \$5000 in 1914 for a transatlantic flight.

Upon widowhood, Woodhull gave up the publication of her magazine and retired to her English country estate where she died on June 10, 1927.

Victoria Woodhull was truly a remarkable woman 100 years ahead of her time.

Coyote Calhoun SASS #201

t is a brand new year, and as promised, here is my new column. I have had a lot of positive feedback from readers concerning last month's column, and everyone seems to be excited about the new programs SASS will be implementing. Also, I have had a lot of feedback on the name "Coyote Droppings." The name is resurrected from a column I did in my club's newsletter several years ago, and believe me, I have heard all the jokes!

LIONS, TIGERS, AND POWER FACTORS, OH MY!

So, I guess you have heard the Wild Bunch is instituting a "Power Factor" that will go into effect at END of TRAIL this year. Just the mention of "Power Factor" brings a grimace from most shooters, but in reality a power factor is the only way to address the problem of light loads without leaving a door open for other problems to surface. Ammunition standards for Cowboy Action ShootingTM were set in the early days to ensure all competitors' loads were in a safe velocity range for shooting at the various types of targets used in Cowboy Action Shooting[™]. Beginning ammunition standards were set at a maximum of 1000 fps for revolver ammunition, 1400 fps for rifle ammunition, and a minimum of 650 fps for both rifle and revolver ammunition. During the Territorial Governor Summit of 1999, the minimum standard was deemed arbitrary and was set aside until testing could provide a better solution. After testing, input from various sources, and a study of current trends, the Wild Bunch has determined the time has come to re-establish a new minimum standard for ammunition used in Cowboy Action ShootingTM.

Beginning at END of TRAIL 2008, the minimum standard for ammunition used in all smokeless categories at State, Regional, National, International, and World Championship competitions shall be not less than a minimum power factor of 60, and no velocity may be less than 400 fps. The maximum velocity standard for revolvers will remain as 1000 fps. The maximum velocity standard for rifles will remain as 1400 fps. Buckaroo Category shooters choosing to use centerfire ammunition in handguns and/or rifles must also meet all power factor and velocity requirements. Pocket Pistols and Derringers are exempt from the Power Factor and velocity requirements.

With Coyote Calhoun

Power Factors are simply calculated by multiplying the bullet weight times the velocity, and then the resulting number is divided by 1000. Some examples are:

100 gr bullet traveling at 600 fps has a power factor of 60 (100x600)/1000=60.00 (Continued on next page)






Power factors are the simplest and easiest way to maintain a minimum ammunition standard and allow competitors to shoot the weight bullet or velocity with which they feel comfortable.

At the discretion of the Match Officials, the procedure to check power factors will be random for suspect rounds. Any challenges to power factors will be administered using the process listed within the SASS ROII Materials under the "Appeals, Challenges, and Protest" section. If a competitor is checked, they will be asked for five rounds, preferably from a revolver already loaded at the loading table. One round will have the bullet pulled and weighed. The other four rounds will be fired across a chronograph using the competitor's firearm. The muzzle of the revolver should be raised to 80 degrees and then lowered each time prior to firing through the chronograph. If any one of the four rounds meets or exceeds the calculated 60 power factor and velocity requirements, the competitor's loads will be considered as legal. If all rounds fired through the chronograph measure less than the calculated 60 power factor and/or velocity requirements, the competitor will be given a 30 second Spirit of the Game penalty for the last stage completed. Any subsequent stage(s) shot with the same ammunition will result in the same penalty per stage.

To assist clubs and matches checking power factors, Dillon Precision has created a "Chronographing Kit" just for SASS Clubs. It consists of the CED Millenium 2 chronograph, a D-Terminator Digital Scale, and a kinetic bullet Puller (stock #09998). The cost is \$309, which is a 15% discount over ordering each item separately. A tripod can be included with a similar discount.

It is my feeling this rule will not have an effect on very many shooters. It is designed to give the shooter every benefit of doubt. All shooting disciplines that use handguns require some sort of power factor, and this is, by far, lower than all. This decision was not reached easily or taken lightly by the Wild Bunch. The decision was made to stop the race for lighter loads and was made to affect the fewest number of shooters. The decision is a good one, and I hope that now we can get on with shooting and having fun and put this issue behind us.

The Marshals began with five

sheriff spied them and a gunfight broke out. He didn't want to arrest them; he did want to annihilate them. How dare they do this in his town! The lady screams and is tossed aside as one of the bank robbers grabs for his shotgun. The blackpowder hanging in the air from the pistols and shotguns blur each shooter's vision, whether villain or the law. In the end all the wrong people lay "dead" on the street, and the sheriff stands over them ... he yells "clear!" and they all stand up, brush the dirt and straw from their pants and take a bow as the crowd vigorously applauds. "We are the U.S. Territorial Marshals, California."

The Marshals, as they are commonly referred to, are a 501(c)(3)

SASS Waddies who met at the 1995END of TRAIL. By the following year, the U.S. Territorial Marshals -Norco group (who also used the name, Lonigan's Rangers) was busy robbing the stagecoach line as it ran through town at END of TRAIL in Norco, California. In April 1996, the group reorganized and became the U.S. Territorial Marshals - California. Some of their regularly performed re-enactment skits bear interesting titles such as "The Messenger," "The Wedding," "The Bank Robbery," and "Code of the West." The excitement runs high for those who participate in the gunfights, whether from actual re-enactment plays of historical accuracy or vignettes with a twist (Continued on next page)

that everyone thought would be fun for the players and the audience. The visual experience is drawn directly from Old West books or western fictional movies.

The group is managed by a cadre of five Directors, who pick successors for vacant director positions from the membership, when their number goes below five. These five key Marshals meet regularly and discuss the direction the club will move in terms of new members, more or less activities in the year, special gettogethers and practice sessions, which activities will get priority, the cost of yearly membership, and make decisions such as whether to add amplified sound to the key players. Of priority concern is whether any money spent on the group will take away from resources committed to the charity groups the U.S. Territorial Marshals' (USTM) support.

Membership may vary from 35 to 50 members. There are currently 29 families of all sizes in the group. Some are single adults; others participate as husband and wife and sometimes include the kids. Other important components of the group are satisfied with having a safety manual and also a safety officer who checks all ammo and clears the guns after each skit. Several in the group who have reloading equipment make the reloads provided to those performing in the skits. Obviously, that means policing the shells after each skit is over. An additional element for creating group solidarity is the Marshal's Star, an e-newsletter sent out to members each month. The Marshals' "day jobs" range from attorneys, apartment owners, management, public service, K-12 and college Instructors, to owners of their own businesses. Often that is just the job to pay the bills and make USTM come to life in a figment of their imaginations called the Old West. Some members are involved in SASS competition shooting, but most focus on the historical aspects of Cowboy Action ShootingTM through re-enactment. It's making the past come alive to the next generation that is so satisfying.

The Marshal's portable town is a work of love by the guys who built it and haul it to re-enactment locations. The town is made up of 1/3size storefronts made with plywood and painted to represent different components of a real Old West town. Many storefront replicas are of buildings such as a cottage, the bank, the jail, and, of course, the saloon. Depending on where the reenactment is to be held and the amount of members willing to help put up the town with brute strength, the main street in front of the town storefronts can increase or decrease in size by several "buildings." The Marshals often haul parts of their "created" town to Las Vegas to add that extra western seasoning to SASS conventions. Doing re-enactment skits indoors is the really difficult one. It is problematical to do a re-enactment skit without the excitement stirred by the loud bang of the guns. The effect indoors is not quite what any Marshal would want at an indoor venue, but the SASS conventions are a must for many of the USTM members who participate.

The Marshals are mainly "hired guns" to raise money for charity. The group is involved in activities more than just at SASS events. Most of the paid performances are at county fairs, fall harvest festivals, and special events, such as the Hugh O'Brian birthday party at the Gene Autry Museum, or a fundraiser for cancer by noted celebrities at Paramount Studios. The Marshals regularly present educational programs to children and teenagers to ensure the history and values of the real Old West don't die. At the beginning of almost all performances, a gun safety demonstration is presented for the audience. Of course, when you are outdoors, the most difficult dilemma is to figure out how to fall when you get shot. The best a shootist can ask for is not to land on those 50 cent-size rocks; they hurt! "I'm just getting to old for this" is often the complaint laughingly said behind the scenes when all gather to talk about the skit and make fun of the blunders that only they know about. How it was planned and how it was executed are two different things. There are written versions of the scripts, but they are loosely followed, as long as the punch line gets a laugh or applause.

Heed the Call to Battle! On to Gettysburg!!

Pennsylvania, late August 2007 - A faint whiff of powder smoke clutched the air ... the distant timbre of cannon and musket fire soundly pealed ... the cries of battle and the wail of the fallen resonated within our souls! It was time for Kincaid's Irregulars to stop their mundane daily activities and rush to Timonium, Maryland to reform the unit and repel the attack! (Okay, we're 144 years too late ... it's the THOUGHT that counts ... Right?).

Once again gathering under the "leadership" of Ellsworth T. Kincaid and his long-suffering bride, Lady Stetson, "Kincaid's Irregulars" began yet another adventure into the past in late August. This time it was to enrich our comprehension of the battles fought at Gettysburg, Antietem, and Harper's Ferry before boarding the beautiful stern-wheel river steamer American Queen for fourdays and nights floating serenely down the Ohio River from Pittsburgh to Cincinnati, with stops at Wheeling and Point Pleasant, West Virginia, and Maysville, Kentucky.

Commandeering the historic Gettysburg Hotel for our headquarters in Gettysburg, PA (or so it must have seemed to the other guests of the hotel), we advanced to the battlefields by motor coach under the tutelage of one of the most fascinating guides I, or any of us for that matter, have ever had the privilege of listening to, Jim Hueting. His delivery and depth of knowledge is unsurpassed! Way beyond "dates and events," Jim educated us in the "whys and wherefores" of Gettysburg. Reading history and studying textbooks of battles and skirmishes that took place here so many years ago doesn't really prepare one for standing at the Wheat Field where countless died in so short a time; walking where Pickett's Charge took place, and just BEING on the fields of the battles that made so drastic a change in our country's (Continued on next page)

history. We learned why Gettysburg was the "High Tide" for the Confederacy. Though we men were dressed in the wool uniforms of both blue and gray and our ladies were dressed in appropriate hoop skirts in the heat of August, with sweat running down our faces, (just the guys ... the ladies only "glowed"), we sensed and appreciated but a small portion of what those "Bluebellies" and "Johnny Rebs" felt in 1863.

Evenings during this trip were spent in the usual Kincaid Irregulars' manner ... eating in historic inns such as the Farnsworth House (wonderful game pie and "goober soup") and the Dobbin House, eating (and participating) at an amusing Civil War murder-mystery dinner theatre, and eating at any place that would seat over two dozen of us in full period regalia. Another evening activity that is becoming a regular part of the festivities is ... no, not that ... a "ghost walk." This time, with a lantern-bearing guide, we trod the "haunted" campus of Gettysburg College to learn of the "siren of the bell tower" who tempts young men into leaping to their deaths with her, as well as the Civil War Medical Operating Theatre in the basement of one of the administration buildings that appears on dark and gloomy nights if you press the wrong button on the elevator.

On our visit to Harper's Ferry we explored the area of the Arsenal and surrounds, where abolitionist John Brown made his last stand, forted up in, of all things, the local fire station! It was Union officer Lt. Col. Robert E. Lee and a contingent of Marines to the rescue to foil Brown and his cohorts!

The Antietam locality was picturesque, yet it was here the bloodiest day of the Civil War was fought. Walking the Cornfield, where most of the fighting took place, and Bloody Lane was heartrending. Again and again, guide Jim Hueting took us back in time.

On the day of our leave, President Abraham Lincoln joined us after breakfast and entertained us with his life's story up to the Gettysburg Address. Then, surprisingly, Major General Kincaid stepped forward. He and President Lincoln called each of our names and we, individually and as couples, stepped forward to be inducted, officially, into "Kincaid's Irregulars" for gallantry and meritorious service.

Sadly, we bid Gettysburg a fond farewell and traveled west, visiting the Flight 93 Memorial and finally arriving in Pittsburgh on the afternoon of 29 August. That evening we had the privilege of dining with Lady Stetson's family (they're all alike! But that's a compliment!). The next day we toured the beautiful city of bridges and her mansions. That afternoon we boarded the luxurious American Queen and, as usual, created a bit of a stir among the rest of the passengers (who were dressed outlandishly, not at ALL appropriate for a refined, nineteenth-century voyage on the great Ohio River-and THEY were staring at US!!!).

The "steamboatin' down the river" was smooth and peaceful as all

our river excursions are, with the additional feature of traversing the many "locks" to accommodate the river's varying "heights." The American Queen, Flagship of the Majestic America Line fleet, transmits very little, if any, sensation of motion while making her runs, and provides an elegant, peaceful opportunity to just put your feet up and relax, read a good book, watch a movie in the ship's theatre, grab a cocktail, or just wait for the next meal to be served. She is larger than the Delta Queen steamboat we've cruised on in the past, but every bit as Victorian in nature as her predecessor. In fact, the American Queen is the quintessential "floating palace" Mark Twain referred to in his writings.

The next morning found us in Wheeling, WV where we explored Victorian Old Town and visited the city's Civil War past. Point Pleasant, WV was our next port of call. Here we toured the farms and Appalachian culture and learned about the area's involvement in the *(Continued on page 62)*

With the arrival of the railroad in 1881, the population of El Paso boomed. Gordon H. Frost, says in his book *"The Gentlemen's Club: The Story of Prostitution in El Paso,"* the train brought to El Paso "honest" people, but along with them a "plethora of sinners," including prostitutes in need of money and a fresh life. They came to test the waters at the Pass City, and passed the word that El Paso was a place where EL PASO TENDERLOIN DISTRICT

El Paso had several types of prostitutes, from streetwalkers and crib girls, who advertised their wares from the front window of their one-room apartment or "crib," to saloon girls, who plied their trade above the bars and in dance halls. Madams like Etta Clark and Alicia Abbott presided over brothels or parlor houses, which catered to wealthier clientele. El Paso's parlor houses lined Utah Street, now Mesa Street, and housed beautiful women in fancy dresses. The men of El Paso had quite a choice depending on what they were willing to pay. Crib girls received fifty-cents to a dollar for their time, while the girls of the parlor house charged \$3 to \$5.

Madams knew how to make money off their girls. Frost writes that madams "charged their girls for the use of the brothel rooms, meals, and laundry" and since the girls were unable to save much money, the madams permitted the girls to use their charge accounts. This created more problems for the girls when they were not able to pay their debts.

It was not uncommon for madams to punish their girls for owing them money. When a girl became too much in debt, her madam could confiscate her belongings until repayment. This was an efficient way of getting a debt paid back, unless the girls happened to sue their madams. From April until December 1892, Etta Clark's exgirls, claiming she "wrongly appropriated their belongings," filed eight suits. Clark lost the suits against her and paid back the girls who had sued her.

Madams advertised their businesses using many approaches. In the 1901 Worley's Directory of the City of El Paso, Clark recorded her occupation as the owner of furnished rooms. She entered her name as Madam Etta Clark. Most men who looked in the city directory could see what the listing signified, but if they did not, the street (Utah) would have given it away.

Leather-printed cards and ads in souvenir booklets for large city events were some of the other ways madams advertised their services. They were cunning businesswomen and were often successful at building their clientele.

Though Clark was a great businesswoman, her weakness was her terrible temper. Some men found her to be beautiful, while others found her to be vicious. She ran off customers with her foul mouth, which helped her gain more enemies than friends.

Clark's rival was Madam Alice Abbott, also known as "Fat Alice," whose parlor house was just across from Clark's. Abbott, who had arrived in El Paso in 1880, was the first madam to build her brothel on Utah Street. She was six feet tall and weighed two hundred pounds.

Although Etta Clark and Alice Abbott were business rivals, no one seems to know why they became enemies. Frost says at one time they may have been friends because Abbott had a picture of Clark in her photo album. Frost writes, "Venting her anger on the picture, Alice drew an arrow-path into Etta's heart, then caustically accused the petite meretrix with being a 'Whore to Nigers,' the ultimate insult of that prejudiced period."

On April 18, 1886, an argument between Alice Abbott and her girl Bessie Colvin, who wanted to leave and work for Etta Clark, ended in Bessie seeking refuge in Clark's parlor. Abbott followed her, repeatedly assaulting the door with her fist. When Clark finally opened the door, Alice Abbott punched her in the face. Angry and in pain, Clark mustered courage and ran to get a gun.

Gordon Frost describes the shooting this way: "The weapon roared its authority, sending a bullet into Alice's pubic arch. Clutching her groin, Alice screamed: 'My God! I'm shot!' She lurched from the hall and staggered down the steps to collapse in the street." Etta Clark shot again, but missed. When Abbott looked up, she caught Clark with a little smile on her face as she went back to her house.

Just the thought of tiny Etta Clark drawing a heavy handgun and shooting the giant Alice Abbott, a foot taller and 100 pounds heavier, in the most delicate of parts was enough to make any El Pasoan smile, if not downright guffaw.

Alice Abbott survived the shooting, despite the risk of blood poisoning and a fifty-fifty chance of dying. This crime was called the "Pubic Arch Shooting," but the El Paso Herald misspelled the headline, calling it the "Public Arch Shooting." However, the headline caused townspeople to make fun of Abbott in the streets. Furthermore, on May 12, it took a jury only fifteen minutes to find Etta Clark not guilty on grounds of self-defense. Alice Abbott's humiliation was complete.

On the morning of July 12, 1888, a fire broke out at Etta Clark's parlor house while the women were asleep. They all escaped unharmed, but the house was destroyed. It was later determined Fat Alice had hired some drunks to set fire to her enemy's house, but because of gaps in the evidence, Alice and her hired bunch were acquitted.

The homeless Etta Clark was now a streetwalker. Her luck changed when J.P. Dieter, one of her clearly smitten clients, built her a (Continued on page 65) TICLES

Texas cowboy was waiting impa-Atiently for the Abilene bank to open. When the cashier finally arrived, the cowboy told him he wanted to "float a loan" on what he had in his hand: a poker hand that consisted of an ace and four Kings. The cowboy further explained he was in a poker game across the street in a saloon, and he was in danger of being raised right out of the game unless he could raise more

money. Already, there was more than \$4000 in the pot.

The cashier appeared to be hesitant, explaining he doubted whether the bank would loan money on such a thing as a poker hand. This was unfortunate for the cowboy. But, fortunately, the bank president came upon the scene. He took one look at the cowboy's hand, hurried into the bank, grabbed a sack of money, and accompanied the cowboy back to the saloon.

Within a few minutes, the banker re-entered the bank, carrying the original sack of money plus \$500 in interest. And he explained to the cashier, "Remember this in the future. Four kings and an ace are good for this bank's entire assets."

Marion Clark and Corydon Coolev owned a prosperous ranch in Arizona Territory. The ranch supplied vegetables and grain, as well as By W. Paul Brandt

cattle, to the Army at Fort Apache. But, in 1876, the two men decided to dissolve their partnership, and it all came down to the turn of a card. The stakes were the entire ranch, and the card game was seven-up, Clark told his partner, "... show low and the ranch is yours."

Cooley did indeed show low with the deuce of clubs, and the ranch was his. The site of that ranch is now the town of Show Low, Arizona.

One night in Fort Worth, Texas, a cowboy named Burk Burnett sat in on a card game. In this poker game, Burk came up with what turned out to be the winning hand, and in the pot was a cattle ranch. Burk's winning hand included four sixes, and his brand became 6666. His ranch became one of the largest and most important in the Lone Star State.

And, in Montana Territory a cardsharp sat in on a card game, and he watched the pot slowly increase by a considerable amount. Then he found, to his amazement, that he was in possession of four aces. Eventually, all the players had dropped out except for the cardsharp and one cowboy. The cowboy kept raising the ante, and the cardsharp began to feel a bit uneasy.

"Look," he told the cowboy, "I'd hate like the devil to clean you out. After all, I've got four aces in my hand!"

"Four aces?" the cowboy replied. "That's a right smart hand, sure enough ... but I've got you beat seven ways to Sunday." And then he showed his hand, which consisted of three clubs and two diamonds, and there wasn't a face card in the lot. Then he left out a sigh, leaned back, and added, "You can't beat a loo loo!" When the cardsharp began to

protest, the cowboy explained, "We play by different rules around here" and pointed to a sign above the bar that read:

A LOO LOO BEATS FOUR ACES.

They returned to their card game where new hands had been dealt, and amazingly enough, the cardsharp found he was holding three clubs and two diamonds which were even lower than the hand the cowboy had held.

The cardsharp showed his hand and began to reach for the pot. But, integral part of the Old West, and it is true that ranches were won (or lost) on the turn of a card. But by and large, gambling was mostly just a pastime of fellowship, fun, and relaxation, which was not based on any ranch, or even on hard coins ... but more on wooden matchsticks.

Cowboying was pretty much of a full-time job, which lasted from before dawn 'till after dusk, and spare time was usually at a premium. And so, the cowboys quite frequently turned to poker, and since a batch of wooden match sticks were a whole lot easier to come by than a

again, the cowboy stopped him, who then motioned to the bar where the bartender had just put up another sign that read:

ONLY ONE LOO LOO PERMITTED IN ANY ONE 24-HOUR PERIOD.

Gambling had rapidly become an

month's wages, the matches were a popular type of ante.

There are now more than a hundred variations of poker, all of which belong to one of two types: either draw or "Closed" in which the player conceals his cards until the final showdown, or stud or "open" poker


where <u>some</u> of the player's cards are open to view during the hand.

In most all poker games, each player will present his five strongest cards at the showdown, and no matter which type of poker is being played, the value of the hand remains the same. Hence, a straight flush will <u>always</u> beat four of a kind, and a flush will <u>always</u> beat a straight, and so on. Some cowboys eventually became top-notch poker players, while others did not. If a cowboy learned to concentrate hard, to study his opponent's style, and had a good knowledge of the mathematics of poker and it's probabilities, he could do quite well at the game. Needless to say, there were very few cowboys who could eventually retire on their poker winnings even if they drew a "loo loo!" **A**.

ALL I FOUND WAS ... TOMBSTONE!


When you're planning a trip to another century, it pays to do research and prepare for your journey. I listed some of the sources I used at the end of this article, but ANY source can help you decide what's interesting and you want to see, where to eat, and where the best buys can be found.

It's important to remember Arizona was the last state to join the union in the "lower 48." This was a wild and wooly territory until 1912. We tend to see history as Hollywood has presented it. Part of the reason I got involved in SASS was because I wanted to learn the real story ... the true history. I started by finding out how it all started.

Edward Lawrence Schieffelin (1847-1897) went looking for gold in 1877, but he ended up as an Indian scout working out of Camp Huachuca. He kept prospecting in his spare time, and eventually near the San Pedro Valley, Arizona, he





Knowing the history, I wanted to see "Tombstone" ... the town, not the movie. I wanted to see the historical side of all the Hollywood hype ... and I wasn't disappointed. Wherever I (Continued on next page)

went, there were no "cheesy touristy" places. I met dozens of people who have a strong sense of their town's history and a great respect for their heritage. They want to show that history realistically and without hype. They live there. It's not a theme park.

I flew into Tucson (rather than Phoenix) to give me a day to relax and because I wanted to see the Museum of the Horse Soldier. Located in southeast Tucson, this casual museum features a rich cache of donated and recovered artifacts from several

nearby cavalry fort sites. The cowboy on duty that day was knowledgeable about the history of the cavalry forts and helped recover a lot of the artifacts from the grounds with several metal detectors.

On day two, I drove the 80 miles to Tombstone. I knew from my research I wanted to see a few sites right away. First stop was the **Tombstone Historama**. Located next to the O.K. Corral site, I started here to get a unique overview of the history of the area narrated by Vincent Price. They also give you a coupon for a free copy of the *Tombstone Epitaph* dated the day after the epic shootout. You can also buy your ticket for ... **The O.K. Corral Gunfight Re-enactment.**

On the corner of Fifth and Toughnut streets stands the Tombstone Consolidated Mines

Company. This is the site of the recently opened "Good Enough" Mine Tour. Because it is so very dry ... NOTHING disappears. There was everything from food cans to Model A fenders left inside these shafts. The tour was fascinating and led by an experienced miner. It put perspective on the backbreaking work of the miners and the fortunes taken out of the ground by the investors.

The Birdcage Theatre was named for the hanging cages where dancers

strutted their stuff over 100 years before caged dancers in discos. The old song, "She's Only a Bird in a Gilded Cage" by Arthur J. Lamb was written for the "tainted angels" of the Bird Cage Theater. I remember that song from Warner Brothers cartoons with "Tweety Bird." Sort of puts a whole new perspective on the cartoons.

Inside the "Birdcage" were hundreds of preserved artifacts sitting unmoved since 1889 when the place

finally closed its doors. On the walls were dozens of paintings and photos of famous and not-so-famous citizens. Among these are:

Nellie Cashman (A local heroine called the "Angel of the Camps." She made sure every miner and bummer had a good meal.). Mickey Free (One of the deadliest man hunters EVER.), and Luke Short (Gambler, pistoleer, and buddy to the likes of Wyatt, Bat, Virgil, and Doc.)

Tombstone Court House was the county seat and the center of law and order in this wilderness for over 47 years.

Although it's three hours north of Tombstone, I couldn't fly all that way and not visit Cave Creek, AZ. This suburb of Phoenix is home to beautiful countryside and the offices of *True West* Magazine. I'm glad I got the chance to meet the fine folks who enlighten me every month with true history.

I had a fun first trip of a lifetime ... and learned a lot. I brought back about six months worth of reading. Would I do it again? Maybe ... after my checkbook recovers ... I'll let you know.

Black Bart's Bad Day

NOVEMBER 3, 1553 It's a Saturday as the Sonora-Milton stage rattles along, empty, save for the driver. Reason E. McConnell has been on the road for three hours since he stopped at the Patterson Mine, near Tuttletown, California, picking up \$4,200 worth of amalgamated gold. The Wells Fargo box also contains \$500 in gold coin and \$64 in raw gold.

McConnell finally reins up in front of the Reynolds Ferry Hotel, nestled along the banks of the Stanislaus River. Jimmy Rolleri, the hotel manager's 19-year-old son, exits the hotel and exchanges the outgoing mail for the incoming. Glancing at the empty coach, Rolleri asks if he can catch a ride up the hill on the opposite side of the river. A traveler who had stopped at the hotel the previous night reported seeing "two big bucks up there on the flat above Yaqui Gulch," he says.

McConnell tells the boy to grab his gun, and Rolleri returns with a "well-worn but serviceable .44 Henry rifle." With the help of Henry Requa, the two successfully ferry the stage across the river. Requa returns the ferry to the hotel side of the river, and Rolleri jumps up on the box with McConnell, who slaps the reins of his team, encouraging them up the steep approach to Funk Hill.

Halfway up the long grade, Rolleri asks McConnell to slow down. He jumps off with his rifle, thanks McConnell for the lift and heads out into the underbrush to hunt for the big bucks.


The six-horse team continues on, struggling up the steep grade for another 30 minutes. As the stage rounds the head of Yaqui Gulch, with the ridge line in sight, the lead horses snort and rear in fright when a lone, hooded figure, shotgun in hand, leaps into the roadway.

Wearing a dirt-smudged duster and a flour sack with eye holes cut into them, the highwayman demands the Wells Fargo box be thrown down. McConnell informs the robber it's bolted down. The outlaw tells the driver to unhitch his team, but McConnell protests, fearing the stage will roll down the hill due to its bad brakes. The

robber's solution is for McConnell to wedge rocks behind the wheels, but the driver brashly pushes his luck by stating, "Why don't you do it?"

Incredibly, the hooded robber keeps his shotgun trained on the driver, picks up several stones and blocks the back wheels. McConnell then unhitches the team and leads it uphill. "If you don't want to get shot," the robber warns him, "don't come back or even look back in this direction for at least one hour."

While leading the team, McConnell hears the robber banging away at the strongbox. Sneaking glances toward the coach, he can't see the brigand, who has probably crawled into the stagecoach.

Two hundred yards from the stage, McConnell stops to catch his breath when downhill movement catches his eye. It's Jimmy Rolleri, the Henry rifle in the crook of his arm, moving across an open swale of land about 300 yards below. Tying his team to an oak tree, McConnell runs downhill as quietly as he can, frantically waving his hat until he gets Rolleri's attention. Coming up the hill, Rolleri first thinks McConnell has discovered the deer. But the driver fills him in on the situation, and the two warily approach the stage with the intent of capturing the outlaw, or killing him. When they get within 100 yards, the bandit suddenly emerges from the stage and spots them. The outlaw throws a sack over his shoulder and starts to run.

McConnell borrows Rolleri's rifle and fires twice, missing the robber both times.

"Here, let me shoot," young Rolleri says. "I'll get him and I won't kill him, either." With Rolleri's shot, the outlaw stumbles, but he vanishes into the underbrush with his booty.

When the county sheriff and a Wells Fargo detective arrive, they discover what the brigand left behind in his hasty retreat: a derby hat, three pairs of cuffs, an opera glass case and a silk crepe handkerchief with the laundry mark "F.X.O.7." on it.

After eight years and 28 successful stage holdups, this last item will prove to be Black Bart's undoing.

Detective Harry Morse tracks the bandit by matching the handkerchief to a laundry center in San Francisco. Black Bart pleads guilty on November 17, 1883, and serves four years and two months in jail. **1**.

Me? My alias is Sassy Dancer. I chose to come home and write about it. Start that journal I thought about doing a million years and a whole different lifetime ago \dots A.





ur club, "Sucker Creek Saddle & Gun Club," has some of the most unique and interesting targets in Cowboy Action Shooting[™]. I find myself kind of in charge of them. From time to time things I come across inspire me or sometimes I envision props, targets, and such to build for our matches. The Vicar's Wife accuses me of staying awake at night thinking things up for Cowboy Action. She says my mind runs at 90 MPH and never slows down. It says in I Thessalonians 4:11-12, "Make it your ambition to lead a quiet life, to mind your own business and to work with your hands, just as we told you, so that your daily life may win the respect of outsiders and so that you will not be dependent on anybody." Well, maybe the reason I'm into Cowboy Action is the Lord's way of keepin' me out of trouble.

One of our most enjoyable targets is the "Pop Can Launcher." We use it on bay #7, the "Mine Stage," along with shotgun poppers, knock down rifle targets, and stationary pistol targets. All are engaged from a mine car. The "Pop Can Launcher" is a two



shot shotgun target. The cowboy steel target is shot first. It has a 3/4inch rod welded across on the back up from the bottom around two inches. There is a 3/8-inch threaded rod attached to the bottom middle of the steel target through a hole up around ?-inch from the bottom. This threaded rod goes back to the pop can launcher tube and holds the springloaded firing plate (around 1/8-inch thick) at the bottom of the launcher tube. Slots in the tube allow the plate to be pushed down. The plate is attached by springs and has a hole in the bottom that holds it in place by the threaded rod as it passes through holes in the tube lock. A plunger pushes down the plate, and the steel target is tilted forward to lock it in place, and the pop can is inserted. One must be careful when operating this target. Do not have any part of anyone in line with launcher and make sure the lock is adjusted correctly. The launching tube is of a large enough inside diameter to allow the outside of the pop can diameter to be guided freely.

When the steel target tilts back from the first shotgun shell, the threaded rod is pulled forward, releasing the firing plate and launching the pop can. The pop can is then shot and sprays red warm pop resembling a liquid form of 4th of July fireworks to the delight of all.

Make sure to have proper backstop, wind direction, distance of target, and do not build, operate, or use any unsafe target. God bless and "work with your hands" to build enjoyable projects for Cowboy Action! creevicardave@hotmail.com \$\$

In my time shooting I have been asked, and heard many theories about the Thursday pot shoot events. I don't know if there is really a right way or wrong way to approach the pot shoots, but I do know what has worked for me over the years. I have also had the opportunity to see some fun, interesting pot shoots.

There are two main theories I have encountered when it comes to shooting pot shoots. First, there is the 'practice before the match' theo-

ry. The thought is pot shoots are a great way to practice for the match. I personally give this theory only about half credit. I do like to shoot the pot shoots for practice; however, it is a particular type of practice. For me, the practice is for testing my gear, getting used to the range, the targets, and shooting under match pressure.

Before every major match it is my plan to clean all my guns and to shoot them after I clean them to test them. However, as sometimes happens, my plans don't always turn out the way I want. If I happen to run out of time to clean and test fire my guns before the match, I have sometimes cleaned and test fired them on pot shoot day. Mind you, this is not the time for major changes such as going from a regular length stroke to a short By Holy Terror, SASS #15362


stroke. However, if you are cleaning or replacing an extractor, the pot shoots or speed shoots are a great place to make sure you got all the pieces put back together correctly.

I like to shoot the pot shoots everywhere I go, but especially on the ranges I haven't been on before. Every range has different weather, lighting, ground, and surrounding conditions. It never hurts to know the sun rises behind the targets, so you remember to bring your sunglasses the day you shoot the early shift.

Pot shoots, or speed shoots, are a great way to get the lay of the land before the big match. I also shoot the pot shoots so I can get a feel for the targets. Practicing can get you used to the sounds, or lack of sounds, of the targets, the target distances, and their shapes and sizes. I know shape and size might be obvious, but I have a friend that is so used to shooting circles and squares, she has a bit of a mental block against oddly shaped targets. Pot shoots are also a good way to test knock down targets if they are available.

I also like to shoot pot shoots to get used to the match pressure. At pot shoots you shoot at targets on the range under the clock. By participating I am starting to work on my "game face," so t my mental side is ready for the match.

I do not use pot shoots for regular practice. All my regular run of the mill practice is done at home. If there is a skill you are trying to master, or if you want to bump up your speed, pot shoots are not the place to do that. If you try to change too *(Continued on next page)*

many things the day before your match, you are liable to mess your-self up more than help.

The other major theory I have heard behind shooting pot shoots is they are a mini competition, and you should be shooting to win. I personally try to stay as far away from this theory as possible.

I stay away from these testosterone-fueled feuds as much as possible because for me, there is a line of control. On the safe side of the line, I shoot as fast as I can while hitting the targets. On the other side of the line, I shoot as fast as I can while sometimes hitting the targets. If I cross that line during pot shoots or speed shoots, it is hard for me to get back to the other side in time to shoot the match. When you shoot at your maximum speed, it is as much luck as skill to hit the targets, and I have never known anyone who could shoot that fast for two or three consecutive days without missing.

Now, just like any person I can't always stay out of the competitive feuds. It is especially hard for me to do so when someone plays the "boys are better than girls" card. At some matches it has cost me in the match, and sometimes it has cost me pride when I choose to walk away. When it comes to this theory I suggest always trying to win if possible, but keep yourself from getting caught up in the game and losing your head.

My own personal theory for shooting pot shoots is to shoot each event at least one time well. If I can shoot them all well once, then it gives me a last chance to check out my gear, a chance to get used to the range, and a chance to get a feel for the targets. My goal is to be able to go one for one. Shoot well the first time and quit there. If I happen to screw up the first time by missing a target, fumbling a shell, or anything else, then I try again until I get it right. After I get it right, I usually stop. I stop not because I don't enjoy shooting, but because it is hard for me not to get caught up in the competitiveness. I know myself, and once I get going, it is very difficult for me to stop.

Let me tell you about some of my favorite pot shoots ...

First, the run of the mill speed or pot shoots are great because they are simple and relatively easy. It is always helpful if you shoot targets that will be in the match, but fun either way.

Man-on-man shoots are fun shoots, but not usually held on Thursday. I like them because they are exciting to shoot, and they are great to watch. If you have never shot one, I suggest you do so. Nothing gives a better adrenaline kick.

I think the most useful of pot shoot or speed shoot events are the mini stages or practice matches that many events are recently including. Usually they consist of 3-4 short or regular length stages. I think the short stages are fun because you can mess with your speed, but still practice match conditions. Plus the short stages are not something you are used to doing, so it makes it a special unique event. The regular stages are helpful because they give you practice shooting under match conditions. They are a little more work for match officials, but I suggest match officials put some time and thought into making them unique. While it is cool to have a practice match, it is not fun to shoot double tap 10-10-4 for four stages!

The last real regular pre-match event I have participated in is The All-Around Cowboy Event. These can be fun, and usually have really good prizes. They are pretty challenging, and sometimes involve the use of borrowed firearms and ammunition supplied by the sponsor of the event. Sometimes these guns and ammunition are frustrating, but it can be exciting to shoot something different.

The absolute best side event in my opinion is The Wild Bunch Shoot. This event is based on the big shoot out scene at the end of "The Wild Bunch" movie, and usually involves shooting 1911's and high-powered rifles. I participated in one when I was 12 and got to shoot a Browning automatic rifle. It was the most memorable shooting experience of my life to date.

There are many more side events such as Plainsmen, trap, skeet, and long range. If you are looking for a challenge, then I suggest trying one of these unique side events. It can be a fun way to shoot more, and give you a chance to win a different prize. Pot shoots and speed shoots can be lots of fun. However, they can also be very tricky. Whatever you choose to do, remember it is all for fun, and in the end you get to shoot more. How could that be wrong?

WILD BUNCH COWBOY ACTION SHOOTINGTM AT END OF TRAIL

The rules and equipment requirements are listed below.

The match will cost \$75 in addition to your main match entry. This means you will get to shoot 24 stages during the ten days. If a competitor wishes to only shoot the Wild Bunch Match, they can do so by paying the main match fee and requesting only the Wild Bunch Match. In doing so, you would get all the benefits of END of TRAIL, but would not shoot the main match the last weekend. Either way you get all of the entertainment, fun, and food END of TRAIL has to offer. In addition we will have a Wild Bunch Side Match on Sunday June 22nd just to cap off a great week of shooting. So, what are you waiting for? I'll see you at END of TRAIL!

Wild Bunch Cowboy Action Shooting[™] Rules Firearm Requirements:


- Handgun: Full size single stack steel frame 1911 style semi-auto pistol in 45 ACP caliber.
- Rifle: Any SASS legal main match rifle in .38-40 or larger caliber.
- Shotgun: 1897 Winchester pump in 12 gauge. Civilian or Military style.

Ammunition:

Handgun: Minimum bullet weight: 200gr. Minimum power factor: 150 Maximum velocity 1000fps.

- Rifle: Minimum bullet weight: 200gr. Minimum power factor: 150 Maximum velocity 1400fps.
- Shotgun: Standard velocity #6 lead birdshot shot or smaller. All other SASS main match am-
- munition requirements must be met.

Firearm Covenants: Handgun:

- Barrel length must be of at least 5 inches. No barrel porting or compensators.
- No extended magazine wells.
- Adjustable sights are allowed.
 No electronic sights or optical sights. No "fiber optic" sight inserts, only black or white colored sight inserts are allowed.
- No "target style" grips or grip enhancing tape. Grips must be GI-style wood or plastic, no rubber grips.
- No front slide checkering or serrations.
- No extended beavertail grip safeties.
- Magazines cannot hold more than 8 rounds. No extended base pads on magazines.
- Mainspring housings, triggers, hammers, safeties, magazine releases, and slide releases may be replaced as long as they appear to be original.
- Internal accurizing and action tuning is allowed.
 Bifle:
- Must meet SASS main match

requirements and must be .40 caliber or larger. Shotgun:

Must meet SASS main match requirements for pump shotgun, except military configuration allowed.

Holsters, Cartridge Belts, Magazine Pouches, and Bandoliers:

- Holsters and magazine pouches must be of traditional or military design and made from traditional materials, (e.g., canvas or leather).
- The holster must cover the entire length of the barrel and completely cover ejection port. No open front speed holsters allowed.
- If a holster has a flap or strap they need not be closed during competition.
- No metal or plastic "competition" type equipment allowed.
- No shoulder or cross-draw holsters may be used during competition.
 Magazine pouches must be worn
- Magazine pouches must be worn on the opposite side of the body from the handgun.


- Magazine pouches must be worn vertical.
- Magazine pouches can hold either 1 or 2 magazines.
- At least 2 inches of the magazine must be covered by the magazine pouch.
- All other SASS regulations pertaining to these items apply. **Costuming:**

Period US military from 1900 to 1916 is allowed. Period western dress is allowed such as Pike, Dutch, Lyle or Tector in the closing scene of the Wild Bunch movie; i.e., Western style pants with suspenders, and long sleeve western shirt. Vests are optional. Jeans are not allowed. Boots must be SASS legal. Hats must be worn and must be made of felt, no straw hats.

Firearm Rules and Penalties:

1. The 1911 must be restaged safely at the end of each shooting string with the slide locked open, unless the 1911 is the last firearm engaged. It may contain an empty magazine or no magazine when restaged. (Failure to comply, SDQ ... per current *(Continued on next page)*

SASS rules the shooter has until engaging the next firearm to correct without penalty)

- 2. Magazines shall be loaded with only five rounds. (Overloading MSV)
- 3. Shooter may take no more than four loaded magazines to the firing line. (Failure to comply MSV)
- 4. When moving with the 1911 in your hand the slide must be locked open and the trigger finger must be outside the trigger guard. (trigger finger MSV, slide closed SDQ)
- 5. Changing magazines on the move is allowed as long as the slide remains locked open and the trigger finger remains out of the trigger guard until at least one foot reaches the shooting position. (trigger finger MSV, slide closed SDQ)
- 6. At the end of the stage, the 1911 must be cleared on the firing line. Under supervision of the RO the magazine is removed, the slide cycled if not locked open, and the chamber checked. Then the slide is closed to battery, the trigger pulled, and hammer dropped before holstering. (Failure to comply SDQ)
- 7. Shotgun magazines may be loaded with up to the correct

number of rounds for the target sequence. Any additional rounds needed for targets must be loaded from the body. (Overloading MSV)

- 8. Loaded shotguns shall be staged with the action closed, hammer down on an empty chamber. (Failure to comply SDQ)
- 9. All other SASS rules pertaining to firearms are in effect.

Shooting Procedure Rules and Penalties specific to the 1911: Operations at the loading table:

Pistol shall be shown clear and then the slide closed to battery, hammer lowered and holstered with NO magazine inserted. (Failure to comply SDQ)

Magazines shall be loaded and placed in pouches or on the shooter's body. (Failure to comply MSV)

PRIOR to engaging the stage:

At the firing line under the supervision of the RO, the shooter shall insert a loaded magazine in the pistol, but NOT operate the slide. Pistol shall be re-holstered or staged per instructions, with the slide forward and hammer down on an empty chamber. (Failure to comply SDQ)

Operations at the unloading table: The already cleared pistol shall

remain holstered.

Any live ammunition remaining in magazines need not be unloaded.

Rules for Wild Bunch Team Event

- Shooters and firearms:
 Four shooters on a team. One each as Pike, Dutch, Lyle, and Tector.
- 2. Firearms for Pike: 1911 pistol and 1897 shotgun.
- 3. Firearms for Dutch: SASS main match revolvers and 1897 shot-gun.
- 4. Firearms for Lyle: 1911 and SASS main match rifle.
- 5. Firearms for Tector: SASS main

match revolvers and SASS Main match rifle.

- Side Match may be shot by all competitors with their main match costuming, but to be true to the characters of the movie, the following is a recommendation:
- 1. Pike, Dutch, and Tector: Dark pants, light colored long sleeve shirt, dark vest, SASS legal boots, and hat.
- 3. Lyle: Dark pants, light colored long sleeve shirt, NO vest, SASS legal boots, and hat optional. *A*.









11 Jan 1860 Florida, Alabama secede from the Union.

- **27 Jan 1860** William Russell sends a telegraph to Alexander Majors and William Waddell explaining his plan to set up a pony express run to California.
- **6 Jan 1861** New York City Mayor Fernando Wood, supporter of Southern states to secede, proposes the city maintain economic ties with South Carolina and any other state that secedes.
- **9 Jan 1861** In one of the 1st acts of hostility between the North and South, Citadel cadets on Morris Island fire three rounds at the civilian ship *Star of the West*, a ship bearing supplies for Fort Sumter. The 1st cannonball whistles across the bow as a warning and the second two strike the ship. Although little damage is done by the smoothbore twenty-four-pounders, the ship turns and leaves the area. Major Anderson, commander of Fort Sumter, holds his fire, having no orders from Washington to fire on Confederates and start the war. He'll leave that to his former West Point student, Confederate General Beauregard.
- 10 Jan 1861 Mississippi secedes from the Union.
- **13 Jan 1861** On the 4th day on his new job, P.G.T. Beauregard is removed as superintendent of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, New York because of his outspoken sympathy for seceded states.
- **21 Jan 1861** Apaches near Sonoita, Arizona kidnap Mickey Free, a rancher's son, setting off a 20-year war with Cochise, falsely accused of the kidnapping.
- Jan 1862 The Battle of Mill Springs, Kentucky is a disastrous Confederate loss, losing the state for the Confederacy. Confederate Brig. Gen. George Crittenden is accused of being "in a beastly state of intoxication."
- **11 Jan 1862** "Dirty Bill," AKA Commodore William Dixon Porter, riverboat commander, challenges three Confederate gunboats near Columbus, Kentucky. The gunboats withdraw. To provoke them, each day Porter hoists an insulting taunt or cartoon on a special mast.
- **15 Jan 1862** Seven ironclads, nicknamed "Pook Turtles," because they were designed by Samuel M. Pook, are completed and accepted by the War Department. Each cost \$100,000 and are named after cities on western rivers. Each is round-nosed, flatbottomed, 175 feet long and 51.5 feet wide, drawing only 6 feet of water. Each is plated with 2.5-inch-thick iron, with flat sides and front and rear casemates sloping at 35-degree angles, and carry 13 heavy guns. Each is propelled by a stern paddlewheel covered by a rear casemate.
 - Jan 1863 The Bear River Campaign near Salt Lake City is conducted by Gen. Conner and 700 California volunteers against Shoshoni and Bannock raiders. Over 350 Indians are killed, 160 women and children are taken prisoner.
 - Jan 1863 The U.S. Army betrays the Apache, murder and mutilate the great Apache leader Mangas Coloradas, cut off his head, boil off the flesh in a cauldron, and send the brain East for examination.
- **1 Jan 1863** President Lincoln issues his Final Emancipation Proclamation, declaring slaves in rebel states are free.
- **1 Jan 1863** Confederates take Galveston, Texas with two riverboats, the *Neptune* and *Bayou City*, converted into gunboats.
- **4 Jan 1863** Captain J. Sewell Reed and "The California Hundred" become Company A, 2nd Massachusetts Cavalry and are ordered from Boston to the front in Virginia.
- **7 Jan 1863** The Pittsburgh Gazette gives a glowing account of the heroism of the Seventy-Eighth Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry at the Battle of Stones River, bestowing upon the regiment the distinguished name, "The Gallant Seventy-Eighty."
- **12 Jan 1863** Responding to Lincoln's "Emancipation Proclamation," the Confederate Congress passes legislation designed to deal with "every white person" commanding "negroes and mulattoes in arms against the Confederate states." Such persons

LEXANDER SWAN was a Wyoming cattleman in the 1800's who founded the Swan Land & Cattle Company and created the state's first Rodeo, complete with western barbecue and a rip-roaring Wild West Show. Swan ran his ranch to ruin and landed in an insane asylum.

"shall be deemed as inciting servile insurrection, and shall, if captured be put to death or otherwise punished." No record any Federal officer was ever executed for the 'crime' of leading black soldiers into battle exists.

- **14 Jan 1863** Henry Plummer kills Jack Cleveland over an argument in which Cleveland demands a cut of Plummer's "action." Both men begin firing at each other and Cleveland is mortally hit. Before dying, Cleveland tells of Plummer's secret society of outlaws and Plummer's leadership.
- 26 Jan 1863 Burnside bogs down in the "Mud March" and is replaced by "Fighting Joe" Hooker. Hooker declares: "May God have mercy on General Lee, for I will have none."
- **10 Jan 1864** A vigilante committee hangs Sheriff Henry Plummer and more than two dozen of his 'road agents' in accordance with "hemp justice."
- 14 Jan 1864 Five men are hanged in Virginia City, Montana by the same vigilante committee.
- **21 Jan 1864** A vigilante committee hangs eight men in Hell Gate, Montana.
- Jan 1864 3000 Navajo Indians begin their 90-day, 300-mile trek known as "The Long March" from Canyon de Chelly (NE Arizona) to the Bosque Redondo reservation. Hundreds die from hunger, cold, and disease.
- Jan 1865 Outraged by the Sand Creek massacre, Cheyenne, Arapaho, and Sioux warriors attack wagon trains, stage stations, and military outposts along the South Platte River. Julesburg (NE Colorado) is burned, its white residents scalped.
- **8 Jan 1865** At the Battle of Dove Creek, a combined force of Confederates and Tonkawas attack a friendly group of Kickapoo Indians. Capt. Silas Totten's Rangers are mowed down as they charge through the water. Twenty-six Texans are killed and another 26 wounded; 11 Kickapoo are killed, 7 wounded.
- **13 Jan 1865** The Thirteenth Amendment, abolishing slavery, is submitted to the states by Congress.
- **28 Jan 1865** Robert E. Lee is made Commander in Chief of Confederate forces. He'll hold this post less than 3 months before surrendering at Appomattox Court House.
- **31 Jan 1865** Congress approves the 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution, abolishing slavery.
 - Jan 1866 Fifteen-year-old John Younger kills a man named Gillcreas after the man slaps Younger with a dead fish.
- **1 Jan 1867** Bill Hickok begins scouting for Custer's Seventh Cavalry.
- **25 Jan 1867** The February issue of *Harpers Weekly* publishes the 1st article about Wild Bill Hickok.
- 11 Jan 1868 Three gunmen are hanged at Daly City, Wyoming (40 miles west of Cheyenne).
- **6 Jan 1869** Thomas Orr, a schoolteacher with a crippled right hand, has been bullied and threatened by Cullen Baker. With three additional men in his posse, including Cullen's father-in-law, Orr finds Cullen and a friend eating lunch beside a road. The posse blazes away, killing both men. Cullen is found with a shotgun, 4 revolvers, 3 derringers, and 6 pocketknives; SE Arkansas. *A.*



MORE YOUNG COWPOKES FROM THE BUCKEYE STATE

There must be something about the L water in Ohio. The state is a hotbed for Cowboy Action ShootingTM and consistently has some of the best matches in the country. It also has some of the top young shooters in the country. Two of them live near the small town of Kilbourne in Central Ohio, just north of Columbus. Kilbourne Kid, SASS #35161, took his alias from the town on the banks of Alum Creek when he began shooting Cowboy Action eight years ago. He attended his first match just to watch his dad, Rowdy Bishop, SASS #48453, and from then on he was hooked.

I have known him for the past four years, and have watched him progress from the junior ranks to an adult shooter of exceptional ability. He graduated with honors from Delaware Christian School in 2006 and is currently in his 2nd year at Ohio State University majoring in mechanical engineering. Not surprisingly his best subject in school was math. One wouldn't think being a math scholar would be too much of an advantage in Cowboy Action since we only have to count to ten, but he counts so much faster than the

rest of us! Kilbourne shoots .38 caliber Ruger Vaqueros carried in a Kirkpatrick Handlebar Doc rig, a Sage Chick and Kilbourne Kid, ace competitors from the great state of Ohio. Both have already accumulated impressive credentials in their young shooting careers.

Pioneer Gunworks 1866 yellowboy, also in .38 caliber, and a Coyote Cap model 1897.

Kilbourne was the Ohio State Junior champion in both 2004 and 2005 and was 2nd overall at the Ohio State Championship in 2006. That same year he was 2nd overall at Hell on Wheels, 4th overall at Guns of August, and placed in the top 16 overall at the END of TRAIL World Championship. Of course, everyone has their moments. He also discovered in 2006 at Tusco that you can't shoot quite as fast when you are sitting on your butt in the mud, but that's another story!

Sage Chick, SASS #48454, started SASS by following her dad and big brother to the matches and picking up brass. Early in her career at Firelands she was upset she did not get a raffle ticket (she was too young *(Continued on next page)*

to shoot), so her mom bought her a 50/50 ticket that later turned out to be the winner. After a couple of years of brass duty, she decided it looked like it would be more fun to shoot. So, at the advanced age of nine, armed with a single barrel 20-gauge shotgun from Walmart, she began to wreak havoc on the junior shooters throughout the state of Ohio. This was all prior to the development of the Buckaroo and Buckarette categories, so she was required to shoot SASS legal guns (not .22 calibers) and was placed in the junior category with older shooters.

One of the best SASS stories I have ever heard came out of one of her competitions that same year. She had signed up to shoot in the Guns of August Regional Championship, but upon arrival was told by the match director because of her age she would not be allowed to shoot. Sage Chick and her dad headed down to the range to discuss the issue with the officials and after a somewhat lengthy discourse, they agreed to let her shoot. Walking back up the hill her dad asked, "Who was that one guy?" Sage Chick replied, "I don't know his name, but his SASS badge had a 1 on it."

One of her chores on the home farm is raising chickens and selling the eggs. Money collected is saved for her college fund. Since she likes birds, she wanted her alias to reflect that with a western flavor. Sage hen was already taken, and her dad thought since she was so young when she started shooting that Sage Chick was a good fit.

Sarah is currently in the 8th grade at Delaware Christian School and would like to pursue a degree in Veterinary Science upon graduation from high school. She is a straight A student and has never missed a day of school during her eight years except to attend END of TRAIL in 2005.

Sage Chick retired the single barreled 20 gauge (although I have heard a rumor some 30, 40, and 50





something female shooters from Ohio are petitioning SASS to reinstate the single barrel requirement for all junior shooters). She now shoots .38 caliber Ruger Blackhawks carried in a Kirkpatrick gun rig, an 1873 rifle also in .38 caliber that has been short stroked by Lassiter, and an 1897 Winchester slicked up by Just Wild Bill.

Her list of accomplishments in SASS include Ohio State Buckarette Champion 2005, 2006, Regional Buckarette Champion Guns of August 2005, 2006, 2007, Buckarette Champion at Mule Camp 2005, 2007, Buckarette Champion at Hell on Wheels 2006, World Champion Buckarette 2005, 2006, 2007, Ohio State Women's Overall Champion 2006, Guns of August Regional Women's Overall runner-up 2006, and Guns of August Regional Women's Overall winner 2007.

With all their accomplishments in SASS, Kilbourne Kid and Sage Chick say what they enjoy most about SASS is meeting other shooters from all over the world. They are both top shooters, but more importantly they are two of the finest young people I have ever met. They are the children of Rowdy Bishop and Fowl Woman. **1**.

public after the war. With well over 150,000 Spencers in circulation after the Civil War, it was not until sometime around 1880 that the 1866 and 1873 Winchesters finally out-numbered the Spencer! Until I began researching this article, even I was unaware to what extent the Spencer repeater dominated the early West.

Until about seven or eight years ago, if you wanted to shoot a Spencer, you were limited to an antique converted to center fire, or one of the prohibitively expensive hand-made Romano replicas. Originals run from (Continued on next page)



(*Continued from previous page*) \$2,000 for a "beater" to \$3,500 for a decent one, and another \$500 to convert to center fire and get the brass, mold, and special dies.

Tammi Loy at Taylor's and Firearms developed the Armi Sport Spencer, with the help of Kenny Howell. They started working on the Spencer project in 1999. They were looking at reproducing something no one else did. Considering the important role the Spencer played in the American West, it was an excellent choice. Taylor's teamed up with the Italian firm of Armi Sport, who already makes their quality 1874 Sharps rifles.

They initially introduced a SASS main match legal replica 1865 Spencer in .44 Russian and .45 S&W Schofield, and a N-SSA legal .56-50 center-fire. The .44 Russian and .45 Schofield have recently been discontinued in favor of the more popular .45 Colt and .44-40 Winchester calibers. The modern .56-50 center-fire was developed by Taylor's and Ten-X Ammunition. Several years ago SASS voted to allow the .56-50 Spencer to be used as a legal main match rifle. At about the same time, Taylor's also began selling a 30-inch infantry rifle version of the Spencer,

as well as the 20-inch carbine. It was also about that same time Armi Sport violated the exclusive import agreement they had with Taylor's, and began selling Spencer reproductions to Cimarron also. Now both firms market the Spencers to SASS folks and re-enactors.

The best part is these SASS legal Spencers sell for about a third the price of an original that has been converted to shoot expensive center fire custom reloads. The folks at Armi Sport have certainly outdone themselves this time. Their 1865 Spencer is a real peach! When I first heard about their plans to produce a Spencer replica back in 1999, I couldn't wait. Now that they offer a wide range of calibers in both rifle and carbine versions, there is something for a wide range of shooter's preferences.



ing too! That's the case with the Armi Sport 1865 Spencer—you get what you pay for, and it is WELL WORTH IT!

For this article, I had five to shoot and handle. Taylor's sent me a rifle and a carbine in .56-50, and carbines in .44-40 and .45 Schofield. Cimarron also sent me a carbine in .44-40. The .45 Colt carbines were being imported, but already went out to back-orders.

The quality on all the Spencers was uniformly excellent! The oiled walnut butt and fore stock are solid and nicely figured. The color case hardening of the receiver, crescent butt plate, hammer, and lever are positively gorgeous. The highly polished blue of the 20 and 30 inch barrels is deep and lustrous, reminding me of the excellent Colt bluing in the 1950's and 1960's. They are an absolute joy to look at.

The overall length is 37 inches for the carbines and 47 inches for the rifle. The carbine tips my postal scales at 8.8 pounds. The rifle is about half a pound more. About the only problem I have found in Armi Sports is an inconsistency in the trigger pull of various Spencers. My current .56-50 carbine and one of the .44-40s had trigger pulls of about 4 pounds, right out of the box. Six to eight pounds seems to be the norm, though. I have heard of a few Spencers, especially earlier ones, that even had up to ten or twelve pound pulls. Part of the problem is inherent to the Sharps style trigger, sear, tumbler arrangement. Heavy pulls are generally from the spring being too heavy, and fortunately, most folks can take care of that themselves.

The front sight is a period correct fixed blade on a square base, like Sharps and Springfield carbines. The rear sight has a flip up ladder military sight identical to the originals. It is graduated 100 to 900 yards. Folded down, the base becomes a rear notch "battle sight." This was the sight I used for testing, as it would be the one used for SASS shooting. As you will see later, the sights were right on the money!

The Armi Sport 1865 Spencer carbine has a carbine sling ring and slide on the left side of the receiver, just as the originals did. This slide and ring was used with the Army issued carbine sling. It is a threeinch wide leather strap (that was worn over the shoulder and across the chest) with a large nickel-plated snap ring that hooks into the ring on the receiver. This allows cavalry troopers to release the firearm without losing it while on horseback. These slings were issued throughout the Civil War and Indian Wars period. The Armi Sport rifle versions also have this carbine sling ring assembly. While generally not correct for the original rifle configuration Spencers, some carbines were re-barreled after the war as rifles and retained the sling ring, and some early rifles like those used by Wilder's Lightning Brigade had assorted sling rings added to the stock wrist on the left side. The rifle version is a three band, 30-inch barrel "Army" model.

The Spencer looked like a Sharps single shot rifle with a receiver that has been squashed flat. There is a tubular magazine in the butt stock, reminiscent of early Browning .22 LR autoloaders. The trigger guard acts as the loading lever like the single shot Sharps, and the Sharps-like hammer must be cocked manually with each shot. This two stage cycling of the action is slower than with a traditional Winchester or Marlin lever gun.

Loading and firing is simple. First open the action by pulling down the lever. Inspect the chamber to ensure it is empty. Close the action. With the rifle pointing muzzle down at a slight angle in a safe direction, rotate the top of the magazine tube base that is inset into the butt stock 90 degrees clockwise. Withdraw the magazine tube. This contains the follower and magazine spring, which is totally captured in the tube. Insert seven live rounds, nose first, into the open butt stock. The recently discontinued .45 S&W version held eight, while the similarly discontinued .44 Russian held nine. Like any tubular magazine rifle, make sure you use flat nose bullets. Allow the rounds to slide down the tube gently (DO NOT HOLD THE RIFLE PERPENDICULAR TO THE GROUIND AND DROP ROUNDS STRAIGHT DOWN! This is just common sense, folks!). Insert the magazine tube into the butt stock all the way, rotating it back to the upright position to lock in place.

To fire, first go to half cock with the hammer. Then, you open the action by pulling down the trigger guard/action lever. This allows a live round to enter the receiver from the magazine. Close the action by lifting the lever. This forces the live round into the chamber. Now you cock the hammer to full cock, aim, and fire. To chamber another round, open the action again. An extractor under the center of the chamber (called a Lane extractor) rotates from under the chamber and grabs the center of the bottom of the shell case's rim, forcing the spent round from the chamber, up over the cartridge keeper lever holding the next live round in the receiver, and out of the top ejection port. Ejection is very positive. The action is then closed, chambering a fresh round. (Continued on page 60)





Another reason is at a number of Cowboy Action ShootingTM Regional matches I have attended we played poker, so it is part of Cowboy Action ShootingTM as far as I am concerned. A third reason is it was played in the Old West

BIGGER DEAL A Year Inside The Poker Boom


by many of our heroes of yore (okay, they played a lot of faro, too, but that's a whole nuthuh smoke!).

Actually, originally known as ipoqueî, poker was introduced into the United States in the 1820's, specifically in Louisiana, by French Sailors. Most importantly, however, 80 million people, 1.5 percent of the global population, play poker regularly. Far more importantly than that, 37.5 percent of that 80 million are Americans. That's right, 30 million Americans play poker regularly and SASS is now approximately 80,000 members strong, so that means 8,000 Cowboy Action Shooters probably play poker regularly. If 10 percent of us play poker, and who knows how many watch it on television, that is a good enough reason for me to write a review of a book about the world of poker!

The author is a writer of another stripe, by the way – actually, he is a critic. Specifically, he is a classical music critic, but he has also been asked to critique various theater, music, and film performances, not to mention a restaurant or two from time to time. The importance of that is Mr. Holden knows how to write, and write well, and his skill in writing makes his second year in the poker boom amazingly fun and exciting to read about. (His first book, "Big Deal," takes place some years earlier as the international poker boom developed.)

If you ever watch a poker game, you know it can be almost as exciting as watching grass grow, except on television now you can see the players' hole cards and that makes it incrementally more interesting and exciting. In any case, if you think a book about watching poker sounds boring, you need to think again. Anthony Holden exposes the hole cards of the poker world and, indeed, he makes it quite interesting and exciting.

The poker boom is a doubleedged, worldwide phenomenon due as much to television as to the Internet. The various on-line card rooms are discussed in detail, including the history of how an unlikely named Internet poker player, Chris Moneymaker (a CPA by trade, amusingly enough!), won the World Series of Poker Main Event in 2003 and *(Continued on next page)*



changed everything. The book goes way beyond that, however, because details of hands from other famous poker games from other World Series and other major events are told in a style that just makes you feel like you were there. Holden is that good at telling poker stories!

Additionally, the author writes details about his own games and his attempt to make it to the Final Table of the 2006 WSOP. If you're a poker player, then you readily feel his exultation when he wins, and easily feel his pain as he fails to make it to his long held dream. But the book is more than that because international play comes alive through Holden's pen, games that we in America, are unaware of and never fully hear about. The impact of these games on the international poker boom is felt, the exhaustion of marathon tournaments is, indeed, well described (just try it sometime as your Nubbins has and you will truly understand!), and you will almost be as tired as the author when the tale is fully told.

If you love poker, if you watch it on TV, if you understand the game at all, you will enjoy reading this book. I highly recommend it.

The loading process can be expedited by using a Blakeslee Quicloader. The original 1860s Blakeslee device consists of a leather covered long wood block with six to ten longitudinal holes bored into it. In these holes were metal tubes that held seven rounds each of Spencer ammunition. When the magazine tube was removed from the stock, a tube was removed from the Blakeslee box, and the rounds were dumped into the open magazine in the butt stock. It was one of the first speed loading devices. Taylor's, Civil War Leather Co, and Fall Creek Sutler all have reproduced a beautiful six-tube Blakeslee box complete with shoulder strap. Civil War Leather even has a ten-tube infantry version. The various makes of Blakeslee sell from around \$125 to \$260, depending on quality. I bought the Civil War Leather ten-tube model. It was Awesome! They work great.

I believe Blakeslee loaders would be allowed at a match, only when loading at the loading table, since SASS regulations prohibit using speed loaders during the match. Reloads during the match would be done with single rounds through the top ejection port, just as with the traditional lever rifles. As the Blakeslee is definitely period, and using it at the loading table offers no competitive advantage, I believe there would be no complaints, as long as they were not used for reloads during firing. In fact, the Spencer by its very nature puts you at a competitive disadvantage except for "STYLE!"

Another nice feature of this stock mounted tubular magazine is it can be readily, easily, and safely unloaded. It is not necessary to cycle live rounds through the action to empty the magazine like Marlins and Winchesters. You simply rotate the magazine base 90 degrees, withdraw the tube from the butt stock, and tip the muzzle up to empty the magazine of live rounds. The action should be cleared after this to ensure there are no live rounds in the chamber or under the cartridge keeper lever. The only other Cowboy Action ShootingTM rifle that can be emptied this easily is the Henry rifle. Hmmmm ... That is very interesting considering both rifles originated in 1860! Maybe they were just a little more practical back then.

As with the originals, there is no *(Continued on next page)*

safety, other than a hammer half cock. This is appropriate for Cowboy Action Shooting[™], and is refreshing that the original has been duplicated, trusting that intelligent shooters will use the firearm! How many other firearms manufacturers have added obnoxious and unnecessary safeties to make the lawyers and litigators happy.

Disassembly for cleaning is very simple. First, ensure it is unloaded. Open the action and remove the lever screw. The breechblock and lever assemblies just come right out leaving the receiver empty and open for easy cleaning. The breech and lever units are also easily cleaned while out of the rifle. Break down, cleaning, and re-assembly was accomplished in mere minutes, even after shooting blackpowder and Pyrodex loads. This is a real plus for us blackpowder shooters. If you shoot a Henry or 1866, disassembly for cleaning is a pain in the posterior. An 1873 is a little better with its easily removed side plates, and Marlins are not too bad either. The Taylor's 1865 Spencer, however, has them all beat for ease of disassembly and cleaning!

HOW DOES IT SHOOT?

As far as target shooting went, they all preformed very well. For the pistol caliber Spencers, Black Hills Ammo supplied their excellent 200grain .44-40 WCF and 230 grain .45



I wish I had a .45 Colt sample to shoot, but they are still scarce as hen's teeth. I did include data from a .45 Schofield version of the carbine, as even though they are discontinued, they are still plentiful and should be representative of the .45 Colt with a 250-grain bullet. Ten-X supplied me with .56-50 ammo (both blackpowder substitute and smokeless) for the big-bore carbine and the rifle. I also had my pet .56-50 hand load of 40 grains volume of Hodgdon's Triple Seven, CCI large magnum rifle, and a 350 grain bullet made from a cut down 500 grain LEE .50-70 mold lubed with LEE Alox liquid lube.

All groups were at about 30 yards, using crossed buffalo sticks for a casual rest. The only change on the guns I made before firing was to open the rear sight notch a tad. The carbines, in .45 Schofield, .44-40 and .56-50, were dead on the money, right out of the box. The rifle, on the other hand shot about 5 inches below point of aim at 25 yards! The front sight was much too tall. I trimmed the front sight a little at a time, until I brought it up to about one-inch above POA at 25 yards. As you can see from the table below, the Carbine in .44-40, using Black Hills ammo was the absolute best performer.

LOADS

- .44-40 CARBINE: BLACK HILLS 200 Grain: Sub-3/4 inch cloverleaf, about one inch above POA! Best performer of any Spencer I have fired.
- .45 SCHOFIELD CARBINE: BLACK HILLS 230 Grain: 1 inch group, dead on point of aim. Almost as good as the .44-40.
- .45 SCHOFIELD CARBINE; 25 grn. Triple 7 (volume) w/250 grn. SPG bullet: 1-1/2 inch group, 1 inch above point of aim
- .56-50 CARBINE: 40 grn. (volume) 777 with 350 grain modified 50-70 Lee bullet. Fairly stout load. Averaged about a 1 inch group, 1-1/2" above POA. Really thumps the steel! Good deer load, too, I would imagine.
- .56-50 CARBINE: TEN-X BP substitute loads: Fairly tame load! The best group I got with them was a 1-1/4" group, dead on point of aim at 25 yards.
- .56-50 CARBINE: TEN-X smokeless loads: Their smokeless loads were noticeably stiffer, but shot a decent 1-3/4" group, though they shot about 2-3" left of the blackpowder substitute loads, but at the same level.
- .56-50 RIFLE: 40 grn. (volume) 777 with 350 grain modified 50-70 Lee bullet. Averaged about a 1-1/4 inch group, 1 inch above POA.

I have never enjoyed shooting any rifle as much as the 1865 Spencers! Both carbines and rifles are an absolute joy to shoot. Despite their hefty 8.8 pounds, they throw up to the



shoulder naturally, and seemed to point at the target all by itself. It is one of the most naturally pointing rifles I have ever had the pleasure to shoot. With the .56-50 rifle and carbine, and with the .44-40 carbine, I was able to bounce pop cans at 20 to 25 yards with every shot from an offhand standing position.

Taylor's specified in their literature using factory ammo only, and using only flat nose projectiles. Using flat nose bullets is an absolute MUST for the tubular magazine Spencer. Many originals were converted from rim-fire to center-fire, and the original round nose follower (resembling a round nose of a projectile) were not flattened. My pard "Hanging Judge Hemp's" original detonated like a bomb about 10-12 years ago when it and rider were bucked off at a Civil War re-enactment. The butt hit the ground, and the round nose follower set off a chain reaction of an entire magazine. destroying the gun behind the receiver. Use of round nose projectiles can cause the same result!

CONCLUSION

Granted, the Taylor's 1865 Spencer is not the Cowboy Action ShootingTM main match long gun for speed demons and top competitors. In fact, one time Wild Bill Briscoe commented he could time me with a sundial when I was shooting the Spencer at one match! Besides being slower to cock between shots, most stages have nine or ten rifle shots. Ten shots will cause you a little lost time single loading two or three rounds through the top to make the full compliment. It is not as bad as it sounds, however. I keep some loose rounds in my strong-side vest pocket for easy access. The main point is that what you lose in speed, you more than make up for in style! I am sure that some day, someone will come up with a ten shot, 3/4 scale Spencer in .32 H&R or .45 Cowboy with a titanium breech block and self cocking hammer to make "gamers" happy. Until then, at least in my book, the Armi Sport Spencer is the epitome of "STYLE" and "Spirit of the Game."

The Armi Sport 1865 Spencer is the perfect long gun for someone whose character is a mid-1860s persona armed with percussion revolvers and a mule-eared shotgun. It is also appropriate for anyone up to late 1870's or early 1880's. Many a former Civil War soldier would tote a Spencer carbine west, and many an Indian Wars Cavalry Trooper would also be armed with a Spencer. Plainsmen, cowboys, and lawmen alike would find the \$5 price for a surplused military Spencer a bargain too hard to pass up.

When I shoot my personal Taylor's .56-50 Spencer carbine, it does something to my vision. I begin to see things in the sulfurous smoke. I see torn battlefields during the War Between the States. I also see the Spencer armed troopers on Beecher's island repelling the fierce Sioux war chief Red Cloud and his warriors in this swirling haze. Finally, I see hardscrabble settlers trekking the woods in search of game or defending the homestead from renegades, with a Spencer carbine in hand. Most of all, I feel a sense of history, and of being a little part of that past.

(Continued from page 23) Revolutionary War. I was even handed a loaded flintlock musket to fire across the "green." And with a "pop" of the priming powder and boom of the main charge, flame and smoke flashed and rolled across the field. No balls of course ... (in the musket!) ... as we didn't want to hurt anyone.

Next stop: Maysville, Kentucky, where Harriet Beecher Stowe got the inspiration for her novel, "Uncle Tom's Cabin." This area was home to many abolitionists and on the "route" of the "underground railroad," assisting escaping slaves during the Civil War period.

As we journeyed toward our final destination of Cincinnati, two traditions of a Kincaid's Irregulars Adventure had yet to take place. The first was the "Captain's Dinner Evening, Dress in Your Very Best Finery" with attendant promenade (pre-approved by the captain, of course) around the dining room. This was accomplished in fine style, as usual, and the "regular" passengers, even those seated at the Captain's Table, were duly impressed. 

IDAHO TERRITORY-SIX-GUN JUSTICE

Resburg, Idaho - On Septem-ber 14th and 15th, 2007, the Idaho Territory two-day SIX-GUN JUSTICE match took place at Heritage Town, Twin Butte Bunch's section of the USC range near Rexburg, Idaho. Seventyeight shooters from east to west coasts came to participate in the match set in bermless lava beds. Teton County Jr., SASS #3714, put together the club's biggest event of the year, and Match Director, Lava Rock Kid, SASS #64929, dreamed up 12 stages based on stories from Louis L'Amour's Sackett series, incorporating 24 different sweeps.

After reading stage descriptions, a mob formed, but before the lynching could take place, Lava Rock Kid swore all the sweeps were legit because he had looked them

up on the Internet. The mob backed down, and the match began with the story from Sackett Brand on Stage 1. Everyone soon realized the stage was a lot of fun.

The fun continued in Stages 2 through 6 on the first day, with stories from Day Breakers, Ride the Dark Trail, Ride the River, Lando, and Mojave Crossing. Some of the sweeps had unfamiliar names, such as the Hermit Joe Sweep, with the first rifle round on the far right target and sweeping left with alternating shots on the far right target. Shooting took place in the Livery with Cactus Buck and Poverty sweeps, at the outlaw cabin corral using a California Sweep, with shooter kneeling to shoot between the corral's poles, and then riding a "mule" (a really cute stick horse) where the shotgun was staged. Mother Stage took shooters between the jagged rocks of a narrow pass, and the Louisiana Swing, (alternating single shots from outside to inside) for the rifle and a Brat Sweep for pistols (don't ask).

Friday night's potluck provided plenty to eat, and the Fall River Boys band had everyone laughing at their stories and tapping toes to their music.

The second day's stages began with Mustang Man on Stage 7, and a pistol Firelands Sweep, a rifle Gorilla Sweep, and a shotgun Desperado Sweep. Treasure Mountain provided the story for Stage 8 with shooters sitting in a covered wagon and shooting everything from there, including an ingenious rocking horse target.

Using the novel Lonely on the Mountain on Stage 9, shooters had to save Logan Sackett from the gallows by alternating shots between a small gong that lowered the

hanging dummy - representing Logan - and a stampeding herd of cattle. Shooters ran up the stairs to give Logan a shotgun (via Velcro on both Logan's chest and the stock of the fake shotgun), and then shoot pistols down at the bad guys behind the gallows.

Stage 10, with a story from Sackett, had shooters in the brush and lava rocks, fighting off an outlaw gang. Stage 11 from To the Far Blue Mountains took place at Fort Fizzle, and shooters used pistols for an Arkansas Shuffle from the lookout walk and an Arizona Sweep with the rifle from the gate. The shotgun targets consisted of two knockdown targets and one (Continued on next page)

(Continued from previous page) popper using a full can of pop that flew up and squirted fizzy liquid like fireworks (if it was hit). Twin Butte Bunch likes poppers, especially if they're using cans of cheap pop instead of clay birds.

Shooters on Stage 12, based on The Lonely Man, had to run into a teepee, retrieve a rubber doll and carry it around while shooting, a little easier said than done. Most shooters stuffed the doll under suspender straps, or into vests, but I'll tell ya, levering a rifle with a doll's head flopping in your face is miserably hard. Next time the doll goes into the vest headfirst! A Black Jack Abernathy sweep used 9 rifle rounds, and with the 10th round shooters tried for a long distance target and a 10 second bonus.

The weather was great on both days, sunny and warm. Tired but happy shooters gathered at the clubhouse for the Awards Dinner and a good catered meal. Winners from each category were called up to receive trophies and certificates, and have their photos taken by

new place. His wife divorced him and took their children back East, but the fact that Dieter was willing to chance the loss is a testimony to Etta's appeal. Dieter and Clark lived as husband and wife although they never married.

Etta Clark's new three-story bordello had 32 rooms, two parlors, a huge dining area, a ballroom and many bedrooms, costing Dieter over \$125,000 to build and furnish. An 1881 El Paso Times editorial said the mansion was the 'finest parlor house' in the entire Tenderloin. It was a showplace pointed out to tourists who arrived at the turn of the century. When the building was razed to make way for Paisano Drive in 1947, elderly men came to collect bricks in remembrance of their time spent at Etta's.

In February 1890, Alice Abbott leased her brothel to another young madam, Tillie Howard. Whether tired of public harassment or suffering from poor health, Abbott retired from the business, spending several lonely and unhappy years. In her early 40's, Abbott died on April 7, 1896, of a heart attack and was buried at Evergreen Cemetery. Her death went unnoticed by reporters because of a widespread interest in a boxing match and the municipal election campaign.

In 1904, Clark began to feel ill and decided it would be easier to run her brothel on the third floor of the Myar Opera House. When the Myar Opera House burned down in 1905, she barely escaped alive and suffered complications from smoke inhalation. In 1908, on a trip with her sister to Atlanta, she died of these complications.

Because the "fines" the city levied on prostitutes paid the salaries of the police and fire departments, town fathers often turned a deaf ear to complaints about the brothels. The city fathers allowed prostitution to flourish unchecked, but in 1882 began enforcing sections 49 and 73 of the City Charter, ordering the arrest of all wanton women and their employers. Actually, the word "arrest" was a misnomer. There was an understanding that a fine collector would be appointed to collect a "fine" from each girl. The fine was actually a license to practice their trade. Madams all over the West ran their businesses successfully and at least some observers see them as the feminists of their age.

On July 10, 1883, Assistant City Marshal Thomas Mode along with jailer Jim Wheat responded to Abbott's brothel on a disturbance. During his investigation, Mode was shot several times and staggered out, collapsing in the mud of Utah Street. Authentically Designed 1800's Elk and Buckskin Clothing

Virginia, just over the border from both Kentucky and Ohio is the Putnam County Gun Club. This is the home of the Kanawha Valley Regulators (KVR). The KVR organized in 1998 and struggled through some very lean years as they looked for a suitable home and the members learned the rudiments of Cowboy Action ShootingTM. They shot for several years on abandoned coalmine property that was better suited for mountain goats and blackberries than cowboys. Simply getting there was a struggle. Very few folks from outside the Charleston area ever shot there, and those that shot at the KVR seldom, if ever, went anywhere else to shoot. Even those in the county had trouble getting there sometimes. About four years ago this group became a shooting discipline of the Putnam County Gun Club, and following a breaking in period in the new location and the addition of some new blood to the group, the club has really begun to take off.

In the past 24 months club members have constructed a top-notch shelter with picnic tables, a covered firing line that accommodates four stages and provides complete cover in inclement weather, a new Buffalo Flats Post Office shooting stage, a fort, and finally a livery stable. At present the club has eight stages available on perfectly flat ground (an obvious rarity in the state of West Virginia). The shooting line is covered in limestone, so it provides easy access to all individuals regardless of age or walking ability, and two of the shooting bays are independent of the other six so downrange movement is easily facilitated.

On July 28 and 29, 2007 the Kanawha Valley Regulators held their first two day shoot consisting of 10 challenging stages with close targets and lots of downrange movement. Thirty-five participants enjoyed the shooting and the free lunch on Sunday. The match was a warm up for next year's two-day event when the Kanawha Valley Regulators will host the SASS West Virginia State Blackpowder Championship. That event will be held on July 12th and 13th 2008 with blackpowder side matches on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning (11-12). Planning for next year's match has already begun and will have some new targets, new props, lots of fun blackpowder side matches, and maybe even some homemade ice cream. So, if you enjoy shooting blackpowder, mark your calendars for next July and come on over and shoot with us.

The Kanawha Valley Regulators shoot on the 3rd weekend of the month on alternating Saturdays and Sundays and usually have a practice shoot on the 2nd Saturday of the month, March through November. They have an excellent website that can be accessed through the SASS website. The range is located next to the city park in Eleanor, West Virginia on Rt. 34 between Charleston and Point Pleasant. So, if you are looking for a great place to shoot, with easy access, pleasant folks, and an outstanding range, come to Putnam County, West Virginia. Even if you don't like to shoot, just come to gawk at the only flat shooting range in the state! You won't be sorry. A.



for a 20 second bonus. I believe three shooters got all nine of the black ones, so time determined the placing. No one hit the bonus, which tells me it was too hard.

Warning: Philosophical Dissertation

I'm of the opinion that bonuses should be like the rest of the targets in a SASS match. Most contestants should be able to hit them if they take the time. Many will still miss them because they shoot too fast, and those who hit them fastest will still come out ahead. Missing isn't fun. It's frustrating. The better shooters will still win. Everyone else will still have more fun.

Back to the Story

There were two afternoon side matches. A four-stage Plainsman match had a smoky and a smokeless Plainsman category to increase participation. Smokeless Plainsman is an oxymoron, like jumbo shrimp or military intelligence, but it added a few participants. Simultaneously a four-stage train robbery used all main match firearms plus a derringer and a pocket pistol. The fatigue factor took over. None of the Plainsmen shot the Train Robbery, and none of the Train Robbers shot Plainsman, all finishing between three and four pm after a morning start for the buffalo hunt.

For the main match I lucked into getting on a posse with Tex again. This led to, as expected, some interesting stories, most of which I can't tell. Some I can. On one stage I didn't knock over one of the pistol knockdowns with a center hit and had to make it up with the shotgun. Tex kidded me unmercifully about my wimpy loads. Wimpy! They made it to the target! Who are you calling Wimpy? A wimpy load is one you wouldn't mind getting shot with. It should be noted Tex puts 40 grains of wholly black in his Ruger Old Armies when he shoots them. I put in about half that, about 1/3 more than the amount the smoke standard was made from. The next stage had two knockdowns, then three targets with each pistol. The sound went like this:

BANG! BANG! Pop pop pop. BANG! BANG! Cackle! Cackle! Cackle! (from

the gallery—Tex, of course.)

Pop pop pop ...

"Gamer! Gamer!"

Well, duh! This is a game, isn't it? If the targets were shooting at us (a) I would be elsewhere (b) failing that, I would have different loads, and different firearms, preferably crew served and belt fed.

A later stage had one of the new plate racks, with five plates one in front of the other, the biggest on the front, each one smaller, and the last one pretty small. According to Tex, it sounded like this when I shot:

sand that delineated areas for gun carts and gun cart free zones. With the gun carts kept off to the side, spectators could actually see the shooters in action! What a concept! They might make this a spectator sport of this yet!

Free Margaritas!

The Saturday night party started with free Margaritas (but no salted rims!) That's always a good start. The costume contest was limited to best Lawman, Law Lady, Outlaw, and Outlaw Lady.

For several years at the Convention I've told people attending my costume seminar not to take costume contests seriously, because judges are involved. You can work very hard making an authentic, unusual costume with all of the details right and get beaten by a dog with a badge and cowboy hat.

Larson E. Pettifogger brought out his dog, a Pomeranian, with a complete cowboy outfit, including SASS badge and RO1 and RO2 pin. He won Best Law Dog.

MEMO TO EVENT COMMITTES:

If you're going to offer free Margaritas, you might want to have the costume contest first. The presentations might be more coherent, and less giggly.

Disregard this if you like giggly, incoherent presentations. Some were pretty funny.

This is not a complaint concerning free Margaritas. I'm all for free Margaritas at EVERY SASS Party. I'm also in favor of giggly, incoherent presentations, especially by the competition if I'm entered.

Back to Texas

We wandered back to Texas via the Big Texan Steak Ranch in Amarillo and the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City.

The first target was Badlands Bar-3 in northeast Texas. T-Bone Dooley had kindly agreed to let me use their facilities for practice, and we wanted to shoot their monthly match.

I noticed the timer operators all had very small hand held timers. These were connected by RF to big display boards. You could just look at the board to see how the shooter had done. Wow! Why hasn't EVERY club gotten these? SASS is working on improving the spectator appeal, as noted above. This would do a LOT. In my previous life I was involved in motorsports. Autocrossing involved one car at a time through a course. There was ALWAYS a big display board, and as soon as the car crossed the finish line the audience (and the driver) knew exactly how the driver did.

after the last shot, the timer operator just had to hit the "Review" button, and further shots weren't counted.

If you want to improve spectator appeal, the addition of a big display board immediately displaying the shooter's time available for all to see would be a good start. *A*.






Once again our stalwart Stage Designer, Texas Jack Morales, surprised us with the simplicity of his stages. He has been doing this for

Between them they essentially followed the Judge's advice and put the targets up close where everyone can miss with regularity. They worked hard to avoid procedural traps and their primary thought was stages should be designed for everyone, not just the top shooters. The shooters love it, and this helps make our annual shoot the success it is.

Twelve Stages were shot—six on Friday and six on Saturday. On Sunday, the Master Gunfighter Stage was shot, and after that, the Awards Assembly. The Master Gunfighter Stage pitted the top 16 men and 8 women against each other to determine the shoot-off winnermen versus men, women versus women. In the final match, the top man faced the top lady. Not to be confused with the overall top gunsimply a fun shoot-off stage (results are listed below). Side Matches were shot Friday and Saturday after the main match stages.

for any shooter who experienced a firearm mechanical failure despite the number of rounds fired. The failure had to be a legitimate firearm failure, such as a broken firing pin, NOT an ammunition failure. Inspection of the firearm, be it hand gun, rifle, or shotgun, was conducted by either the RO or Match Director, and the deci-



sion to allow a re-shoot depended on the result of that inspection.

"Considering the cost of traveling to these shoots, and also considering Cowboy Action ShootingTM is supposed to be a fun sport, I thought it would be a good idea to try this reshoot policy," said Texas Jack. "Now I'm glad I did," he continued, "because a couple of shooters had legitimate failures and were allowed a re-shoot. You should have seen the smiles on their faces when the announcement was made they would be permitted a re-shoot. Now that's having fun! I think it's a policy Territorial Governors should suggest to their clubs, and SASS should seriously consider and encourage," he concluded. We agree Texas Jack! Keep up the innovative thinking!

HELPING HANDS.

A thing that amazes folks about Cowboy Action ShootingTM is the camaraderie and willingness to help that visiting shooters provide before and during a shoot. One such shooter, Shenandoah, SASS #746, from Stockton, California is a perfect example. He worked harder during the shoot than some of our own club members. He set targets, picked up brass, manned the loading/unloading tables, and kept score during the Cowboy Trap event. His attitude and help are

examples of why Cowboy Action ShootingTM is different from other shooting sports. He and a couple of other hard working "out of townies," Bad Eye Lefty, SASS #35114, and Tumbleweed Thom, SASS #346, exemplify the "Cowboy Way!" Thanks Pards!



Things kicked off on Friday afternoon with registration and some really exciting side matches. Competition included a wide assortment of stages that allowed everyone a chance of showcasing their skills.



I'm sure as 2008 rolls






around a full compliment of competitors will register again. It is a good cause and a good shoot. Hope Dapper Dan will not be in charge of the weather anymore.






SASS #49462.





The shooters were particularly thrilled over the new cut-through between two of the stages, which saved on time and walking, and with the fabulous new permanent building on Stage 10, erected in honor of Muleskinner Micah, a CKR member lost to cancer a year ago. The club had done a fabulous job of "dressing up" the cut-through with bones, vultures, and even a fallen cowboy, and the stages themselves were decorated with all kinds of Old West items from lanterns and washboards to a dressmaker's mannequin and real sagebrush. The awesome props included an 1890's buggy, two antique wagons, a 3/4 scale stagecoach, a train, a permanent cabin, Boot Hill Cemetery, a permanent "town" with six building fronts and a kick-down door, a bank, horses, cacti, etc. There was some nice new signage as well, most notably the PG-rated Boarding House sign.

The stages themselves were great—fun, fair, and safe, affording plenty of movement, along with interesting target acquisitions that managed to be challenging without becoming procedural traps.
