've been instrumental in developing, defining, and advocating new shooting categories since the late '80s. The idea was to provide avenues to "advance" or try something different once a particular discipline had been mastered. This was a way to keep the game fresh for everyone and prevent burnout. For the top competitors, once they've consistently reached the winner's circle, there's no way to go but down ... even if one continues to work very hard. Those shooters now have the opportunity

### SHOOTING CATEGORIES — ONE MORE TIME

to "move on" and explore new challenges. For the more relaxed shooters, after shooting the "same old discipline" for a few years, trying different shooting categories is a way to keep the game just as exciting as the day they started.

When folks sign up for any of the shooting categories beyond Traditional and Modern, I'm overjoyed. This means other cowboys and cowgirls have discovered the fun in our "additional" shooting disciplines. However, many of these other disciplines often don't have enough participation to warrant a separate category, and over the years the dynamic of the shooting categories has changed ... it may well be time to reexamine what we as match directors are doing.

While the text in the Shooters Handbook has evolved over the years, the general intent of the categories has not. First of all, recognize there are no men's categories.

Anyone, for example, can shoot in the Traditional category unless they're shooting an adjustable sighted revolver ... this includes men, women, old folks, kids, blackpowder shooters, and even cap and ball competitors. SASS recognizes eight basic categories ... and every match should start with the proposition these eight categories should be offered. (These categories are: Traditional. Modern, Gunfighter, Duelist, Frontier Cartridge, Frontiersman, Classic Cowboy, and B-Western.) All shooters can easily be assigned to one of these basic categories.

Without obligation to do so, SASS also recognizes several "protected" shooting categories based upon gender and age. The ladies can opt out of the regular categories, if they so desire, and shoot with other ladies. So can the Juniors, Buckaroos, Seniors, Silver Seniors, and Elder Statesmen. And here's where part of the problem begins ...

With the age brackets defined, gender recognized, and the basic categories established, it's a small matter to begin combining these into a myriad of additional categories. A Senior Ladies Frontier Cartridge Gunfighter category would be easily and unambiguously recognized among today's competitors. While almost any of the potential combined categories could be recognized by match directors, only a subset are commonly accommodated; however, this has led to providing awards for roughly 30 categories at many of the major matches, including state championships and Regionals. And, to make matters worse, often awards are purchased to recognize competitors 10-deep. Any match with less than 300 shooters has no chance of filling out that many winning slots ... and indeed, even END of TRAIL and Winter Range cannot. One pro-(Continued on page 82)

## 1876 - A YEAR OF TRANSITION AND CELEBRATION!

he date is July 2, 1776, and the Second Continental Congress, meeting in Philadelphia, declared the independence of the United States of America. Two days later, on July 4, Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence.

In treaty negotiations to end the war, the United States was able to negotiate boundaries for the United States over the Allegheny Mountains reaching to the Mississippi River and the southern Great Lakes region, which included a huge unsettled region nearly as large as Western Europe. The United States was the first major colony successfully to revolt against colonial rule. It was



the first "new nation."

So, let's fast forward one hundred years!

In the 19th century, westward expansion of United States territory began, and incredibly, the United States would occupy all the North American land east to west, from the Atlantic to Pacific Oceans.

And now, it is 1876, the United States is 100 years old, and many interesting things happened that year.

Mark Twain released his novel, "Tom Sawyer."

It was the year Major League Baseball came into existence.

After being wounded in the hip during a gunfight in Sweetwater, Texas, Bat Masterson agreed to become Assistant City Marshal of Dodge City.

It was the year all indigenous peoples in the US were ordered to reservations. This was not a popular policy among the original Americans.

On March 17,th after Sioux chieftains, Sitting Bull and Crazy Horse, refuse to comply with the Federal government's order to leave the Black Hills of the Dakota Territory, General George Crook attacked their forces, defeating them at the Battle of Powder River, beginning the Great Sioux War.

On June 17th, Crook's forces are forced to withdraw following his defeat by Crazy Horse at the Battle of Rosebud.

On June 25,th while leading an attack into a Sioux village, Brigadier General George Armstrong Custer is ambushed and wiped out by over 2,000 Sioux and Comanche warriors led by Sitting Bull and Crazy Horse at the Battle of Little Bighorn.

> On August 2nd, James "Wild Bill" Hickok is shot in the back of the head and killed by a drunk during a poker game in Deadwood, South Dakota. Hickok cards, supposedly two pair, aces and eights, at the time of his death, has since been known to gamblers as the "dead man's hand."

On September 7th, several members of the James-Younger Gang, including Cole Younger, are captured after the failed robbery of the First National Bank leads to a gunfight with bank employees and local residents in Northfield, Minnesota.

United States Presidential election of 1876 was one of the most disputed and intense Presidential elections in American history. Samuel J. Til-

den of New York defeated Ohio's Rutherford Hayes in the popular vote. The votes were ultimately awarded to Hayes after a bitter electoral dispute.

The Centennial International Exhibition of 1876, the first official world's fair in the United States, was held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence in Philadelphia.



Consumer products first displayed to the public include:

- Alexander Graham Bell and the telephone. Bell acquired his patent and made the first phone
- The Remington Typographic Machine (typewriter)
- Heinz Ketchup
- Wallace-Farmer Electric Dynamo, precursor to electric light
- Hires Root Beer

Yet there was another event that year whose reverberations are still being felt today. It was the year the stuffy old Westminster Kennel Club decided to hold the first national championship for dogs and select the best pure bred dog in America. It doesn't get much better than that!!

Socially, Martha Washington balls were all the rage during the 19th century, celebrated on George Washington's birthday every year. It was popular to dress up in Revolutionary style clothing.

But this year, 1876, was the Centennial. We were 100 years old! The new nation had made it much longer than anyone thought possible. It was time for celebrations, a birthday

The flag that flew atop Independence Hall that night was one of George Washington's battle flags used at Valley Forge. The celebration started with a reading of the Declaration of Independence and the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner." The party lasted until 4:00 in the morning. The New Year, our Centennial, had started with a bang!

1876 was a transitional period during fashion history. Ladies fashion was changing once again, going from the pencil straight lines of the Natural Form Era to the exaggerated lines of the Grand Bustle Era. During 1876, you would see ladies in both fashions, and you would even see both fashions displayed in one fashion plate. What more could a girl want than to pick the fashion that suited her figure the best and still be in style?!

Celebrations and parties were the name of the game, and everyone wanted to be part of the festivities. The Centennial rekindled a new interest in our nation's colonial past. Many of the festivities that were held were hosted by George and Martha Washington. Well, not really, but it seemed that everyone wanted to be a hero or a hero's wife, and what better hero was

there than our nation's father, George Washington. The Martha Washington Balls were attended by ladies in Revolutionary style dresses, while the men wore their tuxedos of the nineteenth century. The dresses were very creative, ranging in style from natural form to grand bustle. Then, there were other celebrations that used our technological progress as inspiration. 





It's usually a weekend when ya shoot, and you have made the conscious decision to spend your time, energy, and money at this here shoot. Whether yer leadin' a posse or are one of the many posse members, have a positive attitude, display an air of energy; shucks, hoot and holler when each posse member shoots a clean stage, don't act like it's Monday morning and yer back at the office. I believe that's the simple difference between a Good Posse, and a not so good posse.

If'in yer a posse leader, then use folks fer their strengths, and try to ignore their weaknesses. It makes the job go easier, and you may find that the posse members gravitate to the posse chores that fits them best anyways. Up front, simply ask all posse members to be an active part, since we are all family 'er friends for the day or two. Briefly give them the "how to properly count" lingo, as it's important, 'cuz you never know who has NOT heard a good, how to count fairly briefing.

Am I reinventing the wheel here? Absolutely not. I am just putting into print what others have done, and that I have come to believe are some of the important components for a great foundation to building a Good Posse. "Find success and then copy it" was something I was taught in a community college in a small business management class oh so many years ago.

#### **OLE DEADEYE - A** DRIVING FORCE IN COWBOY ACTION SHOOTINGTM IN **ARIZONA**

We first met Ole Deadeye, SASS #422, in 1992 at a local cowboy shoot south of Tucson. There was a group of a dozen shooters in attendance, and maybe 4 or 5 more, not present that day, that made up the Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> club known as Los Vaqueros. We were impressed with his friendliness, knowledge, and leadership at those local shoots. As we got to know him better over time, we saw his true strength of character and wisdom in handling a club growing from a handful of folks into a large cohesive group of "like mind and value" folks out for Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>.

Ole Deadeye was the driving force behind starting Los Vaqueros, as well as guiding it through the rapid growth to come. He was instrumental in setting up and organizing matches such as RAILHEAD, BISCUIT FLATS, COWTOWN, and WINTER RANGE in the early days of SASS in Arizona, and later BORDER-TOWN, either as a mentor, board member, or outright "shoot boss." He often said, "If you can shoot well with the Los Vaqueros, you can shoot well with anyone anywhere." The truth of that statement is proven by the number of State, Regional, National, and World Champions that got their start and experience in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> under the guidance of Ole Deadeye at the Los Vagueros club matches.

Ole Deadeye gave the most precious of things he had to and for his family, to and for his country, and to his cowboy friends.

To his family, he gave a life of unfaltering love, devotion, dedication, and guidance.

To his country, he gave his courage, loyalty, extended military service, a thumb, an eye, and both of his legs.

To his cowboy family, he gave his strength, leadership, character, expertise, and friendship.

To all, he freely gave of his time, the most valuable of all gifts.

Ole Deadeye's passing will leave a hole in the hearts of those that knew him. The world is a poorer place without him. He was our friend, and he is missed.



## DISPATCHES FROM CAMP BAYLOR

On other Wednesdays they practice until the wind starts blowing steel targets down. The wind? Oh, yeah. We had wind like this in Houston, but it was usually the leading edge of the hurricane! I've worked setup at Founders Ranch a few times. Usually we were putting building fronts up that had blown down or retrieving a tractor or pickup truck that had blown over the berm. It's a match DQ to shoot over the berm at Founders Ranch. I don't know the penalty when a target goes over the berm in the wind. If you want to drive a bit, the Magdalena Trail Drivers shoot first and third Saturdays, starting at 1 PM and ending with dinner at the local drug store, a total time warp to the '50s.

We spent the winter near Phoenix. The Arizona clubs shoot. A monthly match might have eight stages, and they finish by 1-3 PM (by starting registration at 0800 and first stage at 0900). Here they'll have 4-6 stages, start shooting at 10:00 or 11:00, and take long enough they sometimes need to break for lunch in the middle.

It's all good practice for END of TRAIL, which, after all, uses the same targets, props, and location as two of the local clubs. It's also a lot more fun than working!

#### SASS University-**Long Hunter Shooting School**

I signed up for Long Hunter's Shooting School at Buffalo Stampede as soon as I saw the ad (and, of course, got The Redhead's permission). Long Hunter is famous for his match shooting skills, his running at 110%, as attested to by his destruction of three '97's in matches, and his four dropped guns in competition. If you go flat out, occasionally you're going to crash

and burn. When we were setting up the sets for Buffalo Stampede, one of the workers mentioned Long Hunter had knocked down the set we were working on before, and we had to put it together better. He's also known for his absolute honesty, having called DQs on himself. He is also an awesome posse marshal.

It's hard to write about a school. It's kind of a "You had to be there" situation. My notes are inadequate, but I'll quote some of them anyway:


Front sight determines how fast you shoot. Don't shoot to a rhythm. You'll encounter a small target among big ones and miss it on rhythm.

Move with your knees, not your waist. Knees slightly bent. Boxer stance. 60% of weight on front foot, 40% on the rear.

Grip (two hand): Point (strong (Continued on next page)

(Continued from previous page) hand) thumb at target.

Rifle drill: dry fire at a spot on wall. The spot should be big enough to get a flash sight picture on the target, not just near it. You don't want to practice dropping the hammer when the front sight is just *near* the target. It must be *on* the target. A Post-It note on the far wall of most rooms works very well. Dry firing a '66/73: grind the rim off a snap cap or dummy round with silicone in the primer hole so the round stays in the chamber and protects the firing pin.

Your conscious mind can only think of one thing at a time. Muscle memory and subconscious mind have to handle the rest. The subconscious mind can do several things at once.

Study just the stages you're going to shoot the next day. Relax and enjoy what you're doing.

Wiggle your big toe while waiting. Deep breath/relax. The only pressure you'll have is what you put on yourself. Mental image of sights on the targets. Smooth. Drink plenty of water. One bottle per stage. Don't put any unrealistic expectations on yourself. Shoot smart first, fast second. Don't over think it.

When you practice, the first thing you should do is shoot a stage, and not an easy one. The first stage is the hardest, and on a big match, first stages are 25% of the match.

No do over's. One time only. Get out of your comfort zone. Practice your weaknesses, not your strong points. Set goals against yourself, not someone else.

The notes only covered the classroom, of course. The school was more shooting than classroom. The school is limited to 12 students. We had 11. He doesn't use assistants. When someone is commenting on your shooting errors, it's the guy you're paying to hear. And, he is good at watching you shoot an exercise and then giving specific, cogent methods of correcting your mistakes.

We had a lot of beginners, so some of the exercises took a long time, and we didn't get as much practice on transitions as he would have liked. Every fast shooter will tell you that transitions made the difference between winning and finishing down in the pack. He had a lot of good ideas on transitions, as you would expect of a World Champion. Some of us suggested he have an advanced school for his graduates, one day at the range.

I really liked the school. I'll probably take it again as a refresher.

This is where someone asks, "Well, Capt. George, you've taken Tequila's school. You've taken Evil Roy's school. You've taken Long Hunter's school. If you had to take only one, which one would you rec-

ommend?"

Take the one that's available first. Then take the others. Never stop learning. (Don't judge the school by my performance at Buffalo Stampede!)

#### **The Infamous Aerial Targets**

One part of the school that really interested me was aerial shotgun targets. When I started Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>, I was stunned to see aerial clay birds as targets. I thought we were loosely reenacting Old West gunfights. I could have missed something, but in no Old West gunfights I've studied did anyone take off and fly away.

Long Hunter had a pop up bird launching knockdown set up and gave us all instructions on how to hit the bird. Then, when I shot, he told me what I did wrong. I shot up two or three boxes after the class without a hit. It was a good while before Edward R. S. Canby took me to his club's private range, and we shot crossing and going away birds and pop-ups for several hours. After I shot over a case of 12 gauge shells and a few cases of clays, using the techniques Long Hunter taught me, I was hitting those pesky birds pretty regularly. I never had before.

This illustrates a point. You can go to all the schools you can handle, but if you don't get out to the range and work hard, you won't shoot any better.


I have a wonderful lady who




## LIVE THE OLD WEST THROUGH DURANGO COLORADO'S HERITAGE CELEBRATION

on't you just love to don your Old West or Victorian outfits, especially when doing so lets you step back in time to this era of our country's history we all love and cherish? In the Four Corners area of southwestern Colorado, there's a mountain community perfect for immersing yourself in this period of our country's development. It's Durango, Colorado, a town of approximately 14,000 history buffs, bicyclists, hikers, artists, ranchers, descendants of original area pioneers, and just plain folks who would love to share their town with you.

Durango is located in the San Juan Mountains and boasts fantastic views of the higher peaks and the Animas River. It's a resort town now, but began when the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad first pulled its steam-driven train into the "wide spot in the road" in 1881. This original railroad served as both a passenger train and a vehicle for bringing silver and gold ore into Durango for smelting from Silverton, Rico, and other mining areas. These original narrow gauge tracks are still used for the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad, which runs for sightseeing between Durango and its northern neighbor Silverton, transporting passengers some 50 miles through the prettiest mountain country you'll ever experience.

Durango was never a mining town itself, except for the coal seams its citizens exploited to power the

huge early smelters on the Animas River south of the town. From its incorporation in 1881, Durango boomed from the financial benefits of the smelters, as well as its entrepreneurial enterprises. Everywhere you turn in this little town you catch a glimpse of some part of its history, because Durango prides itself on keeping its early diverse history alive through its architectural preservation efforts, historic activities, and its museums and businesses.

Now, of course, I'm biased because I live there, having escaped "big city" life in Albuquerque just as fast as my husband and I could. However, I think you'd be hardpressed to find a visitor or local say Durango doesn't present numerous opportunities to experience the feel of life in the West in the Victorian era.

Just picture this: Here's a narrow mountain valley with a beautiful trout-filled river running through the middle of it. There's Main Avenue, which is home to most of the town's many very fine restaurants and other places of entertainment (if they're not on Main, they're almost all within walking distance). Since Durango is a substantial tourist destination, places of lodging and restaurants are numerous. At the southern end of Main is the original train depot, with vintage steam trains running daily. In the summer and early fall months, the destination is Silverton, while in cold weather trains travel up to an area in the high mountains called Cascade. Just two blocks away is the historic Strater Hotel, built in the 1880's, which houses the largest collection of antique walnut furniture in the country. In this same general downtown area, you can stroll past both historic business structures and homes. Or, within distance for easy day trips, you can explore old mining areas on Jeep trails, go to Mesa Verde National Park a mere hour away, hike hundreds of mountain and river trails — or just plain hang out.

Now I'm getting to the best part.

From October 9-12, 2008, Durango will be holding its Heritage Celebration, a downtown event being offered for folks to enjoy our rich, diverse past, benefit the community, and, of course, have fun! Planned for the festivities are a multitude of history-related activities. The cornerstone one is the Grand Victorian Ball at the historic Power House, with Miss Tabitha of River Crossing Inc. as dance instructor and prompter at the ball, and the Grandview Victorian Orchestra, who have been the featured performers for many years at the Saturday night ball during the Las Vegas SASS Convention.

Additional activities are being offered, such as the Banquet of the Governors at the Strater Hotel; a special run of the historic steam train (ONLY for those in period attire); a barbershop chorus concert and ice cream social; a "Then and Now" fashion show/luncheon/silent auction; Victorian promenade; historic walking tours led by those "in the know" about Victorian/Old West times here; a mustache contest at the Diamond Belle Saloon; a vintage gun workshop; a special dinner and historic presentation at the Palace Restaurant; a Fort Lewis re-enactment and display by the Sons of the Union Veterans; a tour of our Greenmount cemetery with re-enactors playing pioneers buried there; an old-fashioned game afternoon for kids; and special displays at the Center of Southwest Studies and Animas Museum. Participating downtown merchants, hotels, and restaurants will be offering specials, and people who want to dress up and get into the spirit will find Victorian and/or Old West items for sale in participating stores!

There are numerous SASS members living in and around Durango. As our event's chairperson, I am hoping this first year's festivities become an annual one. And, I would like to suggest perhaps a SASS shoot might become a part of it, which would provide you with even more reason to be here in October!

Plan to join in the fun! You'll be amazed at what you can learn in an




## THE OTHER BULLET: Re-enactors Review

In most places, you can only reminisce about yesterday's colorful western legends. They claim in Cheyenne, Wyoming those legends come to life, energized by the vitality of this western city. "Carved first by the pioneers and molded by the path of the great railroad, Cheyenne's rich and colorful lifestyle beckoned the Easterner with the romantic lure of the West, attracting the rowdy town bars to flourish alongside the elegant opera houses, theatres, and business establishments." Unspoiled mountain vistas, tipped with snow and vast forested wilderness, with nary a man-made silhouette in view, and unbelievably blue sky stretching from horizon to horizon are just a few of the amazing sights Wyoming has

to offer, and Cheyenne is a key city to this state. In September of 1897, a group of

volunteers from the Chevenne business community thought it would be fun and profitable to stage a western celebration. Now more than 2,500 volunteers work around the calendar

to produce an event that borders on two weeks long and includes parades, world-class concerts, chili and chuck-wagon cookoffs, exhibits, Indian Village, military open houses and performances by the United States Air Force Thunderbirds, and, of course, the event that started it

> all-nine Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) rodeos. In the middle of all this is the Cheyenne Gunslingers, a group that has a 25 year-long history as premier volunteers for Cheyenne Frontier Days, performing for the crowds.

Chevenne Frontier Days occurs every summer, usually for the better part of the month of July. Tens of thousands of spectators come from all over the world to eniov the variety of events and can see the Cheyenne Gunslingers perform in addition to nine rodeos, plus caring for the world's largest horse-drawn carriage collection and a remarkable period clothing collection. During Cheyenne Frontier Days (called the world's largest outdoor rodeo), the Cheyenne Gunslingers perform twice a day at noon and 6 pm. All performances are open to the public. The season starts with a noon gunfight on the first Saturday in July and continues through the last Sunday of July. During that period the Cheyenne Gunslingers perform approxi-

mately 56 times. The schedule is posted at: <www.cheyennegunslingers.org>.

2008 is the Cheyenne Gunslingers Association's 25th season. The association was started by several local businessmen in an effort to keep Cheyenne's western heritage alive, representing the period from 1870-1903. The Gunslingers also teach firearms safety and entertain tourists and the local population in

the off-season. Some of the Cheyenne Gunslingers members also shoot with and are members of the Cheyenne Regulators SASS club.

The Cheyenne Gunslingers have twenty-four members, and as a general rule have 10 to 12 members at each performance. The Gunslingers have an annual election to select a new vice-president, and the outgoing vice-president assumes (Continued on next page)

the position of Chief Marshal (president). The new Chief appoints a secretary, treasurer, and various committee heads such as ammo marshal, gunfight marshal, clubhouse manager, public relations marshal, and so forth. They have 28 safety and conduct rules, primarily dealing with firearms safety. Several of these rules are read at each meeting and are briefed to the members prior to each performance. In addition, they start script practice in late April to ensure no bad habits have been developed during the winter. You can see their safety demonstration link on:

At each performance all ammunition is handed out to each individual prior to that performance, and each member must return all his cartridges, both spent and live, at the end of the performance. All performances are in a roped off area, and no one frm the audience is allowed in the area. If anyone enters the area, the performance is immediately halted. In addition, they practice, practice, practice ...

The Cheyenne Gunslingers occasionally do private performances during the year as a way to generate funds for the organization. As a general rule, they will perform within Colorado, Wyoming, and the Nebraska area during off-season by doing parades, fairs, and the like. Because of traveling, props are limited to a hanging rope, balloons, pop cans, and a shotgun. All public performances are free. Each member pays annual dues plus The Cheyenne Gunslingers sell advertising to local businesses. All funds are used to pay for props, ammo, and upkeep. No member receives any remuneration. Any left-over funds at the end of their season supports the local charity, "Hands in Harmony," which uses choreographed sign language to speak to the hearing impaired, to enhance the sound presentation for the hearing, and as a vehicle to reach all audiences with their sign-language message.

Since all members perform with firearms, and they must own their own firearms, it is necessary to limit the age of everyone to 21 or older in the group. On some occasions they will use younger folks when interacting with the audience, but no firearms are allowed to go out into the audience area. One of their most enjoyable events is during Halloween when the Gunslingers perform holdups on the Cheyenne Tourist Bureau Haunted Trolley. This is a lot of fun for everyone in the group, and it really entertains the kids and families on the trolley!

I asked Gatlin Gunn to describe

one of his favorite skits, and he responded with this tale.

"One of our favorite scripts is a gig The Cheyenne Gunslingers call The Meanest Man. It is a script based on a really evil guy coming into town. Upon entering the saloon he picks a fight with several locals and shoots up the saloon and the locals, including shooting the bartender. When the Sheriff's deputy enters the scene, this bad guy also wounds him. Subsequently, he is arrested by the sheriff. After a scene change, this rotten guy is brought before the Judge for a quick trial and hanging. However, he has some friends that attempt to rescue him, which results in a big gunfight. This guy and his friends shoot all the Sheriff's men and start to exit when the Judge grabs a shotgun and shouts, "Justice will be served!" and shoots all these bad guys. This is one of those exciting massive shootouts: the more thunder, smoke, and fire, the more fun it is for all!"

As you can see from the previous skit, the Cheyenne Gunslingers have a reason to start each performance with a disclaimer ... if you expect to see "real history," you came to the wrong place. The Cheyenne Gunslingers are here to try to raise awareness of the danger of improperly handled firearms and to hopefully provide a few laughs and some Old West entertainment.


"Gatlin, what do you think are the outstanding things about your group?"

"When you spend this much time with fellow re-enactors, you become One of our members (Reverend RIP) had diabetes, and he subsequently lost a hand to the sickness. He continued to perform until his death because we were family. The most important thing that everyone in our group supports is firearms safety. The first thing The Cheyenne Gunslingers do at every performance is demonstrate just how dangerous firearms are and stress they must be handled with respect. Our main goal is to continue to provide quality entertainment for the next 25 years! Another goal is to complete the next 25 years without a firearms-related accident ... just like our first 25 years."

### TUNING THE PIETTA CAP & BALL FOR COMPETITION

#### Part 2. Fixing the Problem Areas

In our last session we diagnosed problems and disassembled our Pietta .44 Sheriff's Model. This month, we will fix the problems we identified and reassemble and test our revolver. While our revolver is apart, if you see a burr, remove it. It you see any surfaces with bright marks, polish them. We want every surface that produces friction as the revolver is cycled to be as smooth as possible.


On our project revolver we'll start with the frame and hammer. Smooth and polish the problem areas we identified in the hammer channel in Part 1. Photo 1. LIGHT-



LY break any surfaces on the frame that have razor sharp edges. We don't want to remove any appreciable amount metal or change the frame contours, we just want to lightly dull the sharp edges. In Photo 2 a small diamond file is used




to very LIGHTLY brush over the frame's sharp edges and dull them. Install the hammer and make sure it moves freely in the hammer channel. (Don't tighten the hammer screw to tightly. If the hammer is a close fit, it is possible to tighten the hammer screw enough that it will bind or put drag on the hammer.) Again, like we did in Part 1, put very light side-toside pressure on the hammer as it is moved up and down in the frame. Even after smoothing the hammer channel and breaking the channel's sharp edges, on our project revolver the sides of the hammer had a little bump on the down stroke. This was caused by two sharp corners on either side of the hammer. These corners were dulled with a stone. Photo 3. It isn't necessary (or possi-



ble on some guns) to completely remove all side-to-side hammer contact. What we want is a smooth transition in the event the hammer happens to rub on the frame while shooting. Once the hammer moves smoothly in the frame, we will move on to the most critical part of our tune-up--fitting the cylinder bolt to the cylinder.

If you reload, you probably already have a dial caliper. If not, they can be obtained from a variety of sources. If you do any gun work or reloading, it will be invaluable. Measure the cylinder notches on both ends and in the middle of each bolt notch. Remember, the bolt notches are offset, so make sure the calipers are square to the notch. On our project revolver all the notches measured around .153" on the ends and .145" in the middle. Photos 4 and 5. As we had previously diagnosed, the bolt appeared too wide and was peening the bolt notches. Our bolt measures .157". Photo 6.








So, our original diagnosis was correct, as the bolt is clearly wider than the bolt notches. Just to double check your measurements, try to insert the bolt into the bolt notches. Remember, the notches are offset, so the sides of the bolt must be kept



parallel with the sides of the bolt notches. Photo 7. Check all of your notches and try the bolt in each notch. IF your cylinder bolt measurements are all greater than the width of the bolt and the bolt it goes into all the notches, then you can sit back and relax and skip the next operation. On our project revolver, the bolt would not go into any of the cylinder notches, especially since all of the notches were already showing signs of peening. Photo 8 shows a



cylinder ruined from peening and also shows the results of an attempt to square the notches with a Dremel.

The cylinders on our blackpowder revolver are soft. Thus, we can re-square the notches with a de-burring tool like that pictured in Part 1. Put the point of the tool in the bottom of the notch (on the same side as the burr,) and make sure the side of the blade forms a 90-degree angle with the bottom of the notch, and drag the blade along the notch. This may need to be done a couple of times, but the tool will cut the burr away and leave a nice clean square notch cut. Do this for all notches


that have damage. On our project revolver, this was all six notches. Remeasure all of the notches; they should now be fairly uniform. If the middle measurement on any notch is still markedly smaller than the ends, you may need to remove a little more material with the de-burring tool.

Now, determine the smallest notch. On our project revolver, all the notches were between .152" and .154". In Part 1, we marked the bolt with a black Sharpie. Keeping the cut as square as possible, stone this area down until it is .002" or .003" thinner than your smallest notch. On our project revolver the bolt was cut from .157" to .150". **Photo 9**.



Put the hammer in the frame and then the bolt and bolt/trigger spring. (You don't need to install the trigger.) Put on the back strap so you know the maximum the hammer can be cocked when the revolver is fully assembled. (On our project revolver it was noted in Part 1 that the back strap was sprung. When it was attached to the frame for this step, it was also determined that the screws were bottoming in the frame, and the back strap couldn't be fully tightened. This wasn't noticeable when the gun was assembled because of the tension put on the screws by the sprung back strap. If your screws do this, shorten them so the back strap can be fully tightened.)


Push the hammer back and forth in the frame and watch the bolt retract and then pop back up. Also, feel how smooth the hammer feels when the bolt leg passes over the hammer cam when the hammer is moved forward to its seated position. You can shine some light in the frame with the little light discussed in Part 1 and watch the action of the cam and bolt leg. When we originally looked at our hammer and bolt in Part 1, it was observed that the hammer appeared to have a nicely formed and smooth cam, and the bolt had a nice bevel. However, that nice flat spot on the cam caused more drag than anticipated. By looking at the cam and bolt leg while they were moving over each other, it could also be seen that the flat spot was dragging on the bolt below the bevel cut into the end of the bolt leg, causing the bolt leg to flex inward more than needed. The top of the cam was polished with a fine stone. The bevel on the bolt leg was blended a little further down the bolt leg to make its transition over the cam a little smoother, and then polished. **Photo 10** "A." Now that the hammer and




bolt are working properly, we can move on to the hand.

One of the major reliability areas in a Pietta revolver is the hand and handspring. The hand is soft and the handspring breaks frequently. Hold the hand in one hand and pull the spring straight down. **Photo 11.** 





See how easy that broke off! **Photo**12. Now that it's broken, we'll fix it
permanently. For this step, do not try
to remove the broken-off stub. We
want it in the slot. With the handspring gone, you can see how rough
the back of the hand is. **Photo** 13.
Smooth it so that you have nice
curves and a polished surface all
around the back of the hand. **Photo**14. When smoothing the back of the
hand, the little piece of the hand left





in the slot now forms a nice little plug, so there is no gap in the back of the hand. You want to smooth and polish over the little stub because depending on where we drill the hole for the next step, the plunger on our modified hand may ride over the stub. With a stone, smooth all the little burrs that are typically found on the tip of the hand. Do not change the contours; merely smooth out the burrs. After the tip is smoothed up, we want to try and harden it a little. Hold the hand in a pair of pliers and heat the tip with a propane torch until it is red hot, and then immediately submerge it in a bucket of water. Photo 15. This isn't the best




method for hardening steel, but it will help a little with the dead soft metal in our hand.

Next, we are going to drill a hole in the frame and install a Ruger style plunger and coil spring. Ideally, the plunger should ride in the middle of the back of the hand. To determine where to drill the hole, measure the width of the hand. Our hand is just shy of .120". **Photo 16**.



The middle of the hand would be .060". (There is a lot of slop in the hand slot, so we can round the numbers a little to make locating the hole we are going to drill easier.) However, our project revolver's hand has a boss on the bottom to space the hand out from the hammer. The boss is shown in Photo 13 at "A." (Some hands have this boss, some don't. You need to take a good look at the one in your revolver. If there is no boss, then the final measurement is simply half the hand width.) The boss on our project revolver's hand is roughly .040". Thus, half our hand width, .060", plus the width of the boss, .040", is .100". The next thing we have to do is figure out how big a hole to drill and where to put it.

One nice thing about splitting this article into two parts is that it gave me a chance to solve a problem and make the next step a little easier. On gun one (remember, we actually started with a pair of revolvers), I installed a standard Ruger plunger and spring as used in all of the Ruger single action revolvers. On some Piettas, the stock Ruger spring and plunger work perfectly. On others, the plunger is too short and would fall into the hand slot or hang up on the edge of the hand slot. The original article text and photos described how to test for this problem and showed how to correct it by making a longer plunger out of a piece of drill rod. I had two more new Piettas on the shelf and both of these also had a wider hand channel than some of the older models. I decided to see if a different set of parts would work better. After ordering and trying different part combinations, the following parts should drop in and function fine with no modifications - Ruger Pawl Spring Plunger KE51 (Brownells part no. 780-001-231) and Ruger Cylinder Latch Spring KH05000 (Brownells part no. 780-000-464). These parts are actually out of a Ruger double action, but will work fine in our project revolver. The original Ruger single action plunger and spring is shown on the top of Photo 17, and our new combination double



action plunger and spring is shown below it. The new plunger is smaller in diameter, which will work fine in our application, as it will give more clearance when we drill our handspring hole.

Drilling the hole must be done with a drill press or milling machine.

The frame must be held so the back of the frame is parallel to the drill table. Do not attempt to drill the hole by hand! How exactly the hole gets drilled will depend on the tools available. The best method is to drill the hole in a milling machine using a starter drill to start a pilot hole, and then drill the remainder of the hole. The hole can also be drilled on a drill press with a good drill press vice. We want to measure in .100" from the left edge of the hammer channel. If using a drill press, take a Sharpie and blacken the back of the frame. Measure in .100" and scribe a line. The other dimension is basically to move down from the top of the machined surface on the fame so that when the hole is drilled, the back strap covers it. This measurement is not as critical as the .100" measurement in from the side of the hammer channel. Scribe another line and then with a very fine punch, make a punch mark at the intersection of the two lines. See, Photos 18 and 19. Do not attempt to start the






hole on a drill press without a punch mark to guide the drill tip. If you do, the drill bit will skate on the hardened frame metal, and you might wind up with a hole, but it will almost certainly be in the wrong place. The hole size is a number 42 drill, which is .0935". Number drills can be obtained at most hardware stores and hobby shops. Complete

sets of number drill cans also be obtained at Harbor Freight.

After the hole is drilled, make sure any burrs on the inside of the hand channel are removed. This can be done by running a small file up into the hand channel and over the hole a few times. Put the plunger in the hole and make sure it moves freely in the hole and into the hand channel. If the plunger is dragging, take the number 42 drill and rotate it back and forth between your fingertips while moving it in and out of the hole. This will help remove any tiny burrs. Once the plunger moves freely in the hole, we are ready to move on to the next step.

On our project revolver, the wedge was hammered into the barrel so tightly that it had raised a bump on the side of the barrel. The wedge should be able to be inserted and removed from the barrel with finger pressure or a light tap from a screwdriver handle or some other nonmetallic object. Run the wedge back and forth on a fine tooth file until one side is flat. Photo 20. Then put






the wedge on a stone and polish that side until it is smooth. Photo 21. Repeat the process on the second side of the wedge, testing frequently, until the tip of the wedge spring just sticks out of the barrel with thumb pressure on the wedge. Photo 22. When the gun is shot, the wedge will loosen a little more, and the wedge will go a little further into the barrel. As long as the wedge is tight, it doesn't matter if the tip of the wedge spring is past the edge of the barrel. The primary purpose of the spring isn't to lock the wedge into the barrel. It's primary purpose is to catch on the wedge screw and keep the wedge from falling out of the barrel when it is pulled loose to remove the

barrel for cleaning.

On our project revolver (both revolvers as it turned out) the back strap was sprung and wouldn't fit back on the frame without a good deal of effort. Since, in addition to putting in the back strap screws we also now have to accommodate the handspring and plunger, the holes need to line up fairly well or we'll never get everything back together. Fortunately, the bottom of the back strap is flat, and even though there are two thin projections on either side of the hammer slot, they are the same width as the back strap. So, we can set it in a vice with aluminum or some other non-marring material in the jaws and give a little tap with a hammer on the end of a piece of wood. Photo 23. A couple of light





taps and everything lined up perfectly. The next step is purely cosmetic, but made the guns feel much better in the hand.

Photo 24 shows and original 1851 Navy Colt back strap on the left. The back strap has subtle curves from just behind the hammer slot down to the bottom rear of the back strap. In the middle is the stock Pietta '51 Navy back strap. There is almost a two-inch stretch where the back strap is perfectly flat between the curve behind the hammer slot and before turning out sharply at the bottom rear of the back strap. The solution was to scribe a line just behind the shoulder stock cut out groove on the bottom of the back strap, and then grind up to this line using a belt sander. Then the rear of the back strap was ground on the belt sander to blend in a new curve. The back strap on the right shows the final contour. Not radically different, but it made the grip feel entirely different. Now that the back strap has been re-contoured, the wooden grip stuck out on

the back. The trigger guard, wooden grip, and back strap were screwed to the bare frame and a belt sander used to re-contour the back of the grips and to thin them down. Photo 25. After the rough contours were



cut-in, a Black and Decker "Mouse" sander (a small orbital sander) was used to smooth the wood and remove the deep scratches from the back strap. Be careful not to mar the trigger guard, as it is fine as is.

After the grips were sanded smooth, they were removed and paint remover used to remove the rest of the finish. After the wood was stripped and dried, a few coats of Birchwood Casey Tru-Oil stock finish was applied. No stain was needed, as the wood looked great with just the application of the stock finish. While that was drying, the back strap was polished with a small buffing wheel and compound from Sears. Shined up great. Had a few imperfections left over from the belt sanding, but after its been shot in a few matches, no one will ever notice. Now comes one of the most important steps in our tune-up.


More problems and frustration with cap and ball revolvers arise from misfires, caps falling off nipples, caps too tight to seat on the nipples, and cap fragments jamming the gun than all other issues combined. No matter how reliable the mechanicals may be and no matter how smooth the action, all of this is of no consequence if the gun will not fire reliably. There are always individuals who claim to have perfect performance from stock nipples and any brand of cap they can find at the local firearms emporium. Those circumstances, however, are few and far between. There is only one sure-fire way to address ignition and cap problems—the nipples must be consistent in size and the caps must fit correctly. The best combination is Treso nipples and Remington #10 caps. No other combination comes close to the reliability of this set-up. Treso nipples are uniform in diameter and have a smooth polished finish. This alone could make the difference between success and failure in shooting your cap and ball revolver.

Another big factor in favor of the Tresos is the Treso's flash hole is much smaller than a stock Italian nipple. See, Photo 26. When the

gun fires, the ball and most of the gas goes down the barrel. But, gas also blasts rearward out of the nipple flash hole. The larger the flash hole, the more gas escapes and can



blow cap fragments off the nipples and into the action. The only thing keeping the fired cap on the nipple and sealing the escape of gas is the hammer, which is one of the reasons the hammer springs on cap and ball revolvers tend to be fairly heavy. Bottom line is change the nipples and use the appropriate caps and most ignition problems will simply go away. The correct size nipples for the Pietta are the 6 x .75mm thread Tresos. The Treso threads are also cut much more precisely than the stock threads. On the stock nipples they are easily inserted into the cylinder and have a little wobble until they seat. The Tresos might at first seem to be to big, as they can be hard to start, and once started have virtually no play as they are screwed into the cylinder. To make sure you can get them back out, coat them with anti-seize compound.


Now that the nipples have been installed, we want to make sure they aren't going to be damaged by the hammer. Put the hammer into the frame and place the cylinder on the arbor. Line up a nipple with the hammer and lightly push the cylinder back with one hand and push the hammer forward with the other. If you can feel the cylinder move forward, the hammer is contacting the nipple. Remove material from the nose of the hammer until it no longer contacts the nipples. Don't remove too much material. We don't want the hammer impacting the nipples, but we don't want a large gap between the hammer and nipples either.

Now that all the internal parts have been completed, it's time to reassemble the revolver. Put in the hammer and hand, bolt, trigger, trigger/bolt spring and then the trigger guard. Now depending on how smooth you got all those internal parts you can try the next step. The stock mainsprings on the newer Piettas and Ubertis and much lighter than they were several years ago. A good piece of advice is to keep the mainspring stiff. However, this advice is based on using a revolver that has not had our modifications and has stock nipples. IF everything is operating smoothly, and the hammer falls with minimal friction, we can go with a slightly lighter mainspring and still have reliable ignition and avoid cap jams. (Which, again, is why the Treso nipples are so important.) Use a Wolff mainspring, Brownells part number 969-322-850. It should drop right in, but there is one test to be performed. Slowly cock the hammer and watch the tip of the mainspring. Make sure when the hammer hits the full-cock notch (remember, the back strap is off, so don't pull the hammer back too far), the tip of the spring is not hitting the bottom of the hammer. Photo 27. If




it is, remove a little material from the tip of the mainspring. Install the grips and back strap, put the cylinder on the arbor, and install the barrel and wedge. Cycle the revolver several times to make sure everything is operating properly. On our project revolver, the cylinder had virtually no side-to-side play, and is now solidly locked up. If yours has a little play, don't worry. It is better for there to be a little movement than to have the bolt not dropping fully into the cylinder bolt notches. If everything is operating smoothly, grab some powder and balls and get ready to go to the range for some testing. If there is something dragging or not operating correctly, disassemble the gun and using your best detective skills, track down where the problem is occurring and correct it.

At this point another article could be written on the care and feeding of a cap and ball revolver. However, this article has gone long, and I will end with just a couple of observations. Colt style revolvers have no cylinder bushing. This creates two issues. First, hot gas from the chamber/cylinder gap blows directly on the arbor. Make sure bore butter or some other grease (oil is too thin) is on the arbor or it will quickly foul and cause the cylinder to drag. Second, because there is no cylinder bushing, there is nothing to stop the barrel from moving forward when firing except the cylinder physically touching the back of the barrel. Put the revolver on half-cock, pull the cylinder to the rear, and hold it up to a bright light. You should see some cylinder gap. Photo 28. And, since our Pietta has a properly fitted arbor, the gap should be uniform from top to bottom. (Ubertis will typically have a pie shaped gap




because of incorrect arbor fit.) Let go of the cylinder and pull the hammer back to the full-cock notch. The gap goes away as the hand pushes the cylinder forward. **Photo 29**. When



firing, the front of the cylinder gets dirty, and it will drag more and more on the back of the barrel as more shots are fired. Use good grease over the balls to help keep the fouling soft and/or wipe the face of the cylinder off every couple of stages.

How did our project revolver(s) hold up on its test run? Fired 50

rounds out of gun one and then brought it home to clean and check everything. The gun was much smoother after firing just 50 roundsand the wedge had loosened just a tad, so it could be pushed in just a bit further when the gun was reassembled. (The wedge has not loosened with more shooting.) No misfires, no cap jams. Went back out to the range for a test of the second gun. EMF's website recommends a charge of between 22 and 28 grains in the Sheriff's Model. I used a flask with a 25-grain spout. Fired ten rounds with APP. Nice mild load. Next, emptied the flask and filled it with Goex Cowboy blackpowder. Another ten rounds. More stout than the APP and nothing has that nice satisfying boom of real blackpowder. Next, ten rounds with 777. Noticeably more stout than APP or Cowboy, but nothing excessive. Finally, while at my local firearms emporium, I noticed they had some Pyrodex pellets. These were listed for a .44/.45 cap and ball and were listed as 30 grains equivalent. Ten rounds down range. These clearly had the most power of anything tried. So, test number two; 40 rounds, no cleaning, no misfires, no cap jams. That's equivalent to eight stages. These were not protracted tests, but the results indicate we have definitely moved in the right direction.







hard pressed to get ten. Now after a meager effort of just a few years, I'm up to 20 or so. It's not much of an increase, but I am improving, and I haven't injured myself yet. After a couple more years, I might work my way up to 25. But one thing I've noticed from this exercise, is my guns have less tendency to wave around when engaging targets.

- 2. Also on a weekly basis to do list are sit-ups and attempting to touch my toes ten times or so. What I try to do is stay limber enough to move around a stage aptly, while at the same time not tightening up my stomach muscles so much that they affect negatively the regularity of my system. After all, at my age being regular is far more important than being in shape!
- 3. I've saved the best one for last. This may be a big advantage for us ole timers who have nothin' better ta do then ta read this meandering composition. For by now I'm sure most of the young,

in shape whipper snappers have given up on this article and moved on to something more vogue. So I'll pass on this earth shaking revelation to the hardy ole few who have more time on their hands for lack of exercise.

Last summer I noticed the strength in my hands was not what it used to be. While shooting Traditional category, it was not noticeable. But when I took on Senior Gunfighter, it was a challenge. So, I bought some hand exercisers. The first type I got was the rubber squashy ball called a Hand Grip Gel Ball. They work well for building up finger and palm strength. Then, I got a couple of the spring type called **Hand Grip Exerciser**. In my opinion, this type works well for improving hand to revolver grip. I put one in each hand, squeezing them together with the bottom three fingers of each hand while pulling them up and out as if braking leather. This action leaves the trigger finger and thumb free to simulate cocking the hammer and pulling the trigger. When I first started, I had trouble holding this springloaded device together while simulating target engagement. But every time I try this workout, improvement is noticed.

The best part about this exercise is that you can stay seated on the sofa the whole time watching your favorite TV program. Whenever I feel the urge to build up the old hand grip, I just call out to the Vicar's Wife to bring me my hand exercisers, and she drops whatever she's doing and brings them over to the sofa. Then when I'm finished, she puts them away. You probably should not try this at home, as it could leave a ringing in your ear! I had quite a bit of trouble working the bugs out of the conveyance system between her and me, so now I place the hand exercisers on the end table beside the sofa. I found this to create far less static. These hand exercisers have improved my grip and also helped the thumb trigger finger coordination.

If you are planning to get involved in an exercise program, you should contact your doctor to see if you are healthy enough for this activity. Don't use exercise in excess, and if you have an exercise that lasts longer than four hours, contact your doctor right away, as you may already be in too good of shape!

By now, we've built something that looks functional, but we have a few details we need to consider before we throw our guns on the cart and take off to the range. A few of these items will be absolutely necessary to protect the finish on your shootin' irons, and the others will be for appearance and comforts.

The Gun Rack: First let's take in consideration that as your cart rolls down the trail, vibration and rocking are going to cause your guns to shift around in their holders. This is going to cause rubbing. The tighter you store your guns, the more severe the rubbing you will incur. Basically, you have to realize everywhere your gun touches the cart, it must be protected from rubbing on the bare wood. Metal on wood will probably not show any wear right away, but wood on wood will show immediately by marring your gun's finish. The

most important place this can happen is on the upper rack and retaining bar. These areas must be protected as shown in *Figure 1*.

The other place the guns touch the cart is at the end of the butt, down at the bottom. Since this area is closer to the axel, and the ends of the butts are usually protected by metal, plastic, or rubber, the rubbing is not as critical, but this area of the cart still cannot be ignored. As you can see *Figure 2*, we've covered these areas as well.

When you chose a material to protect your guns, you have to consider, is it going to hold up to wear? Is it going to hold up to exposure to the elements? Does it look cowboy? Does it fit my budget?

When I built my personal cart nine years ago, I chose to use burlap. I have had no problems with it. It has protected my guns, it holds up to the weather, and it looks cowboy. In my first article in this series, I included the price of burlap into the price list since this is a critical item.

If you cannot tell in the photos, for this project I have used leather instead of burlap. I know this is supposed to be an article about a low budget, so why am I using such an expensive material? Well, I am not being a hypocrite. I actually get the leather scraps for free from an industrial upholstery shop. Since I intend to donate this cart, I want it to look nice.

The Handle: Not being afraid to ask a stupid question every once in a while, I once asked some shooting buddies, why are only certain woods used for rifle stocks, gun grips, and tool handles? I guess it wasn't such a dumb question because I got a direct and straight-faced answer. Certain woods feel better in the human hand than others. Now, if you followed my directions, and used a poplar wood dowel for a cart handle, you may find poplar is not comfortable wood to grip, as it has a fibrous feel to it. To remedy this. I have covered the handle in leather to make it more comfortable. I put the smooth side out to avoid stains from dirty hands. Another option may be to use an old broomstick instead, as these are made from better woods like birch or hickory.

The Box Lid: One thing about having your own cart of this design is that you will always have a place to sit, that is, unless a family member beats you to it ...

Sitting on a hard wooden box lid can eventually fatigue the old derriere, not to mention the occasional splinter getting stuck in an area where it is difficult to pull it out by yourself. So, consider padding your lid and making it into a soft place to sit. Just find some foam padding and cover with a material of your choice. My padding was taken from an old throw pillow the wife let me use. If you have a scrap of leather, consider mounting a 1"x3" piece folded into a loop to the bottom of the lid so the loop sticks out of the front creating a courtesy tab to assist in opening your lid. (Figure 3)

The Box Bottom: It never fails for anyone who's been shooting long enough, eventually, a box of ammo will dump all over the bottom of your cart. Considering we have used rough-cut materials, cleanup of a few stray rounds may involve a splinter or two. Also, you will have seams in the bottom of the box that can make it more difficult to move things around in there. Covering the bottom of the box with leftover material wrapped around a thin scrap of plywood or paneling will not only give your box a neater appearance, it will also prevent splinters.

Miscellaneous: If you've followed along, I hope you considered my advice and still dared to deviate from my instructions in order to find something that works a little better for you. From here, even more fun is to be found in making your cart part of your persona. The rest is up to you.

Paint it your favorite color or stain it. Maybe leave it out in the weather and let it turn grey. Consider hanging a bullwhip or a holster on the side, or wood burning your favorite cowboy phrase somewhere. Display your stickers and club logos on it. Whatever you do, you have made it yourself and somehow, when you do that, it becomes an extension of who you are. The nice thing about making something like this on a budget is if you mess up, materials are cheap, and you can fix it yourself.

Well friends, it's been a long ride together. Thank you for putting up with my yammerin' about this stuff. I hope I inspired your creativity. Enjoy your new cart! .

cerns the testing of challenged ammunition that may or may not be loaded appropriately, and why we concern ourselves with such a simple thing. True Soot Lords load the Holy Black to the top of the case, seat the bullet, and make fire and smoke. Guess what category I shoot in? Doesn't mean I don't have to know the requirements of the other categories.

Question 1 - A shooter has been asked to provide five smokeless rounds for testing. Before each round is fired in the firearm it was going to be used in, the firearm is raised to at least 80 degrees. Why, and the testing is done by whom?

There may be a safety issue when shooting extremely low-powered loads ... but that's not why SASS imposes this requirement. The reason is fair competition. A small number of competitors discovered they could shoot small caliber rounds with hollowed-out bullets using only primers! Others weren't quite so extreme, but the trend was clear ... if one wanted to be competitive, one had to load down to "popgun" levels. That's not what Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> is all about. The challenge was finding a way to outlaw the most egregious practices without disenfranchising those who shoot small caliber guns (hence, the 60 power factor). The 400 fps minimum velocity recognized a .45 caliber round can easily make a 60 power factor due to its heavier bullet. Both standards were necessary to stop abusive loading practices.

Answer - Range Officer II Course Material, Power Factor Appeals and Testing.


Question 2 - A shooter has been asked to provide five blackpowder or blackpowder substitute rounds for testing. rounds are tested in the firearm they were to be used in. Why, and the testing is done by whom?

As all Soot-Lords know, a "blackpowder" round needs to be full to the base of the bullet "with something" to ensure correct denotation ... however, that's not the reason for testing blackpowder rounds. # FANCY GUN HANDLING

The first revolver made with a ■ trigger guard and an exceptional sense of balance was the Colt 1851 Navy, and I am going to guess the art of gun spinning or fancy gun handling was probably born out of that legendary firearm Wild Bill Hickok favored so much throughout his life. Hickok is certainly credited with being an outstanding pistolero of the day. In a number of references some of the old time cowboys on cattle drives apparently spun their guns around the campfires, notwithstanding the fact that many, if not most, of the cowboys only carried rifles on a day to day basis. The Wild West Shows were certainly the beginning of the heyday of fancy gun handling beginning in 1883 with Buffalo Bill Cody's show and continuing until the 1940's when they met their demise about the same time the "B" Westerns movies did. Thankfully, there are a number of wild-west shows in production today, and we can all be happy in their revival.


In the early 1900's some of the old time cowboys actually went to Hollywood during the winters when finding work was difficult and served as extras in the movies. If

you look at some of the silent films of the era, the cowboys used the weight of the gun to help cock that awfully heavy mainspring in their Coltsthis actually was the origin of the saying to "Throw down on someone"-throwing the gun in a downward motion while holding the hammer. It is also a fact many of these extras spent off camera time spinning guns. A number of the early westerns actually used fancy gun handling in the films. Some, like Johnny Mack Brown, were extremely talented. Additionally, Roy Rogers was very good, especially in Under Nevada Skies, as well Glenn Ford in The Fastest Gun Alive where he showcased the Rodd Redwing trick of cocking the gun with his belt (attributed even earlier to either Yakima Canutt or Paul Fix, father in law to Dobe Carey, who coached John Wayne in Randy Rides Alone).

On the heels of the fast draw competitions, gun spinning competitions took place on a regular basis from the mid-1950's in California up to the late 1970's, but the sport became somewhat inactive until the International Gun Spinning Championship was held at the Sands Hotel in Reno, Nevada in 1990. Then, the Wild West Arts Club (WWAC) headed by Mark Allen and Jo Benson held national championships as well as regional events. The club has officially disbanded, but there are numerous regional events that continue today, including an outstanding event held in Ohio every July.

Dusty Johnson, owner of Pleasant Valley Saddle Shop, founded the World Gun spinning Association, but unfortunately that, too, has folded, so we are anticipating SASS can step forward and fill the gap. There are still some fabulous gun spinners today, and at the risk of omitting some of the greats, Joey Dillon, Jim Martin, Pistol Packin' Paula, Howard Darby, Phil Spangenberger, Bob Hamm, and Joe Bowman come immediately to mind.

We are continuing to work on the advisory board determining if we

will start out slowly with Wild West Arts gatherings, as opposed to jumping into competitions. We will update you as we progress. .

was very little smoke to obscure the targets. If one can actually see the targets, it's possible to shoot very fast and accurately ... and it was not fair to the blackpowder competitors using "honest" loads. Once again, the challenge was to find a standard that produced adequate smoke while not disenfranchising those who choose to shoot very small calibers and/or very short brass in any caliber. The amount of smoke produced by 1 CC of blackpowder is achievable in all legal SASS calibers.



When setting up a new shooter, especially a child shooter, it can be challenging to help them choose which hand to shoot with, which eye to look out of, and whether or not to wink. There is much discussion on which technique is better. In this article I want to help explain the different shooting styles, and especially how to help shooters who have cross dominance problems.

When helping a new shooter get started, the first thing you want to do is help them figure out which of their eyes is the dominant eye. Your dominant eye is the stronger of your two eyes, dictates where you see, and makes the choice on which side you can use your long guns. To determine dominance, you should point at something with both eyes open. Then, you close each eye one at a time. Two things should happen when you close each eye. When you close one eye, your finger will move off the object you are pointing at, and when you close the other eye, your finger should stay pointed at the object. The eye open when your finger doesn't move is your dominant eye. This is the stronger of your two eyes.

Knowing your dominant eye is very important to setting up your shooting style. If you are lucky, your dominant eye will be the same as your dominant

hand. If this is the case, you are able to shoot your long guns from your dominant side without any problem. This will also give you the option of keeping both eyes open while shooting. This is the easiest style of shooting to teach because it is the most natural.

If you are unlucky, your dominant eye will be different from your dominant hand. This will affect the way you shoot your long guns only because with the pistols you can simply tilt your head a little, and you will be able to see

If you happen to be cross dominant, your dominant eye and hand are opposite. Then, you have two options for learning to shoot the long guns. One option is to learn to close your dominant eye and shoot your long guns with your dominant hand. For instance, if you happen to be left eye dominant and right handed, you can close your left eye and shoot your long guns on your right side. I have two very strong eyes, and while my right eye is dominant, my left is so close that if I try to concentrate on my sights with both eyes open, I see double. Therefore, I have to close my left eye to be able to see my sights.

There is some discussion on whether or not it is better to shoot with two eyes open versus one eye open. Many shooters say it is better to shoot with two eyes open, but I don't believe there is any disadvantage to closing an eye. As I said, I shoot with one eye closed, and so far I don't believe it has hurt me anv.

If you can close one eye, then this is probably the easiest method of dealing with cross dominance because most people have trouble performing activities with their non-dominant hand. For some people closing the dominant eye is not natural, so they must practice before they can do it. Other people can never learn to close their dominant eye. If you cannot learn to close your dominant eye, then the second option is to shoot your long guns with the non-dominant hand.

Shooting with your non-dominant hand can be a challenge to learn, but for most people it can be mastered, especially if you start that way from the very beginning. If you have a young child, it can be very easy for them to learn to shoot on their non-dominant side because they are fast learners. While shooting with the "weak" hand feels unnatural for most of us, I have known many great shooters that have shot this way, and it was no disadvantage to them.

Knowing which eye is dominant is also important for experienced shooters as well. If you happen to wear corrective contact lenses or glasses, knowing which eye is dominant can help in setting up your lenses so you can see well enough to shoot. Seeing well is the key to shooting well. If you can't see the sights or the targets, you will have a pretty difficult time hitting the targets. Our sport has many older competitors that wear not only corrective lenses, but wear bifocals or even trifocals while shooting.

In case you missed my earlier column, here are some tips for setting up shooting glasses. If you can shoot with both eyes open and you require bifocal glasses, there is a very simple way to set them up to see well. Bifocals are not

the best set up for our sport because it is difficult to find the spot in the lenses where the sights line up clearly. Instead of using bifocals, the trick is to put your "distance" prescription in the lense for one eye and the "close" prescription in the lens for the other eye. I know it sounds crazy, but I promise it will work. The dominant eye lens should be the corrective prescription you use for your sights. The non-dominant eye should be the prescription for your distance vision. With this setup, you will be able to see the sights and the target in perfect clarity.

If you happen to be cross dominant, and you keep both eyes open and shoot with your non dominant hand, then the glasses set up is the same. However, if you are cross dominant and shoot with one eye closed, your glasses set up will be different. In this case you will have to compromise your prescription just a little to be able to get both distance and the sights. It is my experience that the sights are the most important objects to see, and that as long as you can see a fuzzy outline of the target, you will have the best compromise available.

Knowing which eye is dominant is important when starting a new shooter, but it is just as important for even the most experienced shooters when it comes to setting up your corrective glasses.




The Roy Rogers Rangers focuses on regular monthly practice, recruit-




# COWBOY MOUNTED SHOOTING GOES TO CHURCH!





Morning Dove at the Western National Championship running stage #98. Photo by Jeff Valdez.



fun to watch, but a bit boring! Yep, I said boring! Galloping around the arena in the same pattern as usual trying to get faster and faster to see who's running good that day. Almost like what we do, but not as exciting, not by a long shot! You see, changing patterns each time we all run through makes our game more exciting. But wait ... we shoot five balloons, change guns, and shoot five more while we're galloping around the arena too! That REALLY makes our game more exciting!

After the barrel racing, we set up our first stage as the colt auction was going on. I'd let you know how it turned out, but I really don't know since we were busy setting up the demo! The first stage we set up was chosen so we could show off a bit. It was the same barrel pattern the racers had just run, but we added our 10 balloons to shoot along the way! The audience loved it! We ran close to the same times they did, but proved we

were better at multi-tasking as we blasted balloons along the way! Sure was neat having them cheering us on!

Next, we changed patterns and set up an open course with lots of galloping along the way! #98 in the SASS Course Book was one of the stages we shot at END of TRAIL last year and also at the SASS Western Nationals in Tombstone where Morning Dove was the Ladies Overall Champion. An off-set start with four quick shots, first to the left, then two to the right, and another to the left before the first barrel turn. and a horse race to the far end of the arena where the remaining white balloon was centered up in a row of red balloons spread out laterally across the arena. We all know about media bias, so I'm certainly not going to preach to the choir here, but I've always had one simple question on this topic, and it's the underlying point of this month's column. After years of seeing patently slanted reporting, it's truly laughable how the media in general continues to deny, deny, deny they are anything but impartial and empirically objective. However, to paraphrase George C. Scott's opening speech in *Patton*,

the simple truth is, their claim of "objectivity" is a bunch of crap. With each election that fact becomes increasingly obvious—a fact that should be pushed right back in their collective faces. Their charade insults our common sense, as they relentlessly make these false claims of impartiality. Of course, if you openly challenge them on this, as I've done many times both in print and in person, they vehemently deny it. But, my one simple question to the press has yet to be credibly answered by those I've confronted. What is that question, Colonel? How can the press claim objectivity when every newspaper I've ever seen subjectively endorses candidates from city council to President? Doesn't that smell just a bit tainted to you? It also smells like they're so arrogantly convinced of your stupidity you'll never see this for what it really is.


What I've heard in most cases is their editorial staff is independent of their news staff. While the names may be different in each of those departments, they all answer to the same boss at the top of that publication's food chain, do they not? So, by applying common sense and just a modicum of knowledge where human nature is concerned, I find it impossible to believe a newspaper can endorse a candidate on their editorial page and then blast him with bad press on the front page!

Such reporting would undermine the validity as well as the credibility of their endorsement, wouldn't it? And what might this result in? A reduced number of newspapers and advertisements sold, of course. The owner or editor-in-chief would do their level best to prevent such an obvious conflict from unfavorably impacting revenue. Keep in mind; all forms of the media are first and foremost a business, and the editors always have the final say about what gets published ... even if the front line street reporters themselves are trying to be evenhanded.

Still doubt it? Then put yourself in the shoes of the top dog at that (Continued on next page)

particular newspaper. They endorse Moe for office, claiming he is much better than Curly. Two stories come in about both candidates that are less than favorable. Which one do you think they would print or emphasize? Would they blast Moe, or would they downplay that story and highlight the one on Curly? No rocket science here, just an observation based on years of watching ... and as Yogi Berra, one of my favorite philosophers once said, "You can observe a lot just by watching."

We saw clear evidence of this during the last Presidential campaign. Anything that might hint at unfavorable press for Bush was front-page news, while many stories unfavorable to Kerry were downplayed or spiked. Why? The press generally favored Kerry.

Want an example? Do you remember reading about the call for Bush to disclose his National Guard records so they could see if he was AWOL? The press went into hyper drive pushing that story—even if

those stories were based on fraudulent documents—isn't that right CBS? The possibility that Bush may have missed a few National Guard meetings was too juicy to ignore. Compare that to the issue of Kerry's medical records concerning his three purple hearts. There was never a similar heated clamor from the national media berating Kerry for not making full disclosure of his service medical records was there? Why? Kerry was their man, and the approach here was to tout anything that might be bad for Bush and downplay or kill anything that might be bad for Kerry. Had it not been for the Swift Boat Vets who had eyewitness knowledge, as well as the guts to unveil it, we would have never heard about even a fraction of Kerry's true Viet Nam record.

I see this same philosophy applied at all levels during political campaigns from the local to the national. The practice was confirmed by a long time friend of mine who writes a well-known nationally syndicated column and spent a life-

time in the newspaper business. He confirmed that newspapers routinely downplay or ignore news that might reflect badly on their man, while focusing like a laser on his opponent and reporting anything that could even minimally be construed as bad press for the other guy.


Watch this election unfold and see how much your own newspaper plays up past and present "questionable" activities of one side versus the other, how many hard questions one candidate is asked compared to the other, and how many "discrepancies" and "colorful" escapades are printed about one party compared to the other. Most recently, note how many of those in the media have been treating Obama compared to the other candidates. Just what do you think would happen to any conservative candidate if they had attended Rev Jeremiah Wright's church for 20 years or had a "friendly" relationship with a terrorist? It quickly becomes clear how the media leans while all the while vehemently claiming journalistic objectivity.

Now I realize I'm just a simple old soldier, but in my mind, if newspapers were honestly sincere about their unbiased reporting, they wouldn't endorse anyone—they'd just stick to reporting the facts about all candidates. Their claims of neutrality and objectivity might then be more believable-maybe. And, if they really wanted to advocate one side over another that would be fine with me also ... as long as they were up front about it and proclaimed their political leanings to the world. At least such candor would go a long way in earning the respect of respectable Americans. Either way, I'm probably asking far too much of folks who pathologically deny blatant political bias, then wonder why their readership among independent thinkers continues to dwindle. My faith abounds in such independent thinkers, and it's that staunch faith that uplifts my spirits knowing that regardless of media spin and distortion, the truth will be found in the likes of SASS cowpokes, for example, and the millions of others where true patriotism and the spirit of love for and dedication to this country runs as deep today as it did in 1776 ... and in that, I'm exceedingly proud just to be counted as one of your number.

# THE CAPGUN KID RIDES ... WITHOUT GETTING HIMSELF KILLED DOING IT!


Part 1 - Where d'you start to learn to ride?

"C'mon, Greg, ride fast and shoot straight ... Roy's in trouble!!"

Idunno how many dads out there took the time to cater to their son's fancies, or nurture their thinking, but for all his faults my Dad, squatting there under the 1954 Christmas tree, Bell and Howell movie camera in hand, showed me the side of him I want to remember. I will admit I watched those home movies he made of me several times before I remembered him actually saying that. cial Roy Rogers Cowboy Hat and official Roy Rogers Schmidt capguns in their official Roy Rogers Holsters. I was mounted on a spring supported, plastic horse that was about as Palomino as Trigger himself, and, God bless him, my Dad got his camera shot. Aside from the trip to Frontier Town in the Adirondacks where I rode a pony around a pen, it was the only time in my life I was sitting on something resembling a horse.

When I lost interest in the French and Indian War, stopped writing for the journals and published my second novel, I sold all my stuff and stopped camping out in the forests. I started writing westerns, and that was the reason I decided I needed to learn how to ride a horse. As a matter of fact, I probably shared the same resignation most of us seem to feel ... It'd be nice to ride because cowboys all rode, but who has the time or the money, and how many of us are just getting too old to start? Yeah, the Mounted Shooting thing seemed appealing, so I set that as part of the goal of learning to ride.

If you are one of those kids who grew up on a ranch or in a surrounding with enough countryside to own a horse, or if you are already a Mounted Shooter, then this series of articles is gonna seem pretty stupid. You already know what you are doing. The rest of us have not a clue as to where and how to learn to ride, or even where to start if we wanted to.

The journey has taken me through work in a shelter, where I learned huge lessons about horses, where I darned near killed myself by being thrown, bucked, and bitten, and where I connected my elbow and posterior and got some direction as to where to go to learn about riding the right way. I got to build my own saddles and lug them all the way out to Arizona, found an instructor who understood what riding like a cowboy instead of a showman meant, and found a stable where I could pursue my goals of riding and Mounted Shooting. It was not easy.

If nothing else, learning to ride saved me from TEF Syndrome (that's Terminal Elmer Fudd Syndrome), and I shaved off twenty to thirty pounds out of sheer desperation to ascend to the task.

As I stated, this series of articles is for those of us who would someday like to pop a balloon with a load of blackpowder and corn meal, or who would like to be a cowboy for the few moments we get to sit astride a horse at a dead run.

It took me two years to get from the standing start to that dead run. That makes these articles for the cowpoke who might someday like to try to learn to ride, and doesn't know where or how to start without spending his life savings.

The first time I saddled up a young gelding named Comanche, I did not know enough to tighten the cinch properly or how to mount up. I ended up pulling the saddle off the horse because it was so loose. On the second try, I ended up upside down on his opposite side because he stepped into me as I tried to get on. My instructor remained unconvinced that I was merely trying out the tactic of shooting under the horse's neck, and probably viewed me as the long lost fourth of the Three Stooges. Comanche won his first engagement with me (every time you step onto a horse, part of the experience is you versus him, and you'd be surprised how much cunning and escape and evade can come out of a walnut sized brain), and it took me several sessions of working with him before I could get him to trust and respect me.

I don't pretend at having credentials as some sort of expert in riding, but I know where I made my mistakes and spent my money. So, let me give you the first hard and fast rule you can take to the bank about learning to ride ... your biggest asset

is the people who ride, manage stables, or own horses. Your task is to connect with them and not stay in some sort of naïve frame of mind that you can learn by yourself. It was the *people* that turned out to be the milestones of my journey.

Along the way I had more than a few good friends to help and advise. I had enough good fortune to survive getting dumped by a Morgan mare that I fell in love with, in spite of being knocked out cold for about five minutes. I still enjoy the mutually swapped stories about getting dumped by just about everybody who has learned to ride.

Later in my quest, I rode up and down the Arizona Sierra near the Apache Stronghold where my horse took terrain that I did not think horses could take. When I finally got to shoot at balloons, it was only because the woman who runs the stable I ride with was enthused over the novelty of it all. I don't know what is next for me, but I probably share the notion with many of you that time is moving a little too fast. I ain't dead yet, but I can see it from here, so I'm in that boat with a lot of folks who realize that life's experience is a precious gift that is there only once.

I'll stand by what I wrote in the preface of *Small Creek*;

### Friendly Fire on Snake Row

AUGUST 15, 1873

Big Ben Thompson walks up to gambler John Sterling in Nick Lentz's Saloon on Snake Row in Ellsworth, Kansas. He asks for "his fair cut" from a game of Monte just finished. In his cups, Sterling strikes Ben across the face. As a fight breaks out, policeman "Happy Jack" Morco, who was talking with Sterling when Ben approached, pulls two revolvers and forces Ben to back off. Grabbing Sterling, Morco guides him out of the saloon.

Ben goes back to Brennan's Saloon (site of the original Monte game) and is telling a Texan friend about his altercation when a shout from outside is heard: "Get your guns, you Texas sonsof-bitches and fight!" It is Happy Jack Morco, with two drawn pistols, and Sterling armed with a shotgun.

Ben begs his friends to loan him a firearm but they refuse, so he ducks out the back door of Brennan's and makes for Jake New's place, where he checked his guns earlier. Stuffing his revolver in his belt, Ben loads his Winchester and steps out onto S. Main Street. As he does, his very drunk older brother, Billy, joins him, having grabbed Ben's double-barreled shotgun.

Cocking both barrels, Billy staggers. Just as Ben warns him to be careful, one of the barrels goes off, striking the sidewalk in front of New's saloon, at the feet of Texas drovers Seth Mabry and Eugene Millett.

Ben grabs the shotgun away from his brother and tries to extract the shells, but they are brass and swollen. He hands the shotgun to someone else and steps into the street. Determined to make a stand with his brother, Billy retrieves the shotgun and follows Ben. Looking down Snake Row to where Sterling and Morco are standing, Ben bellows, "If you sonsof-bitches want to fight us, here we are!"

Across the plaza, on the opposite side of the tracks, Sheriff Chauncey B. Whitney is enjoying a meal with John "Long Jack" DeLong at Veatch's Hotel

### A Hefty Reward Went Unclaimed

Although a large reward for his capture was offered, Billy Thompson was never brought to justice. Immediately after the fight, Billy was given a horse, a pistol and some cash by his Texan friends as his brother told him, "For God's sake leave town." Instead, Billy rode to Nauchville to visit brothel owner Mollie Brennan; he allegedly "partook of her charms."

and Restaurant. The sheriff stayed in town instead of going on a picnic with his family. The sister of his wife, Nellie Henry, was being courted by John Montgomery, editor of the Ellsworth Reporter, who had informed the sheriff that he may want to stick around because Billy was on a bender that day.

Hearing the report of the shotgun, the unarmed sheriff leaves the restaurant, with DeLong behind him. Stepping across the tracks, he calls out, "Boys, don't have any row. I will do all I can to protect you. You know John and I are your friends."

Trying to calm down the Thompson brothers, the sheriff offers, "Come let us go to Brennan's and take a drink." Both Whitney and Ben ask Billy to let down the hammers on the shotgun, but Billy will not comply, saying, "I'm not going to let those damn sons-of-bitches get the best of Ben." He does, however, promise to ease off the hammers once he reaches the saloon.

Walking across the plaza, the men reach Brennan's. As they enter, a Texas stockman, W.A. Langford, yells out a warning that Morco is advancing down the boardwalk with a pistol in each hand. Ben spins around, brings his Winchester up to his shoulder and fires at the rapidly approaching Morco, who dives into the entrance of Beebe's General Store. The bullet hits the door casing, missing Morco.

Coming out on the boardwalk, Sheriff Whitney steps forward, asking, "What does all this mean?" Behind the sheriff, Billy staggers out of the saloon. As he tries to recover himself, the shotgun goes off, striking the sheriff in the right side (chest area).

"Oh, I am shot!" Whitney cries, as Ben Thompson screams, "My God, Billy, you have shot our best friend!"

Billy recovers, saying sheepishly, "I am sorry.'

Bystanders crowd around the mortallywounded sheriff, who says, "He did not

mean it. It was accidental, send for my wife and baby.'

The fight that never came off is over, but this is where a dubious legend begins.

Late in life, Wyatt Earp told his biographer Stuart Lake that he watched Billy Thompson ride out of town, and he accepted the city marshal badge from the mayor. Then he boldly walked across the Plaza, under the guns of countless Texans, and placed Ben Thompson under arrest. Yet the Ellsworth Reporter, which reported exclusively on the shooting and its aftermath, never mentioned Earp. Of all the Earp claims, this one is the most dubious.





ed, in the worst way, to be a cowboy.

Now I am fifty five years old ...

Now then, concerning working in a shelter. It was worth every minute. Here are some of the things hard knocks taught me about finding my way to a point where I could actually get up on a horse.

Take your copy of "Horses For Dummies" and use it to light the campfire. You can't learn anything from a book in something this physical. You need other people who have experience with horses.

Forget about Trigger, Silver, Champ, and Topper. The best that can happen is you get disappointed because your horse doesn't have quite the same emotional bonding system or IQ you have in spite of what the bunny huggers tell us. Teddy Blue Abbot, Charlie Siringo, and several other cowboy authors have more than documented that 19th century cowboys used their horses as tools, and today's animal activist would have heart failure watching the goings on in the cow camp.

Get used to the fact that a horse is sort of a big deer. It's afraid of everything all the time because it was made as a prey animal and has a brain the size of a walnut. "What's that You say, Champ? Gene is a prisoner in the cabin?" The first lesson I learned about earning a horse's trust was that I had to do it by having enough force of personality so as to be willing to control the horse and give it the impression I was not gonna get it hurt, and it would be safe with me.

Maybe your golden or black lab will love you if you give it treats, but a horse just gets nasty when fed by a novice and real nervous when ridden by one. Big concept here ... you can't buy affection with treats, and the horse has to think it's safe with you atop it.

A well-trained horse is worth its weight in gold. They are out there, but are hard to find. They will truly bond

If you head out for lessons, stay away from the English style of riding. Western riding techniques, the methods used by cowboys, are completely different and an instructor, no matter how good, who allows you to perch upon your steed with a western saddle whilst trying to teach you eastern techniques is risking your welfare. The styles are incompatible because they were designed by folks for different purposes. Cowboys had to work, so they rode

Be willing to go slow. Patience is truly a virtue, and this is not a reality show. If you wanna learn to ride, you need to have people who will teach you because you can't learn it by yourself.

If you're looking for some real enrichment and some really nice people to meet, then put the Clint Eastwood movie on pause and go for the gold. We ain't getting' any younger. One year after I started learning to ride, I had still not yet shot a gun at a balloon from the saddle.

Don't shoot yore eye out, kid. 🚣



# HOLLIDAY IN TOMBSTONE

special treat for me, this book Acame from the SASS office with a request for a review, and it included the author's note thanking me for my review of her last book about Doc Holliday and Wyatt Earp called "Borrowed Time." Well, I should thank Ash Wednesday herself because I am sure I derived more pleasure from her books than she can get from my reviews!

I remarked Ms. Ballard's first novel was quite a good job, and there is no doubt her second novel is equally as good. I also remarked about "Borrowed Time" that as historical fiction it created the thought that said, "The way it should have been." Well, truth be told, "Holliday in Tombstone" is more than that. More than that because it is the way it was, the way it should have been, the way it might have been, and the way we think it was. What an amazing job ... why ... here is a sort of quiz:

Raise your hand if you saw the movie "Tombstone." (If you saw the movie "Wyatt Earp" and not Tombstone that's okay, too, but "Tombstone" is the better reference point.)

Raise your hand if you have ever read any of the historical accounts of the Earps in Tombstone.

Raise your hand if you think you have read enough Old West history to state with any kind of certainty that you understand to some extent what happened at the "Gunfight at the OK Corral" and the events leading up to it.

Raise your hand if you have any kind of feeling at all about the real relationship between Wyatt Earp and John Henry Holliday, DDS.


Okay, I could go on, but you get the point. This novel is not just historical fiction. It is a real history blended with historical fiction. It is a novel of the Old West that includes close parallels to historical events recently depicted in the movies. It is true. It seems to be true. It should be true. It must be true. And yet ... you cannot tell where the truth leaves off and the author's skill comes in, as it is blended so perfectly one could truly read this book as an actual chronicle of events before and after the Gunfight at the OK Corral and believe it completely and use it as a reference and think you were one hundred percent correct. It is amazing. It is impossible. I simply cannot begin to explain how well blended the facts and the fiction are to the point the entire book is simply completely believable as history. A fantastic and spell binding performance by Ash Wednesday!

In my review of her first novel, the first of a trilogy, I said we had "Wyatt Earp, Doc Holliday, the Long Branch Saloon, well-known family and friends, and a long trail across various parts of the Old West, all as a part of a deep character study of these two men in the pursuit of outlaws, and love, in places far different from the history with which we are all so familiar." "Holliday in Tombstone" is no different, except it is an even deeper character study of Doc Hollidayhis character, his loves, his hates, his bonds with Wyatt Earp, and his bonds with, how shall I put this, let's just say his "family." The people you associate with Earp and Holliday are all present. The people you know as friends and as enemies are all there and, yes, if you saw "Tombstone," the results are exactly the same. But more so. You will get into John Holliday's very soul. You will feel his deep pain and anguish, and you will feel his love, and his enormous devotion to Wyatt Earp above all else.

Again, in my review of "Borrowed Time" I suggested "while you are reading it, your mind is telling you ... you know this is not a true story, but in your heart you cannot help feeling t it rings true, almost like a slice of a double biography." This time the characters are not only real, but you will recognize events from your readings of histories, or watching of movies, and you will be pulled into the lives of these incredibly complex, incredibly brave, incredibly stoic men as a moth is drawn to a flame. Git! Really—in today's mail I received the July issue of GUNS Magazine and ol' John has a nice write-up of a Texican he tested. The Texican, as I think everyone knows, is STI's new Colt SAA replica, made completely in America. The SASS Wire has been replete with discussions about this new gun, so it definitely is high time to

get this into print.


Sixgunner noted his test gun had a 2 1/2-pound trigger, which he claimed is a little light for his taste. I didn't check the pull weight on my test gun's trigger, but I bet it was in that area as well, and for me that's too light, too, but I know many shooters like light triggers. The interesting thing is I tested the Texican against another Colt SAA replica, one I wrote about in an

earlier Cowboy Chronicle, which has an EXTREMELY light trigger, and I found the Texican to be somewhat stiffer and easier to keep under control. More about that later.

The workmanship of the Texican is superb, to say the least. The color case hardening is rich and deep, and if it weren't for the color. the seam between the mainframe and grip frame would be imperceptible; if you close your eyes you cannot feel it whatsoever. For a gun in this price range, STI did it right; the fit to finish everywhere is just perfect, the blue of the barrel (5 1/2 inches, by the way) and cylinder, the color of the frame, hammer, and loading gate (the trigger is in the white, interestingly enough), and the grips are so perfectly mated to the grip frame that the seam there is imperceptible, too. I found the traditional fixed sights easy to see and use and the 37-ounce weight balanced perfectly for me.

Shooting the Texican was a pleasure as well. The way I range tested it was at an indoor range where I hung paper targets at varying distances, shot it one-handed and two-handed, shot it fast and shot it slow, and ran it against my excellent Italian Model P replica. Its performance was everything I could ask for.

Slow fire at close in distances such as 3 yards and 7 yards gave me (Continued on next page)

every round in the black of an "official 50 foot" target. Groups were generally quarter-sized with an occasional flyer caused by yours truly. Since I was firing offhand, I would like to say I consistently hit the same places every time, but the groups would vary, sometimes a little to the left or right or high or low, but always in the black. On the other hand, it is to be noted I got these very consistent, tight groups shooting both one and two-handed, so whether you shoot Traditional or Duelist, you're not going to miss anything up close and personal.

Next, I shot at an "official 25 yard" target, but at five yards only, shooting both slowly and fast (well, fast for me, anyway). The results varied from the earlier perfection only when I shot fast and one-handed, but there is nothing to complain about when you have two hits in the X ring, two in the 9 ring at 11 and 12 o'clock, and one at 11 o'clock in the 8 ring. Since slow fire netted me tight

groups again, it is not necessary to repeat the same story for you. If I were shooting at Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> targets, well, there would be NO misses.

Finally, I moved on to some weird law enforcement targets (V-10Ps, I think they are known as) that had variable green and red dots to aim at, each about three inches in diameter, and black dots that were about two inches in diameter. Here's where I brought out the sexy Italian model to race against the luscious Texican. I already knew what the Italian could do; I wanted to see if the Texican could match it. And it did, stride for stride, dot for dot, green, red, black; it didn't matter. At close ranges, the Texican blew the dots away, as did the Italian. Tight groups were the norm, which opened up some as I shot faster, but that's my doing, not the gun's fault. Since I already knew to expect this kind of result from the earlier targets I perforated, I decided to move another V-10P out to fifteen yards. Folks, if you

do your job, you'll have clean matches with the Texican every time. At fifteen yards I won't say I was getting groups, but I was putting every round in a place that would qualify as a hit if you were ringing steel. And I mean in the middle of your steel target, not way off somewhere.

Speaking of clean matches, the next step in the equation was, of course, a Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$ match! Last week I got myself down to the Comanche Valley Vigilantes' Sunday match at the Ormsby Ranch outside of Cleburne, Texas. Okay, I didn't have a clean match, but I did have four clean stages out of six, and I assure you all my misses were my fault. The funny thing is, however, I was having so much fun with the Texican and his new Italian girlfriend, I cannot recall which gun I missed with. As I think I only had three pistol misses for the day, it hardly matters. The Texican is right on target, right out of the box. There were no misfires, either. The gun performed without a hiccup, just as it is intended to, and I was delighted.

I did mention I was going to make some further remarks about the trigger, so I'll do it now. The trigger is light, that's for sure, but as ham-fingered as I am, I never really had a problem with the Texican's trigger under match conditions. My Italian has to be carefully handled. If it is not, I am guaranteed to get an occasional downrange accidental discharge when shooting against the clock. And I did, at least once, and it was a hit, so no harm no foul, but I simply cannot abide that experience. I never had that problem with the Texican. It's lock up and timing are magnificent. It points as smooth as butter, and it hits every time, if you do your job. If you favor a light trigger, then you'll like the Texican's trigger very much.

The Texican came with an invoice I apparently have lost, but Sixgunner's article in GUNS lists the suggested retail price at \$1,260. I actually thought the invoice I originally had said more than that, but perhaps not. The Texican is expensive. The MSRP is twice that of the Italian I discussed above, which I thought was expensive, too. Mr. Taffin rates the Texican as "exceptional," and I would not differ from his opinion at all. I guess it should be "exceptional" if it is that expensive but, then again, everything seems to be getting pretty expensive these days, so why not Americanmade firearms? I'll hate sending it back donchano!

I do not have my finger on the pulse of the Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> marketplace, but I think it is safe to say we will see Texicans at our matches, as we should—this wonderful firearm belongs in our sport.

# \*THE PIONEER\*

I've always liked external hammer side-by-side shotguns. They scream *Old West*. Everyone remembers John Wayne's Greener in *Big Jake*. If you're into the history of the Old West, you know how many "gunfights" consisted of someone shooting someone else in the back with a shotgun filled with 00 buck—or dimes in the case of Billy The Kid's murder of Deputy Robert

Ollinger. (Hence the stage starting line, "Keep the change, Bob.") When I started, there were virtually no hammer doubles suitable for Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$ . So, I started with a hammerless (internal hammer) side-

by-side. The sport started pretty much the same way. If hammer doubles had been available then as they are now, they might be required in the blackpowder categories as they are in Classic Cowboy.

Prior to receiving this gun for test I've been shooting a hammer double for comparison, a Coyote Cap Commemorative 1887 Coach Gun, a no frills, ready-for-competition winner. Most cowboys shooting hammer doubles have been shooting the TTN. It comes out of the box almost ready for competition. The hammers have sharp edges on them that need softening, and it benefits from judicious polishing and tuning. According to

World Champion Classic Cowboy T-Bone Dooley, it doesn't need much. If you think a hammer double is slow, watch T-Bone shooting a TTN fly through a stage! You should video it so you can slow it down in replay enough to see that he really is cocking those hammers as he wipes his left hand over the barrels, cocking them and simultaneously opening the lever with his left thumb.

At the SHOT Show three gentlemen came by the SASS Booth and talked to Coyote Calhoun, showing him a high quality hammer double. They were Paul Brenkman AKA The 45 Kid, Michael Michalczuk AKA Bury M. Deep, and Jim Bartels AKA Paul Bearer, from Pioneer Arms. They mentioned wanting the gun tested in The Comboy Chronicle. He pointed in my direction and told them to see me. They handed me the very good-looking hammer double and asked me what I thought of it. I told them it looked great. Then I tried cocking both hammers with the edge of my hand. As politely as possible I told them the springs were too heavy the speed cocking SASS matches require. The gentleman from the factory, Bury M. Deep, listened and said he would make the changes I suggested. I suspect I wasn't the only one suggesting them.

When the gun arrived for test it was obvious he was a man of his word. The hammers were light and easy to cock, and the opening lever opened the gun at a tap.

Before we go further, it should be noted the gun retails for \$1960. Several people have shaken their heads when told that, and comments like "well, I hope they sell both of them," and "who would spend so much money on a gun?"

Well, we have shooters shooting engraved, ivory-handled Colt SAAs. I have two with Peacemaker Specialist action jobs. You can guess what I have in them. At any long-range match you'll see a gaggle of Shiloh Sharps rifles that average



more than that. There's a market out there, but to capture it the gun has to be good, and it has to have an aura about it that makes people want to spend the money. Colts and Sharps are guns of legend.

Well, as for the aura, there's the Greener aura. The Greener is a legendary Old West gun. This is not just another hammer double, but a *GREENER* action. The Greener's cross-bolt lock is mechanically neat and simple. Opening the lock moves the bolt to the left, releasing the barrel lock. Closing the barrels re-engages the lock. It operates very slickly, smooth as silk. People will ask to work the lock-work just to see it work.

After much correspondence, Mike Michalczuk, Bury M. Deep (Continued on next page)

SASS #73733, decided that the introductory price will be \$1290 for 3 months. It is well worth this price.

This gun is made in Poland. All parts except the front sight and springs are made out of 4140 steel alloy. Frame mono-bloc, box locks, and locking mechanism parts are made from forgings of solid steel. A dual lug locking mechanism with the Greener cross-bolt and coil springs add to the strength.

It has a manual tang safety. This bothered one shooter, but none of the shooters ever actuated it accidentally. This is one item on the gun that should be stiff. It is. It requires work to move to the "safe" position. The oversized trigger-guard houses two wide, curved triggers. Trigger pull is light and consistent. The hammer spurs are wide, and feature borderless, hand cut knurling. The top lever is angled to the left. A tap of the lever opens the gun easily, and the barrels fall open. The lever was angled to the left to speed up opening. It doesn't hit the hammer if you try to open it with the hammers cocked. The gun balances right in front of the trigger guard, which is just right. The barrels are 18.5" long and VERY thick. The gun wouldn't fit in my gun cart without carpentry to open up the top mount on the gun rack. Length of pull to the front trigger is 15". It has a beautifully fitted butt plate instead of a recoil pad, which isn't necessary. The 8.7-pound weight of the gun damps recoil more than enough for SASS loads.

The gun's automatic sear's safety mechanism prevents accidental firing when the action is not fully closed. This is not noticeable during shooting. Body parts are deep blue finished. The barrels are rust blued.

#### Stock

Pioneer calls this the soul of the gun, and uniting it with the body brings the gun to life. It's a beautiful stock. It starts with one carefully chosen blank of selected quarter-sewn pieces. Both the fore-end and stock are cut from this blank, insuring a perfect grain match. The wood is beech, with a

high gloss hand-rubbed finish and borderless hand cut checkering. As a onetime amateur woodworker from a family of cabinetmakers, I really appreciate nice wood. Generally SASS guns don't have it because of the expense.

#### How does it shoot?

In a word, well. It fits my shoulder and arm length. The wrist is a bit thick for guys with small hands, but I managed. It fits me very well for manipulation and for shooting. Knockdowns were in grave danger when I shot it. It opened in a flash and shucked the shells from the mirror polished chambers like there were hidden ejectors in there somewhere. Cocking the hammers was easy. The hammers are very light. I could sweep them with my weak hand or use my strong thumb on





the offside one as the gun went down to load, the other as the gun comes up.

Shooters who saw it were enthralled with the smooth Greener action, and everyone enjoyed shooting it. It had no dangerous edges. Laramie Jack's new TTN had a sharp edge on the trigger that reached out and attacked my trigger finger, causing me to run for a Band-Aid to keep from getting blood on the bluing of any of the test guns, especially the great bluing of the Pioneer. The CC1887 had chambers that had been chamfered. The stock TTN and Pioneer did not. (Laramie Jack's had been chamfered.) That is about the only modification I thought the Pioneer would need for SASS. If the Pioneer had this modification, it would be race ready.

#### Conclusion

I would love to have one of these. It is a classy and efficient match gun, mechanically and historically interesting. The Greener action gives it authenticity points and panache. If you shoot hammer doubles and want about the finest one you can buy for SASS competitions, this is it. .







### OLE DEAD EYE, SASS LIFE #422 June 3, 1944 – May 9, 2008

Tucson, AZ - The world of Cowboy Action ShootingTM lost a Hall of Famer when Ole Dead Eye came to the end of his trail. He came into the Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> family in 1984 with a visit to END of TRAIL and immediately loved the sport. Along with a couple of friends, they formed the Los Vaqueros club in Tucson, the first SASS club in Southern Arizona. This club has spawned six additional clubs in Southern Arizona, all exemplifying the friendly attitude of Los Vagueros. He was one of the founders of Railhead in Williams, Arizona, and was Match Director for six years, receiving the "Cowboy Way" Trophy in 2000. He was also a founder of Winter Range and served on that Board as Range Master for six years. In 2000, Ole Dead Eye was one the founders of Bordertown, the Arizona State Championship Match. Under Ole Dead Eye's management, this match was declared SASS Match of the Year in 2003. He served as Territorial Governor for both Los Vagueros and Bordertown, was the first Regulator in Southern Arizona, and was inducted into the SASS Hall of Fame in 2006.

But before he was Ole Dead Eye, he was Mike Sinclair and served three tours in Vietnam. On his last tour he encountered a land mine, and he lost both of his legs, one eye, his left thumb, and parts of both forearms. He spent quite some time at Walter Reed Hospital, where he met and married his wife, Gail, his nurse. They have four children and 3 and 1/2 grandchildren. They moved to Tucson in 1979, and Mike worked for IBM until he retired.

Now, how you ask, did a man with no legs, one eye, and one thumb participate in Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$ ? Well, Ole Dead Eye always considered these things minor challenges to be overcome. And, overcome them he did. He fell

down on more than one occasion, and even lost one of his artificial legs on a stage. He just "kept on getting on."

No one was ever allowed to write a stage with him in mind. Whatever a stage called for, Ole Dead Eye did it. But there was one time at Los Vaqueros when a stage was written for him. Each shooter had to wear a patch over one eye. But Ole Dead Eye was told he had to wear the patch over his good eye!

Ole Dead Eye loved life, God, his family, his country, and the Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> family. And, he always enjoyed a heated discussion, giving orders, drinking a glass of wine, and smoking a good cigar.

We will miss you, Ole Dead Eye. A




### COOSIE, SASS #3499 September 13, 1937 - December 4, 2007






### SUNNY BEAR, SASS LIFE #19459 August 26, 1949 - October 26, 2007

Grover died at work on June 25th, 2007. We found him on the ground next to one of the header presses. I knelt by his side hoping he would come back.





Shooting Speed Pistol from the upstairs of the Magnolia Inn was a new experience for all, and tuned shooters up for a similar 'angle of engagement' at the Fort Stage for the Main Match.

Friday's lunch was a Dutch Oven affair that put many a shooter into nap mode. That afternoon, after shooters shopped with vendors and visited old friends, they got the Main Match rolling. Every stage told a story about events and outlaws in and around Castle Gate in 1896 when Butch Cassidy and Elza Lay pulled the Castle Gate Robbery. Each stage had a line to shout, and there was variety galore on target sequences and distances. Props all

that's my kind of Cowboy Action match! Even more importantly, that sippin' was accompanied by a lot of "gun talk" – not counting shooting, of course, there is simply nothing more fun than sitting around talkin' guns with gun people – it just really is one of my favorite things to do!

Okay, I know you need to hear about some of the shooting, that's what everyone came for. The main match was just spectacular. Lawdee, it was fun. And I have a funny line from the Comanche Valley Vigilantes website about clean matches; they posted this: Clean Match – "Some, faster than others." Well, speakin' from experience, AIN'T THAT THE EVER LUVIN' TRUTH!!!!! If I had to go against all of them heads up, they'd be packin' their bags and headed home before I got finished!

The fun thing for me personally, however, despite my turtle-like speed was winning two winners' belt buckles, plus the clean match award. Now how'd I do that? Well, on Stage 2, our posse's first stage, much to my dismay, I see Brazos Ace is shooting in my category, Duelist. My reaction? "I'm doomed!" I was hoping for as small a group in the category as possible, and I sure didn't need to be competing against Brazos Ace and others of his speed. Well, little did I realize, he's a Senior Duelist (remind me to stay out of that category, even if I qualify for it!), so I got lucky there were three different Duelist categories for men - so, since the Comanche Valley Vigilantes awarded buckles to the top five finishers in each category, and by my count there were at least 13 Duelists ahead of me, I got that first buckle on LUCK!! So, let's hear it for all these categories - the SASS Wire is replete with arguments on the subject, and

I'm casting my vote in favor of LOTS of categories! Yeehaahhh! (More on my second buckle later.)

As I review my now unintelligible notes, I realize I was having so much fun I didn't actually write specific stage by stage details that really matter; I simply noted the stages were well thought out, not overly easy nor were they overly difficult, and they were apparently designed to ensure everyone could do their best, and I think we all did. With only two exceptions, the stages were all ten rifle rounds, ten pistol rounds, and four shotgun rounds. There was plenty of "action;" sufficient movement was required gun to gun so you couldn't argue about any lack of action and, since "action" is the game's middle name, it was exciting, consistently challenging, and fun. But one of the things I especially like about the Comanche Valley Vigilantes's Showdown matches are the late event side matches. There is always something during and right after the main match that just adds special luster and excitement to the game. And this year it was:

WILD BUNCH!!!!!!!

So much controversy surrounds Wild Bunch side matches, the SASS

Wire is always full of questions about requirements, and so forth, so let me note here there ain't any requirements. "END of TRAIL" has requirements for its Wild Bunch side match, but SASS has not yet prescribed any other rules, so everyone is free to make up their own. Silver Sam made up *Showdown at Ormbsy Ranch's* Wild Bunch side match and what a great job he did!

First, he made two categories, which I thought was very clever. In

the "Pike" category you had to shoot any "Period" automatic pistol (Sam called them semi-autos, but they were always called "automatics" back in the day), "replica or clone thereof, with a minimum caliber of .30 Mauser." That brought out some guns! The second category he called "Dutch." Shooters in that category could use any "Period" double action, "pencil barrel" revolver. I used an old Colt Police Positive .38 Special, but it was far from the most unusual handgun used. Shotguns included any "period" pump, lever, or semi-auto shotgun - trench guns were allowed

as well, "humpback" semi-autos, and more. They appeared, trust me!

"Period," as I keep putting that term in quotes, is "prior to 1915." That covers a lot of ground. Attire required was standard "cowboy" clothing or "period military." Silver Sam was exceptionally dapper in his period correct "Pike" military uniform—a great example of how the costuming is done. All shooters, if able, were required to shoot "Duelist" style, namely, one handed. Then, of course, there were the various stage rules and restrictions on modifications, too numerous to mention, but the point is I think two dozen of us joined in the fun, and we had a ball. Even more hilarious, as there were reloads required, my reloading of that Police Positive was so sloooooow I was dead last (clean. again, as I recall, but I am uncertain, maybe I had one miss). Sam had a booby prize set up for dead last, and at the banquet I was awarded a knife and binoculars—for being last! How's that for hilarity? In any case, the Wild Bunch courses of fire were

the same as a couple of the main match stages so we all knew what we had to face, and it was great – kudos to Silver Sam!

On Sunday, for those who linger after the Main Match and Saturday night banquet (which, by the way, was terrific!), we had various secondary side matches and team matches ... things like couples (I can't say husband and wife because, trust me, summa dose fokes ain't neah close tuh bein' married!) and "Master Gunfighter" (aka "Man-On-Man" or "Top Gun Shootoff"). Those always make for a wonderful conclusion perfect, cool weather helped, too. Here's where I have to note some good fortune on my part. I was on Team 10 with The Tonic Kid, Red Dooley, and T Bone Dooley ... I probably slowed those folks down, but we were a team and came in third, and that's how I got my second buckle! Gracias, companeros, it was great fun!

I just noticed something ... I have used the word "fun" a dozen times already to describe this wonderful match. With that in mind, is it any wonder so many fine pards show up every year for this event? Our game's middle name might be "action," but shootin' and social fun epitomizes what we are really all about. Rumors abound about the demise of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>; well, I DON'T THINK SO!!!!! Not by a long shot (no pun intended!).

Speaking of fun, the couples' match requires the handing off of a "baby." You cannot shoot while holding the "baby" (it's a doll, and very

Well, I don't have to tell you it was a masterpiece of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> high performance and this year Shalako Joe was not to be denied. Congratulations to Shalako Joe and a hearty "WELL DONE!" to both these young men for their speed and agility and very classy behavior on the range.

Then it's time to go; hugs and kisses all around, pack up the trucks, and head on home to relive this match in our memories for years to come. EVERYONE was a winner at this remarkable regional match. My thanks again, to the Match Director, Eli Hawk, and all his able assistants. You did a wonderful job and should be proud of yourselves. See y'all on the same trail next year!

## ounders A Peek at

**ounders Ranch** is home to END of TRAIL, The World Championships of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>. It was the first formal Cowboy Action Match, and it has generally been the largest through the years. It has been inventive, both creating and adopting new ideas gleamed from visiting Cowboy Action matches around the country and around the world. END of TRAIL was the first to adopt the notion of growing Cowboy Action matches into full-fledged western festivals, featuring western-style entertainment and catering to the public. Dutch's Wild West Shows were unique, for example, and attracted END of TRAIL public attendance far beyond anything the shooting alone could have hoped to accomplish. But, these innovations didn't just happen out of the clear blue. Most were tested, tweaked, and smoothed through experimentation—by implementing these innovations in monthly and other local matches ... and that process continues to this very day.

Founders Ranch is home to two other annual matches, Buffalo Stampede in the Spring and Outlaw Trail in late Summer. Buffalo Stampede has also been the New Mexico State Championship in the past, and stands ready to be so again if there is any hesitancy from a local club to step up to the bar. Outlaw Trail also doubles as the Four-Corners Regional, and is a great opportunity to earn a free berth at Winter Range for the winners. Founders Ranch is also the home of two Cowboy Action clubs, the Buffalo Range Riders and the High Desert Drifters.

New ideas are often first tested at the local club level during the monthly matches. Those initiatives that hold promise are then taken to Buffalo Stampede and Outlaw Trail and showcased for a much wider Cowboy Action audience. Finally, these new practices are implemented for END of TRAIL and set precedence for all other Cowboy Action shoots around the world. To see the future, come to Founders Ranch and shoot the monthly and annual matches. Be prepared for what END of TRAIL has to offer. See what clubs across the country will be doing in a few short months. ...

#### **Buffalo Stampede '08**

Buffalo Stampede this year was structured very much as it has been in the past ... a warm-up match, side matches, a multi-stage Plainsman event, the main match, fiesta and poker night, and a Top Gun Shoot-off involving anyone who wanted to step up to the bar. By all accounts it was a good match with interesting, very shootable stages. And, yes, there were lots of knockdowns. By the way, the knockdowns were set the same as they were for Outlaw Trail last year (you had to hit them to make them go down!), but were nearly twice the size. Very light loads that hit the targets low still had a problem, but virtually anything that hit the top half of the targets would easily topple them. Something good to know for END of TRAIL!

New this year was a lesson in Tequila. Yes, Tequila! And, there was a Tequila tasting organized by folks in the business ... and by all accounts the drinks were outstanding! These folks have been invited back for END of TRAIL.

The really exciting event at Stampede was the introduction of the Wild Bunch event. There have been Wild Bunch side matches and team events at various matches over the years, but this time the event was structured as a four-stage mini-match. The rules have been published in various places, including the SASS web-page, but this was the first time a large number of folks were invited to play the game under match conditions. After an extended safety meeting where all the cowboy gun aficionados had the intricacies of a Colt 1911 explained to them and the safety practices reviewed, the match was on! The first stage was rather slow ... clearing and show empty, moving only with the slide back, stocking the '97s at the loading table, and so forth were new to most of the competitors ... but by stage three, everything was running as smoothly as any regular cowboy match. 

#### **Outlaw Trail '08**

The high price of gas has taken **⊥** its toll on the Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> community. Matches all across the country are reporting decreased attendance this year. The ever- increasing cost of living is also taking a toll on many of our senior competitors who are on essentially fixed incomes as well. When a 25 pound of lead shot goes for \$50, it gives on pause when purchasing ammo and reloading components. These increasing costs are also finding their way into increased match fees, making the situation even worse. Outlaw Trail has chosen to meet his new challenge head-on.

As Coyote Calhoun addressed last month in his Coyote Droppings, SASS has slashed the price of participating in Outlaw Trail to a mere \$50 bucks ... and for 18 stages! Doc Bones, a retired member of the Wild Bunch would be proud ... he introduced the SASS match, Just Shooting, years ago at Rahaague's Ranch in California. This was "no frills" match—just shooting. Winners were recognized, but expensive trophies were not on the agenda. You were on your own for evening entertainment.



Targets out to roughly 300 yards can finally be challenged at Founders Ranch. Crotchety Old Bart and Jack Diamond have built a shady Shooting Kiosk at the north end of the Ranch. When the time is right, we "turn the herd loose" and see who can bring home the most meat!

Revising these award practices will also result in a significant reduction in match costs. Nothing has been chiseled in stone yet, but change is in the wind ... 🌲

with one shot each. There was no reason to shoot the small bell on the train, 'cept for pride, o'course, and a bunch of shooters did just that!

On Stage 2, the shooter started in the public outhouse in the middle of Main Street. Outraged that the town fathers would position the outhouse there, some of the town folk set it on fire, shooter inside and all. The shooter had to say his line, and then bust out of the outhouse, now filled with smoke due to the two smoke machines we installed. Well, might as well equalize the opportunity between smokeless and blackpowder shooters, right?

Right close to the public outhouse was Doc Caraway's Cures Anything, Everything, Improves Magical Medicinal Elixir Show. This was an interactive stage with all the posse members part of the brief show in which Doc Caraway tried to ply 'em with his Magical Elixir. In addition to putting on a show, Doc Caraway also outlined the shooting procedure in a unique combination of performance art and shooter instruction. The target array was simple and fast, and this stage took no more time than any of the others, despite the humorous introduction. I don't believe anyone actually bought his Elixir, however.

Every town puttin' on a celebration has to have a shooting gallery, and Bodie was no different. Also, it turns out the gallery was a perfect place for Territorial Governors to stump for the comin' election.

There was even a functional telegraph office on the next stage, where a traveler could send kisses and hugs (X's and O's) back to his or her sweetie. In keeping with that, the target array was all X's and O's. The shooter started by tapping out a message at the Telegraph office, and then shot the close revolver targets (Figure 5). The shooter then moved to center stage and with the rifle,

If yer horse got thirsty with all these shenanigans goin' on, you could always stop at the next stage, which was, of course, the Livery. A mark of wealth and influence is to have a building named after you, so we held a raffle for the privilege of putting someone's name up on the Livery sign. Gundawg, SASS Life #21042, won the raffle, and so when you all come to shoot with us next time, you can water yer horse at the Dawg Pound Livery! Well sir, I'd be a might careful about that if'n I was you. When the shooters were sayin' their line to start the stage, the waterin' trough right in front of them erupted with splash from enemy fire! The special effects were operated by remote control, and never failed to get a giggle out of the shooters.

After slakin' yer horse's thirst and finishin' off the bad guys at the Livery, you could go to the next stage which was Granny Hawkin's Outpost and Store for a touch more powerful libation. Credit bein' what it is these days, Granny ain't likely to give you any and tells you, "All that big talk's worth doodly-squat," so you shoot up the place and move on.

The last stage is the fort. With a name like Fort White Cowboy Cavalry, we just HAD to have a fort. Match Director Kid Hawkins, SASS #15254, and his partner, Slow Loadin' Katie, SASS #39478, felt if we built a stockade wall, it would be like most stages where you shoot through some kind of opening, and the spotters would have to gather around whatever other opening there was, and the spectators wouldn't see, well, doodly squat! So, we decided to build the fort wall between berms and shoot from INSIDE the fort. That way, the posse and spectators could be safely inside the fort and watch all the goin's on. posed solution is to allow signups for any and all potential categories, and sometime prior to the match, do an analysis to determine which categories have enough competitors to offer a true competition, and then order awards accordingly

Everyone likes to be a winner, but if everyone is recognized as a winner, where's the glory? It's like passing kids to the next grade just because they were present in the classroom for the previous grade ... or providing SASS scholarships just because someone turns in a halfcompleted application. Winners should be recognized for achieving something ... not just for participating ... that's what our prize drawings are for!

If there are not enough competitors in a particular category, that category should be combined with one of its "parent" categories. For instance, if there are only a few Frontier Cartridge Duelists, they should be given the opportunity to shoot as either Frontier Cartridge competitors or with the Duelists. If for some reason the match director decides to allow the category anyway, they should shoot for certificates.

But what about the kids? Don't we want to encourage them to get into and stay in the shooting sports ... even there are only a few shooting the match? Of course we do! But what are we teaching them when we reward them for simply



showing up? There's not a working cowboy in the world who doesn't feel like he's obligated to pull his own weight. That's part of what "riding for the brand" is all about.

Another nice fallout of determining the final set of categories well prior to the match is it encourages everyone who wants to shoot one of the "optional" categories to signup early so their headcount will justify including the discipline. All match directors are more than happy to accommodate their competitors' shooting desires, but it's unreasonable for them to provide expensive trophies when there are only a few in a category.

A few weeks before END of TRAIL, 29 categories were recognized. Nine categories had less than ten competitors in them, and four of these had five or less. Seven categories had between 10 and 20 competitors, and 13 had more than 20 competitors. What would have made more sense than purchasing awards 10-deep for all 29 categories? One approach would have been to collapse the four smaller categories, provide awards 3-deep for the categories with up to 10 shooters, provide 5-deep awards for categories with up to 20 competitors, and arrange for 10 awards for the categories containing more than 20 shooters. It would have cost a lot less, and the winner's trophies would have meant a great deal more ... they would truly have been earned! .

#### **HISTORY**

In 1993, Mark Smith, visiting his brother Art (Lefty Dude) in Phoenix from his home in Oregon, read about something called "Winter Range" in the Arizona Republic. Since both of them were shooters, they decided to visit this event at Ben Avery Shooting Facility outside Phoenix and see what the big commotion was all about.

They were knocked out!!!

Right then, they decided to get into this Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> sport and play out the Old West fantasies they had as kids growing up in the Tucson area.

Mark went home to his regular shooting club, the La Grande Rifle & Pistol Club, in La Grande, OR and shared what he had seen at the next monthly meeting and suggested they start a Cowboy Action discipline as part of the Club. The President told Mark if he felt there were enough shooters in the area who would like to shoot "Cowboy," then HE should go find 'em and sign 'em up!

Mark started talking it up and before long he had a dozen shooters rarin' to go. The parent Club said, "Let's Roll!" and the Oregon Trail Regulators became a reality.

The Regulators appointed Mark (now known as Wire Paladin, SASS Life #5954) as their leader and started putting together the basic requirements for a bona fide Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> club.

In the beginning, most of the shooters had only one pistol and one holster ... and they allowed big bore lever rifles in their main matches, too. They shot steel targets right from the beginning with some interesting dimensions and distances: Pistol targets were 15" high by 8" wide, set at 10-20 yards. Rifle targets were 18" high by 12" wide, set at 50-65 yards. Shotgun targets were USPSA Pepper Popper Knockdowns set at 15+ yards.

To keep up the enthusiasm, they included lots of "fun stuff." When there were only enough shooters for one posse, they pulled a wagon behind a four-track to simulate shooting from a horse drawn wagon. On the clock, they started stages by flipping a pancake, bent over a fire with a pot of coffee in their other hand. As you can imagine, stage times for shooters under these conditions averaged in the 55-65 seconds range!

Almost every stage started with hands touching or grasping something. They threw knives, shot a bow and arrow, and roped and branded cattle. They shot from a bathtub, from an outhouse, behind corrals, and even had four false fronts made up to give them town props.

The Regulators built a safe with fake gold bars to steal. They dressed as Granny and saved the day while shooting and holding a baby at the same time. (The Elder Katie loved this one). They had a saloon bar made and shot over it as they drew shotgun shells from the nearby spittoon. They even went so far as to build a portable stagecoach, buckboard, and fort, each of which you had to climb onto to shoot from.

Things have changed a lot through the years (like bigger, closer targets and off-the-clock fun stuff)

but the Club, which now boasts 30+ members still has a great time at its monthly shoots ... and, as you might have guessed, stage times have dropped dramatically.

#### INTERESTING STUFF


Several Oregon Trail Regulators members bring their original '73, '76, '92, and big bore '94 Winchesters, .44-40 Colt Lightnings, and Marlin '93s and shoot them in either main or side matches.

The Regulators' parent club hosts a Turkey Shoot each December, and an Oregon Trail Regulators member walked off with one of last year's turkeys shooting a score of 44 out of a possible 50 with 5 Rounds, using an original Marlin '93 in .32-40 caliber, and shooting off-hand.

The Club maintains a library of Shooter's Manuals from scads of State, Regional, National (Winter Range) and International (END of TRAIL) Matches that they draw from to put together a wide variety of stage scenarios for their monthly and annual shoots. They take great pride in their matches.

#### Stage 6 **Oregon Trail Riders '06 Annual** 9 Rifle, 10 Revolver, 6+ Shotgun



Here's a Stage that the Pards and Pardettes of the Oregon Trail Regulators get a big kick out of. They used it in their Annual Shoot in 2006. Give it a try with your club and see how your card sharks do.

START: At Table A, Two Pistols loaded with five rounds each, holstered. Rifle, loaded with nine rounds, staged at Table B. Shotgun staged at Table B. To signify readiness, shooter cuts the deck of cards and hollers "Red!" or "Black!" for the color cut.

AT SIGNAL: Draw 1st revolver and engage the three revolver targets with a Nevada Sweep, starting with the cut color. Holster. Move to Table B. With rifle, engage the five rifle targets with a Nevada Sweep, starting with the cut color. Restage rifle. With shotgun, engage the shotgun targets as follows: 1st Knockdown, Stationary, 2nd Knockdown, Stationary. Take shotgun to Table C. Engage the two knockdown targets. With 2nd revolver, engage the three revolver targets with a Nevada Sweep, starting with the cut color.

Shooters always anticipate very special stage scenarios at this annual match. This year to help cowboys save costs, the Club will have a fun shoot with no trophies or prizes.

Oregon Trail Regulators members take a great deal of pride in the impact their club has made in the Northwest. They're proud of the fact they've spawned some additional Cowboy Action clubs, namely the Vigilantes of Virtue in Baker City and the Dry Gulch Desperados in

Milton-Freewater.

Some of the shooters who started with the Regulators have made pretty good names for themselves ... champions like Ol #4, Shalako Tucker, and Pinto Annie (who own Desperado Cowboy Bullet Co, by the way).

From a visit to Winter Range in 1993 to a thriving, enthusiastic Cowboy Action Shooting™ Club today, the Oregon Trail Regulators have made giant strides ... and have brought lots of shooting fun to lots of Pards and Pardettes in The Great Northwest.

Next month, *Bunkhouse Bidness* heads east to spotlight one of SASS's most active clubs in New England. Could it be your club? \*\*J.







## SHOOTIN' THE MEDUSA

The beginning of the tale fades **▲** from memory, but virtually everyone remembers the ending to the story about Medusa, the maiden so obsessed with her own beauty that her bragging angered everyone. And, eventually she even angered Athena, the Goddess of Beauty. For punishment Athena turned Medusa's head into a hideous monster writhing with snakes. Snakes moving in all directions at once. So hideous that none dare gaze upon the face of Medusa from that day forth for fear they would turn to stone.

Spin forward in time from mythology to reality, and we find two creative Cowboy Action Shooters ... Ore Cart, SASS #5719, Governor General, SASS #43291, who are sometimes a little too creative for their own good. Their minds are constantly, dare we

call it "working," trying to


find the right mix of speed, accuracy, and competency with all firearms on the Cowboy Action range. They believe Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$  should blend all three of these components, sometimes emphasizing one over the other. And above all, it should be safe and fun for everyone. And, for more that four years they have been in charge at the Pawnee Sportsman Center, Briggsdale, Colorado, of the Pawnee Shootists' 3rd Saturday of the month match doing what they do best,


dispensing fun and lots of lead.

A little background to this story is in order. One night Ore Cart arose from probably his best night's sleep in weeks and asked himself, "What if we could design a shotgun target that acted like the head of Medusa?" Now, the idea of anything writhing can bring out the best in creative cowboy target design, par-

ticularly among shotgun aficionados. And it did, albeit with a lost night or three of sleep. So, Ore and Governor General cogitated over the idea for a while, going through several design iterations, and there you have it! Enter for your shooting pleasure "The Medusa," a new and improved variety, a shot-


The Medusa stage at Pawnee Sportsman's Center is a stage where the shooter instructions describe the number of shotshell rounds required as "6 plus plus plus," which should give you a good idea of what you find yourself up against. You stand ready, staring into the eyes of the Medusa waiting for the timer's beep, and if you aren't careful, for a moment or two you will find yourself gripped, as if you have been turned to stone. You ask yourself the question, "Why are they doing this to me?" And then you thaw out as quickly as you froze, fire your six plus plus plus rounds, and move briskly to the unloading table happy to have survived and a little bit more savvy about the in's and out's of Cowboy Action shotgun handling.

The Medusa is a moving target second to none among virtually all shotgun targets. It is a pendulum driven, spring loaded, clay bird holding monster that you start in a variety of ways, depending on the stage set up. The steel plate that is at one of the business ends of the pendulum can take pretty much whatever is thrown at it. So, creative stage design allows the pendulum to be started with a shotgun blast, a shot from a rifle, or one from a revolver. And then the fun

really begins. Once unleashed, the pendulum swings and the stout spring inserted mid-way down the arm at the opposite end of the pendulum loads up a firmly attached clay bird holder containing a clay bird holding on for dear life. This clay bird gyrates rapidly and wildly, like the snakes on the head of Medusa, just daring the upstart shotgunner looking her in the face to try and knock her down. And, eventually the energy fades and Medusa is tamed, allowing even the most nervous shooter to succeed.

The Medusa targets at Pawnee Sportsman's Center are quite unique and for anyone who has never shot them before, a little intimidating. But, leave them out from just one shoot, and you are bound to get half dozen questions asking, "Where are the Medusa's today?" Those simple questions really emphasize the point being delivered by the designers. While these creative targets may raise your level of anxiety, they also add a real sense of pure fun to the game of Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$ . And therein they truly accomplish what the designers always have in mind, to create a challenging but fun target that all can face and eventually turn their faces of stone into the face of a shooter having the time of their life with a shotgun.


priate character from fiction.
