hoenix, AZ – What takes 372 donuts, 192 slices of pizza, 148 pieces of fried chicken, 18 feet of subway sandwiches, 537 bales of hay, 49 Boy Scouts, 19 porta-johns, a train, a fort, a river boat, and five teepees? Oh, and add in 33 cutout animals, 200 steel targets, 37 Arizona Territorial Rangers, 2000 man hours over 4 days, and 14.5 stages. The answer is that is what it took to setup Wild West Mercantile's Winter Range 2008. The 17th annual edition of Winter Range took place March 5-9 at the Ben Avery Range in Phoenix, Arizona. Oh wow, what a time we had!!

This year the 648 actual main match shooters hailed from 42 different states and 4 foreign countries (Australia, Canada, Norway, and Sweden). The award for the shooter traveling the furthest went to Constable Nelson, SASS #11784. who came all the way from Australia by the most round about and nightmarish route any of us could imagine. I actually think one of his layovers was in Beijing where he picked up some tickets to the Olympics!

tition shooting stages you have ever seen. They were fun and challenging, and they made you move and think, which was one of my personal problems, but they were not tricky or cutsie. These were the real deal, all 200 steel targets worth. Blackjack Zak, SASS #26828, designed an outstanding match that had everyone talking. The props were terrific, including an absolutely gorgeous replica of a paddle wheel steamer designed and built by the very talented Swiss Kid, SASS #54030, and a near full sized train designed by Lt. Col. Scratch, SASS #23839. There were forts and mines,

Indian encampments, ranches, stores, and Cantinas—everything you would have encountered in the Ol' West. These stages moved along smartly, and there were very few delays to any posse.

The action actually began on Wednesday when approximately 325 shooters took part in four great warm-up stages utilizing every opportunity to sharpen their skills, limber up them smoke wagons and long guns, to say nothing about getting the kinks out of some long-distance travel. There was a full corral of side match events including speed events, pocket pistol, derringer, and

Cowboy Trap, Skeet, and Sporting Clays, Plainsman, and the Long Range competition where this year 300 shooters matched their skills over some VERY long distances.

On Thursday morning opening ceremonies were held promptly at 7:00AM. The formalities included a very moving tribute to those cowboys and cowgirls who are no longer with us capped off with a bagpiper who marched in playing Amazing Grace. Glad there were plenty of bandanas around. The normally mundane recitation of important safety rules was, once again, taken over by a truly unique video piece based on the movie The 3 Amigos. Our Amigos, Trusty Dog, SASS #17263, Blackjack Zak, and Lt. Col. Scratch answered the heartfelt pleas of some beautiful senoritas in distress to help them after their village had been taken over by a rather slovenly and dastardly looking group of unsafe baddies led by the notorious El Guapo. owboys are an independent lot! They don't want to be told what to do, where to go, or how to get the job done. Cowboys are loyal ... they understand "riding for the brand" and taking care of the outfit's gear, cattle, and pride. And, our SASS cowboys are no different!

We have some 500+ Cowboy Action clubs across the country and around the world. If our cowboys do nothing else, they will regularly shoot with and support activities of their home club. And, that's good. But, it's not enough.

# COWBOYS NEED TO STICK TOGETHER!

Some areas have few local clubs. To participate in a Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> match, one must drive for a few hours in each direction ... for those folks, playing cowboy takes lots of determination and drive (pun intended!) to play the game. In other areas, there are multiple clubs in close proximity ... and yet, often cowboys won't travel to the other clubs in their area ... and that's not good.

### **Broad Participation**

Each club is unique. Each club does things differently, and their matches have their own characteristics. Some of these differences are neat and appealing ... others are simply not fun and are unappealing. Politics sometimes becomes an impediment as well ... someone doesn't like someone else, and by golly, "I'll NEVER shoot with those guys!" Politics nearly always has a bad connotation, but it doesn't have to be ... politics is simply people dealing with people ... and everyone

has their own ideas, opinions, and ways of doing things.

So, I have my own club, why should I care about the other clubs in my area? Well, for lots of reasons. By shooting with other clubs, you learn. You discover there are many ways to host a match. There are many kinds of stages and props. Nearly every club has something to offer that's worth taking back to your home club and making it your own. It's a wonderful opportunity to meet new friends!

It's also an opportunity to shoot more than once or twice a month ... and it's an opportunity to not having be "the man" at every match. While you may be responsible for running your own club's match, you can afford to be "one of the boys" at someone else's match ... and not get burnt-out having to always make sure the shooters are having a fresh, entertaining time.

It's also a way to build relation-

ships and bring more people into worthwhile projects. If your cowboy club chooses to participate in a community activity, it's always wonderful when members of adjacent clubs opt to "help out" and participate as well!

### **Match Schedules**

Many of our clubs offer annual matches ... in fact today, there are so many annual matches around the country, it's impossible for anyone to attend them all. Clubs should take a long, hard look at the necessity for even doing an annual match. If there are several clubs in a single area, is there really a need for half a dozen local annual matches? would be far better if the clubs cooperate and jointly host an annual match. There's less strain on the sponsors, there is more help for the match organizers, and there is the likelihood of more cowboys attending! And, the right thing for the other clubs in the local area to do is

oday you can go to an annual match just about every weekend, if you are willing to drive a little. But, also in this day and time driving has become more and more expensive. What's a shooter to do? What's a Match Director to do? We are hearing more and more from match directors whose attendance is down, and most are contributing it to the rising price of fuel. So, how do you get attendance up amid rising gas prices? Can we lower

the cost of matches? Maybe it is time to take a hard look at how we run matches and make some changes.

All SASS matches use volunteer labor. If match directors had to pay for their labor force, the cost of matches would be so high most could not afford to attend. Another big cost is the cost of awards. If a match director offers all the thirty or so SASS categories and goes five to ten deep, the cost can be exorbitant. So what is the answer? Do we cut awards? Do we cut entertainment?

The Wild Bunch has considered these questions and others as to the causes of low attendance and the escalating prices. Cutting entertainment cost, cutting awards cost, and cutting some overhead can lead to a lower cost match. The potential answers are still mere speculation, but we have decided to "think outside the box." I hate that cliché. I don't think there is a box. But, nevertheless, we have decided to make a change in the format of the SASS Four Corners Regional, Outlaw Trail. In some ways we are doing new things, and in other ways we are going back to basics. Will these changes be the cure-all? I'm not sure, but I think they're worth a try.

Here's what we're going to do. The Wah-Makers Outlaw Trail is scheduled for August 13th – 15th at Founders Ranch. Beginning Wednesday, August 13th on the Action Shooting side, there will be a six-stage warm-up match and a six-

stage Wild Bunch Match. Then beginning Thursday, the 14th, and going through Saturday, the 16th, there will be an 18-stage main match. Yep, 18 stages, shot six per day! The SASS Shooting Gallery and .22 caliber range will be open for "just plinking." On the mounted side, beginning on Friday, the 15th, there will be a two-stage warm-up match. Then, on Saturday and Sunday there will be a six-stage triple points main match.

Each day the activities will end with a potluck and a community grill followed by one of the following: 1) Coyote Calhoun's Trivia Contest, back by popular demand. (You need to know your western movie trivia.) 2) Popcorn and a Movie, we will let the



### MY RESPONSE TO "WHERE IS OUR **GAME HEADING?"**

Tex, I hafta agree with you concerning your thoughts on Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$  and where is the game heading. I think the game has gone way too far what with all the available categories and the stuff available to shooters nowadays. When I started in 1995, a lot of equipment and guns were available, but not to the extent they are now. You either bought a Ruger, EMF, Cimarron, or Colt along with an 1873 of some sort or a Rossi, and a Stoeger side by side or an old '97, and that was about it. I don't think the Winchester '94's were suitable then, although '92's were available at a more or less reasonable cost, but no more. You could slick up yer own guns or get someone close to do it for you, but most of 'em were fairly OK out of the box, except the Colts. Their trigger pull was like rubbin' rocks together.

Now we have nearly 80,000 members and evidently still grow-

ing. People around the world are interested in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> and the American West. The proliferation of guns and clothes is almost mind-boggling. Businesses are thriving, dealing in nothing but cowboy and Old West stuff. Many of the big gun manufacturers are producing all manner of cowboy guns – unheard of ten years ago. Several dealers here in Fort Worth and Tarrant County have been in business for over ten years and going strong. I don't how many clubs are within a hundred mile radius, but it is a bunch of 'em. And that's good.

But ... I agree if a body has to ask is "this and such legal," it likely ain't. If it don't look cowboy, maybe it ain't right. But, we have to remember not everyone in the Old West was a cowboy. I shoot with a trainman, a bartender, a banker, a couple preachers, a store keeper, what looks like a buffalo hunter, some soldiers, and veah, some cowboys. Also, lotsa ladies. Some shoot black; most shoot smokeless. I don't know many who shoot those wimp loads, but we have a few who do.

Don't matter to me; I ain't that fast anvwav.

I shoot four calibers: .32, .38 spl., .44-40, and .45 Colt, and it just depends on how I feel on whatever day it is that determines which one I shoot – usually .45 and full power. Also, I have a pair of Cimarron 1872 open top .44 Russians. Personally, I don't load any wimp loads.

A few shooters have gotten really good at Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> and are now selling their own line of guns and equipment, offering shootin' schools and training, or lending their names to various products. And that's good, too. I have shot with several of them in the past, and every one of 'em was a really nice person. Good for them

Nevertheless, I think a shooter just has to think about what is called the "cowboy way." I don't hear that much anymore, but that's what I go by. We have a little skinny rulebook, and I'd like to keep it that way.

In the 1880's, El Paso was known as the Chinese Mecca of the Southwest. Today, only about 2,000 people of Asian descent live here. Historians have long known Chinese labor built much of the intercontinental railroad in America, including the links in El Paso.

The discovery of gold in California was more than likely the biggest factor that led the Chinese to come to the United States. Because hard labor was needed for mining, young men were the ones who usually migrated. They wanted to make a fortune and take it back to their families.

But, the Chinese were to suffer difficulties unknown to the Americans who were also looking for gold. They were subjected to hatred, prejudice, and violence in California, and leaving the state was one way to escape their harsh environment. They would next find work on the railroads in the West, especially Texas.

More than 1,200 Chinese laborers helped build the Southern Pacific Railroad from Los Angeles to El Paso, completed in May 1881. When the job was done, about 300 Chinese decided to stay in El Paso. Most were married with families to support back home. With the completion of the early rail-

road, the Chinese started settling in El Paso in larger numbers. Chinese women were scarce in Chinatown, however. Only two Chinese women were living in El Paso in 1883.

The laborers who remained in El Paso formed the basis of the El Paso Chinese colony. All over the U.S. Chinatowns developed wherever a large number of Chinese congregated. El Paso's Chinatown was located downtown from St. Louis Street (later Mills Street) south of Fourth Street, Stanton to El Paso and south of Overland Street. In her 1972 study of El Paso's Chinese population, Nancy Farrar says Chinatown served as a place of spiritual refuge, for it was there the Chinese could hear their native language and practice their native customs.

The Chinese operated laundries and restaurants, worked as house servants, cooks, waiters, gardeners, and vegetable growers. A few kept working for Southern Pacific, cleaning trains. Some Chinese became property owners, exceeding their earlier goals of simply making enough money to get by and send home. They did this not only by taking jobs that other men did not want, but also by taking positions formerly held by women, especially Mexican women, such as

Farrar says all 18 laundries in El Paso in 1889 were owned and operated by the Chinese. This monopoly created tension between the Chinese and Mexican populations. The Chinese

were accused of raising prices and giving mediocre service, and local newspapers went as far as to ask for reforms against the Chinese laundry owners.

Like their counterparts in California, El Pasos Chinese realized their community did not accept them either. The immigration of Chinese into the United States was a highly contested issue. With the people of El Paso and the rest of the country growing tired of this problem, the government decided to act.

On May 6, 1882, Congress forbade further immigration of Chinese laborers for 10 years. The Chinese Exclusion Act ended America's "open door" policy and began discriminatory distinctions based on race and national origin. Those Chinese caught entering the country illegally were quickly deported. The law exempted those Chinese laborers already living in the country and Chinese who were not laborers, but the law forbade their naturalization.


On October 1, 1888, the Scott Act prohibited the return of any Chinese laborer who left the U.S., punishing as many as 20,000 Chinese who had gone back to visit their families. The Geary Act, passed in 1892, added ten more years to the Exclusion Act of 1882 and required those Chinese laborers already in the country to acquire a certificate of residence within one year. A September 1895 Herald-Post article entitled "Notice to Chinamen" advised the city's Chinese that an immigration officer would receive applications for residency.

In 1894, The Gresham-Yang Treaty softened the exclusion laws a bit by allowing laborers to return to the United States if they left for a visit, providing they had wives, children, or parents living in America, or property or debts owed them of at least \$1,000. And when China denounced this treaty in 1904, Congress extended exclusion indefinitely. Not until 1943, when China became an American ally during World War II did Congress finally repeal the exclusion law, and the Chinese came under general immigration laws.

The Chinese Exclusion Act encouraged the smuggling of Chinese aliens across the border between Juárez and El Paso. An "underground railroad" began, a well-organized system that allowed illegal entry into El Paso. After their arrival in Juárez, Chinese aliens hid in homes there and waited patiently. Language schools were organized in Juárez to teach the Chinese English. Once smuggled into El Paso, they could speak as if they had lived here for some time.

According to Farrar, immigration officials even believed tunnels with walls two feet thick and ceilings made of railroad iron actually extended under the Rio Grande to serve as entryways for illegal Chinese. When the right time came, they crossed the border into El Paso.

attic rooms and underground passages were built. Farrar says even floors contained secret compartments where a man could lie down and hide. She writes in her study that some buildings located on South Oregon Street were linked with underground tunnels in order for the Chinese to move around from one place to another.

Historian W. H. Timmons writes it was believed all the Chinese who lived in El Paso supported this illegal activity. Mar Chen, owner of the Eastern Grill, was accused of supporting smuggling. Another businessman named Lo Kay, who owned and ran Kay, Doc Sing, and Company, helped smuggle 18 Chinese aliens before being caught.

A New Mexico State University study states that for protection as well as social and economic support, traditional Chinese associations called "tongs" formed and confined themselves to Chinatown. The overseas branch of the revolutionary Triad Society (the Chee Kung Tong) became the main institution of the El Paso Chinese community, with almost half of its population belonging to the brotherhood. Faced with racial hostility, the Chinese became more and more independent. By the end of the 19th century, Mar Wing Kee, a café owner was the unofficial, but recognized "mayor" of Chinatown.

While most El Pasoans saw the Chinese monopoly of the laundry business as a nuisance, they saw other Chinese-run businesses as immoral. By 1893, El Paso had more opium dens than any other city in Texas because of its high Chinese population. Religious groups constantly protested against the opium dens and gambling halls, and crime and violence seemed to rise near these hot spots.

Laws were passed providing fines for anyone who bought, sold, or smoked opium, but because many El Pasoans of all ethnic backgrounds frequented the opium dens, they continued to be run openly without fear of prosecution.

Problems did exist. Opium "dens" were obvious in El Paso until just after 1885—although apparently more "white men and women entered" a certain "Chinese den of iniquity" than Chinese. And, an unknown number of illegal migrants were brought through what was called an "underground railway"—but one that led to only limited freedom.

Much easier to observe, living conditions were poor. In 1893, a traveler observed that "surrounding the American city are hundreds—yes, I should say *thousands* of adobe houses with just one, or at the outside—two, rooms, all of them one story high, inhabited by Mexicans, Negroes, and Chinamen."

Prejudice, especially against illegal immigrants, was high. Certainly on the West Coast, small numbers of Chinese diplomats, businessmen, students, and the occasional visitor were admitted, but the stereotype remained. In 1917, T. K. Fong, Consul General of China (based in San Francisco) came to El Paso, where he met and spoke to many Chinese. Also visiting often in Juárez, Fong made one unfortunate border crossingwalking because of a delay in streetcar service—and without his usual translator. In spite of his formal business suit, and probably because of his reply in Chinese to a border guard, Consul Fong was hustled to the police station as an illegal immigrant. Fong was quickly identified and eventually pacified. The United States State Department forgave the arresting officers, and two weeks later Fong had as his dinner guest Police Chief B. J. Zabriskie of El Paso.

El Paso always blamed the Chinese for outbreaks of disease that occurred in the city. Chinatown's buildings were close, overcrowded, and the living conditions of most of its people were poor. Farrar says the dirty water left over from laundry businesses was dumped on the streets, leaving bad odors. Chinese who had pigpens and other dirty areas were ordered to clean up their filth. But as much as the El Pasoans resented the Chinese, they were tolerant of them. Other Americans had driven the Chinese out of their towns.

The Mexican Revolution of 1910 interrupted service on the Mexican National Railroad, forcing a number of Juárez smuggling companies to cease operation. The U.S. Immigration Service increased its surveillance along the border, making it more difficult for Chinese to cross into El Paso. Although historians debate the exact date of the demise of El Paso's Chinatown, they agree it disappeared in the first half of the twentieth century.

The Chinese in Mexico eventually helped the United States after smuggling activities had stopped. General John J. "Black Jack" Pershing had been sent to Mexico to capture Pancho Villa after his raid on Colombus, New Mexico on March 9, 1916. While the Mexicans refused to help Pershing, many Chinese living in Mexico did so. They supplied his troops with cigarettes and candy and cooking and laundry services.

Marian Martinello writes that the Chinese even helped fight one battle against members of the Villistas. Villa swore to hang every "Chino" in northern Mexico. When General Pershing returned to El Paso, he brought 537 Chinese with him, even though the Exclusion Act was still in effect. Congress granted a special exception for these Chinese to enter the country.

Many things led the Chinese to leave El Paso. The laws that were passed against immigration altered the flow of Chinese into El Paso. Steam laundries replaced the Chinese hand laundries. Gambling finally became outlawed. But the lack of Chinese women was the biggest reason that led to the decrease in El Paso's Chinese population.

The only Chinese cemetery in the state of Texas exists in El Paso. Located in the middle of Concordia Cemetery, it is surrounded by a rock wall with large iron gates and the words "Chinese Cemetery" in both English and Chinese. Farrar points out that even in death, the Chinese remained apart from their fellow townsmen. Today there are fewer than 100 visible graves. Chinese funerals contrasted with the solemn ceremonies of Anglo El Pasoans. Laughter and music accompanied the procession to Concordia, with a long dragon snaking its way through the streets.

A close friend or relative of the deceased gave amber squares of candy representing the spirit of the deceased and silver coins for good luck to each person at the funeral. The ceremony lasted only about 15 minutes, and the coffin was then banked with food. Martinello notes one of the many men buried in Concordia is Sam Hing, father of the first Chinese child born in Texas.

Today, El Paso's multicultural population is responsible for much of the city's uniqueness. The Chinese make up a small but notable percentage of El Paso's business and professional groups. Their customs and food remain part of a culture representing the many peoples who helped develop El Paso in the late 1800's and early 1900's.

on Gibson and John Denson took ✓a last drink together at the bar of the Silver King Saloon in Phenix, New Mexico in June 1894. Both men were recent arrivals in Phenix, Gibson having moved there just the year before, and Denson a couple weeks earlier, in May '94. Even though new to the area, the men represented two feuding factions. Con Gibson was an ally of Sheriff Bud Frazer of Pecos, Texas, who was involved in a feud with an ex-deputy

named Jim Miller. Gibson, a wellknown drunk, told his brother, Reeves County Clerk J. B. Gibson, he knew of a plot hatched by Miller to kill Frazer.

In November 1892, a rowdy cowboy by the name of William Earhart had moved to Phenix from Las Cruces. His friend, John Denson, a cousin of Jim Miller's wife, apparently followed him a little over a year later. It wasn't long before Denson and Gibson met at the Silver King. Words were exchanged and a shot fired. Saloon owner Ed Lyell and Constable William H. Smith immediately disarmed Denson and examined Gibson's body. Gibson's pistol had hung up in his suspenders, so the shooting was ruled self-defense. The wounded man lingered for three days before expiring. Denson, contrary to most historians' accounts, was never charged with killing Gibson. The shooting is significant as part of the larger story on the Miller-Frazer Feud, a feud that resulted in Miller shotgunning Frazer in Toyah, Texas, on September 14, 1896, and Barney Riggs, Frazer's brother-in-law, outgunning Denson and Earhart in Pecos, Texas, on October 3, 1896.

The shooting of Con Gibson and other, lesser-known shootings throughout the West have long fascinated the author. Take the killing of Eli Chevallier, a former employee of Con Gibson's, by Deputy Sheriff McDaniels, also in Phenix. Both men stood at the bar and emptied their pistols at each other. Afterwards, Chevallier placed his pistol on the bar and expired, hit just once. Were they bad shots?

Or, the shooting of W. T. "Tarantula" Dawson at the Lone Wolf Saloon, a few miles north of Phenix in August 1893. Jim Nichols, the bartender, was amusing himself by shooting a .45 as close to his target's head as possible when he accidentally shot the luckless victim in the mouth, the bullet stopped by his teeth. Tarantula, who jovially declared the shooting accidental, apparently suffered nerve damage. He lingered until October, and then he died.

Such shootings as these relate to three phrases often encountered in studying the Old West:

He "shot out the lights."

He "came out smoking."

And, they "emptied their pistols at each other."

The author had an opportunity to test these three time-honored expressions. No novice at extreme shooting, the author is "down on

Hollywood" for its inaccurate portrayals of violence. Even a thrilling gunfight like that in the film Open Range borders on the surreal. For example, run the final gunfight on slow motion and watch Kevin Costner fire a six-shooter seventeen times without reloading! Other examples abound in Hollywood films.

In the Old West, only hapless fools loaded a revolver with six bullets. Accidents were quite common. Take for instance, the buildup to the trial of Sheriff Bud Frazer for shooting (but not killing) Jim Miller in Pecos. Attorney John Wesley Hardin tried to gather support, but in the weeks prior to the trial, both Mart Hardin, a very distant relative, and Mannie Clements, Hardin's first  $cousin \ once \ removed, \ shot \ themselves$ by carelessly handling revolvers with a live cartridge under the hammer. Scratch two supporters ...!

One of my father-in-law's neighbors was going to pull down an old board-and-batten tool shed. I asked permission to use the shed for a scientific experiment. The shed was old, mostly watertight, with a secure door. Along one wall to the left of the doorway was an old kitchen cabinet perhaps ten feet long. Scattered around the concrete floor was an assortment of plastic buckets and rusted tools. On the floor opposite the doorway was an old awning-like contraption of canvas and aluminum. In the corner was a paper feed sack filled with pecans perhaps ten years old.

I borrowed a kerosene lamp from my mother-in-law, plus a Ruger Vaquero revolver with a 7.5" barrel. I also used my own Vaquero with a 5.5" barrel. To this mix, I brought a box of real "cowboy" ammunition, fifty .45 LC caliber cartridges loaded with blackpowder, which generated muzzle velocities very similar to real 1880s cowboy loads. To add realism, the scheduled experiment happened at night on December 16, 2006, after I had finished my deer hunt and ranch work. In attendance were the owner of the 7.5" Ruger, the landowner, who didn't want any fires, and a passerby.

The kerosene lamp was lite and set upon the makeshift bar, the old kitchen counter, beside the intrepid author. A target, in this case the outline of a cowboy, was spray-painted on newspaper pinned on the far wall. The witnesses expressed skepticism and various other remarks at the author, who entered the room, loaded five chambers in each gun, lighted the lantern, and stared down the target on the wall.

A long minute passed. To be truly appropriate, I should have had a few shots of whiskey or a mug or two of beer. Witnesses outside finally heard uttered that famous line from Owen Wister's The Virginian, "Smile when you call me that."

Then the firing commenced.

I'm proud to say the target, a mere ten feet away, was hit at least four times. On shot number three or four, the glass chimney in the kerosene lamp on the "bar" was shattered. Perhaps a tense minute passed as the author felt for the door, then tried to recall how to use a doorknob. Witnesses saw him stumble from the shed, gasping for air. A great billowing cloud of noxious blackpowder smoke rolled from the open doorway as the author fell to his hands and knees, retching.

Witnesses peeked inside. The paper target was ablaze; the awning on the floor was smoldering; the feed sack in the corner was covered in embers. The kerosene lamp was still burning, though only its wick glowed. The shed was mostly dark. After 45 minutes, the author stopped shaking and coughing. The shed was saved for destruction later, and valuable lessons were learned.

"The cowboy shot out the lights?" Yeah, right. The concussion of a loaded .45 in a small enclosed space is enough to cause a miscarriage, and the author is, trust me, not pregnant. Lamps in a saloon or other enclosed space probably were blown out, but not necessarily from having been shot.

"Came out smoking?" Cough, cough. You bet!

"The cowboys emptied their pistols at each other." After the second shot in the shed, smoke was so dense as to make any target invisible. The author's ears rang for three days afterward.

The experiment has bearing on many shootings in the Old West. Take "Uncle" John Selman, Sr.'s shooting of John Wesley Hardin in a crowded Acme Saloon in El Paso the night of August 19, 1895. Smoke, the concussion, the movements of the crowd at the bar, the falling of the body, and the emotion that hot, hot night in August can now be imagined with much more clarity than historical accounts suggest. The relevance also extends to Jesse James getting it in an enclosed dining room, or Wild Bill in a saloon, or Dave Allison in a hotel, or any one of the hundreds of other shootings we research.

The violence of such a shooting is far more intense than Hollywood portrays, yet it is nastier and much dirtier too. The concussion, smoke, and confusion are far more than the author ever hopes to repeat. Besides which, he owes his mother-in-law a lamp with a glass chimney that is proving very hard to replace.

Dear Shadow Shooter,

This is a touchy situation, and I hesitate to answer due to "Spirit of the Game" issues. First, I suggest you devise another way of "gaming" since shadow shooting is, as you said, frowned upon. But since you asked, I will not take it upon myself to judge. Lucky Bill answers all sincere questions. My suggestion will have an added benefit in that you will obtain a new talent. This should be considered if you are not shooting up to your expectations. My suggestion is simply this: find a reputable ballet school nearby. Take ballet and tap-dancing lessons. You will learn unique steps in both venues. This will allow you to perform various moves and steps that those in the posse will not recognize as shadow shooting. There could be a drawback to this, however. This is due to the fact that those watching may recognize the steps as tap or ballet, and thus the hoots and hollers may continue for a different reason. But, it is worth a try. The upside is with your new talent you will be able to explain yourself by tap-dancing around the issue!

Dear Billy,

First let me say I am a healthy male who has been Cowboy Action Shooting $^{TM}$  for six years now. Lately I am becoming in touch with my inner self. Being honest, I realize I have gender issues. I find when I go to a shoot I have this insatiable desire to shoot in Lady Duelist instead of my usual Duelist category. I can't explain it. I want to go ahead and do it, but am afraid that someone will notice. What do I do now?

Dear Lady,

My suggestion may be obvious, but will require some intestinal fortitude on your part. I'll get to that in a minute. You did not mention what type of guns you are shooting. You should initially obtain a pair of Lightening revolvers in .38 Special caliber. Become as proficient with these as you want to be, depending upon your attitude in this matter. That's the first step. The most important thing is the transformation, so I suggest you find a female Cowboy Action shooter that is either retiring from the sport, or one that is selling off some of her outfits. Obviously (again) find a gal who approximates your size. Obtain some of her outfits and start shooting. No one will be the wiser. A couple of suggestions: First, you must alter your voice to speak in a higher pitch. Second, you'll need to shave any facial hair you may have. A little make up will help avoid any shadow. Other suggestions that could help sell yourself is to take some modeling lessons. They'll

Is there anything wrong with me shooting in the Frontiersman category? almost forgot, I'm a lady.



the balls, they cooked up an itinerary that both kept everyone busy and still left plenty of time for relaxed fun in the sun!



# THE OTHER BULLET: Re-enactors Review

he ladies are conversing as they walk down the street on a mild spring Saturday morning. There is a lot to catch up on given they have not seen each other since Saturday week. Southern Star is excitingly sharing her man's promise to take her on the stage away from this town. She would be happy if it were only for a few days. About that time her man, Dusty Shell, comes up to let her know a poker game has changed his plans. Southern Star is not pleased and lets him know, while following him all the way into the saloon.

About the time required for two hands of poker, a loud ruckus can be heard in the streets, indicating a fight in the saloon between Dusty and a man he has called a card cheat. While exchanging words of insult and degradation, they back out into the street and the hog-legs are pulled. Dusty, not the hero type, kills the "cheater," takes his watch, and yells out " ya'll better not tell anyone what you seed!" While Doc Jo bends over the man to declare him dead, Shotgun Frank, Dusty's brother, pats Dusty on the back and offers to buy him a drink.

Arriving a bit later in town, the dead man's brothers and widow find their brother and husband lying in the street. Questioning all they can find, they learn it was Dusty that did their brother in, and he is now in the saloon celebratin'. The brothers angrily call him out and a sizeable gunfight ensues with one avenging brother surviving after killing Dusty. As he takes the watch from Dusty's dead body and turns back to his fallen brothers, Southern Star comes runnin' to discover her man is dead, and she loudly disparages the brother for his actions. He argues, "A man has to do what a man has to do." As he walks away from her, Star picks Dusty's gun from his hand and shoots the lone brother. As he lays dying, she utters "and a woman has to do what a woman has to do."


The audience applauds and whistles as the MC announces,

"Welcome to the Dallas Heritage Village and this performance by the Trinity River Desperados." Dallas Heritage Village, located at Old City Park, is a nationally accredited history museum, depicting life in Dallas from 1840-1910. The grounds showcase 38 historic structures, including log cabins, the pre-Civil War Millermore home, a Victorian Main Street, a railroad complex, an 1861 farmstead with livestock, a 19th century church, school, and more. It is located at 1515 South Harwood, one block south of Farmers Market in downtown Dallas. What a perfect setting for a premier re-enactment group, the Trinity River Desperados. "So, Mad Dog, how did this re-

enactment group ever get formed in the middle of Texas?" "Well, a call went out from Deacon Justice (Daryl Congos) among some of the local SASS clubs looking for members to perform at the 2006 spring festival and raise money for the Leonard, TX schools. About 20 cowboys and gals showed to perform the famous Lee-

Peacock feud. (You know, the one where Bob Lee, a Confederate, and Lewis Peacock of the Union League fought a second "Civil War" in northeast Texas from 1867 through June 1869, with an estimated 50 men losing their lives.) We really smoked the town up and loved every minute doing so. About mid-summer another call went out to the cowboys and

gals to do another festival for the city of Roanoke. This call came from Deacon's son, Chad Congos, and five of our current members answered the call. After Roanoke, we talked about continuing these two gigs and the idea of forming a loose knit club, so we could at least call ourselves something. We each put in five suggested names and then voted on them. The Trinity River Desperados was formed that day. We are most definitely a performing group and do have very reasonable charges for our services, but sometimes the fee may only cover 'gas and brass."


"Almost all of our members are SASS shooters and all are NRA members. To become a member, one must be sponsored by a current member and mentored on the safety rules. SASS shooters have a huge advantage for reenactment, since they already are used to loading tables and own western attire and period firearms. Reenactments differ from a Cowboy Action Shooting™ match—they require acting, interacting with others, and multiple shooters firing at each other (at least in the general direction). Our attire is that of eclectic cowboys. That is, we try to be somewhat period correct, but allow our members to wear non-period rigs, boots, and hats. We have found that most patrons do not know the difference between authentic and Hollywood versions of attire. As long as it looks cowboy, it's okay We feel this allows our

members more freedom to dress and develop their characters the way they please. It actually allows the audience to better identify with what they think cowboys might have looked like. It simply raises the 'fun factor' for everyone."

The Trinity River Desperados have strict minimum distances and rehearse their positions and firing sequence until everyone is confident in each skit. They have a secured loading and unloading area, which is very familiar to all SASS members. All firearms are cleared upon arrival, and all rounds are checked to be blanks or dummies. They rope off their performance area and post signs instructing 'do not cross a shooting line.' Always aware of their muzzle direction to never shoot towards spectators, they usually even have the local police help with crowd control at large events." All members not only practice gun safety throughout every event, but also take every opportunity to discuss it with the public. For example, their firearms never clear leather for photos, and they are asked, "Why not?" all the time. Their safety officer runs all events like a major SASS event. Safety for the group and the patrons always comes first.

The three SASS clubs whose members are involved are Fort Parker, Comanche Valley Vigilantes, and Greenville.

Most often the Trinity River Desperados reenact the 1870's to



1893. They like to represent the "feel" of the Old West more so than a specific time frame. For the last year, they exclusively provide the reenactments for Dallas Heritage Village (www.dallasheritagevil lage.org), now considered their home base. Dallas Heritage Village is a living history park, based on representing 1893. All of their skits and historic references are based on that year. They also use historic figures in their skits, assuming they fit into the correct time period. Other city events might be built around a different time period or a specific outlaw that had terrorized their city back in the days. They perform at special events at the Dallas Heritage Village as well; for example, a Texas outlaw book signing and Blue Bell ice cream's 100th year celebration. They also provide entertainment for many city historic annual events, such as Roanoke and McKinney. Most of the events they participate in are well advertised, and the public is invited to all of them.

They hold many rehearsals and walk-troughs before larger events. Since the performing roster varies based on who is available, the rehearsals give everyone a chance to explore different roles within the skit. They have specific skits that include the sequence of shooting, lines delivered, and characters to be portrayed. The writer of a given script is the general director, helping the other members fulfill his/her vision of how it should play out. They encourage all our members to bring new scripts and/or an idea, making one of the head characters their own.

"Mad Dog, does performing in a "real town" make things a bit easier for you and the other Desperados, especially getting ready for a performance?" "When we perform at Dallas Heritage Village, we like to make a day of it. We start a few hours before opening, to rehearse that day's skits and allow new skits to be presented. Once the park opens, we step into our character for that day and "work the crowd," walking about town and main street. Staying in character before and after the skits is as much fun as the performance itself. Our ladies are a key element to our performances. They not only provide all the "town's folk color" and interact with the audience, but they allow our performances to show how women were treated and/or interacted with the men of the Old West. We have young and older members. This allows us a diverse character portrayal in our skits. All 14 members have chosen a character and written a "bio" (all available on our web site). All of our skits are written to include all 14 characters and can be scaled down for any given performance if a few can not attend. We try to wardrobe change between skits, if we are going to portray a different character in the second skit."

"The great thing about working in the Dallas Heritage Village is we really enjoy staying in character throughout the whole day." This allows them to perform all day and gives the patrons a chance to feel what it was like to be a cowboy. They all grew up loving cowboys and idolized them, so this is their chance to give a new generation a look back at what inspired them as children. They like to build a "cowboy camp" at larger events that also allows the patrons to come to them and sit on a bedroll, play some cards, and hang out with some "cowboys."

"The most memorable moment for me was at Dallas Heritage Village. There was a group of about 10-15 little girls there for a birthday party. Dusty and a few others played cards with three of them in the saloon for a long while, just having a great time. After the girls had their party, and the skits were over, they all came to us to say goodbye. Dusty was standing on the walkway and felt this little girl hugging his leg. We all looked down, and it was one of the little girls with whom he had played cards. We were all so touched by this. That's why we like to dress up and play cowboy, to give a memory to someone, which in turns gives us one as well."

Mad Dog also relates a time when things didn't quite go as planned. Dusty Shell almost always dies in the skits he participates in, especially the one related at the beginning of this article. On one Saturday they decided to use James in the part that Dusty normally does and let Dusty play a part where he would live. Dusty was so excited about finally living that he was dancing around in practice, celebrating his good fortune. The skit was going well, and as planned, Dusty knelt down to tend his dead brother whom James had just shot. He slowly rose up to gun down James for killing his brothers, and he pulled his gun from the holster, cocked the hammer, pulled the trigger, and click. He cocked the hammer three more times, click, click, click. He had forgotten to load more than his usual one round, needed for his usual character that ALWAYS died. Dusty looked at James with sad eyes knowing what he had to do to finish the skit. James fired, and once again, Dusty died.

## TUNING THE PIETTA CAP & BALL FOR COMPETITION

## Part 1. Diagnosing the Problem Areas

Yap and ball handguns are fun to ✓ shoot, and if tuned properly, can be very reliable. However, many pards buy a pair, go to a match, have problems, quickly become disillusioned with them, and write them off as difficult and unreliable. We are going to go through the steps necessary to tune a Pietta cap and ball for competition. Like many things, a picture is worth a thousand words. So, I will try to illustrate as much as possible what needs to be done, and try to suggest tools and ways of doing the job a good home gun "tinkerer" can use to tune his/her Pietta.

The revolver chosen for our tuning exercise is shown in Photo 1. I



picked up a pair of these from EMF at END of TRAIL 2007. They were under \$200 each, and it is amazing these guns can be produced, shipped halfway around the world, and still sold for such an amazingly low price. They are described in the EMF catalog as the "1851 Navy Sheriff Model in .44 caliber with a 5-1/2" barrel." As an historical note, there is no such thing as a .44 Navy. Whenever Colt advertised a revolver as being of "Navy" caliber, by definition it meant a .36. A revolver of "Army" caliber was a .44. Uberti tends to offer only guns that copy original Colts. Pietta mixes and matches parts to come up with a wide variety of interesting, but historically incorrect models. Our revolver is actually an 1860 Army frame and cylinder mated to a set of "Navy" grips with an octagon barrel bored out to .44. Although listed as a 5 1/2" barrel, it is actually closer to 4 3/4". It will be a great shooter when we are done with it, and the shorter barrel will be quicker out of the holster than a 7-1/2" or 8" model.

Before we get started, we need to discuss some of the tools needed for our tune-up. The first thing anyone

needs when working on guns is a quality set of hollow ground screwdrivers. Hollow ground screwdrivers are machined so the sides of the tip that enter the screw slot are parallel. A regular screwdriver simply has tapered sides that taper all the way to the tip. Photo 2 shows a hollow ground and a standard screwdriver.



The parallel sides of a hollow ground screwdriver fit the screw slot tightly from the top to the bottom of the screw slot. A standard screwdriver fits in the slot like a wedge and only engages the top part of the screw slot. The quickest way to bugger a gun screw is to use the wrong type of screwdriver.

We are going to be doing a lot of internal work, and it's hard to get light down inside the gun to see what is going on. Photo 3 shows an LED light that has a twistable neck and a



magnet on the end of the base. I picked this thing up in the checkout line at Walgreen's Drug Store. It is an amazing little tool that costs less than \$5 and can be found at many drug and hardware stores. No matter what kind of light you have, your head or something always seems in the way, and you can't see down in small holes. This little gizmo solves that problem.

Photo 4 shows a burr remover/ metal scraper. If your Pietta is like most, you will need one of these for the tune-up. (As an example, go to



Enco.com and type in #380-0840. This should take you to a simple deburr/scraper tool.) You will also need a variety of needle files, preferably fine diamond needle files (since some parts are hardened and difficult to file with a regular file), and some honing stones. Lastly, you will need a drill press and drill press vice.

The first step in any tune-up is to inspect the exterior of the gun and test the action to identify problem areas that will need fixing. The first thing, which isn't exactly a "problem," but is an issue for many, is the grip shape. Photo 5 shows an original 1861 Navy (same grip as a '51



Navy) on top with our Pietta below. Colt spent a lot of time developing what many believe is the best grip ever put on a handgun. The 1851 Navy grip was so popular it was carried over into the Single Action Army. The original back strap has a compound curve (Photo 5, A) that starts at the top of the back strap and runs almost to the bottom of the grip frame and then curves slightly outward at the bottom (**Photo 5, B**).

The Pietta grip is narrower front to back at "A" and the back strap is absolutely flat before turning out at "B." The Pietta grip looks more like a trumpet bell. The wooden grip itself on the Colt is also thinner than the Pietta. For some, because of the angle of the back strap, the Pietta grip tends to cause the gun to point high (much like a Colt 1911 with a flat or arched mainspring housing). We will modify the grip to be slightly

more like an original Colt. The front strap is pretty close to an original and is fine as is.

Cock the action and look for anything that causes friction or binding. Raise and lower the hammer a few times and put SLIGHT pressure side-to-side on the hammer. On our gun, the hammer was hitting on the left side of the frame and had already turned up a burr even though the gun has never been fired. Photo 6.



Something else that seems to be a problem on many new cap and balls is the wedge is pounded in so tight, it is difficult to remove. On our gun, the wedge didn't stick out of the right side of the barrel and had been hammered in so hard it had puckered the metal. Photo 7. On a Single Action Army the frame is flat under the



cylinder, and you can visually check the timing of the bolt. On a Colt cap and ball the frame is curved, the cylinder is much closer to the frame, and you cannot see the bolt. About all you can do is slowly cock the hammer and listen for the bolt drop, and then watch the cylinder to see how far it moves before the bolt locks up.

The bolt drop will be the second "click" while cocking (make sure you keep your finger off the trigger or you won't hear that first click), and you can look at the top locking slot in front of the hammer as a reference to

see how far the cylinder is turning after the bolt drops. It should only move about the width of the lead-in groove. Our gun is new, so timing was fairly good.

Next, put some MODERATE back pressure on the cylinder. **Photo 8**. Do this for each chamber. On this gun, its mate, and several



other Piettas I handled at END of TRAIL, most of them would unlock on at least one chamber. So, even though most Piettas (we are talking about the newer Colt style Piettas made in the last five years or so) feel like they are locked up "bank-vault" tight, they are not, and that is the primary problem we will address in our tune-up.

Next, remove the barrel and cylinder. If the wedge is hammered in tight like our project gun, it will have to be hammered out with an aluminum or brass punch. Don't use a steel punch or you will almost certainly mar the barrel. Correct wedge fitting is an issue we will address in our tune-up. If the barrel won't come off, put the hammer on half cock, rotate the cylinder so one of the chamber walls is below the rammer, and use the rammer to push the barrel off the frame. With a magnifying glass or magnifying visor, carefully inspect all the cylinder notches. Our project gun has never been fired and has only been cycled a dozen or so times. Yet, all of the cylinder notches are already beginning to show wear. Photo 9 shows a notch with a little damage on the solid side (A) and a



definite ridge already showing on the lead-in groove side (B). What is happening is that rather than locking bank vault tight, our cylinder is simply getting a wedgie from the bolt.

Fitting the bolt is the main part of our tune up. With the cylinder off, **Photo 10** shows the frame is slight-




ly miscast. The left side of the frame is over 1/16" higher than the right side. This is cosmetic and won't affect gun function.

Next, we need to test the fit of the arbor. With the cylinder out of the gun, place the barrel on the arbor at a 90-degree angle to the frame and make sure the arbor is bottomed in the arbor hole. **Photo 11**. (Make sure you stick the arbor in the arbor



hole and not the bore!) Now, rotate the bottom of the barrel down until it contacts the frame. The barrel should set flush with the frame or just a few thousands up or down from the frame. **Photo 12** shows our





Pietta barrel mates perfectly with the frame. **Photo 13** shows an Uberti. The Uberti arbor is far too short, and the barrel sets well behind the front of the frame. There are exceptions to all rules, but in general Piettas have poorly fitted bolts and good arbor fit. Ubertis have properly fitted bolts and poor arbor fit. (We will tune an Uberti in a future article and fix a poorly fitted arbor.)

Now, we will begin final disassembly of our Pietta and look for obvious internal problems. Remove the rear grip frame. On our project Pietta, as soon as the upper grip frame screws were removed, the frame sprang down and back. **Photo** 14. I could not get the screws restarted in the upper grip frame. The bot-



tom screw also had quite a bit of resistance coming out. (Be particularly careful with any screw that is threaded into brass, as they are easily stripped.) This will be corrected when we re-contour the back strap.

Before removing the trigger guard and internals, the bolt head should be carefully inspected. In order to get our gun to lock properly, we are going to modify the bolt head. However, we need to be slightly cautious with the bolt. In order to lock up properly, there are three things involved. First, there is the width of the bolt window (the little rectangular opening the bolt sticks up through) in the frame. Next, there is the fit of the bolt in the bolt window and, finally, the fit of the bolt to the cylinder notches.

On our project gun, the bolt does not fit the cylinder correctly. Widening the bolt slots in the cylinder is beyond the capacity of most home gun tuners, so the only alternative is to narrow the bolt head. HOWEVER, we only want to narrow that part of the bolt sticking out above the bolt window in the frame. **Photo 15**. If we narrow the entire



head of the bolt, it will fit the cylinder notches, but it will fit too loosely in the frame window, and the cylinder will have excessive side-to-side play. Just to make sure what area needs to be narrowed, take a Sharpie and color the side of the bolt as shown in **Photo 16**. (Only color the side shown, we will not take material from the other side.)

Now, remove the main spring, the trigger guard, the bolt/sear spring, the trigger, the bolt, and finally, the hammer and hand (some people refer to it as a pawl). Now that the bolt is






out, be careful not to rub off the black color until we get around to fitting the bolt. **Photo 17** shows the bolt and the area in black that is ABOVE the bolt window in the frame. We do not want to remove material below the marked area. **Photo 18** (A) shows the burr we identified when



cycling the hammer. With everything apart, it was also noticed that the arbor staking pin was sticking out and hitting the hammer. **Photo 18 (B)** and **Photo 19**.





Before ending this month's installment, we'll look at the relationship of the internal parts and explain how they operate, so we will know what is needed when we refit the parts during our tune up. Photo 20 shows the hammer, and it has a very nicely made and smooth hammer cam. Photo 21 shows the bolt. Although the Pietta bolt head is typically too wide, the bolt body is very nicely made and very smooth compared to many other Colt clones. It






has a very nice bevel on the end of the bolt leg that rides on the hammer cam. Photo 21(B). Many bolts are fitted with virtually no bevel or a very roughly ground one.

Essentially, how the bolt operates is at rest, the bottom curve on the bolt is sitting just above the top of the hammer cam. Photos 20 and 21 (A). As the hammer is cocked, the top of the hammer cam pushes up on the bottom of the bolt and the front of the bolt tips down (like a teeter totter) and unlocks the cylinder. As the hammer travels further to the rear, the bolt leg slips off the top of the hammer cam and the bolt rises to lock the cylinder.

The bottom of the hammer cam is shaped like a hatchet head pointing down. The bolt bevel is shaped like a hatchet head pointing up. Photos 20 and 21 (B). When the trigger is pulled, the hammer drops down and the two hatchet heads pass each other. Since the hammer is stationary vis-à-vis side-to-side movement and is stronger than the leg on the bolt, the hammer cam pushes the leg of the bolt inward. Photo 22.



When the hammer is all the way down, the leg of the bolt snaps back over the top of the hammer cam and the process begins again for the next shot. (In Photo 22, the bent leg is riding over the hammer cam and will snap back to the left when it reaches the top of the cam.) That's why we need the little light described in the beginning of this article. We are going to modify the bolt and need to be able to see that it is working correctly.

Finally, Photo 23 shows the relationship of the hammer and trigger.



The top of the trigger above the trigger screw hole slides along the front of the hammer until the trigger tip drops into the half cock or full cock notches. On many guns, the back of the trigger or front of the hammer is very roughly ground, and you can feel grittiness while cocking the hammer as the trigger drags over the front of the hammer. On our project gun, the front of the hammer and back of the trigger is smooth and needs little, if any, polishing.

Next month we will correct all of the problems we have identified and reassemble and test our Pietta. Make sure you keep this issue of The Cowboy Chronicle, as we may need to refer to some of the photos when correcting problems or reassembling our gun. ...



Recently, at a knife makers' meet, a bunch of us cursed with the leatherworking persuasion got to jawin', swapping lies, and comparing techniques and tools. All of us had our warbags out and there was considerable trading going on.

Warbag. Now there's a great old cowboy word. Ramon F. Adams describes it this way in "Western

"A cowboy's sack or bag for personal belongings, in which he kept all the useless ditties and dofunnies he had gathered through the years. Here he kept his supply of makin's and cigarette papers, an extra spur, some whang leather, an extra cinch or bit, and perhaps a carefully wrapped picture of a girl, or some tattered letters that had brought him news from the outside. Among this plunder, too, there would likely be a box of cartridges, a greasy deck of playing cards, a bill of sale for his private horse, and his "low-necked" clothes."

(For those of you with evil minds, the term "whang" in cowboy lingo means a piece of buckskin lace. The term "low-necked" clothes pertains to a cowboy's best set of clothes, them that he wears when he's (and again I quote Adams) lookin' as miserable as a razorback hog stroppin' hisself on a fencepost.")

Beyond what Adams describes, the warbag was a place to keep extra socks and underwear (if you owned any). It was hide-away for a dose of medicine for days where you were feeling "puny" or a pint of tonsil varnish for them when you weren't. It would likely have contained some form of "housewife," a small sewing kit with some thread and needles, and maybe a spare button or two for repairing clothing. It might also contain an awl and some heavy thread to keep your leather gear in good shape. Sometimes it was called a

## WHAT'S IN YOUR WARBAG?

war sack and in the Northwest, occasionally, a "poke."

On the trail or in the bunkhouse, the warbag provided storage and prevented stuff from straying. Its place was in the bottom of the soogans (cowboy bedroll), though sometimes it traveled "northward" for use as a pillow. In the bunkhouse, it was often kicked under a bed or hung up for safekeeping. Those "boiled shirts" and "lownecked" items were removed and placed between the boards or mattress of the bunk and soogans so they'd get "ironed." There's many a puncher who slept mighty careful those nights before a hot date, a fine shindig, or some other doin's so as not to wrinkle his finest duds!

While the warbag was a place to carry personal possessions, it wasn't the only thing a puncher used to pack his stuff around in. (Cowboys never carried anything. always packed it. Hence, packin' iron and so on.)

The most useful things a cowboy had were his pockets and his boots. There was a time when there were no pockets in britches or shirts. It was the vest, the sack coat, and other types pocket-bearing attire that were used to pack about anything that would fit in 'em. Cigarette makin's, a watch, a folding pocketknife, and often a tally book and the stub of a pencil. Many cowboys who could write kept a daily log of what they did through the day. They kept track of how many cattle they encountered through the day and what brands they were asportin'. They might note doctoring a critter, as well as conditions of grass, water, or weather.

There are many instances of military men, law dogs, and others carrying small telescopes in these pockets. And let's not forget a place for guns. Whether your pockets had specially-built heavy canvas or leather holsters fitted in 'em, they certainly could hold "hide-outs."

Chaps also came with pockets.



This bag is patterned after one built by JC Johnson of old California. It is interesting as, with its narrow connector, it can serve as either a pommel bag (tied in front of the horn over the forks of the saddle) or as a saddlebag (tied with saddle strings behind the rider).

Not always, but a good many had 'em. Most times there was only one—on the leg that was opposite your roping hand, so it wouldn't interfere with dragging animals while branding and so on. Sometimes it had two. Most of the pockets were "patched" on, basically just a couple of chunks of leather stitched on the leg to form a pocket and flap. These are still added on to chaps to this day.

After the turn of the century, chaps were often made with "builtin" pockets. These were constructed like a deep jeans pocket and were accessed from the side of the leg near where a britches pocket would normally be. This style of pocket has mostly fallen out of favor.

Chaps sometimes even had a special pocket built into them to pack a pistol! You don't see it often, but it was sure nuff done!

Boots also had potential for packin' things other than sweaty feet and nasty socks. Knives and even pistols found refuge in the tall tops. It was also a convenient place for both cowboys and soldiers to stash a twist of tobacco or jerky (yum!) or an important document.

The cowboy's saddle was not illequipped either. Pommel bags were often the choice for traveling as, positioned over the horn of a saddle, they placed items (often including a pistol!) within easy reach. Furthermore, they placed weight over the horse's shoulders, which take weight bearing better than the kidneys, creating less fatigue over greater distances.

Pommel bags, unfortunately, interfered with work, specifically with roping. Hence, the saddlebag or saddle pocket. This was a thoroughly useful piece of equipment. It was a repository for victuals and cooking gear enough for a day or two of riding. It carried medicines for doctoring animals, and maybe a spare horseshoe and some nails - just in case in rough country. It was a place

to carry a small roll of wire and some of the other necessities for fixing fence. (Fence staples were often carried in a small pouch built into the back of the saddle seat. This is often thought to be a lawman's handcuff case. It is NOT. Similarly, fence pliers often had their own pouches that hung off the rear cinch.)

Most cowboy saddlebags were small out of consideration for their horses' backs (hence the term "saddle pocket"). They averaged eight or nine inches square or thereabouts. It was the cavalry with their extensive campaigning that used much larger bags. With them, the mission was paramount. Man and beast were expendable. Cavalry bags were plain, while cowboy bags could be anywhere from dead plain to heavily tooled or fancied up with spots and angora or bear hair.

Sometimes saddlebags matched the saddle; sometimes not. Some

saddlebags were simply tied over the saddle with the saddle strings. Others were more permanently attached by threading the strings through the connector panel and then tying them off with a bleed knot.

Compadres, when you think of it, there were all sorts of ways to "pack" in the old days. A puncher generally didn't own a lot of property. Most all he had could be tucked into his warbag and a couple of saddle pockets. With his soogan and some "kitchen equipment" strapped to a packhorse, he was free to go anywhere his heart and his horse carried him. We've lost that, but gained somethin' else. Maybe good, maybe bad. Maybe just different.



## WOMEN, GUNS, AND GEAR Myra Manes the Knife Maker

Myra Manes, SASS #74463, aka Karen Hewitt, of Kimball, Nebraska, is a knife maker, only one of a few female knife makers in the country, and the only female knife maker I know. Myra Manes started her knife-making career working with her husband, Redwing, SASS #43324, in 1994. Redwing is the owner and operator of Redwing Trading Post, a vendor present at many Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> events. Winter Range 1994 was Myra Manes first experience at a Cowboy Action match. For the first several years, she just helped her husband in the store vending while Redwing was on the range shooting. After a few years, Myra started building knives as well as learning to shoot. She now loves every

minute of both the knife making and the shooting.


Part of Redwing's business is making and selling knives. After many years watching Redwing make the knives, and helping him sell the knives at shows and shooting events, Myra Manes decided she wanted to do more than just watch. She finally convinced her husband she could help make knives as well as sell them. At first Redwing didn't think she could, but she proved him wrong, and she continues to make knives today.

Currently, Myra Manes makes 90% of the Screwknives Redwing sells. The Screwknife is a specially designed knife used to clear jams, specifically in the 1873, and tighten screws in every different type of


firearm. After five years of knife making and working in the "real" world, she retired from the "real" world so she could make knives full time, as well as continue to help Redwing in the store. Before END of TRAIL 2007, she made 10 knives a day for five days, a total of 50 knives! She produced 50 of the 54 Screwknives Redwing Trading brought to END of TRAIL that year.

There are many steps involved in making a knife. Myra starts each new knife by choosing a blade from the stock of blades she and Redwing order from blade makers. Myra and Redwing choose to buy their blades from another source to keep the quality high and to have a variety of materials from which to choose. Myra's

(Continued from previous page) favorite blade material is damask.

After choosing a blade, Myra must then choose the right type of handle material. Both Myra and Redwing can make knives to order or knives of their own design. When she first began, Myra found it hard to design a knife on her own, but now she finds the creative part easy. Myra's choices of handle material include deer and elk antler, leg bones, ebony wood, pearly maple, and ivory. Myra's favorite choice of handle material is leg bone because of the way it looks when she finishes the knife.

After choosing a blade and handle material, next the hard part begins. In order to fit the blade and handle together, each piece has to be ground, drilled, and sanded. The whole process takes many different power tools from belt sanders, drill

presses, dremels, and good old elbow grease. Not only does the process take many tools, but there is also a variety of safety equipment used. For safety, Myra wears a respirator, a heavy-duty apron, a welder's mask, and gloves.

When Myra first began, she said the hardest part of learning to make knives was learning how to use all the different tools. In the beginning, Myra was down right afraid of the belt sander. But, Myra knew she wanted to make knives, so she conquered her fears and discovered she could handle the tools as well as anyone. Myra says it was a long process learning to operate the tools, taking her about 20 knives and three months to feel fully comfortable. Today, Myra doesn't think twice about using the tools; however, wearing the respirator is still her least favorite part of the fabrication process.




When each knife is finished, the last step after sharpening and polishing is to number each knife before it is sold. By END of TRAIL 2007 Myra had made a total of 864 knives during her career. When Myra sets out to make a knife, she says her personal goal is to put out a quality piece of work, making it the best it can be. She says the three secrets to making this happen is to first be safe, next be creative, and finally, be inventive. After that Myra just tries to have fun.

Like most Cowboy Action Shooters, Myra Manes has found something special in the world of SASS she enjoys and in which she excels. Also, like most Cowboy Action Shooters, Myra says the reason she comes back is because she loves the people she meets.

By now we have something that looks like a gun cart, but it is sitting on blocks and is looking like an old car that has been sitting in a redneck's yard too long. We need some wheels. If you refer back to the first segment of this article, you will notice in the price list the wheels and axel comprise over half the cost of this project. Sadly, this

## BUILD YOUR FIRST GUN CART

is a just fact of life. Is there a way around this? Let's investigate.

First, let's look at what works and what doesn't work. I remember years ago when I built my first cart I used 7" lawn mower wheels. There is only one place this type of wheel will do you any good—on your lawn!

Small diameter wheels just don't work. They do not have the footprint to give your cart ground clearance and stability. A small diameter wheel produces an angle of approach to an obstacle that will catch it and stop the cart from rolling over it. So, you wind

up lifting the cart vertically and dragging it across these obstacles, instead of rolling over them. This is rather frustrating.

Very soon after trying the small wheels, I graduated to a rear axel assembly from a Radio Flyer little red wagon. This assembly was mounted to the back of my cart vertically. These wheels were about 11" in diameter and didn't do too badly, but since I bolted the entire axel assembly to the back of my cart, my wheelbase was only about 12". This did give me ground clearance, but it did not give

me the stability of a wide footprint I needed. With the cart wider than my wheelbase, this made the cart top heavy in rough terrain. While it never tipped over on its side, it almost happened several times. At these times I would have to stop and keep the cart from rocking back and forth from one wheel to the other. I have since corrected this problem with larger wheels and a wider wheelbase. It is my opinion that solid wheels should be at least 14" in outside diameter and at least have a 16" wheelbase.

It is my observation spoke metal garden cartwheels, like the ones we (Continued on next page)



are using, are the most popular. Most cowboys use modern metal spoke and pneumatic wheels on their gun carts because they have proven themselves to be durable and reliable. Although they look modern, for now, we are dealing more with practicality rather than appearance.

overcome with this type of wheel is that a special axle must be made in order to mount them to the cart. Because the bearing journals and axle of a front bicycle wheel use fine threads and a small diameter, this creates problems in adapting them to a gun cart application. One option is to take a solid axel and weld the orig-



If you really want to save money, don't mind a modern look, and have the time, you can often find old children's bicycles at rummage sales. The front wheels from two 20" or smaller bikes will work, but again, may look rather modern. The other obstacle to

inal bicycle axels to its ends. Another option, which I used, is to cut fine threads on the ends of a one-piece solid axle in order to make a two-wheeled axel that is required for this application. (I don't think you can find threaded rod cut with fine

threads at your local hardware store.) This requires a die wrench, a 3/8" 27 TPI fine die, and a can of WD-40.

For this project what I have done is to find an old trail bicycle with heavy-duty rims. The axels were 3/8". An axel diameter of 3/8" is just strong enough to allow the wheel to be supported from only one side. If you use a regular wheel, say from a girl's bike that uses a 5/16" axel, the axel must be supported from both sides. This requires the cart to be redesigned to create a support that runs outside of the wheel. This looks a little unconventional, but you can use the original axels and do not require the use of a single solid axel. If you do this, you will also need 8 more 2" lag bolts and washers in order to mount the outer wheel support top braces to the cart. While not shown to scale in the drawing, the top of the brace would be 2"x4" while the outside of the brace would be 5/8" fence plank.

The disadvantage to saving money on used bicycle wheels is these wheels are not easily removed for loading into a vehicle. If you are really lucky, and shop around at yard sales and search some junk piles, you may find and old garden cart, a pneumatic tire dolly, a couple old wheel barrows, or a broken lawn mower with the big back wheels. These wheels are easily adapted to a gun cart with removable wheels.


It has been my observation that when pneumatic tires are used, their bounce or shock absorbing capacity seems to give a smoother ride, good stability, and will tolerate smaller diameters. I say again, these wheels are reliable, durable and modern looking—you decide.

One final word on wheels before we get to work on our cart. If you decide to use a wheel larger than 20", please remember you may have to detach them to get them into a smaller vehicle, and the axle will have to be mounted higher. The higher axel may cause your cart to be too tall for practicality.

If you are working with a 3/8" solid axel, the axel must be anchored on both sides of the axel support. The reason is that across an 18" span, a 3/8" axel will flex and bow. When this happens, the wheels will push in at the top and rub the sides of the cart. Add enough weight for a long enough period of time, and the axel will bend this way permanently; 1/2" and greater axels have enough inherent strength that they will not do this. Any axel less than 3/8" must be supported from both sides of the wheel as in the previous drawing.

I hope this information has helped you make a decision on how you want to approach the rolling gear on your cart. Just remember, a gun cart fully loaded with ammo, four guns, pistols, and beverages, can weigh over 100 pounds. Just make sure your rolling gear is strong, solid, and tight.

We're almost ready to roll out onto the range ... next month we finish up with all the trimmings. ...

'm a millwright by trade, and I Lenjoy building props for Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>. So when I spy something with Old West appeal, I consider what it would take to manufacture it. Wood spoke wheels have just that allure to me, especially those made out of red oak. It says in Ecclesiastes 9:10, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might, for in the grave, where you are going, there is neither working nor planning, nor knowledge, nor wisdom." At my age I find myself planning more projects than my allotted time may allow.

In the old days there were skilled tradesmen known as wheelwrights. They made wood-spoke wheels in all sizes to be used on wagons to wheelbarrows. With the Industrial Revolution, the wood wheels evolved into steel spoke wheels. Today there are a few wheelwrights around. The Amish have helped keep the trade alive

I had thought about building wood spoke wheels for some time, so I decided to move the plans to make them to the front burner. I looked at old wagon wheels and at new gun cart wheels and asked a few questions. Then, I put my hands to work using the knowledge learned stored up in the old noggin.

First thing on the list was to check my supply of rough sawn red oak. (Air dried oak should be three or more years old.) Mostly 2"x10" wood was used for this project. The wood was planed to a little over 1-1/2" thick. Then I took a piece of paper and laid out the wheel. I am sure glad I stayed awake in drafting class. The knowledge I learned

mels, or a string with a pencil tied to the end. I used the string and pencil because I could not remember where I had hid the trammel points. Next comes the choice of the size and number of segments in the felly. (Felly = "the exte-





rior rim or a segment of the rim of a wheel supported by spokes." Webster's) Felly segments were made 1-1/2" thick and around 2-1/4" for height. If your wood is pine or other finished lumber from a lumberyard, you may have to cut the felly a little less than 2-1/4" high if you want to cut three segments at a time out of a cross section. The hub and the number and size of the spokes are then considered. The type and size of tire will also have to be thought out. Depending on the grade of the wood, it takes two to three 2"x10"x8' boards to get two wheels.

I divided the felly into 8 segments and used 12 spokes because it seemed more expedient. But I've seen wheels with 7 segments with two spokes per segment and 8 with 2 respectively. I rough cut the spokes with a band saw, and then used a table saw to finish taper cut. The ends of the felly segments were sawn where they join to receive a 3/16" by 3/4" piece of wood the height of the segment. But, you could just as well use biscuits. Then, the segments were dry fit. I glued them together using exterior wood glue and "Dap" Acrylic Silicone Clear Caulk. This was all clamped together with a ratchet strap.

The center hub was cut around 5-5/8" diameter and the same thickness as the felly, 1-1/2". Then, using a 30°/60° triangle, the hub was laid out with 12 flat sides on the outer diameter (or tangent) to accommodate the spokes. Pocket screw holes were placed in each 1-1/2" flat to hold spokes in place. After surmising the spoke size, I taper cut them 1-1/2" square to 1" square.

Then the felly was laid out to receive the spokes and drilled. The spokes were then turned on the small end to fit in the felly holes, and each spoke was fitted to a square to round appearance. The felly, hub, and spokes were dry fitted, then glued, and pocket screw assembled. You can build out the outer hub sides as wide as wanted using round cut wood. I used a 6-1/2" x 3/4" thick wood piece on the backside, and on the front I used a piece 1-1/2" thick cut 6-1/2" diameter tapered down to 4-1/2" diameter. When sanded and installed, it gives the appearance of the real thing.

Make sure you think about the hole size of the hub and whether you drill the holes before or after the wheel is assembled. The best way I could figure was to use a drill press, and drill the holes in all the three hub parts, and place the copper pipe into them, then, glue and screw together. I drilled the hub holes 7/8" and used a 3/4" copper pipe as a bushing and 3/4" threaded rod as an axle. Bushing and axle size can be larger. A strip of sheet metal was used for the tire, held on with counter sunk deck screws. The original type tire works better, but requires a lot more resources. Stain and polyurethane varnish finished it off, or you could paint them.

The first set of wheels were 40" in diameter, with 8 felly segments and 12 spokes. The second set I made were 36" diameter with six felly segments, two spokes per segment, so I could use the same type hub. I made templates for the felly segments and hub. The wheels look great, as they are for decorations or can be used as prop wheels. Be sure to adhere to all safety rules when working on projects.





## DISPATCHES FROM CAMP BAYLOR

### Winter Range Or The Revenge of the Shotgun Gods

First I must mention the fact Winter Range might just be the best-organized SASS event I've ever attended. I can understand why it won the Wooly Award twice. It worked perfectly once I figured out where the heck it was shooting, which took three stages, all of which were very ugly.

I haven't figured out what the heck I've done to anger the Shotgun Gods, but if any of you know what offerings I need to make, please let me know, as long as it doesn't involve burning an SKB on the top of Mount Ararat at midnight during a full moon or something like that.

As a follow up, as I'm writing this in late March, the first, most badly damaged Stoeger returned only three weeks after Winter

Range. Generally when a Stoeger breaks at the lugs, it's history, but Cap fixed it. The fact he could fix it says a lot for his gunsmithing abilities, which are legend. The fact he had to instead of getting another barrel from Stoeger and just fitting it says a lot about Stoeger service. Ruger and Dillon spoil us all. The stories of Rugers sent to the factory after thousands of competition rounds and other abuse coming back a few weeks later back to new factory specs are legion. Equally legion are Dillon stories. I have enough to fill this column for a while, such as their rebuilding my RF100 (primer tube filler) after Winter Range and

putting a new motor in my CV500 (vibratory brass cleaner), both at no charge. Thanks to Randy Shelly for his invitation to bring both to the factory after Winter Range. Both are nine-year-old units. This kind of treatment makes us all (a) buy more from them, and (b) recommend them to our friends. But Stoeger won't work (for pay) on a gun sold before the current importer, and their warranty is void if you use the gun in competition or have a gunsmith slick it up. Additionally, they won't sell parts to qualified gunsmiths like Coyote Cap.

And to answer the question, "If you have five shotguns, and three broke, why did you have to borrow one?" Shotgun #4 is an excellent hammer double, a Coyote Cap Commemorative 1887 Coach gun,

probably the best Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> hammer gun ever. But I hadn't been practicing with a hammer gun. Shotgun #5 is a Winchester '97 that Coyote Cap did for me years I can't shoot it in the Frontiersman category.

#### The Screw Knife

I had seen Screw Knives worn by most of the top guns in SASS. When I took Evil Roy's course, I remember he made a pitch for them, which apparently, I dozed through. I couldn't quite figure out why everyone was wearing a knife/screwdriver that cost \$100 or more. Then I saw Penny Wrangler practicing, and a short round became next up in the '73 she was shooting. The bullet had retracted into the split case, allowing the next round to slip partly into the carrier. This locked the gun up. She pulled her Screw Knife, slid it down the back of the carrier, behind the offending case, and pushed it forward, allowing the carrier to rise as she closed the lever. Then, she used the tip of the Screw Knife to push in the loading gate and eject the bad round. If that had been during a match, and the choice was to get 7 or 9 misses or a few seconds to fix the problem, then the knife would have been worthwhile.

So I went to Redwing Trading and bought one. The blade is Damascus steel and will take a lot of torque, if you use it as a screwdriver. Each is hand made, all different. Redwing attached the only left-handed scabbard in stock to my holster, offering to make me a scabbard that matches the color of my Lone Rider Leather rig. In fact, he bent over backwards to insure my satisfaction. I was impressed.

#### **Codymatics**

I should also mention my satisfaction with Taylor's and Cody Conagher. A basic rule of any competition equipment is if you don't have a spare, your primary equipment will break. Mr. Murphy (or, as we called him in Vietnam, General Murphy) rules in all things. My Codymatic '73, bought from Taylor's at the '06 END of TRAIL, had been a fantastic rifle, but the extractor broke at the Texas Regional in '07. Thus, I "needed" a spare '73. (As I used to tell Mercedes' buyers, we've gotten way

past "need." We're into "wants" here.) I ordered another '73 Codymatic at the SHOT Show. It was at the Taylor's booth at Winter Range, and Cody was there to check out my primary '73 early Wednesday morning. He had even sighted the new one in for me, knowing I might be shooting it at Winter Range.

Cody had told me an interesting story at the SHOT Show. A while back he started getting complaints about Codymatics that weren't working right. When he got them in the shop, he could quickly tell he had not built these guns. Someone was selling counterfeit Codymatics! He fixed them all at no charge. Now each Codymatic is signed inside.

#### Cowtown

I spent the month before Winter Range parked near Ben Avery Shooting Center and Cowtown. Cowtown is a very old Cowboy Action Shooting  $^{\text{TM}}$  venue, 25 years or so. It's under the excellent stewardship of the Cowtown Cowboy Shooters Association. The targets are up all week, and club members can shoot any day for free. I don't know of any other place you can go shoot cowboy any day of the week without hassles or bringing your own targets. I've gotten a lot out of putting a few thousand rounds downrange there, often in the company of such champions as Hell's Comin', Smackwater Jack, and Larsen E. Pettifogger.

## MATCH READY GUNS, PART 1: The Great Western II Custom

Inside were tuned springs, a coil handspring and a smooth action done by U.S. gunsmiths, resulting in a light, no-creep trigger and light hammer pull. I bought a pair in .38/.357, 4-3/4" at the 2006 SASS Convention. These proved to be good buys. Since then I've retired and started shooting a lot more. During the winter my usual routine was to take 300-400 rounds of rifle/pistol ammo and 75-100 rounds

of shotgun ammunition to Cowtown and return a few hours later with a lot of brass and hulls. This was repeated 4-6 times a week, with a match or two nearly every weekend. The rounds fired are all blackpowder substitutes. Normally I clean the pistols and rifles every other day. I'll also clean a gun when it gets hard to operate. You might call this a torture test. I call it practice.

Problems? Virtually none. After 2,000 rounds or so had gone through each gun I noticed a problem popping Winchester primers. I knew there was a pad between the mainspring and the mounting screw to lighten the trigger pull. Putting a pad of some sort like this has long been a method of lightening the trigger pull. The trigger had gotten down below a pound on my old trigger pull gauge. With the pad removed, the trigger pull, as measured on my new Lyman Electronic Trigger Pull Gauge, averaged 1 lb., 8.6 oz. It pops all primers now. If you like 1 lb. triggers, then you wouldn't see the trigger of the Evil Roys a problem. But then you'd be limited to Federal primers. For those of you new to the sport, Federal primers take less pressure to go bang than other brands. Gunsmiths lighten trigger and hammer pulls. Really good gunsmiths make light triggers

that will pop all primers.


The Evil Roy SAAs are, because they were there first, the "baseline" by which new "match ready" SAA clones are compared.

#### The Great Western II Custom

Buffalo Sam Peed (Don Davenport), of EMF, offered me their "match ready" gun, the Pietta-made Great Western II (GWII) Custom. Fittingly he gave it to me at Tombstone, AZ. Wyatt Earp would've approved. This was a 4-3/4" blued .38/.357. The real Doug Turnbull bone color case hardening just jumps out. I pulled out my "Gold Standard" for judging SAAs, a SASS Colt with (Continued on next page)

action work and ivory grips by Peacemaker Specialists. The color case hardening on the GWII looked every bit as good. The GWII has a case hardened hammer, too. List on this one is \$690 in .45 Colt, .44-40, or .357 mag. in 4-3/4", 5-1/2", and 7-1/2" barrels. It's also available with ultra ivory grips or ultra stag and in bright nickel finish. Additionally, without the case hardening it's available in .45 Colt and .357 mag. for \$560 list. I tried several fancy GWII Customs at a vendor's store. They all have good hammers and triggers and the good sights of the test gun. Many skeptics assume guns sent to gun writers are hand selected and tuned. While this might happen, it hasn't happened to me in 20+ years. On the other hand, I've gotten four guns that didn't work right out of the box. Where possible, though, I do go look at similar guns at gun stores to eliminate "ringers."

Otherwise, externally this one looks a lot like the Evil Roy. It has a wide front sight and wide rear sight notch. It has thinned, checkered oiledwalnut grips.

Why thinned grips? They provide a better grip. Why checkering? We don't shoot them like the shooters of the Old West. Their grips were designed for the gun to ride up in recoil to help absorb the recoil of 250 gr. bullets at 850 ft./sec. We're trying to shoot really fast using light, wimpy loads I still wouldn't want coming at me. So checkered grips that are thin enough for us to really get a good hold are desired.

This is bad for the aftermarket grips industry. Even worse, they are very well fitted.

I got out the Lyman Electronic Trigger Pull Gauge. An average of 10 equaled 1 lb., 14.6 oz. For comparison I pulled out an untuned Cimarron Model P—3 lb., 13.4 oz.

### It looks gorgeous, but how does it shoot?

I took the gun to the range at Cowtown, north of Phoenix, Arizona. Cowtown is open to members during the week, so I could set up the Ransom Rest and Oehler 35P chronograph (provided by Brownells) without interference. Cowtown's stages face a steep hill, and I could only set the target up 15 yards away instead of my usual 25. I put up a target stand designed to hold IPSC targets firmly but allow quick target replacement. The targets don't move. The gun, mounted on a Ransom Rest returned to zero after each shot. This means groups listed here (a) actually existed, and (b) are repeatable. Any gun writer who uses hand held groups is fudging. Better writers than I have pointed out that, while you might be able to shoot good groups for a while, you probably can't do repeatable groups all day.

The Ransom Rest doesn't care how well you shoot (a good thing for

me). Correctly used, the groups it gives are the capabilities of the gun and ammunition, not the writer, and not the writer's M1 Pencil.

#### Short answer: Is it accurate enough for Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>?

Yes. It gave good groups with several different loads, different bullet weights, and powders, both smokeless and smoky, hand loaded and factory. All in all I tested 21 different loads (the comparison of bullets, powders, and loads is the subject of its own article).

Best six-round group: 0.98 in. center-to-center (measured with digital calipers), Ten-X 130 gr. (Truncated Cone) .38 Special factory ammunition. 542 ft./sec., power factor 70.

Other factory ammunition scores: Ten-X 105 gr. TC. – 1.14 in. 393 ft./sec. PF 41(!) Great Basin 125 gr. RNFP – 1.56 in. 670 ft./sec. PF 84. Black Hills 158 gr. SWC – 2.22 in. 798 ft./sec. PF 126 Ten-X 130 gr. BPS – 2.22 in. 671 ft./sec. PF 87 Great Basin 125 gr. RNFP BPS – 2.15 in. 525 ft./sec. PF 66.

#### **Observations**

I do six-round groups because occasionally (more often than we'd like to admit), you get fliers with a revolver. If that happens I redo the test and try to find out if it's the same chamber giving the flier. If it is, something's wrong with that chamber. If it's just a hair off line, it'll shave lead off the edge of the bullet going into the barrel, and that bullet will wobble in flight, causing it to deviate from the others, thus adding to the legend of the stealth bullet. I was happy to note I didn't have this situation with any of the loads tested. This told me those little holes in that round thingie were pretty accurately drilled. The gun locks up solidly. The timing is perfect. The trigger is crisp. The hammer doesn't have rub marks or scratches from hitting the frame. When I disassembled the grip frame to remove the one-piece grips for mounting the gun in the Ransom Rest, I discovered a coil handspring. This, as Martha Stewart says, "is a good thing." It's considerably harder to break a coil spring than a leaf spring.

The Italian SAA clones' base pins have a double groove or notch "safety." Pushed in to the first groove, the gun works. Pushed into the second groove. the gun is "safe." More accurately, it is incapable of being fired. The base pin is preventing the hammer from falling completely. This is crude, but effective at meeting the letter of the law. Whether this is safe or not depends on what happens if you are unable to make the gun go bang when the boogieman is charging you waving a machete over his head. But, it does keep the federal bureaucrats occupied. (Evil Roy told me the only modification made to his guns was to have the gunsmith cut off the base pin to the length to prevent an inadvertent "safe" condition. The GWII's base pin has two notches on one side for the latch, not grooves. It fits very tightly in the frame and in the Colt-style removable bushing in the cylinder. The base pin insertion and removal was much facilitated by judiciously applied white lithium grease. It got easier to remove and reinsert with use, but harder than the Uberti.

During one shooting session I thought I'd broken the gun. It wouldn't cock reliably. The base pin had slipped out of its notch. Easily fixed. No phone call to Buffalo Sam Peed required.

Pietta apparently does not have on staff the equivalent of Uberti's 350 lb. retired weight lifter who tightens all of the (soft) screws to 400 lb./ft. in Red Loctite. I presume he's getting a little extra in his pay envelope from the importers of spare screws for Ubertis. In fact, some screws on the GWII were a bit loose after the Ransom Rest session.

When I took Long Hunter's Shooting School at Buffalo Stampede, I handed the gun to him and asked his opinion. He couldn't find anything wrong with it and pronounced it a good gun. As a SASS-renowned gunsmith, he can find more things wrong than I can. It turns out he had spent some time with Allesandro Pietta (Alchemista) and made some suggestions for improving Pietta SAAs. Obviously his suggestions were acted on.

#### Shooting

When I practice, I now take one Evil Rov and the GWII. I'm using them in regular practice, and I'm quietly looking for weak points, to see if they break in normal use. The Evil Roy has a serious head start. So far nothing's broken, and so far it's really hard to tell the guns apart when shooting them. Picking nits, the only complaint I have is it's often hard to get empties out of the GWII. If it were my pistol, I'd flex hone the cylinders to solve it. Not a biggie. My plan is to keep shooting them and report on how they hold up in a future "Dispatches from Camp Baylor." Future tests include the Taylor's Smoke Wagon and a USFA Rodeo prepped by Long Hunter (okay, it's not sold directly by the manufacturer, but Long Hunter is the outlet for tuned Rodeos). Then the plan is to top the comparison off with what might be the most accurate, well built SAA clone to date, the (understandably more expensive) STI Texican.

#### Conclusions

The Great Western II Custom is "match ready" out of the box. It looks good, feels good, and shoots great. SASS matches and championships are won every day with guns no more modified than this. You don't have to find a gunsmith you trust and wait nine months for the gun's return. Buyers of this gun just need to get one from their local six-gun purveyor. Heck of a deal. A



## **High Doom in the Andes**

#### NOVEMBER 6, 1908

Two heavily armed "Americanos, on jaded mules" ride into the high mountain village of San Vicente, Bolivia. As the sun is setting, Butch and Sundance rein in at the home of Bonifacio Casasola. A village official, Cleto Bellot, approaches the strangers and asks what they want.

"An inn," they tell him.

Bellot informs the strangers there are no inns in San Vicente, but that Casasola can put them up and sell them fodder for their mules.

After tending to their animals and unloading their gear, Butch and Sundance join Bellot in their room, which opens onto Casasola's walled patio. The Americans ask Bellot about the road to Santa Catalina, an Argentine town just south of the border (this was probably a ruse to throw off any pursuing posses) and the road to Uyuni (their real path), located about 75 miles north of San Vicente. They also ask where they can get sardines and beer, and Bellot sends Casasola to buy some with money provided by Sundance.

After more small talk, Bellot leaves and goes to the home of Manuel Barran, where a four-man posse from Uyuni is staying. The posse rode in that afternoon, warning Bellot and other locals to be on the lookout for two Yankees with a mule belonging to the Aramayo mining company, whose payroll was recently robbed.

The posse consists of Capt. Justo P. Concha, two soldiers from the Abaroa Regiment and Inspector Timoteo Rios from the Uyuni police department. Captain Concha is unavailable when Bellot arrives. When Bellot tells his news to Inspector Rios and the two soldiers, they immediately load their rifles.

Accompanied by Bellot, the three posse members march to Casasola's home and enter the patio. As the Bolivians approach the bandits' room, Butch appears in the doorway, draws his Colt and fires, hitting lead soldier Victor

Torres in the neck. Torres gets off a shot with his rifle, then runs out the patio door and collapses at a nearby house. He dies within minutes.


The other soldier and Inspector Rios also return fire, before they scurry out with Bellot. After retrieving more ammunition, the two return and fire into the house through the patio door.

By now, it's dark. Captain Concha runs up and commands Bellot to find some locals who can watch the roof and the back of the adobe house so the bandits don't punch a hole and escape. As Bellot rushes to comply, he hears "three screams of desperation" coming from the bandits' room.

The San Vicenteños are finally at their posts, but the firing has ceased and all is quiet. Minutes turn into hours, and there's no response from the fugitives. The guards remain at their stations throughout the bitterly cold and windy night.

The next morning, Bellot and others enter the room and see Butch's lifeless form stretched out on the floor, one bullet wound in the temple and another in the arm. Sundance's corpse sits on a bench behind the door, hugging a large ceramic jar. He has been shot once in the forehead and several times in the arm. According to one report, the bullet removed from Sundance's forehead came from Butch's Colt. From the positions of the bodies and the locations of the fatal wounds, the witnesses conclude that Butch put his partner out of his misery, then turned his gun on himself.

The bodies of Butch and Sundance were buried in the local cemetery that afternoon. The Aramayo payroll was found intact in their saddlebags. Once the outlaws' possessions had been inventoried, Capt. Concha absconded to Uyuni with the lot, leaving the Aramayo company to battle for months in court to recover its money and mule. .



### TOO DANG FRANK, SASS LIFE # 31985

February 20, 1939 ~ March 24, 2008

Words from Marty Robbins' Gunfighter Ballad, "*Utah Carol*," come to mind when I think of my friend, Too Dang Frank (aka T. Frank Pinder, II):

"And now my friends you ask me,
What makes me sad and still,
And why my brow is darkened,
Like the clouds upon the hill.
"Run in your pony closer,
And I'll tell to you my tale,
Of 'Too Dang Frank' my partner,
And his last ride on the trail.
"We rode the range together,
An rode it side by side;
I loved him like a brother,
An I wept when 'Too Dang' died."

Frank grew up on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, in the county of Kent, the state's smallest. Everything he loved was within easy reach. He had a pony as a kid and never lost his love of horses. Surrounded by water on three sides, boats were both passion and business. Driving over the Chesapeake Bay Bridge going to or coming from a Cowboy Shoot, he would point out half a dozen boats on the Bay and tell me their make, model, cost, current speed in knots, and how much fuel they consumed at that speed, and having sold, surveyed, and hauled them all at one time or another, it was no BS; he really knew!

But, our conversation to and from matches was mainly 'war stories' from our respective military careers. He began as a United States Marine and never lost his love for the Corps, even though most of his time was as a soldier in the Maryland Army National Guard. In the Guard he rose to the top of the enlisted ranks, Sergeant Major. If ever there was an American patriot, Frank was it! And as such, he always made sure the Stars and Stripes were flying and our Cowboy Shoots began with the Pledge of Allegiance—always! And, he would question the Match Director of other Posses if this was not done at their range!

On a good month Too Dang Frank would shoot eight different Cowboy

Matches at eight different locations: in Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Virginia, or West Virginia.

Saturday and Sunday, if there was a match within a three-hour drive, he was there.

He knew and



was known by Cowboys and Cowgirls all over this part of the East Coast. During the week, as owner and operator of Kentech Marine, he would haul boats from Maine to Florida. "Finances my Cowboy shooting," he would say—but the weekends were Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>!!

At all of the matches, he arrived early to 'set steel' or do whatever last minute things needed to be done. And, he stayed late to help with the teardown and put-away. During the match, he was constantly in motion. As an RO-II he would run the clock or serve as Posse Leader, if asked. Always a willing spotter, he also picked up brass and reset targets, worked either table, coached and encouraged a new or young shooter ... whatever! I used to get tired just watching him!!

Frank and I belonged to the same local gun club, the Delmarva Sportsman's Association (DSA). Coming home from a Cowboy Match one Saturday in 2005, we hatched the idea of starting a new Cowboy Posse at DSA. We found a ton of steel targets (literally) at a gun club on the other side of the Bay for sale cheap because they could no longer shoot steel outside, hemmed in by a housing development and golf course. We bought it, and Frank hauled it back to DSA on one of his big boat hauling trailers. It was the first of several hundred dollars he donated to our cause.

Frank was generous to a fault. With the help of Nanticoke, SASS #16530, we built stands and were in business. With what name? We both liked "Renegades," and since we were the only Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> Club on the Eastern Shore of Maryland that seemed a shoo-in ~ Eastern Shore Renegades ~ but it was Frank alone who made it "Eas'dern Shore Renegades." He had a great sense of humor, which he injected into every match he shot.

We started with nine Shooters in



November of 2005. In 2006 we shot the first Saturday of every other monthaveraging 25 shooters per match. By 2007 we were officially recognized as a SASS affiliated club, shot every month that year, and averaged 36 shooters a month with a growing reputation for providing great lunches as part of the shoot! The first quarter of 2008 we have averaged 38 shooters and conducted an RO-I & -II Course that trained 29 Cowboys/girls in the fine points of a SASS match. Our instructor was Tennessee Slim, hosted for the weekend by Too Dang Frank. I mention all of this, because if it were not for Frank, there would be no Cowboy Posse on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

In our matches, Frank made it a crusade to be *safe* ... and have *fun*! He had little tolerance for anyone who brought a heavy, <u>must</u> win attitude to the match. "It's a game," he would say. "We do this because we enjoy the Old West, and shooting firearms from that era, it's a way to have fun!" And have fun he did. In local level shoots, he was merciless in ragging those he knew could take it when they missed a shot or got nailed for a procedural. And, in the best Spirit of the Game, he


readily took as much as he gave. Please don't misunderstand me ... Single Deck, aka Anthony Lee "Papa" Jensen, passed away peacefully and was called to his heavenly home March 19, 2008. Lee, as he was called by everyone who knew him, fought a courageous battle against congestive heart failure and pulmonary fibrosis.

Single Deck was one of those handfuls of people that entered my life, making my life better for it. Born in Montpelier, Idaho, he graduated from Idaho State University with a degree in design engineering. In 1965 he moved to Albuquerque, NM, where he attended the University of New Mexico majoring in Astrophysics. The ground trembled from the **⊥** thundering hooves of the six frantically galloping draft horses. Atop the driver's box, the bearded, dusty teamster furiously whipped the team pulling the Deadwood Stage. Next to him, the lanky "shotgun guard" faced to the rear. He aimed down the gleaming barrel of his trusty 1873 Winchester, from under the brim of a ten-gallon sombrero. "Boom, boom," the Winchester belched smoke again and again, at the pursuing party of fierce, whooping Indians. Just as it seemed the painted braves would overtake the hapless coach, a loud bugle call pierced the din. A squad of blue-coated troopers on powerful chestnut horses had appeared at a full-on gallop. The cavalry had arrived, just in the nick of time. At the head of this relief column was a tall figure with a goatee and steely eyes. He wearing white buckskins and riding a magnificent white stallion with a flowing mane and long tail. The feathered warriors that weren't gunned down in the army's fusillade turned and fled. As one, the audience rose cheering, stamping their feet, and clapping with a thunderous applause. Buffalo Bill Cody, last of the frontier scouts, Prince of the Plains, had arrived to save the day.

"Buffalo Bill" Cody was a genuine hero of the American West. Early on, however, he knew the West was changing. Cody loved the West, and wanted others to be able to experience it before it was all gone. He attempted to preserve and share his "Wild West" with the entire country and even the world. He did this through his "Wild West Shows." Buffalo Bill did more to propagate the image of the West than any other person of the times.

To understand Buffalo Bill and his wild west shows, you must consider the times. In the later part of

the nineteenth century, America was healing from a bloody civil war. The railroads had just spanned the continent. The cities of the East were overflowing with burgeoning masses. America was undergoing an industrial revolution. Immigrants flowed into the melting pot of North America. The tide of humanity was spreading west from the Mississippi River. Cody knew the West would soon disappear forever. Let us first take a brief look at the man and his own role in the West.

Buffalo Bill was born William Frederick Cody on February 26, 1845 in Scott County, Iowa. Bill was the fourth born of five girls and three boys in the family of Issac and Mary Cody. Following the death of Bill's older brother, Samuel, in a horseback riding accident while showing off to the girls at the local school yard in 1852, Cody's father Issac

decided to sell the farm and head for the Gold Rush in California. After encountering broke, disheartened ex-miners returning east on the trail, however, Issac moved the family to Kansas instead.

By the mid-1850's, Kansas and Missouri were hotbeds of pro- and anti-slavery conflict. Bill spent his formative years in this cauldron of violence and intrigue. In 1854, Bill's father was stabbed while giving an anti-slavery speech. He was secretly moved to his brother's house in Ohio to convalesce and to hide from the pro-slavery faction that was looking to finish him off. During this period Bill had to step in and become a man before his time. Bill carried messages between Kansas and Ohio for the family, and even had to use a double-barreled pistol to stand off a drunken man looking to kill his invalid father. His father never fully recovered, and finally died in 1857. Only 12 years old, Bill had to take the part of the man in the family.

In the fall of 1857, Bill took a job on a supply wagon train taking beef to the army units that were forming up to go to Utah and fight the Mormons. It was during this trip Bill reportedly killed his first man, an Indian, in a party attacking the group. At twelve years old, Cody was developing a taste for adventure. In 1860, Cody joined the fledgling Pony Express as a rider taking mail to California. Almost every trip was an adventure or a close scrape of some kind. At his mother's insistence, Cody finally quit and returned home.

In 1861, Cody joined the Union Army as a scout. In 1863, he was assigned as a spy behind Confederate lines. In 1865 when Cody demobilized, he became a stagecoach driver. By 1866, he saved some money, married Louisa Frederici, and opened a boarding house with her in St. Louis, Missouri. Cody tired of the inactivity, and rejoined the army as a scout on the frontier. While he used the boarding house as


a base, he scouted for George Armstrong Custer for several years.

This is the time when America began to expand westward almost exponentially. The Union Pacific Railroad pushed westward from Saint Louis to join the Central Pacific Railroad growing eastward from Sacramento, California. In 1869, the two railroads met at Promontory Point, Utah. The transcontinental railway was a reality. Railroads were beginning to crisscross the West. The huge construction crews required large amounts of fresh meat as they worked their way across the plains. In 1867, Cody went to work as a meat hunter for the Kansas Pacific Railroad, earning the princely sum of \$500 a month. During this period Cody earned the

nickname "Buffalo Bill Cody." It stemmed from a bet with Billy Comstock where Cody killed 69 Buffalo in one day, as opposed to Comstock's 43. In that one year, Cody is said to have killed 4,280 buffalo.

In 1869 Cody was again scouting for the Army. During this time, Cody first attained fame when Ed Judson (writing under the pen name of "Ned Buntline") published a dime novel about Cody called Buffalo Bill, King of the Border Men. This started a deluge of legends and stories about Cody. Cody continued his adventures with periods of scouting and hunting buffalo. In 1872, he took the Russian Grand Duke Alexis on a buffalo hunt. Alexis tried to kill a buffalo with a pistol, and it was only Cody's intervention of handing the Duke Cody's own rifle, and getting him within ten feet of the buffalo, that got Alexis the kill.

In 1872, Cody experienced the stage for the first time. He accompa-(Continued on next page)

nied Judson (Buntline) to a theatrical adaptation of a Judson Buffalo Bill story in New York. Cody was captivated and soon began his own presentations of "Scouts of the Plains" with fellow legends such as Wild Bill Hickok and Texas Jack Omohundro. It was thoroughly amateur and silly, but was well received. They traveled with "Scouts of the Plains" for several years, playing towns such as Saint Louis, Missouri and Rochester, New York. The play made incredible amounts of money.

In the 1870's, the West began to swell with the flow of humanity com-

ing from the East. The railroads had acquired 130 million acres of public land from the government as they built the transcontinental railroad system. This was sold to settlers to make towns and raise revenues for the railroads. In the last 30 years of the nineteenth century, Americans had spread over 430 million acres. In the short time between 1870 and 1900, agriculture had spread from 89 million acres to 225 million acres cultivated. Gold strikes like the one in Dakota's Black Hills region in 1874/1875 would cause even more people to go west. The Native American population of the Great Plains and Rocky Mountains numbered about 250,000 at this time. The Indians resented the displacement by the white tide. They had been warring with the encroaching white settlers all along.

Probably the most publicized battles of the era was the massacre of George Armstrong Custer and 264 men of his 7th Cavalry by Sioux and Cheyenne warriors at The Little Big Horn in May of 1876. Shortly after the Custer Battle Cody would temporarily leave his show, and begin his last scouting expedition for the Army. During this expedition with Colonel Westly Merrit, Cody and the cavalry pursued the Sioux in the area of War Bonnet Creek. On July 17th, 1876 Cody engaged in one-onone combat with the Sioux Chief Yellow Hand. When Cody Killed Yellow Hand, he scalped the chief and is said to have shouted, "The first scalp for Custer!"

After the expedition, Cody returned to the stage. Cody was now 31 years old. On his last expedition with the cavalry, he found the West was changing. Considering the success of dime novels about the West and Cody's stage play, people seemed to be hungry for the West. With the

## SASS Florida State Blackpowder Shootout



Makes you kinda'

want to think twice when complaining 'bout the size or distance of those pesky targets.


after they had shot a round or two, I heard a very excited, "I've never had the opportunity to do something like that!" It was just plain fun to see who got teamed up with whom.





CANCEL any monthly matches that conflict with the annual match of a nearby club! It is always appropriate to encourage one's members to attend annual matches in your area.

Most clubs do a good job of not scheduling their monthly matches in conflict with other local clubs, but this is not the case when it comes to scheduling annual matches. All too often, clubs within driving distance of one another will schedule their annual matches for the same weekend. How clever is that? The objective should not be to drive the other club to its knees, but to find a way for each to support the other. Even if the clubs are at opposite ends of the state (none of our guys would go all the way up there anyway), consideration for other annual matches should still be high on the agenda. Remember, there are those who live in between these two clubs that could attend both, but now must make a choice. Once again, that's not a good practice ... we all want the opportunity to attend as many "away" matches as possible.

When it comes to annual matches, there is a hierarchy. At

the top is the World Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup>, END of TRAIL, closely followed by the SASS National Championship, Winter Range. No one should schedule an annual match that conflicts with these matches; rather, one should encourage all your members to attend these major matches ... it's a fantastic experience, one not to be missed ... and you can't support these programs if you are running your own in competition.

The Regionals come next. The Regionals, the National, and the World Championship have negotiated their schedules so there are no conflicts. All State Championships should honor these shooting dates ... especially the states within each of the Regionals. It's not an appropriate practice to make your state cowboys have to make a choice between their State Championship match and their Regional.

It's also appropriate for all annual matches within each state to respect the date of their State Championship. Once again, don't make your local cowboys have to make a decision which to attend. Arrange your schedule so they can do both!

#### **New Clubs**

Additionally, new clubs are constantly being formed, and universally, they can use some help getting established. Older clubs can often offer advice as well as manpower to help create new ranges and cowboy organizations. Donating targets no longer being used by the older clubs can also offset necessary new club expenses. Helping another club become self-sustaining is the "cowboy way," and creating more shooting venues is beneficial for everyone.

#### Other Shooting Disciplines

Not only should cowboys support one another, it's vitally important to support other shooting disciplines as well. Who knows what the next administration will be like, but all shooters will need to stick together if any of us are going to keep our firearms. Organizations like NSSF are a huge help in establishing and keeping shooting ranges and, of course, the NRA

champion we could ever hope to have. All cowboys should be members of both!

#### Conclusion

As can be seen, we're a big family with lots of activities across the country. Even though it may sometimes seem so, none of us are ever playing this game alone. Monthly, annual, state, regional, national, and world championship schedules dictate which matches we each can attend. A little thought and consideration can provide more entertainment and opportunities to compete if we would simply stop stepping on each other's toes!






financial success of Cody's play, he now had money to buy a palatial estate in Rochester, New York.

Cody, however, wanted more. He missed the "old days" and filled up his house with his partners from the past. He knew the West would soon be gone; it was an era drawing to a close. Cody loved the West. He wanted to share that era with everyone through an expanded Wild West Show. He wanted it to create a grand pageant that would bring it alive. Cody's sister, Helen Cody Wetmore said it best. She said Cody wanted to present the public "the actual history of the West as it was lived for, fought for, and died for by Indians, pioneers, and soldiers."

His first "Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show" would debut in Omaha. Nebraska in 1883. It was an extravaganza of "real" cowboys, Indians, horses, buffalo, stagecoaches, wagons, teepees, and US Cavalry. The parade of the grand entrance was a spectacle. There were stagecoach robberies, trick riders, Indian battles, and herds of cattle and buffalo pursued around the arena. Between 1883 and 1886, Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show traveled most major cities in the United States.

The timing was perfect. During

the last twenty years of the Nineteenth Century, America was undergoing an industrial revolution. Immigration was swelling the eastern and mid-western cities to overflowing, overtaxing their infrastructures. Settlement houses like Jane Addams "Hull House" sought to improve the plight of the masses. The West probably seemed to be a magic place with clean air, bountiful game, huge mountains, and wild Indians. People by the tens of thousands would flock to see the Wild West Show. This experience was the closest most would ever get to the West. This experience was "The Wild West" to most people.

In March, 1886, Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show made its first trip to Europe. Cody took the entire show—cowboys, Indians, horses, buffalo, longhorns, and stagecoaches all on the chartered steamer, "State of Nebraska," to England. The show was a tremendous success and ran continuously in England for almost a year, closing on May 1, 1887. It had entertained Queen Victoria and many of the crown heads of Europe. Cody and the Wild West show returned triumphantly to the United States.

The show once again toured the major cities of the United States. It was a small village of about 600 hundred cowboys, Indians, and showmen moved by train and wagon from town to town. In subsequent years, the show took several more trips to Europe. The crowds at the performances were huge. Buffalo Bill Cody and his Wild West Show entertained under varying names until 1913. After about 1903, the show's business did, however, start to decline. Even after it closed down, Cody decided to use the new media of motion pictures to reach people. He formed the "Cody Historical Pictures Company" in 1913, but it was not a success. Finally, Cody toured with the Sells-Floto Circus as a headline attraction. In the end, however, Cody knew the time, his time, had past.

America was a changing place. The census of 1890 officially stated there was no longer a "frontier line." As historian Frederick Jackson Turner maintained in his "Frontier Thesis" in 1893, there was no more frontier, no more safety valve. The West was gone. Labor and big business were battling each other with heated strikes such as the Pullman and Homestead Steel strikes. Women were fighting the continuing battle for the vote. America was expanding overseas into the Pacific and Asia. Teddy Roosevelt was attacking big business and big trusts. It was a different world. Cody's sister, Helen Cody Wetmore, said it all, "The story of the frontier is a tale that is told. The Wild West has vanished like a mist in the sun before the touch of two great magicians of the nineteenth centurysteam and electricity."

William Frederick Cody died on January 10th, 1917. The headlines of his death wiped away the usual headlines of the war in Europe. Buffalo Bill Cody was buried in Lookout Mountain, Colorado under a bronze statue of himself atop his horse Buckskin Charlie, depicting him in the prime of his life. He had now faded into the mists of history just as his beloved Wild West had.

There is no way to measure how many hundreds of thousands, or even how many millions of people Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show touched. For the last fifty years of his life he was a legend, synonymous with the Wild West. Still today, there is probably not a school age child that doesn't at least know something about Buffalo Bill Cody. Even though the legend of his life grew beyond its reality, the real deeds of his life are still truly amazing. He achieved his goal to spread the image of the West, at least as he saw it, to the entire country, and even the entire world. It is likely he reached more people with this image in his 50 years of showmanship, than any other single person. While it may not have been historically objective by today's standards, it offered a glimpse of a life and times the spectators would never know first hand.

In my mind's eye, Buffalo Bill still rides across the vast, rolling, grassy plains on Charlie. His goatee is protruding from his leathery suntanned chin, a broad-brimmed felt sombrero is perched jauntily atop his head of long blonde hair, his fringed buckskins are stained and dusty, and his favorite .50 caliber buffalo rifle "Lucretia Borgia" is cradled in the crook of his arm. Adios, Buffalo Bill!







#### **HISTORY**

ACSA was started in 1981 by a group of 15 shooters, many from the Fast Draw discipline, who had heard about Cowboy Action Shooting  $^{\text{TM}}$  and decided to give it a try. They already had cowboy guns and liked the concept of shooting them in the style of Roy and Hoppy ... as well as the outlaws and law dogs of the Old West.

Their first range was in the desert on State Trust Land behind the ranch house of one of their members, Jim Martin, who lived off Carefree Highway, not far from the Ben Avery Shooting Facility. Ready access to sheet steel made the job of building reactive targets a lot easier, and a lot cheaper, than finding and buying targets from the few steel target makers in those early days.

In 1985 the Club moved its shooting range to a more "cowboy-(Continued on next page)

oriented" site ... the western town movie set of Cowtown. This setting was constructed by cowboy movie stuntman, Ron Nix, who built it as a venue for shooting movies and TV commercials, and for live action western reenactments and rodeos for facilities at Cowtown until 1995 when it moved to Ben Avery, the site of Winter Range, SASS' National Championship Match. At that time a group of members spun off the Cowtown Cowboy Shooters Assn., which continues to use the Cowtown



With all its activities, it's not surprising that ACSA has developed some fine shooters through the Several World Category Champs have come from the Club, among them current World Overall Champ, Chuckwalla Kid, SASS A flock of National #56565. Category Champs call ACSA home.

A serious chunk of these shooters' successes can be claimed by several name brand Action Job Specialists in the Club, including Bob James (Arizona Thumber, SASS #319), Palo Verde, SASS #56522, Sheriff Bill Murphy, SASS Life #43990, and Johnny Meadows, SASS #28485. And, a lot of Club members get their shooting skills honed at fellow member Rattler John's, SASS #5290, Shooting School.

As noted in the January 1988 Cowboy Chronicle (Volume 1), ACSA hosted the very first SASS-sanctioned Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> match. It was the Southwestern Cowboy Shooting Championships held at the Cowtown Range in September 1987.
