heyenne, Wyoming - The very name conjures up images of the Old West. Wyoming is a very big state with very few people in it. It has only 500,000 people in the entire state, but about twice as many antelope. A lady at Fort Laramie told me Cheyenne was nice "if you like big cities." Cheyenne has 55,000 people. A considerable amount of history happened in Wyoming. For example, Fort Laramie was the resupply point for travelers going west, settlers, and the army fighting the Indian wars. On the far west side of the state, Buffalo Bill built his dream town in Cody, Wyoming.

Cheyenne, in a way, really got its start when the South seceded from the nation. Then, without southern hindrance, the faction that wanted a northern route for the railroads won. President Lincoln signed the Pacific Railroad Act in 1862 and construction began on a railroad between Omaha, Nebraska, and Sacramento, California. As the railroad went west, a curious phenomenon ensued—the Hell on Wheels towns. Entrepreneurs, con-men, business

men, saloon keepers, and, of course, madams and soiled doves started supplying the wants and needs of the railroad workers as they advanced. Since they were constantly moving, these establishments had to move, too. Some were tents, some were

wagons, and some were buildings easily taken down, transported on wagons, and put back up. The term "Red Light District" may have gotten its start here due to railroad men's lights hung outside the ladies' tents.

In 1867, General Grenville Dodge,

chief surveyor for the Union Pacific Railroad, surveyed a town site at what would become Cheyenne, Wyoming. He called it Cow Creek Crossing. His friends, however, thought it would sound better as Cheyenne. Within days, speculators had bought lots for a \$150 and sold them for \$1500, and Hell on Wheels came over from Julesburg, Coloradothe previous Hell on Wheels town. Soon, Cheyenne had a government, but not much law. A vigilance committee was formed and banishments, even lynchings, tamed the lawlessness of the town to some extent.

The railroad was always the central point of Cheyenne. The Union Pacific build a large shop in 1886, and the depot in the center of town was, and is, a magnificent structure. Long trains with two or three diesel engines at each end still run through and near Cheyenne, but a lot more Old West history occurred there. Alfred Packer, the only American ever convicted of cannibalism (though the official charge was murder since cannibalism was not a crime), was apprehended north of Fort Laramie and was taken to jail in Cheyenne, March 11, 1883. Cheyenne is where Tom Horn confessed. You can still see the office where that happened, and Chevenne is where he was tried, escaped, and was recaptured (because he couldn't (Continued on page 70)



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


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

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

We started talking about hockey players and other general sportsmen, and how by the time you hit your thirties you were done in the professional sports arena. We all agreed it was just impossible to keep up with those

Proposal Summary

- Traditional and Modern categories to be COMBINED (not eliminated).
- An age break at 35 and up is added, creating two age-based categories 17 and UP and 35 and UP.
- All the age based categories, as is currently the case with 49er and above, are allowed to use modern or traditional revolvers, one or two-handed shooting styles, and any propellant, and the competitor can be either gender.
- Names of the new categories are yet to be determined.
- Net sum gain of categories is "Zero."
- This change also applies to the protected Lady Modern and Lady Traditional categories.

Possible Amendments

- Should we also allow the use of the Gunfighter style in all age-based categories?
- Should we allow the use of the Gunfighter style only in the 17 and up category, making it truly an "open" category?

Thave been working with folks in Europe to promote Single Action Shooting Society (SASS) membership in Europe. Three years ago I attended Days of Truth near Prague in the Czech Republic. This was a great shoot organized by Thunder Man, SASS #29821. Many European countries were represented, and a few American SASS members attended.

Last year Days of Truth was held in the north of Italy near Brescia. Brescia is the area where almost all the arms manufacturing companies are located. This event was organized by Alchimista, SASS #41531, and Master Rino, SASS #5745. Alchimista is a principal of Pietta Firearms Company, and Master Rino is the owner of Chiappa Firearms Company. Like Thunderman, both have attended END of TRAIL on several occasions and were also able to produce a great European Championship Event.

Early this year I started working very closely with Alchimista and Master Rino and their fellow shoot-

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

ing the opportunity to experience and enjoy some hands-on training in a few of the basic skills reminiscent of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. In addition to more than 100 exhibitors the highlighted SASS and Centennial Ball, we are offering a total of six Old West arts classes. Three classes will be offered two times each to give you a chance to attend and participate. The first class will feature Fancy Gun Handling, the second will feature rope spinning, and the third will focus on the stunt show.

Fancy Gun Handling

Historically this was referred to as gun spinning; however, with the introduction of flips, border shifts, and juggling maneuvers, it is now more commonly known as fancy gun handling. Hot Shot Johnny Mincks will lead this class with assistance from Buck Montgomery and Thomi Hawk. Johnny is a champion entertainer and fancy gun handler who entertained us this past year at END of TRAIL. Johnny will also spend some time explaining and teaching the use of the bullwhip, a very practical and useful tool of the cowboy. Thomi travels the US entertaining crowds with knives, tomahawks, bullwhips, fancy gun handling, and trick shooting. Each attendee should have a good understanding of quite a few spins and tosses, the safe and proper way to practice, and the safety guidance needed to be successful.

Rope Spinning

This skill was first perfected and promoted by Will Rogers, and we are very fortunate to have Kowboy Kal, one of the nicest and most accomplished entertainers of today, lead this class. Kalvin Cook, Kowboy Kal, hails from Apache, Oklahoma and still lives on the spread his grandfather homesteaded. In fact, Kal learned the ropes from his grandfather, Evert Cook. While working at a fish hatchery, Kalvin practiced rope tricks after earning a Bachelor's Degree in Natural Science from Panhandle State University. He studied the films and books of Will Rogers, the legendary writer, humorist, and cowboy, and dreamed of becoming an entertainer in Roger's manner, which clearly he has! At the conclusion of the seminar, each cowboy and cowgirl will, at a minimum, be able to execute and maintain a flat spin.

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COSTUME CONTEST RULES FOR THE * 7TH ANNUAL SASS CONVENTION *>

The SASS Convention and Costume Contests are just around the corner; in fact, they take place next month. Hopefully, a few changes to this year's costume rules will make it easier for more contestants to participate.

First, the Saloon Night Costume Contests featuring the categories of Classic Cowboy and Cowgirl and B-Western will remain essentially the same, except for the expansion of B-Western to include Silver Screen. Somehow, Silver Screen disappeared and many folks have asked to have it re-appear.

Saloon Night contestants do not have to pre-register. Just show up Thursday, December 4th by 7:30 PM at the Top of the Riv Ballroom, sign in, and present your duds to our panel of judges. Awards from first to third place will be given that evening during a break in the music. Again, categories are Classic Cowboy, Classic Cowgirl, B-Western/Silver Screen Male, and B-Western/Silver Screen Female.

The big rule change occurs in the Best Dressed Costume Contest held on Saturday night, December 6th. You DO NOT HAVE TO PREREGISTER to enter the Best Dressed Contest. Disregard the information in the Chronicle Convention ad concerning preregistration and entry forms. Just show up in your finest at 5:00 PM at the Top of the Riv Ballroom, sign in, and present your finery to our panel of judges. Best Dressed categories are Men, Ladies, Couples,

and Military. Centennial costumes will be judged within those categories also. Awards, from first to third place, will be given during a break in the Centennial Ball festivities later that evening.

The SASS Convention brings out the utmost in costuming; it's the SASS Social Event of the year. And now, we've made it easier than ever to enter the costume contests. Don't be shy. Show off those fabulous outfits!

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
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
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

Also, Dixie Bell's seminar at the '08 Convention "So You Are Afraid to Enter the Costume Contest" would be most beneficial for first time costume contest entrants...Cat)

irst of all - this is supposed to be fun! Just like in the shooting aspect of SASS, the first priority is about having a good time. Some people just happen to feel taking first place adds a lot to that good time! But for most of us, scoring high is great, but it's more about the friends we make, what we learn from each other, and the fun and adventure of the moment.

You know, sometimes it's not always the flashiest, or most authentic, or most expensive or impressive costume that takes first place in the contest. So, if you've been wondering what really is going on in the heads of the costume judges, here's a few tips.

THE CONTEST:

Most costume competitions are divided into several entry categories such as Working Outfits, Best Dressed Couple, Evening Dress, Military, B-Western, etc. The specific categories available to enter will vary. Most events will have one person who heads up the costume committee, often made up of 2-6 handpicked judges. Desirably, each judge will have a good working knowledge of one or more of the specific categories, be a past winner with much personal experience, or even be an occasional "wild card" judge thrown in for balance.

While some events do a "roaming judge" system, where the judges wander about and make their own selections, more and more events are

ENTERING THE COSTUME CONTEST

(Or, How to Impress the Costume Judges!)

establishing a set time and place when all interested parties may present themselves to the panel of judges for consideration.

THE JUDGING:

Many of the contest judges have adopted the system established by Cat Ballou, where each contestant is judged in four categories: Originality, Authenticity, Detail, and Presentation. Each category earns you points toward the total score, so paying attention to all four can really make or break your chances.

Originality:

You can have the most beautiful ball gown or classy men's outfit in the world, but if you're up against 15 other beautiful, classy outfits, what makes yours special? This is where being original can make or break your odds. Advice: if you're going to represent a historical character, research the character thoroughly, not relying only on what you've seen portrayed on TV or in Hollywood. This category often works closely with presentation.

Authenticity:

This category is judged on the general construction, look, silhouette, style, and materials used in the outfit. Success in authenticity is best achieved through reading books and doing lots of research. Something like having the correct footwear can edge you up in the scores. Another example: if you want to represent a Native American, an outfit made with the leather roughside out would be more correct for a historic look, while an outfit made with the leather smooth-side out would have been more commonly seen in B-Western movies. Tip: don't just say your pretty dress is Victorian, as that title can cover from 1837-1901! Instead, narrow down the year your gown represents, or why you might still be wearing a style that is several years out-of-date (for example, it might have been your wedding gown in 1864, and even though it's now 1877, it may still be the best dress you own, because you live in the wild frontier).

Detail:

This category showcases all those little things that set you apart from everyone else, like having the appropriate accessories and knowing their usage. Explain the reasons for your details. Whether you wear your pants tucked in or not, the proper pocket watch or cigar, the add-ons, the way you style or comb your hair, false teeth, what you carry in your pocket or reticule—basically the "above and beyond." Examples: Two gents in identical suits - one has added spats because he's attending a fancy affair. Two military men - one has polished boots, but the one that doesn't has a good story to explain why (perhaps it was raining and muddy when he got off his horse just prior to entering the building).

Presentation:

In most costume contests, you are given the opportunity to briefly say something.

Depending on the number of people who register for the contest, the costume committee may need to limit the amount of time each contestant has to present their outfit (we all like to get to dinner, you know!). There is no need to think this must be a theatrical performance. It is simply your opportunity to tell why you are wearing what you are wearing based on who your character is—to show you "know your stuff." You might wish to explain who your SASS persona is, and why you are dressed this way. Being "in character" is not required, but it doesn't hurt. Some contestants have

even been known to give historic photos to the judges of the character they are representing, wearing the outfit they have replicated. Tell a little story, if you wish. It's very possible that a person with a less impressive outfit, but a great presentation can out-score something flashier but weakly presented.

TIPS:

To increase your odds of winning and also make for a better competition, consider entering a category that isn't as popular (almost everyone wants to enter in Evening Dress!) But choose carefully. Some flashy outfits would sweep the B-Western category, but would not score as well against authentically recreated garments.

A fellow judge once awarded a man the winner because he "smelled right." While this may not be literal, it does sum up the way some contestants are able to pull all of the pieces together, making sure the ensemble (and their attitude!) works as a whole. It's better not to wear a 1910 hat, for example, if you're claiming the year is 1875. Personal tip: if you're posing as an elegant lady, please don't show the judges your drawers—no proper lady would have done so!

WHAT THIS IS NOT:

This is not a history contest. Knowing details about your character, the authenticity of the fabric you selected, or any historical information will definitely help in your presentation, but the judges don't expect or even want a four-volume encyclopedic account of why you chose to use a particular button. Very few SASS members are museum curators. However, read some books - a little research can go a long way.

This is not a sewing contest. We (Continued on next page)



highly admire the skill and multiple hours many of you devote to the fine details of your costume, and there's no harm in mentioning if you made your own outfit, but there's nothing wrong with having someone else do the sewing for you. Historically, almost anyone who could afford to would hire a seamstress, and certain period catalogues offered readymade clothing, as well.

This is not a popularity contest! Usually repeat winners have learned from trial and error. By now they know how to research not only their costume, but have developed a great presentation that really showcases their character and more importantly, why they are wearing their specific outfit.

IN CONCLUSION:

If you're new at all this, enter anyway! If you've got a zip-up prom dress made over to be a saloon girl outfit, and you want to enter the costume contest, go for it! Consider entering the B-Western category with a good story. This is about fun, not competition. Beginners are always welcome, so start with what you have.

Once again, the biggest tips: do your research, tell a good story, and select your category wisely. Remember, the judges fully understand how nervous many of you may be, but they really do want you to enjoy yourselves. Of course, each contest does come down to the personal impression of each judge instead of hard scores like targets hit or seconds saved, so if your outfit doesn't do as well as you'd hoped, don't take it personally. Try it again at the next event, and remember that some (though not all) judges will be happy to answer questions on their opinion of your outfit, if approached in a friendly manner. If it's really something important to you, continue your research, and keep honing your character and presentation. Above all, have a great time with it - we're all family here!

This year our Friday "Evening With ..." series continues with "How The West Really Was." This year ask questions of our panel that includes

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
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

If you are shooting a local match, you don't have to travel, and you are familiar with the location, stages, people, props ... you just name it.



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OUTRANKED!

I read with great interest Chuckaroo's article on shooting with 'Gunny' R. Lee Ermey for the History Channel. To me it was especially ironic because my interest in cowboy guns came directly from being around Ermey shooting sixguns with Phil Spangenberger on the set of 'Mail Call' in 2005.

In August of that year, I was flown down to LA to be a on-air guest on the show, talking about WW-II cartoonist Bill Mauldin. My segment was completed very early in the day, and I was invited to hang around the set until I had to head back to the airport that afternoon. Also scheduled for the day was a segment on cowboy guns with Phil and collector Al Frisch. Al brought one of John Wayne's documented screenused SAAs from the former Stembridge collection. 

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

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

The words of a concerned Thomas Jefferson ushered America onto a historically unique frontier of freedom. Similar concerns face many of today's patriots regarding freedom and unity that faced the patriots of

yesterday. We know how our colonial past unfolded, but what about our future?

I'm seeing more and more examples of less and less common ground among Americans, and it concerns me greatly. There's a schism that is widening into a chasm as we lose our national identity and align ourselves with a variety of splinter groups, cultures, and philosophies.

When many of us were kids, Americans seemed to share a sense of traditional values much more so than they do now. We appeared to have been more aware of what the American culture was and could more easily describe it or at least know it when we saw it and identify ourselves with it. God and guns were not looked upon as political lep-

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rosy, the Founding Fathers were not vilified as former slave holders deserving of no respect, and the Constitution was revered as the foundation of our freedoms, rather than a challenge for politicians to circumvent and ignore ... and we were just Americans, no in-your-face use of hyphenations that I remember. Today we seem to have lost that melting pot look and are now more like a mosaic of sub-cultures that feel a need for a hyphenated identity.

We're losing our sense of national unity that was America's unifying force or national glue that came from sharing a set of traditional cultural values. The glue that keeps any country unified boils down to a very few important ingredients ... a common language, secure borders, a

shared set of traditional values upon which the country was originally based, and a sense of identity with a culture that sets its people apart from the rest of the world. In order for any group of people to remain united, they must share a common set of values they incorporate into their lives as their own and pass along to their children. History has shown when those characteristics are lost, the country soon comes unglued.

It seems to me we are now coming unglued and polarizing into two major camps whose philosophies will never reach consensus because their fundamental values are mutually exclusive. Can such divergent philosophies ever coexist in one (Continued on page 28)

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

country and under one government? The differences between the two philosophies are stark and becoming more entrenched as attitudes harden. The most basic differences are that traditionalists believe in selfreliance, self-determination, and personal freedom, while modern liberals believe in government reliance, government control, and very limited personal freedom ... for the masses.

Reviewing some concepts of the opposing philosophies, traditionalists generally believe in the former, while modern liberals generally believe in the latter: Individual freedom versus societal control; Small government versus big government; Independence versus dependence; Self-reliance and personal responsibility vs. government reliance and "shared" responsibility; Freedom of religion versus freedom from religion; Equal opportunity versus equal outcome; Private property versus public property; National sovereignty versus world government; States rights versus federal rights; The money you earn is yours versus the money you earn is ours; "Shall not be infringed" pertains to the right to keep and bear arms versus pertaining to political ambition.

This country is becoming so divided in basic values and polarized in philosophy I can see no clear path to a reconciliation of these two opposing camps.

Continued coexistence would require not compromise, but submission because this confrontation involves diametrically opposed principles ... and I don't cotton to compromising principles. As I've said, compromise of principle is no compromise—it's surrender, and traditionalists are unwilling to surrender their principles.

... in matters of principle, stand like a rock." ~ Thomas Jefferson ~

These attacks on our Constitutional principles are clearly an attack on the country because it seeks to obliterate many of those principles and goes against the very foundation upon which we've built our lives. I sense dark clouds forming on America's horizon regarding philosophical unification versus separation, and it shouldn't surprise anyone. We faced separation issues in the 18th and 19th centuries, so why should the 21st be much different? I believe those causes that impel separation to which Jefferson referred are being unmistakably declared everyday by these opposing ideological camps, and some form of separation is becoming more of a possibility than it has been in 150 years. How this will play out is still TBD, but my faith in loval Americans remains unshaken.

I strongly suspect that if this divisive trend continues, the day will come when patriots rise up in great numbers, standing united and strong against modern liberalism and vehemently reaffirm their traditional principles for all to hear:

"For those who choose to live in a country wherein the state is dominant over the individual and government control replaces individual freedom, that's your choice, and we'll respect your right to that choice, but don't try to fit us into that mold nor force that same choice on any of us. As we respect your right to choose your way, we demand you accord those of us who choose otherwise the same respect in our right to live a life of freedom bestowed by God and guaranteed by our Constitution.

We refuse to accept your philosophy that leads to the loss of liberty. While we refuse to live under a system based on government domination, we'll respect the choice of those who willingly surrender that liberty in search of security. To us, however, such a life goes against the Creator's vision for mankind and the principles of freedom upon which America was founded. We choose to follow the Founder's vision, which we believe was divinely inspired, and not by your vision that inspires authoritarians.

Let there then be no misunderstanding. We will never surrender the rights bestowed on us by our Creator that the Constitution of our Forefathers forbids government to negate. Our Constitution still governs this land despite liberalism's best efforts to undermine it, and we refuse to apologize for our beliefs that have their roots firmly based on a set of values that your philosophy does not accept.

Let us then go our separate ways, and do so peacefully, as we see no possible reconciliation of two such divergent and mutually exclusive philosophies. If you persist in refusing to recognize our right to choose and continue to harbor thoughts of coercion through ever increasing levels of government regulation, then many may see no alternative but to impel separation."

People who revere freedom over submission will not allow themselves to be dominated by anyone, and their resolve will not waiver. As George Washington affirmed during their time of trial, "The spirit of freedom beats too high in us to submit' I'm convinced, traditionalists will therefore continue to soldier on the path pioneered by our Forefathers and choose to live as did they-free!"

In y grandpa was born in 1888. On the back porch of his house hung an old thermometer on a tin base, painted in a faded but nonetheless gaudy yellow and red, advertising Arbuckle's Coffee. Arbuckle didn't mean anything to me then, but it was a most familiar name because we would go out and check that thermometer most mornings and evenings during the winter. And while I never had a cup of Arbuckle's Coffee, I knew the day had to start with a cup of hot coffee. I was a confirmed coffee drinker by the time I was six, and dimly understood the morning coffee consumed

before we ate breakfast had something of a ceremonial aspect to it.

Grandma and grandpa drank their coffee from a saucer. They could pour from their cups and never spill a drop, never have coffee run down the sides of their cups. It was a skill I never mastered. But the important thing to me was I was a part of the ceremony along with all the rest of the family gathered around the kitchen table. It was a good time, a warm time. And though it was also hard times, I think everybody drew a measure of comfort from sharing that morning coffee.

But, all that was about to change. One of my strongest childhood memories is of the whole family—uncles, aunts, cousins, all sitting around that big kitchen table silently drinking coffee into the night as we listened to the radio bearing the reports of the Japanese attack on

Pearl Harbor. I was only seven, but I knew the world had just changed forever for all of us.

When Grandpa died in 1982, I removed the old Arbuckle's thermometer from the back porch where it had hung throughout my life, and most of his, and took it home with me. It was now dull and badly faded and covered with a patina of rust. And, though I did not come to appreciate Arbuckle's Coffee as one of the enduring symbols of the Old West until much later, the Arbuckle's thermometer was a symbol of the many times during the war when grandpa, grandma, and I would sit at the big table alone and drink our coffee and wonder and worry about the boys in the family who were scattered to France, the Pacific, and the high seas. We would learn in due time that one had been strafed by a Zero in the Aleutians

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and had taken three bullets; one had floated wounded for two days in the Coral Sea when his destroyer went down; and one was in a German POW camp where he lost his toes to frostbite.

Though scarred and broken, two of the boys came home, and by my 12th birthday they joined us once again drinking coffee at the kitchen table. But, it wasn't the same anymore. The lights may have come on again all over the world, but at our house it stayed dark for a long time.

Today, as I drink my morning coffee, I realize in a great many homes across this country there are families once again taking what comfort they can from their morning cup while they worry and wonder and pray for their missing loved ones in harm's way just as we did when I was a boy. And, my heart is with them today, just as it was back then.

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
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

at getting guns shot out of their hands. They rode fast, but never fast enough to escape The Hero who always rode them down, jumped them off their horses, and beat the


daylights out of them before turning them over to The Law.

If it hadn't been for a writer

at Republic Pictures, we might have been cheering on crusty old *George* Hayes on Saturday afternoons rather than our favorite B-Movie Sidekick, "Gabby" Hayes!

> It seems that a good-looking, somewhat sophisticated, articulate stage actor named George Hayes was trying to make the scene in Hollywood during the 1930's, playing any number of roles (even some Westerns-which he kinda disliked) when he met a Producer at Paramount Studios who had seen him in a couple low-budget flicks. (Continued on next page)





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












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The Producer said if George kept the beard he'd grown for a recent part, Paramount would cast him as Hopalong Cassidy's Sidekick, Windy Halliday, replacing Fuzzy St. John, who had taken ill, in the very first Hoppy movie.

Hayes took the part and made film history as one of the most cantankerous, word-slurring old codgers ever to come out of Hollywood.

Now, when Hayes later balked at Paramount's salary offer for another series of Hoppy pictures, they showed him the door ... and told him he could not use the name "Windy" any longer since it belonged to the studio.

About this same time, the big poobahs at Republic Pictures were looking for a Sidekick for a rising new Cowboy Star, Roy Rogers. One of Republic's writers commented that the character Hayes was about to play was a "real gabby guy" – and the rest, as they say, is History! George Hayes became "Gabby" Hayes ... and stayed that way for the rest of his life!

A curious thing about Gabby was his early start in "professional" life. At 17 he played semi-pro baseball while still in high school. Later, he ran away from home to pursue an acting career, mostly with touring stock groups, and as a song and dance man in vaudeville. He even spent some time with the circus ... as a trapeze artist!

Then movie bit parts led to his role in 174 Westerns as second banana to

movie greats John Wayne, William Boyd, Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, Randolph Scott, and Wild Bill Elliot.

His toothless, bewhiskered movie persona, spouting such colorful phrases as "Why, you goldurned whippersnapper" and "consarn it" and the infamous "yer durn tootin', Roy" made him the grumpy-grampa hero to millions of popcorn-munching kids every Saturday afternoon for more than a decade. In fact, Gabby was such a matinee draw he was listed by Boxoffice Magazine in its Top Ten Money-Making Western Stars for twelve years in a row!

Following his movie career, Gabby decided to work his magic as host of his own TV Show, *The Gabby Hayes Show*, in which he introduced a herd of his favorite old and new Westerns to another generation of Cowboy fans.

Gabby kept it rolling for another five years before he decided to retire in 1957 to manage his extensive investments ... including a 10-unit apartment building he owned in North Hollywood.

Gabby passed on to that Big Trail in the Sky in 1969 at the ripe old age of 83, but you can still "visit" him at his TWO Stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, or at his very simple headstone in Forest Lawn Cemetery in Hollywood Hills, CA. I know he'd enjoy sharing a chat with a fellow Cowboy.

THE OTHER BULLET: Re-enactors Review &

The re-enactment group, Gold Pike's Peak gold regions and Colorado Springs home. After gold was discovered in Colorado in 1858, fortune seekers flooded to that portion of the Front Range, loosely referred to as the Pike's Peak gold region. Most came to dig for the valuable metal; others came to make profits off the diggers. When gold was found in South Park in 1859, the town of Colorado City sprang up on Fountain Creek. While few found their fortunes in the diggings, many discovered they could make a living there. Various crops could be grown along stream valleys, and the native Grama and Buffalo grasses were ideal for ranching. The arrival of the railroad in Colorado Territory in 1870 gave these settlers access to distant markets. It also brought more fortune seekers, homesteaders, and a spurt of town building along the tracks. Chatting with Nighthawk Hartley, the editor of the monthly newsletter for the Gold Canyon Gunfighters, related the following account of this re-enactment gunfighter club, who represents that area rich in western history from the era of 1865 to 1900.

The Gold Canyon Gunfighters club was formed in 1968 to entertain and educate the public on the era they represented and to have fun doing it. They feel they can entertain and slip folks a little history when they're not looking, by putting some historic material in the introductions to the skits and in the skits themselves. "We are hopefully giving the young people in the audience a look into the days of the early west."

SASS members of the club shoot at various clubs such as Shaketails in Ramah, Colorado and at the M lazy C in Lake George, Colorado, as well as several other clubs. They have approximately 50 members, and about 30 participate on a regular basis. Their policy is a member's responsibility is to God, his or her family, his or her job, and then to the club. Their oldest member recently

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passed away at 90. The youngest performer is 5. The lady performers portray cowgirls, madams, saloon girls, schoolmarms, farmer's wives, or anything they can come up with. Many of them are excellent gun handlers and are highlighted in numerous performances. Three years ago they competed in a reenactment competition in Cripple Creek, and won the major prizes for amateur groups, plus one of their ladies won the award as Best Female Performer. Officers are elected annually, and gun safety is taught to all their members, with a brief gun safety talk and demonstration before each performance for the audience. They actually wrote into the by-laws specifications that no one in the group would EVER shoot in the direction of the audience; NEVER point a gun directly at anyone (they practice shooting either to the side or over each other), and keep at least 15 feet

distance between shooters.

Although the Gold Canyon Gunfighters do consider them-

Gunfighters do consider themselves to be a performing group, the shows are not actually reenactments of historic events. They specialize in comedy based on the Old West. They have about 50 skits and maintain regular practice sessions that are often held (without guns) at a city park, drawing audiences, even for practices. Various members have written scripts, although they may not follow the dialogue precisely. There have been several instances where having forgotten the line, a member improvised, and the result was better than the original line. In these cases, they start using the improvisation instead of the original line.

They meet at the Fountain Colorado Senior Center to travel together to their performances, since most of their members are from the Colorado Springs area and perform anywhere within reasonable driving distance from that location. Usually the town (Gold Canyon City), fake dynamite, period handcuffs, and various types of special costumes go with them. They perform annually at Territory Days in Old Colorado City (a suburb of Colorado Springs). Territory Days commemorates Old Colorado City as the first capitol of the Colorado Territory in 1861. It has grown from a small neighborhood craft fair, parade, and barbeque into a threeday street festival hosting over 180 craft, commercial, and food booths. Between 80,000 and 140,000 guests, (depending on the weather), enjoy this event every Memorial weekend. Other annual events include the El Paso County Fair in Calhan Colorado, Gold Rush Days in Buena Vista, Colorado, The Relay for Life, and the Relay for Life Jail and Bail, as well as several venues that come up during the year. The Relay for Life supports Cancer research. They are always willing to perform for charity events and anyone is welcome to come and watch, including other gunfighter clubs.

Dues are \$25 a year per family, including husband, wife, and dependent children under the age of 18. Since they are a non-profit group, their members are not paid; however, they charge the organization requesting their services. All the money goes toward reloading supplies and liability insurance. Often, they have surplus money at the end of the year, which is donated to charities. They also have bought a sound system and are adding and upgrading components for it. Last year they offered the opportunity for ten members to become Life members for \$450 each. This money was used to create buildings of a simulated western town to use as a backdrop.

The town, Gold Canyon City, is newly completed, and they are very proud of it. It's built of 1- 1/2" square steel tubing welded together to form a frame, and then covered with 1/4" plywood. The plywood is painted to resemble various town buildings. Each building is free standing and roughly eight feet across the front and

six feet deep. In order to not have to carry bulky sandbags for stability in the stiff winds of the region, they use five gallon buckets filled with water in the corners of the buildings as ballast. The walls have two sets of flat steel loops similar to hinges on the edges.

These mesh with each other and large nails are dropped through the mating sets to hold them together. They are all uniform so that, if need be, they can mix and match the walls of the various buildings. The covered chuck wagon, made from an old horse trailer, is used to stack and haul the town when it comes apart and to tie off the safety lines. The chuck wagon /trailer and town are stored on a member's property. An enclosed trailer serves as their sound booth and is assigned telegraph office status. It usually sits in the approximate center of the town.

"Nighthawk, tell me about a performance which stands out in your mind."

"We have a skit called **The Kid** in which a bad apple known only as The Kid is captured and brought into town by the Marshal and two deputies. The Kid is between two deputies, and the marshal is in front of them. The townspeople, seeing the posse, want to lynch the Kid and get into an argument with the Marshal about it. At this point, The Kid is supposed to break free of the deputies, grab the shotgun, shoot the deputies, and run. Instead, the performer portraying The Kid, after shooting the deputies, ran up to the Marshal, handed him the empty shotgun and yelled, "The Kid's getting away." The marshal just stood there with his mouth hanging open while The Kid ran away. The Marshal then got his wits back and finished the skit in spite of all of us laughing hard enough to nearly choke. This is one of the things we adopted into the skit."

"Sounds like you have fun doing what you do. What else did you want to tell me about your group?"



"We like to visit historic sites in costume, and have visited South Park City in Fairplay, Colorado, Old Town in Burlington, Colorado, and the Strater Hotel, in Durango Colorado. We also rode the Durango to Silverton Narrow gauge railroad, and the stagecoach ride in Mancos, Colorado. These are not official club performance events, but we just get together and do them. It's great fun! When we went to Old Town, which is a museum containing old and reproduction Old West buildings, I called ahead, as always, to let them know we were coming and that our costumes included guns. (By the way, I have yet to have anyone object to the guns). Old Town Museum, is a 6-1/2 acre historical complex with 21 buildings restored with authentic artifacts from the turn-of-the-century. Old Town depicts "life in the past lane" by turning back the hands of time in rural America. When I spoke to the lady at Old Town, she asked if we are the group that does gunfights at the County Fair. I said we are. Then, she kind of giggled and asked if we would do a show for them. Since we're always willing to shoot at each other, I agreed. As it turns out, we did four shows for them that day. It was a blast!! We would also love to be able to perform at the halftime of the Pikes Peak or Bust Rodeo in Colorado Springs someday."

Mancos Valley Stage Line

actually learned something from the SASS Wire. (What a concept!) I was reading a thread about stagecoaches, and someone posted a link to Mancos Valley Stage Coach's website offering a real live stagecoach ride in southwestern Colorado. "Hmm, we're in southwestern Colorado. Where's Mancos?" Oh, 17 miles from the Cortez KOA where we would be parked until after the Colorado State Championship. They offer one-hour tours, and 2-1/2 hour lunch or dinner tours in Weber Canyon. We signed up for a lunch tour. I dressed in full SASS regalia. The Redhead dressed as The Redhead. When we showed up and the owner, Eric Bartels, saw me, he said, "Hey, look at you! You look just right! You'd be right at home in this in 1880."

We learned quickly that Eric has been doing this since 1993. He and his father bought the land then. They had been playing with coaches as a hobby, buying and selling wagons and coaches, and training hors-

es. His family owns a chain of hamburger restaurants in northern California. They now can run five coaches simultaneously in case a tour bus comes through. They have contracts with several tour bus companies. Their route spends a little time on a county unpaved road, but most of it on a more authentic 1880's trail on their land and on adjacent land they've leased until they can get the entire course on their property. Thus, you won't be meeting an authentic Old West 1956 Chevy pickup truck. Eric has an encyclopedic knowledge of stagecoaches, rattling off several makers' names.

The coach seen in most westerns is the Concord. This was a patented design, and the same company built all Concord coaches. The Butterfield Stage route used Concords. They were not the best coaches for the rough trails of the mountainous areas of the west. The best coach for the rough trails of the west was the mud coach, made by several manufacturers and varying in grace and beauty. The Butterfield Overland Mail, also known as the Oxbow Route, was a stagecoach route operating from 1857 to 1861. It was a conduit for the United States mail from St. Louis, Missouri through



Captain Baylor and The Redhead ride "up top," Captain Baylor was well heeled, including his trusty coach gun by his side. Any potential robbers took heed, and this ride was safe and incident free.

This Concord coach and the rustic setting instantly transports one back to the 1880's Old West in Mancos, CO.

Arkansas, Indian Territory, New Mexico, and Arizona, ending in San Francisco, California. The stage was an early operation of American Express and Wells Fargo.

The Butterfield Overland Mail Company had the government mail contract from September 15, 1857. Originally all the Overland Stage owners had submitted routes with relay stations and frontier forts that were north of Albuquerque, New Mexico Territory. They had no knowledge of what was called the Oxbow Route. John Warren Butterfield (who was in a partnership with the principals of Wells Fargo for the American Express Company) was

paid \$600,000 to get the mail between St. Louis and San Francisco in 25 days. At that time, it was the largest land-mail contract ever awarded in the US.

It was required by contract to go through El Paso, Texas and through Fort Yuma near present day Yuma, Arizona—the so-called Route." The western fare one way was \$200 with most stages arriving 22 days later at its final destination. This route was an extra 600 miles further than the central and northern routes through Denver, Colorado and Salt Lake City, Utah. However the southern route was free of snow.

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The route called for the coaches to run 18-20 hours a day, with fresh horses changed out every 12-20 miles. People were packed in pretty much sardine-like. Coaches the size we rode held three in the front, three in the back, their legs interlaced, and their shoulders touching. The cushions were thin. Passengers were also able to sit on the roof.

The idea was to carry as many paying passengers as possible, so they were packed in. Comfort? A correspondent for the New York Herald, Waterman Ormsby, remarked after his 2,812 mile trek through the western US to San Francisco on a Butterfield Stagecoach thus: "Had I not just come out over the route, I would be perfectly willing to go back, but I now know what Hell is like. I've just had 24 days of it."

However a 2-hour ride through the beautiful Weber Canyon was fun. The Redhead and I shared the ride with a family with a couple of ankle biters and a grandfather. We started off sitting on the roof behind the driver and shotgun. These were the best seats in the house. After a while, the people inside were allowed up top, and we were given the choice of sitting down below or sitting on the back of the roof. We chose the latter. That part of the ride had a roller-coaster familiarity

since we couldn't anticipate what the horses were going to do.

The horses, by the way, were led by Prince and Bud. Bud is strong and eager, but he likes to fight with the other horses. The entire ride he was squabbling with Prince. This added excitement to the ride, especially when Bud reared up. They told us if Bud had been replaced by another lead horse, the ride would have been smoother and more incident free.

Lunch: Eric's wife, Lizzie, a Scotswoman who used to be a tour guide, hates cooking, but she has been unable to get a chef who met her standards, so she does it herself. She does it very well. Lunch consisted of shredded barbecue brisket sandwiches, potato salad, baked beans, chips, and cookies, all you could eat. The dinner run has steaks cooked by Eric, big steaks. You don't have to eat all of it, but you will get a big, properly cooked steak of local beef.

Outside were several toys to occupy the children, bows and arrows, throwing tomahawks, BB guns, ropes, and steel cattle. Being a SASS child, I threw tomahawks until my elbow gave out. If match directors are going to put them into shooting matches, I'm going to practice. The family wanted back inside, so we got the front again. We never did ride inside.

When the ride was over Eric took us back out to get some pictures for The Cowboy Chronicle with me in the shotgun seat with a shotgun, and not the wall-hanger their shotgun rider uses, my race ready Coyote Cap Commemorative 1887 Coach Gun. Eric mentioned a SASS group had been there that was big enough to fill one coach, and they all went armed to the teeth. Some of the runs encounter stagecoach robbers. When this one appeared, he had his gun half drawn before being covered by eight or so riders. The robbery didn't go off that day.

This wasn't my first stage ride.

When Thunder Ranch was still in Texas, they had a pre-1900 course, and it included shooting knock down targets from a moving stagecoach. (Best shooting position was on the roof. The best firearm, surprisingly, was the pistol.) That was probably the most fun I've had on a stagecoach, but this was a close second. If you're anywhere near the Durango-Silverton-Cortez area, it's a short drive to Mancos. Doing this on one day and the Durango-Silverton Railroad on another would make you an expert on 19th century transportation. n August 19, 112 years ago, Hardin was murdered in the Acme Saloon in El Paso, Texas. His life, death, and legend have meant different things to different people over the years. Hardin's career as a killer and folk hero began in East Texas in 1868, when he was 15 years old.

Hardin's first victim was a former slave and sometime playmate of Hardin's named Mage. It seems that Mage, who was older and physically

intimidating, was sore about losing a wrestling match with Hardin and his cousin. According to Hardin, Mage swore revenge and later attacked him as he was riding through the woods. After warning Mage to leave him alone, Hardin shot Mage until the man fell, mortally wounded. Hardin rode home to tell his father what he had done.

This was the Reconstruction era. The economy was devastated. The presence of a federal army of occupation – not to mention some 180,000 former slaves - made many Texans nervous and resentful. Acts of terrorism by white vigilance committees accelerated the cycle of repression and rebelliousness. Against this bleak, chaotic backdrop, (Continued on next page)

Reverend James Hardin saw little chance of a fair hearing for his son. He told John Wesley to go into hiding until things blew over.

During those fugitive years, Hardin went on to kill more blacks, federal soldiers, and state police. And, he became a hero in the eyes of many like-minded Texans. Over the long haul, though, the majority of Hardin's victims were whites and Mexicans, and he killed them neither for political reasons nor to escape being captured, but to solve personal disagreements on the cattle trails, in blood feuds, in the gambling halls, and, at least once, at a circus. Almost everywhere Hardin went, he found a reason to kill someone. So what was John Wesley Hardin? A product of his times or a cold-blooded killer?

According to Richard Marohn, the author of a new biography of Hardin called *The Last Gunfighter*, the answer lies somewhere in between. Marohn, a professor of psychiatry at Northwestern University Medical School, says Texas' most notorious gunfighter suffered from a narcissistic behavior disorder. His violent deeds were the actions of an exhibitionist who had extreme difficulty regulating his self-esteem.

Marohn's insights into the root causes of Hardin's violence make The Last Gunfighter truly unique in the field of western biography. John Wesley Hardin left a trail of words as well as blood, and according to Marohn, that trail tells us an awful lot about what made him tick. Letters Hardin wrote while imprisoned in Huntsville (from 1878 to 1894) and his autobiography, written after his release, provide insight, information, and strangeness. Above and beyond the psycho-biographical aspect, The Last Gunfighter is the most complete and clear-headed biography of Hardin ever written. The book is enlivened with over 100 photos (some never before published), maps, illustrations, and diagrams of many of Hardin's gunfights.

There are only a handful of titles in the field of western outlaw autobiographies, and The Life of John Wesley Hardin, as Written by Himself (published posthumously, in 1896) is as unique as its author. Things were tough for people like Hardin and his family during the Reconstruction years. But, as Marohn points out, the majority of Texans found ways to cope instead of kill. Hardin was one of the exceptions. The way he tells it, there was a good explanation for every one of his killings. Marohn tells us Hardin's autobiography was, in essence, an extension of the many times he rode back home to explain his latest murder to his parents.

Read Hardin's autobiography and his letters and things start to

add up: the Biblical references, his terrible fear of being attacked by mobs, the incredible naïveté of his doting mother, and the mysterious synchronicity of the death of his younger brother (which occurred shortly before Hardin's first murder). While Hardin was being torn apart from the inside by personal demons, the peculiar chaos of the frontier became the stage on which he acted out his inner conflicts.

According to Marohn, Hardin's many episodes of violence were the result of his efforts to "put himself back together and to regulate his self-esteem," as were his habits of drinking and gambling, which also frequently set the stage for violence. So where does this gunfighter myth come from, and what prompted Hardin's tragic downfall?

"Early in Hardin's life, there was cultural support for this kind of behavior. It was still the Wild West. There were still sides to be taken around the Union-Confederate issue, in black/white issues, and in family feuds. As culture and society changed in post-Civil War America and increasingly people became `civilized,' and violence became frowned upon, things became more and more difficult for Hardin."

It was in Comanche, Texas, on May 26, 1874, that things really changed for Hardin. Hardin was celebrating his 21st birthday when he ran into a deputy sheriff named Charley Webb and shot him dead. Hardin's cousins pumped more bullets into Webb's body as it slumped against a wall. An angry mob swelled on the street, clamoring for Hardin's blood. Shots were fired. Hardin escaped, but some of his friends and relatives weren't so lucky. All told, five men were killed by vigilante violence.

Three years and at least a half dozen killings later, the Texas Rangers caught up with Hardin aboard a train in Florida. In a highly publicized and controversial trial, Hardin was found guilty of second-degree murder in the Comanche killing. He served 16 years at Huntsville before being paroled and released. In early 1896, he received a full pardon from Governor Jim Hogg.

Hardin briefly tried going straight, practicing law, and shunning drink. He moved to the wild town of El Paso. Toward the end of the 19th century, as the rest of the state began to mellow and become more civilized, El Paso just got wilder.

Hardin took up drinking again. He got involved in local intrigues, had an affair with a notorious prostitute, and held up several saloons after complaining their games were fixed. He paced back and forth in his room, practicing his fast-draw in front of a mirror. He handed out autographed playing cards he'd shot holes through. He beat up his girl-friend. He broke down and cried in front of his landlady. He bragged in public he'd hired a local lawman to kill someone, then had a retraction printed in the paper, saying he'd been drunk at the time. Somehow, he also found the time to finish his autobiography.

Much has been written about this period of Hardin's life, as a lot of wild things were going on in El Paso besides the sordid flameout of a haunted gunman. Consequently, there are many different theories about the events that led up to his death.

Stories of the shooting went down like this. Around 11pm the evening of August 19, 1895, John Wesley Hardin was playing dice with grocer Henry S. Brown in El Paso's Acme Saloon. Constable John Selman, himself a notorious shooter with a questionable past, stepped through the door, paced three or four steps, and focused on Hardin standing almost sideways against the bar. The other patrons in the saloon quit talking. The only sounds came from the two men throwing dice, at 25 cents a throw. "Hoss piss on you," said Hardin. "Shake again," said the grocer.

Selman pointed his six-shooter at the back of Hardin's head. Four cubes danced across the felt and came to rest. "You have four sixes to beat," Hardin said to the grocer.

Selman pulled the trigger. Hardin spun around to face his killer, a hole showing at the corner of his left eye – the exit wound of the bullet that had passed through his brain. Witnesses said Hardin reached for his six-shooter as he fell to the floor. Selman kept shooting, even as Hardin lay flat. Selman's son, John, Jr., ran into the bar and took his father by the arm and pleaded, "Don't shoot him anymore. He's already dead."

Hardin's death came as a huge sigh of relief to many El Pasoans. Journalists mined the event for its dark humor. Several citizens were quoted as saying that, aside from being dead, John Wesley Hardin had never looked better. The death of Texas' most notorious gunfighter was only one indication that an era had truly passed into history.

It was a cold morning! The barn was also leanin' to the right just a tad, indicating whatever fearful coldness was a-lurkin' out there, it was also going to be accompanied by a sharpish North wind.

In "We Pointed Them North," Teddy Blue Abbott describes what he wore through fearful winter weather:

"I wore two pairs of wool socks, a

pair of moccasins, a pair of Dutch socks that came up to the knees, a pair of government overshoes, two suits of heavy underwear, pants, overalls, chaps, and a big, heavy shirt. I got a pair of women's stockings and cut the feet out and made sleeves. I wore wool gloves and great big heavy mittens, a blanket lined sourdough overcoat, and a big sealskin cap."

Now, that might be a bit of overkill for a cowboy event in Florida, but there's some words of wisdom here for folks who shoot where the air's a might crisper. Dressing so you have some ability to move while simultaneously keeping yourself comfortably toasty is important.

The secret to keeping warm is to dress in layers. This gives you the benefit of air pockets between your garments as well as the option of chucking bits of attire as the day warms. Wool will always be warmer than cotton, especially if it's damp or windy out there. What you wear should depend on what the weather conditions are at the range early on, and how warm it will get through the day. Pay attention the night before to the predicted ranges of temperatures over the shooting day. Having stuff you can shed is better than sweating under a single heavy layer, overheating, tossing it, and then freezing with only a light shirt on.

Wear a neckerchief. I like great big silk ones for winter. Give it an extra wrap around your neck before tying it or putting a scarf slide on it, and you'll keep cold air from diving down your shirt collar.

If you're lucky enough to have a coat with a fur ruff on the collar or a mackinaw with its big, ol' collar to turn up around your ears, you're going to be a lot warmer even if just wearing a cowboy hat. If you want to be traditional about keeping your ears warm, pull the brim of your hat down over your ears with your neckerchief and tie it off around your chin! (Note: Yes, this will hurt a really nice hat. Use one that's soft and pretty much past its useful life. You might think this looks dorky, but it's as honestly "old timey" as it gets!) Other forms of ear protection come in the form of wool stocking caps, flapped caps like the "Kromer," and fur hats. The Kromer is the classic stockman's cap. Made out of wool, it

has earflaps that can be pulled down without removing it from your head. If you are a costume fanatic, please note the Kromer is a tad late (1906) for the frontier era, but other styles of caps with ear flaps have been around a considerable time and are not inappropriate for those times.

The most popular fur hat on the northern plains was the type issued by military. This was generally made of sealskin or muskrat. Civilian hats leaned to those pelts as well, but could also be made of bear, fox, wolf, and the like. The military style was quilt-lined and had front flaps secured to the hat with side earflaps secured across the top of the hat with a string or ribbon. If you look at the paintings of Charlie Russell and Remington's cavalry and Northwest Mounted Police, these are the hats we're talking about. There was a heavy trade between cowboys and soldiers for desirable items such as these hats and Teddy Blue's overshoes. It was amazing what a couple of shots of tonsil varnish or a winning hand of poker could gain a feller!

If you are against all forms of hat other than a felt Stetson, give this a whirl. Get a chunk of that material they make "space blankets" or those emergency blankets out of. (It's a form of mylar. It'll look like aluminum foil, but it's actually a

heat reflecting plastic.) Cut a large circle out and tuck it into the sweat-band of your hat so it fits inside like a shell. You'll be amazed at how well it'll keep your noggin insulated. (It'll attract aliens and keep interstellar thought-sucker rays off'n you too!) Yes, it sounds goofy, but it works!

Gloves of all varieties were used on the frontier. Most were simple and unlined made of buckskin, elk, or cowhide. These were okay for general ranch work and for cooler weather, but failed for really cold conditions. If this is all you've got, make sure your gloves fit loosely. Thin, skintight ones might do nicely for shooting, but your fingers will get very, very cold because you have no air between you and the leather.

As Teddy says, he wore wool gloves and heavy mitts. Mitts allowed each finger to warm the next without heat loss to the environment. Most riding tasks could be done with mittens on, even quilt-lined hair-covered ones with leather palms or all leather ones. If dexterity was required, you stripped the mitts off, performed the duty, and then slipped them back on with little loss of warmth.

If you like a bit of flash, try a pair of gauntlets over a light pair of gloves

Hand warmers tucked into your gloves or pockets will also keep your shootin' fingers limber.

Boots work the same way. It's better to wear two light pairs of socks than one heavy pair in your boots. You want that layer of air! A set of battery socks or "Toasty Toes" foot warmers will work wonders in keeping your feet happy as well – especially if your range is gravel on bare dirt. Make certain your boots don't leak and the soles are in good condition. Failing a pair of government-issue overshoes, a solid pair of boots with a neoprene rather than a leather sole will help immeasurably in keeping your feet warm.

Please note it is important not to try and jam extra socks and toe warmers into a pair of skin-tight boots. You will not be any warmer, and you will certainly be a good deal more uncomfortable! If you have poor circulation or issues with peripheral nerves, *please*, *please*, *please* pay attention to your footwear! You *must* have boots that will not cut off circulation or impinge on nerve function for your feet to be happy and healthy over the course of a day's shooting! I cannot stress this fact enough!

Finally, you'll be a lot warmer if you move around. Help out on your posse, or move around and watch others shoot. If your range allows auxiliary heat in the form of open fires or propane heaters, take advantage of as much time in front of the warmth as you can without neglecting posse duties. And, for heavens sake, don't set yourself on fire!!! If SASS is the funest thing you can do with your clothes on, don't lose sight of this when you have to wear a tad more toggery for winter shooting.

MOLDING YOUR OWN


Thave molded my own bullets in some form or another for more years than I care to account for. I started when a neighbor gave me a box of goodies after his father passed away. The box contained a .38-caliber mold, an Ideal Bullet sizer and powder dump, a bunch of lead, and a cast melting pot along with dipper and miscellaneous odds and ends. At the time I was shooting a lot of .44 Special/Mag, so I only had to buy a mould and sizing die, and I could start saving money and shooting more.

I shot up all the lead he gave me and tons more I mined off the hill at the police firing range, mostly for pistol shooting, but also started casting my own balls for muzzle loading. It is amazing what a guy can melt down and push down his barrel, but I soon learned alloying or not alloying material for specific purposes helped me develop more accuracy from my creations. I continued molding my own pistol bullets until companies like LaserCast, Meister, and a host of others could deliver cast bullets to my door for a cost way not worth my time to mould.

These bullets are excellent for cowboy matches or practice ammo in my 1911, but when I started shooting long-range single shot rifle at the cowboy matches, I dug out the box of stuff again and began experimenting with casting bullets for this competition. Don't get me wrong, I still depend on LaserCast for my .45-70

lever guns I load with smokeless powder, but when I start working up loads for the Sharps replica, I found the LaserCast was a bit too hard, and I didn't get the results I knew the rifle was capable of shooting.

My spaghetti Sharps is .45-90 caliber, and I shoot only blackpowder

cartridges through it. I needed to custom build a bullet for this rifle that I could duplicate exactly each time to insure accurate performance. It had to be alloyed softer than what was available already cast. I had most of the equipment I needed, so the journey began.

I started with a Lyman mould from a few years ago when I was experimenting with a .45-120. It is #457125 and is supposed to weigh 500 grains when cast from a #2 Alloy. The #2 alloy is harder than I was looking for to cast these bullets, and when I found the mixture I wanted, the same mold produced bullets that weighed out at 520 grains. I wanted a heavy bullet for long range shoots with the single shot.

Casting bullets requires some simple tools that are easily paid for when producing your own concoctions, but two money saving tools I bought were the Lyman 48th edition reloading manual and "Shooting Buffalo Rifles of the Old West" by Mike Venturino. The advice offered in these books gave me starting points. Mike's book helped me the most in deciding what alloy to start with for the buffalo cartridge. The historic account shows a mixture of approximately 1 part tin to 20 parts lead was a recommended alloy in the old days. I started out with the 1 to 20 alloy and found it improved my accuracy in this rifle immensely. Also, by duplicating this alloy in the melting pot, I found it was easier to keep my finished bullet weights more consistent. I weigh out each cast before loading them, and runnerups are practice ammo. If

they are too far out of spec, I send them back to the pot.

I bought some lead from Buffalo Arms Company, and if you are going to shoot and cast bullets for these guns, their catalog is a good one to have on hand. They sell lead and tin in pure form to mix your own, or they



the lead around 800 degrees. The alloy stays together, and the lead flows and cools the best at this temp.

have ingots already cast in 20 to 1 mix. I went with the already alloyed lead and really have been happy with the results. I tried making bullets with on hand supplies and could get casts to shoot pretty good, but at longer ranges duplicating mixtures offers more consistency. One thing to keep in mind, starting with pure materials usually will take a little of the cost savings out of casting your own bullets over finding scrap metal to cast, but I guess that is the price of accuracy.

Some other tools needed would be an alloy melting pot or furnace, a dipper, a small mallet for bumping open hot moulds, flux, sizing equipment and lube, and a casting thermometer. I found the casting thermometer to be a very useful tool in consistency. Temperature plays an important part in how alloys mix, and using just the thermostat on the furnace may be off temperature wise. Once the temperature is found to be where it is needed, the thermostat will keep it there.

Many outfits make casting furnaces—Lyman and Lee, to name a few. The biggest thing I would consider when buying one is size. I use a 10-pound furnace from Lee with the bottom dump lever. This allows me to cast about as many bullets in one sitting that I want to. There are bigger ones on the market if you are planning on making lots of bullets at a time.

Bullet sizers are available from Lyman and aren't overly expensive. They come in kit form that start you out with everything you need. I still use the Ideal sizer that was given to me, and I think it is kind of cool to still be using this antique. Lyman bought out the company, and their sizing dies fit it. I don't use the powder dump that came with it because I weigh all my charges individually with a Dillon Terminator electronic scale. I used a balance for years, but I can see the big numbers on the electronics screen much easier, thus helping me eliminate mistakes and be more precise. The same electronic scale will measure up to 900 grains, so it doubles as a bullet scale.

Casting bullets is really easy, and I find it satisfying to produce projectiles for the buffalo gun that are extremely accurate at long

ranges even by today's standards. There are some precautions the wise caster will consider before starting though. We all know the hazards that lead can cause, so melting alloy should be done in an open or ventilated area. Molten lead gives off fumes and also cold lead can rub off on your hands and be accidentally ingested when eating or smoking. The best practice is to not do these things when casting and wash up good when you're done.

Caution must be taken when handling hot lead so it does not splash onto exposed skin. The least that can happen is it will really hurt. In the eye would be debilitating. Even with eye protection, gloves, and long sleeve heavy clothing, care must taken not to drop things into the pot that will cause splashing of hot metal. Do not drop water in the pot, as it will cause an explosive reaction and will splash lead out. I usually drop a bit of lead on the table when cutting the sprue off. This scrap can be returned to the pot on the next run. Remember this sprue looks the same hot as it does cold when you go to pick it up. If it is hot, you won't look at it very long.

I start by cutting off a chunk or two of alloy and melt it in the pot. It takes about 20 minutes for the furnace to melt the lead. I like the temperature to be between 725 and 750 degrees Fahrenheit. Once I get it there and confirm it with the thermometer, I set the thermostat to keep it there. I will check it regularly because if the alloy becomes too hot, it will cast frosty colored bullets that will weigh out lighter than I want.

Once the lead hits the temperature, it needs to be fluxed so impurities will float to the top and can be removed. I use a teaspoon to scrape off impurities and a metal coffee can to dump them into. I keep a bit of the scrap in the can to make it bottom heavy and harder to knock over. The slag will stay hot for a long time, and I don't want to knock it over onto some part of my body that I am fond of. The correctly fluxed metal will be bright and shiny. As I start to cast, scum will form on the surface indicating time to flux again.

One thing about starting with the pre-made alloy, there are very few impurities to start with and greater consistency can be achieved in my casts. I have used pure lead diving weights (which I found not to be pure) to wheel weights and found them not to be the same alloy from batch to batch. This will be evident when they hit the scale. Wheel weights are okay for pistol bullets with smokeless. I was told the other day that lead wheel weights might become a thing of the past as they might start making them out of steel.

As the lead is heating up, I warm up the mould by placing it on the edge of the furnace. It usually takes several castings before the mould will be hot enough to cast perfect bullets. The first batch of bullets will have huge wrinkles in them, and some won't even cast completely until the mould is hot. I will pour more lead than necessary, letting it flow over the top of the mould to help heat it up more quickly. When the mold is the correct temperature, the bullets will come out with a smooth finish throughout and no wrinkles. They will have a shiny appearance and usually fall from the mould easily when opened. I keep an eye on the bullets, as the mould can get too hot and the bullets will look a bit frosty. Just slowing down a bit to cool the mould is all I usually need to do.

I have a wooden gavel that has been around since I made it in wood shop during my 9th year of high

school. It serves well to knock the sprue plate around and tap the mould should the bullet stick in it. If you have long since lost your 9th grade shop project, a piece of broom handle or 1x2 will work also. Metallic hammers will damage the surface of the mould and plastic mallets will melt. It usually takes a second or two for the bullet to cool enough to bump it out of the mould and when the sprue hardens it will be about time. The bullet is still soft and will dent if dropped on a hard surface. I use an old dishtowel folded over several times to break its fall. The towel will brown a bit from the heat. but I have never had it fire up. I am told an old piece of ironing board material is a bit more flame proof if you have it.

Let the bullets cool for an adequate amount of time, as they will be too hot to handle for some time. If you try to

handle them too early, you will know, but they will get dented when they hit the ground and won't be usable. When they cool, they need to be run though the sizer/lubricator. The sizer will size them and lube the rings all in one action. I use SPG lube, which is better for blackpowder loads as it keeps the fouling soft and results in longer accurate strings of fire between swabbing. The SPG works well with smokeless powder also.

Some things to be careful of when lubing is make sure the bullet enters the die straight. If it is off a bit, it might knock the edge off of the base and that would affect accuracy. Also the nosepiece should fit the tip of the bullet so it doesn't damage it. I sometimes don't get the bullet in


straight, and if the tip of the bullet hits the edge, it will dent it.

Casting lead bullets is an enjoyable pastime and can lessen the burden of shooting costs, giving you more time on the range. It is also a precise science to make more superior projectiles for precision shooting. Woodsmen of long ago sat around the fire producing their next day's projectiles, and before the jacketed bullet, it was the technology of the time. There are tons of materials available on casting bullets, and with a little experimentation a shooter can learn how to make the most of it. I was definitely impressed with the huge difference it made with my spaghetti Sharps. It competes with many of my modern guns shooting jacketed bullets. ...

Idebated when to discuss the two main styles of shooting Gunfighter and chose to do it after the article on finding a pard to shoot Gunfighter with. Mostly this is because I see shooters shake their heads as if Gunfighter is overwhelming when they overhear two Gunfighter pards discussing the stage prior to shooting it. Having a pard who understands, or at least is interested in understanding Gunfighter, signifi-

cantly reduces the number of procedures a shooter would otherwise get. It isn't that Gunfighter is difficult, but Gunfighters do have to think a bit differently when pistols are shot back to back.

There are two main methods for shooting Gunfighter, the most popular seems to be alternating pistols, and the other is shooting pairs. Either way is competitive, and each method has its own advantages and disadvantages, so a Gunfighter is left to choose a method that suits him/her.

There are things a Gunfighter has to think about when both pistols are out there. First is gun control. Most of us have a dominant hand; therefore, we have a weak hand that needs to be able to control the firearm at all times and be coordi-

nated enough to hit what we aim at. Dry-fire practice with UNLOADED firearms is the best way to get the physical dexterity needed for Gunfighter. Remember the layers of safety, UNLOADED firearms AND don't point at anything you aren't willing to blow away.

Second, there is a tendency for beginning Gunfighters to have a "cross-over" motion when the Gunfighter is faced with an odd number of targets. Consider a Nevada sweep example, left gun P1, right gun P2, left gun P3, right gun P2 ... The right gun shoots P2 twice in a row, but the left gun has to swing to P3 in-between those two shots. This is where a novice Gunfighter has a tendency to 'cross-over' the right gun with the left. Another novice Gunfighter mistake

is to "pump the pistols," a back and forth motion that is essentially sweeping oneself if it is dramatic enough. Here the experienced Gunfighter will keep the pistols side-by-side, not very far apart to ease sight acquisition between each pistol and keep pistol movement to a minimum

While I won't delve deeply into the nuances of either method, the details can be confusing until the new Gunfighter shooter gets some experience. I'll begin with Alternating Pistols. In this method the shooter generally pulls one pistol slightly ahead of the other, cocks it and fires it, then cocks and fires the other, continuing until five rounds have been expended from each pistol. This method works very well for

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shooters who have a significantly dominant eye because it allows the shooter to align each pistol with the dominant eye; only one sight is visible at a time. With some practice a shooter can also be cocking the offgun while firing the other. This is the method Widowmaker uses in his World Record Speed Pistol run posted online at http://www.jspublications.net/records/records.html. Alternating can be very fast and accurate once the shooter has mastered the technique.

Alternating has its advantages such as lining up with the dominant eye, and pistol sequences are easier to think of as five shots, then five shots, and with practice the Gunfighter can free up one hand ahead of the other for easier transitions. I also believe there are disadvantages such as extra gun movement or swing on some common sequences, and learning off-hand cocking while firing the other seems to be harder to learn for some Gunfighters.

Shooting pairs is a whole different mind-set and gives a lot of grief to Traditional shooters. When a Gunfighter shoots pairs, he'll draw both, cock both, fire alternately, and repeat. Gunfighters I know who shoot pairs seem to have difficulty cocking the off-gun *while* shooting the other. Shooting pairs allows the

shooter to cock both at the same time and fire independently, no offhand motion while shooting either pistol. The trouble comes in when it is time for a "lead change." Lead changes occur when one pistol is fired twice in a row. Take the Nevada sweep again, pull both pistols, cock both, fire left gun at P1, right gun at P2, cock again, (lead change) fire right gun at P3, left gun at P2 ... When I shoot pairs, and I almost always do, my left gun always shoots left side targets, and my right gun always shoots right side targets, as there is minimal gun movement that way, but you have to think of the sequence as five sets of two shots. P1 and P2 is one set, P3 and P2 is the next set, P1 and P2 is the third set, and so on.

Remember how Alternating seems to favor folks with a dominant eye? Shooting pairs seems to favor those who can use both eyes and therefore see both sights at the same time when shooting multi-tap sequences. I don't mean to insinuate that eye dominance is the determining factor for choosing a Gunfighter method, but it is something to consider.

Lead changes seem to be the biggest confusion factor in Gunfighter. It isn't all that hard to learn, but it is different from other shooters. I shoot pairs and was several matches into it before I shot a match without a

Procedural, not that my P's all came from my pistol sequences, but a majority probably were.


I should also note not all Alternating Gunfighters will strictly alternate. Some will change leads too, and not all Gunfighters who shoot pairs will change leads either. They will most always shoot a particular side first and keep that pattern throughout the sequence.

The key is to keep the pistols as motionless as possible, use a method that allows the best sight acquisition, be safe, and practice until it becomes second nature. As more experience is gained, the nuances

and "tricks" for shaving time can be focused on and discussed with your partner. As every shooter has different physical abilities, don't be pressed into a method for Gunfighter that you don't care for even if someone you admire shoots that way. I've been there, done that, and came back to shooting pairs because it works for me, and I enjoy it.

It seems most western films always feature a steam locomotive pulling into town. In fact, the first film ever made was a western named "The Great Train Robbery."

Growing up, I never really took notice of these iron horses, even when I saw a real steam engine at an amusement park as a child and several times again as an adolescent. As I got older, I acquired an understanding of how these magnificent machines work. With this under-

standing, it was like a veil was lifted from my eyes, and I understood the fascination Americans have with old steam locomotives.

Years later, I returned to that same amusement park with my own children, and really saw for the first time that same steam engine I had ignored years earlier. Oh sure, the owners had a fancy pain job on her, and all the brass and bright work was polished to a spit shine. That's the glitz and glamour for the tourists. Armed with knowledge about this machine, it wasn't the bright colors and fancy paint that mesmerized me, it was the sounds.

The next time you see a steam locomotive, listen carefully. Cinema cannot capture the low rumble of the fire that burns inside the belly of these mechanical beasts of burden. You can almost feel it. Above the rumble is the constant hiss of steam bleeding through and warming the idle engine, while the tone of exhaust moans out the stack. As the sleeping beast comes to life, the conductor rings the bell and blasts the steam whistle. The low rumble begins to become a stifled roar as smoke stack gives its first chug. The stack sounds like a winded organ pipe, synchro-

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Cross section of a fire tube boiler


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nized with it is the first pant of live steam leaving the engine. The beast lurches forward and the car couplings slam together cascading from car to car. The winded organ pipe and panting engine repeat over and over as they pick up a cadence, like the hoof falls of a Clydesdale pulling a heavy load. The wheels groan, the tracks bow, and next thing you know, the train is rolling out of sight.

So, what make this machine work? Steam. When broken down, a steam locomotive is really just a boiler on wheels. More specifically, it is a fire tube locomotive design boiler, a design still used in commercial and industrial applications to this day. A locomotive boiler is a large horizon-

tal cylindrical pressure vessel that is mostly filled with water; above the water is a head of steam. Inside the vessel is a metal box connected to tubes that run back and forth through the water. The metal box is known as the firebox. This is where combustion takes place. Fueled by wood or coal, (today, some are even converted to propane) the hot gasses from combustion snake their way through the tubes back and forth as they make their way to the smoke stack. Along the way, the hot gasses give up their heat into the water causing the water to boil into steam. The hotter the fire, the more pressure in the steam, the more work we can do with it in the engine.

The engine itself is mounted low,

down by the wheels. This engine houses a single piston with two sides. High-pressure steam is fed back and forth, alternating on opposite sides of the piston causing it to move from high pressure toward low pressure. The high- pressure steam is directed to alternate on each side of the piston by a slide valve or slipper valve.


With the exhaust port always open inside of the slipper valve, the slipper valve uncovers ports on each side of the piston. The position of the valve determines which side of the piston will have high pressure steam directed to it, while the other side vents exhaust steam. The high-pressure steam gives up its energy in

moving the piston as it expands in the cylinder. The slipper valve is timed to ensure the piston travels a full stroke before changing direction. This reciprocating energy is attached to the drive wheels by linkages plainly seen from the side of the train.

Today's locomotives have replaced the boilers with internal combustion diesel engines, and the steam engine is now an electric motor. Even the steam whistles have been replaced with air horns.

Working much like a hybrid automobile, today's locomotive diesel engines drive an electric generator. The electricity is then used to drive (Continued on page 49)






NEVER SHOW UP FOR A MEETING EARLY The Early Cowboy Gets the Rifle


do's and don'ts, showed me how to





current category system. The feedback was positive, so I prepared a briefing for last year's Summit TG's. There were numerous suggestions to add categories at the top end of our system (75 and up, Senior Gunfighter, and the list goes on ...), and other issues with much merit were also brought into the discussion. Clearly, the sleeping beast had been awakened!

I was commissioned to form a committee to look at all the categories, and at the entire category system, in an attempt to improve it where needed. An endeavor such as this needs input from across the country, from shooters in the various regions, from match directors, the Wild Bunch, and the TG's. A committee was formed: Ol #4, Elder Katie, San Quinton, Chuckaroo, and myself. We also had very good support and ideas from Snakebite, Tex, Hipshot, and Coyote Calhoun.

Our mission was to change the

current category system, where needed, to achieve a more "equitable opportunity for competition." We also needed to be sensitive to the requirements of match directors and to maintain the favorable aspects of our current system.

The committee's tactic is to move slowly and thoughtfully and resolve the inequities or problems incrementally. We also believe any change needs to fit into future plans for changes ... in other words, there needs to be a long-term view in which all proposed changes fit into a new vision of modified SASS shooting categories.

What's the next step?

The TG's will be given a voting proposal that will, if passed, result in the Traditional and Modern categories being COMBINED. An age break at 35 years will be added—creating a kind of "35er" category, similar to 49er. We will then have 17 years old and up, 35 years old and up, with no change to any other category. As already allowed in 49er, these two new age-based categories will allow the use of modern or traditional sighted revolvers, one or twohanded shooting styles, and any propellant. In essence, there will be two additional age-based categories using exactly the same rules as the current 49er and up. The net resulting increase in categories is zero.

In essence, it's clear the older we get, the faster we lose our ability to run fast, acquire targets, and react ... and our eyesight deteriorates faster as well. This started me thinking about the inequity of our current category system, in particular, the Traditional and Modern categories.

Put in plain terms, it was possible for a 48-year-old Traditional or Modern shooter to compete against a 17-year-old shooter, in the same category. This is an age range of 31 years!! It is clearly an inequity, and worthy of further investigation. Surely, the logic applied to the splitting of the Senior category applies here as well.

A few weeks were spent looking at various research available to the public on the internet, much of it published papers from research done at colleges or universities around the world, medical journals, and so forth. I discovered once a person enters their mid-thirties, on average, they will begin a long, more noticeable process of degeneration. (In fact, some research suggested males begin to degenerate once they hit their early 20's, but the amount is very small.) Our eyesight deteriorates, and our reaction times increase. Maybe we need to split both Modern and Traditional into two categories ...

However, there was a second issue ... we already have some 30 shooting categories, not all of which are well populated, even at the larger matches, and introducing additional age-based categories just makes things worse.

Through discussions with the Wild Bunch, it was learned the reason for initially having the Modern and Traditional categories was in the earlier days of Cowboy Action ShootingTM the distances at which the targets were placed, the sizes of the targets, and the speed at which folks were shooting merited two different categories—yes, the sights made a big difference in those days, and the "traditional" guns needed protecting!

Over the years Cowboy Action ShootingTM has evolved: the targets have gotten significantly larger, the distances significantly shorter, and folks are now shooting at tremendous speeds. The two different types of sights now make no difference as the vast majority of shooters simply "look for the front blade to be near the target ..."

The beginning of a solution ...

I began the process by asking shooters that participate in the various age group categories what they thought of the idea of changing our

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
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WHAT'S THE CALL?

ur topic this month is the **JUNLOADING TABLE**. As a suggestion, when you present your revolver to the unloading table officer, turn the cylinder at a slow rate, as it is difficult to see a nickeled cartridge case in a stainless cylinder. Same thing when the shooter has used blackpowder in a color casehardened or blued cylinder. Courtesy goes a long way. When you spin the cylinder at a rate that exceeds the sound barrier, don't be angry when some older shooter asks you to do it again, only slower.

"Being the Unloading Table Officer is boring."

"At times 'weaker' competitors are placed in these boring positions."

"When a firearm is brought off the line, I see the unloading officer grab the firearm(s) and start working the actions in a helpful, well meaning way, trying to clear a jammed firearm."

"I have had an Unloading Table Officer tell me it was his responsibility to clear jammed firearms and proceeded to take my pistol apart."

"Competitors have come to the line and had a malfunctioning firearm. It is handed off, taken to the unloading table, the competitor tries to clear it, and a discharge occurs." "If one of MY firearms malfunctions on a stage and someone starts working on it without MY permission, discharging a round into the unload-


ing table, I can tell you it ain't gonna be ME that gets the MDQ!"

"When is it permissible to leave the shooting line with a malfunctioning firearm? "Where am I supposed to take it?"

Okay, I have read or heard all of these statements one time or another. What is the responsibility of the Unloading Table Officer? We all know the shooter has the ultimate responsibility for their firearm(s).

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
"You'll see!" It was a great chance to shorten up your reins, gain control of your pony, and get ready for the next weekend at END of TRAIL!


contacts that are the real value added in whatever we hope to do.

I Shot the Sheriff (And I Killed a Deputy, Too)

After eating breakfast at the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln, New Mexico, Sheriff William Brady walks out on the main street to meet his deputies: George Hindman, Jacob "Billy" Mathews, John Long (a.k.a. Frank Rivers) and George W. Peppin. It's approximately 9:00 in the morning.

A heavy rain has drenched the Bonito River Valley. The formidable men walk east down the center of the muddy street, picking their way around the bogs.

As the quintet passes the Ham Mills residence, Sheriff Brady stops to speak with Mrs. Mills. From across the street, Pastor Taylor Ealy sees Brady laugh. It's April Fool's Day.

After his light-hearted exchange with Mrs. Mills, Sheriff Brady hurries to catch up with his men.

When the lawmen pass John Tunstall's store, a storm of bullets sweep the street. Shooting from behind a 10-foot-high adobe wall, the concealed gunmen mow down Brady and Deputy Hindman. The sheriff has been hit by a dozen bullets.

Sitting in the middle of the road, Sheriff Brady groans, "Oh, Lord," as he tries to rise, but another volley of shots riddles his body. He falls over, dead.

Deputy Hindman moans and cries out for water. Ike Stockton emerges from his saloon, rushes up the street and attempts to pull the wounded deputy to safety. As he does, Hindman is hit again. He dies in the street.

The shooting stops. It is quiet except for the distant barking of dogs.

Suddenly, two men sprint from the Tunstall corral into the street. "Big Jim" French covers William Bonney (a.k.a. Billy Kid). The Kid straddles Brady's body, perhaps looking for warrants or wanting to retrieve the Winchester rifle the sheriff took from him on February 20.

From his position in the Cisneros' front yard, Deputy Mathews takes aim

and fires. His bullet clips Billy Kid's hip and rips through French's left thigh.

The Kid gives up his scavenger hunt, and he and French hotfoot it back to the safety of the corral.

Tunstall's main pard Rob Widenmann opens the north gate of the corral and all the Regulators mount their horses except French, who can't swing his leg over the saddle.

Six horses thunder out of the compound, heading east along the Bonito River bottom, unseen by the deputies up on the main road. As the Regulators meet the road just east of the Ellis Store, however, they are fired upon by the deputies. But the boys are out of range, and they escape.

Pastor Ealy quickly dresses French's thigh. ("I drew a silk handkerchief through the wound," Ealy later says.)

Comrades of the dead sheriff soon come looking for the perpetrators, but French is successfully hidden under the floorboards of Tunstall's store. He later escapes.

Some three years later, Billy Kid (by then known as Billy the Kid) is captured and tried for killing Sheriff Brady. Found guilty and sentenced to hang, the Kid tells a reporter, "I think it hard that I'm the only one to suffer the full consequence of the law."

He has a point. Some seven men shot at the sheriff, and it is unknown which of them killed the sheriff and his deputy. ...



LITTLE KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE WAY OUT WEST -

Texas John Slaughter


EXAS JOHN SLAUGHTER was born in 1841. He was a Civil War veteran, trail- driver, cattleman, Texas Ranger, Cochise County Sheriff, and Arizona State Representative during his lifetime. He picked up Spanish and mastered cowboy

skills from Mexican vaqueros, learned ranching from his father and brothers, and fought Comanches with the Texas Rangers. He established cattle ranches in Texas and Arizona and transported herds to Mexico, Kansas, California, and New Mexico. Slaughter was one of the first to drive cattle up the Chisholm Trail. In 1886, he was elected Cochise County Sheriff and worked with Jeff Milton to clean up Tombstone. Slaughter did more than any other single lawman to rid Arizona of outlaws. He knew and was much respected by many famous western pistolmen such as Wild Bill Hickok, Wyatt Earp, King Fisher, Sam Bass, Ben

Thompson, and Billy the Kid. Slaughter died at Douglas, Arizona in 1922.

(Modern and Traditional come together; then, add the age break).

The rationale for combining the Modern and Traditional categories is both style revolvers are already allowed to be used in 49er, Senior, Silver Senior, and Elder Statesman ... so we are, in effect, saying on the one hand there is no difference between these two types of sights, and yet we presently have two different categories solely to accommodate the different sights! It doesn't make any sense ...

There are other suggestions pertaining to this proposal. It has been suggested we also allow the use of the Gunfighter style in all age-based categories ... providing truly "open" categories and open competition. This suggestion is still the subject of much discussion in the committee and between the TG's.


Considerable discussion regarding the names of these new categories has also taken place. We need to determine names for the new 17 and up and 35 and up agebased categories. Names suggested include: "Range Boss," "Wrangler," "Drover," "Open" (more for 17 and up), "35er" (for 35 and up), and so forth. We're looking for suggestions! 
No other changes to the current system will be proposed this year.

Further discussion ...

A wide range of possibilities have been addressed that deal with the high cost of quality awards for categories with only one or two shooters participating. One thought is to declare a two-tiered system— SASS Official categories and SASS Approved categories. State and above matches might be required to offer the Official ("open") categories, but could pick and choose from the Approved list if there is a demand for that particular category. This would allow matches to better manage their awards packages and not have to purchase awards for undersubscribed categories. It's an important issue for matches in the current climate of high cost and lower shooter turnout due to poor economic times. Shooters are traveling less due to fuel prices, and matches want to respond to increased pressure on their bottom line ... matches don't want to raise their shooters' fees, and yet strive to maintain the quality of their awards. It's a rather complex issue ... 🎩



THE CAPGUN KID RIDES

Shooters Product Report ... The Nichols Stallion .45 and the Mattel Fanner Fifty

Prior to the 1968 Gun Control Act, when kids ran around banging away with their capguns without a single school shooting, two replica firearms dominated the Capgun World. A company known as Nichols, based in Texas, manufactured a capgun called the Stallion Forty Five, and another Company Named Mattel, in some big city somewhere manufactured a Capgun called the Fanner Fifty. Both seemed to have dominated the shooting world of the six to ten year olds during an era where fifty-seven of the seventy or so TV shows were westerns. Many of us remember them in the context of Christmas presents, while still others mortgaged their allowance by saving up to buy one, and still more of us

had an Aunt Rita or someone like her who instinctively went to the capgun aisle when purchasing birthday, barmitsva, or first-holy-communion

presents for us.

This product comparison worked with three out-of-box (c. 1958) models known as the Stallion Mark Two, The Fanner Fifty, and the Shootin-Shell Fanner Fifty. The historical setting for these two guns, having its roots in a lot of fond memories, is nevertheless compromised by two tragic victories of the anti-gun movement ... The Gun Control Act of 1954, in which several of our Moms pronounced Capguns as outdoor weapons and violated our constitutional right to detonate caps inside the house ... and the Gun Control Act of 1958 in which, by proving my prowess as a gunfighter, I shot my father in both buttocks with my shootin' shells. Big Mistake.



Really big mistake.

The former got me banned from Saturday morning TV such as Looney Tunes, that cartoon show left over from the silent era in which Farmer Grey was besieged over and over again by a mouse population the size of China, Sky King, Roy Rogers, Range Rider, Annie Oakley, and the like. The latter resulted in what I now refer to as the Barney Fife

Syndrome, where Dad made it clear I was allowed to have only one bullet. This lasted between that particular afternoon and the day I found girls. I don't wanna talk about it. (The Horror ... the horror ...).

Overall Impressions

Both Capguns can be spotted in multiple showings on eBay. In fact, some of us out here on the firing line are quite surprised as to why nobody measures the economy based on eBay transactions.

In gratitude to the Nichols Family, a second-time-around Backyard Buckaroo can go to the website of http://www.nicholscapguns.com and re-discover everything from the history of the product to where the action is in the Capgun Show Trend.


Sad to say, when a little boy acci-

dentally swallowed the plastic tip of a Shootin' Shell Fanner and choked to death, Mattel ran for cover and, to this day, denies any connection to the Fanner Fifty on moral grounds. This is a little ironic, in lieu of their single-handed attack on little American Girls by making them all feel fat, stupid, and ugly if they did not

grow up with Barbie Doll-like figures. If you wanna find anything on the Fanner, Google is your best bet. There is also a video entitled Boys Toys of the Fifties and Sixties, which is pretty comprehensive in covering Mattel's commercials. Man, those were great commercials.

For the purpose of these tests, standard, out-of-box ammunition was used. The Stallion had a bullet big enough to shoot down a plane where the metal slug (about an inch and a half long) fit inside a thin brass shell. It loaded through a loading gate just like a real Colt. The standard factory load was a red, round cap that was placed on the back end of the bullet before being stuffed into the shell. The old time bullets weighed about three hundred grains,

and the charge seemed to be 1/100 FC (that's 1/100th of a firecracker).

The Fanner Fifty had an incredibly realistic brass bullet, known as the play bullet, manufactured under a separate company's auspices in Waterbury Connecticut. It used a special role of perforated caps that, as with the bullets, loaded via a loading gate on the incorrect side of the breech. You could get by that, though, because the gun was really boss and Mattel's marketing and slick looking gunbelt owned us all in 1957. Besides, in the shootin-shell version, the loading gate was on the correct side. Their charge was also 1/100FC, but the shootin-shell version had a spring mounted brass casing which, when struck with or without the cap, propelled the grey tip for about ten feet reliably and anybody's guess after that.

I don't ever remember seeing a (Continued on page 65)







BULLWINKLE, SASS #22839 1943 - 2008

Bavville, NJ - This past March we lost Bullwinkle, AKA John Moran, a Cowboy Action Shooter that exemplified "Spirit of the Game." He was one of the founders of the Jackson Hole Gang and was instrumental in helping me get Purgatory in the Pines off the ground five years ago. Bull fought a two-year battle with cancer and never let it get him down. He is greatly missed by all at the Jackson Hole Gang.

Bullwinkle had a great sense of humor. His sense of humor was one of quick wit coupled with his vast repertoire of backwoods sayings and his storytelling. Anyone that knew Bull knew some of his stories. He was someone with whom you definitely wanted to shoot on the posse. He made the day fun. If the stage called for a line or action at the buzzer, he would always give it a little extra and ham it up in good fun.

You could call Bullwinkle any time of the day or night and he would be there for you in a heartbeat. No matter what kind of a jam you were in, he would get you out of it. If he couldn't, he made you feel better anyway. He truly did like to help people. Anyone at work or any cowboys that needed something, he was the first to volunteer with a smile.

We traveled a lot to out of state three-day cowboy shoots. The ride in the car was full of laughs, jokes, comments, memories, and stories. Singing along with country songs. I will miss most of all just being with Bullwinkle and having a good laugh. As many of our cowboy friends have told me over the last year, Bullwinkle was the kind of person you just felt good being around. Many SASS members have told me Bullwinkle was one of their favorites to shoot with, and other quotes such as:

"Such a great and jolly cowboy will be missed"

"To those who knew him would be honored to be compared to him"

"You never saw him without a smile on his face"

We got into Cowboy Action ShootingTM about eight years ago. Those of us that grew up with Hoppy, Gene, and Roy remembered their values of doing the right thing, fair play,



honesty, and that translated to something called the "Spirit of the Game." It's hard to describe to a new shooter, but a good description would be it's the way Bullwinkle approached the game. That is, where you are not as concerned with winning and losing and "headlines" as much as playing fair, doing your best, having fun, and not taking it too seriously. You are more focused on enjoying the moment, helping others, and just being with your friends for a good time. That pretty much not only sums up the cowboy spirit but how Bullwinkle lived his life. He enjoyed the moment and got the most out of his time here. He didn't get involved with the things that would interfere with his outdoor activities. While he was alive, Bull *lived*.

Bullwinkle made the sign post by the berm at pit four for the first Purgatory. Every time I see it I think of him. Mild Bill said about Bull, "good people should not be forgotten." We may have some great shoots at the Jackson Hole Gang now and in the future, but they will not be the same without Bullwinkle!

I'd like to finish with a prayer from Roy Rogers ...

Lord, I reckon I'm not much just by myself,

I fail to do a lot of things I ought to do.

But Lord, when trails are steep and passes high,

Shirley and Colorado Jack are survived by eight children and numerous grandchildren and great grandchildren. We miss you. 🚣





commercial for the Nichols Guns, but Mattel used Hollywood footage in their commercials that bombarded us around Christmas right before the Mickey Mouse Club every night starting right after Halloween.

The Stallion was die-cast metal, screwed together in two halves in such a way as to almost be repairable by any kid who had a dad who could handle a Phillips head screwdriver and be patient enough not to curse his brains out when all the little fragile springs bounced across the room. It came with two sets of grips ... white pearl looking jobs that had Hoppy and The Lone Ranger implied by them, and black plastic grips that no kid could figure out because none of the good guys had black grips. They became mostly trash can fodder.

The Fanner ... well ... here was an addictive combination of those phony stag grips that just about every good guy from Roy to Matt Dillon had, in a rig (known as the Marshal) that looked like something Arvo Ojala hisself would have made. It was incredibly shiny because some of the engineers figured out how to get the lowest cost plating on the plastic cylinders, and most of today's antique Fanners can be spotted by not only the grips, but also the absent finish that pronounces a grey plastic cylinder.

The Shootin-Shell Fanner had a recess in the right grip where you were supposed to place the plastic tip before forcing the brass shell over it to secure it. None of us in Pine Avenue Grammar School could figure the sense of this because it interfered with the looks of the grip. We all cared about the looks of the grips.

All three guns had backstrap/trigger guard designed for a kid's hands, but none of the guns seemed to have the proportions or grace of their lines seriously affected by this. Man, those guns were boss. You felt like you had the same gun your hero had. All guns were well balanced for both shooting and gun handling. The lighter Fanner Fifty would spin so fast you could sweep most of the known western world before an RO could even open his mouth in protest. If there was a major difference between the capguns, it was in the fact the nonshootin-shell Fanners were nowhere near as rugged as their shootin-shell mates or the Nichols Stallion. You could drop a shootin-shell or a Stallion. Drop the Fanner Fifty and you hadda wait 'till next Christmas or the first available birthday to get another one.

Not more than a month after the Christmas of '57, most of us on the block were running around with Fanners loaded down with Scotch Tape further afflicted by trigger action that no longer worked. You could get away with that though, because the Fanner was built around a flattened hammer meant to be fanned as in the movies. Hence the Name Fanner (because of the Hammer) Fifty (because of the number of shots on the roll of perforated caps).

A Nichols Stallion and Shootinshell Fanner were both built on the concept of six bullets. Realistic, but out of the question in terms of the imagination's required round count

Overall Shooting Impressions

All three capguns were tested out of the replica Mattel Marshal, right handed holster I built in adult size for the capgun shows I attend on an annual basis. Sold quite a few of 'em, as a matter of fact. The Stallion could not fan well at all. As with its counterpart, The Fanner Fifty, when using the standard factory load, stealth bullets could be grouped within an inch of each other at a range of about a half mile or so, depending on how far away the bad guys were and having the lighting just past dusk because you did not want your neighbors seeing you shoot a capgun in your backyard as an adult.

The Shootin-shell Fanner grouped in a tight thirty six inches at a range of about twenty feet, but the light load clearly did not have enough pressure to potentially ding a gong.

I did manage to put two rounds in my wife's butt because I am a little slow on the uptake and never seem to learn. I should mention, however, that my father and my wife are two different levels of authority. In my house I make all the decisions, and my wife just has to get used to living with it, unless she corrects them, which is usually about half the time. Also, I am a benevolent dictator, and never engage the wife in an argument without demanding a complete understanding of its impact on my bedroom privileges. Today, I am still allowed to have two rounds for my Fanner.

I fired two groups with the Stallion 45, using the sofa arm as a bench rest while picking off the bad guys during the climactic gunfight in a Hoppy Movie. Not being able to use caps because I did not want to wake up my wife, I could not quite remember all the neat guttural sounds we used to make as kids to simulate gunfire, so I probably looked and sounded like a jerk. I was also unable to steady my hand with a tumbler full of Bosco because of the hazard of reflux by doing anything except sleeping late at night. But the capgun worked well, and I still wonder why we had to grow up.

The Fanners were used to out-

draw Matt Dillon ... as if any of us would have trouble outdrawing Matt Dillon ... and came out of leather as fast as I remember they did when I was eight years old.

Generally recoil was non-existant, until I remembered that a kid named Jay saw a real gun shot and taught us all to jerk our arms up when pretending to shoot. So I tried it, and it had little or no effect on the accuracy of my stealth bullets.

Pricing

The collectors have a phrase called ... "mint-in-box" ... which always implied to me some nerdy kid got one in the fifties and did not play with it. You can spot a Stallion or a Fanner MIB for close to \$100 on eBay or at a Capgun Show. That's a long way from the unrecoverable day and age where the capguns sold for \$1.50 and the Marshal Gunbelt sold for \$2.00. Chalk that up to yet another drawback in having been the generation that went from the Mickey Mouse Club and Wonderama to the Rice Paddies.

Don't shoot yore eye out, kid! .

riding I had done. In fact, the Wranglers there, Adam, Annie, Russ, Rusty, and Danny, actually taught me more in three days than I had learned in the previous three years.

Grapevine Canyon is a working ranch, and, rather than devote too much travelogue to it here, lemme just refer you to the website ... www.gcranch.com. The rates include lodging, all the riding you can stand, and food that'll make yore socks go up and down. By the time I was done with my stay there, I had finally gotten comfortable in the saddle. I had spent about a half hour with Adam Mellot who un-did all my mistakes and built my collection to where it was supposed to be. I had ridden into the Apache Stronghold, and I had seen my horse take terrain I didn't know horses could take. Check out Adam's bio on their website, and you'll get the idea.

One of the wranglers, Annie Rentschler, led a ride that finally got me to a point for which I had searched for three years. When she raised her hand, we took off at a dead run. I couldn't believe it. I watched as the scenery went by and got into the rhythm of the saddle and was quite surprised to find it just about what I thought and dreamed it would be. Even more so, I felt comfortable doing it. You have to take a small test in order to be able to take the advanced rides they offer, and completing that was worth the trip alone ... not to mention having the saddle I made work out so well. Not the least of the gratifications was the fact every cent I spent there riding through a herd, whipping along the road in the High Sierra, and being fed so well was worth it. If you get out there, tell 'em The Capgun Kid says "howdy."

They offer advanced rides, basic rides, and a working ranch where you can learn everything from cowboy work skills to how to manage your existing or future horse via the horse camp they put on. Did I mention being fed so well?

Unfortunately for me, when I got back, I hit a big stop point in taking my riding any further. Nothing I could afford or find in Connecticut was going to take me any further toward my original goal of Mounted Shooting. The biggest nail in the coffin came when I shot in Massachusetts at the SASS Regional, and served as armourer for the mounted folks. Whilst I stood there and loaded their guns for them, I realized the riding part was not what was stopping me. Looking out over their assembly, it occurred to me I could never afford to own and transport a horse. Just the act of getting there and home again was blatantly beyond anything I could hope to achieve.

If that weren't bad enough, I ran into this SASS Feller named, TEX. The mounted folks invited him to shoot, and I loaned him my sixguns. As he whipped past and dusted the balloons with MY Uberti's, I thought that my ivory stocked sixguns were the only part of me that would ever get that far.

But there was one more thing; one I have now come to regard as an essential in any goal ... I did not know any of the folks in Mounted Shooting, and, being bereft of people was like being penniless amidst a lot

Back to my daughter's wedding day. In the time I spent working for the Knights Of Columbus, either I had done something right, or they were capable of a dreadful mistake, because in 2005 they promoted me, and I took a position in western Pennsylvania. We left two weeks after her wedding. As I packed up my truck, I had not only the notion of losing whatever contact with horses I thus far had, but had to leave all my shooting pards. Gloom, despair, and agony on me ...


Enter Andrea Barbarino and Eric Urbanowicz of The Silvercrest Equestrian Center just one town over from me, in Valencia, PA. I can't say this enough. If I have learned one single thing from this whole riding gamut, it is how badly you need people to do the things you want to do. Just do a Google search on their name and more than enough info will come up.

I signed up for some lessons and a trail ride or two simply because I wanted to keep some saddle time and did not really know how beyond the conventions of the stable. Then, inasmuch as there but for the grace of a God go I, in one simple conversation, I took an unexpected leap toward my goal of shooting at balloons. I remember the look on Andrea's face as we sat at her desk in her stable. I had just come off the Marvland Regional at Thurmont, and was describing what I saw when the Mounted folks ran new horses past some balloons on pylons and faked shooting at them with capguns.

Can you imagine that? The Capgun Kid comes all this way only to find horses being trained with Capguns!!!

Anyway, Andrea did not bat an evelash when I drew the diagram showing where pylons and balloons were and how I saw the horses being worked. She is a naturally attractive and athletic woman and an accomplished equestrian pro, and, at that moment, had that matter of fact look

In spite of this, I had finally come to the point where I had to admit I was at another dead end. I can't imagine how to meet the folks who run the Mounted Shooting clubs, nor how to even get a horse, let alone move it, to these shoots. They're probably as great a bunch of people as the folks I have been shooting with off my gun-cart for all these years, but they might as well be in a different world. It seems there is no way I could ever amass the wealth to sustain a horse, move it in a trailer, maintain it during an event, and compete affordably. I could not imagine somebody would have all that amassed, or that I could hook up with a group that would help get me started.

... Although ... when I described how an event is run, the logistics of travel, and competition and had her strap on my six-gun, there was this faint blaze in Andrea's eye ...

on her face when she nodded and told me this could be done. Just like that.

"We'll try Mojave. He's not affected by anything." She replied when I told her how horses got trained to get by the gunfire.

Silvercrest has the advantage of a well run stable and a lot of open land and arena space. Horse trailers, large rings, an open meadow, and a trail network. Not bad. They already had barrels, so all I needed was a couple of dollars here and there, to secure some bright, shiny, new orange pylons. She furnished that white plastic pipe you see all over the place, and I soon had the course set up. We decided to use the old Crossman single action BB gun with gas cartridges only. The report was actually close to what a horse hears with earmuffs on. I stopped just short of springing for earmuffs, and was a little leery of the reports of blanks on her property to start off with. So CO2 it was.

Andrea taught me how to put the shin guards on the horse, how to work him through the gunfire training, how to deal with quirks and peculiarities of a horse, as well as a whole host of other things with remarkable patience. She made me learn to Post, or ride in a trot, in spite of my clumsiness. As a matter of fact, here was the first instructor who was willing to bend all my sad-

dle time to a specific task at hand rather than riding for show, or just plain sucking up ring time for the same ol' same ol'. I was not riding to execute technique for no purpose, but rather was riding with one goal in mind. Mojave lived up to her word and was a great horse to ride.

Now, after four articles and six years, You'd think I'd have a lot of bubbly enthusiasm to write about here because I shot at a few balloons from a saddle I made atop a great horse, dressed authentically. Nope. The initial rush and feeling of accomplishment was there in force, but once it wore off, the feeling was surprisingly short of that exhilaration and was matter-of-fact. There was a sense of accomplishment, but that was by far overridden by the appreciation I had for Andrea and Silvercrest, and the knowledge I did not know where to go afterwards. What I remember most about banging away at those targets was I had stopped worrying about how to ride, and I began to just do it. No more thinking about it, no more intellectualizing over technique. I just rode the horse and shot the six-gun. Now, it was truly fun.

If anything, that was because of the type teacher Andrea is. No confusing sequence of instructions, no insistence. She knew when to interject and when to watch. Without being bossy, she instills confidence.



to leave at o'dark thirty to be there in time for the match. We opted to haul our fifth wheel down the day before and spend a quiet night on the range prior to the big match. release the safety on the auto pistol he had stolen), and was eventually hanged on November 20, 1903. The case is still controversial, with proponents for and against his guilt still giving passionate cases. The gunmen of the Johnson County War were imprisoned at Fort D. A. Russell in Cheyenne.

be just as good the 2nd time around, and the smaller class size meant more personal attention. We got to see the circus arrive and blossom. The big tent in the middle made the circus analogy appropriate.

On Thursday, the side matches began, starting with a six-stage warm-up match. The stages were short. One had 10 pistol shots and one shotgun. Another had seven rifle and four shotgun. After the 2nd or 3rd such stage, we realized something—the targets were pretty far away. Pistol targets averaged 10 yards and longer, and shotgun targets went from 10 to 20 yards. Rifle targets, of course, were even further out. One of the committee members replied to a "why" question with, "They're within SASS Guidelines." In the afternoon, the Plainsman match proved to be a step back in time in

more ways than one. It was filled with gimmicks, such as throwing a tomahawk on the clock for a bonus if it stuck, shooting a bow and arrow on the clock, and shooting at an angled pistol target in an attempt to break a clay bird with lead splatter.

We also realized we only thought the rifle targets had been distant. These were way out at Fort Mudge, including two clay birds on a stick that were bonus targets. I saw Evil

Roy, and he was quite happy about the distant targets. "I can hit them." The really good shooters aren't fazed by distant targets, of course. By the time this was over, we were ready for the meet and greet at the restored downtown Plains Hotel. Soon the 19th century lobby was filled with gentlemen wearing their barbecue guns and ladies wearing their finery. I wore my engraved ivory handled SASS Colts, and, appropriately, Cheyenne style holsters (by Lone Rider Leather) based on the one on the cover of "Packing Iron."

The Plains Hotel was a good place for this event. The lobby bar is well lighted and pleasant, with western memorabilia décor. A tour trolley gave cowboys and cowgirls a free tour of the historic downtown area of Cheyenne. We noted Tex and Cat Ballou had not taken advantage of the invitation to come heeled. Considering the inadvisability of going unheeled in the Old West, The Man With No Name and I took it upon ourselves to guard them (and our significant others, Connivin' Katie Jones and The Redhead respectively) against the lawless element, so we had an excellent dinner at the hotel.

The next morning, a color guard, led by Colonel William F. Cody (Terry Lane) began the opening cere-

monies. The color guard wore a variety of American military uniforms of the Old West era, and then the match started. We shot six stages a day in two shifts. The afternoon shift contended with considerable heat. Army medics from the local (Continued on page 72)

Army National Guard came by reminding us to drink water and Gatorade. I shot on a posse marshaled by Fort Hays Preacher, who had his entire family with him. His invoking the Lord's help didn't keep me from missing some of the more distant targets. I noted I wasn't alone. Ordinarily I can judge how well I'm doing by comparing my times to someone competitive in one of the categories that doesn't require percussion pistols, smoky powder, and Duelist shooting. I knew they should be shooting in the 20's, and no one was. Fort Hays Preacher was in the 30's mostly, shooting Gunfighter very well. This made me realize these stages weren't that

easy. The REALLY fast guys were still REALLY fast. J. T. Wild was shooting between 20 and 30 seconds, and Evil Roy was in the mid to low twenties consistently. The stages were very well designed without procedural traps or strange shooting orders. The stages were also all well designed from a safety standpoint.

That night in the big tent was casino night, run by Marshal Jack Murphy and Sandhill Ruston, with awards for the Tastiest Tart In The Territory and Dapperest Dan in Old Cheyenne. I would tell more about it, but we finished shooting about 30 seconds before the poker tournament started, and several people were having Margaritas in the bus until way after the deadline came and went. This was probably a plot to keep The Redhead out of the poker game!

By Saturday morning we were beginning to realize that stage times we would have considered non-competitive at END of TRAIL or Winter Range were competitive at these longer ranges. Most everyone slowed down and concentrated on the front sight the 2nd day. I saw very few train wrecks, but the trains were occasionally late. As I started pushing the gun cart down the hill to shoot stage 12 first, a contestant who had shot 7-12 on Friday warned me the shotgun knockdowns were really tough on 12. They were big cowboys, and you shot them at an angle. The last one was about 20 paces away at a 30° angle. That was scary for those of us without screw-in choke tubes and heavy field loads.

Fortunately, Deputy Cuny came down to look at it. He decided it was angled too far forward and adjusted it. Some of the shooters still had trouble with it, but I made sure the shotgun bead was on the upper third of the target and centered. It went down, not too smartly, but it was down before I could reload.

The shooting costume contest had a military category, which added a lot to the visual appeal of the match, with uniforms of all kinds, including a rare Marine Corps uniform on, who else, Mud Marine. Others ranged from Confederate to Mexican Punitive Expedition.

That night the Holiday Inn downtown hosted the best-dressed costume contest awards banquet. This had several advantages. Ladies could wear their finest ball gowns without having them ruined by dirt floors and weeds, and the indoor banquet had actual sit down service. Standing in lines was reserved for the bar, the appetizers, and the dessert bar.

The Redhead wore THE Dress from the Convention for the first time since the convention. Previous events had too much in the way of dirt and grass for a proper Victorian Lady to wear the ultimate Cinderella dress. Of course, I had forgotten how hard it was to get her into this dress and ready. It became apparent that 1860 Victorian ladies were expected to have their squadron of servants help her get it on and ready. Lacing her in, for example, took over an hour. We entered Best Dressed Couple, with me in my finest Texas Cavalry Regiment Commander's uniform, and her in THE Dress. Of course, I could have worn anything or nothing, and no one would have noticed. They were all looking at her.

The evening costume contest was well attended. Perhaps the fact presentations were not required brought out the shyer contestants. I noted last year's big winner of both the daytime and nighttime costume contest, William H. Bonny, was now a judge. This is what happens when you start winning a lot of costume contests. They told me he "volunteered." I understand. I've been "volunteered" before, too. Volunteered or drafted, he, and the other judges did an excellent job. Being a costume contest judge is tough, especially with the quality of contestants at this event. Buffalo Bill himself in the person of Terry Lane provided the Entertainment. He was the spitting image of Colonel Cody and his sales pitch for Cody, Wyoming was hilarious. It should be noted all of the stages were based on the legend of Buffalo Bill Cody. Buffalo Bill was the rock-star of his day, a genuine hero who had won the Medal of Honor and later became famous for "first scalp for Custer." It was as if Elvis had won the Medal of Honor. And Buffalo Bill is, of course, a revered figure in Wyoming, so basing the stages on his legend was more than appropriate.

The next morning, for those not sleeping in, came the couples event, the team event, and, of course, the shoot-off. Awards started at 1:30 and went mercifully fast. Each winner was given his due applause, but there was no dawdling involved. An improvement over last year was the drawing for the donated prizes was done when you registered, so no time was lost now. Evil Roy was first Overall and Regional Champion, and Sage Chick was Top female. Evil Roy is a Silver Senior, and Sage Chick is a Young Gun. Hmm. Sage Chick was from out of region, so Dixie Bell was Ladies Regional Champion, and Evil Roy was Men's Regional Champion.

Hell on Wheels went virtually flawlessly. There were no match DQs. Procedurals were rare, but due to the distant targets, so were clean matches. I counted only nine names called for clean matches, out of 318 shooters. The Cheyenne Regulators did their usual impressive job of putting on a match that went virtually without a hitch. Committee members I haven't mentioned yet: Assistant Match Directors—Breed and Fight'n Joe Baker, Administrative Goddess-Nevada Sweet, Assistant AG-Lizzie Walker, Head Cook and Bottle Washer—Two Choices, Sponsors—William Clark Quantrill, Top Gun Shoot Off—Wild Ben Raymond (all the way from Sioux City, Iowa), Long Range run by Executioner, Team event—Fight'n Joe Baker, Nevada Sweet, Couples Event run by Slowhand La Rue and Larkspur La Rue. The Buffalo Bill Historical Center helped with graphics and posters. Boy Scout Troop 216 provided brass pickup and garbage detail. I'll throw in special thanks to Lizzie Walker for her assistance with this article and author babysitting.

We didn't move the bus until Monday, so we watched the circus dismantle and move out. This is always a little poignant, especially after a really well run event, but the circus will return next year on Fourth of July weekend for another fine, memorable match. Drop by for Margaritas. We'll be in there. 🌲

Treading in the footsteps of Chiefs Geronimo and Victorio

Cilver City, New Mexico - July 18-20, 2008 – If I may take literary license with a catchy paraphrase ... 'A fiery horse with the speed of light, a cloud of dust, and a hearty 'Hi-yo, Silver City, away!'

The badlands north and south of the border from western Texas to eastern Arizona has seen more than its share of cowboy action. Folk heroes and dastardly villains were immortalized in dime store novels depicting the good and bad in the region. The lure of the Old West is as fascinating as it is timeless. Who of us as children didn't dress up like a cowboy or cowgirl and dream of catching those bad guys? Fantasy? Entertainment? You bet, and you can live it right here on the ranges at our 'imaginary' town of Fowler City, New Mexico Territory.

The site of Silver City was originally known as San Vicente de la Ciénega (St. Vincent of the Marsh), and prior to Anglo settlement, the valley served as an Apache campsite. In 1860, Anglo and Mexican prospectors appeared, and the quiet valley changed.

Silver City was founded in the summer of 1870, shortly after the discovery of silver ore deposits by Captain John M. Bullard and his brother James, just west of their farm at Chloride Flats. Following the silver strike, Captain Bullard

laid out the streets of the new Silver City on his former farm, and a bustling, rip-roarin' tent city quickly sprang to life. In less than a year, eighty buildings had been constructed, and in 1871 Silver City became the seat of Grant County. Unfortunately, Captain Bullard never lived to see the full fruits of his efforts, as he was killed in a confrontation with Apache raiders less than a year later.

At the time, all of southwestern New Mexico was plagued by Apache raids. Bands of these fierce warriors roamed the area, led by famous chiefs such as Chato, Cochise, Geronimo,

Mangas Coloradas (Red Sleeves), Nana, Natchez, and Victorio. Because of the rough terrain and strategic lookout points, the impenetrable Gila Wilderness area was an important stronghold where the Apaches felt safe from US Army pursuit.

Butch Cassidy and the Wild Bunch were familiar with every saloon and "soiled dove" in Silver City. Between robberies, they worked (Continued on next page)

Although the Earps passed through on their way to Tombstone, they bypassed Silver City to avoid Deputy Dan Tucker on their retreating pilgrimage to California.

the State shoot to take part in the Gila Rangers regular two-day weekend match. As the state event weekend approached, the campground filled, the anticipation grew, and the festivities began in earnest.

Capt. Eli McDaniel, a club officer for 10 years, remarked, "We're glad and excited to see such a positive turnout from throughout this state and from neighboring Arizona and Texas. We even had shooters from as far a-field as Oklahoma, South Dakota, and North Carolina." One father/son pair, Okie Lawdog, SASS #79588, and his Buckaroo sidekick Hawkeye Okie, SASS #79590, made the 1600 mile round trip just for this match. They seemed to kibitz at every opportunity ... except on the firing line, where serious business was at hand. "There's a lot of camaraderie and enthusiasm in this group." Captain Eli observed ... Lots of close-up new steel targets and easily re-settable shotgun knockdowns were homegrown for the occasion. And, the ranges all had a theme ... Main Street, The Wicked Sisters Cantina and Corral, The Lost Mind, Boot Hill Cemetery, The Ole Homestead, and Fort Harry Luck. The latter was named in honor of a well -known and well traveled friend recently passed.

Shooters had a good laugh at a Hanging Tree Cemetery display created by Attitude Annie, SASS #18031, where gravestones mark the unfortunate few who wandered into town, but never made it out. One lone desperado dangled from the withered tree standing on a box, silently awaiting the coup de grâce. In all the excitement,... we forgot about him and he's

Saturday and Sunday's lunch, as well as the Saturday night dinner were on the house for this match. On Saturday evening, shooters were entertained with DJ selections from Old West movies and classic country singers. Even banjos and fiddles came out at the campfire rendezvous performed by Grizzly Adams, SASS #3674, and a Young Gun shooter from North Carolina known only as Fiddlin' A. Round, SASS #78557.

As competitors enjoyed a well earned late lunch on Sunday, they awaited the awards ceremony, and the infamous posse shoot. destruction of a long row of 25 clay birds individually suspended from fishing line was the goal for posse bragging rights. When the posses went for their shotguns, they were advised that only their revolvers were allowed on the line. Later, as they posses boasted about their blue rock conquests, the awards ceremonies began with a final culinary treat ... an Ice Cream Social under the Big Top to set the mood for cheering the top shooters getting their awards.

A group of nine competitors cleaned the 12 stages and were awarded personal certificates. They would later find a hand-made and prized Clean Match Scarf Slide in their mailbox for their efforts, courtesy of the artistry of Captain Eli. Trophies, medals, and certificates were awarded to category winners regardless of state and were also awarded to the top three New Mexicans in each category.

As an annual shoot for the Gila Rangers, Southwest Border Dispute grew out of an imaginary land boundary ruckus between neighboring states. It seemed like everyone wanted a piece of New Mexico. So as part of this match, any state with 10+ shooters represented had the top 10 scores added to see which state could amass the lowest overall. Being the

state shoot, the New Mexicans went all out to claim the award.

Many of us grew up with Hopalong Cassidy, Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, and other western and frontier icons as our heroes. Riding the west with the Lone Ranger taught us right from wrong, and to always do what was right. The world seemed so simple then ... didn't it? So pony up ladies and gents, boys and girls – it's a grand ride! It's the Cowboy way!

SASS OREGON STATE CHAMPIONSHIP AND 19TH ANNUAL SHOOTOUT AT SADDLE BUTTE

CHEDD, OREGON - Early Morning, 15 August, 2008. The gates to the Albany Rifle and Pistol Club Range are thrown open by members of the Oregon Old West Shooting Society and the first of 224 shooters from Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Utah, and Hawaii begin streaming in toward the huge 120 by 40 foot, White "Bigtop" Tent. These cowboys and cowgirls are joined by 21 different vendors, as well as stagecoaches, chuck wagons, 90 RV's and campers/trailers, and, oddly enough, a 1901 Curved-Dash Oldsmobile horseless carriage built by Just Bill, SASS #16394. The 2008 SASS Oregon State Championship and 19th Annual "Shootout at Saddle Butte" has begun!

Every annual match presented by the folks of the Oregon Old West Shooting Society has had a "theme," and this year was no different. The 2008 Oregon State Match was built around the truth and legends of William F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody, and his wildly popular

traveling shows, "Buffalo Bill's Wild West." Though Cody gained his reputation by working as a buffalo hunter for the Kansas-Pacific Railroad in 1867, no buffalo were killed, injured, or even INSULTED in this match.

Known the world over as a "showman," Bill Cody was also the recipient of the Medal of Honor, awarded for "gallantry in action" as a civilian scout with the 3rd Cavalry Regiment in 1872. (The government revoked it in 1917, 24

days after Cody's death as he was a civilian at the time it was earned). Cody's "Buffalo Bill's Wild West," opening in 1883, attempted to show "life on the plains" with Indian attacks, stagecoaches, trick riders, and amazing exhibition shooting.

Those that camped out on the vast grassy plains of "Saddle Butte" this year, as well as those who drove in from their motels early enough, were treated to the morning aromas of a great Old West Breakfast cooking over the fires of Isaac Scrambler Day's, SASS #19637, Dutch Oven Chuck Wagon, featuring my favorites,

biscuits and gravy, as well as blueberry pancakes! (And was that a pot of Arbuckles Coffee brewing up in that battered camp pot?) Heaven! And, all for a small donation each morning.

Side matches were shot on Friday and consisted of Long Range Rifle targets for Single Shot, Rifle Caliber, and Pistol Caliber. Speed Pistol, Rifle, and Shotgun; Need for Speed; Cowboy Trap; and a Plainsman Event were also presented. Friday was also the day to attend the afternoon shooting school put on by Doc Shapiro, SASS #31526, and Badlands Bud, SASS #15821.

Saturday morning's opening ceremonies kicked off with a recording of the Star Spangled Banner played by Buffalo Bill's own band, featuring their slightly different version, which was arranged before the anthem became official in 1931.

The Oregon Old West Shooting Society has a unique range, as over half of the berms are almost com-

pletely protected from the elements by steel buildings covering 7 of the 12 firing points. When you consider Oregon's unpredictable weather, this can be a VERY good thing. Twelve main stages were shot, six on Saturday and six on Sunday. They were well laid out with the shooting sequences just complex enough to make you think, but not TOO hard! The Match Theme was kept alive throughout all 12 stages, both with the story lines and the life-size wooden props. There were

wooden buffalo, horses, camels, elk, rabbits, and coyotes.





Unlike previous years, the 2008 Shootout was NOT a "lost brass



Then, amid much fanfare, a mismatched pair of Zombies appeared through the "smoke" onto the stage and began cavorting to the strains of that classic piece of music: "Thriller." These guys were REALLY scary ... Several "buckaroos" headed for the tall and uncut! ... I happen to know that as I was with them! (My excuse is I thought it was one of my four exwives and her brother, coming to get me ... I should have known she

wouldn't fly all the way from Florida – not with the price of brooms being what they are!) When the "Zombies" were stripped of their costumes, they turned out to be Match Director, Mid Valley Drifter and Ol' #4, SASS #41004. The awards ceremony kinda went downhill from there ... (#4 was asked several times to put his mask back on ...)

Plaques were awarded five places deep, and by mid-afternoon, tired and happy cow folks, some clutching their awards, some lucky folks clutching new guns, reloading presses, spurs, amazing metal artwork, or just clutching each other, drifted off into the Oregon sunset. ...

A Spotlight on SASS Clubs Around the Country

HISTORY

The Club started way back in 1985 when Weewahootee and a handful of friends decided they'd like to try their hand at this "new" shooting discipline of Cowboy Action Shooting TM . They prevailed upon the folks at the Central Florida Rifle and Pistol Club, located just outside Orlando, to allow them to shoot their new "game."

The Rifle and Pistol Club permitted them to set up on the club's Action Range. The WVC got busy and put together a number of permanent stage fronts that could be used by the cowboys as well as the other shooting disciplines, such as USPC, Tactical 3 Gun, and IDPA.

Right from the start, Weewahootee decided he wanted the Cowboy Action Shooters to have FUN!!! He wanted targets most folks could hit, so they made them big and close. He didn't want mindnumbing shooting sequences, so they designed them fast, fun, and simple ... but NEVER boring. He also wanted the winners decided by their shooting skills, not by some lucky toss of a hat or tomahawk ... so any non-shooting stuff is done OFF THE CLOCK. All matches are scored on total time ... not rank points. Weewahootee calls this giving shooters a "Shooters' Shoot."

Through the years, the WVC has constructed a mission, a "sporting house," a train depot, and a town section. They supplement these permanent stages with a variety of portable stages they rotate monthly to provide the club's usual six shooting stages. For their annual match, they expand their offering to a full ten stages.

I mentioned hurricanes have caused the club some special headaches through the years. In one spectacular year, 2004, Hurricanes Charlie, Frances, and Jeanne blew down their permanent stages ... which had to be rebuilt in just three months. As TG Black Diamond Doug says, "That's just one of the drawbacks of living in Paradise." Salsa Sure Shot was the gal who rallied the Last Stand Committee members and recruited skilled volunteers to get the job done ... when other folks doubted it would happen. I'm told it all wound up even nicer than before the storms. This year,

Hurricane Fay didn't do any serious damage, but as of this writing (early September) there's still a hunk of hurricane season to go.

As SASS has grown, so has the WVC. They currently have over 40 active members, some of whom, like Sam Westley Hardman, are very involved in club operations. Another subgroup, known as the Last Stand Committee, consists of a dozen shooters from WVC and other area clubs. Each year these folks give their blood, sweat, and tears, along with a host of volunteers, to organize and operate the Florida State Championship Match known as the "Last Stand," the WVC's annual match each January.

INTERESTING STUFF

Like many Clubs, the WVC hears occasional complaints about shooting noise from housing developments popping up nearby. They feel there's little to worry about, however, since the Orange County Sheriff's Shooting Range is adjacent to theirs.

The pride and joy of the WVC's year is their annual match, "The Last Stand." Not only is this match the Florida State Championship, but it's also regarded as a key shoot for many national and international Cowboy Action Shooters. In past

years, such notables as Evil Roy, Holy Terror, China Camp, Lefty Longridge, Lassiter, Island Girl, Lead Dispenser, and Tequila have made it a point to shoot it.

One of the reasons the match fills up fast (limited to 300 shooters) is in addition to the great stages, fun off-the-range events, and beautiful weather, there's also the unique "Sole Survivor Shootoff" (SSS) on Sunday, which pits the top 32 shooters, regardless of age, sex, or category in a series of man-onman competitions using three stages, lots of knckdown targets, and lots of movement until the SOLE SURVIVOR is determined. They also have "Last Lady Standing" and "Last Junior Standing" versions of the shoot-off to assure ladies and young shooters can take part in the fun.

The WVC and Last Stand Committee also take pride in the various unusual props they provide to make The Last Stand so special. They've pioneered the technique called "turf painting" in which they create rivers, canyons, and grave-yards, using spray paints, rocks, and bushes to achieve very interesting

and realistic effects.

Always unique is Stage #8, which has been decked out through the years with very professional props like the river and raft from Rooster Cogburn, the graveyard from the closing scene in The Good, The Bad and The Ugly, a riverboat from Maverick, and the OK Corral from Tombstone. These outstanding creations are produced annually by The Last Stand committee members Stumpy, Shiloh Jasper Green, and Ol' Glor-e and a handful of talented volunteers.

Speaking of members, the WVC boasts such top shooters as Dang It Dan and his missus, Dang It's Darlin', Santa Fe River Stan, Arcadia Outlaw, Gun Dawg, and upand-coming Junior shooter, Bad Lands Drifter, who at 15 is showing lots of Florida shooters how the game is played.

Another notable member is Colonel Dan, founder of the Stealth Bullet Shooting Society (SBSS) (of which I'm the Regimental Punka Walla) and who's widely known (at least in Central Florida) as "The Cleanest-Shootin' Man in the West." Col Dan proudly bears SBSS #1.

Did I mention the Last Stand Committee also likes to promote costuming? At their annual, they always provide a theme and invite all attendees to wear costumes to go along with that theme. Tombstone was the 2008 theme with nifty prizes for shooters attired as Doc and The Earps. John Wayne will be the 2009 theme, so everyone is invited to dress as The Duke or one of his costars in any of his classic flicks.


Another feature shooters at the 2009 Last Stand can take part in is a four-stage Wild Bunch Match to be held after the Main Match shooting on Friday and Saturday. For those lacking all the gear, plans are in the works to have a 1911 and a '97 on loan. Details are on the Web Site: www.laststand.org.

A lot of imagination and genuine hard work go into the running of a major annual match like The Last Stand, just as it does to run an active club like the Weewahootee Vigilance Committee. But the proof, as they say, is in the pudding ... and this pudding tastes sweet.

STAGING: Two revolvers loaded with five rounds each and holstered. Rifle loaded with eight rounds and staged on either center table, BUT NOT THE POKER TABLE. Shotgun staged open and empty on either end table.

LINE: I'LL FIGHT YOU RIGHT NOW!!!

SEQUENCE: Standing at table where shotgun is staged, hands hanging straight to your side, not touching guns. Say line. At buzzer, draw first revolver and engage the nearest R/P target with five rounds. Holster. Pick up shotgun and knock down the our shotgun targets at that position. Take open and empty shotgun to table where rifle is staged. Place shotgun on table, pick up rifle, and put two rounds in any order on each of the rifle targets. Return open, empty rifle to table. Pick up shotgun and move to other end table. Place shotgun down. Draw second revolver and engage the nearest R/P target with five rounds. Holster. Pick up shotgun and knock down the four shotgun targets at that position. Place open, empty shotgun on table. Go back and pick up rifle. Move behind the Poker Table. Then, while standing, hold rifle to load it with six rounds (you may NOT place or support rifle on table to load it). Engage the four rifle targets and the two R/P targets.

TRAIL 2006, which is a big hit with exhibitors as well as the public, espefuture Buckaroos Buckarettes and their mommas who let daddy gun shop while they watch the video. It is really fun to watch their eyes grow big when they see someone their age shooting and doing well. The reaction is even greater when they hear the words granddaughter and World Champion used

when Holy Terror shoots. And the ladies eat it up when one of their own shoots better than a male competitor.

Club members at the table get a lot of enjoyment talking to visitors, answering questions, and showing off their Bar-B-Que rigs (barbeque is big medicine in the Memphis area in case you did not know). After "Are your guns REAL?" the most often asked questions relate to required gear and cost. One member explains that he got his start by trading at a gun show a couple of years ago.
