he first END of TRAIL was hosted in beautiful Coto de Caza by the initial Wild Bunch, led by Gordon Davis (l) (later known as Diamond Jim Chisholm), Harper Creigh (r) (later known as Judge Roy Bean), and Bill Hahn (later known as Moss Horn). Of these three, only the Judge, SASS #1, has survived as a member of the Wild Bunch and is still active in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup>. General US Grant, SASS #2, was instrumental in establishing the initial prize pool, and as President of SASS, like the Judge, is still very much involved.



go to their local monthly Cowboy Action matches are the ones who stay with SASS the longest. The camaraderie, excitement, and fun found at these matches are the things that hold everyone's interest and keep them coming back. As has been stated many times, clubs are the backbone of SASS. When Cowboy Action clubs began springing up around he country, our membership began an impressive growth. For the first several years, SASS membership stagnated at around 5000 members, but when clubs began coming on line, membership increased by thousands each year ... until today we're issuing badges in the 90000+ range!


Many SASS members and local club match directors only shoot at their local club matches ... and that's too bad. They're missing a big part of what it means to be SASS.

Whether you're the club champion or simply one of the ones who plays the game every month, going to "away" matches is a way to test your skills against a larger community ... and there are some terrific competitors out there! But, testing your skills against strangers is only a small part of going to neighboring club shoots and other nearby annual matches. These matches are an opportunity to make new friends!

As comfortable as it is for many,

the last thing one wants to do when going to a match away from one's home range is to shoot with other members of your home club! The whole idea is to get to know new shooters! If you want to pair up with long distance friends you only see once a year, that's one thing; but otherwise, shoot on a posse with folks you don't know. You just might develop some new "best friends!

As wonderful as other local annual matches might be, State and Regional Championships are a real step up! Generally, these matches are larger, and most are well organized. They can be an education, exposing you to new targets, new props, new procedures to expedite the shooting, new ways to process match prizes, and different *(Continued on next page)*

ways to hold a banquet, provide entertainment, and present the awards. The SASS Handbook and RO materials have gone a long way toward making the rules and the range operations consistent wherever one goes, so there are no real surprises at these away matches, but many good (and sometimes not so good) ideas are introduced along the way that can make your local matches better.

The ultimate matches have proven to be the US National Championship, Winter Range, and the SASS World Championships, END of TRAIL. These prestigious matches showcase the best of the best in match operations and in the level of talent among the competitors. In both cases the shooting is "easy," the fun factor is high, and the production is awe-inspiring. World-class competitors show the rest of us how it's done! But, you don't have to be a top competitor to participate in these matches as a competitor ... just safe. 98% of the competitors at these matches have no chance of winning ... so they had all better be having a great time ... otherwise, there would be no reason to attend!

In the past few years, another set of matches have come to the fore—international competitions. Canada, Australia, and New Zealand have held National Championships and now the Europeans are doing the same. In additional to National Championships, there is also a European Championship, Days of Truth, which moves around each year as determined by the European Board of Representatives. Next year, Days of Truth will be held in Hungary ... and it promises to be a good one! For the adventurous, these matches are wonderful experiences!

Listening to familiar country music sung in Czech, or watching western (cowboy) dancers who don't speak a word of English perform, or listening to excuses for not shooting well in a dozen different languages is a real treat! Though the languages are different, Cowboy Action and shooting provide a common language understood by all. Fortunately for American Cowboy Action Shooters, English is a common language in Europe and is often used to facilitate communication for cowboys of different nationalities. And, the range commands are all 100% right out of the RO manuals!

Traveling with guns can be an adventure. I've heard a few horror

stories, but I've never lost any guns or failed to get my guns to a match. My luggage (including the guns) has been delayed a few times, but they always show up. Because of the nature of firearms, airlines and government personnel generally give them special attention in transit. They might get stolen, but they don't get "lost!" It's important for you to know the rules and regulations for transporting and importing firearms. Every airline is potentially different, and airline personnel often don't know their own regulations. Use the Internet and take a copy of the appropriate regulations with you! If traveling internationally, do your homework ... getting your guns into a foreign country and them back into the US requires specific paperwork ... and that paperwork varies by country.

But what about ammo? Airlines have imposed an arbitrary limit of 11 pounds of appropriately packaged ammo per person. Unless you're shooting .32s and lightly loaded 20- gauge ammo, 11 pounds in not nearly enough! I once figured I needed close to 28 pounds for a 12-stage match. Ammo is not considered hazardous material, and less than something like 65 pounds can be shipped surface ... talk to your shipper about their regulations. Match Directors or some of those friends you've been cultivating over the years will often be in a position to receive your ammo shipment.

Shipping ammo overseas is a different matter. I discovered I needed to be "an exporter" to ship my match ammo to Canada! Once again, there's more than one way to get ammo overseas ... talk to your host and to some of those new "best friends" you've developed over the years ... you needs can be met with a little help from your friends!

I've been shooting Cowboy Action for 30 years now. My hands still get shaky with excitement every time I step to the line. To say I have a great time every time I shoot a match would be an understatement ... but that excitement isn't the whole story, not by a long shot. Cat and I have friends, good friends, all over the country and around the world! The big matches, both here and abroad, are opportunities to keep these friendships alive, and are to be treasured. So, don't miss out-pack your bags, board the animals, and go to a match someplace new. I think you'll like it! 🦊

Rich with pioneer heritage, New Mexico became the first state in 2011 to proclaim July 23, 2011 the National Day of the Cowboy (NDOC), thanks to volunteer, Richard Beal of Beal's Cowboy Buckles. Richard enlisted the support of NM Representative Brian Egolf, who co-sponsored the resolution in the legislature, securing passage in a 70-0 vote March 2nd.

Richard was present in the legislature and reported, "We did it! Representative Egolf talked about the history of NDOC and its importance. The clerk read the resolution, then about 20 legislators stood and told stories about how their grandfather had been a cowboy, or they were a rodeo queen back in the day, etc. Each one thanked Egolf for doing this and honoring New Mexico's cowboys. At the end, they presented NDOC with the official certificate, and the entire legislature sang *Home on the Range*."

The following Monday, March 7, Texas became the second state to pass the resolution, when the Texas State Senate voted in Austin. State Senator, Jeff Wentworth, invited me to attend the ceremony, and thanks to generous donors, I was in the Senate Chamber when our efforts were lauded by Wentworth and Texas Lieutenant Governor David

Dewhurst. Texas set a precedent and raised the bar in passing the resolution for two years. A few days later, Doc Stovall secured a proclamation from the Governor of Georgia. Internationally, Judi Wilson of the Canadian Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame, and Bronco Bill Cameron of the Canadian Golden Memories Fan Club, are working for passage in Canada's Parliament.

The 2011 resolution is different from previous years. We modify the words a bit every year to adjust statistics such as how many people attend rodeo. This year, however, we added three things; a statement listing preservation related organizations, a phrase regarding the Cowboy Code of Conduct, and, a reference to the cowboy's horse.

One new segments reads— "Whereas membership and participation in the National Day of the Cowboy Organization, **Single Action Shooting Society**, Working Ranch Rodeo Association, Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association, American Quarter Horse Association, Pro Rodeo Cowboys Association, Championship Bull Riding, Women's Pro Rodeo, the Western Music Association, and other organizations that encompass the livelihood of the cowboy, continues to expand both nationally and internationally;"

Also modified was, "Whereas the Cowboy is central figure in literature, etc.," to read, "Whereas the Cowboy **and his horse** are a central figure in literature, etc." Then too, people frequently express a conviction we should highlight the Cowboy Code of Conduct to enhance its relevance as a guideline for personal behavior. Thus, we added, "Whereas


the core values expressed within the Cowboy Code of Conduct continue to inspire the pursuit of the highest caliber of personal integrity;"

These changes were implemented to help legislators and others see this movement is not limited to the National Day of the Cowboy organization. There are hundreds of preservation and cowboy culture organizations, many with international members and chapters, who support a day of honor for this heritage and who will benefit from its passage. Although not all states pass the resolution exactly as we propose it, the important thing is to get as many states as possible to pass it and to agree the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday every July is a day to honor Cowboys, Cowgirls, and pioneer heritage.

It's not a complicated process and never involves petitions or letter campaigns. Volunteers are listed by state on the NDOC website's "Organization" section.

The NDOC organization is a 501(c)3, always in need of volunteers and donations. Hancock, asked if I would give a description of the spurs that we have made for this year's SASS Memorial Chapel's Fundraiser drawing to be held in Vegas at the SASS Convention this coming December.

The Praying Cowboy motif has stayed the same as the five pair we made for the 2010 fundraiser. The heel band is the same as well. It is the same one August Buermann used for his 'Lone Star' spurs, but that is where the similarity ends. We have used an older style diamond shaped shank for those pairs we patterned after Mr. Buermann's No. 95 and No. 95X spurs. We've added a small Texas Star on the shank, and the rowel we've chosen is what we'd call a sunset style. These rowels have a terrific sound and are very nice looking. We've accented the rowels with Spanish/ Mexican style jingle bobs, an older design as well, and we've added brass heel chains. As was the case for the five pair of spurs we made last year for the fundraiser, we will only be making five pair just like this. 



shooter realize they have loaded too many rounds and safely ejects those rounds, it's a no call. Should the shooter fire more rounds than called for in the stage, it would be a "P" for using ammunition that was illegally acquired.

The rule has not been uniformly applied in the past, so it's time to fix it and be fair for all.

The RO Committee feels this is the right thing to do, but also feel it is beyond the scope of their Committee charge and asked the Wild Bunch to intervene.

### A Postscript for Tuolumne Lawman's Excellent Article on the 1836 Colt Paterson

Tuolumne Lawman's article in the April 2011 issue accurately described the effective use of the Paterson Colt by the Texas Rangers in their battles with Comanche warriors. An interesting sideline, however, was that the Colt Patterson was introduced in Texas by the purchase of 180 Patersons from Colt by the Texas Navy in 1839. Texas Ranger Captain Jack Hays obtained his first supply of Patersons from the Texas Navy after the Navy was decommissioned in 1843. ### Soldadera Photo in April Edition

I always read Captain George Baylor's articles (Dispatches from Camp Baylor), but his recent article "Wild Bunch for Dummies" I read with special interest.

The Mexican Revolution, especially as it relates to the Texas border, has long been a fascination of mine. The Revolution, played out in battle after battle along the border, was eagerly viewed by many curious onlookers on the American side. (Sadly, we may repeat this macabre viewing of the violence across the border if the Mexican government can't gain the upper hand in today's drug wars ...)

The Mexican Revolution was popular with tourists and souvenir hunters. These "brave" people ventured across the border whenever the fighting stopped to collect photos and visit the famous scenes. Bars were packed with visitors; bullfights were staged between the battles; thousands and thousands of picture postcards-many of which still exist—were brought back across the border. Some of the scenes shown in the photos were staged, but there were quite a few brutal scenes available, too.

One of the visitors to the Mexican border during this period was the daughter of an El Paso restauranteur. Herlinda Wong Chu was a member of the Chinese family that owned The American Kitchen and other restaurants in El Paso. During her brief visit, she donned a bandolier, pistol belt, a brace of pistols, and a hat; then holding binoculars and a rifle, she had her picture taken before a pockmarked wall. Captain George Baylor included it in his article, page 41, #4. The photo has become an iconic photo of the Mexican Revolution-but it is NOT a photo of a Mexican soldadera. She was a ... tourist! I expect herd causalities would have been the main source. Just what

would have been the cowboy diet and calorie count?

Howdy Lue Dee Kriss:

You had a couple thoughtful questions in your letter. Here's what usually went on during a cattle drive:

The bean pot was usually a 12 -16" cast iron Dutch Oven, not much different than the Lodge cast iron we cook with today. Since the normal cowboy-to-cow ratio on a drive was 1/300-400, it didn't require too large a pot to hold enough beans to feed a hungry trail crew. The normal chuck wagon was designed to handle 10-12 men so, presuming the drive had just one, the crew would not be real big.


Regarding meat, herd casualties were the main source of beef as you suspected, but any wild game Cookie or the drovers harvested became part of the day's menu. Bacon and salt pork, which kept for some time, filled in the rest of the meat needs.

Drovers worked hard throughout the drives, and calorie counting was out of the question. A piece of meat, a couple ladles of beans (usually pinto), and a couple freshmade biscuits was pretty much the standard mealtime fare on the trail, though canned goods became available in the later years and were used (sparingly, due to their weight) by Cookies. A good cup of strong Arbuckle's coffee washed it all down.





The other day, one of our good Cowboy Action buddies, M.T. Stetson, told us about a great chicken chili his wife makes on occasion. He says a bowl of chicken chili and a platter of buttermilk biscuits with clover honey are just about the favorite supper at their ranch.

Our meal this month is a "breed apart" as they say ... Dutch Oven-cooked Cornish Game Hens. These tasty little birds are a cross between White Rock hens and Cornish hens that were developed

by the Makowsky family of Connecticut back in the '50s, in order to provide a single-serving chicken with mostly white meat. Whatever their origin, they're fun to prepare for your cowboys who love to brag that they "ate a whole chicken last night." You can easily fit two

of them in your 12" Dutch Oven, and another two in your 10" Dutch Oven if you truss 'em up with a bit of baling twine.

We like the flavor of garlic, so our recipe (originated by one of our local magistrates, Judge U. Harshly) calls for abundant use of that yummy allium to make these birds even tastier. The scent of cooking garlic will bring in lots of your campground neighbors willing to sample your supper.

We like to use the preroasted garlic we find on

the bulk olive bar at our nearby supermarket, but you can use fresh garlic cloves or even minced garlic from the jar if you prefer. Judge Harshly's

#### Garlic Birds & Taters Ingredients

### Rock Cornish Game Hens

Garlic cloves (or equivalent)

- 6 Medium Potatoes, cubed
- Olive or Vegetable Oil
- Ground Sage to taste
- Salt and Pepper to taste
- Can of Chicken Broth
   Large can of Peach Halves
- Directions
- Wash your birds and pat them dry. Stuff a bunch of garlic into each bird's cavity.
- Rub outside of birds with oil.
- Sprinkle on spices.
- Cut taters into 1" cubes.
- Make a foil pouch to hold your
- taters. Wrap the taters in the pouch with

- some of your garlic, some oil, and seasonings.
- Put about a cup of Chicken Broth in the bottom of your Dutch Oven.
- Place a trivet of some sort in your Dutch Oven to keep the birds off the bottom but still provide moisture while cooking.
- Put the birds, breast up, in your Dutch Oven.
- Nestle your taters alongside your birds.
- Place your Dutch Oven on about 8-10 glowing coals.
- Cover and put 15-20 more coals on the lid.
- Cook your supper for about 45 minutes or until done.
- Put one bird and a bunch of taters on each cowboy's plate.
- Serve peaches in small bowls.

Let's admit it: Cookie never heard of Rock Cornish Game Hens ... but he sure would have chowed down on them if he had! .

studied posse lists, found pictures and videos of the Bar 3, checked scores from last year's match, anything I could get my hands on. To say I was getting excited is an understatement.

It's about a 15 hour drive from where I live in Colorado to the Bar 3, so the plan was to leave after work on Tuesday and make it as far as we could that night. Miz Grizz said I wouldn't make it past noon in the office, so I stuck it out until 1:00 P.M. simply out of orneriness. I got home, called Mom, and staged all my gear in the garage so I could throw it in her car when she got there. She'd been expecting me to call early and was ready to go. While I was waiting, I stared at




The Saturday evening banquet theme was the Roaring 20s. Here T-Bone Dooley demonstrates how to use a Thompson machine gun for fun and profit.

the pile of gear and went through a mental checklist to make sure I had everything. Yup—got my cart, ammo, leather, hats, suitcase, wait a darn minute, where are the GUNS!? We got the car packed, including the guns, and set off.

As the miles rolled by at 70+ mph, I saw long-abandoned Stuckey's and Nickerson Farms buildings on the side of the interstate. These were the stage stops of the 1960s, and I remembered many trips across the prairie in the old Ford Fairlane wagon. I imagined the stage stops of the Old West must have been similar, welcoming tired, dirty, and sometimes cranky travelers. I tried unsuccessfully to remember the average speed of a horse drawn stage coach. 

### **AIMLESS ANNIE** SASS Regulator & Life Member #6890

imless Annie became a member of the A Texican Rangers in 1994. The early attraction was the historic firearms. Aimless was a proficient shooter and helped lay groundwork for the Lady Duelist category. But, Aimless Annie soon found her niche in the SASS arena.

She began using her journalism skills to promote the sport she loved and the organization in which she believed. In addition to covering events for The Cowboy Chronicle, Aimless used her position as Contributing Editor for Women & Guns magazine, to bring national recognition to our

modern day Cowgirls.

After years of travel, writing stories, and covering SASS events for numerous publications, Aimless decided to record the legacy of the SASS women for posterity. In 2000, she authored the now classic book, Cowgirl Action Shooting-Women of SASS. The slick publication is chock-full of wonderful photos, information, and anecdotes, dating from the very first female participants in the sport.

Aimless Annie taught the popular "Women of SASS" seminars for several years at the SASS Las Vegas Convention. Back home in Texas, she was featured in a 2002 television show, The Hill *Country Reporter*. Acting as a goodwill ambassador for the sport, she guided the show's host through a local SASS match and sat for a spirited "question & answer" segment, expounding on the

### **DEADWOOD STAN** SASS Regulator & Life Member #7275

eadwood Stan joined SASS in D 1995. He started Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> at Big Rock, Indiana where he helped South Paw II with the shoots and was ultimately made a member of Big Rock's Defiled Bunch. Deadwood, along with Lassiter, formed the Big Irons, starting with 25 members and growing to over 100. Deadwood was the Big Irons' founding president and is still president.



After the first Trails of August, Middletown Sportsman's Club (Ohio) asked Deadwood and the Big Irons to become responsible for the match. The name was changed to Guns of August. With Deadwood as ramrod, it went from being almost kicked out of Middletown to the club's 3rd largest event. Guns of August started as a two-day shooting event and soon became the SASS State Championship. It later became the SASS Midwest Regional. This Regional has been recognized as one of SASS' "Shoot of the Year" matches.

Deadwood, along with Blue River Bob, started the Modoc, Indiana SASS shoot. Deadwood was a founding officer in the NCOWS Posse Great Lakes Fright and Mining Co. and helped the Miami Cowboys get started. He was also busy attending shoots and shows around the United States promoting SASS.

Even though winning has never been his main goal, Deadwood Stan has had success on the shooting range. He won the Kentucky State 2000 Frontier Cartridge Category, the Kentucky 2000 Pocket Pistol Side Match, the 2001 Big Rock Roundup Frontier Cartridge Category, the NCOWS Eastern Regional Blackpowder Duelist Category, the 2001 NCOWS Blackpowder Duelist Category, the 2003 and 2004 Wyoming Pocket Pistol Side Match, and the Smoke in the Valley 2004 Frontier Traditional Category.

Deadwood worked for Taylor's & Co. for five years doing cowboy shoots and shows and for the last two years has worked full time for Chiappa Firearms. A.

### **DEAF LAWS** SASS Regulator & Life Member #6889

lifelong gun owner and collector, Deaf began Cowboy Action Shoot- $\operatorname{Aing^{TM}}$  in 1994 at a Texas Hill Country shooting club called the Texican Rangers.

SASS had just begun to refine and guide our sport on a national level, striving for a universal playing field and common rules. Early on, a few independent Texans resisted affiliation with the California-based group. Deaf Laws stepped up to bridge the gap and went on to become one of the first SASS Territorial Governors. He attended the inaugural TG meeting in Las Vegas in 1996 and helped establish early guidelines for the group.


Meanwhile, Deaf was also a proficient shooter. He won many local matches before venturing to END of TRAIL to compete on a national level. Deaf always held his own in the Senior Category against much younger cowboys, but he rose to the top for the first time in 1999 as the first ever World Champion Elder Statesman. It was a feat he would repeat the following year, in 2000.

For years, Deaf Laws and his wife (Aimless Annie) traveled the

SASS trail, promoting and supporting matches from coast to coast. Deaf became a fixture among the outstanding Senior shooters. But, his interest in preserving the ideals of our game for future generations compelled him to take a leadership role in establishing the SASS Scholarship Fund. He campaigned for its creation and donated the first \$1,000 on behalf of that worthy foundation.

This now 84-year-old cowboy, SASS Regulator and recipient of the 2000 END of TRAIL Spirit Award, has devoted both time and treasure to promoting this great national pastime. He is a true pioneer. 🦨

# Hall of Fame 2011



Diamond Dick began playing Cowboy Action in Castro Valley, California at a non-SASS club in 1989. In 1990, he founded River City Regulators with seven other shooters. He was the range master initially, and later became (and still is) the Territorial Governor of the River City Regulators.

Long Hunter, like many SASS participants, grew up watching the silver screen cowboys shoot it out with the bad guys and defend what's right or weak. It was the late 1990s



before he found SASS and was able to live out those dreams. Although he was an avid hunter, competitive archer, and part time gunsmith, he realized there was still something missing—and Cowboy Action filled that void.

In 2001, he attended his first END of TRAIL and placed 10<sup>th</sup> overall. Shortly after that his job was eliminated due to down sizing. The love of the game moved him to incorporate and make Cowboy Action his full time job. Traveling around the country vending gave him the opportunity to shoot many big matches and to meet the wonderful people involved with this sport. Along the way Long Hunter won several State, Regional, and National titles plus five World Championship category titles. In 2004 he won the overall World Championship at the last END of TRAIL held in California.

The recognition that means the most to Long Hunter is "The Spirit of the Game" Award given to him at the first Founders Ranch END of TRAIL in 2005. He believes we are not judged by our shooting skills, but rather how we conduct ourselves.







These two, as over-the-hill former lawmen, and a mouthy younger sidekick played by Ron Starr, are hired by the town banker to collect gold from miners in an isolated mining camp, guard it against robbers, and bring it to the bank for safe-keeping.

That sounds straight enough, except Scott and Starr have other ideas—like taking the gold for themselves!

Along the way, the boys pick up a young woman (Mariette Hartley) who's running away from her Bible-quoting abusive father, to marry one of the Hammond brothers, the slimiest pack of peckerwood rednecks you'll ever meet.

So, our heroes collect the miners' gold and head back toward town, unfortunately accompanied once again by the girl, who's now running away from her husband, Billy Hammond (James Drury).

On the way, instead of encountering robbers who want the *gold*, the guys encounter the sleazy Hammonds who want the *girl*.

Well, needless to say, lots of gunfights take place, eventually leading to **The Showdown**, pitting the three remaining Hammonds against Scott and McCrea. The outcome is pretty much what you'd expect, but I won't spoil it for you.

Now, I didn't mention Scott and McCrea get tangled up over who gets the gold, and Starr and Hartley get tangled up over who loves/hates who. It's all mighty confusing.

This film is rated #4 in Wild West magazine's ratings of the 100 Greatest Westerns! (Ahead of ALL other Westerns save High Noon, Ox Bow Incident, and Liberty Valance! C'mon now!)

This film was Randolph Scott's very last picture in his illustrious career. He decided he wanted to retire (at age 64) after making what he considered his best flick.

This film eats up supporting actors. We see guys like James Drury, Warren Oates (Lyle Gorch in *The Wild Bunch*), John Anderson, L.Q. Jones, and Edgar Buchanan put into bad roles and doing some bad acting.

This film, in my opinion, deserves to be rated down around #90, near *Cat Ballou* and *Johnny Guitar*. Her father, Delta Glen, SASS #39197, and her older sister, Hawkeye Gin, SASS #44595, attempt to make the little cowgirl feel better, but their praise has no

effect. She tells her father she wants to be left alone, so Delta replies, "OK, I'll go get ready to shoot." I can see and feel the pain Delta feels as he walks away, knowing his child is learning a lesson in life, and he can do nothing to help her. He must fight the urge to shelter her from all harm, and let her fight this battle on her own. So the little cowgirl sits in the shadows, alone with her thoughts.

A moment in time has just passed me by; one which will be lost forever. Once again my camera is nowhere to be seen. So how will I share something so precious, something so beautiful, as a child struggling between physical pain and emotional pride, and a father helping his child through one of many lessons in life? I'll never be able to express in words what I saw or felt at that moment in time on a beautiful, fall afternoon in South Carolina.

South Carolina. This event was hosted by the Palmetto Gun Club, and The Geechee Gunfighters of South Carolina, November 11-14th, 2010.

I figured you'd get around to asking me that question sooner or later. "Wigley, how did the little cowgirl get in such a predicament?" Well, Posse One had two squads. Squad "A" was shooting, and squad "B", my squad, was working. As luck would have it, our first shooter just happed to be this little nine-year-old Buckaroo by the name of Beck A. Boo, SASS #49857. She's an "A" student in fourth grade, stands four feet tall, and weighs 80 lbs.

Pride has a price, and pain knows no age limit. Stage Nine consisted of four knockdowns from two different locations in an alleyway. At the end of the alley were

two clay pigeons which were located on either side of five rifle targets. Beck A. Boo had her shotgun belt loaded with 12 shotgun shells as she started the scenario. Tex, SASS #4, was her RO, and Delta was not far behind as Boo progressed down the alleyway. Boo enstated, "Boo has that SWAT Team duck walk down perfect."

However, this stage was going to be Boo's biggest test of the match. She took out the right clay with only one shot, and she used her remaining seven shotgun rounds on the left target. Tex and

You could see her pride, determination, and willingness to overcome any obstacle had numbed the pain she was feeling as she squeezed off another round. What I saw was the determination of a young champion. She took down the clay, snatched up her rifle, and starting from the middle target, quickly completed a Nevada sweep with nine rounds. Delta held his breath as Boo pulled her first pistol. She was now going to engage the smallest target selection in the whole match.

On the long walk back to the unloading table, cheers could be heard from all of Posse One. The little cowgirl, with tears rolling down her sun burnt cheeks, had cleaned the stage. She walked down the alley with her long guns in hand, and Dad and Big Sis in tow. As she walked past me, you could tell it was taking every last bit of strength she had left to carry her long guns to the unloading table. She quickly glanced my way, and I could see the pain in her eyes. Her shoulder must have been very sore. Her pride and confidence had been challenged in front of the entire Posse, and that was where the pain was coming from. So, now you know why the little cowgirl sat alone in the shade, weeping.

What you don't know—as Posse One's First Sergeant, I had many jobs, but now I had to be a motivator. I walked over to the little cowgirl, knelt down beside her, and whispered, "Boo, right now everyone on this Posse is watching you. They're watching what you are going to do. Your reputation as a shooter starts right now. No matter how bad the pain is, you need to put it someplace else. I know that's asking a lot of you right now, but I need you to Cowgirl Up, and come help your Posse!" I walked back to my seat and continued keeping score, not knowing what the little cowgirl would do. Soon I felt a tug on my shirt tail. I turned around to see the little cowgirl, with tears still in her eyes, standing as tall as any cowgirl ever did. With her head held high and shoulders thrown back, she proudly said, "Wigley, I'm here to Cowgirl Up. What can I do?"

tar by which we are all welded together-same gear, same rules, same game! What more could one ask? We have a sense of mutual support and purpose. But there are certain things to consider before asking your club members to contribute to this worthy and noble cause. The first question that should be asked is, "do your club rules and by-laws permit

using donor fees or shooting fees for a donation?" A similar question can be asked of direct donations from club funds. If such restrictions exist, then perhaps your club can use one or more of the ideas developed by a couple of our clubs. One idea is to "sell" chances during the shooting of stages, or better yet, sponsor a shoot for the benefit of the Cowboy Memorial Chapel.

One of the Selling Ideas. Notice the photos accompanying this article. You will note the three tables within the bay are placed at various distances from the targets. The Idea here is to "buy" your way up to the targets, thus making it easier to hit the targets. Each Table toward the targets costs a dollar. So if you choose the furthest, it's \$1; the middle one, \$2; and the closest is \$3proceeds go to the Chapel fund. This set-up represents one way your club can collect Chapel funds without jeopardizing club rules. Other ideas are many, such as Insurance Policies and buying Reshoots. SASS abounds in fertile minds. Ask your club members to think of innovative ways, and you will probably be amazed at the ideas that emerge.



Well, I had a little trouble with the pronunciation, but eventually I was able ta find out K. Bob was right there at the shoot that very day. When I tracked him down after the match, he was displaying his wares on the tailgate of his pickup truck. Klickitat Bob, SASS #21903, a.k.a. Don Fordyce, informed me he got his alias from the place where he was born, Klickitat County, Washington. The county is named for the Klickitat American Indian Tribe. Talking with K. Bob, I found out he makes butt covers with an assortment of leather tooling designs, will dye them to the color of your choice, and place silver dots on them ta spice 'em up a little. He also will put your alias on one side and some type of icon on the other. I chose a basket weave pattern in a cordovan color ta match my holster rig. Then I had him put my alias in an oval on one side and crosses in an oval on the other side. It says in Matthew 16:24 (NIV), "Then Jesus said to his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and fol-

• Must use a SASS-legal singleshot rifle firing a traditional blackpowder rifle or revolver caliber cartridge (e.g., not a .30-30). The rifle may have spring-actuated ejectors if they are standard for that rifle.

- Must use a side by side, with or without exposed hammers or lever action shotgun.
- Must use blackpowder in all loads (rifle, revolver, and shotgun)."

Purpose

Plainsman side matches are usually 3-6 stages. Note the word "stages." They are just like stages for a main match, but the rifle must be single shot. Most event directors use the same rifle targets as on the main match. This is not to say that some event directors don't put the targets out to 200 yards or use stationary clay birds at 100 yards. It is to say that when they do, most of the shooters miss the rifle targets because their rifles are set up for closer work.

Additionally, where most regular stages have 8-10 rifle shots, 4-6 is more workable and common for Plainsman for obvious reasons. Okay, if it's not obvious to you, allow me to explain. It takes a practiced shooter 2-4 seconds per shot from the fastest rifles. Some contestants take 10 seconds per round. Lots of rifle shots mean long stages. It's nice to finish the match before dark. **Bifles** 

The most popular rifle is the H & R Handi-Rifle or Buffalo Classic with automatic ejectors. These are very fast reloading rifles. Push the lever that opens the barrel, and the *(Continued on next page)*

round is ejected over your shoulder. Grab another round (or several if you can), and you can, with a lot of practice, have split times below 3 seconds per round.

A few years ago H & R stopped putting ejectors on the rifles and now only installs extractors. If you're looking for a Handi-Rifle for Plainsman, make sure it has ejectors.

Handi-Rifles can be found for good prices on the used market, which makes them even more desirable. They usually come with a (illegal in SASS) peep rear sight. The peep can be replaced with an open sight, or the entire sight can be replaced with a semi or full buckhorn or express sight. The front sight is

a post, and it can be replaced with a bead. Smith Enterprises makes a buckhorn/ladder sight for those wanting to shoot long range. A tang sight is problematic since there is no metal tang. I had a gunsmith cut dovetails in the barrel and put in a Marbles front sight with a bead and a flat-topped rear sight. The sight picture is similar to that on my main match rifles but with a smaller bead so I will have some (slim or fat) chance at those 100vard clay birds.

#### Calibers

The most popular calibers are .38-55 and .45-70. Handy-Rifles in .38-55 have notoriously tight chambers. Two solutions are popular: have a gunsmith ream the chamber to specs, or use soft lead bullets.

.45-70 H & Rs don't generally need any chamber work. Polishing the chamber and the ejector mechanism and the above-mentioned sight optimization seem to be all that is needed. Rounds have been known to fail to eject. The quickest cure if this happens in a match is to carry a pistol cleaning rod (without handle) or similar brass rod and drop it down the barrel, knocking the round out. Adjusting your full-length resizer all the way down helps.

Can you use pistol cartridges such as .45 Colt? Yes, but their size and shape don't lend themselves to quick loading.

#### **Other Rifles**

Another fast loading rifle is a High Wall or Low Wall, variations of the 1885 Browning/Winchester single shot. A practiced shooter can keep up with an H & R shooter of equal skill. (Yes, you need to practice to win). Next is a Trapdoor Springfield. I've seen some people who were pretty quick with them, but considerably more work is required for speed. The Rolling Block comes next, and the Sharps last. But all of them show up. Most people are shooting for fun. The secret for all of them is three words: practice, practice, and practice.

#### Pistols

Any percussion pistols legal for Frontiersman are legal for this. For a full course in making percussion pistols work, read "Frontiersman Category for Dummies" at http://www.curtrich.com/frontiersmen.html. Reliability is the key. First the gun has to operate smoothly and quickly with no cap jams, snaps, or cap-only ignition. Then, you have to be able to hit the target with it quicker than the other competitors. About half of the contestants in an average field lose because of pistols not up to the job. The Ruger Old Army, of course, is the most successful pistol. They generally work with few if any modifications (Treso nipples and an action job by Rowdy Yates at Lee's Gunsmithing, for example.) But Lefty Eastman has won major matches with well-prepared Colt clones, as has Larsen E. Pettifogger. The Colt clones need a lot of work to be 100% in most cases, and, unless you are your own home gunsmith of the skill level of Larsen E. Pettifogger, you will probably wind up spending as much as a stock pair of Rugers (if you can find any. Ruger stopped making them in '07.) Again, Rowdy Yates does excellent work on these guns.

Remington clones generally need a specialist gunsmith like Rowdy




... slams the rifle closed and fires.

Yates, too. People who use stock ones and only shoot them at Plainsman matches without de-bugging and practicing a lot will be frustrated.

#### Equipment

If the ability to load your rifle quickly and smoothly under time pressure is the most important part of Plainsman, then a shotgun/rifle ammo belt is important. A pouch just isn't fast enough. Lefty Eastman, who won Winter Range this year, uses a canvas Mills belt. He can grab several rifle rounds at once, and they don't jam-up. They come right out.

I had been using a .45-70 slide on my shotgun belt. Getting a handful of rounds out at once was difficult to impossible because they jammed unless pulled straight out. This year at Winter Range I asked Bob Mernickle if he had made any belts for .45-70s for Plainsmen. He said he had, all custom made, but he had nothing in the catalog. He was interested in one, though. So we sat down and began designing, and within 15 minutes he was talking to people at his factory, and cutting on the prototype started that day. It arrived in early March. How's that for R & D? I practiced until I could pick up 3-4 rounds at a time, about all my medium-sized hands can handle. It works quite well. It holds twelve .45-70 rounds and ten12 gauge shells. The one shown is for a left-hander (me) who loads his rifle with his right hand. I haven't encountered a stage requiring more than 10 rifle rounds or 8 shotgun shells. So I can drop a few. It is the prototype, and some tweaks will be in the production "Plainsman Speed Belt."

#### Ammunition

Stuffing every bit of powder in your .45-70 rounds and topping them with 500 gr. bullets is not necessary and only encourages match directors to move the targets out of sight, fearing 500 gr. bullets hitting their targets at 1300 ft./sec. Most contestants use reduced power loads. Most .45-70 shooters use 25-50 gr. loads with filler (corn meal, ground corn cob, grits, etc.) Real blackpowder and Pyrodex need blackpowder-lubed bullets (or Wonder Wads on top of the filler with

smokeless bullets. Wonder Wads on top of blackpowder will contaminate the powder and cause inconsistent loads). American Pioneer Powder and Triple 7 do not. They work best with smokeless bullets.

#### Easy Loads


The easiest load for .45-70s is to drop in a 50 gr. American Pioneer Powder stick and top it off with a 300 gr. bullet. This results in a consistent load that will work at all reasonable

ranges, and no filler or blackpowder-lubed bullet is required. I can make these in about 1/3 the time needed to make loads with blackpowder, filler, and Wonder Wads.

#### The future of Plainsman

Tex has taken up the cause of shooters who want Plainsman divided into two categories, Modern Plainsman, allowing rifles with ejectors (Handi-Rifles and 1885 Winchester variants), and Traditional Plainsman, which doesn't. Others think that Plainsman isn't big enough to justify division into two categories. The counter argument is that if we divided it, more people would bring out their Springfields and Sharps, and the growth would justify the split. There is only one way to find out. END of TRAIL is trying two cate-

gories, with and without ejectors. I might suggest if you would shoot Plainsman if it were divided, shoot Plainsman now at events where it is not divided, with what you have, and then the numbers might justify division.

I've noticed the plethora of side matches has hurt Plainsman. At Winter Range, for example, it would be very difficult to shoot Wild Bunch and Plainsman. Moving Wild Bunch to earlier in the week will help this, and this is being done. Posse Marshal meetings often conflict with Plainsman; sometimes TG meetings do, too. All of these things can be taken care of, if the organizers desire to do so. Buffalo Stampede held Plainsman on Friday afternoon after the main match. I've seen it on Sunday morning, too. Plainsman is a lot of fun, generally low pressure, and attracts a laid back crowd that is fun to shoot with. With a little work and help from organizers we can make it grow! *I*

hree options for Modern Colt Army Conversions: This is going to be a personal and very subjective talk with a few drops of semi-scientific window-dressing. So, shake well before swallowing.


"You can never have enough 1860 Armies" voiced a wise US pard, and he is right. Like him, I enjoy the graceful lines of this great cap & baller and add ... "particularly as a period correct quality conversion shooting smokeless inside lubed .44 Colt cartridges."

If you want a modern made Colt Army conversion these days, it seems you only have three options:

#1: Have one custom made by one of the conversion artists around

in the USA or Europe. They will convert the C&B replica revolver of your preferred manufacturer. What you are getting after a few months, and sometimes years, is usually a period correct, esthetically pleasing display pistol, or a shooter, or both. Of course, this will all depend on your wish list, the responsiveness of the gunsmith to your requests, and the dinero you are prepared to spend. For such a piece of art like the Colt Richards of actor Tom Selleck as Cavalryman and would-be-homesteader in "Last Stand as Saber River," be prepared to invest a lot.

This relatively young market niche for newly made conversions might have been initially triggered by demanding US Cowboy Action

Shooting<sup>™</sup> competitors searching for revolvers matching their1870s characters better than the venerable Colt SAAs or a pair of simple C&B revolvers. The number of smiths capable of such work has been steadily growing in the USA since the 1980s. Good news for the shooters and collectors on the Eastern bank of the big pond, there are also a few now in Europe, too.

RMY CONVERSIO

#2: Do-it-yourself using a commercially available drop-in cylinder with or without load-ing gate on your replica. If you are in the USA and are technically talented, you will eventually have a functional shooter resembling a Colt conversion of the 1870s ... from a distance like below non-gated Army conversion without ejector housing.

The pards & pardettes in the European arena are suffering from the many and different gun regulations in their countries. To comply with their national laws, they will probably have to muster the services of a knowledgeable gunsmith for such an installation. Once the smith has fitted the cartridge cylinder to the C&B pistol, the clients must cross their fingers the local proof houses will finally apply their stamp of approval to the conversion.

#3: When in a hurry, you can buy a conversion revolver made by a rep-

> utable cowboy gun manufacturer. You're getting a very functional shooter "on steroids"\* with factory warranty. (\**respectfully adopted quote from Michael Venturino!*)

> Regarding option #3 and to the best of my knowledge, currently only Uberti in Gardone/Italy, subsidiary of the Beretta folks, makes conversions of Colt Army, Navy, and Remington clones, or the Open Top in various calibers, grip, and barrel configurations. The other major maker in that market was Armi San Marco. They dropped out of the race around the turn of the century after quality issues.

.44 Colt caliber and love them. Why? Because they are rugged and reliable shooting irons. I used a pair of their long barreled Open Tops with Army grips as main match pistols during the 2008 season. They worked well for me.

My 2002 vintage Uberti Richards-Mason Army and Richards Transitional or RII of 2003 production are getting their regular diet of my light Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> nitro reloads behind 200 grainers.

The modern 1860 type pistols of quality makers will hit what you are aiming at ... once you have bottomed out the arbor and adjusted the sights to correct height.

Although these Uberti conversions look like C&B revolvers converted to fire cartridges, they are actually constructed as cartridge fir-

ing pistols for regular loads (no P+, please!); hence, their beefed-up frames, cylinders, and barrels. These strengthened parts will not interchange with the respective C&B revolver models and vice versa. The steel used in the making of these conversions is harder than the alloy of their C&B brethren for a reason.

Uberti is probably well advised to stick to that concept of beefing-up critical parts, using harder steel like for their SAAs and state of the art production technology. That provides for conversions and Open Tops that are considerably stouter than their originals from the 19<sup>th</sup> century, which in turn keeps the customers happy and the lawyers off their backs. In addition, it provides a simple platform to make these pistols in other, possibly more powerful, but not historically correct, calibers like .45 Colt or .44 Special. Because their cylinders are scaled up, they will not only accommodate six rounds of .44 Colt, there is now enough diameter for six rounds of wider rimmed.44 Russian and .44 Special, the fatter .45 S&W, or the larger.45 Colt. A






illy Yank had signed up in 1863 for a three-year hitch in the 9<sup>th</sup> Iowa Calvary. He was from Des Moines, Iowa and a young man looking for adventure. This great Civil War sounded like just the thing. After boring training and traveling to the Union encampment at Sabine Pass, Texas, the war soon came to an end, but his enlistment was for three years. So, Billy was stuck in part of the "reconstruction" of America.

In January of 1866, the  $9^{th}$ Iowa Calvary was ordered to guard a group of government wagons into Indian Territory for the resupply of Union troops in Texas. While there, some excitement finally entered Billy's military experience. His unit got to help Federal and state law enforcement officers hunt down, kill, or capture all outlaws and desperadoes until the  $9^{th}$ Iowa was mustered out of service at Little Rock, Arkansas on February 16, 1866.

some outlaws were killed, Billy Yank took a handgun from one of the bodies. He returned to Polk County, Iowa with this handgun and kept it throughout his life. The firearm was a .36 caliber T. Leech and Company handgun manufactured in Greensboro,

Georgia. Since the gun's serial number is CS50, it was probably manufactured in 1864. The bottom of the barrel under the seater lever reads LEECH GRNBRO GA. C.S.A. The brass framed, walnut gripped handgun has 2<sup>nd</sup> TEX Vol (Continued on page 56)



carved on the bottom of the worn left grip. Billy Yank considered the handgun a memento of the turbulent years at the end of the great American bloodbath, which cost the lives of so many American men and youth with terrible destruction of the agrarian south.

Thomas Leech in 1861 was a gunsmith and cotton broker who manufactured swords and repaired firearms under the name of "Memphis Novelty Works" (William A. Albaugh III and Edward N. Simons; <u>Confederate</u> <u>Arms</u>; Harrisburg, PA, Stackpole Company; 1957; 12-16). Due to the danger of Yankee capture in 1862, Leech evacuated the Columbus, Mississippi plant, where he partnered with Charles H. Rigdon of St. Louis. At Columbus, the major effort was the manufacture of revolvers for the Confederacy. In 1862, Leech and Rigdon made

around 350 imitation Colt Navies.

By the fall of 1862, Yankee soldiers were threatening Columbus, so the ordinance factories were moved to Greensboro, Georgia. Here Leech and Rigdon produced revolvers until January 1863, when the partnership was dissolved. Rigdon moved to Augusta, Georgia and partnered with Jesse Ansley to produce Rigdon-Ansley revolvers.

Leech remained in Greensboro, Georgia and produced revolvers marked only with his name—Leech. A contract with the Confederacy for 1,500 revolvers was filled eventually with both Leech and Rigdon-Ansley companies supplying revolvers.

As one would suspect, out of these 1,500 revolvers manufactured in 1864 and 1865 for the Confederacy, not many specimens remain today. Details and serial numbers of some known to exist are in William A. Albaugh III, Hugh Benet, JR, and Edward N. Simmons; Confederate Handguns; Wilmington, NC, Broadfoot Publishing Company, 1963; 42-60. Folk stories abound that the brass in the frames of these southern manufactured revolvers came from melted church bells due to the shortage of brass and steel in the South.

Revolver CS50 in the photos was obtained from a gentleman who told me he had been a grocery boy as a youth in Des Moines, Iowa. An old gentleman customer offered the boy this Leech CS50 revolver, which had been in his family since the Civil War. The



boy paid his entire week's paycheck of \$37.50 to the old gentleman for this southern handgun.

As Cowboy Action Shooters, many of our distributors are remanufacturing guns of the Civil War and American West era. While the small quantities produced of the Leech and Leech and Rigdon revolvers probably mean they will never be remanufactured for SASS competitions, the research to find out about the Leech CSA revolvers has been intriguing! While I knew little about the "War of Northern Aggression," many phone calls, books, trips, libraries, and Internet searches over months still leave many questions unanswered. There was a 2<sup>nd</sup> Texas Volunteers that was cavalry, one artillery, and one infantry. Calvary was all issued revolvers; whereas, in the artillery and infantry, only officers were issued revolvers. Who had been issued CS50? Was my fictional story how the gun came to be in Des Moines, Iowa for the grocery boy to buy it close to the truth? So many unanswered questions for Ioway even after months of research.

Should any SASS member have additional information, please share this with <u>Ioway@hotmail.com</u> or at SASS. What a challenging assignment Tex gave me when he said research it and write it for us.

ack in the middle 1970's, I did a little leatherwork a few purses, wallets, and a holster for my Ruger Single Six. My wife, Icelady, SASS Regulator #71603, also had done some leatherwork in her younger years. A couple of years ago we decided we would like to get back into working with leather again. Well, we jumped in with both feet! "Lets build our own saddles for our horses." Where to start?

In the recent past, we had dealt with James Sturgeon of J S SAD-DLERY in Cliff, NM (www.jssaddlery.com) when he custom built a gun rig for Icelady. We found he would take one student at a time and would teach, advise, and guide them through building their own saddle.



So, we contacted James to get the details and set up a time to take the class. Since we ride Icelandic horses, we decided to bring them down to James to be fit for the correct tree upon which to build our saddles.

In August of 2009, we loaded two of our Icelandic horses and drove from Stanley, NM to Cliff, NM, about a five-hour drive. We tried several different trees on our horses and determined the best fit was the Hope tree. The Hope saddle was the most popular saddle used by early Texans. Saddle maker Adolphus Hope of Washington County produced the design from the late 1830's through the 1850's. The Hope style saddle was extremely popular before the Civil War and through the 1870's, and was used by mountain men, early plainsmen, and cowboys.

The trees had to be ordered, and because the owner of the tree manufacturing company is the only person in the company who makes the Hope tree, it took about four months before they were ready. When the two trees were in James Sturgeon's shop, he notified us, and we set a date to start our saddle making adventure.

February 2010, we started. I was the one to take the first spot. I loaded up my little truck camper with enough food and drink for the one-week class and drove to Cliff, NM. I arrived on a Sunday evening, set up my camp outside of James' shop, and got ready to start first thing in the morning. At 8:00 Monday morning I was in the shop, bright eyed, bushy-tailed, and eager to start. I saw my saddletree for the first time (**Photo #1**), got

situated in the shop, and it was time to get to work.

I had chosen to build a saddle that had the features of a Santa Fe style saddle made popular along the Santa Fe Trail. It has Sam Stagg rigging and a half seat design. At the suggestion of James, I decided to add full side jockeys, to avoid leg pinching between the half seat and the stirrup leathers. Since this was not a common saddle style, we had to draw and make custom patterns for all the leather parts. Each piece was designed and fit as the saddle was being built, one step at a time.

The first step was to start the seat. A pattern was fit to the seat (Continued on next page)

and then transferred to the leather and cut out. The leather piece was glued and nailed to the tree. Because, over time, half seats have a tendency to sag down between the bars of the saddle tree, a piece of thin sheet metal was formed. glued, and nailed over the leather and to the tree. While the glue was drying, a piece of leather was cut to cover the rear of the cantle. That piece of leather was immersed in water until thoroughly wet so it could be formed and molded to the shape of the cantle, tacked in place, and left to dry. (Photo #2) While

the cantle piece was drying, another piece was cut, wet, formed around the gullet of the saddle, and tacked and left to dry.

While those parts were drying, the next step was to cut out leather for the skirt. The skirt requires a right and a left side. Those pieces were wet and temporarily attached to the underside of the tree, so they could be molded to fit the bars of the tree. (**Photo #3**)

Most of the leather items that were wet-molded to custom fit needed to be left to dry overnight. So each night while they were drying, I would stoke up the wood stove and work on the tooling of the stirrup fenders, stirrup leathers, side jockeys, and tapaderos. I had decided on a very simple appearing design to be tooled, but it required a great deal of time to complete. First the leather must be cased (dampened so the leather fibers swell, allowing the swivel knife to cut smoothly and the stamping tools to imprint well). The design is then transferred to the leather. I used a swivel knife to cut the design, and then a beveling tool was struck with a rawhide mallet along both sides of the cut. I don't know how many thousands of mallet strikes it took, but it was a lot. (**Photo #4**)

Another piece of leather was cut to fit the seat and up the front of the cantle. This was glued to the seat, and then sanded down and skived until all edges were tapered down to a very fine edge. The leather to wrap around the outside of the pommel was fit and attached to the tree. (**Photo #5**)



and pommel wrap

Next the fore-end rigging was cut and temporarily tacked to the pommel (temporarily so the Conchos and saddle strings could be attached later). (**Photo #6**) At this

time, the tree was drilled for the saddle strings.

The final piece of leather for the seat was cut out, and the rear of it was scalloped so it could be rolled over the back edge of the cantle and attached. It was wet and painstakingly molded and formed to the seat using an old porcelain doorknob (an old saddle maker's "tool" James had inherited from his grandfather, who had taught him the art of saddle making). While the saddle seat was tacked and left to dry, the rear jockeys were cut and fitted behind the cantle for the rear rigging. The side jockeys were sewn

to the edges of the seat and the saddle shearling (sheepskin) was cut out and sewn to the underside of the skirting.

The Conchos were attached to the rigging and permanently attached to the tree. The shearling lined skirting was nailed to the tree, and the rear rigging was

laced together. (**Photo #7**) The saddle horn cap w/Concho was attached to the horn, and the stirrup leathers were riveted to the fenders and installed under the side jockeys and through the tree.

At this point the saddle was basically complete. Several coats of pure neatsfoot oil were applied to all the leather, and it was placed out in the sun to darken and enrich the color of the leather as it dried. After the oil had soaked in and dried, the finish was applied. The finish con-*(Continued on page 60)*

(Continued from page 59) sisted of one coat of neatlac and then one coat of Fiebing's Acrylic Resolene. (Photo #8)

The saddle was completed in six days—six very long days. I started at 8:00 each morning, took one half hour for lunch and one half hour for dinner, and then worked 'till 10:30 to 11:30 each night. After 6:00 PM, James would leave the shop open for me to work as late as I wished. Those nights it was just me and the cat in the shop until I quit and locked up. The cat would share the chair with me as I did the tooling on my saddle.

My wife, Icelady, came down the following Sunday and restocked the camper for her stay to build her saddle. I returned home to Stanley to care for our horses, two dogs, and a cat while she was in her class.

Icelady's saddle was a more standard design, but she chose to add black angora goat hair to the tops of her saddlebags as well as to


the bucking rolls. (**Photo #9**)

We enjoyed getting to know James, his wife, Mona, and grandson, Wyatt, while we worked on our saddles. For anyone wanting to build their own saddle, I would highly recommend working with James, as he is a very good instructor and will teach you as much as you could ever want to know about saddle making.

Both Icelady and I felt our saddle making adventure was well worthwhile, and we are the proud makers and owners of our own custom saddles. (**Photo #10**) **1**.

or the past year the Bay Area Bandits, a Tampa Florida SASS Mounted Shooting Club, has made

a serious, purposeful commitment to be more than just another Mounted Shooting venue. Their commitment is to grow and promote the sport by catering to both new, inexperienced rider / shooters and inexperienced horses, while also providing fresh challenges to experienced participants.

In this endeavor the Bandits have teamed up with dedicated professional horse trainers and manufacturers of specialized gear, tack, holsters, ammunition, and innovative devices to enhance training and increase the FUN factor. All the while, never forgetting Rule #1: Safety.

It is essential at this point to explain the impetus and motivation of the "Team." Frankly it is cowboy economics. It's a surprise to no one that shooting sports in general can be an expensive hobby. For Action Shooters to acquire the minimum collection of guns, holsters, cart, ammo, outfits, and the like can sometimes be daunting. So add to all that the cost of a horse, trailer, truck, fuel, saddle, gear, feed, stabling, and so forth, and one can see how costs can get quite out of control!

We also know when an Action Shooter has a gun problem, ten cowboys will offer to lend them theirs to finish a match. The Bandits have taken this "Cowboy Way" one step further. If a new person shows up and all they have is a horse, the "Team" takes care of the rest. Need guns, holsters, special tack, or other items? No problem, and no charge. Or, if you just show up and want to try it, the ranch will rent you a horse. But, we don't rent no pigs! Additionally, the Bandits arena practice match fees and points match fees are very low. The training / practice fees at the Double T Ranch are very low. The leather products from JD's Custom Leather Shop are top-shelf quality at very low prices. The ammo and

specialty shooting and training items from BPM Inc. and Extreme Machine Works are of the highest quality at a very low cost. Why, you ask? Because this "Team" of cowboys and cowgirls got together and decided that promotion and furtherance of the sport was the primary motive, not monetary profit. The Team participants would all agree quite often even the costs are not covered. All believe over time it will all even out. We are not in the shooting business; we are in the people business! The "Team" believes this is their implementation of "The Cowboy Way."

Now, after laying all this groundwork and background, lets talk about something FUN!

Let's talk about incorporating shooting a double barrel shotgun in a stage. First, it's a hoot. It also adds a new element of interest that demands new expertise. It is the same concept the Wild Bunch represents in Action Shooting. The people who shoot in the Wild Bunch side matches don't stop doing the regular matches, they simply are enhancing their fun factor in the sport.

Using the shotgun requires some special safety considerations when on a horse. Obviously one can't ride around with a loaded, but open shotgun. Nor is loading on

the fly practical. Also, in our opinion, riding around with an armed shotgun in a scabbard is unacceptable from a safety perspective. So, in a mounted stage that incorporates a shotgun, we believe that firearm MUST be used first. We will assume the shotgun is hammerless and is cocked when closed.

When the rider is in the final staging area and has received the (Continued on page 63) DUNTED 岸

(Continued from page 61) green go light or signal, the RO hands off the shotgun to the rider. Specifically, only when the rider has the horse completely under control, stopped, and positioned to enter the course will the RO approach at an angle from the front/side.

Just prior to handing off the shotgun the RO will load and close the shotgun. The RO holds the shotgun in a vertical position by the fore stock, up and away from his body. The rider will reach out and down and grasp the shotgun at the handgrip area below the trigger guard, and raise the shotgun vertically so the muzzle is above his head.

At this time the RO verifies no additional repositioning of the shotgun is required and the rider confirms. Now the rider is free to start the stage by riding through the timer beam. After the shotgun targets have been engaged, the shotgun is placed into the scabbard and the rider continues the stage of whatever design and configuration it may be.

This opens many possibilities of design and interest for the stages; e.g., Shotgun/Pistol, Shotgun/Rifle. Perhaps some extreme stages with bonuses and obstacles; e.g., Shotgun

bonus targets/Pistol/Pistol or Shotgun bonus targets/Pistol/Rifle rundown. Imagination is the only limit, as long as Rule #1 is always followed.

To make this simple and cost effective for the Bandits and other clubs the 'Team" has developed wonderfully cost effective and user friendly items. Pictured here you see the special inserts utilized for the shotgun.

The inserts are precision machined from lightweight but very strong material that loads into the shotgun just like a conventional 12 gauge shell. The inserts are further machined to precisely fit and seat the .45 cal Mounted Shooting blank cartridges. The shotgun closes as if loaded with conventional shells, and the firing pin strikes are solid and absolutely centered. No misfires. Unloading is easy, as the inserts eject out just like regular



shells, and the cartridges push right out, particularly if using the BPM blanks, which are manufactured specifically for easy ejection.

Also pictured is the shotgun in action. Much consideration and testing is devoted to maintain SASS standards of distance performance. That again is about safety. SASS established distance standards so competition is consistent for the participants and safe for everyone. That is why cartridges MUST break balloons at a certain distance every time, and must NOT break balloons beyond a certain distance. In an arena situation none of us want to be worried about shooting the spectators. Not the cowboy thing to do.


More rocks were removed, and

lthough "Wild" Bill Hickok's blood runs through his veins, he's better known in cowboy circles as "Tame" Bill, SASS Life/Regulator #30699. Vermonter by birth and Kansan by choice, Tame Bill had ancestors who immigrated to Kansas in 1857 during the pre-Civil War "Bleeding Kansas" era, one of whom ended up as Governor of Kansas from 1895-97. His wife, Melisa, goes by the Cowgirl name of Rowdy Anne, SASS #34556-a handle a bit more bullish than her husband's. Nevertheless, Rowdy Anne has no difficulty shooting comfortably in the shadow of her less rowdy husband. Together these dedicated Cowboy Action Shooters<sup>TM</sup> have helped the Powder Creek Cowboys become one of the premiere affiliated clubs in the great state of Kansas.

"Tame" Bill was the nickname given to James B. "Wild" Bill Hickok's older brother, Lorenzo. Following a family history lead provided by one of his aunts, Tame Bill (a.k.a. Stuart Barber in the market place) discovered his mother's great-greataunt married Elmeron Butler in 1868, the nephew of Polly Butler Hickok. Some years later they ended up in Kane County, Illinois. With that family history in mind, Bill thought the Moniker of "Tame" Bill was a good one, and I think our readership would agree. As our sport grows, we are discovering there are more than a few kinships between current SASS members and some of our western icons, such as J.P. Garrett's relationship to Pat Garrett as reported by Tex in the January issue of The Couboy Chronicle. Only time can tell who or what might pop up next!

Tame Bill is a University of Missouri graduate now working as the Director of Sales for Midland Radio Corporation where he runs the Sports and Recreation Division. Rowdy Anne, on the other hand, attended the University of Texas, and now works at Fort Leavenworth in one of the Northrop Grumman programs. Together, in 2000, they started participating in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> after several years of involvement in other shooting venues. Like thousands of us, they are now hooked on participating in reenacting our western heritage. As you can see from the outfits these two wear, they are truly into the "spirit of the game."



The next president of the USA ... in his mind! Before Colonel Custer

met his untimely demise, he made decisions that led to it.

In keeping with issued orders for effectiveness of attacks on Western Plains Indians, at daybreak on November 27, 1868, Lt. Colonel George Armstrong Custer ordered the 7th Cavalry to charge into the sleeping camp of Cheyenne Sioux Peace Chief Black Kettle on the Washita River in western Oklahoma.

Although Custer initially overpowered the small band of Cheyenne Sioux in the camp, he was unaware of several other Indian camps close by, from which several hundred Sioux braves came in aid to Black Kettle's threatened followers. At one point, Custer became completely surrounded by the retaliating braves from the other camps, and was forced to become defenders from within the camp. After fighting off the attacking warriors, Custer retreated. However, his troops managed to capture many of the women and children who had not been bayoneted or shot as they cowered near what they thought was the protection of the American flag in the center of the camp.

This murderous attack by United States Cavalry was graphically portrayed in the movie, "Little Big Man," starring Dustin Hoffman. The event of the attack, in the dead of the Oklahoma winter, at the very crack of dawn, with the entire camp of

Cheyenne sleeping, was a clear demonstration of the intent of the government and the US Army to eradicate the Great Plains Indians with whatever efficient means that could be implemented.

The "Back Story" to the brutal Cavalry attack at The Washita was that "hero" Custer decided to take one of the captured females to serve him as his personal maid. The "maid" services became sexual demands, and the young 14 year old maiden became pregnant in time with Custer's offspring. Naturally, as Custer was married, he denied fathering the child, a male, as soon as he was born.

Within the boy's first year, he died of pneumonia, as a result of not receiving proper care and nutrition,



## LITTLE KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE Way Out West – By Joe Fasthorse, SASS #48769 Dallas Stoudenmire

allas Stoudenmire was in more gunfights than Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, Luke Short, or Doc Holiday. Born in 1845, he joined the Confederate Army at age 15. After the war he worked as a farmer, a wheelwright, and a carpenter. In 1881, Dallas became the Town Marshal of El Paso. Three days later, he was involved in one of the most famous gunfights in Old West history, a shoot-out in which Stoudenmire


killed cattle rustler Johnny Hale, former town marshal George Campbell, and an innocent bystander. This gunfight made Stoudenmire a legend, but started a feud with the Manning bothers, friends of Campbell and Hale. A few days after the fight, Dallas shot and killed Bill Johnson, a friend of Jim Manning. In the next ten months, the Marshal killed six more men in gun battles. In 1882, Jim Manning killed Stoudenmire's brother-in-law, Doc Cummings. After acquittal, Dallas dared him to fight. He refused. Three months later Stoudenmire resigned to take possession of the Globe Cafe. But, the Manning feud continued, and before 1882 ended Dallas was shot dead in a duel with Jim and Doc Manning. Dallas Stoudenmire is buried in Colorado County, Texas.

as well as medical care once he became ill. The Cheyenne maiden died several years afterward, leaving Custer with no accuser or responsibility. The knowledge of the rape of the young Indian maiden however spread throughout the entire Indian Nation in the Great Plains, to all tribes, to all Indian nations.

In 1876, June 25th, Custer met his fate at the "Greasy Grass" valley, (Continued on page 67)

Stuntmen/women doubles were used to do all the dangerous shots in the film. Until the 1960s most stunt people did not get screen credit, so they remained mostly anonymous to those of us who watched the films.

One such stunt person was Martha Crawford. Martha's father was a professional polo player and horse trainer. He put Martha on a horse at age three, and right there she found her life's work. Growing up in Hollywood during the 1930s and early '40s when many of the stars played polo with her father, Martha was friends and went to school with the children of those stars. Knowing the stars and their children gave her an entre into the studios, and a screen test was offered when she finished school. Her

screen test was not good, however, she told the studio she would actually prefer the opportunity to do horse stunts, which they agreed to and she never looked back.

Over the years Martha worked for many of the studios, many directors, some good, some not so good, and did the stunts and doubled for many female stars, some very friendly, some not friendly at all. Martha talks about the stunts that work perfectly and those that go awry. Her career is chronicled in her recently published book, *Fall Girl, My Life as a Western Stunt Double*. It's a good read and gives a look into the lives and work of many of Hollywood's elite.

A quote from the late Jean Simmons sums up Martha's career—"I knew when I was asked to do *The Big Country* I needed a good stunt double. Well I got her, I got the best ... Martha Crawford."

(Continued from page 65) on the banks of The Little Bighorn River in eastern South Montana. Ignoring his Indian scouts who warned him of the immensity of the encampment lying in the expanse of meadow below the knolls overlooking the Little Bighorn River, Custer commanded his men to charge into the array of tipis, assuming the Indians would panic and flee before his charge. In fact, instead of the sleeping assemblage of Black Kettle's group, the Little Bighorn camp held more than 4000 skilled warriors, seasoned in fighting the "Bluecoats." Led by three of the most famous chiefs, Sitting Bull, Crazy Horse, and Gall, the Indians quickly forced Custer and his doomed troops into a frantic retreat back across the Little Bighorn River and up the arroyo to what is now known as "Custer Hill."

In what has been reported as less than a half hour of furious battle, the total losses to Custer's troops were 268 killed (16 officers, 242 troopers, 10 civilians/scouts), not including the losses suffered by the Reno and Benteen troops which Custer had split off and ordered to attack the camp from the south.

One area of information not seen

in the government reports of the battle, not generally included by historians, was that of all the Cavalry troops killed in Custer's detachment, his was the only body that was not chopped into pieces once the last soldier died. All of the others had hands, arms, legs, heads chopped off, and placed in juxtaposed positions, including severed male organs.

The strangest, inexplicable thing is that the Indians, while they hated, reviled, and deeply feared Custer, at the same time, they respected him as a great warrior. A small portion of his golden blonde scalp was taken, but other than removal of all his clothing, his body was intact. The only other desecration was the arrow that was inserted well into his penis. That was the payback for his indiscretion with the teen-aged maiden he raped, impregnated, and abandoned following the attack at the Washita River. The story of that final act of retribution was quickly spread throughout the Indian Nations of The Great Plains.

The "Final Solution" for the Sioux was The Massacre at Wounded Knee, South Dakota, December 30, 1890 (Naturally, in the dead of Winter, per Army preferences). Three hundred followers of Chief Big Foot, including unarmed women and their children were cut down. The attackers were the reconstituted 7th Cavalry of Custer, and the intent was to revenge the slaughter of Custer and his men at The Little Bighorn River, fourteen years earlier. They did. The "official" reports showed "only" 146 Indians killed, 84 men, 44 women, 18 children. But, more than 200 are buried in the mass grave at the memorial site in South Dakota. Blackthorne4440@aol.com



## BOUNTY HUNTER, SASS REGULATOR #1849

He was perhaps the first "superstar" in our sport, and to my knowledge the first to author both a manual and instructional videos as to how to get started in Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup>. Hunter Scott Anderson, Bounty Hunter, SASS Regulator #1849, was a champion competitor and a friend, and he unfortunately passed away way too early last July 21 at home in Tujunga, CA after a brief and courageous battle with cancer.


Bounty Hunter was a fierce competitor, but one of the nicest individuals I ever met. We knew each other for years and shot together on the same posse whenever we could. We also knew each other outside of SASS and spent time together in California and Arizona where Bounty Hunter loved to ride his motorcycle.

Bounty Hunter wrote the book, Top Shooter's Guide to Cowboy Action Shooting, in 2000 that was, and still is, the Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>TM</sup> "Bible" of field engagement. It is clear and concise, and he drew from personal experience and knowledge to create a wonderful book that gives the reader a complete look into the sport. He provides the tools, techniques, and approaches to shoot a stage as fast as possible, always while instilling in the reader a sense of being safe at all times. The book was well written so it could be embraced by the novice or someone like me who has now been in this sport for twenty-five years.

Bounty Hunter also took the time to create two major DVDs, Top Shooters Guide and Quicken the Pace, where he takes the shooter first into the world of SASS and then into the next level of shooting where you will learn the finer points of the game and sharpen your competition skills. He also offered one-on-one training and, one year to help my nephew, Outlaw Pete, further his game, I gave him a daylong session with Bounty Hunter to improve his skills, which he did exponentially and had a great time just being with Bounty Hunter.

Interestingly enough, I re-read his book recently, and I was impressed to see the names of the shooters who endorsed the book included the late China Camp, Island Girl, Tequila, and Lefty Longridge. And, the dedication from Judge Roy Bean SASS #1 reads:

"This is one book every Cowboy Action Shooter should read and use as a reference for shooting. It will also bring you closer to the sport. It is written by a man who has been in the trenches since the early days, and I can think of no one better suited. Bounty Hunter has done much more than his share in bringing new people to the sport. Like most of us, he has made his mistakes along the way, but has learned and taught others from them. I've butted heads with him, gotten drunk with him, traveled with him, and shot side-by-side with him. Through it all one thing has remained ... I'm proud to call him my friend. No doubt he is one to ride the river with!"

Duell McCall never did anything halfway. He practiced, studied, and perfected everything he did, whether it was hon-(*Continued on page 70*)




### DEAF JOHN, SASS #7342 AKA JOHN GOAR







Trail's End is a competition that remains, by far, New Zealand's most successful western action championships with considerable emphasis being placed on creating a relaxed three full days of re-enacting the history of both the Wild West and the New Zealand frontier period—1840–1899, in a totally safe, responsible, and enjoyable way. Together with the enjoyment of a high quality cuisine-this year's two evening banquettes included venison, wild pig, lamb, chicken, and every vegetable imaginable, plus fruit salad and ice cream! A crate of NZ Mussels was also devoured as an entree on Saturday evening.

This year was the 15th Trail's End, and what an incredibly fantastic event it was—great shooting, great food, great workers, great

Saturday involved six stages of western action shot to SASS rules (except for a 10 second penalty per miss), and with 68 shootists participating, including eight ladies. These numbers were down from our usual 90-100, but with the NZ economy in dire straits, it was expected. All present agreed the Gladstone County Range is now the finest shooting sports range in New Zealand, with six ranges that can be used simultaneously—very rare in New Zealand. On top of that, the whole range is very reminiscent of the Wild West.

Trail's End 2011 was probably the smoothest functioning Trail's End we have ever hosted, and an impressive example of the high regard in which the WPSSC and the FWSSA are held. Schofield Sue and her office team were outstanding—with Sue 'over the moon' with her new colored printer, generously donated by Ron James, a fine example of THE SPIRIT OF THE GAME.

This was also displayed by ONE EYE, who shot the best "SIZE GROUP" ever seen at Trail's End (around 150mm with 5 shots) only to disqualify himself when he found that gas checks were not permitted (ONE EYE went on to win the SPIRIT OF THE GAME AWARD).

Other award winners were: Best Dressed Lady – Princess Lia, Best Dressed Cowboy – Cow Pat, AMPRO SALES LTD ROSSI .30-30 RIFLE – Whisky Murphy, and HAYES & ASSOCIATES LTD CHI-APPA 1873 REVOLVER – Mr Lott.

At the very start of the opening ceremony, Cutie Kick-arse's Father was awarded the highest award when he was presented with FWSSA's PATRON'S TROPHY in recognition of his contribution towards the vast improvements at the Gladstone County Range and his long-term contribution to shooting sports as a 30-year member of the Club and as a MSC Instructor.

Action on Sunday involved an array of team shoots, the highlight being the world renowned "LOG



owboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> takes you "back in time to a better time and a better place in our country," said photographer and fiveyear Cowboy Action Shooter, El Roberto, SASS #69853. Nostalgia is a common feeling among several of the members of the club, many of whom grew up in the 1960s when cowboy movies and television shows saturated the media.

"Dressing up and having a holster and guns and shooting, makes me feel like a little kid because, when I was little, there were a lot of cowboy movies on television. I

watched those and wished I could be a cowboy riding a horse with guns, shooting," said El Roberto. Not only does the sport bring people back to their childhood, it also brings them back to a time when "people had honor, people had integrity." He added, "...Cowboy Action Shooters are people who believe in old values."

Lefty Longridge, SASS #9240, derives his alias from the fact he's left-handed and grew up playing

Cowboys and Indians on Longridge Street. He enjoys the combination of "the skill of shooting with the fantasy of being a cowboy for a weekend." Longridge shoots while wearing a cavalry outfit similar to one worn by John Wayne, one of his heroes, in many of his films.

Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> is a worldwide sport, and at the Hole in the Wall Gang shooting club in Piru, California, a group of 25 shooters have become a second family to each other. Lefty Longridge, as president of the club, holds matches in Piru every third weekend of the month.

Unlike other shooting clubs and organizations, Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup> tries to emulate the cowboy days. Not only do the shooting ranges set up facades to create the feeling of being in a real cowboy town, cowboy-like daytime meals consisting of eggs and biscuits or Mexican burritos are served before and after each match. Likewise, the shooters dress in period clothes and adopt Old West aliases.

El Roberto, who wears a sombrero and a serape as a tribute to his Mexican heritage, said although the alias his high school friends gave him is "grammatically, very incorrect," he chose it because, "I

shoot with a bunch of gringos, and the gringos are the ones who gave me that name." Smokey Burn, SASS #27232, a 68-year-old history buff and retired California fire chief, dresses as a late 1800s fire chief, sporting a bib-front shirt and old fire helmet.

Crazy Little Woman, SASS #82394, a 28-year-old financial consultant, said, "I never grew up saying, 'Oh yay, cowgirl stuff!" When she first joined the sport and found out what the dress code was, she said, "I have to wear a what?" Crazy Little Woman, whose husband created her alias, has now adopted a style of "cowboy mixed with Amish." Her personal style, however, seems somewhat contradictory to the cowboy theme. "I hate country music," said Crazy Little Woman. "I'm like a Metallica and hip hop kind of per-

son." Because the skirts she wears have to be long, she hems them up a little bit to make it easier to run, and, "when you have to go to the bathroom in the stupid Port-A-Potties, it's easier!"

In keeping with the cowboy theme, the group's guns also are from the 1800s. Shooters must use a single action revolver, a lever-action rifle, and a pump-action shotgun. El


Roberto and Crazy Little Woman enjoy shooting the 1897 Winchester pump shogun the most because, "it makes a little louder boom," said El Roberto. From roughly 9 A.M. to 2 P.M., the shooters advance through eight stages during which they have to shoot a combination of targets in varying orders as quickly and safely as possible.

Looking past the aliases and period attire, "you will never meet a nicer group of people anywhere in the world," said El Roberto. This opinion is shared by many members who used the same words, almost verbatim. "Cordial," "polite," "well-mannered," "open," and "honest" were the words El Roberto used to describe the other members. "These people are the most caring, selfless, generous people you will ever meet," said Crazy Little Woman. "Let's say you go there and your gun breaks. You will have five people saying, 'Here, use mine. Oh, you're out of ammo? Use mine.' It is incredible."

Crazy Little Woman views many of the other members as aunts, uncles, and grandparents because "they treat you like family." With the family-like relationship comes a great deal of trust. "You have to trust people," said Crazy Little Woman, "I mean, they have loaded weapons!" El Roberto agreed. "Nobody locks their cars out there," he said. "We have guns, we have bullets, women leave their purses in their cars, you leave your wallet in the car, you leave money sitting on the dashboard of your car, but nobody touches anything. Of course you've got 30 people with guns."

Some may think this politeness and honesty develops over time. However, when people come as spectators, other shooters constantly ask them, "Where are your guns? Why aren't you shooting? When are you going to start shooting?" Once the person gets lured in, "even the guy you're trying to beat will help you out," said El Roberto. "He'll give you his gun and say, 'Here, try to beat me with my gun."" Other members will "... teach you how to *(Continued on next page)*

carry, easy to hand out, and help give the person you're talking to something concrete to remember you by.



ast month my column focused on what I considered common sense arguments regarding guns and left you with this quote from Sam Adams, "And that said Constitution be never construed to authorize Congress ... to prevent the people of the United States, who are peaceable citizens, from keeping their own arms." This month, let's dig that well of common sense a little deeper and explore Adams' qualifying phrase 'peaceable citizens."

There's been much discussion over the years about whether felons should be allowed to keep and bear arms after serving their sentence. It's very unlikely we'll ever come to a national consensus on this issue, but I'll just offer up the view from my saddle, and you can have at it.

Anytime I encounter issues of human rights such as this, I first look to see if our Founders had anything to say on the subject by searching the Constitution and their personal writings, such as the Federalist and other letters. Since I believe these men were as close to divinely inspired as anyone could come when drafting our founding documents and giving birth to America, I don't think we can go wrong by seeking their counsel on such questions.

Sam Adams, one of the more passionate of our Founders, addressed this matter and forthrightly established his position stating peaceable citizens should not be prevented from keeping their own arms. I've always been in total agreement with that, but what about those who aren't peaceful?

It's clear to me violent felons

are certainly not the peaceable citizens Adams spoke of where the right to keep their own arms is concerned. Violent felons have proven themselves to be dangerously irresponsible and unworthy of handling certain civil liberties because by their actions they've aggressively infringed upon the rights of others to life, liberty, and property. If I understand Adams correctly, and I think I do, they have removed themselves from the "peaceable citizen" category.

Throughout my years of pondering, speaking on, and writing about such things, I've always maintained *individual behavior* should be the ultimate basis and sole focus of legal action, not universally restricting peaceful people or considering the tool used in the commission of a crime. My columns have never wavered from that absolute stand, and as his numerous writings indicate, Adams would have supported a similar view.

By its very nature, a felony is the more serious of crimes—serious enough that when one decides to pursue a felons' life, they have, in fact, chosen to surrender many of the liberties law abiding individuals enjoy in our society.

Does the felon then surrender those rights forever? I think it depends on the specifics of the crime. Is there a difference between a little milk toasty weasel who once dipped his hand into the cash drawer and a cold-blooded killer? I'd say so.

If the felony is a non-violent crime such as a first and only instance of embezzlement by this sticky fingered little weasel that then paid his debt to society and after which successfully demonstrated an ability to resume his role as a peaceful member of the community during a supervised probationary period, then again, I agree with Adams.

If, however, one leads a violent life of murder, robbery, rape, and assault, or is a career felon with a record as long as your arm on a variety of such charges, he's clearly shown he cannot reliably live the responsible life of a peaceable citizen. Therefore, the answer to the question of him keeping arms is no—as I believe Adams saw it. To decide otherwise would further place in serious jeopardy the life, liberty, and property of law abiding, "peaceable citizens"—it just wouldn't make any justifiable sense to so endanger honorable Americans.

Okay Colonel, what about the insane person who hasn't committed a violent felony? Should they be permitted to keep and bear arms? One fundamental facet of society the Founders stressed over the years was individual and collective responsibility. I think it's more than fair to say they knew and forewarned that in order for our Republic to survive, it had to depend on the actions and behavior of <u>responsible</u> people both in and out of government.

In my view, whatever the cause of a life tortured by insanity, those afflicted are by definition incapable of reliably achieving the level of responsibility shared by their neighbors. Their thought processes do not reach the level of consistent rationality demanded of an armed and peaceable citizen. Not to say this is the only restriction the insane may face. Depending on the level and type of illness, they may be obviously incapable of taking on other such serious responsibilities—a common sense conclusion. They are certainly afforded unalienable rights, but their mental ability to reliably exercise the judgment required of a peaceable and dependable gun owner is dangerously unpredictable, erratic, and inconsistent. Access to certain items should therefore be restricted for their own good, as well as the safety of those around them—once again, common sense as I define it. Theirs is a restriction imposed by an unfortunate mental condition; a condition that impedes judgment and the ability to handle some specific responsibilities rather than one imposed by a judicial or political denial of their rights. Certainly, we must

depend on an honestly obtained psychiatric evaluation from trusted and trained professionals regarding the level of responsibility they can reliably and consistently exercise.

I think we can all certainly agree common sense judgment about human shades of gray is required in many cases. Ergo, I support background checks to help determine if a potential gun owner is, has been, and will most likely remain the peaceable citizen to which Adams referred with the obvious caveat being that past behavior is no <u>solid</u> guarantee of future conduct.

Can these shades of gray be argued, discussed, pondered, and adjudicated? Absolutely, and they will and should be. In fact, our Founders provided for such latitude when establishing the basis of the legal system to which Americans are entitled.

Now are there any shades of gray in the right to keep and bear arms where rational and peaceable citizens are concerned? Absolutely Not! My "Absolutist" philosophy stands unwaveringly in support of those Adams referenced-always has; always will. In terms of such solid citizens, there's no question in my mind or even the slightest doubt of my personal conviction "... shall not be infringed" is absolutely clear with no "except for" qualifier where such Americans are concerned. As I stated very plainly and precisely last month, that's exactly what the Founders wrote because that's exactly what they meant and no amount of gun-grabbing legal babble can ever change the truth of it. On this, Sam and I are again of like mind—its just common sense. But I respectfully acknowledge the view from your saddle may differ. Contact Colonel Dan:
