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


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

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

how persuasive THAT was!

We live in interesting times ... the Old West is rapidly receding into the past. The day of the "sixgun" is past ... at least in the sense most men walk around with a big "hawg leg" strapped to their hip. The classic cowboy era—late 1860s - early 1890s—has run its course. We live in modern times, with big cities, large population centers, modern technology, and modern ideas. Guns are a thing of the past. Personal responsibility is a thing of the past. Credit is king. We need taken care of. We need to be told what to think. We're entitled to "the good life!"

I don't think so ... but there's more truth in that paragraph than I'm comfortable with.

There's a country song that says in part ... "if you don't stand for something, you'll fall for anything" ... and I believe that's true. The question is, what is it we stand for?

A trivial example of standing for something is planning. Many folks have an aversion to planning. If you plan and have goals, it's possible to fail ... so don't plan! On the flip side, with no plans or goals, you never know when you've succeeded ... and you've no idea where you're headed. Every day is a new day ... and it's an exciting, unpredictable life! But, is it satisfying? What is the probability of achieving great and wonderful things? Plans are good!

Whether one calls it ethics, morals, or simply right and wrong, one needs a framework that guides us through life always signaling us as to what's right and what's wrong. In the Old West, most folks had a pretty good notion of what they thought was right and wrong ... I'm certain today we don't. There's simply too much graft and corruption, especially in our political system, but also in our business and daily lives.

Church. I even served in the church in my early 20's. I no longer practice an organized religion, but my Sunday School training has had a lasting impact on me. The Ten Commandments are a good starting place for an ethics and morals training class. I believe our SASS cowboys are some of the best folks on earth, but I also believe we're in the minority. Many people simply have never been schooled in right and wrong and have never stopped to think about why they think about right and wrong the way they do. One needs to be taught ethics and morals.

(As an aside, New Mexico has a terrible record of public corruption ... our new Governor has stated "ethics is not a moral dilemma ... it's a crime! I hope she can make good on that thought.)

OK, so why have a political column?

In the beginning, the column dealt almost exclusively with Second Amendment issues. Without the right to possess and use firearms, the Single Action Shooting Society would be in a world of hurt. We wouldn't be able to suit up and play cowboy, purchase new guns, buy ammunition and reloadcomponents, transport firearms to matches, and on and Without a strong Second Amendment would we be out of business? No, not right away. We've seen how cowboys around the world are still able to play our game with no Second Amendment "rights," but it's difficult. And, there is a concerted move both here in the US and internationally to ban private ownership and use of all small arms. Those initiatives cannot be allowed to succeed ... not just because of our sport, but for the sake of freedom around the world. As terrible a thought as it is, personal ownership of firearms is the ONLY thing that keeps government at all levels from running roughshod over us.

Over time, the column has drifted away from being a singleissue piece. It attempts to deal with the fundamental concepts and precepts put forth by our Founding Fathers. What was the "original intent" of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights? It has helped me understand and adopt a set of ideals and develop a point of view for dealing with today's political environment I, through ignorance, didn't have before. And, judging from the cards and letters received by The Combon Chronicle, many others feel exactly the same way.

There are some few, however, who take offense. Politics is, of course, a very emotional subject. However, the column attempts to take the high road and deal with fundamental concepts. The column does not advocate a Republican position over a Democratic position. (Neither political party has covered itself with glory!) It touts limited government, personal responsibility, non-professional politicians, and on and on. No one wants to throw babies and indigent mothers into the streets to starve, but neither do we want a welfare state. No one is anti-immigration, but illegal immigrants and all that has gone with that are not appropriate.

Yes, we have a fantasy sport. Yes, it's an escape from our everyday lives. Yes, many would like to read about the latest six-guns, reloading, and shooting competitions and not have to deal with the political world in which we live. But, if we ignore that world, it can and will turn on us. We all need a firm foundation in understanding what's right and what's wrong. We need to remember what has made this country free and great ... and resolve to not let anyone take it away from us! That's why we need a political column.

SASS member recently asked a poignant question, "Is the SASS Chapel just for Christians?" And, the simple answer is, "no."

Even though SASS hosts a fantasy game, rather than historical reenactments, it reaches back into the history of the United States for many of its ideas and ideals. Many of our original immigrants and settlers were religious, and many of these folks were running from religious persecution. Our Founding Fathers were, for the most part, religious ... one has only to look at our Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and even our money to get the message. The prevalent religion in the Old West was one form of Christianity or another. Churches were built in towns as soon as families began to become influential. So, a chapel for Founders Ranch/END of TRAIL Town seemed like, and is, a "natural."

Were all of these churches

Christian? I don't know, but I suspect the answer is "no."

Today in SASS we have a broad spectrum of people of many faiths. In spite of today's "political correctness," this country is predominately Christian, and no one need be apologetic for that.

What we have at Founders will be a nondenominational Chapel ... not a church ... although religious services will certainly be held there from time to time. The Chapel is a quiet respite from the frantic match activities and daily life going on all around it. It is a religious place where one can be at peace with their God. It is a place where departed loved ones can be remembered and memorialized ... regardless of faith (or even lack of it!).

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WWHA TO MEET IN CODY, WYOMING!

fter a very successful convention last year at the Inn of the Mountain Gods in Ruidoso, New Mexico, the Wild West History Association (WWHA) has selected Cody, Wyoming, as the site of its 2011 Roundup.

The convention will be July 27-30, 2011 at the Cody Cattle Company, 1910 Damaris Street, just west of downtown.

SASS members will be very interested in this gathering. Not only is the Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, but so is the incredible Whitney Gallery of Western Art, the Plains Indian Museum, the Cody Firearms Museum (which houses a comprehensive collection of American firearms including the world-famous Winchester Collection), and The Draper Museum of Natural History.

The focus of this year's Roundup will be on the Wild West history of Wyoming and adjacent states, including the Johnson County War, Tom Horn, The Wild Bunch, Liver Eatin' Johnson, and Jack Stilwell, who is buried at Old Trail Town next door to our meeting site, The Cody Cattle Company. A book signing for WWHA authors is also planned in the BBHC lobby on Friday afternoon, July 29.

The Roundup begins with a Reception Wednesday evening, July 27, in the Buffalo Bill Historical Center's (BBHC) McCracken Library Gallery, where the Wild West History Association's Gallery of Gunfighters (a permanent exhibit) will be in place. Respected authors and researchers will give presentations on their latest books and findings about the Wild West. The WWHA Annual Banquet will be held on Saturday evening, July 30, at The Cody Cattle Company.

For those interested in traveling farther afield, Cody is conveniently close to the Little Bighorn

Battlefield National Monument, the Custer Battlefield, and the Reno-Benteen Battlefield. Cody is also on the way to the East Gate of Yellowstone National Park.

The WWHA always concludes its Roundup with an annual banquet, which will be held on Saturday evening, July 30, at The Cody Cattle Company. Period costumes are encouraged.

For more information, visit the Wild West History Association's website. Special rates for accommodations are going fast. It looks to be an outstanding event. ...

HOW DID THEY DO THAT?

Ilike baked beans and, fortunately, my wife likes to cook. As it is her hobby, she is very good at it. At least I like the results. I was enjoying some home made baked beans the other day when my wife asked me how the trail cooks got the beans cooked. As I understand it from many years of reading westerns, the trail menu consisted of beans, beef, bacon, and biscuits. So beans were a staple item in the diet.

To prepare the baked beans, my wife soaks the beans for at least overnight. She then pours the water out, puts fresh water in the pot of beans, adds the rest of the ingredients, and puts the pot back in the slow cooker. They cook for five or six hours. The question is—how did the cook get the time to cook the beans over an open fire for five or six hours while on the trail?

Because the chuckwagon was rolling most of the time during daylight hours, Cookies (who were often called "bean shooters" by their cowhands) usually cooked their beans over a slow fire overnight. After breakfast they packed the bean pot up in the wagon, drove to the next trail camp, unloaded the beans, and warmed them up again before mealtime. Because beef was so handy on the trail drive, Steak & Beans was the most common entrée served up to the drovers.

For variety, have your Missus check out the many bean recipes posted on the Internet. I guarantee you, you'll never run out of beans! ... Whooper Crane) ...

World Championship of Cowboy Action ShootingTM. "The rest is history" as they say, and now SASS has proudly grown to over 90000 members. Again, time flies.

2011 is a landmark year in the history of SASS. First of all, Winter Range is celebrating its 20th anniversary. That's right, folks. Our National Championship is 20 years old and shows no signs of aging. Winter Range 2011 was sold out over a month before the start date as well as the Wild Bunch match, again almost two months before its start date. Few matches equal the creativity and energy that come from the Arizona Territorial Company of Rough Riders, and it is a true testament to the greatness of their organization as they continue to put on fantastic matches year after year. As I write this, Winter Range has not yet come to pass, and I personally can't wait to see what they have in store for this year.

This year also marks the 15th anniversary of the SASS Shooting Program. The program began with only a few Regional matches, the Shootout at Mule Camp, Hell on Wheels, and Susquehanna Roundup. The Regional program has expanded to nine Regionals across the US. We have state matches in all 50 states, a US National Championship, along with six other international champi-

onships and a World Championship to round out the SASS International Cowboy Action ShootingTM Program, not to mention the Blackpowder Shootouts, SASS Mounted, and Wild Bunch State matches we now have coming along.

In addition, this year will mark the 30th Anniversary of END of TRAIL. It has certainly come a long way from 1982 and the 65 shooters that competed in that first END of TRAIL. This year we are planning our biggest bash ever. The match is already about half full and we are realistically expecting it to fill up long before the first of June. Plans for a bigger and better Wild West Show by Dr. Buck promises not to disappoint. Saturday night's entertainment will proudly present Big Red Sky. If you missed the concert last vear. Frederick Jackson Turner and the band rocked the house. We are also currently working on entertainment that will be worth the price of admission alone. And maybe even a fireworks show (if the law will allow it.) Pack your party hats, pards!

END OF TRAIL will also include the World Championship of Wild Bunch Action Shooting the same week. Judging by the response it has received at Winter Range, this could be the largest Wild Bunch Match ever. The ac-

tion main match, AKA the World Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting $^{\text{TM}}$ will revisit some of the best stages written over the last twenty-nine years. Some of these old stages had only one revolver in them, but we will be adding a 30^{th} Anniversary twist to them so they will, shall we say, test your metal.

2011 also marks the tenth Anniversary of the SASS Convention. It seems only a few years ago I had an appointment with Agnes Smith at the Riviera Hotel to discuss the possibility of turning the Territorial Governors Summit into a full-blown convention. That was December of 2001 and the first convention was December of 2002. Again, my how time flies!

The 2011 SASS Convention

will be revisiting one of the most popular themes of the past nine years. The theme will be "Masquerade." There were truly some of the most amazing costumes in that first Masquerade Ball, and I am sure this year's ball will be no different. This year's headline entertainment for the Convention is currently under negotiations. Look for an announcement soon.

This landmark year is sure to bring back a multitude of fond memories for many SASS members that have been with us along the trail these many years. 



Curly Musgrave

purchased this bell 42 years ago and named her "Big Marie." It had about 30 layers of paint on the frame and bell, and I did not know it was bronze until I started stripping it. After restoring this treasure it was used on my ranch in Sonora, CA. and truly has never been out of my sight for all of these years. Currently living in a closely packed neighborhood, it gets rung on July 4th and New Years Eve, but needs to be somewhere where it will be seen, heard, and appreciated.

I will polish the bell and acorn, strip and repaint the frame, and remount it on a temporary wood base for delivery to Founders Ranch. The bottom of the swing frame is curved with a line of rivet pockets, as it was mounted on the boiler of a locomotive with two large bolts. It has lived its entire life outdoors and truly shows no sign of it. The total weight is about 322 lbs. I have been asked to donate it to the California State Railroad Museum in Sacramento, but would much rather have her near cowboys that stand in manure than politicians that spout it.

The bell itself is cast of bell bronze (high silver content) that keeps it from weathering to any sort of patina (no green). Its voice is LOUD and CLEAR

I will miss having "Big Marie" at hand, but knowing she tolls for Jim "Curly" Musgrave, to a group of people that will keep the glory days of the West alive, brings peace and joy to my heart. As part of the donation, I can provide a bronze memorial plaque if you wish. We can determine the size and wording to suit Founders Ranch, and have it cast by Matthews Bronze (I own a funeral home).

Curly Musgrave died December 13, 2009 of a short but devastating illness. He was on the Board of Directors of the Western Music Association, a very talented songwriter, composer, guitar player, and cowboy singer. He received many

well-deserved awards and with his singing partner, Belinda Gail, won many more duet awards. I have shared this donation plan with his wife, Kathi. She said Jim would be very proud of this gesture, thanked Diane and I for the thought, and as he had entertained as a cowboy to cowboys at END of TRAIL in California and New Mexico, it was a fitting place for a memorial. 
WICTORIAN TEA An Elegant Pastime

The fact that it starred Robert Duvall and Kevin Costner had a lot to do with its quality, but another





Michael got his schooling in London. He was a fully qualified engineer by the time he was 21. But Michael had other ideas about how he meant to spend his life. He had gotten the acting bug while attending drama school at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London. He decided to pursue a career "trodding the boards" rather than "pushing the sliderule."

His rugged good looks and aggressive delivery got him many dramatic roles on some of the best stages in Great Britain. He also caught the attention of film producers who saw him as a future leading man. He was even sought out to audition as a replacement for George Lazenby as the new James Bond.

His big breakthrough, however, came from TV when he was cast as the famous Detective, Philip Marlow, in The Singing Detective series. He starred in several other critically-acclaimed TV presentations, most notably as French Detective Inspector Maigret in the BBC series Maigret.

Honors usually follow quality acting, and Michael was pleased when he was nominated for an Emmy for his portrayal of President Lyndon Johnson in the highlyregarded TV mini-series, Paths to War, in 2002.

When Hollywood called. Michael answered in spades. His key roles in flicks such as Sleepy Hollow, Gosford Park, Sky Captain and the World of Tomorrow, The

the Colters Hell Justice Committee to regulate free grazer activity in the Big Horn Basin. Everett assisted them in subduing the free grazer incursions.

Everett then turned his horse southward again, arriving at the outskirts of Tombstone, in Arizona Territory. At the questionable Tombstone Livery, Everett was engaged by the Tombstone Ghost Rider Outlaws in an arrant shootout. The Tombstone Livery (and Tombstone itself) was home to a number of characters of various degrees of notoriety, such as the infamous Calamity, Doc Holiday, and, of course, Wyatt Earp.

Wyatt deputized Everett to infiltrate the Red Sash Gang to bring

about their destruction. At the same time, Katie the Temptress, from Appaloosa, emigrated to Tombstone and began plying her trade at the Crystal Palace where Everett and Katie were reunited.

Everett, Wyatt, Doc Holiday, and Marshall Bill Hill combed the saloons and gambling dens, including the Crystal Palace and Pharo Bank. They were able to flush their quarry, and the members of the Red Sash Gang were either eliminated or brought to justice.
















THE.44 WCF CARTRIDGE (_44-40)

The Round that Tamed the Old West PART 3 REVOIVETS

n the first installment of this series, I detailed the development of the .44 Winchester Center Fire cartridge, and the rifles of the Old West that were chambered for it. As I said in that article, it amazes me a rifle/pistol cartridge developed 137 years ago is still going strong. The .44 WCF is an effective and useful cartridge


still. In this installment, I will discuss the revolvers that were used as the six-gun half of the Old West rifle/pistol combinations. The four most common pistols chambered for the .44-40 were: Colt 1873 Peacemaker, Remington 1875 and 1890, Smith & Wesson New Model No. 3 top break, and finally, the less common Merwin, Hulbert Co. revolvers.

BACKGROUND

The first Winchester round used in rifles and revolvers used the anemic .44 caliber Henry rim fire cartridge with a conical 215 or 200 grain flat bullet over 25-29 grains of coarse blackpowder. Even the improved 200 grain .44 Henry still left a lot to be desired in the stopping power department. Winchester

foresaw the need for a more powerful cartridge and rifle to tame the west with its wide-open spaces. The new Winchester rifle, Model of 1873, utilized a more powerful cartridge that was developed by Winchester specifically for the rifle

The .44 WCF (Winchester Center Fire), or .44-40, as it is now called, had a .427 diameter, 205



grain, flat nosed, lead bullet over 40 grains of FFFG blackpowder. Out of a rifle, it would achieve somewhere around 1320 fps. Out of a pistol, it approached today's magnum standards, pushing a 205grain bullet at about 1,000 to 1,100 fps out of a handgun. After the .44-40 rifles popularity started to grow, pistol manufacturers revisited the concept of a rifle and revolver that used the same ammunition. With availability of a large list of assorted caliber ammunition on the frontier iffy at best, the one cartridge for rifle and handgun on the frontier made marketing sense.

1873 Colt Frontier Six-Shooter .44-40

The Colt Single Action Army was a vast improvement over the percussion revolvers of the day. The 1873 Colt SAA had a robust solid frame with a top strap, rather than the strapless two part frames of the

percussion Colts. Initially offered, the Colt 1873 revolver was only manufactured in .45 Colt. Colt was very savvy, and he was the first to realize the potential importance to a Frontiersman of a pistol in the same caliber as his rifle. In late 1874 or early 1875, the new 1873 revolver was offered in .44 Henry rimfire to be a companion to the 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchester rifles. Colt already had a companion revolver in their 1872 "Open Top" .44

Henry revolver.

It was not until 1878, however, that the 1873 "Colt Frontier Six-Shooter" was released in .44 WCF to be a companion piece to the popular 1873 Winchester. The Colt 1873s were the most popular single action cartridge revolvers of all times. The second most popular caliber in the Colt 1873 was the .44-40. Prior to 1900, Colt made more .44-40 revolvers than all other manufacturers combined.

THE REMINGTON 1875 AND 1890 .44-40 REVOLVERS

Remington made what is sometimes called the "Other Peacemaker." In 1875, Remington introduced its "No. 3, Model of 1875." In basic appearance, it resembled the Colt 1873, though it had a distinctive web under the barrel that approximated the look of the ramrod assembly on the percussion models. This under-barrel web was allegedly for strength, but in all

probability for its aesthetic value, to retain that distinctive "Remington" look. Its ejector rod assembly was alongside the right side of the web, but unlike the Colt, you accessed the ejector rod from the right, instead of under the barrel. Many people believe Remington actually was trying to approximate the look of the 1873 Colt, but actually it was the other way around. Remington

had introduced the solid top strap on their 1858 revolvers, and Colt copied it with their 1873.

The 1875 Remington was originally offered in Remington's proprietary .44/100 cartridge (also called the .44 Remington, though it was nearly identical to the .44 Colt). A short time later, it was introduced in .44 WCF (.44-40) as a companion gun to the 1873 Winchster.

Many original examples of .44-40 Remingtons show evidence the cylinders used for the .44-40 Remington were actually bored out .44/100 cylinders. Instead of the cylinder adjacent the forcing cone being the .427 inch of the .44-40 bullet, they are the .442 inch of the .44/100 cartridge.

While the Remington Revolvers were not as plentiful as the 1873 Colts (there were only about 20,000 Remingtons made), they still made a significant contribution to the Old West. The most famous of the 1875 Remington fans was the Outlaw Frank

James, who in 1882 turned in his 1875 Remington and holster to Missouri's Governor Crittenden. James is quoted as saying he favored the .44-40 Remington revolver as it was the flattest shooting, hardest hitting revolver he ever shot.

In an attempt to bolster sagging revolver sales, in 1890 Remington released a supposedly improved, modified version of the 1875, called the 1890 Police revolver. It was similar to the 1875, though it generally had gutta-percha (hard rubber) grips instead of wood, and the under-barrel web was cut down. It was available only in .44-40. It was not very successful, and was not produced in great numbers.

THE SMITH & WESSON New Model No. 3 TOP BREAK

Smith & Wesson wanted to mar-

ket a more powerful revolver to meet the needs of the frontier. S&W applied their Rollin White patent to a new "top break" design revolver. Instead of the barrel tipping up, like on the No. 1 and 2, the frame was hinged at the front of the frame, and the barrel and cylinder tipped down. When the action was opened, the mechanism activated an ejector star in the middle of the rear face of the cylinder, simultaneously ejected all six empty cases. Six fresh rounds could then be quickly loaded. This new revolver was called their "No. 3 American Model." Released in 1870, it was promptly submitted to the Army Ordnance Board for trials as a possible replacement for the 1860 Colt Army .44, and 1858 Remington .46 caliber rim-fire conversions that were in service. It was originally offered only in .44 Henry rim fire, though versions were offered in .44 American (what amounted to a center fire .44 Henry round), and also in a new inside lubed .44 Russian cartridge.

Many officers and enlisted men preferred the Smith & Wesson No. 3s. While the US Army bought about 2,000 of the new No. 3 Americans for issue, large numbers were also privately purchased by the troops. The S&Ws were carried in many engagements against the Native Americans, several years before the Colt Single Action Army revolver was finally issued. Major George Schofield, patented several modifications to the No. 3 to make it easier to reload on horseback while holding the reins. In 1875, Schofield submitted this modified No. 3 to the Ordnance Board. It was adopted as

substitute standard in 1875. The "Schofield Model" was in a new .45 Smith & Wesson caliber, more powerful than the .44 American. It had a 230-grain conical lead bullet pushed by 29 grains of blackpowder.

By 1880, Smith & Wesson was very successful in pocket pistol sales, and overseas contracts for the full size No. 3 revolvers in various calibers. Their domestic sales of full size revolvers were not making a serious dent in Colt's 1873 Peacemaker sales. Part may be due to the popularity of Colts and Remingtons as companion guns in the "rifle" calibers like .44-40. Part of the lack luster domestic sales was also due to the limited power of the cartridges used by S&W up to that point: .44 Henry, .44 Russian, .44 American, and .45 Schofield. Smith & Wesson needed a new and stronger platform for the more powerful .44-40 cartridge. The following quote from Jim Supica, now head of the National Firearms Museum, says it best:

"In 1878, S&W discontinued production of it's other Model 3'sthe American, Russian, and Schofield-in favor of a new improved design called the New Model Number Three. Standard chambering was .44 Russian, although other calibers were offered on special order or in related models such as the .44-40 Frontier Model, the .32-44, and .38-44 Target Models ... Their accuracy was such that they were used to set most of the target records of the era."

I have to agree with Mr. Supica. If I were a rich man and could own any original Old West pistol, it would be a New Model No. 3 in .44-40. Paired it up with an 1889 or 1894 Marlin in the same caliber, and you could take on all comers.

Merwin, Hulbert & Co Revolvers.

Army and Pocket Army

The fourth most popular revolver in the Old West was made by Merwin Hulbert. Coincidentally, it was also the fourth most popular re-

volver chambered for the .44-40 cartridge. I am devoting more rhetoric in this article to the Merwin Hulbert because you seldom read much about it. Articles about Colt, Remington, and S & W abound.

In my humble opinion, the Merwin Hulbert .44-40 Army and Pocket Army are the most technologically advanced weapons in the Old West. The precision machining exhibited by these weapons is challenging even by today's CNC milling machines standards. They were way ahead of their time in design and execution of concept. The revolvers were produced for Merwin

Hulbert & Co. by Hopkins and Allen Co. of Norwich, CT. Hopkins & Allen was actually a subsidiary of Merwin & Hulbert Co. They began manufacturing the revolvers in about 1876, finally ceasing production around 1891. They could still be found in catalogs even after 1894. Total numbers are unknown due to a fire destroying all factory records.

While Merwin Hulbert made many different models in half a dozen calibers and sizes, the Army and Pocket Army are the pinnacle of 19th Century gun makers art. The models offered in .44-40 were marked "Calibre 1873 Winchester" on the barrel. These large, somewhat unconventional looking revolvers have the most ingenious ejection system ever developed. The rounds are loaded into the cylinder from the rear through a loading gate, like a Colt or Remington. As the cylinder is rotated to expose an empty chamber for loading, the rim of the cartridge just placed in the

chamber rotates and engages a recess and rebated channel in the outside edge of the frame's recoil plate. This channel encircles the recoil plate, with the exception of the loading gate area. The revolver is operated in the normal manner for firing.

This unique rebated recoil plate comes into play when emptying the revolver. To eject the empty rounds from the cylinder, a catch is depressed on the forward portion of the frame, and the barrel and cylinder is rotated 90 degrees as a unit. They are then pulled straight forward on the cylinder arbor. The rims of the

empty cartridges are still held captive by the rebated recoil plate channel as the cylinder moves forward. When the case mouths clear the rear of the cylinder, the cases fall free, gravity doing the work. Theoretically, at least, you can stop the forward motion of the cylinder just far enough for the empty case to fall free, while the longer, still loaded rounds stay in place with the bullet still within the rear of the cylinder. Whether it really works that way under stress is doubtful.

The earliest Merwin Hulbert design had no top strap on the frame

like an 1860 or 1872 Colt. The cylinder had long, closed trough shaped flutes. Later models had a familiar looking top strap, with standard flutes the same as Colt and Remington. The top strap was part of the barrel assembly, engaging the rear frame with a downward pointing protrusion that engaged a notch in the frame above the recoil plate. While it prevented some frame stretch, it was still not as effective or strong as a Colt or Remington top strap. Needless to say, an action this finely crafted and machined was not terribly robust. From what I have read, the Merwin Hulbert was not nearly as sturdy as the Colt or Remington revolvers, but rather on a par with the Smith & Wesson No. 3 top breaks as far as reliability.

Barrel lengths ran from a stubby 3.5 inches on some Pocket Army revolvers, out to a full 7 inches on Army Models. One distinctive feature of the Pocket Army Model revolvers was the "birdshead" grip with a steel triangle protruding from the base. It was referred to as a "Skull Cracker" for ob-

vious reasons. If it were brought down with sufficient force on a miscreants head, it would crack and puncture the skull resulting in a potentially terminal outcome!

The Merwin Hulbert full size Army Models were never adopted by the US Army. It did find Military sales in Mexico, Imperial Russia, and several other countries. Domestically, it was relatively popular, ranking just below Remington and Smith & Wesson in sales. Merwin Hulbert's biggest domestic sales were actually in the smaller caliber "pocket pistols" and their .38 Police Revolvers. If you like one, be prepared to pay a lot of money. Good originals are exceptionally rare!

Conclusion

The .44 WCF cartridge was one of the most popular cartridges of the Old West. Compared to many pistol cartridges of the era, it was a hot-rod approaching some of today's .357 Magnum loads. It had taken its toll of badmen, lawmen, Native Americans, and in a rifle, more than its fair share of game animals. I hope the .44-40 lives another 100 years! .4.

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


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RESTORING A VINTAGE Airstream Tra

Part 4~FRAME



uring our first trip with our restored 1969 Airstream trailer we attended four different state shoots and shot at clubs in Georgia and Alabama through the winter. When we got set up at an RV park in Georgia I noticed a problem occurring on the trailer rear frame. We were attending a little country Church and at one of our gatherings I mentioned the problem. One of the gals present said she knew someone that restored Airstream trailers on a regular basis, and she got me his phone number. What he told me was disheartening. It was something like this. Back then Airstream used the same size sheet metal bent channel on all their trailer frames. The longer the

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trailer, the farther the overhang behind the axles. As a result if there was a little extra weight in the back or a little rust on the steel channel the frame would bend. Our 1969 trailer is 29 feet long, and you guessed it, the frame was bent. They do make repair kits for them, but he advised me to part company with it. I told him that was not an option as I had already spent too much time and money on it, and it would be like getting rid of an old friend.

Now an adequate frame or foundation is very important. It says in Matthew 7:25, "The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock." The foundation of a trailer is its frame. If it fails going down the road at 60 MPH in a rainstorm it would be a "great crash."

So I prayed about it and made some inquiries. Then I put my God given talents and 30 + years of experience as a millwright/welder into use. I consulted our son, Gold Tooth Dave, who is also a millwright/welder about what I had come up with. We talked it over and ended up with a final plan.

I bought a length of 3" standard channel iron. The original frame is "C" channel made out of what looked like 10 gauge steel around five inches high. We cut open the aluminum under belly around 18 inches deep (cross ways to trailer) and 30 inches long (running with trailer length) right behind the rear wheels. inspection the frame was bent on both sides right behind the plate that holds the axles in place. We jacked up the rear frame on both sides and set it on jack stands to the point that it was pushed up in place. The measurements were taken between the axle plate and 3" channel that is welded onto the bottom of the original frame at the back of the trailer. The 3" standard channel was cut to match the angle at the back and overlap the axle plate in the front, around 9". Then two 1/2" holes were drilled in the axle plate and channel on the front and bolted in place. A 1/4" by 3" by 24" fish plate was welded on the back to connect the 3" standard channel to the existing 3" channel. Then a floor jack was used to push the 3" channel up to

the trailer frame and two 1/4" by 3" by 7" steel hangers were placed evenly on each side. They have a 1/2" hole in the top and are bolted to the original trailer frame. The bottom was welded to the new piece of 3" channel. Silicone caulk was placed behind the tops of the hangers where they are bolted onto the trailer frame. The channel was bolted and welded to the axle plate. Some type of lock tight should be used on all bolts and nuts. CAUTION: There is foam insulation above the frame that can catch on fire. We wetted it down and had adequate fire protection available.

All this resulted in a bridgework that increased the depth of the back of the frame to around 8" and greatly improved the integrity of the trailer. The structure was primed and then painted an aluminum color. It is hardly noticed and looks like it belongs there.

In retrospect, 4" standard channel iron might be a better choice. The bottom 1" of the channel could extend under the existing 3" channel in the back another 12" to 16" and a 1/4" by 4" by proper length fish plate could be welded on giving it a little more strength. If the trailer is over 29' this might be a wiser choice. Happy camping and keep the greasy side down.

out and a holy "instant" background check performed. In the 40+ years this was the law, these miscreants, ne'er do wells, and rogues have committed ... well, zero crimes with these guns (assuming bad writing isn't a crime). But, apparently it was only a matter of time, maybe, at this rate, by the twelfth of never. So, to protect the poor, defenseless public from us evil,

degenerate gun writers, the BATFE changed the regulations so ALL guns loaned to gun writers had to be transferred via 4473 and

Aside from the inconvenience factor of having to fill out another holy Form 4473 every time we tested a gun, this was no problem to most... except people who stay out of their state of legal residence for more than a year at a time. Among the hundreds of gun writers in the United States, that totals probably ... oh, about ... one. Unfortunately for me, it's me. Even so, it's not a problem with a long gun because I can transfer from a dealer in a nearby state. But I can't transfer a handgun except in the great State of Texas.

Thus, when Taylor's started offering a 1911, I was unable to get one until I went to Texas for Comin' At

'Cha, the annual Dooley Gang Party with Southwest Regional attached. But, I finally got it, with no little difficulty. It was worth the effort.

Armscor, Arms Corporation of the Philippines, makes the gun. Other importers include Rock Island Armory and Legacy Sports International, which sells them under the Citadel brand. They have a good reputation for being a solid, well-made, low priced 1911 that works. Back when I started shooting 1911s

(when the earth was flat and TV news was in black and white), mine all said "Property US Government" on the side. In the civilian world, they were all Colts. No one was making "clones." They all worked. I shot a few thousand rounds of milspec ammo through guns issued to me (and one acquired "outside the normal military supply chain" when a colonel took mine away—a story for another day), and I never saw one malfunction. Then came IPSC and gunsmiths making the warhorse into a thoroughbred. About then other companies started selling 1911s other than Colt. The bad ones went out of business. The good ones flourished. Neither they nor Colts

were "bargain" priced. Armscor is probably the most successful of "bargain" priced 1911 makers. The first Traditional Category World Champion shot a visibly stock Armscor gun. Nearly all work fine out of the box. If they don't, their warranty service, in Pahrump, Nevada, is excellent. Working is important. There are no "restarts" in combat.

1911 vs. 1911A1

The U. S. Army accepted John Moses Browning's masterpiece on March 29, 1911. (Why this isn't a national holiday I'll never know.)

Navy and USMC adoption followed in 1913. World War I battlefield experience caused some minor external changes, which culminated in 1924 as the M1911A1. Complaints from combatants included the fact the gun pointed low. The cure for that was an arched mainspring housing versus the original straight one. People with small hands complained about the trigger being too far away to use easily. Two changes

were made; a short trigger replaced the original long one, and crescent shaped cutouts were made in the frame behind the trigger. These allowed people with smaller hands to reach the trigger better. Hammer bite was a problem with the original, so a longer tang on the grip safety was fitted. The front sight was considered invisible in combat, so it increased in size. It still was tiny by modern standards. The wooden grip panels were simplified by eliminating the double diamond reliefs.

Mostly 1911

The gun Taylor's sent me is mostly 1911, not A1. This isn't a bad thing. It is more appropriate for the 1916 time frame of Wild Bunch matches. The frame doesn't have the cutouts, making it a 1911 frame. The hammer is 1911A1, a narrow burr hammer that is just long enough to bite the web of your hand when you think it won't. The trigger is a short 1911A1 trigger, and the mainspring housing is flat

and checkered 20 lines/inch. The little diamonds have just enough flat so they won't cut your hand.

Issued 1911s had a lanyard loop that didn't fit the clip on the M1905 Lanyard very well, leading to lanyard loops on issued magazines. Remember, this was a cavalry sidearm. The M1917 Lanyard cured this problem. Now days the purpose of a lanyard loop is to really hurt the palm of your hand when you do a speed reload.

The grip panels are finely checkered and matte finished wood with a prominent grain pattern. The external finish of the gun is matte black bluing. The innards are pure 1911, internal extractor, and no Series 80 firing pin safety. The left-side, right-thumb only safety is a 1911A1 pattern, being a bit bigger than 1911s. The slide release is checkered on the top-gripping surface.

The mag well is almost straight, with no beveling. The barrel has a high polish. The barrel bushing is tighter than GI. There is no full-length guide rod. This is a good thing since (a) they're illegal in Traditional Category and (b) their sole purpose is to sell full-length guide rods. The ejection port has been lowered so it doesn't dent fired brass, not a factor in military guns, but important since we reload our ammunition.

The chamber has been throated so it will feed hollow point bullets. This is unnecessary for match usage, but nice if vou're going to use it for self-defense. (I'm not in favor of using a match gun as your planned self-defense gun. The former should be unloaded except at the loading table. The latter should be unloaded only when you're cleaning it. Getting either of those wrong can be tragic.) The sights are original 1911A1 size. The gun comes with two excellent eight round magazines marked "ACTMAG" that aren't legal for SASS Wild Bunch competition because they have extended base

pads. Since you will need at least seven, this is only a minor loss.

Shooting


Normally no 1911 variant should be considered ready to use until 200 rounds have been shot through it. Several models go from clunker to race gun in 200 rounds. Giving the gun no slack, instead of field stripping it, degreasing it, and oiling it to taste, I just started shooting it with match ammo (200 gr. LRNFP, 5.0 gr. Trail Boss, Federal primers). I was planning to note every malfunction. After more than 200 rounds I didn't have any. Well, that shortens the report, doesn't it?

The gun shot to point of aim at 10 yards. Ten yard groups shot off-hand were considerably better than rack-grade GI guns I have known. I had trouble shooting tiny hand held groups because of the tiny sights and really bad cross light at Cowtown (Phoenix) in winter (and because I don't shoot very

well). You will note no measured hand-held groups. I'm not one of those gun writers who can outshoot a Ransom Rest when no one is looking. When shooting for speed, the sights were less of a handicap, and I got used to them pretty quickly. I would prefer bigger sights, but I can live with these. I did when the targets shot back—and occasionally first.

Magazines

I used stainless Colt sevenround magazines, seven-round stainless Tripp magazines, and blued eight-round McCormick magazines for testing. All of them worked flawlessly with the exception of the eight-round magazines, both ACTMAG and McCormick, which wouldn't reliably feed the first round if I inserted a full magazine and then racked the slide. If I loaded one into the gun, and then inserted a full eight-round magazine, the gun fired all nine without problems. I considered this a magazine/ammunition problem, not a gun problem. Obviously, this has no effect for Wild Bunch matches where only five-rounds can be loaded at a time. I had no problems with seven-round magazines. All of the magazines dropped free when practicing speed reloads.

The trigger measured 6.5 lb. on my Lyman Trigger Pull gauge. This isn't a match grade trigger, but it's a good combat trigger with a little take-up and no perceptible creep. Let's just say I sure would have liked to have this gun in the jungle. I developed a high level of confidence in it very quickly.

Optimizing for SASS Wild Bunch competition

This gun is ready to use in Traditional category competition out of

the box. Like most 1911s, this one can be "optimized" for our competition. The main things your gun needs, according to Col. Cooper, are a trigger you can use and sights you can see. GI style sights are required for Traditional Category, but the rules were written around existing guns. Some have small sights. Some have bigger sights. Thus, putting on sights as big as, for example, the Springfield Armory Mil-Spec, a current Colt Series 80 1991A1, a Remington R1, or a Para-Ordnance Wild Bunch is legal.

The rear sight is in a dovetail slot, so drifting it out and drifting in another is easy. The front sight is a different story. It's swaged. A gunsmith can install a Colt front sight, or it is legal to cut a dovetail slot and install a dovetailed front sight. A taller 0.125" wide front sight and a 0.125" – 0.15" rear sight notch (on a taller rear sight) allows enough light for quick sight acquisition. Traditional category rules require the sights to be blued or blackened, which is a shame since we seem to use a lot of black targets.

Trigger

A good 1911 gunsmith can tune the trigger pull to 4 lb. with the stock innards. This should be more than adequate for Wild Bunch Traditional category competition. The mag well can be beveled to the edge of the frame. You can purchase the gun with either an arched or straight mainspring housing. You can further tune the size of the grip to your hand by switching to a long solid trigger if needed.

Dehorning:

As I type this, I note the renewed hole in the web of my shooting hand from the "edges" in the grip tang and hammer bite. The cure for this is dehorning, taking the sharp edge off the parts. See photo 5. Every corner or "edge" that touches the web of your strong hand needs to be dehorned. A good gunsmith can do this and re-blue the pieces. You can do it yourself if you're careful and not in a hurry. Dehorning the spur hammer enough to keep it from cutting your hand is a good idea, too. As far as I know every mil-spec 1911 needs this work for most people. This is why beavertail grip safeties are so popular for guns not restricted by the SASS Wild Bunch Traditional Category regulations.

Mag Well

The mag well can be beveled to make the opening a larger target, speeding reloads, a good idea for all 1911s. See photos 3 and 4.


Options

Four options are available from Taylors. The 1911STD has a check-

ered straight mainspring housing. The 1911AC has a checkered arched mainspring housing. The 1911AS has a smooth arched mainspring housing. The first three retail for \$499. The 1911LYNRD has a straight mainspring housing with a lanyard ring. It retails for \$525. All have a matte blued finish, short trigger, and checkered wood grips.

Conclusion

You can spend more for a 1911, but this one has everything you need for Wild Bunch Traditional Category, and it works. If they would just put bigger sights on it, it would be right there with more expensive guns. You should be able to get such sights for a lot less, leaving you money for something you really need, such as ivory stocks with a scrimshawed naked lady. 🌲

cowboy became a part of history.

If you look deep into the history of the West, however, you'll find the flinty hide of the longhorn steer continued playing a big role in the winning of the West. Rawhide—the green, untanned hide of the bovine animal—literally held the West together.

When most folks think of rawhide, they think of the beautiful braided reins, quirts, hobbles and reatas in museums and the pages of books. These are the heights of the rawhider's and reatero's craft, but they are an exception. Most rawhide items were much humbler than these.

Consider the far reaches of the frontier. There weren't any hard-

ware stores within easy riding distance, so the materials at hand had to be adapted to the needs of the moment. Rawhide stretched and laced onto a frame served as many a door or window on a settler's cabin or a cowboy's line shack. If they were lucky enough to have a wooden door, the hinges would often be fashioned of rawhide.

A flint (raw) hide often served as a "kitchen table" spread on a dirt floor. The same hide would also see use as a bed at night. As time permitted, chair seats might be fashioned from rawhide—either as a solid seat or from interwoven strips. Rawhide strung between a framework against a cabin wall formed a useful and not-too-un-

comfortable bed-at least when compared to the same hide on a dirt floor!

Strips of rawhide were used to hold fences, corrals, and other structures together. J Frank Dobie mentions the rafters in the roof of the original Mormon Tabernacle were lashed in place with rawhide. At the time of his writing, the structure had already stood for 80 years!

When the great trail herds were pointed north, rawhide was slung under the wagons to hold wood or buffalo chips for fires. Settlers had a similar arrangement for their wagons. This sling saw double duty in carrying their kids across the land—literally becoming

(Continued from previous page) a cradle for them!

Freighters and other travelers who used wagons and carts used rawhide to bind their wheels. In the dry, arid west, it was not unusual for the wood to shrink so much that iron wheel rims fell off the wheels. Wide rawhide "whangs" were cut, wet down, and wrapped around the wheels and rim, and when the rawhide shrank, the two were bound together. The only thing that could cut the rawhide was sharp rock. There are stories of wagon wheels tied together this way making 700 miles!

Horse's hooves were often bound with shoes made of rawhide. (This was an old Apache trick the white man took on.) Essentially, a circle was cut, softened up with water, and brought around the hoof like a bag with a cinch string along the top. You had to be careful about how the job was done, as you could rough up a horse's heel or fetlock, but done carefully, it would work and could save lives—both yours and your mount's.

Rawhide was used in repairs of all types. It laced together leather gear where there was no thread. When softened up with water, it could be wrapped around a broken rifle stock or pistol grip. When dried, it would bind the broken pieces together as well as glue, screws, or nails. (If you look into some of the collections of items belonging to Native Americans, you can see some of these functional (and often well-executed) repairs.

The Apache also used it in their raids on whites. A hard sack of rawhide filled with pebbles made more noise than a concert-class maraca. Tied to the tail of a skittish horse let loose on the run towards a remuda or herd of horses, it would frighten the absolute bejeekers out of them, scattering them to the four winds for retrieval at Apache convenience. Further in the musical instrument department, virtually all tribes used rawhide for dance rattles and drumheads for ceremony and celebration.

The Apache had other interesting uses for rawhide that occasionally passed on to the white man. They found it perfect for torture. One of these "fun" applications of rawhide was to tie a rattlesnake down near a prisoner's head. The rawhide thong at this point was completely dry. As the day went on, the Apache captors would rile the snake to a frenzy of lashing strikes at the prisoner's face as they dripped water drop by drop on the thong, softening it, and allowing the snake to get closer and closer. Kinda makes the Chinese Water Torture seem sorta tame by comparison, doesn't it?

They also taught the white man that wrapping a prisoner in a wet green hide and leaving them out in the sun to simultaneously strangle and die of thirst was a terrible punishment. There are stories of rustlers butchering a beef and then caught by cowhands digging their own graves prior to being left in the hole wrapped in the hide of the animal they killed.

Pancho Villa is said to have wrapped the heads of his prisoners with wet rawhide strips to elicit information from them as that strip dried and tightened.

But like every implement of torture, there were clever fellows who got around their "binding predicament" by toppling into a convenient river thereby letting their wraps get wet and loose. That "charming" habit of rawhide to form tight bindings as it dried could also be reversed by wetting it again, hence the potential for excitement and escape. Hollywood and western writers have paid rapt attention since!

Rawhide occasionally performed as an emergency ration. One party lost in the mountains maintains they survived six weeks by eating boiled rawhide "gelatin" seasoned with sugar. It is said to have kept their entire party free of scurvy in the dead of winter. There are many stories like this.


Having dealt with the grimmer side of rawhide, yes, of course, there is a merrier end to it. There are stories of wagons being bogged to the hubs in muck, their drivers, all helpers and 16 oxen unable to get it out. And not a tow truck in sight —just an old greenhide taken from a farmer's fence and cut into traces, drenched in a creek, and tied from a tree to the wagon. As the driver happily napped and the oxen grazed, the sun beat down on the traces drying them and causing them to shrink up. It might take two or three wettings, but eventually the strength of shrinking rawhide was enough to wrest the heavily-laden wagon out of its mire and back on the road. Or so legends and folklore say!

Compadres, I hope you've found this both entertaining and enlightening. While it probably would be naughty for you to try out some of those old Apache tricks, you might have fun experimenting with some of the others. As always, I welcome all comments. NHEEL GUN CA

ave you ever tried balancing a two-wheel gun cart while pushing it up an incline on uneven terrain? It's not impossible, but does require full attention. There is a better way, as I have discovered.

A while back my ole' shooting partner, Mt Forest Ron, SASS #76664, asked me if I would lend him a hand building a new gun cart. He is quite capable of building one himself, but his shop is loaded up with car bumpers and paint equipment while mine is cluttered up with the wood variety. Now, we are quite

aware there are people who sell gun carts of the 2, 3, 4, and maybe more wheel type. But the truth is, some of us more frugal cowboys have more time on our hands than money in our wallets and enjoy designing, building, and using our own Cowboy Action ShootingTM accoutrements. One of the unique aspects of our sport is

seeing the numerous Cowboy Action accessories displayed at a match.

I advised Mt Forest Ron to look around at different kinds of gun carts to see what kind he would like and to use a lightweight wood. The first cart I built was made out of red oak. It looked real nice, but took two men and a boy to lift it into my vehicle. Later I made one out of red cedar. I told Ron that red or white cedar would be best because they are lightweight and strong enough to do the job. He settled on white cedar, as it is native to our area and easy to obtain.

Being a retired vocational arts teacher, Ron is quite adept at the building trade. He

looked around at many different carts and then came over one day with a set of plans he had drawn up. Proverbs 16:3 says, "Commit to the LORD whatever you do, and your plans will succeed." His cart prints pictured four wheels instead of the regular two. I liked the concept. Now, this is not a how to article, but is meant to stimulate the mind.

The gun cart is around 36" high, X 20" wide, X 25" deep. It folds down to around 12" high with the handle folded over. Axles are 1/2" threaded rod and hold the four wheels that are around 8" diameter. Wood dowels were used for the handle and the hinge point. There are two boxes for storage. One is on the back up by the handle, and the other down near the bottom rear. Box covers are hinged and use a window lock to hold them shut. The cart holds five long guns. There is an edged area on the bottom front that holds the ammo box. It is secured in the up and down possession with two thumbscrews. You have to calculate the hinge point so the thumbscrews can be used in the lower back cross board to hold the cart in the upright position; otherwise, you'll end up having to put them in the bottom, making it a little more difficult to lock up. The four wheels, thumbscrews, wood dowels, hinges, and other hardware were purchased at a surplus supply store in our area at bargain basement prices.

After a few days in the wood shop and a lot of elbow grease, Ron's new gun cart became a reality. He

loaded it up and took it over to his paint shop where he gave it a great looking finish. I liked the idea so much that I converted my old twowheeled cart to a four-wheeler. The cart already was of the fold down style. It's so much easier to maneuver for an old timer like me. Kind of reminds me of pushing a grocery cart down a supermarket isle.

I did suggest one added embellishment though, a parking brake. With the cart sitting on four wheels, it could roll freely down an incline if left unattended. So, to resolve this potential problem, I went over to a medical supply store that sells and repairs wheelchairs. They had some used wheelchair tire locks at a good price. They worked very well as parking brakes for our carts.

We get quite a few comments on our gun carts; some are even positive. But one thing is for sure, we don't struggle to balance our carts on two wheels while pushing them up uneven ground any more. Now it is more like strolling down an aisle through Wal-Mart while pushing a well-oiled grocery cart!

nside every SASS cowboy and cowgirl lives a starryeved child still dreaming of living in the Old West, of crossing the prairie in a covered wagon, of rounding up stray cattle to drive to Abilene, and of running the bad guys out of town.

SASS is the perfect opportunity for those children to burst out and live their fantasies and from dressing the part and playing the SASS

2010 SASS Midwest Regional Mounted Championship

iddleton, OH – The 2010 SASS Midwest Regional Mounted Championship was a lot like the little mechanical horse outside the grocery store: small, but still a whole lotta fun! Before I go any farther, let me say I'm biased, as I was the Match Director, I work summers for Chiappa Firearms, the Main Match Sponsor, and my father (who announced the match) and I were minor sponsors. Still, I think everyone that attended, either as a shooter or a spectator, will tell you it was the most fun they've had in quite a while!

The weekend began in Middletown, Ohio on Thursday, August 12th. Heartland Peacemakers members, Rawhidenlace, SASS #83046, Six Gun Fury, SASS #87198, and I, finished the preparation of the arena and met with some of the Big Irons Rangers about the following day's Opening Ceremonies. By Friday morning, Wild Donkey, SASS Sweet-n-Sassy, #87184, Pony Girl, SASS #87197, and Mustang Lady, SASS #87688, had all arrived, giving us a good showing at said Ceremonies. We rode in to the strains of Aaron Copland's "Fanfare For The Common Man," (commissioned by the Cincinnati Symphony back in 1942), then sat up in the saddle for the Canadian

and American national anthems. We rode out, flags flying, to "The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance," keeping with the weekend's theme of "The Westerns of Jimmy Stewart."

Friday evening we put on an exhibition that gave a brief history of the U.S. Cavalry in the 19th century. Mike LeBlanc, a War of 1812 reenactor, came out to help the author demonstrate mounted militia fighting that was common in Ohio and Indiana; then shooting with cap-n-ball revolvers was shown. The cavalry show finished with a demonstration

of how Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders charged up Kettle Hill in the Spanish-American War-on foot, with a Krag carbine their only weapon! Members of the Heartland Peacemakers, put on more demonstrations, including mounted rifle shooting, drag races, and a team match. Throughout the evening a ballot box was open for spectators and riders to vote for Best Dressed Cowboy, Cowgirl, and Buckaroo, with voting going on throughout the day Saturday. Riders and spectators all enjoyed themselves immensely!

Saturday was the day of our six-stage Main Match. However, both Mike and Doc Hill stuck around all day and did all they could to help the shoot run smoothly. In the first stage, the first five white balloons were arranged on



top of a saloon sign like the knobs Stewart shot in Destry Rides Again. The second stage reminded riders what a great host we have in the Middletown Sportsmens's Club, and what great neighbors they have as well. Five balloons were shot in the arena, and then the rider rode into the woods surrounding the arena, through which the Sportsmen's Club has allowed us to cut trails the neighbors have then helped maintain for their own horses. Riders followed trail signs to St. Louis to pick up Vindicator, the Hereford bull from The Rare Breed. Back in the arena, Vindicator in hand, the rundown balloons were shot. A penalty was given for dropping Vindicator before crossing the finish line; yours truly was the only one to incur the penalty! The winner of the stage, Abe, SASS #87179, was allowed to keep Vindicator, though his daughter, Lady Lacoda, SASS #87180, immediately laid claim to the 8" stuffed bull!

Stage Three was a basic pattern from the SASS book, but riders were to yell the line from *The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance*, "Print the legend!" before crossing the timer.

Stage Four took Stewart's *Broken Arrow* as its inspiration. The classic arrow pattern was changed so the white balloons were parallel to two arena sides, with the first two rundown balloons coming out at an angle towards the center of the arena before straightening out to run perpendicular to the timer, thus forming a "broken" arrow.

Stage Five took riders back into the woods with a run based on The Chevenne Social Club. This time, riders drew a number from a hat before starting, the number corresponding to one of the girls from the brothel. After shooting the first five balloons in the arena, riders followed the signs to Cheyenne, picked up the girl with their number, (a Barbie doll with a number around her neck) and brought her back to the arena, shooting the last five balloons before crossing the timer. The "girls" were carried back in various ways, from in a hand to in the teeth to down a shirt or dress. The riders who finished 2nd. 4th, 6th, 8th and 10th in the stage were allowed to keep one of the girls. Deadwood Stan confided to me this was his favorite stage!

The final stage was based on Stewart's classic *Winchester* '73. Off the clock, and either mounted or on the ground, riders were handed a '73 Winchester loaded

with a single rifle blank. The RO then threw a balloon in a PVC ring into the air, much like the silver ring Stewart shot through in the film. If the rider hit the balloon before it hit the ground, s/he received a five second bonus on the stage, but there was no penalty for missing. The rifle was then handed to the RO, who ejected the empty, handed the rifle to the armourer, and indicated for the rider to engage the stage. More than half the riders earned the bonus!





veryone who participates in Cowboy Action ShootingTM recognizes the name of Taylor's & Co, Inc., as a leader in the design and importation of high-quality blackpowder and cartridge firearms and accessories for shooters in the "game." They are located in Winchester, VA approximately an hour and forty-five minutes away from my home. Since I had the day off, I decided to trek on over to browse and snoop and see what was new at Taylor's.

Following the Map Quest directions, the trip itself was pleasant. The hills and low mountains in Virginia were peaceful this time of year with remnants of the past snowfall still on some of the fields. I admired some very nice

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

sides surrounded by fences of carefully placed stone, with cows and horses lazily grazing in the fields. I passed a few wineries at rest, a State Park, and then into Winchester proper, only to be directed into a modern industrial park, lined with steel buildings, trucks and tractor trailers, chain linked fences, and railroad crossings. Turning onto Lenoir Drive, there it was, the number 304, a yellow metal building with the sign marking my destination, Taylor's & Co, Inc. I guess this is the place?

Pards, don't judge a book by its cover. Upon entering the cold looking metal clad building, I was warmly welcomed by a young lady, who asked if she could help me. I advised I had come to look around and browse a bit, and she invited me to browse as long as I like and to just ask if I needed help or had any questions.

No help needed at this point, gazing at the museum-like display of firearms and accoutrements. Walls lined with rifles, shotguns, muskets, and more rifles, housed in oak gun display cabinets. In front of the cabinets were tiered glass gun cases, displaying handguns of all types and periods. Smoke Wagons, Cattlemen, Conversions, and their new Runnin' Iron revolver. One whole display case was devoted to their 1911 clones, supporting the interests of the growing Wild Bunch crowd. On the adjacent wall hung more rifles of different periods. In the front of the building were several displays of high quality leather gear that Taylor's distributes, all made in the USA. In the warehouse, Taylor's & Co. also has an extensive inventory of parts

for all firearms they offer as well as some additional firearms. The whole showroom was neat, clean. and open to the public. These are people who care and take pride in what they are doing.

Friendliness and hospitality was not in short supply at Taylor's! Sue Hawkins, one of the owners of Taylor's, entered the showroom and greeted me. I never was made to feel as if I were intruding, but instead, was treated like a guest with all the hospitality that comes with being a guest. Before I knew it, Ms. Hawkins was giving me a grand tour of the showroom and encouraged me to handle as many of the firearms that sparked my interest. I later learned that Ms. Hawkins was involved in some important business duties at the time, but stopped what she was doing to make sure I was taken care of. Ms. Loy was on the phone, waving her greetings and conversing with us through the open doorway as she conducted business. Nice people! Getting warmer by the minute.

I learned Ms. Hawkins had once worked for Euroarms of America where she began her training in the industry. Then in 1988, she and her partner, Tammy Loy started Taylor's at a smaller location in Winchester. They specialized in marketing blackpowder arms to Civil War re-enactors. As Cowboy Action ShootingTM began to become more and more popular, Taylor's decided to enter the arena, supplying the cowboy crowd with quality firearms demanded by the sport. As shooters recognized the quality of Taylor's products, Ms. Hawkins and Ms. Loy decided they needed a larger location to serve the shooting public and began to expand their offerings. Taylor's moved to their current location in 1992, which afforded them with plenty of room for a new showroom and ample

hirty years after the end of the Civil War, the last generation of those born slaves was aging. During statewide law Reconstruction, these former slaves had cast about for careers. Some went "up the trail" as cattle drovers, others became sharecroppers or laborers. One of these for-

but he was also half-famous. Lackey had once been a lawman, and he had a story to tell. After the Civil War, a period of lawlessness ensued, and Texas needed enforcement Lackey had joined the newly formed Texas State Police.

A challenge facing lawmen during this time was a dangerous outlaw, John Wesley Hardin. Hardin had been killing people since he was fifteen years old and was a prime candidate for arrest. To escape, he had gone "up the

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trail" to Kansas, but eventually he returned to Texas. Two policemen ran into him at a store in Smiley, Texas, on October 19, 1871. One, Green Paramore, ordered Hardin to hand over his pistols. Hardin was cooperative—until he shot the officer through the head. He then shot at the other policeman, John Lackey, but did not kill him.

In 1877 Hardin was captured. Brought back to Austin, prior to standing trial for one of his murders, Hardin commented that another outstanding charge "in Gonzales County was an attempt to murder a State Policeman, a negro named John Lackey." That shooting would haunt John Wesley Hardin the rest of his life.

Hardin was sent to Huntsville Prison. Fifteen years later, he was released and returned to Gonzales County. Soon afterward, he became embroiled in the 1894 sheriff's election. Hardin opposed W. E. Jones, the Democratic nominee, and he urged people to vote for Robert Coleman, Jones' opponent. It was at this time Hardin looked up John Lackey, now working as a blacksmith.

Just a couple months later, Hardin recalled the shooting in Gonzales County in his autobiography. He said of the shooting of Paramore, "One of the pistols turned a somerset in my hand and went off. Down came the Negro, with his pistol cocked, and as I looked outside, I saw another Negro on a white mule firing into the house at me. I told him to hold up, but he kept on, so I turned my Colt's .45 on him and knocked him off his mule ... the big Negro ... was making for the

bottom at a 2:40 gait. I tried to head him off, but he dodged and ran into a lake. I afterwards learned that he stayed in there with his nose out of the water until I left. [...]. This happened in September 1871."

Louis Nordyke, the first of Hardin's biographers, said, "Lackey dashed out of the store with blood gushing from his mouth, raced to the nearby lake and dived in. [He] ... was out of sight in the lake, holding himself under water with only his nose above the surface. Wes rode around the lake several times and crashed through the brush, but he finally gave up the search. ... John Lackey had lost his teeth to a Hardin bullet and had escaped by diving into a lake at the edge of town."

Nordyke concludes by describing Hardin's encounter with the blacksmith in 1894. When Hardin revealed who he was, Lackey was terrified, but Hardin assured him they were friends. This scene, however unlikely, was hinted at in Lackey's widow's obituary in 1932 in which her children mentioned John Lackey "had some exciting experiences here during [R]econstruction times." From this, we can deduce John Lackey had often spoken of his encounter with Hardin.


Smiley Lake was bigger than it is today. The "biggest water between the San Antonio and Guadalupe Rivers," the lake was a long, shallow depression in the open grassland. Texas was openrange cattle country then, with few trees. Herds of cattle would be rounded up and "held" along

this lake waiting to be driven north to Kansas railheads. The lake was described as stirrupdeep on a cow pony. In Lackey's day, the lake was only yards in front of the Smiley Store. Today, this watercourse is reed-choked and lined with willows.

For sure, neither versions of the shooting that Hardin, Nordyke, other historians, or Lackey himself told is accurate. By the time Hardin returned to Gonzales in 1894, he had forgotten important elements. Certainly he did not know about Lackey hiding in the lake, since he didn't find him. That detail could only come from Lackey, and Lackey, most likely, exaggerated his wound and the danger he faced. He made the incident into a good story, and it was already part of Hardin's legend before the autobiography was written.

So, what is it we know for sure? First, Hardin shot at Lackey. Lackey possibly escaped into water. And, that's about it. Most of the rest of the story was invented by Lackey, yet the shooting haunted Lackey and Hardin the rest of their lives.

Lackey was a storyteller, exaggerating the truth for fun's sake. He probably thought he'd never meet Hardin again. Surely he would have been surprised his story would be recorded—especially by Hardin—and repeated for the next hundred years. Even so, the most telling comment about the affair is Lackey's own: You wouldn't shoot a pore old man just for lying, would you?".




LITTLE KNOWN FAMOUS PEOPLE Way Out West -

Turkey Creek Jack Johnson

urkey Creek Jack Johnson rode with Wyatt Earp when Earp made his legendary Vendetta Ride. Jack was born in Missouri in 1847 and fled that state after he got into a shootout at a local mining town. He showed up in Deadwood, Dakota Territory in 1876 where he pulled his pistols and calmly killed the two men who were trying to shoot him. Later that year, he moved on to Kansas. It was here, in Dodge City, that he became friends with Wyatt Earp. In 1878, Jack joined a cattle drive and ventured into Arizona Territory with Sherman McMasters, Curly Bill Brocius, and Pony Diehl.



In Tombstone, he served as a peace officer along side the Earp brothers. Morgan Earp was murdered in 1882, and Jack went with Wyatt, Doc Holliday, Warren Earp, and Sherman McMasters to see that Morg's body got safely on the California bound train at Tucson. In Tucson, the Earp party found and killed Frank Stillwell, one of Morgan's killers. The next day the group was joined by Texas Jack Vermillion and rode out on Earp's infamous Vendetta Ride. After the Ride, Jack escaped to Colorado, then Texas. He died in Salt Lake City, Utah Territory, in 1887.

Jorma eventually decides to track his father's killers and the trail leads to the Oklahoma panhandle. Three counties, consisting of six-thousand square miles, have become known as


 $the \ outrageously \ lawless \ "No$ Man's Land." Numerous outlaws and gunman have fled to "The Strip" from justice.


That's the preface to the

new novel by Burns Dickenson. It tells the saga of a lawman, a Shortgrass Ranger, in the lawless days before statehood in Oklahoma. This is a spirited tale of the Old West, one that grabs the reader and won't let go until the final gunfight. The pages are filled with intrigue and suspense as Jorma blazes a trail of justice through the panhandle.

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
On the trail, the reader meets the desperados you would expect to find in a western tale, but the author has also woven into the story interesting interventions with major historical figures who passed through Oklahoma during this time frame, like Lieutenant John J. Pershing and Samuel Clements. But the most interesting aspect of the book is one of Jorma's "unique" partners, and that is Uma, the Mountain Ghost. Uma is a puma and Jorma's guardian angel. As an old Comanche says in the book, "He was amazed that the man and Toyarohco were together and that the 'death on padded feet' seemed to favor this man. He would only mention this as a tale when he went back to the tribe and warn them to never touch or look hard at the man with the Mountain Ghost. To do so was to cause their own souls anguish forever..."

The author has done a marvelous job of integrating an intriguing tale with accurate historical facts. Those familiar with western Oklahoma will feel right at home, as the story moves from old Fort Sill and Fort Supply to the towns of Stillwater and Guymon. The complete depiction of the people and their surroundings puts the reader back into the saddle with Jorma, smelling the gunsmoke and feeling the sweat - pretty close to reliving the Old West. It's gripping story, one that left this reader looking forward to the next encounter with Jorma Rekke and the Mountain Ghost.

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
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


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S. L. Cass, SASS Life #20179


S. L. Cass will be sadly missed by a great many people, on and off the SASS range. Vaya con Dios, Meho. I will miss you my friend. 🧘


Sam Walker, SASS #9408 **1938 - 2010**

when an old cowboy passes on, another cowboy is heard to say, "Go on home now cowboy ... your watch is over." God's speed, Chief!

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
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

What a perfect way to end the main match, but we still had one more day of fun.

Saturday we started with the couples event put on by Blastmaster, SASS #47480, and Second Fiddle Sue, SASS #55872. This event was so popular we ran it for an hour and a half longer than planned. You can bet this event will return for next year! True couples ran it one time, and then the ladies could pick a bachelor's name with whom to shoot it out of the bucket, so everyone got a chance. After this event, there were four-man team and sixman team events, all by draw, and the afternoon finished with the Sweet Sixteen Ladies and the Top 16 Men Shoot-offs.

During the entire week we had over a hundred spectators from other sports come to observe, ask questions, and cheer us on, especially when a shooter had a clean stage.

Saturday evening Awards Banquet was held at Cottontown Village in the nearby town of Washington, Utah. This is a group of western buildings. Our dinner was in the big wooden barn decorated with twinkle lights in the rafters. The dinner was Dutch-oven style and was fantastic, followed by cobbler and ice cream for dessert. There was a costume contest and then the awards, a great way to finish off five days of fun.

I can't wait for next year to do it again. The Dixie Desperados have plans to do more grading for additional RV parking and shooter day parking so they can accommodate up to 300 shooters. And after this year, it will not take long to reach that number. HELUVA RUKUS 2010

SASS New York State Championship

allston Spa, NY – This was the big one—the Circle K Regulators' (CKR) 10th year of hosting Heluva Rukus, the SASS New York State Championship. Unsure of how to follow up on their Wooly Award win for SASS Shoot of the Year in 2009, the club was a bit concerned going into this year's event. They got even more nervous when they went from 192 registered shooters six days after applications were mailed to 284 shooters on the seventh day. Guess that's the price one has to pay for fame! However,

the club's concerns about maintaining their high standards for this event were unfounded. The Rukus continued to live up to its reputation as one of the premiere Cowboy Action ShootingTM events in the coun-This year's match held trv. September 17-19, 2010, at the Kayaderosseras Fish & Game Club in Ballston Spa, New York, proved beyond a doubt they were up to the task at hand—and then some. With a record number of both shooters and vendors from all around the country and spectators from as far away as Canada, Heluva Rukus was three days of pure lead-slinging fun.

Once again this year, the months of work preceding the match, along with the long hours of activity on setup day, made a great deal of difference in the overall quality of the shoot. Throughout the summer months. CKR work crews spent an inordinate number of hours at the range. This year's primary tasks included adding a 30'x48' extension to the club's outdoor covered pavilion (eliminating the need for "the BIG tent") and building permanent covered storage areas, shelters, and loading tables on three stages (eliminating the need for tents and portable loading tables in those areas).

Fort Misery was given a new entrance, as well as a very realisticlooking cannon and limber, which added to the authenticity of the scene. There were also several new plywood "characters" and cacti in evidence around the range.

But two stages really stood out this year—the mine and the river. Stage 3's Treasure Trove Mine was actually constructed out of an ordinary 10'x20' tent, but by the time the work crew had finished with it, the tent was nowhere to be seen. The exterior of the mine was covered with rough-cut timber and surrounded by small evergreen trees; the interior was partially timbered, partially painted, and even had a vein of gold running through it and numerous gold nuggets on the

ground. A wooden wheelbarrow, shovel, dynamite, detonator, ore cart, and rock piles completed "the look."

Stage 6 looked like a scene straight out of the movie Rooster Cogburn. Props there consisted of a lengthy blue tarp "river" (complete with pools of water from rain on setup day, diagonally cut crates made to look as if they were bobbing in the water, and sand along the banks), a number of cut pine trees (with targets interspersed among them), and a wooden raft "accessorized" with a Gatling gun (with turning crank and appro-

priate sound effects), and several crates and barrels.

Other stages boasted props such as authentic 1890s buggies, buckboards, a ¾-size stagecoach, a train,

Boot Hill Cemetery (with a full-size wooden casket and several tombstones painted to duplicate those in the REAL Boot Hill), as well as a six-foot bar (along with a real piano, stool, and poker tables). The club's attention to detail was evident throughout, with every stage painstakingly accessorized with period items for that particular scenario. There were three permanent stages as well—the small line shack/cabin, the freight office with wrap-around boardwalk and separate livery stable, and the extensive

Rukus Flats town stage with its six roofed buildings (some two-stories high), decorated rooms, alleyway, boardwalk, train depot, and clock tower. An interesting new prop was added this year, too—a covered wagon with a canvas curtain obscuring several targets. When the shooter picked his rifle up off a stand to begin the stage, the curtain dropped to reveal the targetspretty nifty.

Although both vendors and campers began arriving at the range as early as Tuesday to claim their spot and set up, the event itself officially began on Friday with registration and side events. The rains of Thursday were history, and the weather was great. The majority of shooters made it a point to arrive on

site in time to take advantage of the chance to get in some shootin' and shoppin' before the REAL competition began. When they picked up their packets at registration, both shooters and vendors alike were pleasantly surprised to be presented with a 13"x15" canvas haversack commemorating the 10th anniversary of Heluva Rukus. Special Tshirts commemorating the event and sporting a sepia tint photo of the club's famous "town stage" (AKA Rukus Flats) were also available. In addition to this, each shooter received a door prize valued at a minimum of \$25. There were also new CKR badges and Heluva Rukus lapel pins for sale, along with charity raffle tickets for numerous firearms and other valuable items.

Meanwhile, out on the range, the cowboys and girls had the opportunity to participate in a number of different side events utilizing every Cowboy Action ShootingTM gun imaginable. Besides speed pistol, rifle, shotgun, pocket pistol, and derringer events, there were also .22 caliber rifle and pistol and longrange rifle events. Due to the overwhelming popularity of the mini-stage event in previous years, two additional mini-stages were added this year. One mini-stage strictly focused on gun transition, while the other two could be shot using regular Cowboy Action ShootingTM main match guns or Wild Bunch firearms to complete normal scenarios.

When not slinging lead, many of the cowpokes enjoyed chatting with their Cowboy Action ShootingTM pards or visiting the multitude of vendors lining the range's interior roadway. Despite the continuing

"iffy" economy, plenty of greenbacks changed hands as shooters purchased such things as Cowboy Action Shooting TM clothing and accessories, gunsmithing services, custom eye and ear protection, leather goods, Western gift and craft items, and reloading supplies along sutler's row.

The CKR was proud to welcome a new match sponsor this year—the New York State Rifle and Pistol Association, New York's largest and the nation's oldest firearms advocacy organization. Following side matches, approximately 100 hungry cowpokes gathered under the pavilion for some casual cowboy grub provided by the Greenfield Lions Club. The gang dispersed shortly thereafter—some choosing to attend a Territorial Governor's meeting in the clubhouse, others heading back to their campers, homes, or motel

rooms to relax, clean guns, or go through their Shooters Handbook in preparation for the "main event."

Saturday was the first day of the real competition and, as usual, consisted of six stages with a midday lunch (and shopping) break. There was a slight change in the shooting schedule to allow for more time on each stage this year due to the increased size of the posses, but never fear—all ran smoothly. It was another spectacular day for shooting, too-cool, crisp, and sunny. The day began at 8:30 AM with opening ceremonies and a brief safety meeting under the pavilion. Then it was time for the excited cowpokes to head out to their stages and start seriously throwin' lead.

The stages at the Rukus always are outstanding. This can most likely be attributed to the incredible number of hours Range Master, Rowdy Bill, SASS #9628, spends writing them, making sure they are creative, fun, safe, and fair for all—thoroughly explained, easily understood, challenging, but without favoritism or procedural traps. The




10 separate berms allowed for plenty of both lateral and down-range movement on every stage, and the frequent opportunity for participants to choose how they wanted to shoot the stage, rather than being told every move, kept things interesting.

The scenarios included targets of various shapes, sizes, heights, and distances, and even some knockdown revolver targets. Target acquisitions were interesting and

varied, and all four Cowboy Action ShootingTM firearms were required on every stage. Being the 10th anniversary of the shoot, stage storywriter. Annabelle Bransford. returned to some scenarios from past Rukuses to get her incentive for this year's tales. Shooters were treated to stages where they played good guys and bad guys-stages with names like "Gold Digger" and "Outgunned," where saving the gold could cost you your life. Them was dangerous times!

By late Saturday afternoon, the posses had completed their stages for the day and firearms had been safely stowed away. Around 7 PM, close to 200 shooters gathered under the outdoor pavilion to partake of a fabulous cowboy BBQ catered by Shane's Rib Shack. With a buffet consisting of mouth-watering BBQ chicken, several side salads, cornbread, and dessert, there was no excuse for anyone to leave hungry! After dinner, Trail Boss, Smokehouse Dan, SASS #12524, thanked the Heluva Rukus sponsors, including 10-year sponsors Zack's Sports, EMF, and Wild West Mercantile. Next, ribbons were presented to the male and female winners in each of Friday's numerous side events, and costume contest winners and pairings for Sunday's Top Gun Team Shoot-off were announced. Special "Cowboy Up" awards were presented to various CKR members, and the anxiously awaited free raffle drawings were held for a number of valuable prizes ranging from a free weekend at the Saratoga/Malta Hyatt Place Hotel (Heluva Rukus' host hotel) to a handmade knife to a Rugged Gear gun cart. Eventually things started to wind down, and before long the time had come for the shooters to head home to rest up for Day 2 of the championship event.

No one could believe the perfect shooting weather would hold up, but Sunday turned out to be yet another spectacular fall day. By the time lunchtime rolled around, the last four fun-filled stages of the match were complete. As the data entry folks feverishly tallied the final scores, the majority of the shooters gathered to watch and/or participate in the Top Gun Team Shoot-off. Enthralled spectators rooted their chosen teams to victory as the top 16 cowboys, paired with the top 16 cowgirls, took part in the

final showdown. When the smoke cleared, Smokey Sue, SASS #39531, and Renegade Roper, SASS #86367, emerged victorious. And, alas, with that, the shooting portion of Heluva Rukus '10 drew to a close, and all that remained was the oh-so-important final awards ceremony.

Mid-afternoon on Sunday, the shooters amassed under the pavilion to learn the outcome of their lead slingin' endeavors over the weekend. But first, sponsors and CKR staff were thanked, a special Friends of the NRA raffle was held, some special presentations were made, and this year's charity checks were presented, with \$1100 going to the SASS Scholarship Fund, a matching amount to the SASS Cowboy Memorial Chapel Fund, and yet another \$1100 to the local volunteer fire department as a "thank you" for providing emergency medical staff and equipment on site throughout the weekend.

The long-awaited charity raffle was then held with the lucky winners taking home a custom Bowie knife with Indian hand beaded sheath and various EMF, Remington, Smith & Wesson, and USFA firearms valued at anywhere from \$200 to a whopping \$1500! Finally,



stage winners, clean shooters (36!!), and category winners were presented with their awards. The ceremony culminated in announcement of the overall Top Gun Male, James Samuel Pike, SASS #53331, and Top Gun Female, Appaloosa Amy, SASS #63949, along with this year's New York State Lady Champion, Southpaw Slingin' Sally, SASS #39737, repeating her wins of '08 and '09, and back-in-the-saddle-again New York State male Champion, Rowdy Bill, with his first title since 2002.

Thus ended Heluva Rukus 2010, one heluva shoot. If you've never attended, add it to your list of must-goes. It's one SASS shoot not to be missed!





speed rifles, and speed shotguns side matches, topped off by a night Trail Shoot by lantern light.

Running off a bunch of bullies in another stage called for shooting through a double window without hitting the Sheriff's daughters, who riding a pendulum behind the windows, peeked through them off and on.

BUNKHOUSE BIDNESS

Deadwood County Rangers

apier, New Zealand - The Hawkes Bay Pistol Club had been chugging along real peaceable and orderly since 1972, when, in 1996, a real stemwinder arrived at the gates.

The six bay club just 10 minutes from downtown Napier, the port on Hawkes Bay on the east coast of New Zealand's North Island, had several pistol disciplines getting ready on the right, ready on the left, and bellying up to the firing line with steely eyes clamped on frozen front sights, when it happened.

Whiskey Murphy, SASS Life #47093, came to town. Yes, he had a gospel to preach and, as noted above, he was a real stemwinder. His good book was the SASS Handbook and his gospel The Cowboy Way. On this spot he founded the Deadwood County Rangers, and while it doesn't appear he had the knife-wielding Al Swearingen or his sweetie-pie, Trixie, aboard, this was no ho-hum undertaking.

This must be faced squarely and head on with no glossing over or skulking around it. This is the sheepiest of sheep country! More wool streams out of the port of Napier for the world's clothiers than bull-roar from politicians in every senate, house, parliament, and council in the known world. And the countryside around is the breadbasket—or as my guide J.E.B. Stuart, SASS #5686, calls it—the "food bowl of New Zealand."

He paints a picture of prime vineyards, lush orchards, surf rolling in from the Pacific Ocean, all cushioned in a mild climate. No bunkie here ever turns to his saddle pard and says, "This here's a hard land," as a Blue Norther freezes the beans and biscuits on their tin plates.

And, the town of Napier itself? Why, after the devastating earthquake of 1931, which shook the town down to fire and dust, it was rebuilt in the then-popular Art Deco style and is designated a World Heritage Site for its architecture. Lawksamercy! High culture, homesteaders under hoof everywhere, and up to his shot shell belt in sheep. No one would have thought ill of our hero had he simply ridden off into the sunset alone and muttering darkly.

But there's just no quit in Whiskey Murphy.

The Deadwood County Rangers have thrived. It has 22 Cowboy Action Shooters—eight of them SASS members—four are women and two are juniors and gung ho! Why, they have WEEKLY matches to which 10 or so of the rangers come. Monthly matches bring 10 to 20 out, and at the annual match they get upwards of 110 shooters

"Costuming is a must in NZ Cowboy Action shoots," says J.E.B. And, he adds the guns and ammo used are what you'd expect, "Ubertis, Rugers, Rossis, Marlins, Winchesters, Pedersolis, and both '97

pumps and side by side shotguns. Calibers are .44-40, .45 LC, and .38/.357."

There are about 20 pistol clubs that shoot Cowboy Action," he continues, "with about 150 to 200 Cowboy Action Shooters nationwide. And, there are 20 annual shoots."

"New Zealand is a small country," J.E.B. points out. About 4,000,000 population and about the size of Colorado. "And, you can get to most clubs in a day. If you live at the top of North Island and you want to go to a shoot at the bottom of South Island, it might take you two days to drive there."

"The shoots at this club are always followed by food and drink in the clubrooms. Annual matches have all meals catered in the clubrooms as part of the entry fee. Entertainment is provided, and the cost of drinks is about half bar prices."

Add to this, "We like to have good scenarios with large, close targets and, in the Cowboy Way, everyone is friendly and welcoming."

The sets are well dressed, too.

"There is a cowboy town and a house with rooms. Other facades of buildings are erected as needed. Targets are SASS cowboys and general steel plates. The shotgun targets are reactive, but fall forward."

I saw one of those once at a match at the BAR-E Ranch in Canada. I was so stunned instead of holstering my empty left hand pistol, I dropped it in the dirt—stage DQ!

The stages for the bigger shoots are written by the Cowboy Action ShootingTM committee or individuals organized by the Cowboy Action

tough bunch. They play rugby—a football-like "game" with no forward passing, pads, or helmets, and their national team does a war dancehaka in the Maori language of the warrior indigenous population of New Zealand. In this dance they symbolically cut the throats of their opponents amid blood curdling shouts and grimaces. The team is called The All Blacks, and they beat the living tar out of anyone who comes to play. They particularly like to do this to their much bigger neighbor, Australia, but the English, Welsh, Irish, South Africans, and even French will do if they're feeling

frisky. The All Blacks are equal opportunity shellackers.

But J.E.B. floored me without lifting a finger.

I asked what New Zealand's gun laws were like, and he said, "Our gun laws are good. We don't have the problems Australia has. We even shoot guns that are banned in Australia."

By then my wife had bent me over with my head between my knees to stop me fainting.

When I recovered, I asked him to continue.

"All pistol shooting is controlled by Pistol NZ. It is the only organization recognized by our police. Cowboy Action ShootingTM is a section of Pistol NZ, which shoots by SASS rules. There are a small group of shooters in NZ who do not support full SASS rules."

The main divergence is 10 seconds per miss.

"As in any sport there are always some who don't want to play with others," comments J.E.B. "But, in general, most disputes are sorted out."

In my experience they get sorted out when the "divergence"—almost always designed to slow down the speedsters does exactly that—slows things down, but makes absolutely no difference in the order on the score sheet. By some mysterious alchemy

the better shooters always seem to win. It's amazing. The ones who are really slowed down are us also-rans.

Anyway, back to the gun laws, and J.E.B. explains, "You have to have a category A license to own rifles, shotguns, some high powered air rifles, and original—not replica—percussion pistols. No registration needed for these. If you join a pistol club, after a six-month probation period and a police character check, you can get a Category B endorsement on your license, and you can buy pistols. These are registered and can only be fired on a pistol range. A C endorsement means you can buy anything, including machine guns, but because

this is a collectors' category, you are not allowed to fire them. A D endorsement is for dealers. Finally, there is an F endorsement for military style semi-auto rifles. These can be fired for hunting or competition. B, C, and F categories of firearms must be registered."


As the world turns these days, that is not bad at all.

f you were intent on bringing down a powerful rival whose philosophy, as originally founded, was strong, independent, and entirely opposite from your own—a country you would not want to confront militarily—how would you go about it? The answer is simple; orchestrate the society's destruction from within.

Although possibly taking longer than a military victory and requiring great patience, the damage would be just as effective, if not more so. When you destroy from within, you do it by using that country's own people, no blood is spilled in combat, and the physical infrastructure is left intact.

In any country, there are but a few key areas that determine how the citizens mature, live, and develop their beliefs. These are the focal points that must be attacked. In his book, On War, Clausewitz referred to this concept of identifying and then focusing on select points as attacking the *center of gravity*.

The center of gravity is that key element, if controlled or destroyed, would most hurt your opponent and is the critical factor in achieving your objective. In this case, when taking control of or destroying a country from within, the key is to attack and control the mind of the inhabitants—you must shape the way people view life and the values upon which their life is based. Shape the mind, and you control their direction. Control their direction, and you can lead them down a pathway to hell.

The centers of gravity I would shape in orchestrating a country's downfall from within are its perception of truth, its future genera-

tions, the political philosophy, its sense of nationalism, and of course, the economy.

To shape truth, control the media: Most people absorb what they know about life from the major media centers these days. The media paints the picture for all to see. If that picture is constantly distorted, lies become accepted as truth; i.e., tell enough lies repeatedly and soon those lies are accepted as fact. Spin and concoct, distort and influence using the public platforms such as television, radio, and print, and you can influence, sway, and control the mind of the vast majority of its population in any area you choose. This subversive influence includes pitting one group against another in order to foment internal discord, as well as ridiculing, discrediting, and challenging moral principles and national values in order to destroy any hint of a strong spiritual foundation or allegiance to a unique national culture. This is a much easier task if many in your target audience have become lazy, ill-educated, ill-informed, unthinking, and apathetic.

To shape future generations, control the schools: Incrementally indoctrinate the children with principles that are sympathetic to your philosophy. Make future generations weak in mind, body, and spirit. Avoid teaching children the basic facts about their own history, constitution, or rights. Teach them natural aggression is wrong and docile submission is right. Teach them any basis of a moral foundation, like the principles of religion, is a weakness to be avoided in the name of freedom, and also redefine the concept of patriotism to support your views. Teach them to cast off old values and traditions in the interest and name of sensitivity—after all, we wouldn't want to offend anyone with our old fashioned or traditional beliefs, now would we? And guns, guns are wicked, dangerous, and socially unacceptable—an evil that must be eradicated from society—for the good of the children, of course.

To shape the political philosophy, infiltrate the government: Whenever and wherever possible place those sympathetic to your philosophy into office at all levels—the higher, the better—so they can sway the direction of the country within every function of government, promising solutions, handouts and benefits for all. In such a way you can tilt legislation toward incrementally increasing the control of and dependency on government—a government you are shaping. Concurrently, if you can pack the courts with appointed judges who will not hold you accountable to the law and its constitution, you can act with virtual impunity. Infiltration at the highest levels can also be employed to weaken the military through budget cuts, unwarranted restrictions, and over commitment, degrading both force morale and effectiveness. A country without a strong military is like a bull without horns or a tiger without claws—defenseless and vulnerable.

To shape the sense of nationalism, dilute the culture and the language: A strong society has at its foundation a unique culture and a common language. Simply put, it is the culture and language that ultimately defines and unites a nation. If you can manipulate these two critical elements through legislative action and social pressure, you can weaken the foundation of any country. How? Introduce and eventually force the acceptance of a multi-cultural concept and refuse to accept a common tongue as the official language. In short, prevent cultural assimilation and undermine any sense of nationalism. Encourage and orchestrate a mosaic society rather than a melting pot, and you will eventually mortally wound the national fabric.

To shape the economy, spend, spend, spend and tax, tax, tax: A country with a strong economy is financially independent, and its people unlikely to look toward the government for much of anything. If free people don't depend on their government, that

government has limited sway over them. By legislating large sums from the public treasury, you accomplish two important goals. First, you create dependents of the public and private business that are now subject to conditions, rules, and regulations you dictate. Secondly, you are putting that country into unsustainable debt, reducing the value of the currency while undermining its economy. And of course, to support all this spending, you now make the case the people must "invest" in all these government provided "benefits," so you tax them relentlessly, stealing money from their pockets and independence from their lives. Eventually, if you tax and spend enough, you financially oppress the people to the point of serfdom and overload their economic structure to the point of collapse.

Through patient manipulation and clever coordination of these few centers of gravity, you can, in time, weave the downfall of even the most powerful nation, using its own citizens and systems to orchestrate the destruction.

The irony is that in just a few generations, the indoctrinated masses will be convinced this trail that has been shaped for them is truly the enlightened path for mankind, and they will unwittingly look forward to the trip! You have thus taken control of a powerful rival without firing a shot or spilling a drop of blood.
