






REMINGTON 1858 ACTION WORK

n the January and April issues of The Cowboy Chronicle, Capt. George Baylor reported favorably on a pair of replica cap and ball Colts Mike Brackett (45 Dragoon, SASS #106478) of Goons Gun Works had done for him. Since I've always been enamored of Remingtons but could never find someone who could tune them to my liking, I decided

to give Mike a shot at a pair of Uberti replicas from Cimarron. He accepted the challenge and I'm happy to report the pair I got back from him are wonderfully smooth and reliable. I've now shot them at three Plainsman events with no problems—other than one I caused myself when I loaded a chamber with a felt wad and then the powder, but I digress. Mike is currently accepting work for cap and ball revolvers only, but based on his work on my Remingtons, I have encouraged him to obtain a gunsmith FFL and start working on cartridge revolvers. For now, I would encourage anyone looking for a good gunsmith for Remingtons (or other cap and ball revolvers) to look him up at www.goonsgunworks.com.

FIELD OF DREAMS WINTER RANGE 2018

THE SASS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP OF COWBOY ACTION SHOOTING™ AND WILD BUNCH ACTION SHOOTING™

I. THE MESSAGE

any months ago, in a vacant bay at the Ben Avery Shooting Facility in Phoenix, Arizona, there was a barely discernable sound. If you build it, they will come. At first it sounded like the wind. A few minutes later the sound repeated but slightly louder. If you build it, they will come. It was clearly a voice and not the wind, but still not quite discernable. What? If you build it, THEY will come! Build what and who will come? Build the world's largest cowboy shooting event and Cowboy Action Shooting and WBAS shooters from around the world will come!

And so it was delivered, an 80-page book of instructions that if followed would provide a perfect venue for Winter Range 2018 – The SASS National Championship of Cowboy and Wild Bunch Action shooting. Over the next eleven months props were designed and constructed, stages planned, new targets purchased and old ones repaired. Vendors and sponsors sought, permits acquired, tents rented, volunteers recruited, medical and law enforcement staff arranged and all of the hundreds of other items needed to create an epic shooting venue from a bare field.

The book delivered by the voice designated the movies of John Wayne as the theme for Winter Range 2018. Thus, several of the props were built based on specific John Wayne movies. For example, there was a full size stage-coach from Stagecoach and a courthouse from True Grit. Winter Range consists entirely of volunteers. Many of the props take weeks or months to build. What is typically done is for a team of volunteers to be assigned the responsibility to build a particular prop. The stage-coach, for example, had a team of builders and the design had to evolve as it was





constructed. The concept was to shoot from inside the stagecoach. However, this would create a problem for 750-plus shooters to get into and out of in a timely and safe manner. What to do? Once again the voice had the answer. Remove the downrange side of the coach and mount it on a wall. And that is what was done. One side of the coach was removed and mounted on a support. A boardwalk was constructed between the single side and the remainder of the coach. That way the shooters could run into the fully decorat-



ed coach interior and shoot through the windows on the side of the coach mounted on the wall.

The work slows during the summer months when the daily temperatures are well above 100 degrees. The pace of work increases in the fall. The book specifies what targets and props go on each stage. In the days before the start of Winter Range, trailers are loaded with the items needed to construct each stage. Winter Range takes place at the Ben Avery Shooting Facility, which

is a public shooting facility and is in use up to the day Winter Range begins construction. For 2018 this was Wednesday, February 14, four days before registration opened. Early in the morning of the 14th the trailers were hooked up and 75-plus volunteers begin moving thousands of items onto the range. The major construction was finished around noon on Saturday. Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning the beautification committee went out with paint and brushes to touch up scrapes and dings on the props left from the set-up process. At noon on Sunday, February 18, registration opened.

II. THEY COME


By 4:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, more than 400 people have registered. Over the next three days more than 350 more will register. *They* continue to come and on Monday morning they begin to shoot. The first arrivals are there for the SASS National Championship of Wild Bunch Action Shooting (WBAS). More than 130 are registered to shoot what will be the largest WBAS match ever held and the first major match since several new WBAS rules were put in place.

The two biggest changes allow seven rounds in a magazine (the old rules only allowed five) and allowing tactical reloads. The stages were drawn to accommodate the new rules. For example, the pistol round counts ran from 28 to 35 (increments of seven). The match used a variety of target types and distances and the scenarios challenged the experienced shooters and provided an enjoyable ten stages for everyone participating in the match. There were a few missteps as some forgot they had seven rounds in their magazines and dropped some magazines with rounds still in them. On the whole everyone seemed to like the new rules and the greater freedom in deciding how to shoot a scenario. For the first time at a match of this size there were two clean matches!

When WBAS first started at Winter Range a limit of 125 shooters was set because of the complicated stages and the amount of time it typically took to shoot a stage. The bays at Winter Range are all in use for various purposes (shooting schools, etc.) and WBAS has







always been shot five stages one day and then the targets are reset and another five stages shot the next day. This year showed the potential for expanding the WBAS match. If WBAS grows to the point that more than 150 register, then the possibility of setting up ten stages will be explored. This would double the number of shooters that can be accommodated. The WBAS match continued on Tuesday morning and on Tuesday afternoon WBAS specific side matches were held. These included speed, long range and a BAM (Bolt Action Military rifle) competition. They continued to arrive and on Thursday morning the SASS National Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting[™] (CAS) began.

Bright and early Thursday morning the first of three waves attended a brief orientation meeting and a safety video was played. The shooters then moved to their designated stages. The match has 36 posses with 21 or 22 shooters per posse. Each wave is allocated three hours... 45 minutes to complete each stage. Delays can result in backups and nothing is less fun than waiting for a backup to clear. Backups are avoided by good stage writing, expediters, and great posse marshals. Match officials also walk up and down the shooting lines to offer help if a posse is experiencing problems. The process repeats itself for the mid-day and afternoon waves and repeated on Friday and Saturday. The message as set forth by the voice and the book had come true. It was built and they did come.

The stages consisted of a variety of props – a sawmill, frontier tent city, stagecoach, a courthouse, a cactus forest, frontier fort, general store, and a huge full-size saloon. Putting together a great match consists of fun and interesting stages as well as props and structures that provide the ambience for a true western adventure. Once again the months of planning and construction paid off. The shooter response was overwhelmingly favorable.

III. THEY HAVE FUN

Shooting a multi-day match with multiple events and time between waves leaves a lot of down time. Shooters when they are not shooting, non-shooting spouses, and children and visitors need something to do during the day.

To fill this time there is a huge vendor village offering food, clothing, guns, and every other essential for WBAS and Cowboy Action Shooting $^{\text{\tiny TM}}$ participants. It is the largest gathering of vendors at any SASS match anywhere in the world and the vendors reported brisk sales. When not occupied in the vendor village, attendees could enjoy entertainment going on throughout the week - strolling musicians, Doc Holliday and Wyatt Earp putting on shows in the main tent, a gun twirling show, a vendor appreciation dinner on Tuesday night, and a well-attended swap meet. On Wednesday there was an opening

ceremony with complimentary food for the shooters and what has become a Winter Range tradition - an aerial over-flight. This year a squadron of ten aircraft flew over the main tent doing maneuvers and trailing smoke to entertain the crowd. There was a costume contest where participants wear everything from working cowboy clothes to the finest in military uniforms, suits, and dazzling gowns. There is a casino night where everyone can try his or her hand at traditional western gambling such as Faro. Later in the week there was a mounted shooting match that is extremely popular with visitors as the wide open mounted shooting arena presents an unobstructed view of the action. There were two banquets and a side match awards ceremony. Everyone breathed a sign of relief and kicked back and relaxed Saturday night. It was all over. Or was it?

IV. THEY CELEBRATE

Early Sunday morning two different groups of Winter Range volunteers were hard at work. One group was outside setting up and getting ready for a shoot-

off. Another group was inside un-boxing hundreds of awards and setting up the main tent for the awards ceremony. The shoot-off is completed around 11:00 a.m. and the crowd starts filling the main tent. The WBAS awards are handed out first and then the Cowboy Action Shooting™ awards. Reading as quickly as possible, it takes more than two hours to hand

out 400-plus awards to the winners.


While the awards ceremony was taking place many of the Winter Range Rough Riders and Rangers were out on the range taking down the props. Each bay is dismantled and the props neatly stacked for pickup. The props and stage fronts are loaded into trailers and returned to the storage yard and stored in six large metal containers to protect them from the sun and the elements. By 2:00 p.m. on Monday afternoon the range is empty. The dream is gone in less than two days. BUT there are already rumblings in the desert. The voice says the Field of Dreams will return on February 18-24, 2019.

A COSTUMER'S RESOURCE COSTUME COLLEGE 2018

hatever your Shooting Style Category, whatever your Age Based Category, we all have one thing in common – costuming! It may be simple, it may be over-the-top, but it is always fun and is what sets us apart from other shooting sports.

Just as you build your expertise in shooting, you will find that your expertise in costuming increases over time until the day you might want to try your hand at making your own garments, accessories, even leather pieces. So where do we go to begin our costume journey? Friends, YouTube, even Facebook groups will help, but for hands-on experience with people who are on that same journey there is my favorite place - Costume College. It's not a full time college, but an intense and fun event held in Woodland Hills, California for three days at the end of July. This is where you can learn to create anything you desire - corsets and camisoles, bustles and boot-bling, hats and hatpins, vests and Vaquero jackets. on guns made by the Colt Custom Shop and Smith and Wesson.

Raj met all the greats in the shooting world at these shows. One of those greats, Joe Bowman, the fast draw artist, approached the then grown-up Raj at Eagle Grips about 25 years ago. He


wanted grips that were thin, with a ridge behind the receiver to minimize "roll back" under recoil, and curves to fit the average hand better than stock grips. The resulting grips were named Gunfighter Grips. Most SASS World and National Champions have them on

their guns. They have inspired several copies.

Fast forward to 2018. For a few years Eagle has been making grips out of a new material—Kirinite—an acrylic that has to be cut and polished, not molded, can be polished to a high luster. The more it's polished the more it grabs and bonds to the hand. It comes in some striking and unique color combinations that have to be seen to be believed. I have written about it in Dispatches in the past. I didn't use them until now because I couldn't imagine Bill Hickok meeting Dave Tutt with, say, wicked purple grips on his guns.

But then Raj told me about antique pearl and white pearl. They look like pearl grips but with the strength of Kirinite. While I would call most Kirinite colors "modern," antique pearl and white pearl would look right at home on a gun in the Old West. Among the people who sported pearl handled Colts were Texas John Slaughter and John Wesley Hardin. If you agree with General Patton, they have ivory panel Kirinite and ultra ivory. They're available smooth and checkered. For more money they have elk and Sambar stag.

Note their website says to allow 4-6 weeks for delivery as the grips are hand made to order. They are available for all Ruger Single Actions. They are worth the wait. <u>Eaglegrips.com</u> 800-323-6144.

AMERICAN-MADE BOOTS FOR SASS FROM WORK-N-RANCH

About 10 years ago I went on quests for things I thought SASS vendors needed to provide. Low-heeled authentic-looking boots was one of the items I wanted to see, not just for me, but for all of the shooters in SASS whose feet couldn't stand high-heeled boots. Most boots in the old west weren't highheeled. They started in about 1875 because trail-drive cowboys were having trouble with the available boots and the design of stirrups. Their feet could go through, enabling their foot to get caught, which was not desirable if you're being dragged by a runaway horse. But the Army never went to them, and a lot of civilians didn't go for them because unlike Nancy Sinatra's boots, they

weren't made for walking.

Keith and Linda Schomerus at Work-n-Ranch liked the idea and went looking for some from their suppliers. But Keith could never get a supplier that didn't want a huge initial order. He never stopped trying though, and their shop finally introduced them "Gunfighter" boots at Winter Range. And they're made in the USA.


They come in two versions, and two colors, black and brown. The 16" tall two-piece front version would be authentic for the late 1870s on. The 17" tall boots with one-piece fronts would be authentic for any time in the old west. They have modern soles and rubber heels. The tops are wide enough for most SASS shooters' calves. I ordered a pair of black 17" boots. I've been wearing them at matches since then.

They're made out of high-quality leather that takes polish well and can be brought to a military high gloss. They cost \$199 and you can find them at stores.worknranch.com 402-782-6980.

NEW FROM ST MACHINING

ST Machining is Shalako (SASS #69148) and Pinto Annie (SASS #27966). They have several items for shooters and reloaders. At Winter Range they introduced some new items.

The Dilllon XL650 and SL900 both use the same indexing block, part #16776. It has a flat surface that must

be greased frequently, but ST Machining has one with a roller bearing, eliminating a grease point and smoothing operation. I put them on my SL900 and my XL650. Both worked perfectly with no adjustment.

The SL900 has a plastic primer transfer arm, part #16691. It wears, getting out of alignment, and it can break. ST Machining makes an aluminum one with a roller bearing. It is of stronger material and doesn't wear and get out of alignment. The ball bearing eliminates another grease point. For SL900 owners, this is a significant improvement.

Another new product is one they call a Loading Block. It comes in .38/.357 and .45 Colt and I tested both. Once you put the rounds in and click to rotate the top piece you've checked the diameter of the round, which usually catches split cases, uncrimped cases, the flatness of the rim, and whether the primer is seated correctly or not. It holds 20 rounds. Check out ST Machining's products at cowboy-bullets.com.

HIPSHOT NEEDED A NEW RIG...

A couple of years ago Hipshot (SASS #7) complained to Bob Mernickle that he needed a new rig. He couldn't get his guns back into their holsters easily. His holsters "collapsed." His rig was also worn out. But it had to look authentic, not like the "speed" rigs of today. He wanted it to look like an 1800s rig.

Bob had just introduced the HP series, so he knew how to make a state of the art competition holster, and he made several authentic nineteenth century style holsters. The HP is steel lined, heavy, stiff leather, and supports the pistol with mild retention. Bob put these features into a Double Loop holster that looks authentic, The HPHS REF1.

The holster rides on the belt vertically usually on the point of the hips. The design of the holster covers part of the trigger guard. The front of the holster is cut down and there is a slight lip curl for fast reholstering. Since it is steel lined it doesn't collapse, and reholstering is easy. This is not optimal for shooters who draw the weak side holster with the weak hand and transfer it to the strong because the trigger guard is covered. You can do it, but you will fumble more than if you can grab the weak side gun with thumb over the top strap and fingers on the front of the trigger guard. Then there's room for a smooth transition to the strong hand. It's also not for folks who want to wear their pistols muzzle forward on the front of the belt. Bob makes holsters for those people, of course.



FANDANGO! 2017 THE WISCONSIN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

olmen, WI - Home of the Holmen Rod and Gun Club and host of the Wisconsin State Championship. Unlike many state matches the SASS Wisconsin State Championship rotates among three clubs (Western Wisconsin Wild Bunch, Rock River Regulators, and Wisconsin Old West Shootists) and the date of the match varies each year to match each club's annual three day match (Fandango on the second weekend of October, Reckoning on the Rock on the first weekend of June, and Fire in the Hills on the fourth weekend of August). This year the Championship match was hosted by the Western Wisconsin Wild Bunch.

The three-day event starts a day early in Holman as The Holmen Rod and Gun club allows for RV and tent camping on the range grounds during

the match. The club has permanent electric hook-ups for RVs as a convenience to those who choose to camp. At noon on Thursday the gates to the range opened and the RVs started rolling in! By 5:00 p.m. there were more than two dozen RVs parked and leveled and a number of tents were set up for the weekend. The Fandango Palace was open and registration packets were available for pick-up. As part of the registration pick-up you were asked to pull a commemorative Fandango 20th anniversary poker chip out of a jar. This chip had two uses besides being a fun memento. First there was a number written on the "tails" side of the chip that was used to decide what door prize you would receive - items such as ammo boxes, handgun soft cases, etc. The second use was for the awards ceremony when it would be used in the Fandango Flip! (More about that later.) A raffle was available for \$1 a ticket with chances to win free entry to a number of three-day matches donated by clubs from Wisconsin, Iowa, and Minnesota. More than \$300 was raised and all proceeds went to the SASS Scholarship Fund.

A garage sale ran all day Friday at the Palace where Cowboys and Cowgirls brought in any items they were looking to sell. Friday's side matches started off cool and cloudy with only a 20 percent chance of rain but by 11:00 the forecast changed to a 90 percent chance and by noon we had rain. Fortunately, all of the side matches took place in WWWB's wild west town, keeping everyone under roof, inside, and dry! Also being prepared for inclement weather, the setup crew had the foresight to set up carport tarps along the town allowing carts and gear to stay dry. Side matches included long range pistol, long range pistol caliber rifle, long range large bore lever-action rifle, and long range single shot rifle at the rifle range. In town we had speed rifle, pistol, and shotgun, along with a pistol poker match that required a shooter to shoot a target with a picture of all 52 cards in a deck and try to create the best hand they could with five rounds. As the four-stage Wild Bunch mini match was in full swing, the skies opened up and the rain came pouring down. Despite the rain, the side match stages remained busy until they were shut down for the day. Friday night we were treated to a Mexican potluck at the Fandango Palace.

Saturday morning saw all 117 shooters from the Midwest and beyond (Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska and North Carolina) assembled at the Palace for a safety meeting. The theme of this year's stages was westerns and movies from each of the last 20 years

(two per stage) with a line pulled from one of the two movies used by the shooter to start the stage. The stages, written by Match Director Flyen Doc Koyote were a good mix of speed and accuracy and aside from a brief rain shower an hour into the match the six stages scheduled for Saturday went off without a hitch!

The Saturday night banquet consisted of chicken or a slab of one-inch thick prime rib as big as your plate with all the fixings (dinner rolls, green beans, potatoes, etc). As is often said of the Fandango banquet, "If you go home hungry, it's your own dang fault." Awards for side match winners were handed out during the banquet.

After another torrential downpour Saturday night the weather finally cleared up and a cold front moved in Sunday morning just before Cowboy church. Four stages and two hours later the last posse was finished and it was time for lunch and the awards ceremony! The award for the middle shooter (a yellow 1959 Cadillac Eldorado Biarritz Convertible, Signature Model 32350 1/32 scale) went to aptly named Lucky Leslie (SASS #66961). meaning Someone Found, with her Comanche horse approached out of the night darkness. (Cynthia Ann was portrayed by Fort Parker Director, Sarah McReynolds.) She began to tell us of her capture from the fort, how she was adopted by a Comanche family, later married tribal leader Peta Nocona, and had three children. One son was Quanah Parker, the last free Comanche Chief. She expressed how sad she was after she and her daughter were taken back to civilization by the Texas Rangers when she was about 34 years old. She shared with us some of the Comanche traditions and way of living. Her pony was very willing to have his picture taken!

When the main match began on Saturday morning, the smoke began to "hang" over the fort and at times it was difficult to see the targets! The shooter's line at the Fort stage was "The Fort is on Fire" and it looked like it might really be true! While the stages were being shot, costume judges walked the range looking for the Best Lady and Man shooting costumes.

After the first five stages were completed, shooters had the opportunity to shoot their big guns in the long range events. Categories were black powder and smokeless in lever, single shot, and pistol calibers. Shooters climbed the old wooden stairs up into the fort blockhouse. Once inside the blockhouse and

ready to shoot, competitors shot targets from the very small blockhouse windows. This must have been how the Parkers kept the Comanche away!

Saturday evening brought out some great costumes for the banquet held in the Fort's Visitor Center. Costume judges searched for the Best Lady, Gentleman, and Couple costumes. After dinner was completed, all the costume contest winners were announced, side match awards were given out, and shooters had the opportunity to purchase tickets for some very nice prizes. One of the prizes was a wooden box that was locked so no one would know what "surprise" might be inside. Oklahoma Dee (SASS #44562) won and he was given the key to unlock the box. He was very happy as he took an Uberti Taylors and Company 1873 .357 rifle, in the white, out of the box!

On Sunday morning there was some lingering rain from a cold front that was moving into Texas. The schedule of events indicated shooting started at 9:00 a.m. We were all holding our breath... rain gear or no rain gear? The Sun God must have decided to bless us because at 8:55 the rain stopped! and order in Indian Territory. It was home to the "Hanging Judge," Isaac C. Parker. Parker sent marshals, including Bass Reeves and others, into the Territory to chase down outlaws on the run and bring them back, dead or alive. It's also home to Judge Parker's Marshals and the Old Fort Gun Club, who just held their annual Hell on the Border match.

Mid-March in Arkansas this year was glorious! Fears of cold winds and rain all evaporated as the match date drew near. By mid-match, the temperatures were just above 80 degrees!

The club has done a marvelous job of creating façades and props for their range... and being so close to Ft. Smith, have used that history as inspiration for some rather impressive props. The infamous gallows where six gents were hung all in one setting is the central prop, and Ms. Laura's "Social Club," located a short distance from the courthouse and gallows, has been built right next door.

This three-day match featured a 10-stage State Championship Wild Bunch match as well as a 10-stage annual Cowboy Action match. Wild Bunch was shot Thursday and Friday and Cowboy Action was shot Friday and Saturday... and yes, Friday was a LONG day!

The Wild Bunch match was shot on Cowboy stages... all the targets des-

ignated as Cowboy revolver targets were predictably shot super-fast... and not always cleanly! There were, however, plenty of targets and challenges provided by the Cowboy rifle targets... and one certainly had to use that little bumpy thing at on the end of the barrel! This was the first match at the Old Fort

Gun Club where seven rounds were allowed in 1911 magazines. The stage designers took inspiration for the Wild Bunch stages from the Cowboy Action stages and many of the shooters soon learned loading seven was not always the best strategy! For example, one stage required 10-rifle and 30-pistol rounds

and had four targets to be engaged in a 2- 4- 6- 8- or 8- 6- 4- 2-round sweep using both rifle and 1911... and then again using only the pistol... try THAT with a seven-round magazine! One had to think, concentrate on the shooting problem, and stay in control. Most were not able to do that for the whole match. It became a challenging competition!





it will not encroach on your date to go a'riding with the Masons"



"Well, then, is there any reason to rush to settle up with a friend?" asked Noah, feeling a little tired of the issue at the stage house altogether.


"No, I don't believe there is." replied Rufus, thoughtfully as he handed the pouch back to Noah. "Besides, I judge the issue inconvenient in light of the

STRANGE VICTORIAN PRACTICES

ou might think that the Victorian Era (roughly 1830-1900) was stilted and stuffy, and in many cases you'd be right. The average Victorian of the middle and upper classes was patriotic, religious, and careful to mind his or her manners. Some things just weren't talked about-like sex. Queen Victoria famously advised a bride on her wedding night to "lie back and think of England." If Victoria really said that, England must have been on her mind a lot. She had nine children with her husband, Prince Albert. All this notwithstanding, there were some downright weird aspects to the Victorian era that are baffling to the modern mind.

Despite all the optimism about progress and technology, there was a gloomy undercurrent to the period. Maybe this had something to do with Victoria herself. After Prince Albert died in 1861, she went into permanent mourning. For the remaining forty years of her life she wore black. She attended séances and consulted spiritualists. Victoria's grief seems to have seeped into the general outlook of the time. There was a kind of morbid

preoccupation with death that pervaded the Victorian era.

Technology and morbidity came together with the quaint practice of getting photographed with one's dead relatives. Photography was the new rage and people couldn't wait to have their images taken. You had to sit very still or the image was blurred. Someone eventually put two and two together and figured out corpses would make ideal subjects for photography. These final images would help relatives with their grief. The notion went one step further when someone else figured out the whole family could get together one last time with the recently departed.

An ingenious device was invented which would prop up corpses so they could be photographed in lifelike positions. It involved retractable tubing as well as braces, clamps, straps and a stand. All you had to do was hook up Aunt Emmie to the gizmo, pose her in the desired position, gather the rest of the family (who were still living) around, and presto! Aunt Emmie gets a final sendoff and her family gets a memento.

Of course, rigor mortis might pose a problem in getting Aunt Emmie into the right pose. I didn't really want to research this, but I imagine the person who clamped her into the gizmo had a handy rubber mallet lying around, and the pose was struck, so to speak, out of the family's earshot.

Taxidermy was a popular Victorian hobby, but there was an aspect to it that had an unwholesome twist. It was considered acceptable to pose dead animals in tableaux where they were happily doing human activities like playing the piano or sitting down to dinner. A respectable Victorian could enjoy scenes that involved several stuffed kittens at the opera or a cute scene with baby rabbits at tiny desks studying their adorable hearts away.

It would be interesting to see what would happen if a person were to obtain one of these *tableaux* and smuggle it into the middle of a PETA conference.

Surely it would incite disorder. This may be something for my bucket list.

My wife and I had the dubious pleasure of visiting a museum of taxidermy during a trip to England about twenty years ago. Perhaps we were lucky because the place has since been closed and the collection dispersed. The museum was called "Mr. Potter's House of Curiosities" and was located at the Jamaica Inn on Bodmin Moor in Sussex. I was tired of driving on the wrong side of the road, my wife was interested in the Jamaica Inn, and I noticed it had a pub. We decided to give the museum a try. It was a curious place, to say the least.

Although I'm pretty jaded, the Museum of Curiosities gave me the creeps. Walter Potter practiced his taxidermy skills on everything he could get his hands on and his scalpel into. He was particularly interested in stuffing mutated animals like two headed sheep and twin calves that had been fused together before birth. (I'd call them Siamese calves, but they were apparently English.) We then progressed to the room that held cute but deceased animal tableaux. By that time, I was wishing I'd stayed in the pub. Where and how did he get those all those dead baby rabbits and kittens?

As we left the museum, I asked the lady at the counter if there had been a suspicious disappearance of vagrants and prostitutes during the time when Mr. Potter was practicing his hobby. "Someday," I predicted, "a false wall will collapse and reveal Mr. Potter's masterpiece." The lady shifted nervously and took on that harried look I've observed when my jokes fall flat. Another patron laughed nervously but avoided eye contact.

Spiritualism, which bore the stamp of approval from Victoria herself, was another morbid aspect of the period. Séances were popular, especially in the U.S. during and after the Civil War. It was a way to obtain closure since departed Uncle Ed wasn't up for a photograph after Pickett's Charge and neither was Cousin Clem after the Battle of Franklin.

(It wasn't practical to pose what remained of them into one of those newfangled dead family photo devices.) There were plenty of frauds and grifters who were willing to convert the sorrow of others into dollars for themselves.

Mary Todd Lincoln consulted with spiritualists following the death of her beloved son Willie in 1862. He had been a victim of typhoid fever. Desperate to communicate with the little boy, she allowed herself to fall under the influence of charlatans. The president, who was utterly skeptical, allowed it to go on because he feared, rightly so, that his wife was hovering on the brink of madness. Lincoln was also crushed by the boy's death and hoped Mary's new pastime might help her cope. Ultimately, little of value came of it unless you look at the events from the Confederate side. Mary's connection with spiritualism proved embarrassing to the Lincoln administration.

Victorians also enjoyed going to "freak shows." These were common carnival attractions that featured unfortunate citizens who had physical deformities. You could, for a fee, observe "alligator people" with unenviable skin conditions, microcephalics or "pinheads," bearded ladies, obese people, "little people," and other examples of Mother Nature's terrible whimsy.

The most famous of the Victorian "freaks" were the conjoined twins

Chang and Eng Bunker. They were a major feature of PT Barnum's "Greatest Show on Earth." Adding to their oddity was the fact they were both married (their wives were un-conjoined sisters). Between the two of them, they fathered twenty-one children. Chang and Eng led surprisingly normal lives and were respected slaveholders in North Carolina. Two of their sons fought in the Confederate Army.

Were the Victorians so greatly different from us? In some ways, yes. Modern people, at least to my knowledge, do not pose their dead relatives on cleverly constructed devices. We don't arrange stuffed baby rabbits into schoolroom scenes and neither do we encourage the practice. There are no more "freak shows," unless you make the mistake of watching a Congressional debate on TV. Nevertheless, modern people like morbid and odd things.

We gleefully look at weird articles on the Internet. As I write this, there is a headline announcing the death of the world's heaviest woman on CNN. It is replete with pictures (I refuse to look at them). Recently there was much publicity about the twins conjoined at the head and the successful operation to separate them (the whole thing horrifies me.) Furthermore, modern people have an ongoing fascination with contacting the dead.

The TV show Ghost Adventures continues to be popular even though its evidence of finding spectral apparitions is sketchy. The hosts have an electronic device that supposedly picks up the voices of the ghosts, although the sounds they broadcast could be anything. I guess if you remix the noises enough and stand on one leg facing south, you can convince yourself you're being spoken to from beyond the grave. I recently visited the Washoe Club in Nevada, where Ghost Adventures got its big break, and felt absolutely nothing otherworldly about the place. My wife and I even went on the ghost tour. You'd think a ghost would be especially eager to contact an historian, but nothing happened.

The Victorians can be forgiven for their morbid pastimes. After all, this period was nearly the apex of Western Civilization. It was an era typified by hope and optimism, as opposed to the self-doubt and pessimism that often plague us today. The Victorians may have been stuffy when it came to "behaving properly" in society and equally "stuffy" (no pun intended) when it came to cute little dead animals, but at least they believed in progress. If they had weird ways of dealing with death, the same could be said of modern times.

It almost seems that our present time has abandoned all hope of progress and a better future. Despite the fact Victorians sometimes focused on a morbid present, we seem to wallow in a morbid past, present, and future. Maybe our attitude is the dubious gift of 24/7 news coverage and social media. It's hard to look at the news and feel optimistic. Facebook, depending on how you look at it, is either a nice way to stay in touch with friends and relatives, or a stench in the nostrils of the Almighty. No wonder we Cowboy Action Shooters™ are drawn to the Victorians.

THE REAL PROBLEM WITH MASS SHOOTINGS, PART 2

elcome back. Last we talked, my liberal stepbrother Jack and I were having a discussion about gun control. Jack had sparred with me saying people shouldn't be allowed to have military-style weapons and he tried to stand on the moral high ground by accusing me of defending the AR, which "isn't good for anything but killing a lot of people really fast." But I took back the moral high ground by accusing him of not caring about people's rights to defend themselves and I pointed out if people had been allowed to arm themselves against historical tyrants, most of the genocides in the world could have been prevented. I closed with the real problem with mass shootings, and that is the presence of evil in the world. And so we continue...



Stepping up to the kitchen bar, I slid a beer across the counter at Jack. "So, can you accept that?"

"What?" Jack replied, not sure about which point I was asking.

"If we want to live in a free society then some things are going to be out of our control because there is evil in the world?"

"Yes," Jack agreed, "I can accept that some things would be out of our control, but I think we can do a lot better at controlling and preventing other things... the important things... like reducing gun crimes and saving people's lives."

Typical of gun-grabbers, Jack disregards my earlier points that demonstrated when guns are taken away from regular people more people usually die, whether by criminals or by governments.

Jack continued, "We can't just keep doing nothing!"

"Wait a minute, what makes you think we're doing nothing?" I've heard this before from gun-grabbers. If there's a gun crime then apparently "we're doing nothing." Raising my voice, "There are thousands of gun laws that infringe on people's rights to protect themselves. We delay gun purchases. We track gun purchases. We limit magazine size. We tell people where they can and cannot carry a gun. We enforce strict requirements to carry concealed. We require many kinds of legal reports to be filed. In some states ARs are illegal to purchase and in other states guns are required to be locked up so you can't get to them if you need them. We're NOT 'just doing nothing' and no matter how many laws and regulations you pass to restrict people's freedoms and rights, there will always be bad people doing bad things."

Pushing back now, Jack defends his utopian dream, "All those things are good, but it's not enough! We need to be more like Japan who barely had a dozen murders last year in the whole country. If they have trouble they just call 911 like you're supposed to."

I paused here to use an analogy I like, "All right, so let me ask you... do you have a fire extinguisher?"

Jack says, a little confused at the sudden change of topic, "What? Uh, sure, I have three, one in the kitchen, one in the garage, one..."

"Why?" I interrupted, "Why do you have so many extinguishers?"

Looking a bit annoyed, "So I can put out a fire if I need to."

"If you've got trouble, don't you just call 911? The fire department will be there in just a few minutes." Long pause. "Get it? When seconds count, it doesn't do much good for the police to show up minutes later to draw a chalk line around your body. Everyone has the right to defend themselves at the moment a threat is upon them... and so do you. And we have a right to use any means necessary to eliminate the threat, including a gun, because there's a good chance the criminal has a gun.

"And about that Japan reference," going into my teacher mode, "if you knew what the Japanese have to put up with, you might not be so keen on emulating them."

Jack rolls his eyes, "I suppose you're going to educate me so you can somehow deny the fact gun crimes hardly exist in Japan."

"Yes on the education. But no, I won't deny the fact because it's true. Japan has very few gun crimes, almost none. But there are some good reasons for it." Counting on my fingers, "One, it's a much older and smaller country than America. This makes it easier to maintain their traditions and control people. In America, since before the Revolution to the expansion of the West, guns were a part of our culture because it was necessary for food and national defense since we didn't have much of a military back then, and this all happened right when gun technol-

ogy was making big strides. So we've always had a gun culture, unlike Japan. That's two. Three, they don't have a Constitution that protects people's rights, and I'm not just talking about the Second Amendment. They also have no rights for legal representation or protections against self-incrimination or privacy rights or property rights like we do. If they suspect you of a crime, they can haul you down to the station and beat a confession out of you and you have no recourse. Amnesty International calls the Japanese police custody system a 'flagrant violation of human rights.'

"Where do you get this stuff?" questioned Jack.

"I don't play video games, I read. It comes from a research paper titled Japanese Gun Control by Dave Kopel. I keep a copy of it filed away. It's also part of a book he wrote."

Jack seemed a little surprised, "You make it sound like the Japanese aren't even civil."

"Oh, they're civil. Very much so. Probably more so than Americans, but their civility and extreme respect for authority is rooted in a history of fearing the police. To this day, Japanese people are subjected to unannounced searches of their homes every year, sometimes two. In that search, the police take inventory of their valuables and survey the people who live at the address. They even ask about their sexual habits, especially teenagers. Low Japanese crime rates are a lot less about gun control and a lot more about the attitudes and culture spawned from people control. Not to say they don't have the kind of gun control that Progressives dream of. They do, but they also have civil liberty nightmares under which most Americans, even Liberals, would not be willing to live. And that's why the Japan versus America argument amounts to apples and oranges."

Running out of things to say, I make another comparison, "Let me ask you something else, Jack. Do you think it's fair people judge ALL Muslims by the actions of a few radical terrorists?"

"No, of course not."

Before he could go on about that, I jump in. "Then why do you judge ALL gun owners by the actions of a few radical killers who happen to use guns? You don't demand new regulations when terrorists run people over with trucks.'

"I'm not judging gun owners," Jack insisted, truly believing he's not.

"I'd say you are, because if you feel you're justified in taking away people's property, their guns, like they do in Japan, Australia, and the UK, then you're passing judgment and penalties on them for crimes other people committed. It's no different than the government confiscating your cookware because the Boston Marathon bombers used a pressure cooker as their bomb."

Seeing the silliness in that, Jack smiles, "Why can't we all just be nice to each other? The golden rule, you know."

"If you're looking at the big wide picture, we won't find it this side of heaven, my friend. Let's go out to the range this weekend and I'll show you how that 'mean looking AR' isn't much different from other semi-auto rifles."





SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

The Cowboy Chronicle welcomes and encourages submissions of articles and match reports from any and all readers.

Please submit articles in MS Word or something compatible. Open Office and Apple Pages (saved as MS Word) are also fine. A count of 500-800 words is a good target to shoot for, but shorter pieces are also fine. Match reports on larger events, like END of TRAIL, Winter Range, and Regional and Divisional matches may run 1000-1500 words if necessary. We will accept lengthier articles, but may choose to break them up into two or more parts to run in consecutive issues, or heavily edit them.

Please do not embed your photos in the Word document. They can be extracted for use in the *The Cowboy Chronicle*, but it can be a chore to do that. Instead, send your photos separately, in one or more emails, as attachments. Three to six photos per email usually works best. It's best to send JPEGs, but other formats are acceptable, and it's best to keep them at about 300 dpi and 3000 pixels (10 inches) on the short side. That size is

ideal and will allow us plenty of leeway when it comes to cropping and adjusting them for publication. Photos should be at least 1000 pixels on the short side to be used for publication. If you're unsure of the size of your pictures, or how to size them, send what you have and we'll adjust them and/or inform you if they're usable.

Usually, two to six photos are sufficient for an article, but we will consider using more for a "big" event, if provided. Photos need not have captions, but captions always make photos more interesting. Ideally, the caption would consist of one or two sentences that say something about the picture that is not obvious and/or is not implicit in the body of the article. "Sam making smoke" is a title but not a caption. "Sam, SASS #XXXXX, shooting his first black powder match; after much deliberation, he decided to give it a try and now he's hooked" is much better. A caption may also serve to let everyone know why the picture is worthy of being published in an international magazine.
