IN THE BEGINNING...

■ owboy Action Shooting[™] actually started in 1979, or thereabouts. The Judge (SASS #1) and the General (SASS #2) were members of an action pistol club in Southern California and wondered if their game could be played with "cowboy guns." For the next couple of years "cowboy" style matches were held at Coto de Caza, a wonderful, gated community in the foothills of Orange County, California. After a few years, the notion of an annual match was hatched... and the rest is history!

The planning was set in motion, costumes were required, and the rules were... "well understood" by everyone interested in playing the game. It would be called "END of TRAIL"... marking the end of the months-long cattle drives

to Kansas... the herd had been sold, the drovers had had a bath, been paid, purchased new clothes, drank a little whisky, played some cards, and experienced the favors of the lovely Kansas ladies. It was time to CELEBRATE!

And celebrate they did! Coto had a large, covered equestrian arena, which was to be the site of the inaugural celebration. Chili was cooked, whisky was drunk, and guns were fired! The expensive thoroughbreds stabled nearby all freaked out and loud discussions ensued. Long story short, the cowboys were disinvited from any further celebrations in the covered arena! This could have been the end!

THE EARLY YEARS...

The early years were all in Coto de Caza, from the first END of TRAIL in 1982 through 1991. There were two bays left over from the 1980 Olympics where the pentathlon was held. Two stages could be set up on each bay and the bays could be rearranged each day for four stages. Early on, END of TRAIL sported 12 stages of Cowboy Action. All through these early years it was the Wild Bunch that designed the event, produced the event, and hosted the event. Everyone had an assignment and was held accountable. By the end of each match, everyone was exhausted and nobody was speaking to anybody! The most memorable part of this time was the Wild Bunch meeting at the Judge's home, sitting on the floor, eating and drinking, and designing stages — and laughing... a lot! The problem was, the next morning no one had any idea what wonderful ideas had been fleshed out the afternoon before... so we learned we had to write things down as we went!

The Wild Bunch learned a lot about stage design during this period... balanced stages (time wise) was one of the first things. Several times it got dark before all the competitors had completed the day's shooting. The stragglers were up first the next morning and then the bay had to be broken down and reset for the new day's shooting! Another lesson learned was "one shooter - one

entry!" One of the early competitors entered END of TRAIL six times — as six different competitors. He dressed as six different Hollywood cowboy stars, all with distinctive costumes. He completed the match shooting as all six different cowboys, all in costume, and he ended exhausted from all the costume changes!

Rank scoring had been used from the beginning. Initially there were no computer programs available, so scores were recorded on small "tickets" that could be collected, sorted, and manually tabulated. Time was irrelevant, place of finish was all that counted.

Target size and placement were still a work in progress. There was no consistency... some liked small, distant targets and others wanted a bar room fight where all the targets were man sized at ten feet! Ruger Blackhawks with their adjustable sights were favored because of cost and ability to hit small targets more reliably. Colts were used but were definitely in the minority.

The posse concept did not exist. When a shooter was ready to shoot a stage, he simply got in line and waited his turn. It wasn't until the Durango Kid (SASS #8) hosted a match in Durango Colorado that the posse system was invented. He had no club to support the match operations so he said, "Break into groups and shoot the stages as a group. You guys can manage the shooters, count the misses, and keep the scores." It was a revolutionary idea!

In an attempt to ensure order and safety at the early END of TRAILs, the Wild Bunch hired LAPD deputies to be range officials. They were the timer operators and counters. They also refused to allow the cowboys to handle their firearms! They retrieved them from the loading table and staged them. This never set well and was the reason they were let go after a couple of years.

Costume contests were held from the very beginning. It was recognized if we were to have a true fantasy game, we had to look the part. In the beginning, it was as prestigious to win the costume contest as it was to win the shooting match. Phil Spangenberger (Rawhide Rawlins, SASS #834) and Dennis Mader (Wes Terner, SASS #36)

were participants in the first END of TRAIL and Gary Kangas (Grey Fox, SASS #223) shortly thereafter — all looked 100 percent authentic! In fact, they were the only ones who looked authentic. In the beginning, the winners of the costume contests were the only ones not wearing blue jeans! The early years were definitely a learning time... and shaped the game for years to come!

In 1984 END of TRAIL (the forerunner of SASS) was incorporated. In 1987 The Cowboy Chronicle was created (Tex, SASS #4), the SASS Handbook was written (R.J. Poteet, SASS #3), a better Scoring Program initiated (Doc Alan Mortimer, SASS #178), and the SASS alias registry established. At this point SASS was officially "organized," the Wild Bunch expanded, clubs encouraged, and Judge Roy Bean (SASS #1) was sent on a mission around the country to recruit new members. SASS went from a few thousand Southern California cowboys to a worldwide organization.

THE GLORY YEARS...

By the early 1990s California real estate was booming (again), and Coto de Caza became the hot seat of money politics. Coto blossomed with two PGA class golf courses, hundreds of mini-mansions, tract homes, and undesirable gunfire in the neighborhood. After payments to officials and payments to Coto management, all shooting was forced out of Coto de Caza. The cowboy club, The Coto Cowboys, built a new home near Norco, CA on a dairy preserve situated on flood control land leased by Mike Rahaague (site of an existing shooting facility).

The move was traumatic! SASS left Shangri-la (Coto) for barren wasteland with berms of cow manure. The mounds of manure were undergoing spontaneous combustion, smoldering with acrid smoke, and covered with flies. And, the berms were turned in the wrong direction! The first END of TRAIL held there in 1992 was an exercise in determination. Flies were everywhere, dust in the air wasn't dust at all... it was cow s___t! At the end of the match, Wild Bunch member Leadville (SASS #39) announced he had rented all the flies from an outfit in San Diego and we were obligated to turn them all in so they could be returned to the rental agency! Monday morning after the match, I discovered the roof inside my Suburban was black with flies!

In time, the berms were rebuilt, turned around, and bays added. Water, power, and compressed air were installed in the bays. An arena was added. END of TRAIL finally had enough room to accommodate the numbers of competitors eager to participate.

The theme for one memorable END of TRAIL was "Bringing in the Herd." Dutch (SASS #455) was assigned the task of acquiring a herd.

Several dozen SASS cowboys were veteran trail drivers having experienced a "real" trail drive in Colorado, living off the chuck wagon, and managing the herd for a week over the Continental Divide (ala City Slickers... note: the trail boss in the movie was far nicer than our trail boss!) To our dismay, Dutch had contracted for a herd of dairy calves! Older and wiser cows can be herded... calves are like kittens! Once the calves were released, they disbursed like an explosion and began running through the parking lot in every direction... kids were screaming, women were crying... and the cowboys were frantically trying

to gather the herd! And, that was only the beginning...

END of TRAIL had more waddies than it could manage and was annually held in April. Being close to Hollywood, numerous celebrities (cowboy stuntmen and actors) were easy recruits. Being close to Los Angeles, there were thousands of civilians willing to either play cowboy with us or willing to come see the celebrities. At this point, Dutch took on the job "he was born to do!" Dutch became the spark that ignited the creation and production of the SASS Wild West Show. With a little help from his friends, a series of END

of TRAIL shows were produced that rivaled Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West show. Indians, chuck wagon races, pony express rides, melodramas, and the like filled the bleachers a couple of times each END of TRAIL day. Dave Bourne formed a period correct brass band that provided music for the shows, and Dutch provided color commentary for all to enjoy. These were truly the glory years!

THE LATER YEARS...

Issues had been building for years at Rahaague's facility. After END of TRAIL 2004, SASS moved its Headquarters and END of TRAIL to New Mexico. New Mexico provided a gun-friendly environment, the ability to own the END of TRAIL venue, and more than enough room to comfortably accommodate the competitors. Having a permanent home, investment was now feasible to acquire indoor vendor stores in addition to the traditional tent city. A large auditorium-style building was erected to accommodate END of TRAIL shooters meetings, evening festivities, and award ceremonies.

END of TRAIL 2005 was the first World Championship held in New Mexico. It was special... and eye opening! Everything was fresh and new... and exciting. There were many new faces... especially from New Mexico, but also from nearby Texas. Old friends from Arizona were also in evidence. However, it was chilly (cold, actually). All the transplanted Southern Californians had an opportunity to wear their "woolies" for the very first time! There was rain, sleet, and snow... and the ground suddenly turned soft... there was mud on boots and gun carts... and some of the RVs and cars were stuck due to the soft ground! We learned a lesson about spring weather in New Mex-

END of TRAIL quickly moved to mid-June, continued to host Mounted Shooting in addition to Cowboy Action Shooting™, and provided professional cowboy stunt men to provide "real West" action entertainment for the public. Miss Tabitha (SASS #26972) and Mad Mountain Mike (SASS #4365) produced a vaudeville-style show with dancing girls, comedy acts, and musical

numbers. There was even an escape artist who nearly strangled himself when he couldn't get free of the ropes and chains! Over the years, several period encampments were provided by local reenactors. Civil War soldiers and Buffalo soldiers were often in evidence.

END of TRAIL continued to evolve over the years. The emphasis on entertainment for the public diminished in favor of creating a "shooters event." And even the shooting had evolved.

Coyote Calhoun (SASS #201) was match director for a while and wanted to provide a "throwback" or nostalgic match that glorified the past by resurrecting memorable stages from the early years. When he looked at the past stages, he realized there was no way. They were too different. He finally settled on, "...in the past this stage was shot 'such and so,' but today we're going to shoot it like this...." Additionally, the match style preferred by the competi-

tors had changed dramatically. Fewer "extraneous" actions were wanted, speed was wanted, and of course no one wanted to miss! The fantasy flavor that had spawned END of TRAIL was being left behind for a speed match with large, close targets, minimal costuming, and even less fantasy play acting.

Match design accommodated the shooter's desires and the shooters responded. Match design transitioned from Coyote to T. A. Chance (SASS #4072) and then later to Lassiter (SASS #2080) and finally to Deuce Stevens (SASS #55996). These individuals worked together as Match Directors and each offered a little different stage design philosophy. Inviting others besides the Wild Bunch to do the match design was certainly a successful new idea. In the end, it's the only way to keep things fresh and new and make each END of TRAIL exciting and different.

THE 40TH ANNIVERSARY OF END OF TRAIL...

COVID-19 has certainly not been

a friend to END of TRAIL. Special celebrations were planned for END of TRAIL 2020, but the event had to be cancelled due to the Pandemic. As the 40th Anniversary of END of TRAIL (2021) grew closer, it was clear that a new location and venue needed to be found to avoid another cancellation. Etna Green, Indiana - nestled minutes from Warsaw and through a maze of corn cropped farmland, lies a little slice of Cowboy heaven called Paradise Pass. For the past 40 years END of TRAIL and Cowboy Action Shooting[™] have provided life-long friends and a wonderful adventure none of us will ever forget. As the Wild Bunch drifts slowly into the sunset, we look forward to traveling to occasional matches, playing the role of "grand ol' men (and women)," and watching the evolution of our collective game. SASS has undergone reorganization and new leadership has been recruited to guide SASS and END of TRAIL into the future. Misty Moonshine and her new Board are all experienced, knowledgeable, and committed to satisfying the desires of our competitors.





EDITORIALS

SKINNY'S SOAPBOX END OF TRAIL

y now, it's common knowledge EOT has seen its last match at Founders Ranch in New Mexico. Severe regulatory restrictions brought on by COVID-19 sounded the death knell for SASS's World Championship event in the Land of Enchantment — as they did for many other businesses.

Next year, EOT will make its permanent home at the Ben Avery Shooting Range outside of Phoenix, Arizona, but this year various conditions necessitated it being held at Paradise Pass range in Etna Green, Indiana. That event will have taken place by the time you read this. For those of you who have never visited Paradise Pass, it is an excellent facility and I know it will host a superior World Championship.

To honor this year's 40th END of TRAIL, we've made this a special commemorative issue of *The Cowboy Chronicle*. Inside you will find Tex's retrospective of the match over the last four decades, as well as an overview of the evolution of costuming at the event from Texas Flower and Cat Ballou.

AMMUNITION WOES

It's also common knowledge we're in the midst of a severe shortage of ammunition and reloading components and prices are soaring. We've seen shortages before, but this one seems particularly onerous and long-lived.

As a way of helping deal with the situation, many clubs throughout the

country are offering — for the duration of the shortage — a special "Adult Buckaroo" category in which participants are allowed to compete using .22 caliber firearms. Even a few Wild Bunch matches have started allowing the use of .22s and other sub-.45 caliber firearms for the time being, as reported by Dusty Boddams elsewhere in this edition.

All this is admirable in that it keeps SASS members shooting, but what about practice time? Even .22 ammo is pretty expensive nowadays and that can translate into reduced or eliminated practice sessions and competitors with rusty skill sets.

I've commented in the past about the benefits of using BB-gun replicas for practice and I think the idea has more merit now than ever. BBs and CO2 cartridges are still readily available and cost far less per round than the least expensive rimfire ammo. Moreover, BB-guns open up the possibility of practicing in a backyard, or even inside.

My favorite single action BB-gun for practice is the Colt-licensed John Wayne Commemorative. It loads with *faux* "cartridges" just like an original — the action operates the same and is as smooth as a nicely tuned revolver. For those who like something a little more exotic, you can get a replica of a Remington 1875.

If you want to get in some rifle practice, Walther has a Winchester 1894 replica available that operates like a real one and is smooth as glass. Even the bolt moves back and forth.

For you Wild Bunch enthusiasts, there are numerous 1911 look-alikes available, but my favorite is the John Wayne Commemorative from Air Venturi. It has the same weight and feel as the real thing, the slide moves back and forth and will even lock back after the last round. The "magazine" is the same size as a genuine 1911 magazine and drops free. It houses the CO2 cartridge

and the BBs.

All the mentioned airguns can be purchased for around \$150 or less, except the rifle, which will set you back around \$500. They can be found at various sources online, but I recommend www.pyramydair.com (Pyramyd Air Gun Mall) or www.midwayusa.com (Midway Reloading Supply).



to confirm dates, sign contracts for bigtent rentals, order awards and buckles, purchase shooter name badges and gifts, etc., we have to begin our planning early," he added.

The Chorro Valley Regulators

"As we moved into Spring, we spoke with fellow match directors and the topic of rescheduling/canceling matches was very frontal in everyone's mind," commented El Lazo (SASS #13116), the other half of the Match Co-Director

team. "We were about five months out from hosting the Western Regional at our range and all of a sudden we had to deal with the arduous task of figuring out what to do. As we moved into May and June and realized the State and County health mandates wouldn't allow us to deliver the kind of experience our shooters have come to expect from us, we planned to move the match to Novem-

Western Regional at our range this coming August 4 through 8, 2021. Our plan is to deliver the same high-caliber match our attendees have come to expect from us. We'll have 12 stages, three warm-up matches, along with our regular speed events for revolver, shotgun, and rifle, and we'll have Cowboy trap and long range side matches." "And we'll have our traditional No. 10 Saloon, poker tournament, and RO1 and RO2 classes," added El Lazo.

"Our attendees always rave about our Five-Star Dinner, which is run by CVR member Jacq Neat (SASS #93557). Every year, she puts together an incredible meal in our big tent, served on real plates with real silverware that features shrimp scampi, salad, chicken, custom-cut prime ribs, garlic mashed potatoes, roasted vegetables, dessert, and more. I often think some folks come just for the dinner," El Lazo chuckled. "And, of course, Monte Mills and his Lucky Horseshoe Band will be there to entertain all night."

"Our range features a huge camping area with room for up to 170 trailers. And there's a tent camping area, too," said Trapper McDaniels (SASS #79238), CVR member in charge of facilities. "The campground is next to the big tent, which is right next to the range, so getting back and forth is easy. We also have a hay wagon for those folks who want to be shuttled from the range to their trailer."







LEGENDS SASS FOUR CORNERS REGIONAL 2021 WILD BUNCH TERRITORIAL CHAMPIONSHIP 2021

I see dark clouds and light rain falling outside my living room window. Quite a change from the blue skies and marshmallow clouds that framed Red Rock Country April 19-24, 2021 during this annual event.

DISPATCHES FROM CAMP BAYLOR EVERYTHING YOU ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT BLACK POWDER BUT WERE AFRAID TO ASK

Black Powder is an explosive. Smokeless powder is a propellant. What's the difference? Black Powder will explode under circumstances that smokeless powder will simply burn. It makes a difference in loading and storage. Check local ordinances. To the best of my knowledge, all makers of progressive loading presses prohibit the use of black powder in their machines. A lot of people scoff at this. I don't.

Black powder comes in different grades. The bigger the number the smaller of the grains are of black powder. Generally, 3F or FFF is used for .38 and below. 2F is used for .45 and larger. But there is a lot of overlap. 1F is for Cannon, 1-½ F is for rifles such as .45-70 and above. 4F is used for priming in flintlock firearms. Reenac-

tor is for reenactors.

SUBSTITUTES

The difficulty of using black powder along with the extra regulations concerning it have led to the production of black powder substitutes. These are "smokeless" powders that behave like black powder. They are not explosives and can be sold at most gun stores and big box stores such as Walmart. They can be used to replace black powder on a volume per volume basis. Do not try to substitute weight for weight. Substitutes weigh less in equal volumes — 100 grains of Goex 3F weighed 101.1 grains in my tests. American Pioneer Powder weighed 78.4 grains; Triple Seven weighed 77.2 grains. So if you use 30 grains in your .45 Colt cartridges, you will get 231 rounds per pound of Goex, 297 from APP 3F, and 302 from Triple Seven 2F.

THE CHART

Black powder is loaded by volume. Powder is sold by weight. Weight and volume are basically interchangeable in Black powder — 30 grains by volume of 3f black powder should weigh about 30 grains. But there are many variables, such as granular size. Generally,

a 30-grain powder spout will dispense a sample of 3f that is heavier than 2f from the same spout. Confused? No? But wait, there's more. That 30-grain spout would dispense 23.5 grains of American Pioneer Powder 3F, 23.2 grains of Hodgdon Triple Seven 2F. The densities are different. We need to know this conversion factor in order to load one of the substitutes in our progressive reloading machines because we're going to weigh the charges.

I worked up the accompanying chart over several years, trying to make it more accurate each time. I will warn you, you may not ever get the same weight out of two samples of black powder out of the same measuring device if you aren't obsessively consistent. What I did was use a Lee dipper of 4.0 cubic centimeters and weigh several samples of each powder to get a repeatable weight for each one. 4.0 CCs should be 60 grains. The SASS smoke standard is based, among other factors, on 1.0 CC of Goex 2F black powder. For my percussion pistols I can use a measuring powder spout and never have to weigh the powder once the spout is calibrated (by weighing the charge several times and adjusting the length of the spout to throw the exact charge you want). But if I'm loading shotguns or cartridges on a reloading machine, I want to use the

loading machine's powder measure.

So if I want to make a 20-grain load for a .38 special using Triple Seven, I would adjust the powder measure of the loading machine to dispense 16.4 grains of 2F.

PYRODEX

The original substitute is Pyrodex. It shares most of the characteristics of black powder. It requires soft lead bullets with black powder lubricant. It will foul the bore if you use smokeless bullets with hard lube. It requires almost immediate cleaning, especially in humid climates. It does not produce flame like black powder does, but it gives off healthy amounts of smoke. Pyrodex P is for pistol, RS for rifle and shotgun, and Select for cartridges. It also comes in pellets.

HODGDON

Triple Seven is designed for hunters. That is its largest market. It is about 15 percent more powerful than black powder. It has several restrictions, which should be read before use. Triple Seven will work best with hard lead smokeless bullets with smokeless lubes or no lube at all (but no black powder lubes, such as lubed Wonder Wads). A full charge in a .45 Colt cartridge can exceed the SASS velocity limit of 1000 feet per second.

OTHER SUBSTITUTES

American Pioneer Powder is another substitute. It produces a lower velocity than Triple Seven. It has fewer restrictions. It works well with Hi-Tek polymer coated bullets. It comes in 2F and 3F. It produces more smoke than most black powders volume for volume. It is easier to clean up than real black and Pyrodex. It can be cleaned with just water. I will note that in the Old West contrary, to popular Internet belief, they did not use much Teflon coated hightech synthetic oils on their guns. Their guns were generally cleaned with soap and water and then dried and oiled. Since "Pure Sperm Gun and Machine Oil" (whale oil) came in sub-one-ounce bottles, I can only assume that oil was reserved for bearing surfaces. Ballistol serves as an excellent replacement for

sperm whale oil.

Jim Shockey's Gold is a version of APP. Use APP loading instructions.

Shooters World Multi-Purpose FFF Black Black Powder Substitute is made by American Pioneer Powder. It is based on APP Superpowder, hotter than APP. Use Black MZ (out of production) on the chart for weights.

CLEANING

Cleaning doesn't differ too much among them. If you ask the question on the SASS Wire or on Facebook, "how do you clean black powder?" you will get 40 or 50 different answers. I am lazy and try to use the easiest method that works. Clean the gun with Windex With Vinegar or equivalent such as Windex Multi

Surface. Black powder and all of the subs leave an alkaline residue, and mildly acidic cleaners will neutralize this. Scrub as needed with wire or nylon brush. Get in crevices with a Q-tip, etc. Clean the bore with a Bore Snake with Windex in the front section and Ballistol sprayed on the back part or use patches. Oil every part of the gun with Ballistol and wipe off the excess. Then you can store it. When you finish shooting at the range and don't have time to clean it before you go home, spray with Ballistol. Gunk covered by oil won't rust. Detail stripping will be required occasionally depending on what you're shooting. Rifles shooting bottleneck cartridges like .44-40 and .38-40 do not need as much cleaning because the chamber does not get as dirty. But failure to clean under the extractor of a '66 or '73 or a Marlin can be catastrophic for your chances of winning your category.

Real black and Pyrodex work best with Ballistol, a non-petroleum oil. Other substitutes work fine with most gun oils, but I settled on Ballistol for everything.

LIGHT LOADS

Black powder cartridges were designed to be filled with black powder to the level of the bullet and a little bit more so the bullet will compress it slightly. Most SASS shooters do not want the recoil and excess smoke of a .45 Colt (exceptions noted). Neither did the US Army. The original .45 Colt cartridge held 40 grains and used a 250grain bullet. This was hard on the guns, metallurgy being what it was at the time, and hard on cavalrymen, who by regulation weighed no more than 140 pounds in order to be accepted. So, the Army went to 30 grains of powder and 230-grain bullets, with some filler wads to use the empty space.

THE SASS SMOKE STANDARD

"How do I make sure that I make enough smoke to pass the SASS smoke standard?" The short answer is, if you use 1.0 CC (15 grains volume) or more of black or any of the substitutes, you will meet or exceed the smoke standard. The standard is subjective, based on unbiased witnesses observing the shooting of the test ammunition versus the smoke standard ammunition. This means with

the bigger cartridges you need to add a filler or wads to take up empty space in the cartridge if you want low recoil. Unlike smokeless powder, air gaps can be dangerous, and at best make the charge erratic. Several things are used to fill the space — grits, corn meal, ground walnut hulls, and ground corn cobs. Wads can be used, and caulk backer rod can be an excellent filler — 3/8-inch diameter for .38s, and 1/2-inch for .44s and .45s. When using filler, use enough to fill the cartridge and then insert the bullet, thus compressing the filler. Leaving loose filler is very dangerous as it can "migrate" and get between the powder and the primer and cause squibs, blocking the barrel. A second fired round can then destroy the barrel and even produce dangerous fragments. If you use lubed wads such as Wonder Wads with BP, put a card wad (milk carton for example) under them to keep the lube from contaminating the powder during storage.

12 GAUGE SHOTSHELLS

Hunters using black powder are known to put in 60 or 70 grains of black powder. Years of SASS competition by thousands of shooters have demonstrated this is not necessary nor desirable for SASS. That much black powder opens up the charge, sometimes leaving a hole where the knockdown target is. Fiber wads work better with antique shotguns with full-length chokes. Modern plastic wads work better with modern guns, and of course work with progressive loaders. The following recipe works. I got it from a World Champion about 15 years ago — • 35-40 grrains (volume) of powder • 1-1/8 ounces of shot • Winchester Orange or White 1-1/8-ounce wad or Clayhuster equivalent. The only exception is if you are using a stock SKB. You will need 50 grains or more (or more shot) to reliably switch barrels with the inertia mechanism. The chambers of the shotgun should be scrubbed with a brush wet with Ballistol after each stage.

To clean the shotgun, spray the barrels with Windex/Vinegar and let them soak while cleaning your other main match guns. Then run a Bore Snake with more Windex/Vinegar on the front and Ballistol on the back. Repeat, if necessary.

BRASS CLEANING


Many BP shooters put their fired brass into some sort of liquid and soak it until they can tumble it. Water with a little vinegar works. It prevents it from getting really ugly and scary looking. But if you use a wet tumbler with steel pins, you can just tumble it for twice as long as you tumble smokeless brass, maybe longer. If you let the brass age and develop a lovely black patina, you will need to tumble longer.

MATCHES

Frequent cleanings between stages hide a multitude of sins. Some shooters run a wet patch down the barrel of their rifle and revolvers after every stage. If you use a load that fouls easily, this is a good idea. Using APP, I don't have to touch revolver barrels during a six-stage match day. For the rifle, I spritz the chamber with Windex/Vinegar or Ballistol after every stage and use a chamber brush with Ballistol on the shotgun every stage.





DILLON 650 PRIMER PUNCH TOOL

machine but has a quirk that has he Dillon 650 is a marvelous bothered me for years — changing the primer punch. The 650 can be changed between large and small primers. Most of the things necessary to make the conversion are easy to access and easy to change. Changing the actual primer punch, however, can be a real challenge. Dillon is not too far from my house and one day when I was at Dillon back in the machine assembly area I asked "how do you change the primer punch?" The tech replied they do not have a good way of doing it and the first part they put in a machine when building one is the punch because it is so hard to get to. I know some people who have two 650s. One set up for large primers and one set up for small primers. I change back and forth quite a bit and was getting so frustrated I even considered upgrading to the new 750. The major difference between the two is the priming system. However, I have a bullet feeder and frequently run two powder measures when loading black powder and the 750 has some issues on how to deal with those items. So after years of being frustrated I finally worked out a solution by cobbling together a tool to change the primer punch.

The primer punch is under the shell plate platform (Red Arrow, Photo 1). The punch has a spring that is retained by a steel ring (Blue Arrow, Photo 2). The body of the punch with wrench flats is above the spring. I bought a thin jaw wrench that is supposed to work on the 650 (Photo 3). The problem is, any fixed jaw wrench will not fit depending on how the flats on the punch are oriented when the punch is seated. Something that rotates is needed to do the job properly. A deep-well socket cannot be used because the ring is larger than the wrench flats so a socket will not fit. I measured and sketched out a drawing for a deep-well socket with a section removed to go around the ring. This






















did not work. Next I tried modifying a flair nut wrench so the wrench could be inserted around the spring and then raised around the flats. This also did not work.

Finally, I thought about a crow's foot wrench. I located one with thin jaws on eBay. It was a used 9/16-inch Snap-On and was about ten bucks (Photo 4). Do **not** get a crow's foot with standard size wrench jaws (Photo 5). These are both 9/16-inch, but the wrench on the right is much wider. After I got the crow's foot wrench I put it up onto the primer punch and found there was enough room to use it with a couple of additional parts. The crow's foot was a 3/8-inch drive but smaller parts are needed to fit up into the 650. So, a 3/8-inch to 1/4-inch adapter was purchased (Photo 6, top). After some measuring and checking angles a 1/4-inch one-and-one-half-inch long extension was also purchased (Photo 6, bottom and Photo 7). A 1.50-inch long extension can be fairly hard to find. I wound up getting this one on Amazon. Next I dug around in my tool chest until I found a 1/4-inch ratchet with very fine teeth. The more teeth a ratchet has the less angle you have to move the handle to get it to engage. The ratchet in (Photo 8) has 72 teeth, so it only has to move five degrees to engage the next tooth when ratcheting.

The tool is inserted into the 650 and the primer punch flats engaged by the crow's foot jaws (Photo 9). When in the machine the "tool" sits at a slight angle (Photo 10). This is why an extension longer than 1.50-inch will not work properly. A slight tug and the punch is free and you can spin it out with your fingers. Remember, righty tighty, lefty loosey. Also remember, when using the tool you will most likely be looking at it upside down. Make sure you are loosening and not tightening. You can put a lot of torque on the punch with the ratchet, so when reinstalling make sure to just snug the punch. The punch is not a head bolt on a diesel truck.









DIRTY DEALS THE COMPROMISE OF 1877



he Compromise of 1877 was the outcome of a disputed Presidential election, which occurred the previous year. By midnight on November 7, 1876, it appeared that Democrat Samuel Tilden, former governor of New York, would defeat the Republican candidate Rutherford B. Hayes. Tilden had 184 out of the 185 electoral votes needed to win the election. He also had greater than 250,000 more popular votes than his rival. However, the next day the election results were called into question by the Republicans. There had been voting irregularities in three southern states — Florida, Louisiana, and South Carolina. Oregon's results had also been controversial. The dispute became instantly acrimonious and by January 1877 Congress set up a bipartisan electoral commission to solve the conundrum.

Political affiliations in the northern and southern states were the inverse of what they are today. The southern states were largely the stronghold of the Democratic Party, while the northern states tended to vote Republican. But it was a bit more complicated than that because in the southern states, former slaves would have overwhelmingly voted Republican because that party was the party of Lincoln and the Thirteenth

Amendment. For the very reason that the Republican party was supported by southern Blacks, it was detested by most southern Whites. Shortly after the Civil War ended, it seemed the newly enfranchised Blacks might turn the South into a Republican-dominated region. Indeed, during the first years after the war, several Blacks were elected to Congress. This, according to southern Whites, could not be allowed to continue. The South had to be "redeemed" for the White race and the Democratic Party.

The solution involved intimidation on an individual basis or through groups like the Ku Klux Klan. It had gotten so bad during the Grant administration, federal troops had been sent to restore order in some southern states. By 1876, federal troops had mostly been removed, but they remained in the states

of Florida, Louisiana, and South Carolina. These were the same states whose election returns had been contested. All three states had Republican governments, but the White population regarded those governments as the corrupt tools of an occupying force.

Three months had gone by before the electoral commission was established. By that time, talk of renewed hostilities between the North and South was making the rounds. Tilden got letters (which he ignored) that thousands of "well-armed men" were awaiting orders to march on Washington. South Carolina became the scene of armed conflict between Whites and Black militia. The situation was rapidly deteriorating.


Meanwhile, discussions between moderate southern Democrats and Hayes' Republican allies were held in secret. Eventually they reached a deal whereby Hayes would get all the disputed electoral votes if Republicans would agree to remove the remaining federal troops from the southern states. Additionally, the Republicans were to place a southerner in Hayes' cabinet and to provide funds for a transcontinental railroad with a southern terminus. Southerners in turn agreed to respect the voting rights of Blacks in the region. This became known as the Compromise of 1877. On March 2, 1877, the congressional commission gave all the disputed electoral votes to Hayes. Two days later, Rutherford B. Hayes was sworn in as President. (Back in those days a President was inaugurated on March 4 instead of January 20.)

The Compromise of 1877 was a sweet deal for everyone except Samuel Tilden and the Blacks who lived in the South. White southerners were overjoyed to see the last remaining federal troops removed from their soil. That part of the deal was accomplished within a month of Hayes' inauguration. David Key, a Democrat from Tennessee was appointed Postmaster General. Rutherford B. Hayes got to be President and proved to be a mediocre, boring Chief Executive. The nation got a good deal because it did not have to endure Civil War, Round Two. The troops in Florida, Louisiana, and South Carolina got to be stationed in places where the local population did not despise them. Most were sent out west to subdue the Indians. (Well, maybe the troops didn't get such a good deal — par for the course in the military.) Hayes dragged his feet about the funds for a southern transcontinental railroad, but eventually it was built.


To his credit, Samuel Tilden declined to make a huge fuss. Some of his supporters urged him to take the oath of office anyway, but he wisely refused. In 1878 a congressional committee was formed to investigate charges of corruption during the Election of 1876. Democrat Clarkson Potter headed the committee. He hoped to embarrass the Republicans so the Democrats would have a better shot at the next Presidential election. The plan backfired because the only concrete evidence of fraud turned out to be several telegrams sent by Democrats during the dispute urging the bribery of election officials. Nevertheless, Tilden hoped to be the Democratic nominee for the 1880 Presidential election, but that eventually went to former Union general Winfield Scott Hancock, who then lost to James Garfield, who was later assassinated.

The folks who got a really bad deal from the Compromise of 1877 were the millions of Black people living in the South. There was no effort at all made to respect their right to vote in the states that made up the old Confederacy. In fact, rather strenuous efforts were made to do just the opposite. Despite the Foutteenth and Fifteenth Amendments, over the next decades Black suffrage was systematically reduced, if not altogether curtailed.


The most ingenious devices to deny Black suffrage in the South became known as the grandfather clauses. Most of these laws were passed in the late 19th century. Before registering to vote, you had to prove you had either voted prior to January 1, 1867 or were a direct linear descendant of a person who had voted then. Since most southern Blacks had been either slaves or descendants of slaves, they were excluded from voting. If you were the descendant of a free Black in the South, your ancestor could not have voted anyway.

Other states passed laws that required literacy tests before voter registration was completed. These could be tricky because they could disenfranchise poor Whites as well. Public education was not, and sadly is still not a premium concern in some parts of the South. One way to get around the literacy test was to attach it to a grandfather clause. If your direct ancestor had voted before 1867, you were exempt. But what about someone whose father and grandfather had not voted before 1867? The easy fix for that was, if you were White, you got to read "See Jane Run" (with coaching if necessary) and if you were Black, "Well, here's a copy of *The Odyssey* in its original ancient Greek. Come on, it's a piece of cake. Get cracking!"

Another way to disenfranchise Blacks was to require a poll tax to be paid before registering to vote. This worked out well because most Blacks in the South were sharecroppers and the system made cash scarce and debt abundant. This could disenfranchise the poor Whites, who were also sharecroppers, but as time went on that didn't seem to be such

a bad idea. The Democratic Party was well entrenched by the 1890s and poor whites could fall prey to populist ideas. Southern elites were as unenthusiastic about populism as they were about racial equality.

If all else failed, the tried-and-true methods of violence and intimidation could be dusted off and reapplied. After all, who was going to prevent it? Certainly not the High Sheriff of Hookworm, Mississippi. (Okay, there is no Hookworm, Mississippi; I made it up for instructional purposes.) The only way to put an end to that practice was to keep federal troops in the area. However, the last federal troops had been removed as a result of the Compromise of 1877. Terrorizing Blacks was considered a good outlet for poor Whites and made them feel better about their wretched lots in life.

The history books decry the Compromise of 1877 because it ended Reconstruction, but the truth is, Reconstruction was well on its way out by the time the compromise was achieved. It had gone on for twelve years and the energy for it had faded. Most of the former Confederate states had previously been "redeemed" to white supremacy and the

Democratic Party by the time of Hayes' election. It wasn't like the North was a bastion of civil rights and racial harmony anyway. Segregation was as much a part of Northern life as it was in the South. A fair number of leading Republicans had cynically advocated civil rights for Blacks in the South because it strengthened the Republican Party at the expense of the Democrats.

The major advocates of Reconstruction had either lost interest or died by the time of Rutherford B. Hayes' inauguration. The only enthusiastic Reconstructionist alive at the time was Senator Charles Sumner of Massachusetts, but he had one foot in the grave and the other on a banana peel. Sumner died nine days after Hayes became President. Many people in America felt it was time to move past the Civil War. There was money to be made, railroads and cities to build, immigrants to exploit, and savages to subdue.

When I think of the Compromise of 1877, a photograph of Samuel Tilden enters my mind. He looks as though someone had put a dirty athletic sock under his nose. It's a fitting metaphor not only for the compromise, but for

the politics of the entire period. The Gilded Age, as the era was known, was not a shining example of this country's moral integrity. It overlapped the Reconstruction era. The only good thing about the Compromise of 1877 was it averted widespread violence. Other than that, it smelled pretty bad.





CIMARRON FIREARMS UBERTI 1866 .44-40 CARBINE

It is easy to think of 1873 Winchesters (or the later 1892 Winchester so popular in Hollywood Westerns) as being the rifles that tamed the West. However, that eponym actually belongs to the 1866 Winchester (and its older brother, the 1860 Henry repeater).

The critical period of expansion in the West was from the end of the Civil War in 1865 until about 1885. The Winchester .44 Rifle was introduced in 1866. It is noteworthy that the 1873 Winchester was not readily available until 1875. By the end of 1874, only 126 rifles had shipped, and even by 1878, only about 22,000 had been manufactured. As late as 1883, just over 80,000 of the 1873 models had been produced and distributed. That was less than half the number of the approximately 185,000 total of 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchesters already in circulation by 1883. Those numbers tell us the .44 Rimfire 1866 Winchester the Henry were the most popular and plentiful rifles during the time period of 1865 until at least 1885. Homesteaders, travelers, cowboys, lawman, bandits, and the Indians hunted, protected their homes and businesses, and fought with the 1866 Winchesters until the turn of the Century... and beyond.

With original 1866s being very scarce today, and .44 rimfire ammunition being out of production for decades (original ammo is now worth as much as \$50-\$70 a single round), we can't really shoot originals. Happily for us lovers of Old West firearms, Cimarron Firearms is offering a complete line of fine Uberti-made reproductions of the 1866 Winchester. Uberti makes them available in modern center fire calibers like the .38 Special, .44-40, and .45 Colt.

1866 WINCHESTER HISTORY

In 1860, Oliver Winchester coupled the .44 rim-fire cartridge designed by B. Tyler Henry with a modification of the old Volcanic rifle and marketed the first successful repeating rifle to use self contained, metallic cartridges. The Henry Repeating Rifle was born. This 1860 Henry was a heavy weapon, tipping the scales at almost 9.5 pounds. The majority of this weight was in the barrel and magazine, which was machined out of a single solid forged bar of steel more than two feet long. The Henry rifle had the revolutionary toggle link action with an exposed hammer and finger lever action pioneered by the earlier Volcanic Firearms. Operating the lever ejected the empty round, loaded a live one in the chamber, and cocked the hammer so it could fire immediately. Rather than

a cartridge loading gate on the side of the receiver like later designs, the Henry loaded from the muzzle end of the magazine tube. Another distinctive feature of the Henry is the absence of a wood forearm.

Though incredibly successful for a revolutionary new design, there were two major complaints about the 1860 Henry. First was the lack of a wooden forearm. As I can testify, after cranking a lot of rounds through the Henry (especially black powder loads), the barrel gets quite hot! I wear a glove on my off-hand when shooting the 1860, to prevent getting the "Henry Finger Sizzle." The second complaint was the magazine. The open slot in the bottom allowed dirt, grit, dust, and leaves into the magazine tube, and loading from the muzzle end was quite cumbersome. Loading just a couple rounds to replace rounds that were fired was not simple.

The one-piece forged barrel/magazine tube was also excessively expensive to manufacture.

In 1866, Oliver Winchester reorganized his New Haven Arms Company into the Winchester Repeating Arms Company. Thanks to patents acquired in 1866 by Nelson King (who was Winchester's factory superintendent and engineer at that time) for a loading gate system in the Henry Rifle's receiver, Oliver Winchester ceased production of the Henry rifle in favor of his new "Winchester Repeating Rifle." It was not until later, after Winchester introduced the "Winchester Model 1873," that the improved Henry was referred to as the "Winchester Model 1866" to avoid confusion.

The new Winchester Repeating Rifle was essentially an 1860 Henry with the barrel and the magazine tube manufactured as separate pieces and a loading gate on the side of the familiar brass receiver to make loading easier. It had the improvement of an enclosed magazine tube, rather than the slotted bottom of the Henry magazine. This was much cheaper to fabricate than the Henry one-piece barrel/magazine. This





tubular magazine also allowed the use of a wooden forearm, preventing burns on the hand from grasping the Henry's bare, hot barrel. This new rifle used the same .44 caliber rimfire ammunition as the very popular Henry rifle.

In order to capitalize on the Henry's reputation, Winchester used "brand recognition" and marketed and advertised the first Winchester as the "King's patent improved Henry Rifle." This "Winchester Repeating Rifle" proved to be even more popular than the Henry. It was such a phenomenal success, it literally saved Winchester financially. The "1866" was produced in carbine, rifle, and military musket versions.

The carbine version represented more than two-thirds of the total 1866 production. This handy carbine was a favorite of those working on horseback. It had a 19-inch barrel and the magazine held 12 rounds of .44 rimfire. It was equipped with a "saddle ring" attached to the left side of the receiver by a "U" shaped staple. If you didn't have a saddle scabbard, this could be used with a standard over the shoulder Cavalry carbine sling and snap ring that was used by the military to make the carbine hang down at your side, or a leather thong that was looped through the ring, then over the saddle horn, placing the carbine across the saddle in front of the rider, or down along your leg.

The rifle version came with a 24-inch barrel in both round and octagonal configurations. The rifle

held 16 rounds, and was referred to as "sixteen shooters" by the frontiersmen. The full stock 1866 Military Musket came with a sword bayonet, much like the one on the Spencer Navy models and Remington 1863 two band contract rifle. Even though the US Army never adopted the 1866, the military musket version actually saw front line military service with the Turkish forces in the Russo-Turkish War of 1877-1878.

Instances of the 1866's prowess on the American Frontier are too numerous to count. Cowboys, outlaws, lawmen, teamsters, settlers, scouts, trappers, and Indian braves all prized it for its reliability and firepower. They often called it "Yellow Boy." You only have to look at the tintypes of that period. If there is a rifle or two shown, chances are at least one is an 1866 Winchester.

Part of this success was due to its ergonomics. The handy little carbine weighed a mere 7.5 pounds, and was only 38 inches long, compared to the venerable 1860 Henry which weighs in at quite a bit more and was significantly longer at 44 inches. Anther part of its success was the price, which was significantly less due to ease of manufacturing compared to the Henry. The mechanical improvements of the 1866 also contributed to its extreme popularity. The final factor was demand. With the rapid expansion westward of a virtual wave of humanity, demand for repeating firepower dramatically

increased.

In about 1866/1867, the Henry's .44 rimfire ammunition was also improved from the original 216-grain round nose bullet with 24-26 grains of black powder of Civil War days, to a 200-grain flat nosed, healed bullet over 28-29 grains of black powder. While the overall length of the new cartridge was the same, the slightly lighter, blunt, flat nosed bullet allowed the case to be longer and increased the powder capacity. This cartridge was simply called .44 Flat Rimfire. With its 15 percent increase in powder capacity, it performed better than the Civil War era loading. At 100 yards, the .44 rimfire still has the same muzzle energy of a standard 1911 .45 ACP pistol at the muzzle, and no one would dispute the effectiveness of the .45 ACP!

While still not a powerhouse by today's standards, many a man and animal met its demise from the .44 Flat Rimfire cartridge. In fact, archaeological excavations of the Little Big Horn Battlefields show that the 1866 Winchester and 1860 Henry were the most common rifles carried by the Native American warriors who defeated Custer's various commands. They called the 1866 Yellow Boy, "heap rifle," spirit rifle," or "rifle of many shots." Sitting Bull himself carried an 1866 Winchester.

Despite the tremendous popularity of the newer 1873 Model Winchester and its more powerful 200-grain bullet

powered by 40 grains of black powder, the 1866 Yellow Boy continued to be popular in the West until the turn of the century and beyond. Winchester made its last run of 1866s in 1898. A total of more than 170,000 1866 rifles, carbines, and full stock muskets were manufactured over that period of thirty-two years. Of these, about 95 percent were produced in the first fifteen years.

They were so wildly popular, Winchester continued production of the Model 1866 for twenty-five years after the introduction of the Model of 1873, and four full years after Winchester introduced the much stronger Model 1892. Late in production, Winchester even produced a center fire version of the .44 rimfire. The only difference was the use of a center fire primer instead of rimfire. It was not a commercial success and production was limited mostly to export markets.

Ammunition for the .44 rimfire 1866 Winchester and 1860 Henry continued to be manufactured until the beginning of WWII in 1942, when it was discontinued for the war effort. Its production never resumed post-war.

AUTHOR'S NOTE

My wife's uncle Stanley was a true working cowboy all his life. He worked cattle ranches in the foothills east of the Central Valley of California and all along the western slopes of the Sierra

Nevada from the 1920s into the 1970s. He once related to me that his favorite saddle gun when riding herd and working in the mountains at the line shacks was actually an old 1866 carbine. He used it to kill deer and black bear for camp meat and to kill mountain lions and wolves that threatened the heard. He really liked the little rifle, and did not see any need to replace it until .44 rimfire ammunition ceased to be available.

CIMARRON'S 1866 Winchester .44-40 Carbine

Mike Harvey and his Daughter Jamie Wayt at Cimarron have been a major supplier of Old West firearms as long as I have been a Cowboy Action Shooter[™] (I joined SASS in 1994). One of their more popular rifles is the 1866 Winchester. The 1866 is offered in both 20-inch and 24-inch rifle versions with octagonal barrels and rifle stocks, and a 19-inch round barreled, saddle ring carbine version. They also offer a Military Musket version by special order. There are a wide variety of standard calibers available — .22 LR, .32 WCF (.32-40), .38 Special, .38 WCF (.38-40), .44 Special, .44 WCF (.44-40), and .45 Colt/Schofield. You do have to check for availability, though, as the majority of the production, to my understanding, is in .38

Special, .44-40, and .45 Colt.

The sample I obtained from Cimarron for this article is a saddle ring carbine chambered in .44-40 Winchester. The Cimarron/Uberti 1866 has an eye-catching brass frame and butt plate, with lustrous blue/black barrel finish. The right side of the frame has a blued loading gate, while the left side has a blued saddle ring attached to the frame by a "U" shaped staple. The bright brass nicely accents the blue-black steel of the barrel, saddle ring, screw heads, and loading gate. The lever and hammer of my sample are nicely color case hardened. It has a the correct carbine-style two position flip rear sight. The Uberti 1866 has a barrel band mounted front sight instead of a barrel mounted one. It has a carbine-style butt stock and hand guard that are made of close grained European red walnut.

The fit and finish of the carbine is perfect. The action of the 1866 is smooth, which is typical of 1866s and 1860 Henrys with their brass followers moving within their brass frames. My .44-40 sample holds ten rounds in the full-length magazine tube under the barrel, as does the .45 Colt version. I believe the .38 Special 1866 also holds 10 cartridges.

My only complaint about the Cimarron/Uberti 1866 carbine was the trigger pull — more than seven pounds. Through the years, I have found this is not uncommon with Italian-made toggle link rifles. While this trigger pull is not a problem shooting a 24- by 24-inch steel plate at 10-15 yards in a traditional SASS match, it does not lend itself to accurate shooting at smaller targets and at longer ranges. I lightened the pull on mine to about five pounds by judiciously stoning the trigger and hammer sear notch.

The .44-40, or .44 WCF (Winchester Central Fire) as it was originally called, is one of my favorite cartridges. Historically it was the most popular cartridge in both the original 1873 and 1892 Winchesters, original 1888, 1889, and 1894 Marlins, and the second most popular cartridge in the Colt 1873 Single Action Army. For many years, it was the third most popular caliber with Cowboy Action Shooters™, behind the .45 Colt and .38 Special.

With this in mind, I selected an 1866 in .44-40 for this article. As .44 rimfire ammunition is no longer made, I thought it more appropriate to at least use a contemporary Old West rifle cartridge like the .44-40. To me, it seems like blasphemy to me to shoot a .38 Special or .45 Colt (which were historically pistol only cartridges) from a 1866 Winchester! But that is just me.

The second reason I chose .44-40 is, in current factory loadings it closely duplicates the original .44 Henry rimfire in performance. The .44 rimfire round shot a 200-grain .442-inch diameter bullet at a listed velocity of 1250 fps. This is nearly identical to the current factory loadings of the .44-40 by Black Hills, Winchester, and others, that also use a 200-grain .427-inch bullet traveling at about 1250 fps. (Original .44-40 loads with a charge of 40 grains of black powder actually clocked at 1350-plus fps).

The present day manufactures load their modern smokeless .44-40 loads to this lower velocity/pressure in case they are used in an original iron-framed 1873 Winchester. If they loaded smokeless rounds to the original black powder velocities, it could be hazardous due to the different pressure curve of smokeless propellants compared to that of black powder. These downloaded .44-40 factory loads coincidentally approximate the .44 Henry rimfire, making them a good choice for 1860 Henry and 1866 Winchester replicas.

AT THE RANGE

Both Black Hills and HSM offer great Cowboy Action Shooting™ ammunition in .44-40. Both brands of ammunition were used for my shooting sessions. Black Hills lists the velocity at around 1150 fps from a rifle, but HSM only gives what is listed as a pistol velocity of about 850 fps for their .44-40 loading.

As for handholds, I used my pet load using a Starline .44-40 case with a moly-coated, .428-inch diameter, 200-grain RNFP from Bear Creek Bullets of Waterford, CA, over a load of either 7.0 grains of Trail Boss or the same 7.0 grains of Unique. Velocity should be close to the Black Hills factory loads,

around 1150 fps.

The Cimarron 1866 performed flawlessly! The bullseye shooting for group size was done at an outdoor range, from a rest at 25 yards.

Out of the box, the carbine was printing a little to the right, though after drifting the rear sight to the left about 1/32-inch, I had no problem I centering it on the target. With the carbine flip sight on its lowest setting, however, the groups were about six inches below point of aim at that 25 yard mark. A little work with a flat file, taking about 1/10-inch off the front sight, brought it up to POI, being about 1.5 inches above POA at 25 yards. This is perfect for SASS shooting.

The 25-yard groups from the

bench for Black Hills factory .44-40 were about 1.5 inch, and the HSM factory ammunition averaged about 1.25 inch at 25 yards. The handholds with 7.0 grains of Unique grouped the tightest at one inch. My Trail Boss handholds gave me about 1.75-inch groups at 25 yards. This is not at all surprising, though, as maximum loads for Trail Boss tend to be less accurate.

I then switched from paper to clay pigeons. At 25 yards, I nailed every clay pigeon laying on the berm with a 6:00 o'clock hold. Then, from a rifle rest, I even whacked a clay pigeon I had laying on the 100-yard berm.

The true test of a CAS rifle is how it does at a CAS match. With that in mind, I took it to our local match to use, instead of the trusty HRA 1860

Henry I usually use. Because of the "Friends of the Chipmunks" (our local rabid environmentalists), there is a court injunction against our club forcing us to stop shooting steel targets. They thought it would effectively shut us down, but we adapted and overcome. Now, our rifle targets are sixinch round poly hanging targets, full soda pop cans, and clay pigeons... all on the 25-yard berm. Our matches, unlike many local SASS matches, are more about accuracy than speed.

At the match, because of the 102-plus degree heat, the rifle part of all the stages was identical (we have only one bay to shoot CAS). The shooter had ten shots to engage each of five targets. After hitting them all, you have to shoot a full pop can (they blow up







nice when sitting in the sun). If you miss the pop can it is a miss! If you have extra shots left after hitting the pop can, you can then shoot a clay pigeon for a five-second bonus. I shot the same every stage with the 1866 — I hit the five polys at 25 yards with the first five shots, then with the sixth shot I blew up a pop can on the 25 yard berm, and with the seventh I shattered a clay pigeon on the same berm. I had to dump the last three shots into the berm. It seemed like I could not miss with the 1866 carbine. I was using the 7.0 grains of Trail Boss load. I really noticed this little carbine was so much easier to hold steady than the 9.5-pound .44-40 Henry I have been shooting. I can see why the little 1866 carbine was so incredibly popular after it was introduced!

CONCLUSION

Of all the lever guns, past and present, it is no secret that my favorite is the 1860 Henry. This is followed in a close second, however, by the 1866 Winchester carbine, which just says "early Old West" to me. It is perfect to match up with my 1858 Remington and 1860 Colt Kirst .45 Cartridge Konversions. I now find myself alternating between my 1860 Henry and my 1866 every other match.

With the lack of fore-stock and the necessity to do the "Henry Hop" with your off hand to avoid the follower, the 1860 Henry by design is not a particularly "gamer friendly" rifle! The 1866 on the other hand is a perfect platform for a classy looking, short stroke link, lightened action, "gamer gun." I personally don't care for such modifications, but others do.

Cimarron has done a great job with this Uberti 1866 Carbine. With the bright brass of the receiver and butt plate, the dark, lustrous bluing of the barrel, and the case color of the lever and hammer, it is a very striking rifle! 
STAGECOACH MARY THE WOMAN WHO BROKE ALL BARRIERS

nnie Oakley and Calamity Jane are some of the most well known women of the west, and for good reason — they broke gender roles and inspired many. However, there are many lesser-known females of the frontier, including Stagecoach Mary. Born Mary Fields, Stagecoach Mary went from being a slave in Tennessee to the first African American female to work for the U.S. Postal Service (and only the second woman to hold such a job). Not only did she break gender and race barriers of the time, but she also broke age barriers, starting the job at age sixty. Becoming free after the Civil War, Mary went on to work for the Dunne family until the mother died in 1883 and the children were sent to live with their aunt, a Sister in St. Peter's Convent. When the Sister felt ill, she called on Mary to nurse her back

to health in Montana. Once in Montana, Mary did laundry, gardening, and "men's work" at the convent. She often wore men's clothes with a revolver in the waistband. After leaving the convent, she opened a restaurant in nearby Cascade, although it quickly went bankrupt due to Mary's generosity — she fed everyone even if they could not pay. After this, she worked as a mail carrier for the U.S. Postal Service and did so for eight years. She was known to be extremely reliable and brave; she fought off any thieves that came her way and was rumored to have protected her mail from wolves after a storm flipped her stagecoach. Mary was a highly respected woman and was adored by everyone young and old. When she passed, her funeral was one of the largest in Cascade's history. I believe this is because of her character; if she were alive today, I know she would have stressed the importance of believing in yourself despite what others may expect of you.

She would have advised me to act with kindness in everything I do, but not to conform to what others want you to be. She would tell me to roll with what life gives you. After all, she went from being a slave and a failed business owner to making history. She always made the best of what was happening to her. Although her career path was rocky and very different from the traditional black woman in the 19th century, she stayed true to her beliefs and did not let others define her or let her tribulations set her back. Stagecoach Mary reminds me there are still many inequities and expectations in this world, but individually you can stand against them and be who you want to be. In my life, I can choose to be like Mary by standing up for my beliefs, being kind in all my actions, and trying to change history for the better. Stagecoach Mary had a remarkable attitude and is an excellent role model for what women can do both in the 1800s and now.



here may be people who love Cow-L boy Action Shooting[™] as much as Iron Horse Jim (James Neal Bentley), but no one loves the game more than he did. 
Retirement from Alaska brought Joe and Pat to Trout Creek, Montana.

he Texas Doughboys are a Wild Bunch only club. We have a robust group that enjoys shooting combat style matches and BAMM. Directly because of the components shortages it was decided to implement a few variances at our monthly matches to bene-

fit new and old shooters alike. We feel making accommodations is the best bet for attracting and retaining new shooters. The thought being, competitors have different components and loaded ammo on the loading bench.

For main match we allow *all* SASS legal pistol caliber rifles. In addition, .22 lever actions and pump action rifles with hammer in short, long, and long rifle. We really don't shoot that much rifle in comparison to CAS, as the 1911 is most heavily focused upon. We allow 1911-style pistols in 9mm and .38 super to compete alongside the .45s. We also offer a .22 category, so if you have a 1911-type .22 it can be paired with a .22 rifle. The .22s shoot the same targets and same scenario as the big guns, only they do not have

to knock over a reactionary target. We have not had an issue with seeing and hearing target dings nor with the timer picking up the shots. That's all been a non-issue. Our rifle targets are set out at 25 yards minimum. We also offer the flexibility to shoot a .22 pistol along with a center fire rifle. With these measures, our group has not had to cut back the number of stages or the total round count for the day. These relaxed rules will go away and return to normal WB rules when components return to normal availability without price gouging. Until then, we make do with what's available. We are shooting every month and having lots of fun and entertainment — .22s beat being a bench warmer! I'm Dusty Boddams and that's the Boddam line.

SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

The Cowboy Chronicle welcomes and encourages submissions of articles and match reports from any and all readers.

Please submit articles in MS Word or something compatible. Open Office and Apple Pages (saved as MS Word) are also fine. A count of 500-800 words is a good target to shoot for, but shorter pieces are also fine. Match reports on larger events, like END of TRAIL, Winter Range, and Regional and Divisional matches may run 1000-1500 words if necessary. We will accept lengthier articles, but may choose to break them up into two or more parts to run in consecutive issues, or heavily edit them.

Please do not embed your photos in the Word document. They can be extracted for use in the *The Cowboy Chronicle*, but it can be a chore to do that. Instead, send your photos separately, in one or more emails, as attachments. Three to six photos per email usually works best. It's best to send JPEGs, but other formats are acceptable, and it's best to keep them at about 300 dpi and 3000 pixels (10 inches) on the short side. That size is

ideal and will allow us plenty of leeway when it comes to cropping and adjusting them for publication. Photos should be at least 1000 pixels on the short side to be used for publication. If you're unsure of the size of your pictures, or how to size them, send what you have and we'll adjust them and/or inform you if they're usable.

Usually, two to six photos are sufficient for an article, but we will consider using more for a "big" event, if provided. Photos need not have captions, but captions always make photos more interesting. Ideally, the caption would consist of one or two sentences that say something about the picture that is not obvious and/or is not implicit in the body of the article. "Sam making smoke" is a title but not a caption. "Sam, SASS #XXXXX, shooting his first black powder match; after much deliberation, he decided to give it a try and now he's hooked" is much better. A caption may also serve to let everyone know why the picture is worthy of being published in an international magazine.
