

h, give me a home, where the buffalo roam, where the deer and the antelope play... an old and friendly lament of the once open and wild west. When you get about as far west as you can go and still be standing on land, we still have buffalo, there are plenty of deer, and over the past 15 years or so, herds of antelope have flourished in the great California plains.

California is also the home of The Chorro Valley Regulators — host of the annual SASS Western Regional/Chorro Valley ShootOut every August. Located just nine miles from the Pacific Ocean, as the crow flies, the weather at the range is

as good as it gets with cool mornings and moderate afternoons.

"We were excited to see so many shooters getting back into our sport this past year after a brief hiatus from matches," said Sinful (SASS #73672), CVR's Match Co-Director. "We had almost 270 shooters register for the Western Regional, which was better attendance than our previous Regional."

Ruthless Rodg (SASS #100071), our Vendor Co-Coordinator, said, "In addition to a good turnout of shooters, there were 19 vendors this year, and one even showed up with a bunch of primers. Boy, he sure was busy for a while! I was happy to see the vendors were all pretty busy. That told me they had the kind of goods our attendees were looking for."

With a focus of keeping the posse size comfortable and efficient, we organized 18 posses that averaged about 15 to 16 shooters each. Just the right number of shooters to keep folks moving while not over-taxing any of the posse mem-

bers who were spotting, picking shells, or working the loading and unloading tables.

The 12 stages, crafted by Sinful, featured everything from stand-and-deliver to darn challenging scenarios with targets positioned carefully to be somewhere between SASS-legal and not-in-your-face. We had 15 clean shooters, so at least 15 cowpokes found all the targets on their way through the match.

Side matches included speed pistol, speed rifle, and speed shotgun. There was also Cowboy trap, and a Long Range event with targets at 100, 125, and 400 yards.

A highlight early in the weekend is our three-stage black powder night shoot where the coastal evening haze makes the gun smoke just hang there and creates those moments where visibility is just a notch better than invisible. This is also the place where a few under-breath curse words can be heard both before and after the bang.

Sunday morning topped off the weekend with an early morning Cowboy Church led by CVR's Bushy Blonco. At 10:00 a.m. our Men's and Ladies' Top 16 brought out the best to shoot for the gold. And at noon we were all back in the big tent for the Awards Ceremony.

"I think there's no secret," Sinful said, "that putting on a match like this takes a lot of dedicated folks who can attack a job and get it done right the first time. We had façades to paint, new signs to be made, a field to be plowed to make easier access for trailers, fences to be replaced with log rails, tents to put up, and much more. Somehow, it all came together... as it always does," he said. "As much as I would like to take a bow, the bow would not be for me but instead for our incredible team who just know how to get things done!"

"Striping the camping area [which can hold 168 trailers] was lucky this year," chuckled Trapper McDaniels (SASS #79238), our Campsite Manager. "Three years ago, we came out to stripe the trailer sites on the Saturday before the match and the next day it rained! So, we had to stripe again." Trapper added "And, the year after, the very same thing happened! And that's pretty strange because we just don't get rain in August. Sadly we had to cancel our match in 2020, but to be sure we weren't being jinxed, I still paid attention to the weather that Sunday and what do you know — it didn't rain! I was going to take bets from the striping team this year but I didn't want to risk it jinxing it," he laughed.

For those not camping or tenting on site, the CVR range is 15 minutes from the university town of San Luis Obispo to the south, and about the same distance to the coastal village of Morro Bay to the north; both of these towns are loaded with motels. And if you are okay with being 25 minutes away from the match, the motels in Atascadero (just over the hill from our range) are a bit less expensive.

"We got a bigger tent this year," said Jacq Neat (SASS #93557), CVR's Banquet Manager. "Not only did we anticipate a bigger crowd, but we were also concerned about distancing and making our attendees comfortable." She added, "with the ridiculous increases in food costs, I worked closely with our caterers to ensure nothing would be missing from CVR's much heralded Five-Star Saturday night banquet, and from what I heard from several folks, we knocked it out of the park... again."

Jacq Neat is right about the topnotch dinner, and the eating and greeting was crowned by the heralded Monte

Mills and his Lucky Horseshoe Band who provided the best cowboy music one could eat to and dance to.

"I always like metrics and measuring what and how we are doing," said El

Lazo (SASS #13116), our other Match Co-Director. "To this end, Sinful and I continuously question whether we're on the right path and whether we are delivering the kind of Cowboy Action Shooting[™] event our attendees want to attend," he said. "It's a hard thing to measure and the only thing we can go on is the comments and compliments Sinful and I get during the match. But what really drives it home are the emails and calls we get after the match thanking us and our team for putting on an excellent match. When folks go that extra distance, we know it means something to them, and that we're doing the right thing."

The SASS Western Regional is a notto-miss event that caters to top guns and first-time match shooters with equal care and attention. And this year, our 27th Annual, is going to be even better.

The 2022 SASS Western Regional – 27th Annual Chorro Valley ShootOut will be held August 10-14, 2022. HONORING AMERICAN VETERANS AFIELD 2021

embers of the South Texas Pistolaros and the Texican Rangers Cowboy Action Shooting™ clubs spent the weekend of October 22-24, 2021 as volunteers for the Honoring American Veterans Afield (HAVA) Field Day event in Bandera, Texas. The event provides opportunities for disabled veterans and a family member to explore various shooting sports with industry professional shooters, factory representatives, local IDPA folks, and Cowboys!

SAPD cancelled the HAVA 2021 event originally scheduled for October 9 at the Police Academy due to COVID. Upon learning the HAVA event had been cancelled, many competitors "pivoted" and registered for the Texas Black Powder Championship in Marble Falls,

or the Arizona State Championship in Tombstone, AZ before the alternate date was announced by HAVA. Still, many Cowboys and Cowgirls volunteered themselves and their guns for at least one day at the event.


The Caprock Kid was "ramrod" for the Cowboy Action Shooting™ stage. He had spent the previous week hauling shade tents, steel targets, tables, blankets, and target paint from the CAS range at A Place To Shoot to the Bandera Gun Club facility. Caprock (a different Cowboy) and Burly Bill Brocius spent a part of Thursday setting up the range.

SASS Members Latigo Lee, PJ Mugwump, Long John Beard, Natalia Sue, The Caprock Kid, Burly Bill Brocius, Maid Jalaff, Sauk Valley Sam, Newt Ritter, Canyon St. Clair, Whiskey Moss, Big John Mesquite, Davey Lunchbox, Thunder Mountain, and Beans Ahgin volunteered for at least one day at HAVA. Colonel Colt Winchester was among the first to raise his hand, but health issues kept him from participating.

Throughout each day of the event, "squads" of veterans and family members cycled through five different activities. CAS folk served as Coaches, Range







A catered BBQ lunch provided by HAVA each day kept everyone fueledup. There was live music in the Main Tent. Pallet loads of bottled water were consumed. Over three days, the participants on the CAS stage alone fired more than 2,400 rounds of "Cowboy Ammo."

At the end of the Awards Ceremony each day, an informal Exit Poll was taken by applause. The Cowboy Action Shooting™ stage was far and away the favorite. HAVA has asked that we come to the 2022 event to be held at the Bandera Gun Club.

Anthony Imperato, Founder and CEO of Henry Repeating Arms, said, "We are so grateful to everyone that chooses to support Guns For Great Causes, from those who purchase a rifle to partners like Baron Engraving that donate their time and services." Imperato continued, "To Milah and her family, I wish you continued strength and blessings on the road to remission. Sending you a big hug!"

A cool windy day October 17, 2021 saw 35 shooters arrive all decked out



The number of years as a survivor is represented by beads in the appropriate color for the type of cancer. Also, each past honorary sheriff is given a single bead to add to their loading block. Honorary sheriff for 2021 is Flatboat Bob (SASS #32310).

All targets are painted pink and purple. One bay even has targets arranged to look like the cancer ribbon. Starting line for the six stages is "SHOOT FOR A CURE!" or "I'M A SURVIVOR!"

After all props were torn down and safely stored away it was time to find out the lucky winners of the raffles and all the winners of the match. This year congratulations go out to Cody Maverick and Sassy Shooting Sours as the top male and female shooters.

ission & District Rod & Gun Club, Mission, B.C. Canada, September 3-5, 2021. Well now, that was fun. Even if I didn't get to shoot, I thoroughly enjoyed watching those who did. It's been quite a ride since March of this year when we were asked to take on the Nationals. Last year's event had to be cancelled due to Covid, so it was really important we get one on for this year. We knew this year was going to be filled with its own challenges but we could see a little light at the end of the tunnel and it helped us keep the hope alive. There was talk about lifting some of our restrictions in phases come summer time and that would allow us to have the event. Although we knew it would be a lot different from any of the past Nationals we have had. First, we would be limited to the number of shooters we would be allowed to have at the event. Second, we had no idea if our Clubhouse would be open for gatherings or meals. Still, there was that glimmer of hope, so we forged ahead. Summer arrived and with it the easing of some restrictions and we actually believed it was all going to work out just fine. By August we were allowed to increase our numbers and



it was finally confirmed that our Club and Cafeteria would be open and providing meals for us but we would be limited to a maximum of 65 people in the Clubhouse at any one time. This would present a bit of a problem but could be worked out. We reopened registration and moved people from a waiting list to a confirmed shooters list. More began to sign up, things were looking good. Then the fourth wave of Covid started to take hold and more wild fires began burning up our forests. Those started getting out of hand with some areas being evacuated, some waiting on evac notice, and the smoke getting so bad it was affecting peoples' breathing. The smoke was so bad at times you could see it from the Pacific Coast to the Rocky Mountains. With the fires and Covid we started to lose some of our registered shooters and by the time we were actually ready to start shooting we were down to just 52 participants, a far cry from the usual numbers — well over 130 — we would normally have. Plus, our Province put the mandatory mask restriction back in place for inside buildings. However, that was the worst of it and Friday









or 2021's theme the Mason Dixon Stampede Committee chose to honor the brave men and women of our armed forces. A special Challenge Coin was designed and given to each shooter. Special pins were presented to identify the veterans attending the match and non-veterans were provided

with a "Support our Veterans" pin.

Friday, July 30th, was Side Match Day and Red Shirt day to "Remember Everyone Deployed." Side matches included a three-stage mini warm-up match, long range, and the usual speed events.

Saturday morning opening ceremonies began with the Presentation of the Colors, the Pledge of Allegiance, another beautiful rendition of the National Anthem by Calamity Jill (SASS #86159) and a prayer led by Lash Toru (SASS #85004). After a quick and efficient safety meeting by Range Master Montana Max (SASS

#81717) shooters headed to the shooting bays.

Based on shooter feedback from the 2019 match, the main match was changed to five stages on Saturday and five on Sunday. Stages one through five highlighted a service and the starting line was the service motto. Stages six through ten highlighted five real heroes who played Western heroes on the Silver screen — Audie Murphy, James Stewart, James Arness, Lee Marvin, and Henry Fonda.

As long as Dutch Coroner (SASS #82128) is the Match Director, our match will feature big, close steel with

lots of movement. As Dutch likes to say, "It's a pain to put up, but it's fun to shoot!" The match featured downrange movement on four of the ten stages. The water trough was a new prop everyone enjoyed and the swinging target was back. There were rifle and revolver knockdowns (that could be made up) and on stage eight you pushed down a door to begin the stage.

After all guns had been put away on Saturday, everyone was invited to the ever-popular Wooden Nickel Saloon for "Beverages & BS." Following was a catered dinner by Mission BBQ during which side match awards were handed out. The dinner was a big hit with the shooters.

On Sunday at 9:00 a.m. the final five match stages began and shooters were finished around 1:30 p.m., enough time for everyone to put away their guns, check out the vendors, and pay one last visit to the food vendors before heading over to the big tent for the main match awards presentations.

In 2019, Two Gun Tuco (SASS #78297) edged out Tombstone Coty (SASS #101540) by .02 of a second. In 2021, Tombstone reversed that result, convincingly, to be the Top Man and Overall Shooter, winning six of the ten stages. Top Lady was Sunshine Marcie (SASS #64900), finishing 19th overall.

One huge addition to this year's match was the raffle for a genuine 2nd

Gen Colt Single Action Army generously donated by Geronimo Jim (SASS #21775). Every registered shooter was automatically entered into the raffle. The winning ticket was pulled right before the announcement of the Top Man and Top Lady. The winner... River Banks (SASS #55949).

There were 113 shooters. We hope to welcome even more in 2022. The Mason Dixon Stampede "Lawmen of the Wild West" Match will be held August 5 through 7. We hope to see you there!

THE WHOOPIN' RETURNS! FIVE YEAR DROUGHT IS ENDED

he Tejas Caballeros Cowboy Action Shooting™ Club of Blanco County, Texas ended a five-year absence of its annual invitational shooting competition October 15-17, 2021. Sixty-two shooters from across Texas competed for top honors in the three day event.

The Tejas Caballeros, a 21-year established Texas club, moved to Blanco County in 2016 after losing its Travis County range to the advancement of subdivisions into formerly rural land. With a new location and a 99-year lease on private ranch land 7.6 miles northwest of Blanco, the club began construc-

tion of the "new" old west town and shooting range of Determination, Texas. The club's first shoot in Determination was in January 2017.

After four years of construction Determination now boasts a city hall, city hall annex, bank, saloon, emporium for gentlemen, post office, western union, barber shop, cattle company, livery, wheelwright service company, silver mine office, outlaw cabin, covered wagon, sheriff's office and jail, gallows, and a cemetery. A total of 10 individual shooting stages designed to encourage the world's fastest growing family shooting sport of Cowboy Action Shooting™ (CAS).

CAS shooters converged on Determination for Long Range shooting competition on a perfect Friday morning. Using rifles either produced or patented in the late 1800s, contestants spent the morning engaging steel targets from 100 to 400 yards in a timed

competition of long range accuracy. The afternoon was dedicated to CAS side matches.

On Saturday morning 62 CAS shooters from age 12 to over age 80 began the competition of single action revolvers, lever rifles and cowboy shotguns. Some were blazing fast with timed scores of less than 20 seconds to place 24 rounds on target from four different weapons. Others were not as fast but just as accurate in the multiple age competition categories.

THE COWBOY JAMBOREE

Saturday night was party time as the shooters, spouses, and significant others gathered in the famous Blanco County Courthouse for an old time Cowboy Jamboree. The Blanco Courthouse was the film site of the courtroom scene in the movie *True Grit*. The Jamboree was hosted by the Texas

Republic Ranches Legacy Foundation (501) (c) (3). Guests participated in a costume promenade contest, Old West Faro table for fun, a "Stretch Raffle" with prizes from art to clothing to guns donated by area merchants, and a Dillon 750 loading press donated by the foundation. Dinner was provided along with assorted beverages and a free bar with beer, wine, and setups. The evening's final event was a live auction for a pair of hand-engraved sequentially-numbered stainless steel Ruger Vaquero revolvers, fully tuned for Cowboy Action Shooting™.

Shooting competition resumed at Determination on Sunday morning for the final four stages. After the morning shooting, a lunch of venison chili was provided by the Tejas Caballeros and Dragon Hill Dave (SASS #59561) of Austin.

In the final accounting of timed and accurate CAS competition the overall Men's Champion was Alamo Andy (SASS #101775) from San Antonio. The Women's Champion was Brazos Belle (SASS #82399) from Lipan, TX near Fort Worth.

DISPATCHES FROM CAMP BAYLOR COLT FARO LEATHER

or beginners, I must first mention we are not re-enactors. If you want authentic old west rigs, there are some excellent makers, but you will realize you have made a mistake using them for SASS® competition when you try to reholster on the fly using one hand while the other grabs your second revolver. You will also realize you can't grab the weak hand revolver in a way to facilitate switching to your strong hand. The rig won't be stiff enough to hold its shape. The holster will close when you pull the gun out, and you won't be able to get it back in with one hand.

COMPETITION HOLSTERS

There are very few holster makers who understand this sport. Others might be great leatherworking companies making historically authentic rigs.

Colt Faro makes rigs for SASS COMPETITION, not reenacting. He uses a Cobra Class 4 sewing machine and a Cobra burnisher. He uses a hydraulic press to click out standard parts that he uses all the time. He's getting a laser engraver and cutter to further expand his capabilities. I mention this because if you expect to take custom orders you must be able to work at professional speed. If you don't have them, you're a hobbyist. He's part craftsman, part very particular competitor who accepts only perfection, and part artist.

He makes competition holsters that look like they should be framed on the wall of some sort of art gallery, but they WORK. This rig is VERY functional. It also looks great. Think of it as the equivalent of a custom engraved, ivory handled pistol. They still shoot, but are eye catching, too.

WHO IS COLT FARO?

I met Colt Faro early in my SASS

career in Texas. We shot a lot together. We've been friends for about 20 years. He has become a champion shooter. For those of you who don't know him, you've probably heard of his son, or seen him on the cover of *The Cowboy Chronicle*. Matt Black, who has won that title of SASS Overall World Champion five times. When I met him, he was coming to matches when he was too young to shoot SASS, somewhere around 8-10, at local matches he shot .22s with his father hovering over him. A few years later he was winning matches overall while still a buckaroo.

During that time Colt was making holster rigs, sometimes showing up with a new one every month, and people started buying them, sometimes right off his body. He had help. "Matt is the pickiest person I know when it comes to his equipment, so I had the worst critic ever living with me and eating my food, lol. He would say to me, dad my gun rig has to be perfect because I am going to be an Overall World Champion someday. Well that he absolutely did."

HIS RIGS GOT BETTER AND BETTER

"After lots of prototypes over the years I have landed on perfection as we see it for the sport of Cowboy Action Shooting™. We start out with a platform and there is only one these days that I build for my customers. The Colt Faro Elite platform is everything you could want in a Cowboy Action holster with-

out it actually shooting the stage for you.

"The way it's cut helps to make the bucket on the holster quite large and visible. The steel lining that goes between the layers of leather keep it from having any movement while you are moving. The steel also allows you to adjust the holster so it is as close or as far away from your body as you like. After you get it bent the way you want, it stays there unless you decide to change it. The 34-skirt angles the holster cleverly inward at the toe just making it that much more ergonomic. Each CFL Elite rig comes with the incredible Holster Clamp System. This system allows you to lock the holster down on the belt, so they don't slide. You always want your holster in the same place every time and the Holster Clamp System makes that happen. You slide your belt through the channel behind the clamp and when you get it where you want it on the belt you simply tighten the screws on the back of the holster. This has been a total game changer for many shooters out there!"

ORIGIN OF THE "AMERICAN HERO" RIG

To do this article I needed product to test and review. You can't write intelligently about holsters unless you use them. Looks are maybe 30 percent, and function is 100 percent. Yes, I know that doesn't add up. I knew Colt wanted to show off his artistry, so I left it up to him.

Every rig I've seen has been different, with various exotic leathers and other materials, such as acid washed copper. They've all been heavily decorated.

I had no idea what he was going to come up with. He asked me what the shoulder patch my unit in Vietnam wore. That gave me a clue.

When I saw the pictures, I was stunned at the artistry and humbled when he called it the American Hero Rig. I served with heroes, but I'm not one. I'm a combat vet.

You're looking at pictures. Everyone who has seen the rig has said the same thing. "The pictures don't do it justice."

I have taken probably a hundred photos with two different cameras, several backgrounds, and different lighting systems, and I still agree with that statement. The multi-toned leather looks different in different light.

HOLSTER FEATURES

Functionally, the holsters are well-designed for competition. The top angles away from your body and the muzzles angle in. Additionally, a feature I consider mandatory is you can grip the weak hand revolver with forefinger under the trigger guard. Your thumb grips the top strap. Then you can transfer to your strong hand in a firm firing grip without fumbling. Your weak hand isn't in the way of your strong hand. Do not buy holsters for serious competition without this feature unless you shoot double duelist/gunfighter or use a cross-draw holster. Even then it's a good feature.

It has an oversized holster band with the MACV Crest (Military Assistance Command, Vietnam) and crossed rifles. Obviously, those were specific mementos. Of course, he could do others.

The body is made of elephant and has a gator overlay. Antique brass parachute spots with decorative accents. It has a very high-end tri-color finish, antique brown with black on the inside and the copper washed gator.

Each holster has a Screw Knife scabbard. You can keep two Screw Knives or the included Lutz Two-In-One screwdriver that comes with a #1 Phillips screwdriver (for the Chicago screws in the rig) and a slot head that fits the grip screw and ejector rod housing screw of a Ruger Vaquero (the only

gun I've tested it on), so you can check them at the loading table. If you've ever watched a Ruger ejector rod housing go downrange, you'll know why this is a good idea. You also get what I call a Colt Faro Leather Army Knife that has, among other blades, a #1 Phillips, scissors, and most important, a corkscrew. You want to have wine with dinner, don't you?

BELT

An antique-finished buckle goes with this rig. With this kind of buckle you can yank the belt tight, especially if you wear it low. This is more user-friendly than an award buckle.

There are belt options. Matt Black and the other guys who want their holsters in front and two hand widths apart use a belt that is buckled in the back. It is a curved belt for comfort and has removable billets so the size can be adjusted easily.

This rig has the Scout style, a standard one piece tapered on each end. It is suede lined. It works well for putting the holsters just in front of the point of the hip, angled forward like these, or further back and muzzle straight down. Getting them in front where you can see them is getting more and more popular in SASS.

TOP GUN SHOTGUN BELT

One hundred percent adjustable straps (billets), elephant body, suede on back. Wrapped with elephant and doubled over for clearance. Loops are elephant with a limit strip on the bottom to keep them from going in too far. They are a snug fit for the 12 gauge shells so you push them all the way in and pull up to adjust retention. If it's a stand and deliver you might want to pull them up some. If the shotgun is last with lots of movement push them all the way in. I found the shells all the way in to be quite easy to remove. There hasn't been any binding. Sadly, I can't pick up six shells at once. (Of course, I couldn't pick up six shells with any other belt either.)

Three .38 reloads are on each side. Again, there is a retention strip below, and you can push them all the way in or keep them higher for the planned reload. The rounds came out easily when pushed all the way in.

CROSS DRAW RIGS

A lot of the fastest shooters use cross-draw holsters. Matt Black is one of them. Beginners start with cross draw holsters and get into trouble. The cross draw that Gus used in "Lonesome Dove" isn't legal. What works in SASS is the cross-draw in front of your weak side, pointed almost straight down. The requirement is the holster be within 30 degrees of vertical "AS WORN." Let your belt slip down in front and up in back, and you could be in violation. Needless to say, the Matt Black cross-draw rig with buckle in the back fits all of those requirements. All the rigs come with the Lutz Two-In-One screwdriver, the Colt Faro Army knife, an LED flashlight, and a backpack and bag for the rig.

BASIC RIG

Colt's rigs are not cheap, as you would expect from the quality. The basic rig is \$750 and the shotgun belt is \$275. You get what you pay for. He tries to keep up with orders, so you don't have long waits. That might change after this article is out and several thousand SASS shooters see them, though.

EAGLE KIRINITE IVORY GUNFIGHTER GRIPS

have written about Eagle Gunfighter grips before. They were designed by Joe Bowman and Raj Singh of Eagle Grips more than 25 years ago. They are thin with a thick portion at the top to prevent roll up in recoil. They are the dominant grips on Rugers in SASS. Until Kirinite came out most shooters would recommend checkered grips. Even Phil Spangenberger in *True West Magazine* recommended checkering.

But in testing some smooth Kirinite grips on 1911s, I realized they were so "grippy" I didn't need checkering and started using the smooth ones on my competition 1911s.

Then I realized they came in "Ivory." (Note: No cuddly little elephants were involved in this product, not even ones from 200 years ago). SAAs of all types, even Ruger Vaqueros look best with ivory grips. So that's what's on my competition Vaqueros. When you get a pair or two, before you fire off an angry letter that they're slippery, wash off whatever they're waxed with using a mild all-purpose cleaner. Now they're not, they're grippy. Yes, I use one of the liquid chalks on my hands. I did with checkered grips, too. I have ivory grips on my Colt SAAs, but I consider them too delicate to use in matches. These are tough. I thought they were perfect to cap off this rig.

BLACK POWDER 101 HOW TO TAKE UP SMOKING WITH NO ADVERSE HEALTH EFFECTS


kay, so you've seen some folks at your local club or elsewhere shooting that nasty old smoky stuff and cackling and giggling like mad people. This is accompanied by big rolling BOOOMS! You wonder what the heck is so great? It's dirty, smelly, really hard to clean up, has to be cleaned every day (what a pain in the posterior!) and corrodes your expensive guns, right? So why would anyone do that unless they're a freaking idiot?


Well... while all the opinions expressed above are the prevailing "wisdom" about black powder, they are DEAD WRONG! Now I'm not saying you don't have to do some things differently, but it doesn't take much more effort and sure adds a whole new level of fun to our game. You actually get to shoot your guns with the proper all-organic "green" propellant they really used back in the day. After all, BP is made from charcoal, sulfur and bat excrement (the common source of the potassium nitrate needed).

For those of you who may have a slight itch to try black powder but maybe haven't been quite brave enough to actually confess it to anyone, I thought I'd write a few short articles about what is required to join the "Dark Side." They will include:

A discussion of common misconceptions versus what the truth really is; bullet design and proper lubrication; cleaning requirements (and how simple it is); reloading pistol caliber metallic cartridges; reloading shotgun; reloading long range rifle caliber for when you want to really reach out and "touch someone" at 500 to 1,000 yards — or more!

These won't contain all the information you might need, as there are a lot of variables (just look at all the different load recipes in any reloading manual), but will touch on the major issues and differences between black powder and that new fad, smokeless stuff. It will give you a good idea of

the things you need to do differently, and where BP is actually easier to deal with in a couple of ways. So... if you're gonna play Cowboy, do it right!

COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS

Let's face it, black powder has not been in common use by reloaders for more than 100 years. That being the case, a lot of knowledge about how to load with it has been forgotten. Well, not forgotten, it's out there if you dig for it, but it's certainly not common knowledge. And what "knowledge" folks have is mostly wrong. Think about the old game of whispering a sentence into someone's ear and repeating it around a circle. By the time it gets back to the originator, it bears absolutely no resemblance to the original phrase. That's pretty much the same thing with what most of us "know" about black powder we've been "whispering in someone's ear" for 100 years and "knowledge" has been distorted into having little relationship to reality.

To begin, I'll tell the story of my first experience loading black powder. I had a new Cimarron 1873 Deluxe rifle in .44-40, all decked out and beautiful. After

all, if I'm going to play Cowboy, I'm gonna do it right with the original cartridges available "in the day." I loaded up some smokeless loads with seven grains of Unique (I'm no damn gamer!) and the rifle shot really well — life is good. So... I decided to play with some black powder loads. I'd been thinking about it awhile and decided the .44-40 rifle was the perfect gun with which to take the plunge. After all, the cartridge was designed for black powder. All the "common" knowledge said to fill the case with FFg so there was no airspace and seat the bullet — so simple an Aggie could do it.

I went to the range and fired some of my smokeless loads to adjust my new Marbles tang sight — so far so good. Then I stuffed in some BP ammo and began to make smoke. Woo-Hoo, this is neat! Then I noticed that after less than a magazine of ammo, I couldn't even hit the dang paper. What the heck is going on here? I fired a few more, and it was even worse — couldn't even dignify it by calling it a "pattern." A cylinder bore shotgun would laugh at my "group." Disgusted, I went home cursing and scratching my head.

Upon arriving home, I tried to clean

the barrel, and could barely get a brush through it. When I did, I started pushing out long stringers of lead and took a couple of hours to get it clean. "Well, that sucks!" says I to the mouse in my pocket. This black powder just isn't worth it! How the heck did anyone ever hit anything with it?

Well, after calming down and doing more research, talking to a few people on forums, etc., I finally understood what had happened. I had violated several basic rules of assembling a reliable black powder load. Black powder does not play well with petroleum based compounds. In our case, this is the hard, crayon-like lubes used on regular commercial cast bullets designed for smokeless powder. Petroleum compounds when in the presence of combusting black powder will form the fouling from hell. This is what happens to most folks who try black powder for the first time, and it permanently sours them on it before they learn the cause.

Black powder requires a soft, non-petroleum based lubricant. There are lots of recipes out there if you want to make your own. Most involve beeswax, a light vegetable oil, and toilet



bowl wax sealing rings. Or, if you're lazy like me, there are quite a few sold commercially. The one most commonly used was developed and is sold by Steve Garbe (multiple national champion BP single shot rifle competitor) and is called SPG (for Steven P. Garbe).

You need enough of this soft lubricant to keep the entire length of your barrel "wet" so you have a wet "lube star" on the end of your muzzle. By doing this, you keep the black powder fouling soft and each subsequent shot wipes the bore of the fouling from the previous shot — thus you have an equilibrium with one shot worth of fouling in the bore at any one time. With a properly assembled load achieving this, you can shoot indefinitely without cleaning the rifle.

Thus, we "shoot down" the myth that you have to clean the bore of a BP firearm after every few rounds fired. I'll shoot a complete 10- or 12-stage match and never clean my guns. I'll also shoot a complete long range match without cleaning.

BP ammunition works best with a soft bullet alloy, usually between 40:1 and 20:1 lead/zinc. This allows bullets to completely obdurate (or expand to fill) the rifling grooves, which prevents flame cutting of the bullet and lead deposits.

You need a bullet with large enough lube grooves to hold sufficient lube to keep the entire length of the bore wet. Many modern bullet molds don't have large enough lube capacity to do this.

These are the high-level basics of building good black powder ammunition. But let's address a few other misconceptions about shooting black powder.

Black powder guns have to be cleaned immediately after shooting — Well, yes and no. Yes, in that it is good to clean a gun that has fired black powder as soon as practical. However, the cause of corrosion is that black powder combustion products are hygroscopic

(they absorb water from the moisture in the air). Once they become damp, the sulfur that is part of the BP compound forms various acids (*i.e.*, sulfuric acid, etc.) and this causes the corrosion. HOWEVER... if you keep the gun in a climate controlled area with low humidity (your air conditioned or heated house) there is not enough humidity to cause a problem. While I don't like to make a practice of it, there have been occasions when my work schedule did not allow me to clean my gun for a week or more. I've had no corrosion and the bores are still bright and shiny.

Black powder is very hard to clean — This is probably one of the worst misconceptions out there. In fact, BP fouling is much easier to clean than smokeless powder fouling. The reason is simple — all of the fouling products are water soluble. The best BP lubricant/rust inhibitor I've found is Ballistol, which was developed by the Germans in the late 1800s for the purpose. Make about a 10:1 dilution of Ballistol in water and it forms a nice white emulsion that folks call "Moose Milk." Spray a little moose milk down the bore and run a few patches wet with moose milk down the bore — done. I guarantee you I can clean any of my guns with three or four patches and a pull of the bore snake. Wipe down the rest of the gun with the moose milk and let dry. The water dissolves the BP fouling and when it evaporates it leaves behind the Ballistol for lubrication and rust prevention.

NOW, A FEW RANDOM THOUGHTS...

As mentioned above, you do need a bullet of soft alloy designed to haul enough lube to keep the bore wet. Many people who get "hooked" by black powder end up casting their own to use — "Once you go black, you never go back!" However, there are several sources of bullets you can buy commercially. A few of these are Buf-

falo Arms, Montana Bullet Works, and Whyte Leather Works. Mark Whyte is really good to work with and casts Dick Dastardly's Big Lube bullets lubed with SPG at a very reasonable price.

It's pretty common for someone wanting to shoot "black powder" to buy one of the substitutes, like APP, Triple7, etc. The attraction is they can use the standard commercial cast bullets (don't need soft alloy and SPG), so it is viewed as simpler. There are, however, a couple of issues with these subs. They are more expensive than black powder. They are more corrosive than black powder. They are all based upon some type of organic acid as a key component, such as ascorbic acid. They MUST be cleaned immediately or they WILL corrode your guns. So if the real thing is less expensive and less corrosive, why would you use a sub?

Black powder is hard to find in metropolitan areas. Stores just don't stock it. This is unfortunately a result of storage requirements and insurance for compounds classified as explosive. This is largely why substitutes exist. They are not classified as explosive so can be stored and handled like conventional propellants. This is where the little brown truck is your friend. There are several good retailers that ship to your door — Grafs, Maine Powder House, Buffalo Arms, and my favorite, Powder Inc. The best pricing I've found is from Powder Inc and they are really nice folks to work with. Note that the prices quoted on their website include the Hazmat Fee as well as shipping, so it's an all-in price.

Okay, that's enough to give somewhat of a high-level overview of the care and feeding of black powder firearms. We'll continue in subsequent months with more specifics on how to load BP ammo for various purposes (cartridge revolvers, cap and ball revolvers, pistol caliber rifles, shotgun, big bore lever rifles, and big bore single shot rifles).

HISTORY

MAXIMILIAN'S NOT-SO-EXCELLENT ADVENTURE IN MEXICO — 1863-1867

In 1861, the year the American Civil War broke out, Mexico defaulted on its debts to Great Britain, France, and Spain. The three countries mounted a punitive expedition to force payment. Pretty soon, Great Britain and Spain withdrew, but the French troops remained. The Mexicans put up a stiff resistance and even defeated the French at the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862 (Cinco de Mayo) but they were steadily pushed back in subsequent months. By the spring of 1863, Mexico City and a large part of the countryside was occupied by French forces.

The French emperor, Napoleon III, embarked on an ambitious enterprise. He decided to install a monarchy in Mexico that would increase French prestige and profits. It would be unpalatable to the other European powers to set up a government with a Frenchman at its head, so he went shopping for an archduke in Austria.

The brother of Franz Josef, the Austrian emperor, fit the bill. This was Friedrich Maximilian von Habsburg, who was amenable to the venture. Although he was the Admiral of the Austrian Navy (if you haven't heard of it, there's a reason), Maximilian was bored with his privileged life. His wife Charlotte was positively delighted by the thought of becoming an empress. The scheme was sure to antagonize the United States, but so what? The U.S. was in the middle of a civil war and could not afford to interfere. There was a symmetry to the thing because in the 16th century, Mexico was originally part of the empire of Charles V, who was a Habsburg. Napoleon III could claim that he was restoring order to a chaotic land and at the same time deny he was setting up a puppet government.

To preserve the fiction that Emperor Maximilian was the result of the "people's will," a plebiscite was held in the areas

occupied by the French troops. These were mostly in the large cities where the rich, famous, and reactionary Mexican citizens were congregated. They were sick of the disorder that had plagued Mexico for decades. The previous republic under Benito Juarez had, after all, caused the European intervention in the first place

by defaulting on its foreign loans. Juarez also had the gall to bring reforms that encroached on the privileges of wealthy churchmen. Why not try a monarchy again?

The problem was that the people in the countryside weren't necessarily enthusiastic about a foreigner who was propped up by French arms. Benito Juarez, who had fled Mexico City, was gone but not forgotten. Mexico is a vast country and he had plenty of places to hide. Juarez also had plenty of loyal, talented generals as well as potential recruits to ensure a protracted insurgency.

You can skip this part if you like, but it's helpful to know that in 1863, when Mexico City was in French hands, "Austria" included Hungary, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Slovenia, parts of Italy, Poland, and other lands in eastern and southern Europe. Eventually the Austrian Empire became known as the Dual Monarchy, or Austro-Hungarian Empire. France was technically a constitutional monarchy but was called the Second Empire — Napoleon I had established the First Empire which vanished after his defeat at Waterloo in 1815. A series of political upheavals resulted in his nephew, originally Louis-Napoleon, becoming Emperor Napoleon III in 1852. (Napoleon II is too obscure and boring to write about.)

As long as I'm talking about family ties, it is worth knowing that the monarchies of Europe in the 19th century were so inbred that it even puts me, a native Kentuckian, to shame. This was especially true of the Habsburgs, who tended to produce offspring with long jaws and projecting lower lips. Some of them were almost un-presentable because in addition to being deformed, they were also intellectually challenged. However, it isn't fair to single out the Habsburgs for intermarrying. Victoria of England was the daughter of a German princess and had grandchildren that included Wilhelm II of Germany, Nicholas II of Russia, and George V of England. If the names of Victoria's descendants sound familiar, they were all players in WWI.

However, Maximilian von Habsburg was not in any way intellectually challenged. He was intelligent, decent, well-meaning, and naïve. His jaw was weird looking, but he grew a magnificent beard to hide it. He was married

to Charlotte of Belgium, who was related to Queen Victoria and was also sister to King Leopold II of Belgium. Charlotte's grandfather had been King Louis Phillipe of France who reigned from 1830 to 1848. Charlotte was especially keen to reestablish her own royal lineage. Unfortunately, this caused her to encourage Maximilian to embark upon a dangerous and foolhardy adventure. Even more tragic was the fact she encouraged her husband to remain in Mexico when it was obvious he needed to leave.

Maximilian and Carlota, as she was to be known in Mexico, left Trieste for Vera Cruz in April 1864. They arrived in late May and began an overland trip to Mexico City. Along the way, people cheered them and waved flowers and flags. While some of the goodwill was genuine, one gets the impression that in many cases the happy peasants had been "encouraged" by French troops. One of the carriages bearing Maximilian's staff encountered the bodies of deceased guerrillas during the journey. "See, this country is all but pacified," they were assured. Indeed, there was a plan to ambush Maximilian and Carlota, but it had been discovered and thwarted. "Not a thing to worry about, we have everything under control."

For a while, it looked that way. By April 1865, Juarez and his Republican forces had been pushed northward almost to the Texas border. Meanwhile, Maximilian and Carlota set up residence in Chapultepec Castle in Mexico City and established a European style court with all sorts of protocols and ceremonies. The Mexican conservatives, especially the high-ranking officials of the Catholic Church, were horrified to learn that Maximilian intended to bring reforms to his empire. In fact, he was beginning to resemble Benito Juarez in his attempt to modernize and secularize Mexico. This caused squabbling and division among Maximilian's supporters.

Unfortunately, Maximilian's army, which by now included Belgian, Austrian, Imperial Mexican, as well as French troops, could not completely suppress the insurrection. More bad news came when the American Civil War ended in April 1865. Secretary of State William Seward made it clear the United States was extremely displeased with the idea of a French client state in Mexico. Veteran troops under the command of American General Weitzel were sent to the Texas/ Mexican border and began to harass the Imperial Mexican forces. Caches of weapons and ammunition were "lost" and conveniently "found" by Juarez' supporters. In France, enthusiasm for the Mexican venture began to wane. It was becoming exorbitantly expensive, among other things. The insurrection had to be put down quickly.

As veterans of Vietnam, Iraq, and Afghanistan will attest, putting down an insurrection is easier said than done. Time, terrain, and politics are on the side of the insurrectionists. Things get even more difficult when a major world power decides to provide support for the insurrection. If you prop up an unpopular regime, you had better steel yourself to be utterly ruthless. Unfortunately, ruthlessness is difficult to justify if you have any pretense of a conscience. Since insurrections usually involve atrocities on both sides, they result in a nasty cycle of retribution.

Maximilian tried to be ruthless, but it didn't really suit him, and he went about it in a half-hearted way. On October 3, 1865, he issued the Black Decree, which stated that






any Mexicans who took up arms against the Imperial forces would be executed if they did not immediately surrender. Once the decree was put into effect, Maximilian regretted it and began to issue pardons when he could. Nevertheless, an estimated eleven thousand Mexicans were executed over the next year. Disgusted, Maximilian rescinded the law in November 1866, but by then it was too late. The Black Decree had only made the resistance more committed. Predictably, Juarez applied the same principle to captured *imperialistas*.

By January 1866, Napoleon III had decided to extricate himself and his troops from the mess in Mexico. According to his plan, the first phase would occur in November 1866, the second in March 1867, and the final withdrawal was slated for November 1867. Maximilian was advised to abdicate and return to Europe. He was on the verge of doing so, but Maximilian's wife Carlota persuaded him to stay. A council of sycophants in Mexico City also urged him to fight on. So what if the French left? A new, "Mexicanized" army would be created which would fight on and eventually prevail.

Carlota went to Europe in July 1866




United States Secretary of State William Seward was determined to end France's Second Intervention in Mexican Affairs.

in hopes of persuading Napoleon III to change his mind about withdrawing or at least to continue funding the Mexican venture. Once she arrived in Paris, it was almost comical how Napoleon tried to avoid her. Carlota was quite determined, and she eventually gained an audience with the French emperor. There were tears and excuses from Napoleon (who was suffering from kidney stones), but he stood firm about his decision. After an incisive remark, Carlota left for Rome in hopes of enlisting the diplomatic skills of Pope Pius IX. After all, she and her husband were Catholic monarchs and Pius had given his support to the venture in the first place.

That didn't work out well either. Carlota had suffered headaches and episodes of "melancholia" for a long time. The stress of recent events led her to a complete nervous breakdown. She became convinced that someone was trying to poison her. The pope was sympathetic but could promise nothing. Indeed, as it became obvious that she was spectacularly unhinged, Pius IX avoided Carlota as though she had the plague. Whenever she saw him, she insisted that he taste her food to thwart her would-be assassins. The beleaguered pontiff was reduced to hiding in the unused rooms of his own palace. Eventually Carlota was bundled off to Trieste where she was put under the care of an "alienist" or psychiatrist. She never saw Maximilian or Mexico again.

In Mexico, the withdrawal of

French troops accelerated. Napoleon III rightly anticipated a growing threat from Prussia and its brilliant statesman, Otto von Bismarck. France couldn't afford to squander its manpower by prolonging a doomed venture in the New World. In addition, U.S. Secretary of State Charles Sumner continued to apply diplomatic pressure. In early 1867, Marshal Achille Bazaine, the commander of the French army in Mexico, practically begged Maximilian to abdicate. Unfortunately, Maximilian chose to stay and took personal command of the imperial forces. By March 11, 1867, the last French troops departed for their homeland.

As the French scaled back their presence in Mexico, Juarez' army retook city

after city. The Imperial Mexican Army, reinforced by various European volunteers (as well as some ill-advised former Confederates) was demoralized, underfed, underpaid, and poorly armed. Maximilian and those troops who remained loyal were holed up in Queretaro, about 100 miles north of Mexico City. On May 15, a turncoat Mexican officer opened the gates of Queretaro to the Republican forces. Maximilian and two of his top generals were taken prisoner.

A trial was held the following month. The outcome was predetermined. Maximilian, Generals Miramon and Mejia were found guilty of bearing arms against the Mexican republic and sentenced to death by firing squad. Ironically, Maximilian and his

top generals were sentenced to death for the same offences outlined under his own Black Decree, except this time the tables were turned. There were appeals to commute the sentence from all over the world, but President Juarez was unmoved. An example had to be made so that future adventurers would not threaten Mexico's sovereignty. As one historian observed, Maximilian signed his own death warrant by signing the Black Decree.

On June 19, 1867, Maximilian and his two commanders were executed by firing squad. All of them died bravely. Death was instantaneous for the emperor and Miramon, but Mejia flopped around a bit and had to get a *coup de grace*. Maximilian's body was shipped to

Europe and interred in Vienna.

He would have made a good ruler had he come to power under different circumstances. Maximilian truly cared about his adoptive country and its people. There wasn't a whole lot of difference between the future he envisioned for Mexico and the future Juarez wanted. Tragically, he was installed and propped up by a foreign power. That was impossible for most Mexicans to overlook. Once that power withdrew, he was doomed.

Carlota, Maximilian's unfortunate spouse, was cursed with a long life. She never fully regained her composure. Not long after Maximilian's death, she was persuaded to return to Belgium to live with her brother, King Leopold II. Her husband's fate had been kept from her so she would agree to the move. Once she learned what had really happened, she became even more unstable. Sometimes Carlota would behave in a calm, lucid manner, but at other times she would shout, weep uncontrollably, and break whatever breakable objects were available. At other times she would tear her clothes off and proceed to beat herself with a riding crop. Understandably, she was kept out of the public eye. She finally died in 1927 at the age of 86.

It is with some satisfaction that I can relate what happened to Napoleon III, the man whose vanity and ambition had instigated this entire mess. Things were changing in continental Europe regarding the balance of power between France and Prussia, the largest German state. Otto von Bismarck, the chancellor of Prussia, had ambitions to unite the various German states under Prussian hegemony. While Napoleon III had his dalliance with Mexico, Bismarck had engineered a series of conflicts with Austria and Denmark that had maneuvered the northern German states into a military and economic alliance with Prussia. The southern German states, most notably Bavaria, had so far kept out of the alliance. France was dead set against German unification and rightly considered Prussia to be a threat.

Bismarck hoped to lure France into a war that would force the holdout German states into an alliance that would ultimately result in German unification. In July 1870, Bismarck edited a telegram from King Wilhelm I of Prussia to the French ambassador that made it look like Wilhelm was insulting French honor. The plan worked — the French press howled for revenge and Napoleon III was maneuvered into a war for which he was ill-prepared. Prussia, on the other hand, had developed military plans years in advance for this very contingency. To make a long story short, France was defeated in less than a year.

Napoleon had to abdicate, France had a mini civil war, and the 3rd French Republic was eventually established. Exiled to England, Napoleon III died of kidney failure in 1873. He is remembered as *Napoleon le Petit* because he failed to live up to his namesake. The epithet fits,

It is no secret to any of my CAS friends or our readers that I am huge fan of the metallic cartridge conversion revolvers of the early West. It is also no surprise to them that I am a huge fan of all of Tom Selleck's Westerns, not the least of which is his outstanding 1997 classic, *Last Stand at Saber River*. Here is a great synopsis of the plot from IMDB (International Movie Data Base):

"As America recovers from the Civil War, one man tries to put the pieces of his life back together but finds himself fighting a new battle on the frontier. [Paul] Cable is an embittered Confederate soldier who returns from the war to reclaim his Arizona homestead from rebel pioneers who sympathize with the Union war effort. Desperate to rebuild the life he once knew, Cable ultimately joins forces with Vern Kidston, his Union adversary to make a last stand for the one thing worth fighting for — his family."

Paul Cable (Selleck) returns to his home in Arizona. His father in law, James Sandford (Harry Carey) is an established and prolific frontier gunsmith. Cable's wife, Martha Sandford Cable (Suzy Amis), is also an accomplished "gun plumber." She gives her husband a custom cartridge conversion 1860 Colt, which now uses metallic cartridges and has an ejector. It has ivory grips and is engraved. The revolver that was actually used in the movie is a Kenny Howell custom 1860 Richards Type I conversion. As the movie is about 1865/66, that was at least five years too early for a Richards conversion to be correct. It was not, however, too early to be a private conversion. These private Long Cylinder Conversions (LCC) were beginning to proliferate about the same time (around 1866 and 1867) that Remington New Model Army revolvers (aka 1858s) were being factory converted to five-shot .46 rimfire caliber under license

of S&W's Rollin White patent for bored through cylinders. The private conversions, of course, were unlicensed, but it was impossible to enforce these private conversion patent violations in the far reaches of the American Frontier.

Many Remington and Colt revolvers were privately converted by very talented frontier gunsmiths like Saber River's fictional James Sanford. The most common cartridge used for the conversions was the .44 Henry rimfire, but others were converted to .38 or .46 Rimfire. Later, private conversions used the .44 Colt cartridge, which was designed for the Colt Richards conversions. There are even some samples of 1860 Colts that have been found that were converted to five-shot cartridge revolvers in .45 Colt! In the 19th Century, weapons were not discarded just to upgrade to the next fancy firearm. Often they remained unchanged, or were retrofitted with improvements (like a cartridge conversion) and still used for many years. I remember reading (about 20 years ago) that one member of Butch Cassidy's post-1900 Hole in the Wall Gang was recorded to have still carried a Remington New Model Army in .46 rimfire. If it still worked well, they didn't replace it just because something newer came out, unlike today in our disposable economy.

The .46 short rimfire was generally available in two loadings. Remington's loading had 20 grains of black powder under a 227-grain conical bullet. Winchester's loading of the cartridge, on the other hand, was 27 grains of pow-

der and a 230-grain bullet. Both the Remington and Winchester versions of the .46 rimfire were really good fight stoppers. The Winchester loading, however, was the superior of the two, having more punch than the more common .44 Henry rimfire cartridges used in other

conversions. The Winchester loading had virtually identical performance to the later (1875) developed S&W .45 Schofield centerfire. It was also the equal of the 1902 developed, 230-grain .45 ACP cartridge that is still alive and well 120 years later, and is arguably the

finest self defense handgun cartridge ever developed.

I started shooting SASS® matches in 1994. Since about 1996, I have been a staff writer and firearms evaluator for *The Cowboy Chronicle*. This has allowed me the unique opportunity to shoot most of the Uberti, Pietta, Rossi, Ruger, Henry, and Armi San Marco replicas through the years. I have also used many original Colts, Winchesters, Smith & Wessons, and Marlins in my years in SASS. With all of the revolvers I have had access to and used over the last 28 years, what I now use for SASS main match revolvers may surprise you!

While I use a RIA 1911A1, 1894 Marlin Century Limited, and an original 1897 Winchester for Wild Bunch matches, my standard SASS main match pistols are all Kirst-Konverted Pietta black powder revolvers that I converted myself. Two .45 Colt 1860s, a .45 Remington 1858 Remington, and a Colt 1851 in .38 Colt are my go to pistols. I feel that these "private conversions" of mine are truly in keeping with my

persona of an 1867/1868 Lawman in the California Gold Fields. His revolvers are private conversion, five-shot, in .46 rimfire. These are paired with an 1860 .44 Henry he carried during the Civil War and a 12 gauge hammered coach gun. Since .46 rimfire for revolvers and .44 rimfire for the rifle are not exactly feasible for SASS main match firearms, I use .45 Schofield in the revolvers and .44-40 in my HRA 1860 Henry.

PIETTA 1860 KIRST SABER RIVER

Of the above, my absolute favorite SASS revolver is my Pietta 1860 Colt, Kirst-Konverted Saber River. (Though my three-inch Kirst/Pietta Avenging Angel is a REAL close second!). The sleek and beautiful eight-inch barreled 1860, with its beautifully engraved cylinder and ejector rod and faux ivory grips, points like few other revolvers I have tried. Besides being a beauty, to me it seems it shoots so well you have to try to miss a plate! In fact, it the past couple years I have been using my Kirst/Pietta Saber River, I have never missed a

steel plate target at a SASS match.

I started with a Pietta .44 Colt 1860 revolver with an eight-inch barrel from Debbie Sims at EMF. I obtained the .45 Colt/Schofield "Saber River" edition Konverter kit from Walt Kirst and VTI. I finished off the revolver with some nice one-piece, faux-ivory grips from Get-a-Grip on eBay (for about \$70). Unlike the standard 1860 Konverter kit with its smooth cylinder and Richards-style ejector rod assembly, both the cylinder and ejector rod assembly for the Saber River kit are hand-engraved in a pattern that closely replicates the engraving on the Kenny Howell custom 1860 used in Last Stand at Saber River. I finished off the package with a period correct Texas Jack's Slim Jim holster from Cimarron Firearms.

KIRST KONVERTERS

Walt Kirst has been interested in Cartridge Conversion revolvers for many years. A talented machinist and inventor, he had done some custom conversions of percussion revolvers. More than 20-plus

years ago, he came up with the idea of a drop-in cylinder to convert an 1858 Remington into a .45 cartridge revolver. His initial design had a solid back plate with a single firing pin and a five-shot cylinder. A little later, he came up with a gated version that required a channel to be cut in the recoil shield. His current version has a spring loaded loading gate like period "Thick Plate" Remington conversions. Kirst still offers a non-gated "Pale Rider" 1858 unit.

Walt eventually also came up with a five-shot .45 Colt/Schofield conversion cylinder for the 1860 Colt clones. Like the later production 1858 Konverters, these are gated and require milling or grinding out a channel in the Colt recoil shield for the cartridge to load and eject through. The Saber River is an engraved version of this gated 1860 Konverter. Note, these gated 1860 Konverters can still be used without modifying the recoil shield. You simply remove the cylinder to load and unload it, as you would with the 1858 Pale Rider, non-gated Konverter.

Kirst Konverters are SASS legal, even though they are five-shot cylinders. In the case of the 1860 Konverter, you simply lower the hammer down so the firing pin is between two chambers when not being fired or in the holster. In the case of the 1858 Konverters, there is a designated "safety chamber" area between two of the chambers to rest it. When you cock the hammer, the cylinder rotates to the first cartridge and locks in place for firing.

Some basic information from the Kirst Konverter Website

- Made from strong, heat-treated 4140 steel or stainless steel.
- CNC machined, blued or polished, and assembled in the U.S.A.





The Kirst unit is "drop in" in the .45 and .38 versions of the 1858 and, in the six-shot Pietta 1851/1861s. In the five-shot .45 caliber 1860 versions it may require some minor fitting to cycle correctly. (Uberti's, especially recent ones, can have some timing issues because of Uberti relocating the cylinder hand farther from the arbor than older ones.)

KIRST INSTALLATION

With the gated Konverters, I found it was not hard at all to grind the channel in the recoil shield of the Pietta revolvers. I disassembled the revolver and placed the Kirst gated recoil shield in place. I opened the gate and painted the area on the recoil shield that needed to be removed with black marker. Removing the recoil shield left a black shadow that guided my grinding. Don't worry, the placement of the channel does not have to be exact. There is plenty of tolerance in the alignment if you don't get it exact.

I used a Dremel grinder with a ½-inch sanding drum and began to slowly grind. It took about five drums, but I changed when the grinding slowed. I started with a coarse 60-grit drum. When I got close, I switched to a 120-grit one for a smoother finish. Periodically I would install the cylinder and recoil plate and attempt to eject an empty shell. After about 45 minutes, it was done. I polished the ground out area with fine emory cloth, then hit it with Birchwood Casey cold blue while it was still warm. It is actually surprisingly easy if you take your time and don't get impatient. It is a good idea to cover the lower part of the receiver below the recoil shield with tape, in case you slip (I found this out the hard way on the first one I did).

From start to finish was less than an hour and a half. In the end, I had an 1860 Colt cartridge revolver, chambered for .45 Colt/Schofield cartridges. Even though the percussion cylinder is six-shot and the .45 Colt/Schofield conversion cylinder is five-shot, the timing with the conversion cylinder was perfect. Kirst has maximized the angles of

the indexing star on the rear of the cylinder to achieve enough rotation for the five-shot cylinder to rotate into place.

The only fitting I had to do on my 1860s was the wedge. Even with the percussion cylinder, when the wedge was inserted far enough for the retention spring to engage on the right side of the wedge hole, it was too tight to allow free rotation. This is not an uncommon occurrence on all 1851- and 1860-based revolvers, whether made by Pietta or Uberti. It is just a part of the 180-year-old "open top" design that goes back to the 1836 Patterson.

Also, when using .45 Schofield rather than .45 Colt it can be tighter because of the thicker Schofield brass. Fortunately, it is very easy to fix on any "open top" design. I looked and the rectangular hole in the barrel arbor was

smaller than the frame hole, and was pushing the muzzle too tightly against the face of the cylinder. I removed a few swipes at a time from the front of the wedge (about 1/64-inch) with a fine file until the Kirst cylinder turned free. I made it where the wedge now inserts far enough for the wedge spring to grab the outside edge of the notch, retracts with finger pressure, and allows free rotation of both cylinders.

To finish, I installed the Richards-style ejector rod assembly. Unlike the original one-piece milled assembly that the Colt Richards conversions used, this is a two-piece unit. Simply remove the rammer assembly, re-install the rammer screw, and tighten the assembly with the supplied set screw for a perfect rattle free fit. One modification I did was to cut a small notch in the edge of

the flat spot on the bottom of the ejector rod that the wedge slides through (see picture). This allows clearance for the wedge retention spring to grab the edge of the rectangular hole in the barrel web that the wedge passes through.

Loading the Kirst 1860 is the same as loading a Colt Single Action Army. Pointing in a safe direction, cock the hammer to the first notch. This allows the cylinder to rotate freely in a clockwise direction. Open the loading gate and line up a chamber in the cylinder with the loading channel and insert cartridge. Repeat until all five chambers are loaded, then rotate the cylinder until you can lower the hammer where the firing pin rests between two cylinders. To unload, you repeat the process. With my loads, the cases fall out when you tip the muzzle up and rotate the cylin-

der slowly. If they stick, the Colt Richards style ejector rod assembly is used to knock the empty cases out.

HOW DOES IT SHOOT?

As with all 1860 percussion revolvers, the sight picture on my Saber River is rudimentary. That is because the rear sight notch is a very small "V" cut in the front nose of the hammer and the front sight is a short, tapered brass blade. I slightly enlarged the notch with a triangular machinist's file to improve the sight picture.

The load I use in my main match pistols is loaded in a .45 Schofield case using a 200-grain RN, hollow based bullet (that I also use in my 1911 for Wild Bunch). The load is 5.0 grains of Trail Boss. It is a stout load, though the 1860 grip handles it with ease. With this load, the Saber River 1860 shoots dead center, but about three inches above point of aim at ten yards, using a traditional two-hand hold. As I have said before, this is very common with all of the Colt percussion revolvers, including originals. I aimed at a six o'clock position on a four-inch bulls-eye and hit about three inches above in the black, making a nice three-inch cluster. At a match, I would use a "low, just below dead center hold" and generally hit the center of the target.

I also used some excellent Black Hills and HSM factory .45 Schofield ammunition in the Saber River. It printed to almost the same POI as my handloads. The Black Hills and HSM were not as stout as my loads, and actually grouped a bit better than the Trail Boss hand loads I use.

Kirst Konverters are made to be used with either black powder loaded ammo or "Cowboy Action" loads that approximate BP loads (under 1,000 fps). DON'T shoot Buffalo Bore ammo or any +P cartridges from a Kirst Konverter.

CONCLUSION

Much of the early Old West was dominated by percussion revolvers like the 1851 and 1860 Colts. Many of these were converted to cartridge revolvers, both by the factories and talented frontier gunsmiths. The importance of these early metallic cartridge firearms in the settling of our frontier in the last 30 years of the 19th Century can not be overstated. Whether you are a Cowboy Action Shooter™ interested in recreating a persona from the early West or just a shooter that enjoys classic looks, the Pietta 1860 Colt with a Saber River .45 Colt/Schofield caliber Kirst Konverter is a good choice. After all, Tom Selleck has pretty good taste in his choice of period correct firearms for his westerns, and the Saber River Colt I am told is one of his favorites.


For me, there is also a certain pride in creating your own cartridge revolver from percussion, just like those gunsmiths of the Old West.

HAPPY TRAIL MARKER THE APACHE KID WHO KNEW HE WOULD REACH 82?!



ARIZONA WILD BUNCH STATE CHAMPIONSHIP 2021

I'm tapping this out before catching up on my sleep after a whirlwind weekend at Cowtown, AZ, having just blazed through the fun and challenging Arizona Wild Bunch State Championship. I counted, on various stages, in addition to targets of every size and description, four dueling trees, a long range full-sized steel silhouette, discs, squares, rectangles, coffins, cowboys, swingers, and one stage that contained what I dubbed "Lucifer's Rack." 

WILD BUNCH MATTERS CALIFORNIA STATE WILD BUNCH CHAMPIONSHIP 2021

common saying, "Wild Bunch Matters," is often seen as a pin worn on the shooting gear of those who enjoy that demanding but enjoyable adjunct to Cowboy Action Shooting™. Like CAS, those who play the game get to use period firearms which, like the Cowboy counterpart, includes a lever rifle and pump shotgun from the era. But the game differs from Cowboy, as the cut-off is 1912. This allows the competitors to sling J.M. Browning's greatest creation, the 1911 pistol. It's a hoot, a challenge, and great fun.

And I have never seen a better example of how enjoyable it can be

than the 2021 California State Wild Bunch Championship. Once again, the state championship was held at Diamond Dick's Cowboy Town just down the road from that teeming metropolis, Sloughhouse, CA. (Go ahead; pronounce that one. I've lived in California for much of my life and was never certain how to do so properly until this weekend. Trust me; the locals will square you away, pretty quickly!)

Ms. Penny Ante and I pulled in to DD's Cowboy Town after a genuinely scenic tour of rolling farmland in California's picturesque central valley. When we arrived the day before the match, signs of life were everywhere. Campers were being set up, gun carts were unlimbered, and the echo of large-bore firearms punctuated the afternoon breeze. Around us, the range was immaculate, and the entire scene was a reminder of what a wonderful state California truly is, once you get outside the Democrat-run cesspools that are its major cities.

My traveling companion and I stretched our legs, shook off some travel dust, then shook the welcoming hand proffered by Tully Mars (SASS #40161). Tully is the ramrod and match director for the Gold Country Wild Bunch club, as well as one of the better WB shooters you'll ever see. Once signed in, with our shooter packets in hand, we took in the scope of our location for the rest of the weekend. The match takes place on a sizeable, but only a small corner, of the Folsom Shooting Range. It is a vast, well-maintained facility, serving every kind of shooting sport you can imagine. As we walked the stages, we noted how neatly they were laid out, with easy to follow instructions, and pleasantly shootable target sizes and distances. Nice. After our brief reconnoiter, with big smiles of anticipation plastered on our faces, we headed to our hotel.

Friday dawned clear and cool, and

after a cup of the most truly villainous hotel coffee I've ever choked down, we made our way to the range for some side matches. There was the usual allotment of speed events for pistol, rifle, and shotgun, but Tully & Co. threw in some inventive twists, like a turkey shoot, which involved 10 knockdowns at a goodly distance, with three positions required to see and engage all the targets. Ms. Penny Ante is a newcomer to this Wild Bunch business and indeed, shooting at all, but has taken to it like a duck to water. As I was squinting at the diminutive target size and distance, without an ounce of hesitation, and with my borrowed rifle, she marched to the line, and at the beep, went to work. She promptly went 10 for 10 on those distant little targets — 10 for 10.

With a borrowed rifle. My turn and... harrumph. Those little suckers were out there! My official story, and I'm sticking to it, is that I was feeling merciful and allowed a couple of the turkeys to live. Well, after her performance, I couldn't exactly blame the rifle, could I? Then, just to rub it in, she did it again. Only this time, she did it even faster. "I LIKE this," she chirped, excitedly. With a mutter, I went to the line, and repeated my dismal performance. Stupid rifle.

Some other fun was waiting. Ms. Penny especially liked the card cutting, which involved shooting five playing cards endwise, from about six feet. With two runs, she split three cards each time. Then, it was my turn. Just as I walked to the line, a cloud passed in front of the sun. And a high wind sprang up.

Honest. It was nearly a gale force hurricane. And, the sun was in my eyes. I think there may have even been an earthquake. Plus, I was feeling merciful. Like the turkeys, many a playing card lived, unmolested, to see another day. Sigh, I never was very lucky at cards.

After a fun afternoon of warm-ups we headed back to the hotel so I could listen to my companion chatter on excitedly about how much fun this was.

Saturday dawned, clear and cool. For reasons of our own, we would have to shoot the first full day pretty much devoid of sleep. Buoyed now by a full thermos of the worst coffee in the history of the hospitality industry, we made the pretty drive back to the range, and, all business now, promptly went to work.

It is a tribute to the stage writing of Tully Mars that even in our sleep-addled condition, there were no Ps, simply because there were no P traps. The stages were challenging, as Wild Bunch should be, but they were also straightforward and eminently shootable. You can usually tell when a match is written by an experienced shooter, and Tully is among the best.

Penny kicked off her part of the match with a clean stage. As this included a pair of can poppers, and she was new to the pump action shotgun, plus borrowing one tailored to my monkey-length arms, she was tickled pink by her success.

Safely removed from Friday's dual menaces of turkeys and playing cards, I shot a creditable stage, gulped down another cup of that truly dreadful hotel java, and set about my posse chores. By the second stage, as good posses do, we had settled into a smooth routine. Sunrise Bill tirelessly manned the clock, spotters were selected from those who were extremely capable and diligent, and the vigilant brass pickers were so sharp-eyed they even found a shotgun bead that had come adrift during a stage.

Stage 10 was a special challenge. There was plenty of movement along the line, two dueling trees, and a Texas Star about 20 yards distant to be engaged with the rifle. I think everyone was a bit intimidated by that last, but everyone on our posse bore down on their sights, and just about all of us

cleaned the diabolical thing.

After the main match shooting was done that afternoon, teams were chosen for a log sawing contest. This involved cutting a 4x4 in half, using only our 1911s. I'm delighted to say I was on the winning Team 1! Or, at least I was, until some doofus shouted out, "Let's do the best two outta three!" (Harrumph. I have to learn to keep my mouth shut!) The second time, Team 2 proceeded to cut that lumber like they were armed with Springfield Armory chainsaws. Then, just to prove that they had earned the win, they did it again.

A couple of things I really enjoyed about the match — on stages which featured seven rifle rounds, the 1911 could be used to engage the rifle targets in lieu of using the rifle. Fun stuff and, if I was a more accomplished pistol shot, or the distances had been a bit less... rifle-y, I'd have been tempted to try it. Respect to the shooters who chose to employ that option!

And what shooters they were. With shooters from several western states on hand. Silvertip, Tully Mars, J.T. Wild, Rumwalker, Cordite, and Molly Magoo.

Thoughtful touches abounded at the range. In addition to the excellent and shooter-friendly permanent stage props, there were snacks on the stages, plenty of bottled water, and even an extremely convenient sink for washing, on each bay. Nice, and like the stages, very thoughtful!

Sunday dawned clear, another beautiful day. California was putting on a show for the shooters. With a will, we went back at it. By now the posse mem-

bers were like old friends, cheering clean stages with a hearty "Whoo-YEAH!" and good-naturedly ribbing the occasionally brain addled. It was good fun and I walked to the last stage with a touch of sadness, not wanting this marvelous match to end. We had laughed, cheered, made new friends, shot dueling trees, playing cards, bell towers, and soda cans, shared stories, mended equipment, and generally had as much fun as it's legal to have.

After a really nice awards ceremony, commendable for its brevity, we were reminded about the best part of this game, kicking back, spending time, sharing stories and a libation or two with old friends and new. Too soon, it was time to saddle up and head for home. Tully Mars and the entire crew at Diamond Dick's Cowboy Town are to be congratulated on a terrific match, and be assured we'll be back for another.

Reaching the rifle, shooting the far stars in a two, three, two sweep, then a quick jaunt to the shotgun to engage four knockdown Sandinistas. Doughboy winner goes to Sarsaparilla (SASS #107188) and Teddy Roosevelt winner goes to Artemus Von Schutze (SASS #106783).

As the dew still covered the green grassy thoroughfare, the Flag was raised and began to wave in the wind. The Bear Creek Volunteers played the Star-Spangled Banner and the explosive sound of a cannon signified the start of the 2021 Missouri State Wild Bunch Championship. The Volunteers lead a force of thirty in pursuit of victory.

While playing the Black Jack tables

At first you walk past it to place your rifle on the center table, pointed down range preparing to take down the carefully constructed targets of a lock-box, three Outlaws, and another large lock-box in a one, two, two, two, one sweep. Staging your shotgun on the far table with forethought of creating a diversion by engaging the six bottle knockdowns. Turning to walk back to the first table, your eyes go to the roulette wheel, and you begin to think about what number you want it to land on. SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

The Cowboy Chronicle welcomes and encourages submissions of articles and match reports from any and all readers.

Please submit articles in MS Word or something compatible. Open Office and Apple Pages (saved as MS Word) are also fine. A count of 500-800 words is a good target to shoot for, but shorter pieces are also fine. Match reports on larger events, like END of TRAIL, Winter Range, and Regional and Divisional matches may run 1000-1500 words if necessary. We will accept lengthier articles, but may choose to break them up into two or more parts to run in consecutive issues, or heavily edit them.

Please do not embed your photos in the Word document. They can be extracted for use in the *The Cowboy Chronicle*, but it can be a chore to do that. Instead, send your photos separately, in one or more emails, as attachments. Three to six photos per email usually works best. It's best to send JPEGs, but other formats are acceptable, and it's best to keep them at about 300 dpi and 3000 pixels (10 inches) on the short side. That size is

ideal and will allow us plenty of leeway when it comes to cropping and adjusting them for publication. Photos should be at least 1000 pixels on the short side to be used for publication. If you're unsure of the size of your pictures, or how to size them, send what you have and we'll adjust them and/or inform you if they're usable.

Usually, two to six photos are sufficient for an article, but we will consider using more for a "big" event, if provided. Photos need not have captions, but captions always make photos more interesting. Ideally, the caption would consist of one or two sentences that say something about the picture that is not obvious and/or is not implicit in the body of the article. "Sam making smoke" is a title but not a caption. "Sam, SASS #XXXXX, shooting his first black powder match; after much deliberation, he decided to give it a try and now he's hooked" is much better. A caption may also serve to let everyone know why the picture is worthy of being published in an international magazine.
